61 shelter animals taken for a ride

Partnerships help St. Charles shelter transport these pets to new families

There's a happy ending everyone envisions and hopes for when an orphaned pet or stray animal finds its way to the St. Charles Parish Animal Shelter: that it's simply a step on the way to finding what shelter workers affectionately call "forever homes."

A whopping 61 St. Charles shelter dogs and cats are on their way to living that dream, transported both on ground and through the air to their new homes. This impressive accomplishment occurred over the course of just seven days in May.

It became possible through partnerships and co-ops cultivated by the animal shelter and with like-minded

organizations trying to match these orphan pets to their forever homes.

One such partnership is with Wings of Rescue, a non-profit that flies large scale transports of animals from overcrowded shelters to partner shelters in the north, where the animals are quickly adopted.

St. Rose residents oppose townhome project

In Vicki Smith’s front yard is a sign stating, “Councilwoman Marilyn Bellock, stand with your neighbors. NO Townhomes.”

Smith, along with her neighbors on Riverview Drive in St. Rose, also have other signs advertising the June 6 Planning Commission meeting at 7 p.m.

Planning Director Michael Albert said D Luxe LLC’s second request for a special permit to build four townhomes on Riverview Drive is on the agenda for that meeting. The company made the request earlier, which the Planning Commission denied, but Albert said there is no limit to resubmitting these applications and, if approved, it still requires Parish Council approval.

With an 84-signature petition in hand, Smith said they are again opposing the move because it will devalue their predominately single-family dwelling community.

Small commercial or home-based businesses can currently locate in their area, including providing space for parking, Smith said. Although the area is mostly residential it is zoned for light commercial use, which she said they’ve coexisted with for years without issue.

In April, D Luxe owner Kenneth Martin bought a nearly one acre lot and went to the Planning Commission for the special use that would allow construction of the townhomes.

“This lot isn’t that big,” Smith said of a project proposed across the street from her residence.

By April 4, D Luxe along with opposition from the neighborhood went to the Planning Commission meeting. The measure died.

Two months later, Smith said Martin reapplied for the permit.

St. Rose residents cleaning up in anticipation of Ed Reed Park

When Trenee Royal posted an invite on her Facebook page to the community to help clean up St. Rose’s long neglected cemetery, she didn’t

expect the response she received..
“It went viral,” said an elated Royal. “I had people calling me. People jumped in and then came the call from the courthouse.”

Instead of the handful of people anticipated, nearly 30 of them arrived on May 11, she said. Then the St. Charles Parish government called to announce it was contributing garbage bags and bottles of water, and later parish workers arrived to collect the filled bags.
“This will improve old St. Rose,” said Trenee’s mother, Janice Royal, who has lived near the cemetery for years.

Restoring the cemetery is a move toward improving the area, Janice said. Her family donated the land that allowed people from Montz to St. Rose to have a place to bury their family members.
Over time, the cemetery, with an estimated 50 graves, became neglected, overgrown and an eyesore.
“There was nothing but drunks sitting on top of the graves,” Trenee said. “It was horrible. This is not the way a cemetery is supposed to look.”

So when the community came together for the clean up, Trenee said it was so appreciated. Among them was St. Charles Parish Councilwoman Marilyn Bellock, who showed up ready to work with tennis shoes.

Trenee said the project was started by

her brother, who owns a lawn care business in St. Rose. He told her he was tired of seeing the graveyard in disrepair. He also pointed out it had become an eyesore that is en route to the planned Ed Reed Park.

“The more we do it, the more people will see they are sticking to this,” she said. “They’re not going to stop ... they’re sticking to it.”

A potential donor may provide a fence for the cemetery, Home Depot will donate paint for the graves and the parish

Community Center recognized nationally

Earns Sterling Achievement Award for community, economic development

From egg hunts to dances, from national basketball tournaments to Christmas gift giveaways for the less fortunate, those behind the Edward Dufresne Community Center have consistently embraced its identity as a true multi-purpose facility aimed to benefit all.

To that end, a bit of recognition comes its way.

The center has been honored with the Sterling Achievement Award for the calendar year 2018, which recognizes outstanding contributions in the areas of community and economic development.

The community center was first nominated at the state level for the honor, chosen by Louisiana’s office of community development disaster recovery unit, and earned the honor over several nationwide contenders.

The Sterling award is bestowed by the Council of State Community Development Agencies. It picks a winner from a group of nominees that become eligible for the award by demonstrating positive results over sustained time in the areas of community and economic development, housing assistance and/or homelessness assistance and prevention.

“They were really impressed with the increase in facility usage and the increase in both the number of events we featured and our yearly revenue,” said Anedra Coleman, community center coordinator.

The center has a full-time staff at the facility that manages a

number of recreational activities and enrichment events. Parish officials, Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) staff and volunteers also help support parish and community related events such as the annual Easter Egg Hunt, Toy and Gift Fund, Veteran’s Day Luncheon, Senior Citizen’s Luncheon and Mardi Gras dance.

According to the award nomination, the center has transformed and evolved into a multi-use building that benefits the entire parish. The data over the last four years shows the return on the community center investment has far exceeded its intended and proposed usage while increasing revenues to secure sustainability.

