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Luling inspector recovers from traumatic accident



Outpouring of support from community provides lift to family

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Blake Muller's recovery is a day by day process, something Priscilla Thibodeaux-Horn has had to learn to accept — difficult as it may be.

"It's a marathon, not a sprint," said the mother from Luling. "The doctors have told me that from day one, and I'm starting to see it ... as a mother, you just want it to be all good, good, good, but it's a process."

Muller, also of Luling and who works in St. Charles Parish as an environmental inspector, suffered significant injuries when he was involved in an accident while traveling with fellow motorcyclists in Oklahoma.

"He missed a curve ... it was nobody's fault, just an unfamiliar landscape," Horn said.

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Councilman escorted from meeting by deputies

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“You’re all a joke,” Councilman Paul Hogan shouted as he was escorted out of Monday’s council meeting by St. Charles Parish deputies.

Hogan’s expulsion followed an ongoing argument with Council Chair Julia Fisher-Perrier over how council members should be recognized to speak or address the chair at meetings. He said he has used the electronic system to be recognized since he was first elected to District 4 nine years ago. But during a February meeting, Councilman Dick Gibbs was called on first because he said “Madame Chair” and was recognized while Hogan argued he should have been first to comment because he made the first request for speaking time electronically.

Since, Hogan has persistently sought clarification of Council Rule 14, which states “no member may speak until he has addressed the chair by saying ‘Mr. (or Madame) chairman,’ and has been recognized by the chair.”

At Monday’s meeting, Hogan said, “Madame Chair,” in an attempt to discuss the clarification.

Under parliamentary

procedure, a point of order can be raised if a member believes the rules of the meeting aren’t being properly followed. The chair then rules on the validity of the claim.

“I’m calling a point of order to get some clarification on how members are to be recognized in light of these two opinions,” Hogan said.

Fisher-Perrier responded the matter had already been addressed by the council and told him he was out of order.

Destrehan boy deals with life-changing illness

Family seeking diabetic alert dog to combat Type 1 dangers

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At the age of 6, Luke Giammolva’s life changed unexpectedly, and permanently at that.

The Destrehan boy was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes in July of 2018. His type is the much rarer and usually more serious form of the illness, which causes the body to create little or no insulin. Learning to manage the illness has been an often trying experience for Luke and his parents over the past year.

It also, at times, can be a frightening one.

“To just look at Luke, people think he’s healthy,” said his mother, Rachel Giammolva.

“But,” she continued, “we keep him alive every day.”

The Giammolvas have no family history of diabetes, making his diagnosis a shock, and the ensuing management that comes with it a new adventure.

That’s so even for Rachel, who is a nurse.

“I don’t think many people are fully aware of how bad (Type 1 diabetes) is,” Rachel said. “Even as a nurse, I didn’t realize how bad it was until experiencing it with my son. It’s been life-changing for us.”

Luke receives up to five shots a

day of insulin and has a continuous monitor for his blood sugar. There is no cure for the illness, meaning he’ll continue to have to deal with these things in some form going forward.

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Animal rescuers save baby birds, give them life

The alert was issued on Facebook with a photo posted by the Good Samaritan who found two chicks that apparently fell out of their nest in Bayou Gauche.

Many people commented on how to help, but a woman picked them up and brought them to Kasia Perkowska, of Kasia's Ark Bird Rescue in Ponchatoula, who soon identified them as starlings and said they're now doing really well. Her latest photos of them eating, learning how to fly and soon ready to return to the wild are very different than the original one of them barely with feathers laying on a towel like little rag dolls.

"They're just learning to fly," Perkowska said. Typically, she raises birds until they learn to eat on their own and fly, and then she releases them. These birds are already eager to fly, but they've likely got another six weeks of growing up that includes time spent in an outdoor aviary where they'll learn to catch bugs and then, on a morning when it's not raining, she'll open the door.

They are among seven starlings Perkowska helped this week, and they come from throughout the area, some as far as three hours away. While she picks up rescues, friends and residents also bring them to her.

Perkowska, like Verna Cambre of Norco, are wildlife rescuers.

Both of them rescue animals in St Charles Parish at their own expense.

Cambre, known as the "cat lady" for rescuing felines, also has rescued birds for years. She does it more now since she retired after 35 years as a bus driver with St. Charles Parish Public Schools.

"Everybody brings me everything," she said. "It's a hard thing to do, and you can barely find people who rescue animals."

The cats go to the parish's animal shelter to be neutered and then she releases them to the wild, too.

"I've been saving baby birds for years," said Cambre, who is bringing a bird to Kasia's Ark, too.

In addition to cats, her menagerie of rescues has included birds, squirrels and even a baby possum. She's nursing a sparrow that considers Cambre her mother.

"It kind of flies," she said. "It still opens its mouth for me to feed it. It jumps on my shoulder I put him on the counter on a piece of paper. I guess he thinks I'm his momma. He just won't eat on his own."

But she has a soft spot for squirrels.

Cambre is still grieving the loss of Chippy, a squirrel rescue she kept for nearly 10 year until it died last year. She went everywhere with Cambre, including camping and visiting her niece in Florida.

"Everybody knew Chippy," she lamented over the loss of her much loved pet. "She died on June 14, 2018."

For Kasia's Ark, the local rescues have included a baby heron, several Blue Jays, a couple of chicks after Easter, and several sparrows, starlings and grackles from this parish alone.

