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Beat the Bridge

5K run/walk takes participants over Hale Boggs, into fun after party

After weather sidelined so many runners last year by causing the cancellation of the United Way of St. Charles' annual Bridge Run, they'll have their first chance in two years to cross the Hale Boggs Bridge in competition this Saturday.

This year's 5K run (and walk, for those seeking some less intense cardio while still having a good time) begins at 8:30 a.m. at the East Bank Bridge Park in Luling. From there, participants embark on what is the nation's largest road race across the Mississippi River. Awaiting them just past the finish line is entrance to the West Bank Bridge Park and the event's free after party featuring music, food and refreshments.

This will be the 23rd year since the event was created, and race coordinator Tamara Plattsmier hopes that after a year off, there will be a strong turnout of eager participants.

"You get to cross that bridge once a year, see that view of the Mississippi River, and enjoy that family-friendly environment," Plattsmier said, noting she hopes to have about 2,000 runners registered by race time.

FDR's historical visit to Norco

Trip down Apple Street left quite an impression

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Sal Digirolamo was in Norco Primary School when then U.S. President Franklin Delano Roosevelt (FDR) rolled down Apple Street in an open car.

"We all were lined up along the school fence when the president passed," said the life-time resident of Norco.

It was a historic moment for then youngster Sal, and one for the Bonnet Carre' Spillway.

FDR was there to see the newly completed flood control project.

It was April 29, 1937,

according to Bob Clark, supervisory archivist with the Franklin D. Roosevelt

Presidential Library in Hyde Park, N.Y.

"FDR traveled by train to

Biloxi, Miss., and then on to New Orleans prior to embarking on a fishing cruise in the Gulf of Mexico," Clark told Digirolamo in response to his inquiry about the photo. "During his afternoon in the New Orleans area, FDR lunched in the French Quarter at Antoine's, drove through the countryside with the governor to the Bonnet Carre' Spillway on an inspection tour, then returned to the city where a city park was rededicated in FDR's name and where he delivered some brief remarks before boarding the ship for the cruise."

Residents question developer about planned subdivision

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Prepared with numerous questions about the Heather Oaks residential development proposed for Luling, area residents packed a town hall meeting held Wednesday to discuss the project's impact on their community.

Lafayette developer Cliff Guidry, accompanied by Danny and Julie Hebert who are working on the project, said he responded to their concerns with larger lots preserving property value, traditional drainage over retention ponds, and a two-street loop configuration rather than a single street layout with a cul-de-sac.

In September, more than 100 area residents packed the Planning Commission meeting to oppose the project, saying they were denied information about the development. The parish Planning Commission agreed and rejected it.

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NFL’s longest tenured offensive coordinator calls Destrehan home

The New Orleans Saints and their home region have forged a bond like few others. Destrehan’s Pete Carmichael Jr. understands it in a way few others can, the Saints offensive coordinator and St. Charles Parish resident experiencing all of the team’s peaks and valleys from a central role since 2006.

Carmichael and his family moved from San Diego to Destrehan in 2006, joining the newly assembled staff of head coach Sean Payton, who at the time had just been hired to oversee the rebuilding of a

Saints’ team that had been ravaged by Hurricane Katrina, just as its city had been.

Of course, that season the Saints enjoyed a “worst to first” jump in the NFC South, going 10-6 and winning the division’s championship a year after posting a 3-13 mark. The Saints won their first playoff game in six years before ultimately bowing out in the NFC Championship Game.

“It was a very, very memorable season,” said Carmichael, who was the team’s quarterbacks coach at the time. “The fanbase, I mean, you could just feel their love and passion for this team. The city and

Residents say Entergy noise rattled homes

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Comparing the noise to a jet hovering above her house, Montz resident Shannie Borne said Entergy’s prepping of its soon to be in operation St. Charles Power Station recently rattled their houses.

The good news is the “steam blows” or clearing of the power station’s turbines is over, said Kevin Wright, Entergy’s senior manager of capital projects. All that remains are the routine sounds of construction.

Target date of operation for the power station is May 23.

But residents endured the bellowing steam blows from early March to March 13.

“It was so noisy that people could not sleep at night,” said resident Coleen Perilloux Landry. “It was as though it was in your house.”

Landry said Entergy should have sent out a robo call to citizens of the area on the emergency list to tell them about the power station’s start up and the expected time it would take.

part of the same nationwide pharmacy network as Destrehan Pharmacy was, has also brought aboard several staff members who worked for Destrehan Pharmacy

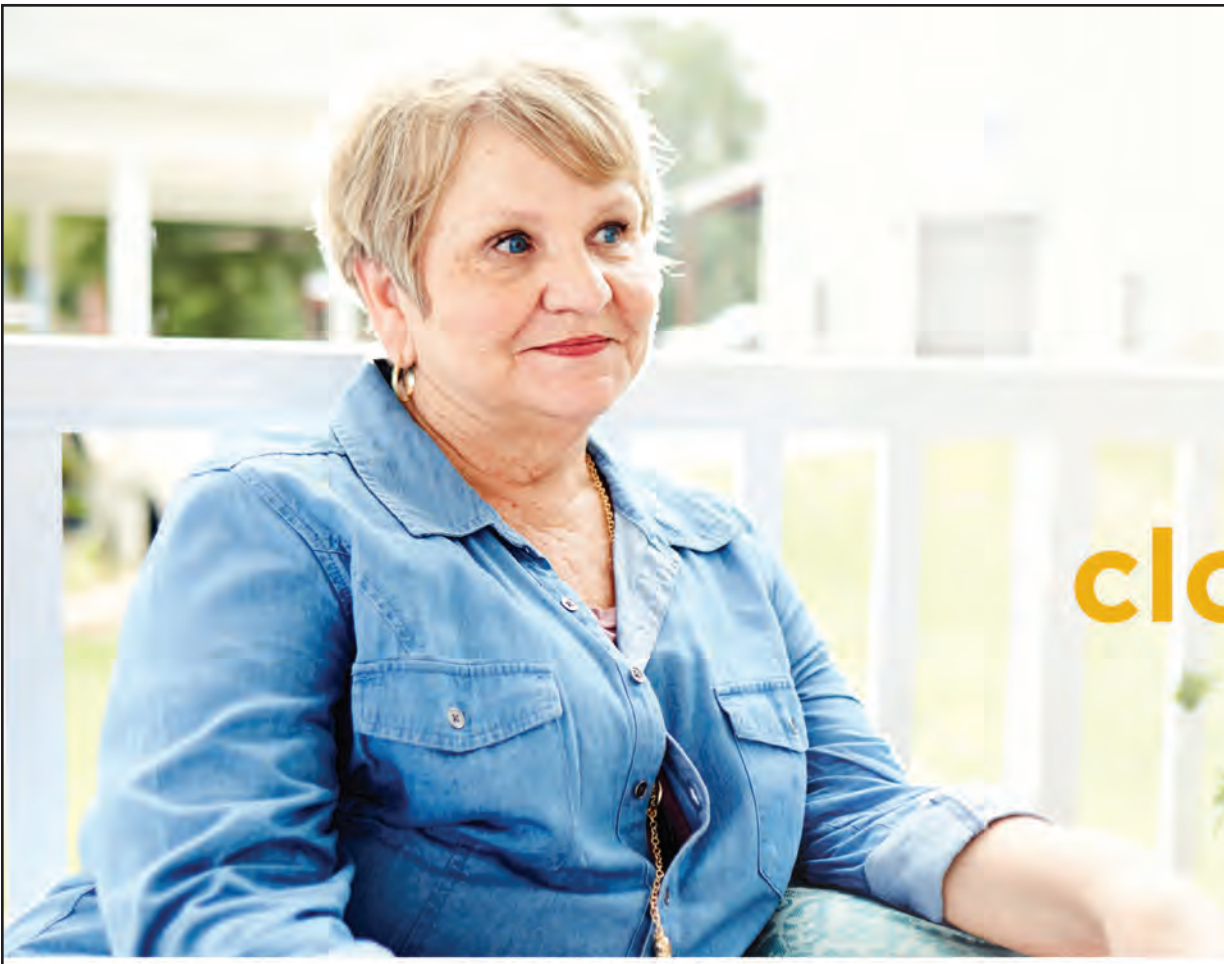
before it closed its doors.

Woman arrested after firing gun, shattering window in St. Rose

A New Orleans woman was arrested recently after allegedly stealing a firearm from a friend and St. Rose resident and firing it outside the latter's home, apparently shattering the window of a neighbor in the process.

Alasia Finley, 19, of 4444 Francis Drive in New Orleans, was charged with aggravated assault with a firearm, theft of a firearm, illegal use of

weapons and aggravated criminal damage to property. The aggravated damage,

assault and theft charges are felonies.

According to the St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office, Finley allegedly stole a handgun and fired it outside her acquaintance's East Club Drive residence. The resident then alerted police to the incident. Soon thereafter, a neighbor discovered the shattered window, believed to have been caused when the weapon was fired.

Finley is being held at Nelson Coleman Correctional Center on a bond of \$12,500.

"Sometimes, it lasted over a 24-hour period," she said. "It has my whole house shaking and the windows rattling. This was being done during the night hours."

"It was not handled well at all. If Entergy is permanent in Montz it needs to learn to be good neighbors."

Kent Greene, an Entergy service representative, said they did notify residents through the St. Charles Parish communications department, as well as put out notices on the parish's TV channel and Facebook pages with the parish and Entergy.

They also sent out robo calls, which are messages to the surrounding area notifying about testing that could have "elevated volumes of noise" in the Montz area, Greene said.

"We tried to do everything we possibly could with the elevated noises and they

were only temporary in nature," he said. "This will not be how the power station will be like. Once the steam blows were at the end, the noise levels would subside at that point."

Greene added, "We want to thank our neighbors for their support and patience during

the St. Charles Power Station's testing period. We understand that the testing may have created elevated noise levels, but the critical steam blow testing is complete and was necessary to ensure the safe and reliable operations of the plant."

Powering up the station

- The St. Charles Power Station is a \$869 million project in Montz.
- The facility is a 980-megawatt gas-fired unit.
- Enough wire and cable was used in the station's construction that could circle LSU's Tiger Stadium about 340 times.
- Some 23,281 cubic yards of concrete was used in the structure, enough to pour foundations for 87 single-story, four-bedroom, two-bath houses.





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Why do bad and tragic things happen to good and innocent people?

Why do bad things happen to good people? Why do good people have to suffer?

The people in Jesus’ day wanted to know the answer to these questions, and so do we.

People asked Jesus about two separate tragedies that happened to innocent people. The first was the murder of some Galilean Jews by Pilate.

Some background might be helpful. Jerusalem needed a new water supply. Pilate took some temple money to pay for this needed improvement.

New Orleans files suit Against oil, gas companies

New Orleans has joined six other southern Louisiana parishes by filing a lawsuit against oil and gas companies because of their roles in coastal land loss, Mayor LaToya Cantrell announced late last week.

It echoes other efforts sought to make the energy companies accountable for damage done throughout the years to wetlands and marshes by damages caused by decades of drilling and dredging.

Not only New Orleans has been harmed, but much of the state of Louisiana has been hurt by damages inflicted here during past years. Much leeway was allowed for oil and drilling companies to get their oil and minerals out of the ground and to customers around the country.

