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Parish disputes levee report

Says subsidence rate in Des Allemands levee is normal

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St. Charles Parish President Larry Cochran refuted a recent report that stated the Sunset Drainage District levee has subsided at least half a foot from 2014 to 2018 and as much as 1.2 feet in one area,

noting that while the levee indeed has subsided over that time, the publicized numbers were inaccurate.

A report by *The Advocate* published last month cited numbers collected by a team of scientists and engineers with the St. Charles Parish government that indicated the

HHS teen's life changes with concussion

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Even after a soccer ball hit Mya Theriot in the face so hard that it knocked her to the ground, she expected to recover and go right back to her beloved game.

But it didn't happen much to her dismay, as well as that of her family of Luling.

In the two years since it happened at Hahnville High School, Theriot was identified with a brain injury that resulted in a diagnosis of dysautonomia – a disease of the nervous system – that has changed this 16-year-old's life forever. It was linked to the concussion that her mother, Cherie, said left her with lingering strange and life-altering symptoms.

"Most of my extra time before my concussion and dysautonomia was spent playing soccer, and I can't do that any more,"

Mya said. "I still get sad about that but I know that my health is more important. My condition stops me from doing most things that kids my age are able to do. Sometimes, I can't go anywhere. And, a lot of the time, if I force myself to do more, I'm really sick afterwards."

While some of her symptoms seemed to ease, others emerged like dizziness, stomach issues, memory problems, difficulty focusing and elevated heart rate that doctors didn't initially connect to the nervous system problems. Over time, doctors verified dysautonomia.

"It's been traumatic for our entire family," Cherie said. "It's turned our world upside down. Her quality of life is really low and she was

Flood damages 19 homes

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Phillip LaRosa and his family saw the water coming toward their home in Norco last Friday so they started picking up everything off the floor – just in case.

By 2:15 a.m., it was in the house and they fled.

"We'd been watching it all night and I kept checking outside to see the water coming up, but it didn't," LaRosa said. "A couple of hours later, the water is only a couple of inches under my door step ... and that's when we knew we were in trouble."

LaRosa said he rushed to check weather radar, saw the heavy band of storms overhead and started packing. Their Labrador retriever, Chloe, was dropped off with his brother nearby and they went to Metairie to stay with his sister.

LaRosa, his wife, Nina, and four children were among several people who fled flooding in Norco, as well as Montz, Hahnville and Destrehan.

Parish President Larry Cochran said these areas were overwhelmed when a slow moving cold front stalled over the

area and dumped up to 9 inches of rain in about two hours. Parish departments, including public works, wastewater, waterworks and recreation, were dispatched to the area to ease the flooding and was substantially gone the next day.

Cochran put the effected structures at 38, including 19 homes.

This was the third flood for the LaRosa family since moving there in 2006, but they'd had at least 10 close calls in that time.

"My house sits two to three feet lower than the other side of the street," LaRosa said. "We're like sitting in a bowl."

By last Friday, they nervously watched the weather again.

"This time was no different than any other time," he said. "We saw the water coming up and hoped nothing was going to happen."

LaRosa estimated two inches of water got into the entire house, resulting in an estimated \$25,000 of damage including sheetrock, baseboards, cabinets, carpet and doors, which will be covered by flood insurance that cost him \$1,800 a year and at a steadily rising premium.

They are among the recipients of a parish grant to have their home raised, but that could take a year to get done.

Curbside recycling - Is it worth the cost?

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Amid major changes to St. Charles Parish's recycling program, the parish will ask residents if they want to resume curbside recycling. "We want to survey the residents on it because it's a mandatory charge on the water bill," said Chandra Sampey, the parish's contract monitor. "The parish can not pay the company to run their truck along the residential streets in the parish without all residents paying the charge."

The survey will be placed in water bills in early April.

Sampey estimated the service could cost residents \$2.50 to \$3 a month for weekly collection.

Participation will be a key decider in whether the parish restores the program. The parish averaged 25 percent in its initial program, a number that was considered too low to resume the effort.

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After 50 years, Destrehan Pharmacy closes its doors

After 50 years as a staple of the St. Charles Parish community, Destrehan Pharmacy will close its doors on Jan. 16.

“It’s the hardest decision I’ve ever made in my entire life,” said store owner B.J. Burkenstock, who represents the third generation of his family at the helm of a business that was passed down from his grandfather to his father, and his father to him in 2012.

While Burkenstock and store manager Steven Fauchaux said it’s been an emotional and difficult time, they also noted they have done their best to celebrate the bond within the store and community that allowed the business to thrive for such a long time.

“We want everyone to know how appreciative we are for everything they’ve done for us. We had a great time taking care of so many patients in the community, and they’re the reason we’ve been here for so long,” Burkenstock said. “They’ve given us so much over the years.”

Burkenstock said the pharmacy improved its outlook when it moved into its new, larger building location along

Airline Highway, the fourth location within the parish the pharmacy has held over its tenure. It allowed for additional inventory, parking and new amenities like a drive-thru window that proved a hit with customers, but the changing landscape of the business ultimately led to the store’s end.

“(Moving into the new building) was an effort to continue on with the legacy and the business ... it worked to a certain extent,” he said. “We tried everything we could, but at the end of the day, it wasn’t sustainable any longer.”