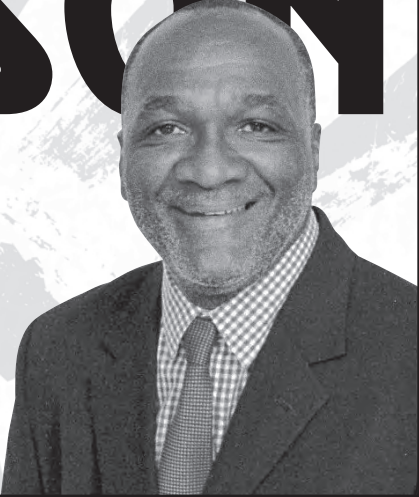
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‘Weird’ lizards reported in Boutte

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When the Trauths spotted “weird” lizards sunning themselves on their stepping stones in their front yard in Boutte, it raised a few questions.

“My husband (Buddy) and I were driving into the driveway one day when he slammed on the brakes and said, ‘Did you see that?! It was as big as a dragon,’” said Abby Trauth. “Since that day, we’ve been amazed at how big these lizards are. They’re much bigger than our usual green lizards and wayyyy faster.”

Actually, the biggest one they’ve seen is 6-1/2 to 7 inches long.

Well, they aren’t big as dragons (they don’t exist), but if there was such a thing they might look like larger versions of these rugged lizards or anoles.

“I’ve grown up in St Charles Parish and this is the first year that I’ve seen such an exotic looking animal (aside from an alligator) in my yard,” Trauth added.

That’s because they’re the latest invasive species reported in St. Charles Parish. Earlier, residents began reporting the bright pink eggs from apple snails in area waterways.

Barry Guillot, Harry Hurst Middle Wetland Watchers teacher, said the

lizards are likely from Cuba or Haiti. This invasive species apparently came into the U.S. from plant nurseries more than 15 years ago. Guillot said he believes the brown anoles were here before Hurricane Katrina.

“There’s no environmental damage unless eating bugs and mosquitoes is bad,” Guillot said. “They look a lot like the green anoles except during breeding season when they get the crest. Green anoles also get the crest during breeding season. They are harmless to people and pets.”

It’s a matter of brown versus green lizards.



Brown lizards or anoles are showing up in area yards and are likely an invasive species from Cuba and Haiti.

These brown lizards were reportedly first seen in Florida, but it wasn’t until 1988 when it started being seen in larger numbers, Guillot said. Green lizards are indigenous to Louisiana, but the brown ones are apparently gaining in number because they can tolerate more heat in a number of hotter-than-normal summers.

In Boutte, Trauth’s neighbor told her he’d noticed the brown lizards for at least a year, but that it appeared the brown and green lizards were co-existing.

The scientists noticed them, too.

The green lizards are evolving with bigger, stickier toes to evade the more aggressive Cuban invaders. They compete for food and will eat one another’s young, but the green lizards developed the ability to climb higher in just the last 15 years.

But Trauth isn’t concerned, adding, “They’re probably only good for mosquito killing, which is great.”



Will brown replace green?

- » Anoles or brown lizards from Cuba and Haiti were reportedly first seen in Florida in 1887. By 1988, they are reported in larger numbers in the U.S.
- » Green lizards are forced to evolve to evade these more aggressive brown lizards. They are documented developing larger, stickier toe pads to live in higher parts of trees.
- » The brown lizards look tougher like they have body armor and are bigger. They bear impressive patterns for camouflage.

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Deputy injured in alligator attack

An approximately five-foot long alligator attacked and bit a St. Charles Parish deputy on Monday, as officers were attempting to help capture it after it wandered into the backyard of a Luling residence.

The officer, who was not identified by the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office, suffered deep lacerations and punctures to his right arm. He was treated at University Medical Center and subsequently released, and is expected to make a full recovery, according to Sheriff’s Office spokesman Cpl. James Grimaldi.

Officers on the scene were assisting

a St. Charles Nuisance Animal Officer after the alligator wandered into the rear yard of a home on the 100 block of Evergreen Court. After using an animal catch pole to hold the alligator, a deputy attempted to tape the alligator so it could be safely relocated to the wild. As the deputy attempted to secure the alligator, the alligator pulled free from the deputy and bit him on his right arm.

A second deputy was able to hold the alligator preventing it from causing further injuries, as the alligator’s mouth was pried open to release the injured deputy’s arm.

Who put the June in June Lockhart?

On several occasions over the years I’ve interviewed June Lockhart – the TV matriarch in shows such as “Lassie” and “Lost in Space” – who turns 94 this year on June 25. Obviously, her parents christened her, but was it simply a matter of being named after the month of her birth? Well, sort of, was her answer – there’s more to the story. The month played a reoccurring role in the early lives of her parents Gene and Kathleen Lockhart, who were also actors. Thomas Edison was involved, too! “Edison had a cross-country train tour every year to showcase his latest inventions,” June explained from her Santa

Monica home during one of our interviews. “(He) knew how to promote his new inventions by taking his product to the dealers.” As his train traveled across the country, the inventor would also entertain the dealers in large cities by presenting his own theatrical productions. “My father was in one of the plays in 1922 and again the following year when my mother was hired in June,” said Lockhart. “Edison introduced my parents to each other in his office in West Orange, NJ, before rehearsals got underway.” That year, Edison and his troupe traveled from New York to Chicago and St. Louis then worked their way across the southern half of the United States, and finally up the Pacific coast to Banff,