Coleman noted the facility’s usage has increased 34 percent from 2014-2017. The number of events offered has grown to help make that a reality, and the revenue has spiked 61 percent over the same time period—creating a sustained path to success, Coleman said.

911 dispatchers help save lives

Dispatchers talk about what it takes to take the call

When Tracie Mathis answered the call, a panicked mother who was watching her son choke on a rubber ball was begging for help. Following her training, Mathis calmed the mother down enough to walk her through giving him the Heimlich hug. Soon after, she got something 911 dispatchers rarely get – news that she had saved a life.

The dispatchers of St. Charles Parish's communications center are technically the first ones on the scene, although it's by telephone. They intervene in emergencies, gather the information that positions deputies, firefighters and emergency personnel on scenes that have ranged from an RV on fire at a convenience store to domestic abuse to murder.

"We do more than just answer phones ... than what you see on TV or what you hear about," Mathis, a resident of Norco, said. "We deal with the deaths in the families and sometimes we're the last people that somebody talks to."

They are challenged to step up to the technology, such as learning a variety of software programs that have made it possible to collect and provide information in minutes that can save the life of a resident or deputy entering a dangerous scene. A dispatcher remains calm to get

young kids crying in the background," she said. "On the way home, on shift change, I had to pass that house. The ambulance and police were still there, and he didn't make it."

It was a tough day, particularly since the center's dispatchers agree they do this to help people.

For Yvonne Green of Luling, a 12-year dispatcher, it's hard not knowing what happens to the people they've tried to help.

"The best thing about being a 911 dispatcher is knowing at the end of the day that you helped someone," Green said. "The worst thing about being a dispatcher is sometimes not knowing the closing of the story."

She's handled calls from someone be-

that information, as well as aid people at a scene, and directs an emergency response within seconds of a call. "You get to help people and save lives even though you're not on the scene," Mathis said. "The fire departments, the ambulance and police can't do what they do without us. We're the first people that our citizens have contact with in their most dire situations. That's the importance of what we do." One of Mathis' toughest calls came from a woman saying her husband was unconscious and not breathing. "I walked her through CPR, but the problem was I could hear their two

ing sick and helping perform CPR or helping someone who wanted to harm him or herself. For Green, the most stressful call is one where the caller is unable to provide information because they're hysterical or have been shot and can't answer vital questions needed to provide help. "You keep talking to keep them calm, find out if someone else is in the residence with them," she said. "You don't get upset." Amid the high emotion of a call, Green said they have to get information for the deputy going into the situation.

Teachers unions looking to fall elections

One day after word of a possible teacher walkout hit the Capitol, Gov. John Bel Edwards appeared on the building’s steps to publicly urge House members to approve the school funding formula pushed by his administration.

Edwards joined members of the Louisiana Coalition of Public Schools who gathered on the Capitol steps to support his proposal, which was approved by the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education.

Their plan includes pay raises of \$1,000

for teachers and \$500 for school support employees and an additional \$39 million in funding for the school districts.

Lawmakers, including Senate Education Chairman Blade Morrish, R-Jennings, and Rep. Pat Smith, D-Baton Rouge, remain confident the House will approve the funding formula.

The Senate already advanced the state school board’s proposal in a 37 to 1 vote. House Republicans have proposed an alternative to Morrish’s plan, including a \$1,200 pay raise for teachers and \$600 pay raise for support employees.

But their measure, included in the budget bill authored by Appropriations Chair Cameron Henry, does not include the additional \$39 million in

discretionary funding.

If BESE and the Legislature cannot agree on a funding formula, then the 2018 formula will remain in place. Any raises or funding increases approved would be a one-time stipend.

“If we don’t move the funding formula all the way through the process and match it up with an appropriation,” Edwards said at the press conference, “you can call it what you want, but it will not be a pay raise.”

Leaders of the state’s teacher unions also remain confident the funding formula will be approved by the full House. But if not, “we’ll take it to the ballot box,” said Larry Carter, president of the Louisiana Federation of Teachers.

Pension Plans & ‘de-risking’

Corporations are transferring pension liabilities to third parties. Where does this leave retirees?

Maybe you just like the way things are going. You may not want the responsibility that goes with reinvesting a huge sum of money.

What is the case for taking a lump sum? One line of reasoning has to do with time. If you are retiring with serious health issues, for example, you may want to claim more of your pension dollars now rather than later.

Or, it may be a matter of timing. If you need to boost your retirement savings, a lump sum may give you an immediate opportunity to do so.

Maybe you would like to invest your pension money now, so it can potentially grow and compound for more years before being distributed. (As a reminder, pension payments are seldom adjusted for inflation.) Maybe your spouse gets significant pension income, or you are so affluent that pension income would be nice, but not necessary; if so, perhaps you want a lump-sum payout to help you pursue a financial goal. Maybe you think a pension income stream would put you in a higher tax bracket.2

If you take a lump sum, ideally, you take it in a way that minimizes your tax exposure. Suppose your employer just writes you a check for the amount of the lump sum (minus any amount withheld), and you direct that money into a taxable account. If you do that, you will owe income tax on the entire amount. Alternately, you could have the lump sum transferred into a tax-advantaged investment account, such as an IRA. That would give those invested assets the potential to grow, with income taxes deferred until withdrawals are made.2

Consult a financial professional about your options. If you sense you should take the lump sum, a professional may be able to help you manage the money in recognition of your financial objectives, your risk tolerance, and your estate and income taxes.