“New Orleans has been harmed,” Cantrell said. “And our way of life is threatened by the damage done to our coastal wetlands.”

The suit also names a dozen defendants, including the New Orleans electrical utility, Entergy New Orleans, Chevron and, Exxon Mobil, and calls on them to pay to restore the wetlands. Defendants in the suit include Apache Louisiana Minerals, Aspect Energy, Chaparral Energy, Chevron, Collins Pipeline, Gulf South Pipeline Co., Southern Natural Gas Co., and Whiting Oil and Gas Co.

The suit alleges energy companies failed to maintain the canals they used to access and transport oil and gas, and that pipelines through the wetlands caused further damage.

“Because each defendant failed to either contain its operations within permitted bounds or secure a coastal use permit when required, to simply follow the rules, to fix what they broke, the network of canals and other facilities they allowed to degrade the coastal lands has ravaged New Orleans protective landscape, according to the suit.

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1099 forms: Explaining these ubiquitous forms and their uses

What is a 1099 form? This is a record of payment from an individual or entity, showing a payment, generated for your records. The individual/entity sends a copy to both the payee as well as the I.R.S.

Who might be sending 1099s? Clients send their freelancers 1099s, recording work performed. Banks send 1099s to reflect interest from a savings account. A state may send a 1099 for a tax refund. If the financial institution who handles your retirement account writes you a check, they will also send you a 1099.1

In any event, a 1099 includes the taxpayer identification number or Social Security Number of the payee. Receiving the 1099 does not automatically mean that the

payee owes tax, as there could be situations that offset that income, but it definitely means that the I.R.S. also has a record of that payment.

There are many types of 1099 form. Here are a few of them:

1099-A. This form is a consequence of foreclosure or bank repossession of secured real property – “acquisition or abandonment,” in I.R.S. terms. Lenders send it to the foreclosed party and the buyer.

1099-B. Brokers and barter exchanges report proceeds from securities, futures, commodities, or barter exchange transactions with a 1099-B.

1099-C. The 1099-C reports debt cancellation. You must claim the indicated amount on the 1099-C form as income in the year the debt was forgiven. When you pay income taxes on that amount, the creditor cannot come after the debt again. This form sometimes follows a foreclosure.

1099-CAP. This one is for those who own shares in a

corporation that has been acquired or has undergone a significant change in capital structure. If it was sold or changes have been made where you’ve earned cash or stock, for example, this form would be necessary.

1099-DIV. When you receive dividends, capital gain distributions, or liquidation distributions, you get one of these. For example, when a mutual fund sells off funds and realizes a capital gain, the fund informs you of your share of the capital gain through a 1099-DIV.

1099-G. This form reports payments from government agencies and qualified state tuition programs – everything from state and local tax refunds and unemployment benefits to agriculture payments, gambling winnings, and taxable grants. It is usually issued to show unemployment benefits or a state tax refund.

1099-INT. This form reports interest income of \$10 or

more, and sometimes other tax items related to interest income (such as federal tax withholding or early withdrawal penalties).

1099-LTC. As the LTC part hints, these forms report distributions (payments) from long term care insurance contracts and accelerated death benefits paid out as a result of a life insurance contract or a viatical settlement.

1099-MISC. This category includes “miscellaneous income,” including awards and prizes.

1099-OID. The 1099-OID reports the difference between the stated redemption price of a bond at maturity and the issue price of that bond.

1099-PATR. This form reports patronage dividends, such as in a farm cooperative.

1099-Q. Have you been paying for school expenses from a 529 plan or a similar savings plan? Withdrawals will be reported on this form.

1099-R. The 1099-R reports

distributions from all types of retirement, pension, and profit-sharing plans as well as any IRA or annuity contract.

1099-S. The 1099-S reports gross proceeds from real estate transactions or exchanges.

1099-SA. This form reports distributions from Health Savings Accounts (HSA), Archer Medical Savings Accounts (Archer MSA), or Medicare Advantage Medical Savings Accounts (MA MSA).

do two or all three a chance to compare their performance.” There will also be a “team challenge” trophy for the team with the most registered participants. “As for the runners, I think it doesn’t matter if they come in first, middle of the pack or last, it’s that feeling of accomplishment that you were able to beat

the bridge,” Plattsmier said. There will be free bus transportation available prior to the race from 6:30 a.m. to 7:45 a.m. The buses will depart from the West Bank Bridge Park to the run’s start at the East Bank Bridge Park. Those parking near the East Bank Bridge Park must have their race number with them.

“We feel like all of the concerns have been addressed,” Guidry said. “We feel that the market is there so we’re going to push forward with the development.” On Thursday (April 4) at 6 p.m., the Planning Commission will consider the preliminary plat with these changes. Residents again questioned whether the now 169-lot project would hurt their property value, although some did say they appreciated larger lot sizes. One resident fired back, “169 ... that ain’t gonna happen.” But another resident said it will be “a slow build” with possibly half of the project done in 10 years. Luling resident Tommy Faucheux said Guidry approached him about holding the meeting with residents in adjoining communities like Willowdale and Lakewood. Danny Hebert explained this is the first step of the multi-step process toward getting approval for the subdivision. He further explained the project includes 4.3 acres set aside adjacent to Rathborne Park for recreation, as well as wetlands that would be protected in perpetuity. Guidry said the lots are larger 80- to 90-foot frontages, instead of the previous 60-foot frontage originally planned. The meeting also was attended by a local delegation, including Parish President Larry Cochran and Council Chair Julia Fisher-Perrier, Councilwoman Mary Clulee and Planning Director Michael Albert. Cochran expressed gratitude to Guidry for holding the meeting, but also encouraged residents to attend the Planning Commission meeting. Area residents asked how trees and debris would be removed from the 52-acre site, as well as how much traffic is anticipated with debris removal. Residents also noted there are at least two eagle nests on the property, which Julie Hebert said would be addressed in the permitting process. “We love trees,” Danny Hebert told the group.

A topography survey would be done to preserve some trees on the property, he said. Guidry added they could limit truck removal to the weekends to avoid interrupting school traffic. Several residents asked about the subdivision’s impact on local schools. Julie Hebert said based on information from St. Charles Parish Public Schools, the development would add another five children per grade, which several residents called speculation. Some questioned the street configuration including cross streets every 1,500 feet, which Danny Hebert said is a parish requirement. Guidry added it costs more, but it’s appropriate for connectivity with the Willowdale and Lakewood communities. Albert said a waiver could be obtained for the cross streets, but it would have to be approved by the Parish Council. Cochran also said projects are being discussed to improve traffic access. “We have a lot of issues we’re looking at in Lakewood,” he said. Fisher-Perrier added the public would have additional opportunity to comment on the project before the council. Residents further questioned why they get so few details about the project at this point, but Guidry replied preliminary plat approval sets that in motion before considerable money is spent on a development that could be denied. Guidry added, “I spent a lot of money to get rejected.”

According to local history, FDR’s visit followed the earlier spillway dedication in December of 1935. The project was completed in only 2-1/2 years. The president was accompanied by Gov. Richard Laiche when they rode down the streets of Norco. In the open car, FDR was waving his hat with his characteristic broad smile. The May 3 edition of the Shell Bulletin reported “his route was lined with waving school children and Norco and vicinity residents. “He kept his hand raised high in greeting,” it states. “He inspected the spillway project thoroughly, spending fully 40 minutes on his tour.” Built after the great flood of 1927, the spillway has made its own history, too. The recent opening is the first where it was opened in back-to-back years. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has started closing it as floodwaters recede. But on that day in 1937, Josie Mire also recounted being among the children waving on FDR in Norco. “I can remember seeing the president on Apple Street,” said Mire. “We were all lined up with our flags.”



The Bonnet Carré legacy

- The spillway was built after the Great Mississippi Flood of 1927 that deluged much of the Mississippi River basin.
- It is a flood control operation in the lower Mississippi Valley in St. Charles Parish. It allows floodwaters to flow into Lake Pontchartrain and then the Gulf of Mexico.
- In addition to flood control, the spillway offers outdoor recreation drawing about 400,000 visitors a year.

the same customer service they’ve had for years.” Maronge said working with

the pharmacy’s customers is about more than just filling a prescription, but offering a

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Councilman hopes lane request takes the right turn

Citing a few near misses, St. Charles Parish Councilman Billy Woodruff got council approval to ask the state for a turn lane in Paradis. If the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development (DOTD) approves the move, the new lane would be added on U.S. Highway 90 at the Dollar General. “I had some calls from a few

people who were telling me the delivery trucks were making illegal left turns and also people in cars,” Woodruff said. When the location was the old Time Saver, he said drivers would make a U-turn, but since that time the heavily trafficked Highway 90 is posing concerns about possible crashes. A sign prohibiting a U-turn is posted at the location, but Woodruff said it’s being violated. The current lane is narrow, which Woodruff said has

required some of the store’s delivery trucks to attempt the turn and then have to back up to make the turn to get to the store. Woodruff said a letter requesting the lane addition has been sent to the DOTD. Department spokesman Rodney Mallett said receiving the letter puts in motion studies on traffic, safety and crashes. “We need traffic history, average daily traffic and cost benefit before we can make a decision,” Mallett said.

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He said he has prospects for the business park, but could not disclose them at this time. “I love St. Charles Parish,” he said. “I’ve lived here my whole life. I’m committed to St. Charles Parish and I want to do everything I can to enhance the parish.” Trosclair plans to submit the project for consideration to the St. Charles Planning Commission within a few months. Murray “has a long history of doing nice developments in the parish,” Trosclair said. He also used Murray Architects on renovating Galatoire’s when he bought the restaurant in 2009. They added and renovated Galatoire’s 33 Steakhouse. “They did it with record time and speed, a \$10 million development and permits, architecture and built in 5-1/2 months,” he said. He called it an “amazing construction feat” considering it was festival time in New Orleans, also praising the work of Joey Murray and Michael Tabb. Trosclair is also a partner with Joey Tufaro in Gold Star Films, which made “Kidnap,” featuring Halle Berry, in 2017. He serves as owner or partner in several New Orleans businesses, including All Star Electric, Galatoire’s Restaurant, Boulevard American Bistro

restaurant, Rotolo’s Pizza, Joy Theater and Flamingo A-Go-Go. His latest projects include the 18-story four-star Hard Rock Hotel on Canal Street; new Parkway Apartments on

Earhart Boulevard and Royal Street Condo project, which Trosclair called “the crown jewel of New Orleans” that is led by his business partner John Georges, also owner of The Advocate newspaper.