Canada, where the tour ended. That’s when, says Lockhart, “daddy made his move!” The couple married the next year (1924) in Chicago – in June. “I was born the following year, also in June,” said Lockhart. “They were expecting a boy who was to be named Gene Jr., so my being a girl was quite a surprise. “When you look at what they’re spending all their days on right now, focusing on impeaching the president even though there’s no evidence to impeach. There was no collusion, but they don’t care,” Scalise said. “They’re still going down that rat hole instead of focusing on real problems like securing the border.” Scalise also noted that he and fellow Republicans hope to see more investigations into intelligence agencies and what he views as political misuses of authority within the federal government. “There’s going to be some investigation looking into the abuses of power within some of our intelligence agencies, and I feel it’s very important to do that because they’ve got to root out the bad apples to restore the full integrity of the FBI,” he said.

The bike fell on top of him, causing the most serious of his injuries, including severed and fractured vertebrae, broken ribs and a severe concussion.

Horn traveled to Fayetteville, Ark. to be with her son, who underwent treatment at Washington Regional Hospital where he required intensive care.

“They saved his life,” Horn said. “When he arrived, he wasn’t expected to make it.”

He’s undergone back surgery to repair his spine, and has had screws placed into his back to stabilize him. He’s had movement in his legs and suffered no sever to his spinal cord, positive for his outlook. Also, though he did suffer a severe concussion and the trauma that comes with that, he did not endure a coma or have injury necessitating brain surgery.

She called Muller a fighter who is staying positive, though she admits some days, of course, are better than others.

“Some days he isn’t as engaged, some days he is. It’s to be expected after the concussion,” Horn said. “Every day we see progress, though. Sometimes it may seem minute, probably, to some people, but they’re all very significant steps in the process.”

Their stay would last approximately a month before he was transported back to Touro Infirmary Hospital in New Orleans. While in Fayetteville, Horn said the people there earned a place in her heart forever.

“The random strangers who opened their homes to us ... our friends, our family. (Washington Hospital) was just amazing. Fayetteville, everyone ... those people are amazing,” she said.

Muller has also touched the lives of others. Donations to a GoFundMe page (titled “Help Blake with medical expenses”), a Venmo account and another account at First National Bank USA in Boutte (donations can be made at the bank by those requesting funds be directed to the Blake Muller account) have shown strong support for Muller, who also

worked as a DJ on weekends. Those proceeds are going toward his medical expenses, including his transport home. His weekend co-workers also started a collection for his wife, who has taken on the responsibility of earning income as Muller recuperates.

“His wife has been working so much to ensure they don’t lose their home ... it’s been hard on her,” Horn said.

While it’s hard, Horn believes her son is still alive due to nothing short of a miracle. A woman of deep faith, she said trying to maintain that connection between her children and their faith has always been a priority for her.

To that end, a small gesture goes a long way in this trying time for the family. She recounted how, before the accident, she had given her son a magnet with The Divine Mercy imagery and prayer to put on the refrigerator. After his accident, she learned he had car-



ried the magnet — and the prayer — along with him in his saddle bag.

“There’s no doubt in my mind ... it was a miracle in itself that he had it with him. Ever since the day of the accident, that picture of Divine Mercy has been popping up over and over again in my mind,” she said.

Horn continued that theme of faith when speaking of her belief that Muller will make a full recovery – “by the grace of God, he’ll return soon,” she said.

But for a mother, the knowledge of a child in pain is a heavy burden to bear in itself. Others know it. That’s why Horn, a longtime employee of the St. Charles school system who retired last year after more than 33 years, recently received visitors of her own — and hands full of cards offering support — from her former co-workers at the School Board office.

“Oh my gosh, the outpouring of concern ... they’re my family. They still continue to be my family,” Horn said tearfully. “I’m so forever grateful to this community. I’m so touched by it all. I wish I could thank everyone.”

This is the third channel or production company that’s contacted her about featuring her daughter’s case. The Des Allemands mother said she’s been contacted by BBC America and ID Channel, both also researching a possible show about Nichols. Earlier, an episode of A&E’s docudrama “The First 48” did feature her case.

“She was in the prime of her life,” Dufrene said. “She had a son to raise that she loved dearly and it’s just not fair that somebody has to be taken in such a violent way ... for no reason. We never found out why she had to die that way.”

The 31-year-old Nichols, a native of Des Allemands, was found beaten and shot to death in the trunk of her car in east New Orleans. The car was also set on fire.

Dufrene received the news on Father’s Day in 2015.

Nichols had been celebrating her return from a job in Texas a day earlier and was last seen by friends leaving a nightclub on Downman Road around 4 a.m. that night after she apparently met a man named Thayon Samsom and got his phone number, according to court records.

Phone records show she called him twice and then called 911 around 4:45 a.m. She told the dispatcher an irate man she’d met that night was standing outside her car aiming a gun at her. The dispatcher’s notes from the call say she could hear a man telling Nichols to open her mouth so he could put a gun in it. This same dispatcher resigned for failing to give this information to police, leaving Dufrene wondering if this would have saved her daughter’s life.

Dufrene said she also hopes the show sends an important message about safety.