Fauchaux said while the cliché often goes “it’s just business,” that was never how the

pharmacy approached customers or employees alike.

“It’s a family on both sides of the counter,” Fauchaux said. “The patients talk to us like family and we work together like family. It was a tough decision ... all we can do now is

show love and appreciation for the support everyone’s ever given us.”

Customers of the pharmacy will be able to fill and pickup prescriptions until Jan. 16, then after that day all records will transfer to CVS, which purchased the business.

The business was established in 1966 and run by three generations of Burkenstock’s family, including his grandfather Lloyd and father Bruce Sr. It celebrated 50 years of business in 2016, but has become the

latest in a growing number of independent pharmacies nationwide to close its doors. According to a report by U.S. News and World Report, 16 percent of independent rural pharmacies have closed since 2003, a total of 1,230 stores (those numbers running through July of 2018). Citing numbers collected by the RUPRI Center for Rural Health Policy Analysis, the report also noted in a number

Parish keeps tradition alive — along with the environment

Collecting live Christmas trees this month to fortify coastal restoration efforts

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While largely discontinued elsewhere, St. Charles Parish continues on with the tradition it was the first to establish years ago as it will collect live Christmas trees from residents in order to recycle them for coastal restoration.

The St. Charles Parish Public Works Department will pick up the trees for recycling curbside around the parish starting today (Jan. 10), then once each of the next two weeks on Jan. 17 and Jan. 24.

Drop-off sites will also be available at the East and West Bank Bridge Parks in Destrehan and Luling until Jan. 24. Trees must be stripped of all decorations and flocked

trees will not be accepted.

All trees are being used as wave and tide barriers, as they have in years past, and will be used to replace degraded trees in the barrier pens in the Bayou Gauche area.

According to parish Planning and Zoning Director Earl Matherne, in the area the pens are used sediment has settled to the bottom of the ponds, making them shallow enough that

vegetation has grown. That has created a better environment for fish and amphibious animals, as well as better for waterfowl

“Simply put, they’ve worked for us,” said Matherne.

That said, while the benefits to the coastal environment have been apparent, the practice has lost support in other areas for an unrelated reason - Christmas trees haven’t been as popular as they once were. Because people seem to be buying less real trees, Matherne believes, participation has shrunk, to the point where the state has stopped providing funding for the project.

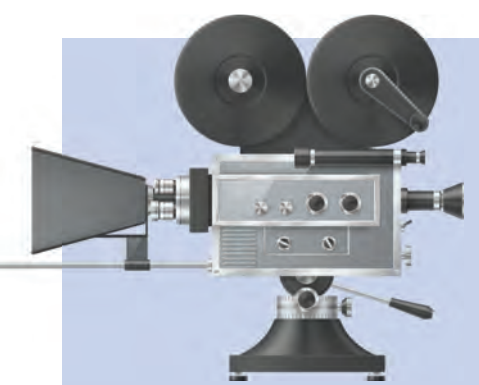
As a result, St. Charles Parish was not only the first parish to adopt the program, it’s effectively the last.

Matherne said the project came to be as the brainchild of a coast sciences professor at LSU, Dr. John Day. He suggested the plan to his contacts in St. Charles Parish.

For over 30 years, Nancy worked at Destrehan Plantation, where she led her staff and the site through decades of growth, renewal, and success as its executive director. Under her leadership, she brought in millions of dollars in donations, grants, and revenue. She added cisterns and elevators to the main house, a parish tourist information center, an education center, a gift shop, the Herbert Harvey Legacy Room, the Jefferson Room, new maintenance facilities, a picnic pavilion, an outdoor concert venue, an open-hearth kitchen, a garden, a bridal suite and overnight cottages, the Azby Administrative Building, and the gigantic always-bustling Mule Barn. She modernized the tour, opened new rooms of the main house to visitors, added live demonstrations, and expanded access to the site to tens of thousands of Louisiana students of all ages. Her work with the Louisiana Tourist Commission allowed her to promote Destrehan - and Louisiana - across the United States and Gulf South region.
Nancy's annual Fall Arts & Crafts Festival has for decades been one of the largest and most popular festivals of its kind in southeast Louisiana - bringing vendors, artists, cooks, performers, and families together every November in St. Charles Parish. She also brought the site to acclaim in commercials, television shows, music videos, and in films like Interview with the Vampire and the Oscar-winning 12 Years a Slave.

During Nancy's tenure, the site, museum and events held there won many awards, including Louisiana Attraction of the Year in 2010. After Hurricane Katrina, she worked mightily to open the site - especially the Mule Barn, grounds, and cottages - to private events and weddings. Hundreds of couples have said "I do!" in the buildings she added to the site.
She worked tirelessly and totally for the site through storms, hurricanes, oil spills, downturns, as well as sociopolitical change - but she never lost focus on her mission of historic preservation and education through tourism. Put simply, she managed one of the most significant intact cultural sites in southeast Louisiana. She is survived by her Destrehan Plantation staff and volunteers, past and present.
Nancy was the kind of woman who made you wonder how she did it all. It was as though she had access to more energy and time than anyone else. She seemed to think of everything - even before you had thought of it yourself. She always found a way to love everyone, support everyone, and never missed an opportunity to be her unique blend of kind, happy, and dignified. She was the very best kind of everything that she was, and we will miss her very much.