It enabled the St. Charles shelter to send 14 dogs for adoption in the middle of last month.

“From there, our relationship really blossomed, once transferring partners and receiving shelters learned our medical protocols and saw how we worked. We were invited again to participate in another flight,” said Allison Badgerow, Animal Control’s Kennel Officer.

This one went out a week later and carried 31 cats and six dogs to find new homes.

A separate agreement with Acadiana Animal Aid saw nine dogs transferred by ground to Tennessee.

It’s a major lift not just for the animals, but the shelter as well. Badgerow said a high number of pets surrendered to the

shelter in 2017 lengthened the average stay for dogs to more than 3 months and cats to more than 6 months. That prompted the shelter to reach out to both Acadiana Animal Aid and Wings of Rescue approximately a year ago.

“We wanted to find partnership with large flight abilities and a similar standard of care as we uphold,” Badgerow said, noting the Acadiana partnership came through a referral by Wings of Rescue. “It’s all about networking and finding shelters and programs with a shared vision.”

It’s a positive result for all, with the local shelter able to find new homes for, often, their most familiar tenants while clearing space for newcomers.

Badgerow said those animals that have been at the shelter for weeks or even months are quickly adopted through the program.

“We’re told when the animals arrive up north there are approved adopters in line just waiting to find their companion,” Badgerow said.

To that point, before the second flight had departed, St. Charles shelter reps

learned all of the pets on the first flight had, indeed, been adopted.

“Some of the receiving shelters have added adoption photos on their Facebook pages that we were able to share with our followers, but we expect more updates to come,” Badgerow said.

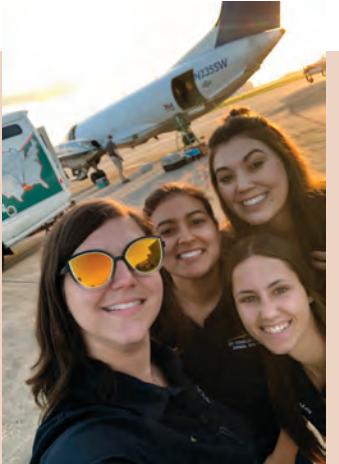
The shelter has also been able, through an assist from the St. Charles Parish Humane Society and United Way of St. Charles, to utilize a Jones Trailer to transport animals directly to partner shelters in Virginia Beach and Washington State.

New Homes

A ribbon cutting and groundbreaking ceremony will take place for Ed Reed Park in St. Rose today, starting at 6 p.m. The park will include a large 40X100 yard multipurpose turf field, two basketball courts, a playground, an open area for picnics and a walking trail. The park is being built on land purchased by Reed’s Eye of the Hurricane Foundation. The foundation has been working with St. Charles Parish officials to make the park a reality.

The park is being built near the streets of Turtle Creek Lane and Preston Hollow Road where Reed, a St. Rose native, grew up.

The athletic field’s turf is set to be installed in the coming weeks, then the construction of the basketball courts and children’s playground will follow.

Reed Foundation spokeswoman Courtney Aburn-Reisz said the target opening for the park will be in October, if everything stays on schedule.

“We’re really excited to finally have people on site for our park. (The ribbon cutting) is going to be a celebratory

announcement to the community,” she said. “We want people to know that this thing is coming and we’re so excited for everyone in that community to benefit from it.”

Reed has credited park athletics among the major influences in his life. He’s referred to himself as a “park baby” when reminiscing about his youth.

The thought is the park provides access to safe facilities, positive programs and mentors. To that end, Reed and the foundation hope to use sports as a means to direct children down a positive path.

It’s been a feature project of his foundation, which directs its efforts at providing opportunities for positive advancement for at-risk youth.

“It’s something he’s always said gave him that outlet to stay off the streets and out of trouble and the chance to interact with people in a positive, healthy environment,” Aburn-Reisz said. “And that’s what Ed Reed Park will be doing for generations to come.”

Land for the project began being cleared in late January.

For Reed and the foundation, they’re elated to add a landmark to a community he has long felt has needed this kind of addition. The park in St. Rose Reed spent his days growing up in was eliminated in order to build houses.

“All of a sudden, we’re right there on the cusp of seeing it open,” Aburn-Reisz said. “St. Rose is really the only town in that area without a public park ... to know this is something kids will forever be playing on is very special to Ed and very special to all of us.”

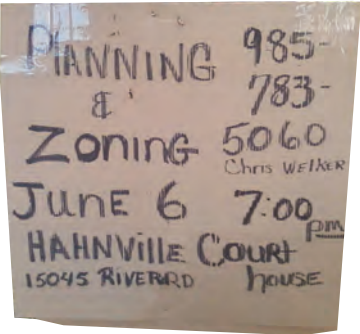

“It doesn’t fit the neighborhood,” Smith said. “It will bring our property value down, cause crime, drainage issues and congestion as you come off River Road and more. This is a single family residence and it has been that way for ump-teen years now.”