“Maybe some of these young people need to realize they need to stick together when they go out,” she said. “I think they think they’re invincible at that age ... they trust too many people and there are predators out there, and they come in all forms.”

Samson was arrested soon after the murder, but Dufrene called the trial unbearable.

“We had to go through that trial and it was horrific,” she said.

With all evidence presented, Dufrene has come to believe that Troy Varnado Jr., 30, may have been her daughter’s killer and Samsom was the accomplice. Varnado was arrested after Samson in connection with the case.

“That’s the way it appeared to some of us,” Dufrene said of Varnado. “It all changed to me. We were willing to give him a bargain, but he didn’t even come forward for one and he was sure he would get off.”

Samsom, who pleaded guilty to manslaughter, second-degree kidnapping, obstruction of justice and solicitation for murder in September of last year, took a plea deal of 40 years in prison. Varnado was found guilty of second-degree murder, second-degree kidnapping and obstruction of justice in Nichols’ death.

Instead of expressing remorse over the murder of her daughter as Dufrene anticipated, she said Varnado told the judge he felt sympathy for Nichols’ family, but hoped the police found who really killed her.

As Dufrene contemplates her daughter being featured in a crime show, she reflects on the irony.

“You see these shows on TV and think it’ll never happen to you,” she said. “You watch Dateline and 20/20. Some of them are crazy, but that doesn’t happen to people you know or a family member. But it can happen.”

The Lindsay Nichols case timeline

- » June 21, 2015: On Father’s day, Jolene Dufrene learns her daughter, Lindsay Nichols, was murdered in New Orleans. She left a son, who is being raised by Nichols’ parents in Des Allemands.
- » Thayon “Bonafyde” Samson, a barber and exotic dancer from New Orleans East, was the only suspect initially charged with the crime. He goes on trial on June 12, 2017.
- » May of 2017: Troy “Ville” Varnado Jr. is arrested and charged with second-degree murder, aggravated kidnapping and obstruction of justice in the case.
- » September of 2018: Thayon Samson of New Orleans pleads guilty to manslaughter and guilty as charged to second-degree kidnapping, obstruction of justice and solicitation for murder in connection with the killing of 31-year-old Lindsay Nichols. Varnado is found guilty of second-degree murder, second-degree kidnapping and obstruction of justice.

“We have the best catfish in the universe,” she said. “We have great entertainment, games, rides and crafters.”

The festival will be Friday 5 to 11 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m. to 11 p.m., and Sunday 10:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. on the grounds of St. Gertrude Catholic Church, 17324 Hwy. 631, Des Allemands.

The festival’s granny queen will be crowned on Friday. On Sunday at 3 p.m., the winners of the Blessing of the Fleet will be announced.

For the first time, festivalgoers can buy tickets for 50-50, which means a winner can get half of ticket sales from that day, Candies said. A winner will be named each day.

There will be games for children and adults, including adult poker using darts to make a poker hand to win cash prizes, a country store and a plant booth.

Admission is free. This year’s entertainment will have new entertainment including The Elvis Experiment, Conye Twitty and Costafunk.

Rides bands are \$25 a day or all weekend for \$55.

Festival food items also will include catfish platters, catfish po-boys, catfish boulettes, seafood gumbo, jambalaya, as well as hamburgers, French fries, hot dogs, snowballs, soft drinks and homemade sweets. New additions to the menu include chicken tenders and corndogs.

Cold beer and wine-a-ritas also will be on sale.

Fair grounds have been upgraded with sidewalks, which makes it handicap accessible. It also features an air conditioned eating area.

Hogan instead presented an opinion he obtained from a parliamentarian, Alison Wallis of Gretna, that he said contradicted parish attorney Robert Raymond’s interpretation of Rule 14 and motioned it be suspended temporarily in favor of recognizing council members electronically, as well as requiring Raymond to meet with the parliamentarian.

The motion failed for lack of a second, but the argument escalated with Fisher-Perrier, who warned Hogan that she’d have him removed from the meeting if he persisted.

When she told him a fourth time that he was out of order, she then announced, “Please remove Mr. Hogan from the chambers.”

Deputies approached Hogan, but he first refused to leave the meeting.

“It is unlawful for me to leave,” he said. “I’m elected by the people of this parish.”

Fisher-Perrier called a five-minute recess and Hogan was escorted by deputies out of the meeting.

On his way out of the chambers, he shouted, “You’re all a joke.” Hogan remained in the hallway with deputies outside the council chambers during the rest of the meeting.

But leading up to his removal, Fisher-Perrier questioned the parliamentarian opinion, saying Wallis had not been adequately informed about the electronic system. She further criticized Hogan for using \$350 in taxpayer money to pay for the opinion.

“The way that you went about requesting this opinion, in my opinion, is not parallel to how we got the opinion from our legal department,” she told Hogan. “You handled this in a way that was closed off. You didn’t give the parliamentarian any context as to exactly what we’re looking at or for. I think there are some pieces missing to make this opinion truly good and official.”

Raymond suggested a temporary fix by using the electronic system to recognize council members to speak or address the chair.

“I think that the root of the issue was whether you are to review or recognize someone who speaks orally or someone who presses the button as has been the case since 1991 or 1992,” he said. “My opinion was continue to do what we’ve been doing the last 30 years and Rule 14 may not be parallel with that.”