LaBranche was an ideal place to start because it was visible from the interstate and could spark interest elsewhere in Louisiana.

Last year, St. Charles Parish collected approximately 3,500 trees, which went toward covering 1,200 acres of pond.
Once upon a time, that number averaged around 8,000 trees about 15 years ago. Now, Matherne said about 3,000 to 5,000 is the expected haul.
But it's still a worthwhile project, the trees' bushy nature and overall availability making them ideal barrier pen fortification. Additionally, Matherne added, it keeps them from going into the landfill, maintaining another environmental benefit.

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The family is a place where we love each other far beyond our merits

This past year was an up and down year for many of us. Whether we agree or disagree with the present policies of our country, one thing we can agree on is the importance of our families.

When we speak of family life today, having a single idea of what a family looks like is difficult. In the U.S. 31 percent of families have less than two parents. Also when speaking of the family, different emotions surface – joy, thankfulness, sadness, pain, anger, disappointment.

You can imagine the enemy army’s anxiety and surprise when, a few minutes later, the women marched out of the fortress, each carrying her husband on her back! Our family members are our most valuable possessions.

When Mary and Joseph return to Jerusalem to look for Jesus, they are surprised to find him sitting with the doctors and asking them questions. When they express their worry and anxiety, Jesus replies that he must be about God’s affairs. Mary and Joseph do not understand what J e s u s m e a n s . Misunderstandings occurred in Jesus’ family. This can be

reassuring when it happens in of our own families.

Misunderstanding causes pain and confusion. Many older parents find it difficult to accept the choices that their adult children make. In particular, they struggle when their adult children no longer go to Church, profess their faith or choose alternative lifestyles.

To love is to continue to accept the other person, even if their choices are hard to accept. To love requires giving freedom that is appropriate to age and maturity. This balance is difficult to achieve. The task of parenting is to nurture this maturity.

For any parent, letting go is difficult. To let go does not mean to stop caring; it means I cannot do it for someone else. To let go is not to cut myself off. It’s the realization that I cannot control another. To let go is not to enable, but to allow learning from natural consequences.

To let go is to admit powerlessness, which means the outcome is not in my hands. To let go is not to try to change or blame another; I can only change

myself. To let go is not to fix, but to be supportive.

To let go is not to judge, but to allow another to be a human being. To let go is not to be in the middle arranging all the outcomes, but to allow others to effect their own outcomes. To let go is not to be protective; it’s to permit another to face reality. To let go is not to deny, but to accept.

To let go is not to nag, scold, or argue, but to search out my own shortcomings and to correct them. To let go is not to adjust everything to my desires, but to take each day as it comes. To let go is not to criticize and regulate anyone, but to try to become what I dream I can be. To let go is not to regret the past, but to grow and live for the future. To let go is to fear less and love more.

CPRA has helped save state coast

When Johnny Bradberry was appointed to serve as Gov. John Bel Edwards’ executive assistant for coastal activities and chairman of Louisiana’s Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority (CPRA), he claims it was those years after Hurricane Katrina that provided a professional test equal to or greater than the test of Hurricane Betsy.

His work at CPRA has been among the most important, rewarding and outright challenging work of his life, he reports.

Louisiana stands prepared and confident with a governance structure and science-based Coastal Master Plan that integrates ecosystem restoration and hurricane protection under a single state-led voice. But Bradberry added this could not have been successful without a tremendous staff.

Since its inception, the CPRA has been outfitted with a devoted workforce that has consistently innovated and delivered solutions to complex problems.

According to Bradberry, “Through funding feasts and famine, disasters and near-misses, this dedicated agency has moved dirt, sand, concrete, rock and countless policy hurdles to secure \$21.4 billion in funding for the betterment of 46,000 acres of land, 315 miles of levee improvements and 60 miles of barrier island construction

Sunset levee subsidence exaggerated

To the Residents of St. Charles Parish,

The purpose of this letter is to clarify some misconceptions contained in an article published in The Advocate on Dec. 12, 2018. The article stated that almost the entire Sunset Drainage District Levee (SDDL) has subsided at least half a foot from 2014 to 2018, with one area along Petit Lac Des Allemands dropping to 5.9 feet this year, down from 7.1 feet in 2014. That information however, is not just exaggerated, but also misrepresents the existing conditions along the SDDL. Recent analyses show that during that time period, the levee subsided at a rate of approximately half an inch per year, which according to scientists and engineers, subsidence is not only typical for a levee system it is also anticipated. During that span, roughly 10 percent of the levee system experienced elevation changes between 2 to 5 inches with about 90 percent only showing differences between 0 to 2 inches (See Figure 1 below). The results show that the majority of the elevation differences were located along the southern stretch of the levee near the Bayou Gauche Pump Station. Areas along Petit Lac Des Allemands and along the Paradis Canal showed very little

change, which is contrary to the article published in The Advocate.

Unfortunately, the information reported by The Advocate suggests otherwise because not only was the article published before analysis of the 2017 survey data was completed, parish officials were not contacted for comments to verify the information that was provided to them. Although initial comparison of the data showed differences between the 2014 LiDAR survey and the 2018 ground survey, it wasn’t until subsequent analysis of the 2017 survey data that those discrepancies were found to be just a result of different elevation models used between the two data sets and not a result of subsidence. Nevertheless, the article created the impression that the amount of subsidence was greater than it actually was. In addition to this, the article also claims that the subsidence was due to lack of maintenance. Since 2014, when the parish took over control of the Sunset Levee, more than 4.5 million dollars has been invested into the levee to ensure it is not only maintained, but that it also meets the engineering standard of care.