On Memorial Day, however, the situation apparently escalated to where Martin allegedly removed some of the residents’ signs advertising the Planning Commission meeting. Smith maintained Martin refused to return them.

The St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office was called to the scene and deputies advised residents to put the signs on the side of the road opposite Martin’s property.

Neither Bellock nor Martin have responded to the Herald-Guide’s request for comment.

A Vietnam veteran, Collins was a close friend to the late Clayton Fauchaux Sr., former St. Charles Parish councilman.

“He was such a good friend to my dad,” said Kelley Fauchaux, who fondly recalled Collins spending some holidays with their family. “I remember being at my dad’s services ... he put his head and his hand on his coffin and just cried like I never had seen a man cry before. It broke my heart. It’s how much my dad meant to him.”

Clayton Sr. became a caretaker for Collins, who suffered from severe PTSD following his war experience. Collins didn’t let that stop him from becoming a positive light for those around him—and a popular figure around the parish.

“He’s an innocent, pure man. He had no idea of hate, racism, material things, all of the things that divide us today as a country, he knew nothing about,” Fauchaux said.

Robbie Brown, meanwhile, befriended Collins in a different way. She was attending a class at the then-named First Presbyterian Church when called upon to reach out and help others in the community. For Brown, that brought Collins to mind.

“I’d spot him out twice a week, like everyone around here did, riding his bike,”

she said. “I wondered who he was, or if anyone paid attention to him. I started asking around if anyone knew him.”

Brown wanted to drive Collins to do his grocery shopping each week to keep him out the rain on his bike and to lessen the burden of bringing his purchases back home. She was able to find him and went on to do just that. The two struck up a friendship.

She said Collins was quick to open up to new people, and once he did, a wonderful personality would shine through.

“If you’d talk to him and just met him ... he asked me if I knew Jesus. He’ll do that after about 10 minutes, even if he didn’t know you. He was a really sweet person,” she said.

“He’s not a beggar, or someone who asks for much. But when you talk to him, you just want to help him. He’s that kind of person.”

She started to tear up.

“It bothers me when I lay down at night,” Brown said. “I try not to think about it. I’ll remember seeing him on the side of the road, waving at me. It’s very upsetting.”

Collins moved to St. Charles Parish in 1974, originally a native of West Virginia, where much of his family resides today.

St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne said Collins had suffered very serious head injuries and was put on a respirator.

Champagne said the State Police conducted the accident investigation at his office’s request and that the other driver involved was not injured and determined to be not at fault.

“We need to keep (the other driver) in our prayers as well,” Champagne said.

The St. Rose and Montz towers are considered too close in proximity to the Mississippi to be brought down safely at this time.

A tower in Des Allemands is still set for demolition this summer as planned, and could be brought down as soon as this month.

St. Charles Parish Waterworks Director Robert Brou said restrictions upon permits from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers related to the height of the river ultimately pushed the demolition of the St. Rose and Montz towers back. Those restrictions stem from concerns that the protection levee could be negatively affected. The Corps restricts work done within 1,500 feet of levees when the Mississippi is extraordinarily high.

The St. Rose tower sits approximately 300 feet away from the levee.

Brou said the hope is to resume the demolition timeline once the river subsides.

“We will attempt to time the notice to proceed so that the contractor can

commence work immediately after the river subsides to 11 feet at the Carrollton gauge,” Brou said.

Brou added that nothing with the operation should be affected by what he deemed a slight delay.

All three towers have been out of services for years, Brou said. Upgrades to the parish’s water system have yielded a reliance on pumps and have effectively made the three towers obsolete. They were initially built in the 1960s, elevated tanks with height sufficient to pressurize a water supply system for the distribution of potable water.

Leaving the towers standing without regular maintenance would create a safety hazard as well, as one could fall from decay. The St. Charles Parish Council approved \$150,000 to demolish the three towers.

Though notable landmarks, ultimately the parish is better off without the towers, Brou said last year. He said they had started causing water quality issues when in use and weren’t necessary anymore.

“The revenue we create goes right back into the center, making sure it’s maintained and up to speed,” she said. “It’s why we’ve been able to offer such a number of different events ... that and a lot of teamwork. What we’ve been able to do with it ... we’re constantly growing.”

The recognition has hit home for Coleman especially, a central part of the center’s planning process since the center was opened officially in 2013.

“I can recall when that building was first being talked about ... just to see that vision come to life, from where we started to right now, it’s really exciting. A lot of people had a key role in how far it’s come, and to see it recognized for everyone is a good feeling,” she said.

His mother, Charmaine Wallace, also is an HHS graduate. Wallace said she was among the first African-American classes to graduate from the school. She became an educator, but started working in mental health, another trait he said he received from his mother.

“I want to show people you can live your dreams no matter what,” he said. “I overcame poverty. I never gave up. I’ve been doing this 11 years and just getting my feet in the door now. I’m 31. I want the kids to know you can follow your dream. You can make your plan.”

As he approaches completion of his first movie, Wallace said he’s become even more passionate about filmmaking.