team embraced each other, and we were really all unified as one.” It would not be anywhere close to the last memorable moment Carmichael, now 47, would spend as part of that symbiotic relationship between fanbase and team. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2009, when the Saints captured the first Super Bowl crown in the franchise’s history. He helped captain one of the most prolific offenses in NFL history in 2011. He’s suffered through the most crushing defeats as well, like the Minneapolis Miracle in 2018 and the blown call to cost the team a Super Bowl berth against the L.A. Rams this past January. That’s the kind of run with one team that’s rare in the NFL coaching profession: just to spend 13 seasons with one team is an experience not shared by many in the pro ranks. So much so that with 10 seasons under his belt in his current role, he’s — by a long-shot — the NFL’s longest tenured offensive coordinator. “I’ve been very fortunate,” Carmichael said. “Obviously, it starts with our ownership. Mr. Benson was so great and Mrs. Benson has been carrying that on. Mickey Loomis is outstanding, and obviously working with Sean is just awesome. All those people have paved the way for me to be around this long.” From a personal standpoint, it’s as refreshing as it is on a professional level, he said. “I have two kids who have made it through the whole school system here,” Carmichael said. “That doesn’t happen (for an NFL coach).” Carmichael’s passion for coaching is something passed down from his late father, who coached for 40 years at the pro, college and high school levels, including time with

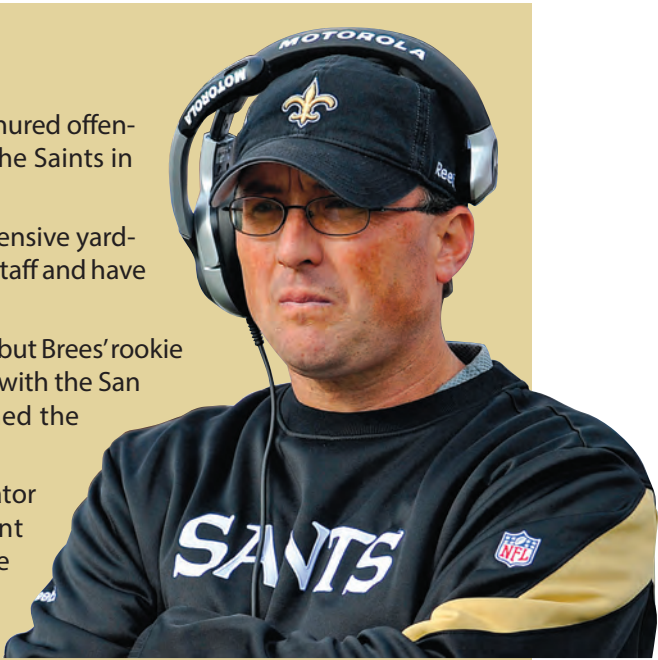
Boston College, Pittsburgh and Louisiana Tech at the college level and with the Jacksonville Jaguars, Cleveland Browns and Chicago Bears in the NFL. “It was something I enjoyed being around,” Carmichael said. “Practices, gameday, I was always around it.” Carmichael played football and baseball as a prep athlete. He chose to stick with baseball when he moved on to the next level, playing second base and in the outfield at Boston College. “But I always knew, one day, I wanted to go back to football,” Carmichael said. “That passion my dad had for it, how he loved being around his players ... it was like, ‘Oh man, I wanna do that some day.’”

Carmichael started his career as an assistant coach, first volunteering for a year at New Hampshire and then getting on with Louisiana Tech at the NCAA level, before earning tenures with the Cleveland Browns, Washington Redskins and San Diego Chargers in the NFL. He spent 2002 to 2005 with the Chargers, and that’s when he began working with Drew Brees. Yes, Carmichael’s league-longest tenure as offensive coordinator is actually surpassed by the time he’s spent with his current quarterback. Carmichael has worked with Brees for all but one year of the latter’s career, the veteran passer’s rookie year. “Everything you read about him and hear about him ... it’s 100 percent true. The consummate professional,” Carmichael said. “I’ve learned a ton from Drew ... he’s been a great teacher for me as well. I’m lucky to be a part of his career.” He calls the 2009 Super Bowl season the most memorable time of his career. The 2011 record-shattering offense was another special time, a season the Saints broke the league record for yardage gained. On the other side of things,

the bitter end to the Saints’ most recent season is one that he’s moved on from, but that won’t be forgotten. “It takes a while to get over. We have a group of professionals here, and Sean’s a great leader. We’re all ready for the 2019 season to get started,” Carmichael said. History says it’ll be another largely productive one. The Saints have been a fixture in the top five of the league’s offensive numbers throughout his tenure. Brees is the NFL’s All-Time passing leader. These things cannot happen without evolving and finding ways to stay ahead of the offensive curve. And that, Carmichael says, is half the fun. “That’s part of why we love doing this,” Carmichael said. “We have an amazing staff where we all enjoy working with one another. There are no egos, we all are there with a common purpose. And we’re friends outside the building as well. “You spend the long hours because you don’t want to let the next guy down. But it’s worth it. We have a special group.”

Chacon drove in two runs, while Mason Lucky and Dustin Ford scored two runs a piece for Hahnville. Collin Maise went 2-for-3.

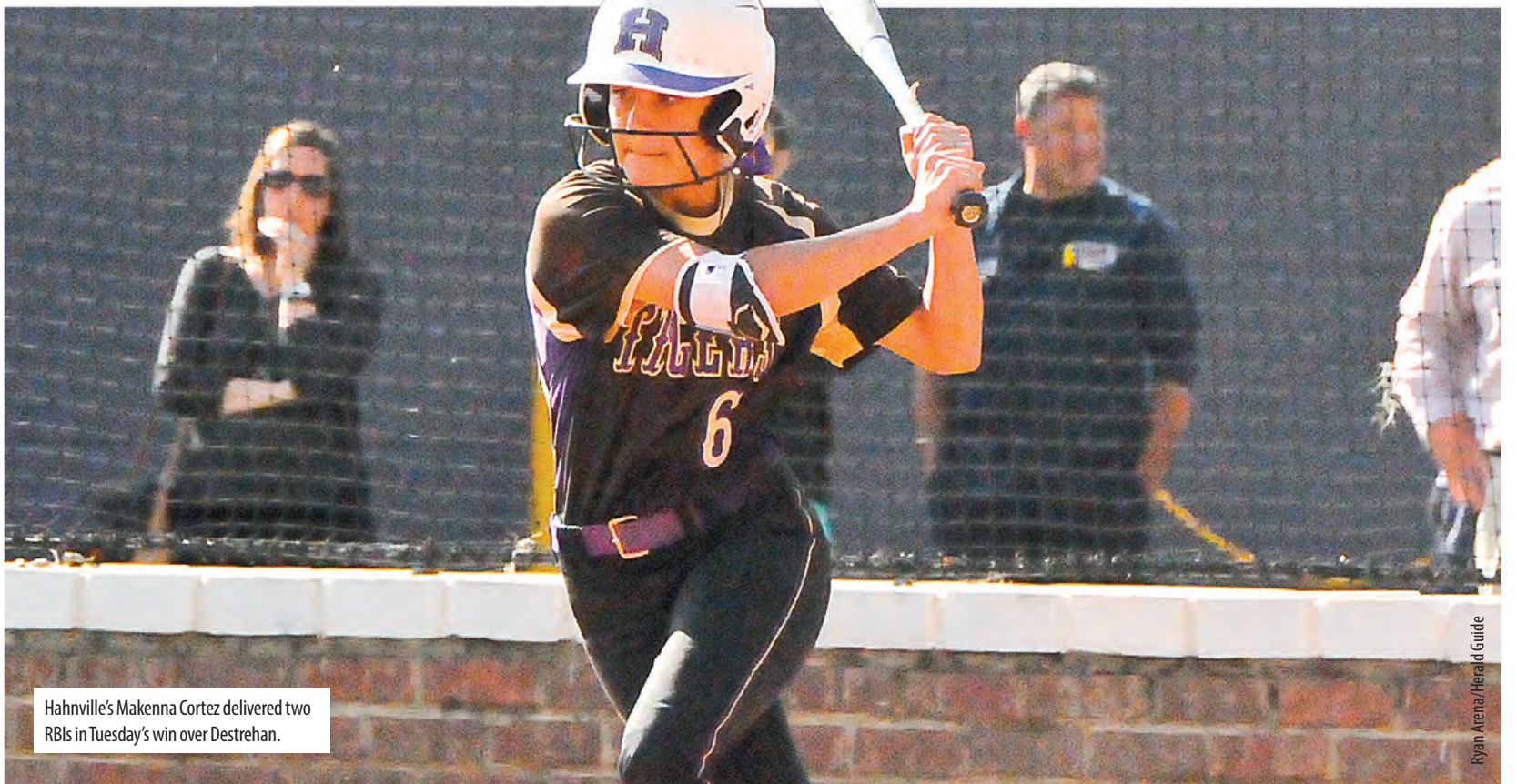

the school.

Raymond died tragically at the age of 16 after he was involved in a car accident in 1969, but he continues to inspire young athletes to this day.

“I’ve been talking to them about who Don Raymond was and his great contributions to Hahnville and beyond,” said Brittany Bonnaffons, HHS head track and field coach. “We’re really excited to run at this meet. We’re all just here crossing our fingers saying ‘Please don’t rain’ because they always love to perform at home.”

As always, Destrehan will join its cross-parish rival to compete at the relays.

Among teams joining them will be Karr, Lusher, East St. John, Belle Chasse and St. James.

Bonnaffons says her team is especially excited to have a chance to see how it stacks up against several of the state’s top performers.

The Tigers have had a strong start this season: the boys team has won each of its past two meets, at Vandebilt Catholic and Central Lafourche, respectively, and three Tigers athletes earned MVP honors at the Vandebilt meet. On the boys side, Jerry Spencer was named Field MVP at Vandebilt Catholic placing second in the triple jump and third in the long jump, while Gevon Hill took

MVP on the track, taking first in the 100 and 200 meter dash. Kevel Byrd, meanwhile, earned Track MVP honors on the girls side with first place finishes in the 100 and 200. The relay teams have also been strong throughout the early events thus far this season.

“It’s been good to see, watching them grow over the years since they were freshmen,” said Bonnaffons. “They’re coming into their own. We lost so many really strong seniors in last year’s class, and you’re wondering, ‘Hey, can we recover from this?’ Pooka Williams, Ashlyn Jack, Alexis Williams ... really dominant performers. But our kids this year are showing they’re no longer sitting in anyone’s shadow, both on the track and in the field events this year. We’re scoring points in a lot of events and that’s what it takes to win these meets.”

She said the Tigers have been comparing their finishing marks and times with those of athletes competing at some of the major track and field events thus far this season, like the Sugar Bowl Track and Field Classic, and they’ve compared favorably to them.