Our main goal for the Sunset Levee has been a holistic one with the intention to provide complete protection to all of the residents on the Westbank of St. Charles Parish. Currently, we are working with engineers and FEMA to ensure the levee stays within the engineering standard of care so we can continue to flood fight while seeking additional federal funding. The mission of St. Charles Parish government is to always work towards improving the quality of life for our residents and at the forefront of that mission is levee protection for every single resident. We will continue to stay dedicated to maintaining the SDDL just as we are with the entire levee system.

Ready, Set, Grow!

I like some mums and I cannot lie. We often purchase chrysanthemums (“mums”) as potted plants to give a little short-term color to fall displays. But once the blooms fade, do we toss them? Leave them? I say we should pull them up quickly to retrieve them! They’re actually perennials (plants that live for many years) and many can be taken out of their pots and grown in the landscape.

First know there are three types of mums. “Football mums” have very few but very large blooms. The plants tend to be tall and upright, lending themselves to cut flowers. They’re bred for that and pruned that way; they’ll tend to get leggy after a while. “Florist mums” or “pot mums” also have somewhat large flowers an upright growing habit. They’ve been bred and pruned to grow this way too. Neither of these types of mums do especially well in the garden.

However, “garden mums” have smaller and more numerous blooms. Their growing habit is lower than the other varieties and they have a rounded shape. So gardeners, if the mum is round... okay; you get the idea. You can see the shorter, rounder shape will hold out in the garden better. They’ll eventually grow to no more than about

12-18” tall. (If yours end up reaching for the sky, you can tie them in a bunch with string for support when blooming.)

Like most plants, they want a fertile, well-drained bed. Pick a spot with at least 6 hours of sunlight per day. Though the shortening days in fall that stimulate blooming, the plants will handle that themselves when the time comes. Cut the plant back by about ¼ to 1/3 of its original height and leave about 12” between plants. This will give some room for the vegetative growth needed to support new blooms later.

Turn the soil over, either with a tiller or a shovel. Then cover it with 2-4” of organic matter – compost, decaying leaves, or whatever’s available. Mix it into the soil, but there’s no need to fertilize this time of year. Just water them in and let them settle.

In January you can do some heavy pruning. Cut the mums down then to about 3” tall. You’ll see new shoots begin to sprout in February or March. Especially on older plants, you may gently dig it up and divide it into as many as four plants. You can then re-plant the divisions into beds prepared similarly to the fall-planted ones. This will promote vigorous new growth in spring.

Sunset levee that protects 16.4 square miles — and the homes of more than 5,000 residents of Des Allemands, Paradis and Bayou Gauche — has subsided at least half a foot during that four year time span, with the most regression coming along Petit Lac Des Allemands, which reportedly dropped 1.2 feet, from 7.1 feet to 5.9, putting residents who live in those areas in increased danger of flooding.

Cochran and other parish representatives maintain those numbers were inaccurate and misrepresented the situation, saying discrepancies between the compared 2014 LiDAR survey and 2017 ground survey were a result of different elevation models used between the two data sets and not a result of subsidence. The parish asserted that during that span, 90 percent of the levee showed differences only between 0 and two inches and that 10 percent of the levee system experienced elevation changes between two and six inches. The parish adds the Petit Lac Des Allemands area showed a much smaller change than reported.

“For most of the levee, it was two inches, and where it was reported it subsided the most (Petit Lac Des Allemands), it was six inches,” Cochran said. “The information was reported prior to the data being processed and analyzed.”

Parish representatives said the rate of subsidence for the Sunset levee was typical and anticipated for a levee system.

The parish’s efforts to maintain the levee have drawn criticism from Councilman Paul Hogan, who says he believes the levees stopped being properly maintained when parish government took control of the Sunset Drainage District in 2013. Prior to that, levee maintenance fell under the jurisdiction of the Sunset Drainage District, an independent board consisting of local property owners.

“Sunset is a very integral part of the levee system,” Cochran said. “We were reminded by (Hogan) that we’ve done nothing with Sunset ... we’ve spent in excess of \$4.5 million and that’s a very conservative number.”

Specific upgrades included the reworking of the pump station with the

addition of pumps, as well as addressing asbestos found at one of the buildings.

Cochran also said while further measures are planned, the parish cannot act alone, and is limited in what steps it can take to raise the levee.

“After Hurricane Katrina, things are done differently with levee maintenance ... you can’t just dig and throw dirt on top of a levee (to raise it),” he said. “It’s important FEMA recognizes this levee. We can’t do anything to degrade it, and this degrades it, in their eyes.”

He added that the Lafourche Basin Levee District is in charge of the Sunset levee, and that the two parishes are working together “to get the levee where it needs to be in the community’s eyes.”

Hogan acknowledged and applauded the parish for making the commitment and effort to fortify the pump station, but held firm in his stance that the levees themselves have not been adequately addressed, nor his requests to lay out a specific plan to raise the levee. He said an inquiry letter to Cochran was forwarded to the Lafourche Basin Levee District, which he said acknowledged the levee’s recession but did not answer his specific questions concerning the minimum amount of levee protection and what the plans to raise the levee will be in that case. He said multiple follow-up letters to Cochran have gone unanswered.