Fisher-Perrier asked if a temporary measure would allow time for Raymond to get a more thorough opinion and he agreed.

Hogan then motioned to suspend Rule 14, but no other council member would second the move so it could be considered.

This is the second time since February that Hogan has been escorted from a council meeting by deputies.

“I also picked up a young peacock from Norco from a lady that called me and told me she found a bird with bunny ears,” said Perkowska, who thought she was describing an owl. “Couldn’t figure it out, then I get there

and it was a peacock.”

Perkowska’s favorite pet is called Malutka (Polish meaning little) and is the reason she got into rescuing animals. Nearly 15 years ago, she found the “naked baby

bird” in the backyard of her then new home. She intended to release it, but later learned these birds imprint on a human if handled a certain way and kept it as a beloved pet.

The bird mimics sounds and when younger would say “Kiss kiss,” “Give me that” and called her son by his name, Nicholas.

Perkowska said she loves these birds, despite them typically being disliked as an invader species. But she said they’re much misunderstood, adding, “They’re like toddlers. They’re very inquisitive.”

“I was devastated,” Rachel said of his diagnosis. “I knew it meant a stark change for us ... everything is just different. We’ve had to adapt to a new plan. We just keep doing what we have to do. But we’ve said numerous times to one another, ‘why couldn’t it have been one of us and not him?’”

The most difficult aspect of it is Luke lacks symptoms when certain things are wrong – with Type 1 diabetes, high and low blood sugar levels are dangerous, the low side moreso. But without an alert from his monitor, he may never know, much less his parents, that he’s in any danger. Rachel said the monitor is a necessity and very helpful, but not infallible.

“It’s not 100 percent,” she said. “It’s a great tool, but it can be off sometimes by up to 100 points.”

There was indeed a point where his levels fell in the middle of the night—the monitor, in this case, sounded the alarm, alerted his mother and father and they were able to treat him.

Were the monitor to fail, however, a worst case scenario could prove fatal. If

Luke’s blood sugar is low he requires fast acting carbohydrates to bring his sugar up quickly, if he is high, he needs insulin along with water to flush ketones out of his blood to prevent his blood from becoming acidotic and possibly moving towards Diabetic Ketoacidosis.

It’s led the family to explore additional methods of caring for Luke that can bridge the gap as close to that 100 percent mark as possible. One unique, but potentially very effective means of doing so, would be by securing a specialized service dog for Luke, something the Giammolvas have been working toward.

Specifically, they’d like to bring a diabetic alert dog into their home. Through saliva, the trained canines can sense a drop or rise in their owner’s blood sugar levels long before a continuous glucose monitor (CGM) does.

“They can know to go get his insulin if he’s high or good if he’s low. It’s amazing

what they can do,” Rachel said.

Especially for the late night, early morning hours, that could buy his parents the kind of peace of mind that’s been rare over the past year.

“The CGM is a life-saving tool, but an inaccurate reading at the wrong time ... it would give a lot of comfort to know he has a second nurse, so to speak, who’s always with him,” Rachel said.

Additionally, she thinks it would be an emotional lift for her son, who’s endured a difficult year since his diagnosis. Luke has had to switch schools and has had to abandon certain activities – a plan to begin playing soccer recreationally had to be put aside because it was causing him complications.

Bringing the dog in won’t be immediate. Training a puppy to be a diabetic alert dog can cost over \$10,000, while the family also has to factor in the cost of the puppy himself.

Some have offered assistance to that end, with \$1,300 in donations, including a large portion via a GoFundMe page for the cause (titled “Luke wants a puppy, not just any puppy”), set up by the family.

Rachel said she knows it won’t happen overnight, but that she’ll work toward the goal as long as it takes.

“I just want him to have every available resource and do what’s best for my son,” she said.

Foret said the hope is the time slot brings in more people who may not have been able to take advantage of the gymnasium’s offerings during the typical 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. time slots because of their work schedule.

“That’s always been a focus of our Parish President,” Foret said of Larry Cochran. “Our community center is wonderful, and he’s always stressing the need to find new ways to utilize it and impact our community positively.”

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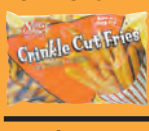

That gathering followed the announcement that it had raised \$1.17 million for United Way of St. Charles, a mark that cemented Valero as the top contributor to the United Way cause in St. Charles Parish.

"I could not be more proud of the Valero St. Charles employees for beating their goal and raising over \$1.17 million for United Way," said Jerry Stumbo, Valero vice president and general manager and the United Way of St. Charles' campaign co-chair for 2018-2019. Stumbo went on to call the employees of the site among the most generous people he has met.

It was one of several honors the refinery employees earned through their efforts. Others included the Campaign Achievement Award (which recognizes industry campaigns for campaign improvement; Valero jumped by two

"It's an important part of who we are as employees," Stumbo said. "Sharing our success with our communities is part of our guiding principles as a company."

Last year, Stumbo noted, Valero employees logged more than 7,500 volunteer hours.