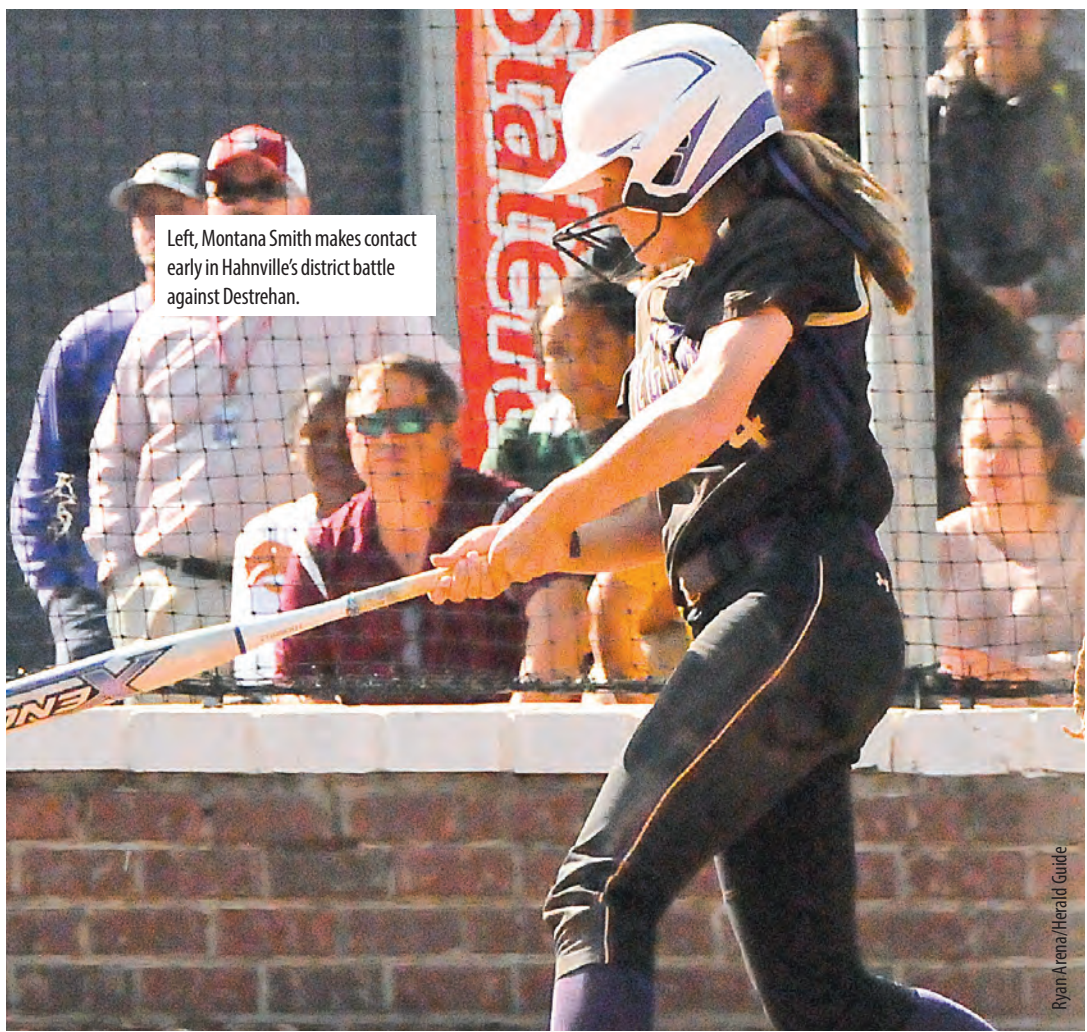
“Our times have been competitive with the times that won there, so to see a lot of those head-to-head matchups now will be fun to see,” Bonnaffons said.

“Tyler (Oubre)’s a great pitcher who hits her spots really, really well ... she pitched a really good game,” said Cortez. “So to get that hit against her felt good, because it kind of set the tone for the rest of the game for us, that energy and vibe that as long as we stay focused, we’re going to win and put runs on the board.”

Hahnville (16-8, 4-0) extended the lead in the third after Montana Smith, Sara Roussel and Baudouin each reached to load the bases with no outs. Cortez collected her second RBI of the game when she drew a walk to force in a run.

“We made a few mistakes early,” said Destrehan coach Kenneth Montz. “We had an error and a walk lead to a run ... we miss a cutoff and load the bases and they get a run. When you’re playing a good

team like they are, in a rivalry game like this, those mistakes come back to bite you. It was uncharacteristic of us lately.”

Destrehan (13-15, 3-1) cut Hahnville’s lead in half after Moriah Omond, Alyssa Vicknair and Gia Zeringue each singled, the third plating Omond to make it 2-1 in the sixth inning.

In the seventh, Oubre walked and Emma Rome lined a hit to right field to set Destrehan up with two on and one out, before Hahnville retired the side for the win.

Oubre took the loss, going six innings and allowing one earned run on four hits and three walks. She struck out six.

Beard earned the win for Hahnville, splitting time on the mound with Mackenzie Kliebert to allow one run on seven hits.

“We approached it like it was

a regular game, not so much pressure,” Beard said. “One pitch, one hit at a time. If someone messes up, the next person has their back and makes the play ... my team had my back when they started getting hits on me. (Kliebert) came in and had my back, then I had her back.”

Though the Tigers’ approach was to not pile too much pressure upon themselves for this one, Cortez said when Hahnville and Destrehan match up, the energy is undeniable, regardless of sport.

“It’s one of the biggest games of the seasons whether it’s football, basketball, baseball or softball. So just to get the win, it’s amazing,” Cortez said.

She added that the Lady Tigers have been out to prove they remain a big factor in the Class 5A championship picture, after finishing as runner-up a season ago.

“(The win) just continues to show people we’re in it to win it,” Cortez said. “We’re not selling ourselves short. I think a lot of people have doubted us this year because we lost a lot of seniors. We’re showing even though we’re a young team, we’re still stepping up.”

Nugent noted for his team’s seniors, it was their 100th win with the program.

But the veteran coach also took a moment after the game to speak to and offer some words of praise to Destrehan’s senior players who have battled in a series of hard fought games over the past few seasons.

“They have a really good young group of players coming up over there, and I’m looking forward to four solid years of this,” Nugent said. “But I wanted to just tip my cap to those (seniors) and for them to know they laid the foundation for what’s obviously a great rivalry now.”

Assistant Manager Pilar Rodriguez said their two salads are avocado and chicken or Caesar salad. Their both presented with a healthy serving of greens topped with a grilled meat of choice – steak, chicken or shrimp. The meat is grilled with El Paso's special seasonings, lending a unique and authentic flavor to their salads.

For vegans or just plain vegetable lovers, the meat can be substituted with grilled mushrooms.

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Understanding your cancer diagnosis

Receiving a cancer diagnosis can be difficult, and it's natural to have several questions about the changes it may bring for you and your loved ones. As the patient, you are as much a key part of your cancer care team as the medical providers who will be treating you, so it's important to ask as many questions as you need in order to understand your diagnosis and your options as fully as possible.

The American Cancer Society recommends the following questions to ask your doctor after receiving a diagnosis, including the following:

- What type of cancer do I have? What is the extent of it?
- Do I need any other tests before we decide on treatment?
- How often do you treat this type of cancer?
- What treatment do you suggest and why?
- What's the goal of treatment – to cure or to control my symptoms?
- What are the benefits of treatment?
- What are the possible risks or side effects of treatment?



- Are there other treatments I should consider?
- How long will treatment last and how often will I need to come in for it?
- How much will treatment cost? Will my insurance pay for it?
- What can I do to be ready for treatment?

- What's my outlook for the future (prognosis), as you see it?
 - Will I be able to work during my treatment?
- It's also a good idea to ask your doctor to write down your exact diagnosis and stage, the drugs you'll be taking, any symptoms you should report immediately, and the contact information for all of the specialists who will be on your care team. You can bring this information to each visit and update the information as your treatment continues.

In addition to receiving your diagnosis, taking in all of the answers to the questions above can be overwhelming. You may want to bring a family member or friend to help you remember what the doctor said later. Though it may seem like many things are out of your control, it helps to focus on the things you can control.

In addition to learning as much as you can about your cancer and its treatment, find an outlet for your feelings. Whether you feel fear, sadness, confusion, or anger, expressing these emotions can make them easier to deal with. It is normal to have some or all of these emotions, but if these feelings persist, tell your doctor about it. Doing things you enjoy with the people

you love is central to taking care of yourself, and helps to keep a good outlook on the life changes you are experiencing.

While you will have your cancer care team of physicians, nurses, social workers, and other professionals, don't forget about other resources of support available to you. Utilizing community-based options like places of worship and support groups can help to cope.

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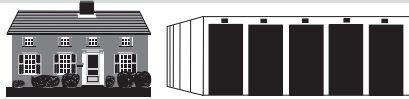

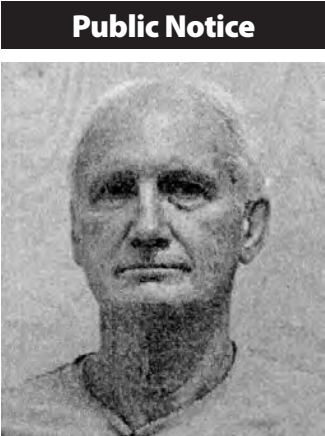

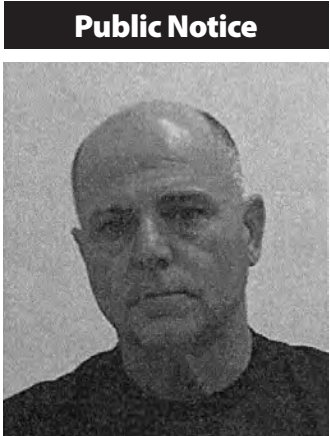

Each spring the La. Dept. of Education administers tests in grades 3 – 8 to measure how well students have learned the Louisiana standards in English Language Arts, Math, Science and Social Studies. Students in grades 3-4 will take paper-based assessments during the week of April 29th. Students in grades 5-8 will take computer-based assessments during the testing window of April 1st through May 3rd. Each school will provide specific dates for testing. We ask parents to speak to their children about the importance of doing their best on these tests as the results are used in planning instruction. The scores will also be used to calculate district and school performance scores. High school students will take End-of-Course and LEAP 2025 assessments during the testing window of April 15th through May 16th. These assessments measure student learning in certain high school courses, are counted as part of the students' course grades, and are used in computing school and district performance scores. Students who pass their courses but fail the End-Of-Course or LEAP 2025 assessments will have an opportunity to attend remediation and retest in the summer. 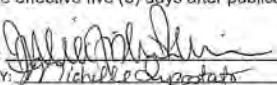
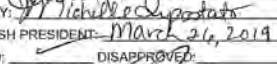

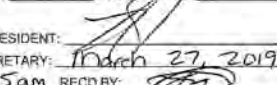

CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT made and effective as of the ____ day of _____, 2019, by and between ST. CHARLES PARISH acting herein by and through its President, who is duly authorized to act on behalf of said Parish, hereinafter called the Owner, and Shread-Kuyrkendall & Associates, Inc., a corporation hereinafter called Engineer. Whereas the Owner desires to employ a professional consulting engineering firm to perform engineering services for the Engineer's Canal Bank Stabilization project as described in Ordinance No. 19-3-9, which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

1.0 GENERAL

The Owner agrees to employ the Engineer, and the Engineer agrees to perform professional services required for the project described above. The project will be implemented in phases and the Engineer will conform to the requirements of the Owner and to the standards of the agencies participating with the Owner in the Project. The Engineer will coordinate all work between the Owner and all participating agencies and regulating agencies, where specified in Engineer's proposal dated March 4, 2019 (Proposal), which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

A task order will be issued for each phase and shall specify the work to be performed, basis of payment, and time for completion. Each Task Order shall become an Addendum to and a part of this Contract in accordance with Exhibit A. The Owner may terminate the Contract or any Task Order by written notification and without cause per Section 7.0. Issuance of a Task Order will serve as the Owner's approval to begin a subsequent phase.