“Levees sink all the time. A plan has to be in place and there needs to be a minimum elevation,” Hogan said. “Where do we let it go down to? Elevation 3, before we say we’ve got to raise that spot? I’m not concerned with the Lafourche Basin Levee District or that you entered into an agreement with them. You have an agreement with us. My issue is with the parish and they have to answer.”

Long term, the ultimate hope lays with the \$940 million federal Upper Barataria Risk Reduction project, under which the Sunset Drainage levee falls. That projects to raise the Sunset levee to 12.5 feet.

“That will be our savior one day,” Hogan said. “But that’s years down the road. We can’t wait for a levee that for all we know may never be built.”

Phillip LaRosa’s sons in their house with water-soaked carpeting in Norco after water from heavy rain flooded the area.

“If my house was six inches higher, I never would have flooded,” he said. “It’s frustrating because we just fixed up the house three years ago and during the summer we painted the outside, we got a new roof last year and replaced the AC. And then this happened.”

Even so, LaRosa said they like the neighborhood and are staying even though every time it rains “we got to sweat it out.” He, as well as his neighbors, say a second pump should be installed in the back of Norco.

In Destrehan, Mary Loup was still grateful for the parish’s alert call on her cell phone at 2:30 a.m. that awoke her to flooding in her area. She praised the parish for the call.

“It was in the house already,” Loup said. “When I stepped into the water, I said, ‘What is this!’ and it was all through the house. I immediately opened the front door and there was a lake facing me.”

She wanted to leave, but realized there was no way to tell where the ditches and road were in the flooding so Loup stayed in her apartment. She had 1-1/2 inches of water in her place, but she still had electricity so she kept track of the situation by watching the news.

But the council recently supported the move to revisit curbside recycling.

The decision came after the parish’s 21 recycling sites were overrun with illegal dumping with items like appliances, furniture and construction debris. They became so bad that Sampey said residents in some areas asked the dumpsters be removed. They also began requiring considerable parish resources in removing the illegal items.

“This is something this administration has been interested in since coming into office,” she said. “They just want to be sure to offer something reasonably priced and see if the interest would be there.”

For nearly 12 years (1993 - 2005), the parish offered curbside recycling but Hurricane Katrina ended the main facility

“To bring back curbside participation, everyone has to pay,” Hogan said. “It makes it hard to charge for that when everyone doesn’t participate.”

The councilman also agreed the condition of the recycling sites warranted closing them and looking at options.

“I much rather see stuff recy-

in Metairie, Sampey said. Recycled materials would have had to be brought to Baton Rouge, making the program unfeasible.

If approved, the program would come with little additional cost and New Orleans Recycle would take the recycled items.

Councilman Paul Hogan said he supports the move provided participation is at or above 50 percent of residents.

cled rather than go to a landfill, but you have to make sure it can be sold and used,” Hogan said. “You don’t want it to go to a recycling facility and it goes to a landfill anyway. I know that’s happened in the past.”

On Feb. 1, the parish will implement a plan calling for two recycling sites in East and West bank parks with improved lighting, security cameras and two 25-foot long dumpsters. The other sites will be phased out.

just getting back to where she was able to do more ... like homecoming, which was exciting.”

Mya needs high quantities of salt to increase her blood volume, as well as a beta blocker to control her blood pressure that help her avoid fainting.

“People think this is just a rare case, but it’s not,” Cherie said of the concussions and complications.

Both Cherie and Mya are dedicated to improving awareness about concussions. Cherie’s research revealed the second highest rate of concussions are in girl’s soccer, second to football, and that concussions can cause lingering complications.

“For my daughter now, it doesn’t take a whole lot to get a concussion,” she said.

Giving up a game that Mya has played since age six has proven difficult, but she continued working with her team keeping stats. She was actually working through one of the tougher lingering symptoms, debilitating migraines, when she was accidentally struck in the head again nearly a month ago in the locker room.

Mya had to be pulled from school in February of last year and home schooled. During that time, she got 40 hyperbaric oxygen chamber treatments

that helped. She has returned to school for half days at Cherie’s Facebook page.

The family also is raising money to buy a chamber.

Dad’s Club is also holding a fish tournament fundraiser for Mya on March 16.

“My hope was that if we treated the brain injury, that it would help with the symptoms as well,” she said. “There was progress.”

But, with this latest injury, Cherie feels they’re going backwards.

“Her life will never be the same,” she lamented. “She was grieving not to be able to play soccer. She can’t exercise or run so it’s pretty traumatic.”

But Mya is staying strong. “I won’t give up on getting better because I refuse for my life to be like this forever,” she said. “I want to finish high school and go to college.”

In the deluge, all she could do was wait as the water rose and then quickly receded. A friend arrived by 8 a.m. with a Shopvac and fans to help dry the floor, and another soon followed that afternoon to help with the clean up. During that time, the American Red Cross arrived with cleaning supplies.

“I love St. Charles Parish because I’ve been here over 10 years and they’re pretty good about letting us know what’s going on,” said Loup, who considers herself fortunate. “It’s one of those things. The north gets snow storms, the west gets earthquakes and Louisiana deals with floods and storms. Thank God that we’re all okay.”