“I realized my talents,” he said. “I feel confident enough to make a million movies now. That’s it. That’s a wrap.”

Domestic violence calls can be hard when the victim calls for help but then doesn’t want to report it to a deputy.

“That’s a hard call because you’re getting them the help, but once they get there they change their mind,” Green said. “Sometimes, the officer will proceed if there’s enough proof to say something is there.”

One of her scariest calls came from a niece calling for help for her uncle who was found lying on the floor. The caller was panicked and finally named her uncle.

The call turned out to be from one of Green’s own family members.

“I knew,” said Green of receiving the call. “You always wonder, but it made me stronger.”

It also left her with a permanent resolve to treat every caller like a family member and with renewed determination to help people.

“I consider being a dispatcher a major part of my life,” she said. “I consider my coworkers family because I’m with them as much as I am with my family. I feel their pain. They feel my pain.”

Green said the public needs to know that helping people is their priority. She added. “I know that sometimes it doesn’t seem like we get there fast enough, but we’re responding as quickly as we can.”

A dispatcher for nearly eight months, Sara Price of Bayou Gauche said she’s impressed with the parish’s emergency response time.

“All of the dispatchers and the deputies take the calls seriously,” Price said. “This is a very serious business. Everybody is professional. I’ve never worked anywhere with such a team environment.

Everybody is always paying attention to what each is doing.”

The calls can vary from an alligator on the road to someone locking their keys in their car to neighbors being too loud, Price said. A woman reported a two-foot snake in her house.

One of her more traumatic calls was from an elderly couple who reported their dog being killed by another, bigger dog.

“It was their baby,” Price said. “She was walking the dog”

A recent call came from a driver reporting smoke at the RaceTrac in Boutte and more followed until it was determined an RV was on fire there, Price said. A deputy passing by pulled over and inquired as to how close the RV was to the gas pumps and then firefighters arrived to douse the blaze.

Dispatchers work 12-hour shifts, alternating one week with three days and then four days the next week.

“There are really intelligent, caring people working here who really care about our community,” Price said. “And we do our very best to get everybody help as fast as possible no matter what is going on. I think most of the people in our community get that, though. People are generally nice ... even in a crisis.”

With a degree in mass communications and public relations, the Luling resident is in a career change, one that fit her desire to stay in her community and give back. She’s still in training, and it’s coming together as a welcome challenge.

“We’re the first responders,” Price said. “The first person that takes that call is the first on the scene, really. You are getting information and giving information.”

Marceaux dominant again, spurs LSU onward

Former Destrehan ace emerging as LSU closes in on trip to College World Series

Landon Marceaux learned to deal with extended failure for the first time, likely, in his life as a pitcher early in his freshman season at LSU. Well, he's dealt with it — and now, he's just dealing.

The latest in a series of dominant efforts from Marceaux came Friday night as he earned the win in the Tigers' decisive win over Stony Brook in LSU's regional tournament opener.

Marceaux pitched five scoreless innings and struck out three while allowing seven hits in his first-ever regional start. In doing so, he helped avenge an old sore spot for the Tigers and their fans—LSU's loss to Stony Brook that led to elimination from the 2012 NCAA Super Regional.

Now, he's helped his team reach the Super Regional once again, after the Tigers emerged from the regional bracket unbeaten. LSU (40-24) will host Florida State (39-21) in a best of three Super Regional series, with the winner to advance to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. Game One is Saturday at 2 p.m. and will be broadcast on ESPN.

The true freshman right-hander truly came into his own down the stretch of the regular season. He posted an ERA of 1.45 over his past three starts after a rocky first month that saw him combat shoulder soreness.

After a strong debut this season against Army, he allowed five and six earned runs, respectively, in each of his next two appearances, including a one inning outing against Texas.

But he turned things around from there, allowing three earned runs or less in each of his final five games before the regional, including four outings with two or less runs allowed.

The regional victory moved him to 5-2 this season. He's struck out 41 batters in 58 innings this season so far.

The highly touted recruit was drafted to the MLB out of high school, but chose to forgo the pros for the time being in favor of LSU. He was selected as the SEC Co-Freshman of the Week for a strong effort last month.

He concluded a stellar career at Destrehan with a senior season befitting of it. The right-hander was named District 7-5A Pitcher of the Year after a dominating senior campaign. He was so advanced and accomplished early in his DHS tenure that he earned an offer from LSU before his sophomore season.

Marceaux committed to the Tigers in 2015 and at the time was rated one of the 40 top sophomore baseball players in America by PerfectGame.org and the best in Louisiana.

Soccer club’s state crown a sign of sport’s rising profile in area

The game of soccer is growing in St. Charles Parish, and the results are following on the field — at a high level, at that.

For the first time since its club program was established six years ago, St. Charles Parish captured a state championship in the Louisiana Competitive Soccer League, its 14U girls team going unbeaten in regular season play and 4-1 in Louisiana’s President’s Cup state tournament en route to the crown. In the process, it qualified to compete in the 2019 Youth Soccer Southern President’s Cup, the organization’s regional championship tournament that will take place June 11-16 in Round Rock, Texas. Success there could propel them to

compete for a national crown in July. The team, named St. Charles Soccer Dortmund — each of the league’s nine teams are named for established professional powers in the sport — overcame challenges from around the state, including second place Mandeville and third place Calcasieu. It bested the Louisiana Fire in the finals by a score of 3-0.