2.0 CHARACTER AND EXTENT OF BASIC SERVICES OF THE ENGINEER

2.1 General

- 2.1.1 Engineer shall provide for Owner professional engineering services in all phases of the Project to which this Agreement applies and as hereinafter provided to properly plan and execute the work on the project(s) assigned to the Engineer. These services will include but will not be limited to, serving as Owner's professional engineering representative for the Project, providing professional engineering consultation and advice, and furnishing customary civil, structural, and construction engineering and inspection.
- 2.1.2 In general the Project consists of the design, bidding, and construction phase services phases shown in the Proposal. Implementation of each phase will not necessarily be done in the order listed. As this project progresses, phases may be deleted or added to complement achieving a successful project.
The proposed project is 4,100 feet of steel sheet pile wall along the southeastern-side of Engineer's Canal and as further described in the attached Proposal.
- 2.1.3 Services provided by the Engineer shall be performed in accordance with generally accepted professional engineering practice at the time and the place where the services are rendered.
- 2.1.4 Engineer shall obtain from Owner a task order authorization to proceed for each phase of the Project.
- 2.1.5 Engineer shall provide minutes of all meetings with St. Charles Parish to include but not limited to meetings regarding any phase of the Project, Pre-Bid Conferences, Progress Meetings, Technical review Committee Meetings, etc.
- 2.2 Task Order – Topographic Survey.
- 2.3 Task Order – Geotechnical Services.
- 2.4 Task Order - Preliminary Engineering Design: Perform the services for preliminary engineering design. Submit one paper copies and one PDF file of the construction documents at 60-percent complete phase to the Parish for review and comments. Based on the Parish's review comments, revise the construction documents as necessary.
- 2.5 Task Order - Final Engineering Design: Perform the services for final engineering design. Submit one paper copies and one PDF file of the construction documents at 90-percent and 100-percent complete phases to the Parish for

review and comments. Based on the Parish's review comments, revise the construction documents as necessary.

- 2.6 Task Order – Permitting Phase.
- 2.7 Task Order – Bidding Phase.
- 2.8 Task Order - Construction Phase Services

2.8.1 General Administration of Construction Contract. Engineer shall consult with and advise Owner and act as Owner's representative as provided in Articles 1 through 17, inclusive, of the Standard General Conditions of the Construction Contract of the Engineer's Joint Contract Documents Committee. The extent and limitations of the duties, responsibilities and authority of Engineer as assigned in said Standard General Conditions shall not be modified, except as Engineer may otherwise agree in writing. All of Owner's instructions to Contractor will be issued through Engineer who will have authority to act on behalf of Owner to the extent provided in said Standard General Conditions except as otherwise provided in writing.

2.8.2 Visits to Site and Observation of Construction. In connection with observations of the work of Contractor while it is in progress.

2.8.2.1 Engineer shall make visits to the site once per month minimum, or more frequent visits as deemed necessary by Owner and/or progress of work during the construction periods to observe as an experienced and qualified design professional the progress and quality of the various aspects of Contractor's work. Based on information obtained during such visits and on such observations, Engineer shall endeavor to determine in general if such work is proceeding in accordance with the Contract Documents and Engineer shall keep Owner informed of the progress of the work.

2.8.2.2 The purpose of Engineer's visits to (and representation by Resident Project Representative if utilized) the site will be to enable Engineer to better carry out the duties and responsibilities assigned to and undertaken by Engineer during the Construction Phase, and, in addition, by exercise of Engineer's efforts as an experienced and qualified design professional, to provide for Owner a greater degree of confidence that the completed work of Contractor will conform generally to the Contract Documents and that the integrity of the design concept as reflected in the Contract Documents has been implemented and preserved by Contractor. On the other hand, Engineer shall not, during such visits or as a result of such observations of Contractor's work in progress, supervise, direct or have control over Contractor's work nor shall Engineer have authority over or responsibility for the means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of construction selected by Contractor, for safety precautions and programs incident to the work of Contractor or for any failure of Contractor to comply with laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes or orders applicable to Contractor furnishing and performing their work except as provided elsewhere in this Contract. Accordingly, Engineer can neither guarantee the performance of the construction contracts by Contractor nor assume responsibility for Contractor's failure to furnish and perform their work in accordance with the Contract Documents.

2.8.3 Defective Work. During such visits and on the basis of such observations, Engineer may disapprove of or reject Contractor's work while it is in progress if Engineer believes that such work will not produce a completed Project that conforms generally to the Contract Documents or that it will prejudice the integrity of the design concept of the Project as reflected in the Contract Documents.

2.8.4 Interpretations and Clarifications. Engineer shall issue necessary interpretations and clarifications of the Contract Documents.

2.8.5 Shop Drawings. Engineer shall review and approve (or take other appropriate action in respect of) Shop Drawings (as that term is defined in the aforesaid Standard General Conditions), samples and other data which Contractor is required to submit, but only for conformance with the design concept of the Project and compliance with the information given in the Contract Documents. Such reviews and approvals or other action shall not extend to means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of construction or to safety precautions and programs incident thereto except as provided elsewhere in this Contract.

2.8.6 Substitutes. Engineer shall evaluate and determine the acceptability of substitute materials and equipment proposed by Contractor and make a recommendation to Owner for his approval.

2.8.7 Inspections and Tests. Engineer shall have authority, as Owner's representative, to require special inspection or testing of the work, and shall receive and review all certificates of inspections, testing and approvals required by laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes, orders or the Contract Documents (but only to determine generally that their content complies with the requirements of, and the results certified indicate compliance with, the Contract Documents).

2.8.8 Dispute between Owner and Contractor. Engineer shall act as initial interpreter of the requirements of the Contract Documents and judge of the acceptability of the work there under and make recommendations on all claims of Owner and Contractor relating to the acceptability of the work or the interpretation of the requirements of the Contract Documents pertaining to the execution and progress of the work.

2.8.9 Applications for Payment. Based on Engineer's on-site observations as an experienced and qualified design professional, on information provided by the Resident Project Representative and on review of applications for payment and the accompanying data and schedules:

2.8.9.1 Engineer shall determine the amounts owed to Contractor and recommend in writing payments to Contractor in such amounts. Such recommendations of payment will constitute a representation to Owner based on such observations and review, that the work has progressed to the point indicated, and that, to the best of Engineer's knowledge, information and belief, the quality of such work is generally in accordance with the Contract Documents (subject to an evaluation of such work as a functioning whole prior to or upon Substantial Completion, to the results of any subsequent tests called for in the Contract Documents and to any other qualifications stated in the recommendation). In the case of unit price work, Engineer's recommendations of payment will include final determination of quantities and classifications of such work (subject to any subsequent adjustments allowed by the Contract Documents).

2.8.9.2 By recommending any payment Engineer will not thereby be deemed to have represented that exhaustive, continuous or detailed reviews or examinations have been made by Engineer to check the quality or quantity of Contractor's work as it is furnished and performed beyond the responsibilities specifically assigned to Engineer in this Agreement and the Contract Documents. Engineer's review of Contractor's work for the purposes of recommending payments will not impose on Engineer responsibility to supervise, direct or control such work or for the means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction or safety precautions or programs incident thereto or Contractor compliance with laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes or orders applicable to their furnishing and performing the work. It will also not impose responsibility on Engineer to make any examination to ascertain how or for what purposes any Contractor has used the moneys paid on account of the Contract Price, or to determine that title to any of the work, materials or equipment has passed to Owner free and clear of any lien, claims, security interests or encumbrances, or that there may not be other matters at issue between Owner and Contractor that might affect the amount that should be paid except as provided elsewhere in this Contract.

2.8.10 Construction Closeout Document. Engineer shall receive and review maintenance and operating instructions, tests and approvals which are to be assembled by Contractor in accordance with the Contract Documents (but such review will only be to determine that their content complies with the requirements of, and in the case of certificates of inspection, tests and approvals the results certified indicate compliance with, the Contract Documents); and shall transmit them to Owner with written comments.

2.8.11 Inspection. Engineer shall conduct an inspection to determine if the work is substantially complete and a final inspection to determine if the completed work is acceptable. If the completed work is acceptable, the Engineer shall recommend in writing, a Notice of Substantial Completion to the Owner and the Contractor that the work is acceptable (subject to any conditions therein expressed).

2.8.12 Pre-Construction Conference. Engineer shall assist Owner in conducting a Pre-Construction Conference with Contractor for the project to discuss construction-related matters. Engineer will supply two stamped copies of the Construction Drawings incorporating addenda items generated during the bid process plus one (1) electronic file copy of each drawing in AutoCAD format (release 2000 or later) and in PDF format titled to reflect "Construction Drawings".

2.8.13 Owner shall select independent material testing labs. Engineer shall review testing results and based on these results, recommend to Owner the acceptability of material provided by the Contractor and used in the Project.

2.8.14 Limitation of Responsibilities. Engineer shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any Contractor, or of any subcontractor or supplier, or any of the Contractor's or Sub-Contractor's or supplier's agents or employees or any other persons (except Engineer's own employees and agents) at the site or otherwise furnishing or performing any of the Contractor's work; however, nothing contained in paragraphs 2.8.1 through 2.8.13 inclusive, shall be construed to release Engineer from liability for failure to properly perform duties and responsibilities assumed by Engineer in the Contract Documents, inclusive of but not limited to 2.8.3.

2.8.15 Work Directive Changes and Change Orders. To be provided as appropriate to construct the project and in accordance with State and Local Laws.

2.8.16 Task Order Close-out and Facility Operation

- The Engineer shall:
- 2.8.16.1 Provide start-up services for the new facility.
- 2.8.16.2 Prepare training materials and provide training of Owner's staff to operate and maintain the new equipment if specified in the Task Order. Training will consist of classroom and hands-on training using the installed equipment.
- 2.8.16.3 Assemble required sets of equipment manufacturer's operation and maintenance manuals if specified in the Task Order.
- 2.8.16.4 Assemble required sets of approved shop drawings in proper order if specified in the Task Order.
- 2.8.16.5 Provide technical consultation and assistance in correcting warranty items.
- 2.8.16.6 Provide assistance in connection with the refining and adjusting of new equipment or system.
- 2.8.16.7 Prepare a final set of stamped project drawings reflecting "as built" along with one (1) electronic file copy of these drawings in AutoCADD format (release 2000 or later) and in PDF format titled to reflect "as built".
- 2.8.16.8 In company with Owner, visit the Project to observe any apparent defects in the completed construction, assist Owner in consultations and discussions with Contractor concerning correction of such deficiencies, and make recommendations as to replacement or correction of defective work.
- 2.8.17.8 Engineer shall have 45 days from Contractor's Substantial Completion date to complete requirements of the Contract.

2.9 Task Order – Resident Inspection: The Scope of Services, fee and schedule for a Resident Project Representative may be negotiated prior to construction in a Task Order.

3.0 SERVICES OF THE OWNER

- 3.1 Provide full information as to the requirements of the Task Order.
- 3.2 Assist the Engineer in planning and design services by placing at his disposal all existing plans, maps, field notes, statistics, computations and other data in its possession relative to existing facilities.
- 3.3 Guarantee access to and make all provisions for the Engineer and his

subconsultants to enter upon public property as required for performing the services.