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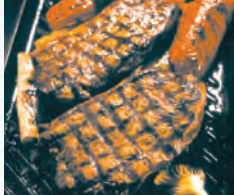
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Wildcats hope to turn district start around

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Destrehan may be off to a stellar 15-6 start, but the Wildcats nonetheless are approaching games with a renewed sense of urgency.

The Wildcats strong overall position was somewhat curbed through two games of District 7-5A competition, with a 82-76 loss to Hahnville and a 84-71 loss at home to Thibodaux leaving DHS with a district mark of 0-2 out the gate.

That said, scheduling has a bit to do with things, as both Thibodaux and Hahnville place within the top 10 teams in Class 5A power points, with Thibodaux entering the week as the top ranked team in that metric.

But Destrehan must nonetheless turn its district fortunes around, and fast, said DHS head coach Todd Bourg. “We need to win the next few games,” Bourg said. “We’ll have Hahnville again soon and playing at Thibodaux will

The Thibodaux loss, Bourg said, stung particularly because not only the district implications a win would bring, but also the power points haul. The Wildcats were in the thick of things before the last four minutes of play yielded a major cold spell

of shooting, with Thibodaux holding Destrehan to 0-16 shooting from the floor.

“We had a chance to get them here at home and we let it slip away,” Bourg said.

Against Hahnville, the issue was the Tigers’ ability to get to the line and draw fouls against what was a suffocating Wildcat defense entering district play. Destrehan allowed more than 60 points just twice in 17 pre-district contests, both of those losses, but thus far in district play both opponents have topped the 70 point mark. “We’ve been sharing the ball real well,” Bourg said. “If we can cut down on the fouling, we’ll be in great shape.”

Tuesday night’s loss at East Ascension came without the services of point guard Dylan Lorio, who suffered a broken nose at practice. Lorio is

expected to return Friday night but was held out against East Ascension, and Jasmine said it made a tough challenge that much greater in a 75-55 loss.

“We couldn’t control the pace without him,” Jasmine said. “We didn’t play well and it kind of snowballed on us.”

Against Terrebonne, it was a case of a slow start dooming the Tigers in a 70-61 loss, who were two days removed from scoring an emotional rivalry win over Destrehan.

The latter win came by a 82-76 score and saw Hahnville in a contrasting spot from the East Ascension loss: this time, the Tigers were able to control the tempo, and pushed the pace early and often against the defensive-minded Wildcats.

“Usually (Destrehan) plays a more methodical game, we were able to speed them up and that was the difference. We had a few guys step up in a big way for us,” Jasmine said.

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Robert: A life dedicated to preserving and promoting St. Charles's historical landmark

For Nancy Robert, Destrehan Plantation was her life for more than 30 years.

On Dec. 20, Robert's sudden death left behind a legacy of making one of St. Charles Parish's historic landmarks one of the most vibrant and interactive that drew thousands of people every year.

As its executive director, she generated millions of dollars in donations, grants and revenue. Paula Mire is serving as interim director. Lily Galland, president of the River Road Historical Society, acknowledged Robert's dedication to the plantation.

Galland added, "She was a very dedicated employee and implemented along with her staff, heritage educational programs aimed at youth and the community."

Robert added cisterns and elevators to the main house, a parish tourist information

center, an education center, a gift shop, the Herbert Harvey Legacy Room, the Jefferson Room, new maintenance facilities, a picnic pavilion, an outdoor concert venue, an open-hearth kitchen, a garden, a bridal suite and overnight cottages, the Azby Administrative Building, and the gigantic always-bustling Mule Barn. She modernized the tour, opened new rooms of the main house to visitors, added live demonstrations, and expanded access to the site to tens of thousands of Louisiana students of all ages.

Robert's work with the Louisiana Tourist Commission allowed her to promote Destrehan – and Louisiana – across the United States and Gulf South region.

The annual Fall Arts & Crafts Festival has for decades been one of the largest and most popular festivals of its kind in southeast Louisiana. She also brought the site to acclaim in commercials, television shows, music videos, and in films like Interview with the

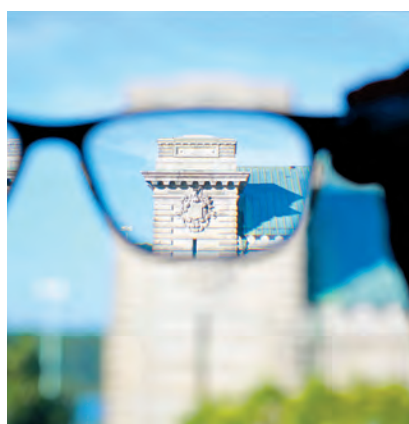

Vampire and the Oscar-winning 12 Years a Slave.

Robert's nephew, Scott Nolan, visiting professor at Tulane University in New Orleans, described his aunt "as a paragon of love, compassion and strength."

"Everyone one of her nieces and nephews were loved like a son or daughter," Nolan said. "She loved the people she worked with as a second adopted family. She was just larger than life ... absolutely giving."

He recalled the time when Hurricane Katrina came to Louisiana and Robert's devotion to the plantation.