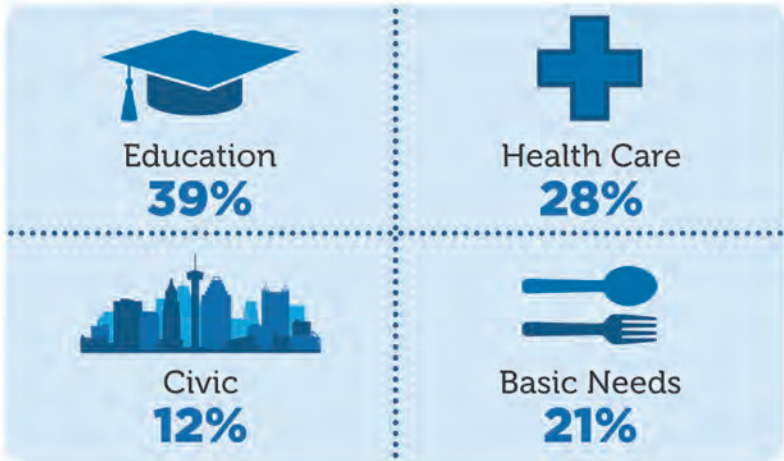
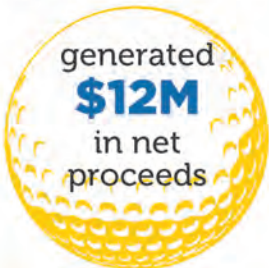

For Emile Broussard III, Shell Norco means just a little bit more.

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As the largest tonnage port in the Western Hemisphere (in 2018, private industries within St. Charles, St. John the Baptist, and St. James Parishes handled over 303 million short tons of cargo brought to its terminals via over 4,402 ocean-going vessels and 63,638 barges), the Port of South Louisiana is not only the highest grain exporter in the United States (over 50 percent of the nation’s grain is exported via the Port of South Louisiana), it is also the highest ranked exporter in North America.

As a matter of fact, the region has attracted billions of dollars of investment - \$24.512 billion to be exact - by companies in the petrochemical, fertilizer and logistics industries.

With over 46 million short tons of crude oil imports per year, four major oil refineries and 11 petrochemical manufacturing facilities, the Port of South Louisiana has been ranked as one of the top energy transfer ports in the nation.

Ranked No. 1 in the Merchandised Received (Warehouse/Distribution) category for 2017, the Port of South

Louisiana is one of the most active foreign trade zones in the country. Subzones in Zone 124 admitted \$49.5 billion worth of products last year accounting for 7% of the nation’s total shipments in zones and supported over 10,600 jobs.

The Port of South Louisiana has one of North America’s largest concentration of heavy manufacturers, a reflection of the strategic location, comparative market access, and a highly-skilled labor pool. Industry leaders in the energy and chemical sectors continue to invest billions of dollars as they expand operations to capture market opportunities.

Yet, without the raw materials produced by Rain Carbon Inc. -- a global company with significant operations in Louisiana -- many of the aluminum-based products that people rely on each day might not exist.

Rain Carbon operates four calcination plants in Louisiana – Norco, Chalmette, Gramercy and Lake Charles– where the byproducts of oil refining are processed in high-temperature kilns to increase the density and electrical conductivity properties of green petroleum coke. Once processed, the “calcined” petroleum coke (CPC) becomes a key raw material in the production of carbon anodes used during the electrolytic process to produce primary aluminum. It’s also a raw material used to produce titanium dioxide, which becomes a pigment in paints for construction and automotive applications, and a filler in plastics, coatings, cosmetics, toothpaste and sunscreen.

In addition to its seven calcination

plants in the United States and India, the company operates eight carbon-based advanced materials and distillation facilities in Belgium, Canada, Germany, Poland, Russia and The Netherlands.

Those facilities take another industrial by-product – coal tar from steel manufacturing – and distill it to create coal tar pitch (CTP), which serves primarily as a binder for the calcined petroleum coke

in the carbon anodes used in aluminum smelting. Rain Carbon's distillation facilities also transform coal tar into dozens of raw materials used in adhesives, rubber goods like tires, and construction products such as concrete and gypsum.

"Without calcined petroleum coke and coal tar pitch – Rain Carbon's two core materials – you wouldn't have aluminum and the many products that benefit from this versatile metal," says Gerry Sweeney, president of Connecticut-based Rain Carbon.

of what makes our communities successful.”

key link in the supply chain for bulk liquid products. World economies would be disrupted without bulk liquid storage facilities that are required for accumulating and distributing the products stored. IMTT has approximately two thirds market share on the Lower Mississippi River with the St. Rose, Gretna and Avondale facilities.

The IMTT – St. Rose facility comprises approximately 1,000 acres nestled between the Mississippi River and Interstate 10 and includes 207 tanks, with 16.75 million barrels total capacity ranging in size from 40,000 gallons to 500,000 barrels.

IMTT-St. Rose handles petroleum and petrochemical products, vegetable oils, and commodity chemicals (alcohols, including methanol and specialties) via five deepwater tanker berths and 13 barge berths along with truck and railcar loading/unloading facilities. Direct pipeline access is available with links to nearby refinery/petrochemical complexes.

Thermal oxidizers reduce emissions below required levels and vapor recovery systems provide waste minimization while continuous emissions monitoring verifies compliance. On-site water treatment prevents contamination. Odor control programs involve regular patrols within and around the terminal and include the application of odor control equipment.

IMTT is committed to providing a safe and environmentally responsible workplace for their employees, customers, and communities in which they operate. Their Destination Zero safety journey instills a culture that places safety at the forefront of all activities and decisions that may impact their workforce and neighboring communities.

we make plastic ... we don't like it on the ground, don't like it in the water. We want to get it recycled and to the right places.”