4.0 COMPENSATION

- 4.1 For performance of Basic Engineering as outlined in Section 2 above, the Owner shall authorize and pay the Engineer a not-to-exceed fee, based on the Standard Hourly Rate Schedule in the Proposal, and actual time and costs. The not-to-exceed fees for each phase are as follows:
- 4.1.1 Topographic Survey \$ 25,000
- 4.1.2 Preliminary and Final Engineering \$224,554
- 4.1.3 Permitting \$ 15,000
- 4.1.4 Bidding Assistance and Construction Phase \$ 16,000 (first phase only)
- 4.1.5 Resident Inspection To be determined

For geotechnical services Engineer shall be paid a lump sum of \$20,000.

4.2 If a Task Order, or any portion thereof, is not completed for any reason, the final fee for basic engineering services shall be negotiated between Owner and Engineer as per Section 7.0.

4.3 The following documentation shall be required for payment to Engineer and shall be attached to the monthly invoice.

- 4.3.1 A copy of the Owner's written authorization to perform the service.
- 4.3.2 Timesheets for all hours invoiced.
- 4.3.3 Invoice copies, logs or other substantiation of non-salary expenses.

4.4 For additional engineering and other services described in Section 5, Owner shall pay Engineer for the fee negotiated at the time the work is assigned by the method stipulated in the contract amendment.

5.0 CHARACTER AND EXTENT OF ADDITIONAL ENGINEERING

5.1 The Owner reserves the right to request Engineer to provide Additional Engineering and/or Additional Services described in Section 5, Paragraphs 5.1.1 through 5.1.2.9 inclusive. It is mutually understood that the Owner reserves the right to reevaluate any/all interested Engineering Firms concerning Additional Engineering or Additional Services as described in Section 5.0. The Owner shall issue written authorization to the Engineer to provide Additional Engineering and/or Additional Services prior to the performance of any Additional Engineering and/or Additional Services as described in Section 5, Paragraph 5.1 through 5.1.2.9 inclusive.

5.1.1 Additional Engineering. Provide Basic Design and Construction Engineering Services for a negotiated fee. The fee for Basic Engineering Services related to the design and construction for the associated work shall be negotiated at the time the work is assigned and this Contract shall be amended to include that work in accordance with Section 4.0 of this Contract.

5.1.2 Additional Services. Furnish or obtain from others Additional Services of the following types. The fee for Additional Services shall be authorized at the time the work is assigned in accordance with Section 4.4 of this contract.

5.1.2.1 Furnish survey personnel to lay out and stake out for construction, giving line locations and grade stakes at the required intervals.

5.1.2.2 Prepare to and serve as an expert witness for the Owner in any litigation.

5.1.2.3 Act as the Owner's representative in coordination of and be present during negotiations between Owner and other Governmental Bodies, Utility Companies, Transportation Companies, etc. (Prepare necessary data for such activities and review and make recommendations on data submitted by such agencies.)

5.1.2.4 Services resulting from significant changes in the general scope, extent or character of the Task Order or its design including, but not limited to, changes in size, complexity, Owner's schedule, character of construction or method of financing; and revising previously accepted studies, reports, design documents or Contract Documents when such revisions are required by changes in laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes or orders enacted subsequent to the preparation of such studies, reports or documents or are due to any other causes beyond Engineer's control as approved by Owner.

Providing renderings or models for Owner's use.

5.1.2.5 Preparing documents in addition to those furnished under Engineering Design and Construction Documents for alternate bids requested by Owner for Contractor's work which is not executed or documents for out-of-sequence work.

5.1.2.7 Providing any type of property surveys or related engineering services needed for the transfer of interests in real property.

5.1.2.8 Assistance in connection with re-bidding or renegotiating contracts for construction, materials, equipment or services.

5.1.2.9 Provide technical consultation and advice on the completed project after the initial thirty (30) day start-up period.

6.0 OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

6.1 Documents including but not limited to plans, specifications, maps, basic survey notes, sketches, charts, computations and all other data prepared or obtained under the terms of this authorization shall become the property of the Owner and shall be made available for Owner's inspection at anytime during the Task Order and, shall be delivered to the Owner prior to termination or final completion of the Contract.

6.2 Engineer may retain a set of documents for its files.

6.3 Reuse of Documents. Any reuse of documents or materials without written authorization or adaptation by Engineer to the specific purpose intended will be at Owner's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to Engineer or to Engineer's independent professional associates, subcontractors, and consultants.

6.4 No materials, to include but not limited to reports, maps or other documents produced as a result of this Contract, in whole or in part, shall be available to Engineer for copyright purposes. Any such materials produced as a result of this Contract that might be subject to copyright shall be the property of the Owner and all such rights shall belong to the Owner, and the Owner shall be sole and exclusive entity who may exercise such rights.

7.0 TERMINATION.

7.1 This Agreement or any Task Order may be terminated by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice.

7.2 The Engineer, upon receipt of such notice, shall immediately discontinue all services in connection with the performance of this Agreement and shall proceed to cancel promptly all existing orders and contracts insofar as such orders or contracts are chargeable to this Agreement.

7.3 The Engineer shall, as soon as practicable after receipt of notice of termination, submit a statement showing in detail the services performed and payments received under this Agreement to the date of termination.

7.4 The Owner shall then pay the Engineer promptly that portion of the prescribed fee to which both parties agree.

7.5 Failure to meet agreed delivery dates or authorized extensions are considered substantial failures.

8.0 COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND ORDINANCES.

8.1 The Engineer hereby agrees to comply with all Federal, State and Local Laws and Ordinances applicable to the work or services under this Contract.

9.0 SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

9.1 Owner and Engineer each bind himself, his successors, executors, administrators and assigns to the other party to this Agreement, and to the successors, executors, administrators and assigns of each other party in respect to all covenants of this Agreement.

10.0 INSURANCE

10.1 The Engineer shall secure and maintain at his expense such insurance that will protect him and the Owner, from claims under Workmen's Compensation Acts and from claims for bodily injury, death or property damage which may arise from performance of services under this Agreement. Insurance for bodily injury or death shall be in the unencumbered amount of \$500,000.00 for one person and not less than \$1,000,000.00 for all injuries and/or deaths resulting from any one occurrence. The insurance for property damage shall be in the unencumbered amount of \$250,000.00 for each accident and not less than \$1,000,000.00 aggregate.

10.2 The Engineer shall also secure and maintain at his expense professional liability insurance in the unencumbered sum of \$500,000.00.

10.3 All certificates of insurance SHALL BE FURNISHED TO THE OWNER and shall provide that insurance shall not be cancelled without ten (10) days prior written notice to the Owner. The Owner may examine the policies.

10.4 Engineer shall include all subcontractors and/or subconsultants as insured under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates for each. All coverages for subcontractors and/or subconsultants shall be subject to all the requirements stated herein.

10.5 St. Charles Parish shall be named as an additional insured on general liability insurance policies.

10.6 For all purposes under Louisiana law, the principals of this Contract shall be recognized as the statutory employer of all contract employees as provided in LSA-RS. 23:1061.

11.0 GENERAL

11.1 The Engineer shall indemnify and save harmless the Owner against any and all claims, demands, suits or judgments for sums of money to any party for loss of life or injury or damages to person or property, growing out of, resulting from or by reason of any negligent act by the Engineer, its agent, servants or employees, while engaged upon or in connection with the services required or performed hereunder.

11.2 While in the performance of services or carrying out other obligations under this Agreement, the Engineer shall be acting in the capacity of the independent contractors and not as employees of the Owner. The Owner shall not be obligated to any person, firm or corporation for any obligations of the Engineer arising from the performance of their services under this Agreement. The Engineer shall be authorized to represent the Owner with respect to services being performed, dealing with other agencies and administrations in order to perform the services under this Contract.

11.3 The Engineer warrants that he has not employed or retained any company or person other than a bona-fide employee working solely for the consultant, to solicit or secure this Contract, and that they have not paid or agreed to pay any company or person other than bona-fide employees working solely for the consultant, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gifts or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Contract. For breach or violation of this warranty, the Owner shall have the right to annul this Contract without liability.

11.4 This Agreement being for the personal services of the Engineer shall not be assigned or subcontracted in whole or in part by the Engineer as to the services to be performed hereunder without the written consent of the Owner.

11.5 Should either party to this Agreement have to file suit in order to enforce the provisions of hereof, the losing party hereby agrees to pay the attorney's fees of the prevailing party.

11.6 No member of the Governing Body of the Owner and no other officer, employee or agent of the Owner who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the planning and carrying out to the Program, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract, and the Engineer shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.

11.7 No member of the Governing Body of the locality and no other public official of such locality, who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the planning and carrying out of the Program, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract, and the Engineer shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.

11.8 The Engineer covenants that he presently has no interest and shall not acquire interest, direct or indirect, in the project area or any parcels therein or any other interest which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of his

or agent of the Owner who exercises any functions or responsibilities in

connection with the planning and carrying out to the Program, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract, and the Engineer shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.

11.7 No member of the Governing Body of the locality and no other public official of such locality, who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the planning and carrying out of the Program, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract, and the Engineer shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.

11.8 The Engineer covenants that he presently has no interest and shall not acquire interest, direct or indirect, in the project area or any parcels therein or any other interest which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of his services hereunder. The Engineer further covenants that in the performance of this Contract no person having any such interest shall be employed.

12.0 ACCESS TO SITE

12.1 Owner shall be fully responsible for obtaining the necessary access authorizations to allow Engineer, its agents, subcontractors and representatives, to have access to all areas of public and private property as required by Engineer in order to perform its services under this Agreement.

13.0 WARRANTY

13.1 Engineer warrants that it will perform its design services with the degree of skill and to the standard of care required of the engineering profession to meet all Federal, State and Local requirements

13.2 If Engineering Services for a task order designed by Engineer does not meet those requirements noted in 13.1 above, then to the extent that this occurs as a direct result of Engineer's failure to meet the standard of care in its design services, Engineer will indemnify the Parish for Engineer's share of the costs incurred to bring Engineering Services for project to the limitations mandated.

13.3 The obligations expressed in 13.1 and 13.2 in no way limits the Engineer's obligations expressed elsewhere in this Contract.

14.0 EXCLUSIVE JURISDICTION AND VENUE

14.1 For all claims arising out of or related to this agreement, ENGINEER hereby consents and yields to the exclusive jurisdiction and venue of the Twenty-Ninth Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Charles and expressly waives any (a) pleas of jurisdiction based upon ENGINEER's residence and (B) right of removal to Federal Court based upon diversity of citizenship.

15.0 SCHEDULE

Engineer shall deliver 30-percent complete plans and specifications along with a project cost estimate within 90 days of Notice to Proceed. Thirty-percent complete plans shall include topographic survey, location of walking path and locations of amenities. The 30-percent complete plans shall be drawn at a scale of 1" = 20'.