"She went to the plantation before she went to her own house," Nolan said. "She said she couldn't go home without seeing the plantation and seeing if it was still standing. She let herself onto the grounds and walked around fallen tree branches and worked her way all around the property, and checked inside of the house. She made sure that the structure and grounds were relatively unharmed before she even considered returning to her own house."

The next day she gathered family members who all went with her to clear the grounds of debris.

Nolan added, "What it tells me is how she wanted that place to shine for every person in St. Charles Parish and Louisiana."

Also describing Robert as the "human character barometer," Nolan said she had a knack for seeing the "untapped goodness in people" and bringing this goodness out of people.

Robert also loved butterflies, which Nolan found a fitting symbol for his aunt.

"They were in her office and home," he said. "Her whole life was finding things old and making them new and beautiful. It's no wonder she chose the butterfly as a symbol throughout her life."

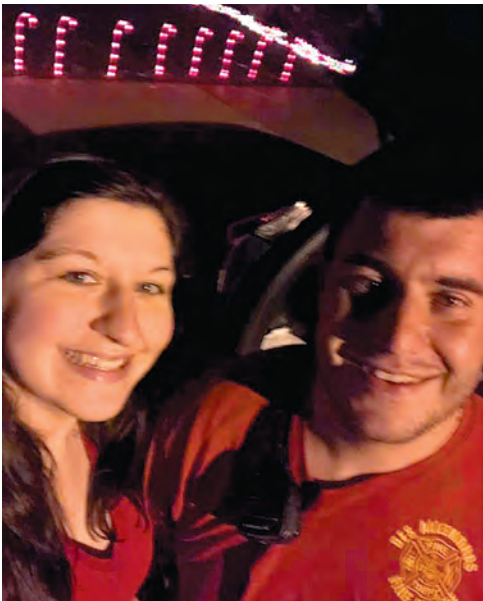

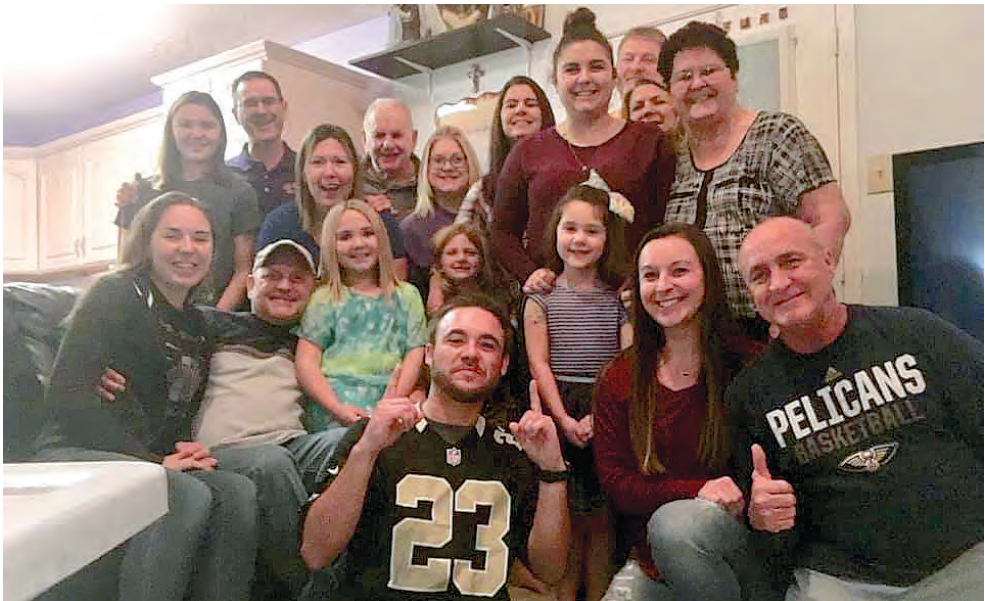

DEPOSIT AGREEMENT

This DEPOSIT AGREEMENT, by and between HOSPITAL SERVICE DISTRICT NO. 1 OF THE PARISH OF ST. CHARLES, STATE OF LOUISIANA (the "District"), appearing herein through the hereinafter named officers, HON GREGORY C. CHAMPAGNE, SHERIFF AND TAX COLLECTOR OF THE PARISH OF ST. CHARLES, STATE OF LOUISIANA (the "Sheriff"), and IBERIABANK, in the City of Lafayette, Louisiana, a banking corporation duly authorized to exercise powers as paying agent (the "Paying Agent"), appearing herein through the hereinafter named officers, who do declare that they do together enter into and make this Deposit Agreement, which shall be dated for convenience as of _____, 2018, upon the following terms

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the District currently has sold and will soon deliver Taxable Limited Tax Bonds, Series 2018 and Tax Exempt Limited Tax Bonds, Series 2018A (the "Bonds") payable from a 2.48 mills ad valorem tax authorized to be levied in the years 2018 through 2025, inclusive, by virtue of an election held in said District on May 3, 2014, (the "Tax"), and

WHEREAS, the District has obligated itself to levy the Tax for the full term of the authorization (subject to being adjusted from time to time due to reassessment) or until the Bonds are paid in principal and interest, and

WHEREAS, after all deductions required by law have been made by the Sheriff, the parties hereto wish to place in a restricted account Tax revenues from each year's Tax levy as received until the Paying Agent shall have received an amount equal to the debt service on the Bonds and any party bonds, and all paying agent fees for the year following the levy of the Tax, and