She said the volunteers have met the project each time with great enthusiasm. “Once they come back from the cleanup, they're saying, ‘Hey, I want to do more. Where can we go?’” Bezet said. “A big, big part of everything is how engaged our leaders have been. Leaders are asking for specific clean-up events to promote team engagement. In St. Charles, employees have taken initiative and found areas in the community to clean up.”

It's a way to pay it forward, and Bezet said the hope is that this is just the beginning.

“We really want to be an inspiration to everyone in the area, to show what we can do when we put aside our differences, get involved and help out the community. We hope this initiative creates a domino effect within the parish and produces sustainable change for the better,” she said.

share of the global automotive fleet is expected to grow from 4% in 2017 to 30% in 2030. That will require smelters to increase their production capacity to meet rising demand, thereby requiring more CPC and CTP for anodes during the next decade.

Moreover, as the number of electric vehicles increases, so will the need for additional lithium-ion batteries that power the automobiles. Rain Carbon plays a leading role there as well, since it is a major supplier of advanced materials used in the coatings that extend the life of li-ion batteries and enable them to maintain a prolonged charge.

“At Rain Carbon, we are constantly looking for ways to do new things with our raw materials that meet increasing demand for lighter, greener and faster products and provide for a cleaner and brighter future,” Sweeney says.

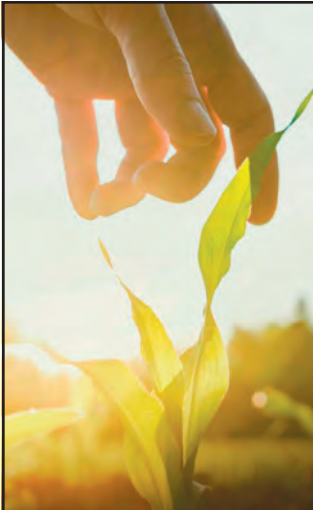
The company also is committed to reducing its environmental footprint. Scrubbers installed at its calcination facilities are an example, as they enable the company to minimize emissions despite the increasingly high sulfur content in the petcoke supplied by refineries.

Elsewhere, the company uses waste heat at four of its calcination plants to produce approximately 125 megawatts electricity that is added to local power grids – what Sweeney refers to as “our continued commitment to greening our industry, through waste-heat recapture and energy cogeneration.”

That environmental focus is an outgrowth of Rain Carbon’s commitment to enhancing the quality of life in its local communities. In fact, Community Involvement is one of six Building Blocks for Success that serve as a foundation for the company’s Vision, Mission and Values. The other Building Blocks are Safety, Employee Wellbeing, Efficiency, Reliability and Environment Responsibility.

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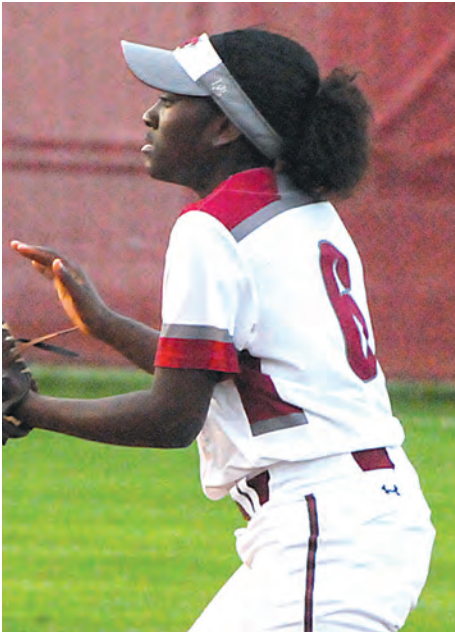

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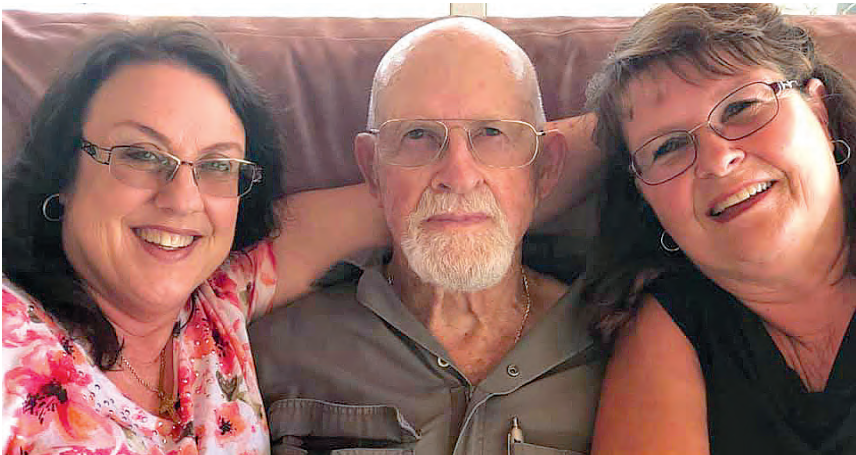