PART I

This Contract for program administrative/management services is made and entered into this 27th day of March, 2019, by and between St. Charles Parish, State of Louisiana (hereinafter called the PARISH), acting herein by Larry Cochran, Parish President, hereunto duly authorized, and Solitient Corporation, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana (hereinafter called the CONSULTANT), acting herein by Colin Sternhell, Vice President, hereunto duly authorized;

WITNESSETH THAT:

WHEREAS, the PARISH has/intends to secure funding through the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Flood Mitigation Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs (and any other funding that may become available) to elevate Severe Repetitive Loss and Repetitive Loss residential structures; and,

WHEREAS, the PARISH desires to engage the CONSULTANT to render certain program management and representation services in the implementation of its Elevation Programs:

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties do mutually agree as follows:

1. Employment of CONSULTANT

The PARISH hereby agrees to engage the CONSULTANT, and the CONSULTANT hereby agrees to perform the Scope of Services set forth herein under the terms and conditions of this Contract.

2. Scope of Services

The CONSULTANT shall, in a satisfactory and proper manner, assist the PARISH with its Elevation Program by performing the following scope of services, including but not limited to:

- Coordinate and host a Program Kick-Off Meeting for all property owners to attend to ensure that the owner understands all policies and restrictions that affect the elevation of his or her property, and to collect any missing data. During the meeting, ensure that the property owner understands the mitigation process in general, duplication of benefits (DOB), the match requirement, and all St. Charles Parish policies and procedures.
- Conduct individual Program Kick-Off Meetings with each property owner as needed.
- Confirm information previously gathered remains valid and accurate.
- Ensure execution of the Statement of Voluntary Participation and Affidavit, and the Applicant's Certification.
- Ensure the existence of records of sufficient photos of the current pre-elevation property conditions, including all doors, utilities, and central or window air conditioning units.
- Provide guidance to each property owner regarding the filing of an ICC claim, the proceeds of which are to be used towards each property owner's required match and provide administrative assistance to property owners as needed.
- Provide each property owner with a list of qualified contractors screened by the consultant and approved by the Parish; ensure that each property owner obtains at least three bids from qualified contractors on the list.
- Review bids for cost reasonableness and any errors or ineligible items.
- Coordinate with the property owner for the completion and review of elevation plans, foundation designs, construction details, elevation certificates, and permitting prior to construction to assure compliance with the grant programs, Parish building codes and requirements, as well as local, State, and Federal regulations, and provide copies of all documentation to the Parish.
- Facilitate the eligibility review of the proposed elevation by grant agency/agencies.
- Compile necessary pre-construction documentation required and package for Parish review and approval.
- Assist the Parish with the preparation of the construction contract for the property owner to execute with the elevation contractor selected. The contract must be pre-approved by the Parish and contain insurance requirements, payment milestones, retainage, and indemnify the Parish against legal action as a result of the implementation of the program. Instruct the property owner on the proper procedures to execute the contract with the elevation contractor they select, as well as the exact dollar amount of the match requirement.
- Coordinate and host a Pre-Construction Kick-Off Meeting with the property owner, construction contractor, project manager, and St. Charles Parish.
- Collect the executed construction contract and payment of the match requirement to the Parish in the form of a cashier's check from each property owner made payable to the Parish along with copies of all documentation collected from each property owner prior to the execution of the construction contract by the Parish.
- Arrange additional meetings, as needed, with the St. Charles Parish Dept. of Planning & Zoning, the property owner, and contractor to discuss construction permitting, code compliance, and inspections.
- Draft and issue Notice to Proceed.
- Conduct site visits to inspect ongoing construction a minimum of once weekly and complete weekly monitoring reports that include photos, progress updates, issues of concern, etc. to submit to St. Charles Parish.
- Review milestone payment requests from contractors for compliance with program requirements, compile all necessary documentation, and submit to Parish for approval and payment.
- Coordinate and host Final Site Visit Meetings following construction with the property owner, construction contractor, project manager, and St. Charles Parish and document any discrepancies.
- Review, analyze, and evaluate requests for Change Orders and prepare Change Orders for execution by the contractor, property owner, and the Parish.
- Assist the Parish in responding to information and data requests.
- Coordinate with the grant agency, as needed.
- Comply with all grant program mandates and documentation requirements.
- Develop and submit monthly progress reports to the Parish that summarize the status of individual projects, and include other information necessary such as the program progress as a whole.
- Assist the Parish in the preparation and submission of the requests for reimbursement.
- Assist the Parish in the preparation of grant program quarterly reports.
- aa. Assist the Parish in establishing project files. These files must demonstrate compliance with grant program requirements and all applicable local, State, and Federal regulations. The project files must be monitored throughout the program to ensure that they are complete and that all necessary documentation is being retained in the Parish's files.
- bb. Attend and assist the Parish during grant agency monitoring visit(s) and prepare the Parish's

- response to any monitoring findings.
- cc. Protect each property owner's right to privacy by restricting communication regarding the elevation of their respective property to only Parish Administrators, the property owner, their selected elevation construction contractor, the surveyor, and grant agency. Parish approval must be obtained prior to communicating with any other individual/agency other than those aforementioned.
- dd. Provide extensive knowledge, experience, and technical competence in dealing with elevation programs, specifically including the requirements associated with FEMA's Flood Mitigation Assistance and Hazard Mitigation Grant Programs, NFIP Increased Cost of Compliance, as well as construction management, and ASCE 24 standards.
- ee. Maintain staff members that have experience with elevation grant funding programs.

The scope of services shall be performed under and at the direction of the Parish President, or his/her designee.

3. Term of Contract

The term of this Contract shall begin as of the day and year first written above and will be for a period of three years. Upon written mutual agreement between the PARISH and the CONSULTANT, this Contract may be extended for one additional year.

The services of the CONSULTANT shall commence upon the issuance of separate Task Orders by the PARISH as needed for each elevation grant award the Parish secures during the contract period. Such services shall be continued in such sequence as to assure their relevance to the purposes of this Contract. The CONSULTANT shall provide services through closeout and monitoring for each event in which a Task Order is issued. The services required and performed hereunder shall not be considered complete until the PARISH has received notification of final closeout from the grant agency for each grant award in which the CONSULTANT received a Task Order regardless of timeframe.

4. Access to Information

All information, data, reports, records, and maps as are existing, available, and necessary for carrying out the work outlined above shall be furnished to the CONSULTANT by the PARISH. No charge will be made to the CONSULTANT for such information, and the PARISH will cooperate with the CONSULTANT to facilitate the performance of the work described in this Contract.

5. Compensation and Method of Payment

The CONSULTANT hereby agrees upon a lump sum fee in the amount of \$11,500.00 per structure elevated as compensation for the Scope of Services provided herein. The method of payment to the CONSULTANT is as outlined in the table below:

The CONSULTANT shall submit invoices to the PARISH for payment no more than once a month. These invoices shall summarize the percent complete of each milestone for each structure of which charges are billed. Each invoice amount due will be the percent complete for the period less any previous payments.

Payments will be made to the CONSULTANT after review and approval by the Parish. All payments will be made within 30 days of the submission of an invoice with all required documentation.

6. Ownership of Documents

All documents, including original drawings, estimates, specifications, field notes, photographs, reports and data are the property of the PARISH. The CONSULTANT may retain copies of said documents.

7. Liability

CONSULTANT shall perform its Services hereunder on a best professional efforts basis, consistent with generally accepted industry standards, or in the absence of generally accepted industry standards, consistent with the CONSULTANT'S experience within the industry. CONSULTANT'S liability in the event of defect, error, omission, or failure (hereinafter called "Defect" or collectively called "Defects") in any of CONSULTANT'S Services under this Contract shall be limited to Defects arising out of its sole negligence and further limited to the correction of Defects in CONSULTANT'S original Services. In the event of any such Defect, and provided that CONSULTANT is notified by the PARISH in writing of such Defect within one (1) year after completion of the CONSULTANT'S Services under this Contract, and such notice specifically includes a request for re-performance, CONSULTANT shall re-perform the defective portion of the Services without any additional cost to the PARISH.

8. Insurance

- The CONSULTANT shall secure and maintain at its expense such insurance that will protect it and the PARISH, from claims under the Workmen's Compensation Acts and from claims for bodily injury, death or property damage which may arise from performance of services under this Contract.
- Insurance for bodily injury or death shall be in the unencumbered amount of FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$500,000.00) for one person and not less than ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) for all injuries and/or deaths resulting from any one occurrence.
- The insurance for property damage shall be in the unencumbered amount of TWO HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$250,000.00) for each accident and not less than ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) aggregate.
- CONSULTANT shall also secure and maintain at his own expense professional liability insurance in the sum of ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00).
- CONSULTANT shall also secure and maintain at his own expense comprehensive automobile liability insurance in the sum of ONE MILLION DOLLARS (1,000,000.00). Auto Liability should include owned, hired and leased autos.
- All certificates of insurance shall be furnished to the Parish within five (5) days after execution of the Contract and shall provide that insurance not be cancelled without ten (10) days prior written notice to the PARISH.
- ST. CHARLES PARISH shall be named as additional insured on general liability insurance policies.
- It shall be the responsibility of the CONSULTANT to require that these insurance requirements are met by all contractors and sub-contractors performing work for and on behalf of the PARISH. The CONSULTANT shall further ensure the PARISH is named as additional insured on all insurance policies provided by said contractor and/or sub-contractor through the duration of the project.
- St. Charles Parish may examine all insurance policies.
- For all purposes under Louisiana law, the principals of this Contract shall be recognized as the statutory employer of all contract employees as provided in LSA-R.S. 23:1061.
- CONSULTANT shall indemnify and save harmless the PARISH against any and all claims, demands, suits or judgments for sums of money to any party for loss of life or injury or damages to person or property growing out of, resulting from or by reason of any negligent act by the CONSULTANT, its agents, servants or employees, while engaged upon or in connection with the services required or performed hereunder.

9. Records and Monitoring Visits/Audits

The CONSULTANT shall maintain accounts and records, including personnel, property, and financial records, adequate to identify and account for all costs pertaining to the Contract and such other records as may be deemed necessary by the PARISH to assure proper accounting for all funds, both federal and non-federal shares. These records will be made available for monitoring visits/audit purposes to the PARISH or any authorized representative, and will be retained for five (5) years from the official date of the final closeout of the respective award, unless permission to destroy them is granted by the PARISH.

10. Terms and Conditions

This Contract is subject to the provisions titled, "PART II, Compliance Provisions for Federally Assisted Professional Services Contracts" consisting of twelve (12) pages, attached hereto, and incorporated by reference herein.

By entering into this Contract, CONSULTANT affirmatively warrants that CONSULTANT is currently in compliance with such laws, and further warrants that during the term of this Contract, CONSULTANT shall remain in compliance therewith.

Compliance Provisions for Federally Assisted Professional Services Contracts

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26. CONFIDENTIAL FINDINGS
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1. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY (Equal Opportunity Clause)

During the performance of this contract, the Contractor agrees as follows:

- A. The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. 8. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor shall complete and submit all reports, in such form and according to such schedule, as may be required by the Owner.

9. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- A. No officer or employee of the local jurisdiction or its designees or agents, no member of the governing body, and no other public official of the locality who his/her tenure or for one year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in any contract or subcontract, or the proceeds thereof, for work to be performed. Further, the Contractor shall cause to be incorporated in all subcontracts the language set forth in this paragraph prohibiting conflict of interest.

13. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE

If, through any cause, the Contractor shall fail to fulfill in a timely and proper manner his obligations under this contract, or if the Contractor shall violate any of the covenants, agreements, or stipulations of this contract, the Owner shall thereupon have the right to terminate this contract by giving written notice to the Contractor of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof, at least five (5) days before the effective date of such termination. In such event, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, photographs, and reports prepared by the Contractor under this contract shall, at the option of the Owner, become the Owner's property and the Contractor shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any work satisfactorily completed hereunder. Notwithstanding the above, the Contractor shall not be relieved of liability to the Owner for damages sustained by the Owner by virtue of any breach of the contract by the Contractor, and the Owner may withhold any payments to the Contractor for the purpose of set-off until such time as the exact amount of damages due the Owner from the Contractor is determined.

14. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE

(Applicable to all contracts in excess of \$10,000)

The Owner may terminate this contract at any time by giving at least ten (10) days notice in writing to the Contractor. If the contract is terminated by the Owner as provided herein, the Contractor will be paid for the time provided and expenses incurred up to the termination date.

15. SUBCONTRACTS

- A. The Contractor shall not enter into any subcontract with any subcontractor who has been debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participating in contracting programs by any agency of the United States Government or the State of Louisiana.

17. BREACH OF CONTRACT TERMS

Any violation or breach of terms of this contract on the part of the Contractor or the Contractor's subcontractors may result in the suspension or termination of this contract or such other action that may be necessary to enforce the rights of the parties of this contract. The duties and obligations imposed by the contract documents and the rights and remedies available thereunder shall be in addition to and not a limitation of any duties, obligations, rights and remedies otherwise imposed or available by law.

18. PROVISIONS REQUIRED BY LAW DEEMED INSERTED

Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and the contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein, and if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not correctly inserted, then upon the application of either party the contract shall forthwith be physically amended to make such insertion or correction.

19. CHANGES

The Owner may, from time to time, request changes in the scope of the services of the Contractor to be performed hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of the Contractor's compensation which are mutually agreed upon by and between the Owner and the Contractor, shall be incorporated in written and executed amendments to this Contract.

20. PERSONNEL

The Contractor represents that it has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required in performing the services under this Contract. Such personnel shall not be employees of or have any contractual relationship with the Owner.

All the services required hereunder will be performed by the Contractor or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in the work shall be fully qualified and shall be authorized or permitted under State and local law to perform such services.

No person who is serving sentence in a penal or correctional institution shall be employed on work under this Contract.

21. ASSIGNABILITY

The Contractor shall not assign any interest in this Contract, and shall not transfer any interest in the same (whether by assignment or novation) without prior written approval of the Owner provided that claims for money due or to become due the Contractor from the Owner under this Contract may be assigned to a bank, trust company, or other financial institution, or to a Trustee in Bankruptcy, without such approval. Notice of any such assignment or transfer shall be furnished promptly to the Owner.

22. INTEREST OF CONTRACTOR

The Contractor covenants that he presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest direct or indirect in the above described project or any parcels therein or any other interest which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of his services hereunder. The Contractor further covenants that in the performance of this Contract that no person having any such interest shall be employed.

23. POLITICAL ACTIVITY

The Contractor will comply with the provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.), which limits the political activity of employees.

All of the reports, information, data, etc., prepared or assembled by the contractor under this contract are confidential, and the contractor agrees that they shall not be made available to any individual or organization without prior written approval of the owner.

An ordinance to amend the Code of Ordinances, Appendix A, St. Charles Parish Zoning Ordinance of 1981, Section III. Definitions., Section VI. Zoning district criteria and regulations. B. Residential districts, [VIII]. R-3, Multi-family residential: 1. Use Regulations and 4. Special Provisions: b.1., Townhouses., and Section VII. Supplemental use and performance regulations. Townhouses., to clarify the definition and regulations for townhouse building and townhouse developments.

WHEREAS, the Zoning Ordinance of 1981 established townhouses as a permitted use in both the R-1T and R-3 zoning districts; and,
WHEREAS, Ordinance 88-3-9 revised the zoning districts and regulations affecting townhouses; and,
WHEREAS, Ordinance 15-7-5 revised the definition of townhouses and added supplemental use and performance regulations for townhouses without deleting the existing regulations established by Ordinance 88-3-9; and,

WHEREAS, the St. Charles Parish Council wishes to clarify the definition and regulations for townhouses and townhouse developments.
NOW, THEREFORE, THE ST. CHARLES PARISH COUNCIL ORDAINS:

SECTION I. That the Code of Ordinances, Appendix A, Section III. Definitions. is amended as follows, with additional text in underlining and deleted text in ~~strikethrough~~:

~~Dwelling, townhouse: A building on its own separate lot of record containing one (1) dwelling unit that occupies space from the ground to the roof, and that is attached to one (1) or more other townhouse dwelling units by at least one (1) common wall. A single-family dwelling on its own separate lot of record with its own front and rear access to the outside, and with its own yards, in a row with other similar dwelling units, in which no unit is located over another unit, and each unit is separated from other units by one or more common fire resistant walls.~~

Townhouse: A single-family dwelling in a row of at least three (3) such units in which each unit has its own front and rear access to the outside, no unit is located over another unit, and each unit is separated from any other unit by one or more

common fire-resistant walls see "Dwelling, townhouse".

SECTION II. That the Code of Ordinances, Appendix A, Section VI. Zoning district criteria and regulations, B. Residential districts, [VIII], R-3, Multi-family residential is amended as follows, with additional text in underline and deleted text in ~~strikethrough~~:

1. Use Regulations:

a. A building or land shall be used only for the following purposes:

(1) All uses allowed in the R-2 district. (Ord. No. 88-5-5, 5-16-88)

(2) Multi-family dwellings including duplexes, apartments, apartment houses, townhouses and condominiums.

(3) Boarding and lodging houses.

(4) Townhouses (see Section VII for Supplemental Use and Performance regulations).

SECTION III. That the Code of Ordinances, Appendix A, Section VI. Zoning district criteria and regulations, B. Residential districts, [VIII], R-3, Multi-family residential: 4. Special Provisions, is amended as follows, with additional text in underline and deleted text in ~~strikethrough~~:

b. 1. Townhouses: Single-family attached dwellings on individual lots for sale served by servitudes of access or fronting a public street.

(a) Location: In R-3 districts, townhousing shall be allowed.

(b) Procedure: Applicants wishing to subdivide existing multi-family lots into townhouse lots shall file for subdivision as per section II; subsection B.4., of St. Charles Parish Subdivision Regulations (Appendix C).

2. Site Plan and Design Criteria, Details:

(a) Minimum width for the portion of the lot on which the townhouse is to be constructed shall be twelve (12) feet.

(b) Minimum yard requirements:

(1) Front—twenty (20) feet.

(2) Side—ten (10) feet.

(3) Rear—twenty (20) feet.

(4) Area—twenty-five hundred (2600) square feet.

(c) Each townhouse shall have its own rear yard of at least one hundred twenty (120) square feet. When rear parking is provided it shall be reasonably secluded from view from a street, parking area or from neighboring property. Such yard shall not be used for any accessory building.

(1) Grouped parking facilities: Insofar as practical, off-street parking facilities shall be grouped in bays, either adjacent to access drive or in the interior of blocks. Adequate drainage shall be provided by developers in connection with common parking facilities, and all such facilities shall be improved to parish standards for off-street parking areas, with at least two (2) spaces per unit on the lot plus one (1) visitor parking space per each two (2) units.

(2) Courts, Open Space, and Recreational Areas: A minimum of two hundred (200) square feet per dwelling unit of recreation space must be provided. At the discretion of the director, recreation space may not be required provided that the developer pay a two-hundred dollar (\$200.00) recreation fee per unit to the parish for the development of recreational facilities.

3. Utilities and Landscaping: Design and construction of drives, drainage, and location of utilities shall be subject to review and approval by the Planning and Zoning Department. A minimum of twenty (20) percent of the site must be appropriately landscaped.

(1)(a) Interior access drives shall be at least twenty-two (22) feet wide for two-direction drives or twelve (12) feet with one-direction drive and must be properly drained.

(2)(b) Parking areas shall conform to section VIII of the St. Charles Parish Zoning Ordinance.

(3)(c) Before approval of the final subdivision plat, restrictions shall be submitted, including designation of all servitudes, lot lines, parking areas and other open spaces, with provision for perpetual maintenance of all improvements, including pavements, landscaping, utilities and servitudes. The above items will be filed with the resubdivision of the R-3 parcel.

(4) Buffer zone: There shall be a six-foot solid wood or masonry fence along the sides and rear of the property wherever it adjoins any single-family residential zoning district.

SECTION IV. That the Code of Ordinances, Appendix A, Section, Section VII. Supplemental use and performance regulations. Townhouses. Is amended as follows, with additional text in underline and deleted text in ~~strikethrough~~:

Townhouses:

a. The maximum density for townhouse developments is twelve (12) ~~seventeen~~ (17) units per acre.

b. In townhouse developments, structures shall front on a public street of servitude of access and be generally compatible with existing developments in the neighborhood.

c. Design criteria.

i. No more than six (6) dwelling units shall be included in any one (1) townhouse building.

ii. The facades of dwelling units in a townhouse shall be varied by changed front yards of not less than three (3) feet and variation in materials or design so that no more than two (2) abutting units will have the same front yard depth and the same or essentially the same architectural treatment of facades and roof lines.

iii. Frontage, measured at the building line, for individual units of a town house may not be less than fifteen (15) feet. Minimum width for an interior townhouse lot - fifteen (15) feet

iv. Minimum width for an exterior townhouse lot—twenty-five (25) feet

v. Minimum building setback from a public street—twenty (20) feet

vi. Minimum building setback from a rear lot line—twenty (20) feet

d. Drives, Parking, and Utilities.

i. Where drives are provided, off-street parking facilities shall be grouped in bays, either in the rear of the structure or in the interior of blocks the townhouse development.

ii. All parking areas shall meet the standards and minimum requirements set forth in Section VIII, Site design requirements, of this ordinance, and must include one (1) visitor parking space per each two (2) dwelling units. Visitor spaces may be provided in separate areas when an adequate area is not provided on an individual lot.

iii. Servitudes shall be provided at the front or rear of the lots within the required front or rear yard for off-street parking and utilities. Entrances to front yard parking areas shall be at least fifty (50) feet apart, unless an individual space is provided for each lot.

iii. Interior access drives shall be at least twenty-two (22) feet wide for two-direction drives or twelve (12) feet with one-direction drive and must be properly drained and accessible to all dwelling units.

iv. The Zoning Regulatory Administrator may require a six-foot landscape buffer, at maturity, along the sides and rear of any Townhouse development that abuts an R-1A, R-1B, or R-1A(M) district or any lot containing a single-family dwelling.

e. Open Space and Buffering

i. Maximum land cover is 80%; 20% of a townhouse development site must be left open.

ii. Each townhouse unit shall have its own rear yard of at least one hundred twenty (120) square feet. The rear yard shall not be used for any accessory building.

iii. A five (5) foot wide landscaped buffer is required along the sides and rear of any townhouse development that abuts an R-1A, R-1B, or R-1A(M) district or any lot containing a single-family dwelling.