Last season, Dortmund earned its way to the state semifinals. This year it knocked down the door.

“It’s kind of awesome to know we can actually do it,” said Kayla Martin, the team’s leading scorer. “A lot of people expected us to win ... it was a new feeling. And then we went out and did it.”

Coach Mert Deger, who helped guide Destrehan to a state quarterfinal appearance and district championship, said the core of this group has been together since the program’s inception.

“They were ready to compete at a high level. We won a couple of tournaments, and were always in the top 2 ... the biggest thing is how you perform at the end, though. We got to the finals and the girls did a great job to bring it home,” Deger said.

He said the semifinal run last year gave his players a taste of success that only helped spur them on this year.

“We lost in overtime last year, so it was that close ... this year, everyone really wanted to win and made it happen,” he said.

The midseason addition of Faith LeVeck also helped. Her family moved to the area recently from Texas, and her offensive game proved a strong complimentary lead along with Martin.

“This team really connects with one another more than a lot of others ... we have a good bond,” LeVeck said.

The regional presents an exciting opportunity for her to play close to her one-time home, as Round Rock is about an hour outside of where she lived prior.

“It’s pretty exciting. I have friends out there and hopefully I’ll have a chance to see some of them out there,” she said.

Deger said the growing success of the program only means good things for the sport as a whole in the parish. The prep landscape dictates that the teams

with several club or “year-round” players boast more experience and, ultimately, more success. St. Charles Parish is seeing more and more of those athletes, and coupled with this past school year’s debut of the public school systems middle school soccer program, the chances to garner that kind of experience are

multiplying. “It’s huge. From this team, you have about 16 kids and it’s split ... eight will be at Hahnville, eight at Destrehan, or close to that. It gives a huge boost with players used to playing at a high level,” Deger said. “I think this group will be more than ready.”

Hahnville gymnast headed to LSU

10 time state champ changes course from Alabama, will stay close to home

Fresh off her 10th state championship win, the plan was for Hahnville alumna Kamryn Ryan to take her gymnastics talents to Alabama.

Plans have changed. The trailblazer for gymnastics at the high school level in St. Charles Parish has decommitted from the Crimson Tide in favor of staying closer to home— Ryan is instead headed to LSU. “Once a Tiger, always a Tiger,” Ryan said.

The newly graduated Hahnville Tiger will indeed continue to wear stripes, so to speak, at the collegiate level.

She said it wasn’t a decision that came easy, but ultimately the chance to stay close to home while continuing her competitive career was one she couldn’t say no to.

When the opportunity presented itself to still join the team in Baton Rouge, she made the call to change.

“It was definitely a later call than I expected,” Ryan said. “Staying close to home was a big factor at play. Alabama has a phenomenal team, program, facility, coaching staff, education ... it wasn’t a slight toward them at all. Both are top notch schools.”

And rivals, of course. “It just so happens, yeah,” Ryan said. “You never expect to be in that position, but I was. It was a tough decision, but this is what I felt like was right for me. And I’m really excited about it.”

Ryan won multiple individual state championships in each of her four years competing at Hahnville — the first four years the program has existed, in fact. The program’s establishment is a point of pride for her.

“It’s remarkable what the parish did and what our school did,” Ryan said. “Really stepped up to the plate. Gymnastics has never been a big thing out here, and even now everyone

might not realize what we’re doing, that we have a team, since they’re just three of us. But we got the ball rolling.”

Ryan was competing at this year’s state meet with an injured foot, and with a national competition to follow days later, there was a question of whether it was worth the risk of worsening the injury. Ryan believed it was, and indeed it worked out that way. She emerged with championships in the balance beam and vault events.

“That I’ve been able to win state championships for my school ... it’s really been an amazing experience,” she said. “I wanted to finish what I started. Once I got through the more intense stuff with my foot, it was a big relief.”

She’s joining an LSU program that has won three conference championships in a row and produced two individual national champions in different events last season: Sarah Finnegan and Kennedy Edney, in the uneven bars and vault, respectively.

Ryan hopes to one day add to those honors, just as she did as another kind of purple and gold Tiger before.

“Having my parents at a basketball game and seeing my banner up at the (HHS) gym ... that thing will never move,” Ryan said. “If my kids ever go there, I can show them, hey, look what I did. It makes me feel like I left my mark.”

Two St. Charles Parish teachers were named among 39 winners in the Shell Science Lab Regional Challenge Competition.

Kristin Surmik of Ethel Schoeffner Elementary School won on the elementary level and Lauren Waguespack of Harry Hurst Middle School, on the middle school level.

Surmik called the recognition exciting. "It's something that can have extra resources to add to our teaching," she said. "It's basically going to be a supplement for what we already have, but the more the better."

Surmik and Waguespack are going to the S.T.E.M. Forum, which is being held in San Francisco from July 24 - 26.