WHEREAS, the original Bonds will consist of a single certificate and the original owner will be IBERIABANK in Lafayette, Louisiana,

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants hereinafter set forth and in order to insure the prompt and orderly payment of the Bonds in principal and interest, the parties hereto agree as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be immediately established with the Paying Agent a special account (the "Debt Service Fund") to be held in the custody of the Paying Agent

SECTION 2. On behalf of the District, after making the deductions required by law from the revenues of each year's Tax levy, beginning with the 2018 Tax levy, the Sheriff shall transfer such Tax revenues to the Paying Agent in the amounts for such year representing that year's debt service on the Bonds, as shown on the attached Exhibit "A" and the debt service for such year or any future party bonds. Thereafter the Sheriff shall transfer the remaining Tax revenues received from such year's Tax levy to the District in accordance with usual procedures and practices. Those Tax revenues to be delivered to the Paying Agent shall be delivered by check or by wire, and if by check to

SECTION 3. In the event party bonds are issued in accordance with the provisions of the resolution authorizing the issuance of the Bonds, the Paying Agent shall act as paying agent for such bonds. The Paying Agent shall receive Tax revenues from each year's Tax levy sufficient to pay the debt service on the Bonds and any party bonds and the additional paying agent charge for the year following the year of the Tax levy in accordance with a schedule of payments that shall be forwarded to the Sheriff by the District. The Paying Agent shall furnish to the Sheriff any change of address and if the Sheriff chooses for the future to wire such payments, the routing instructions as shall be required by the Sheriff in order to forward each year the required Tax revenues

SECTION 4. As soon as reasonably possible, following the delivery of the Bonds and following the delivery of any future party bonds, the Paying Agent will furnish the Sheriff with a schedule of debt service payments

SECTION 5. The various funds to be deposited with the Paying Agent shall be held for the benefit of, and as agent of, the bondholders of the Bonds and any party bonds in an amount necessary to retire said Bonds and any party bonds and pay all Paying Agent fees until the discharge of the obligations of the District upon the final payment or defeasance of the Bonds

SECTION 6. The Paying Agent shall invest all monies in the Debt Service Fund to the extent reasonable in direct United States Treasury Obligations, the principal and interest of which are guaranteed by the government of the United States, or mutual or trust fund instruments which are registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission under the Securities Act of 1933 and the Investment Act of 1940, and which have underlying investments consisting solely of and limited to securities of the United States Government or its agencies and all revenues from such investments shall be used in the same manner as Tax revenues. On March 2nd of each year, the Paying Agent shall remit to the District all monies in the Debt Service Fund not required to make the payments set forth in Exhibit "A"

SECTION 7. All uninvested monies shall be secured in the manner provided by law

SECTION 8. The District and the Paying Agent shall have the right to take all actions available under law or equity to enforce this Agreement or the terms hereof

SECTION 9. All covenants, promises and agreements in this Agreement shall bind and enure to the benefit of the respective successors and assigns of the District and the Paying Agent, whether so expressed or not

SECTION 10. This Agreement shall be governed by the applicable laws of the State of Louisiana

SECTION 11. If any one or more of the covenants or agreements provided in this Agreement on the part of the District or the Paying Agent to be performed should be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be contrary to law, such covenant or agreement shall be deemed and construed to be severable from the remaining covenants and agreements herein contained and shall in no way affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this Agreement

SECTION 12. This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, all or any of which shall be regarded for all purposes as one original and shall constitute and be one and the same instrument

SECTION 13. The Paying Agent will keep books of record and account in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the receipts, disbursements, allocations and application of the monies received. Such books shall be available for inspection at reasonable hours and under reasonable conditions by the District

SECTION 14. If at any time the Paying Agent or its legal successor or successors should become unable, through operation of law or otherwise, to act as Paying Agent hereunder, or if its property and affairs shall be taken under the control of any state or federal court or administrative body because of insolvency or bankruptcy or for any other reason, a vacancy shall forthwith exist in the office of the Paying Agent hereunder. In such event the District, by appropriate order, shall promptly appoint a Paying Agent to fill such vacancy

Any successor trustee shall execute, acknowledge and deliver to the District and the Paying Agent an instrument accepting such appointment hereunder, and the Paying Agent shall execute and deliver an instrument transferring to such successor trustee, subject to the terms of this Agreement, all the rights, powers and trusts of the Paying Agent hereunder. Upon the request of any such successor trustee, the District shall execute any and all instruments in writing for more fully and certainly vesting in and confirming to such successor trustee all such rights, powers and duties. The District shall be obligated to notify the Sheriff of the change of its address and/or routing information required by the Sheriff for the transmission of the Tax revenues

SECTION 15. This Agreement may be amended with the consent of the District and the Paying Agent to correct ambiguities, to strengthen any provision hereof or to sever any provision hereof which is deemed to be illegal or unenforceable

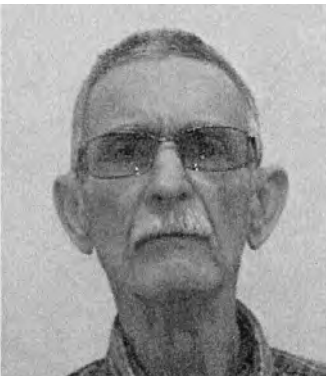