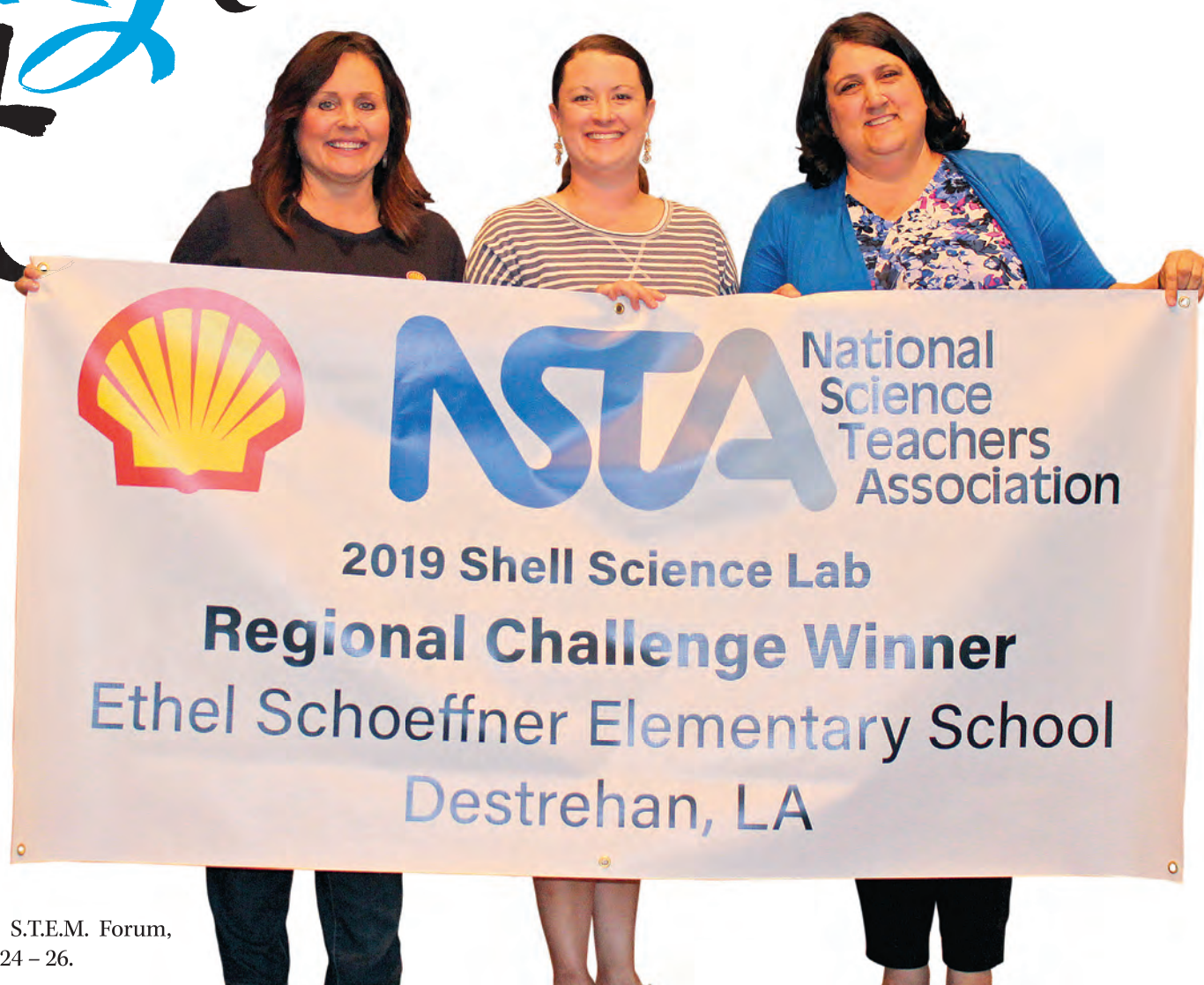
For Waguespack, this is her second win.

"The conference provides new techniques, engaging students in science," she said. "It just provides a wealth of opportunity to explore what's out there and help incorporate technology into science education, new techniques in engaging students in S.T.E.M. education and, most importantly because I teach in a regular science classroom, it's a way to incorporate S.T.E.M. into education and the classroom."

She added, "A lot of jobs our students will walk into in the future will be S.T.E.M. related jobs. We're preparing students for jobs we haven't even thought of that we will need in the workforce. We're trying to prepare them to think about science, math and technology ... the sky is the limit."

Sponsored by Shell Oil Co. and administered by the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA), the competition is aimed at encouraging K-12 science teachers, who have found innovative ways to deliver quality lab experiences with limited school and laboratory resources, to share their approaches for a chance to win a school science lab makeover support package.

Surmik's philosophy of teaching science is to use hands-on learning experiences

and literature to promote deeper thinking and questioning, which can lead to a stronger understanding of science.

“If students act as scientists and perform experiments to answer questions, they become critical thinkers and problem solvers and learn the importance and benefits of collaborative work,” she said.

Surmik’s school does not currently have a science lab - all science teachers conduct lessons and experiments in their classrooms.

This grant would allow the school to convert a portion of the computer lab into a science lab, which would provide teachers a space to prepare for experiments ahead of time rather than spending class time setting up

and materials such as microscopes, triple beam balances, thermometers, and other material to help engage students. Teachers would like to bring some aspects of the lab into the digital age, so that students can experience aspects of real-world science. Also, an upgrade would provide each grade level with more available resources that can enhance the science lessons.

The Shell Science Lab Regional Challenge offers prize packages for one elementary (\$10,000), one middle (\$10,000) and one high school (\$15,000) near Shell assets. Winning schools near Shell assets receive science lab materials to improve science education, and science teachers receive professional development to improve their content knowledge and

upgrade support is needed, and describe their approach to science education instruction utilizing their school’s current lab facilities. A panel of science educators then reviewed and selected the top entries.

“These science teachers are model educators for teachers across the country,” said Dr. David Evans, NSTA Executive Director. “We are thrilled to honor all of them for their creativity, resourcefulness, and commitment to their students and quality science teaching.”

The prize package

and tearing down experiments multiple times a day. Another advantage of having a science lab would be a larger workspace for group experiments. A science lab would also offer a community storage space for all of the supplies used in various experiments.

Waguespack said hands-on activities that incorporate everyday phenomena help students connect and discover scientific concepts. Students learn best when they are fully engaged in an investigation and when they are able to collaborate with their peers.

“Students themselves are a powerful tool in helping each other construct scientific concepts on their own,” she said.

As a teacher, Waguespack believes it is her job to expose student misconceptions and provide opportunities for students to correct their thinking, while helping students become more analytical thinkers. Waguespack’s current lab is shared between sixth, seventh, and eighth grade. It is equipped with basic lab equipment

instructional practices to inspire more students to pursue S.T.E.M. careers.

Rochelle Touchard, external relations manager of Shell Louisiana/Alabama Manufacturing, said, in Shell’s ongoing efforts to provide more robust and innovative science education and lab experiences in schools near their assets, the company partnered with the NTSA to award science lab curriculum, materials and professional development to schools and science teachers that best demonstrated their ability to improve science achievement for students.

“At Shell, we believe that learning and innovation go hand in hand,” Touchard said. “By providing further resources, this challenge helps support innovation as well as foster student excitement about science at an early age.”

How to prevent pediatric sports injuries

Young athletes are becoming focused on single sports at a younger age and are likely to play their sport year-round. More time playing one sport can lead to an increase in injury risk. It may also lead to more overuse issues in the shoulder, elbow, knee and hip.

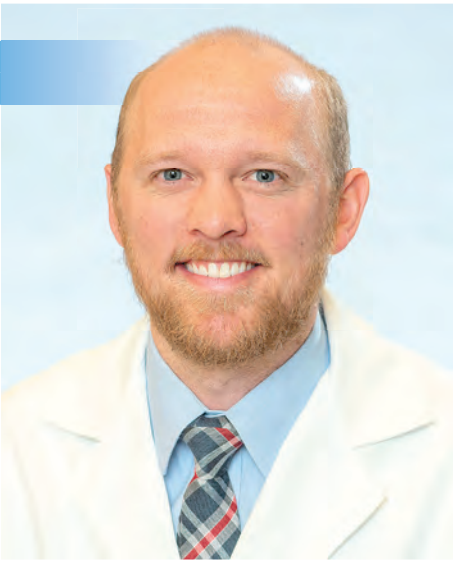
Here are some steps that can help recognize and prevent injuries before they become serious.

Preseason Physical

Pre-participation physicals are becoming more standard and required by most states. They can address problems early on before the season starts and are also a good opportunity for the athlete and parents to meet and have questions answered by a doctor.

Warm-up and Stretching

Properly warming up before a practice or game is an important prevention technique that should become routine for all athletes. Proper warm-up consisting of light cardiovascular exercises and dynamic stretching for at least 15 minutes can be helpful in the prevention of injuries.



Encourage Cross-Training

Changing sports from season to season has been shown to be beneficial in athletic development. This helps to develop other muscle groups and athletic skills that differ amongst sports. This can also help to decrease overuse injuries caused by repetitive activities (i.e. pitching a baseball) that require activating the same muscle groups necessary for the specific sport motion.

Ask Your Children About Pain

Your child needs to know that it is okay to tell you when they are hurt or want to come out of a game if they are experiencing pain. Pushing through

pain can lead to more problems if not addressed.

Rest and Sleep

A lack of sleep and muscle fatigue can cause your child to be more prone to injury. Most overuse injuries could be prevented by adequate rest between activities and preferably an off season where the athlete can rest and work on further strength and conditioning outside the pressures of coaches and teammates.

Diet and Water

A well-balanced diet can help obtain and maintain a proper weight for sports as well as general health, such as preventing hypertension and diabetes. Hydration during and after sport activities is vital in preventing heat-related sports illnesses, such as heat exhaustion.

Emphasize Proper Technique and Guidelines

Every sport has technical components that can help prevent injuries. For example, baseball players should be instructed in proper throwing mechanics and follow pitching guidelines and restrictions. This can be achieved through proper coaching and formal

performance training.

If your child experiences a persistent complaint from playing sports, make sure to see a sports medicine trained physician.