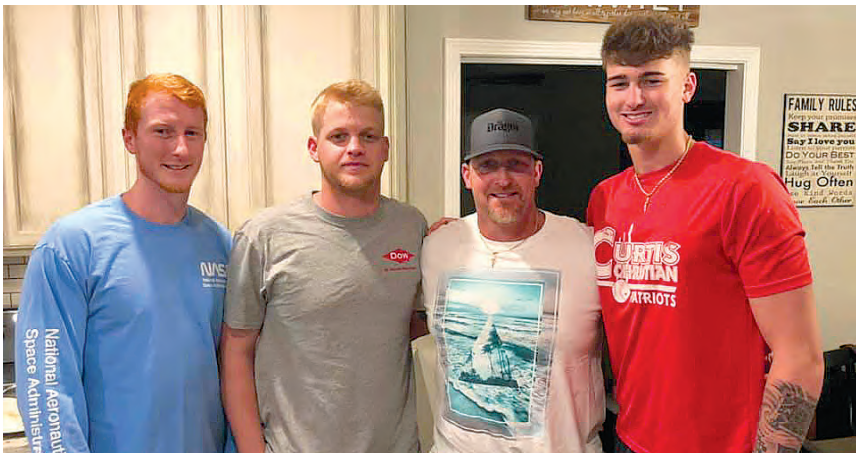

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Parish taking a new approach to hurricane preparedness

#BePrepared campaign to include children's activity book and summer camp field trips

This year, the Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, along with the Public Information Office, is taking a new approach to hurricane preparedness by focusing campaign efforts on educating youth.

"It has been 11 years since the last major hurricane made landfall here in the U.S. (Hurricane Wilma)," said Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness Director Joe Ganote. "It is our goal each and every year to combat any complacency that may have set in with our residents."

The #BePrepared campaign inspired the creation of an activity book called *The Adventures of Charlie and his Preparedness Pals*. The book follows Charlie and his fellow animal friends as they help children understand the importance of being prepared for any weather emergency.

The activity book includes educational activities and learning resources to help children be prepared during any weather event.

"Joe is very passionate about breaking the cycle of complacency in our parish, and he challenged us to help find a way to change the mindset of how our youth view preparedness. Our office felt the best approach was to start creating generations that understand preparedness has to be a way of life for us," said Interim Public Information Officer, Adrienne Bourgeois. "The book is completely original. As an office, we created the narrative and design while Emergency Coordinator Steve Sirmon drew the artwork. It was a challenge, but it was fun."

The parish will launch the activity book on June 17 when the Community Services Department's summer enrichment program goes on field trips to the Emergency Operations Center where they will listen to a presentation

about preparedness from Ganote and Bourgeois. Then, the children will participate in a hands-on game that teaches them how to pack a preparedness kit. After the game, the children will tour the facility and leave with their own copy of the first-ever activity book.

"I couldn't be prouder of this campaign. As a former fire chief, I am no stranger to educating the youth on being prepared," said St. Charles Parish President Larry Cochran. "When the idea was pitched, they had my full support."

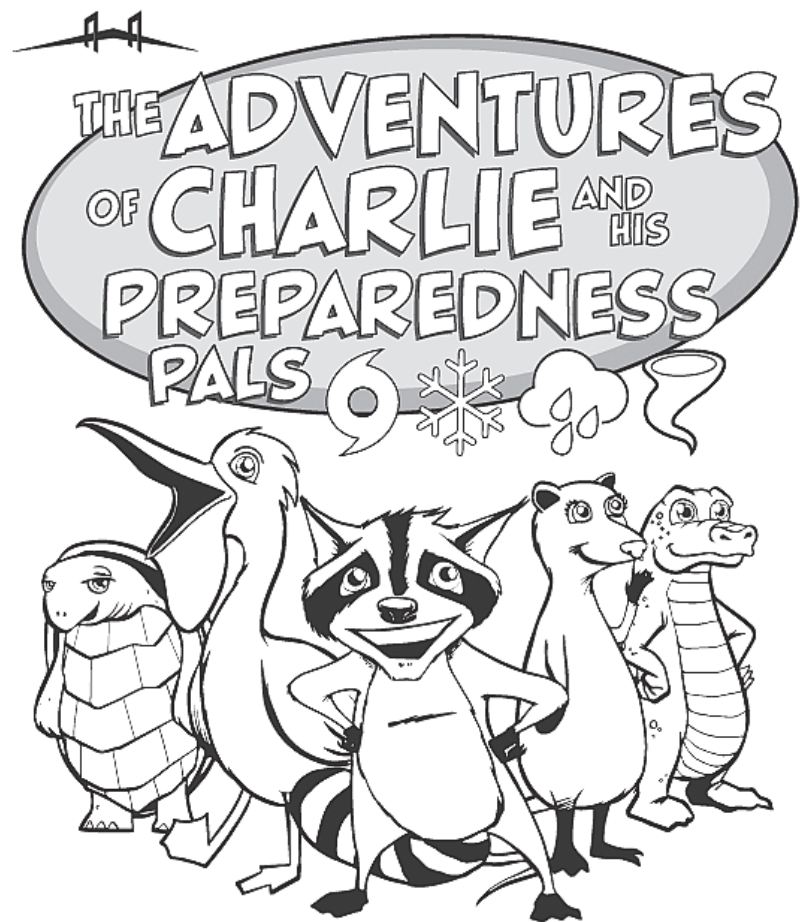
The book's printing cost was sponsored by the Shell Norco Manufacturing Complex whose partnership is expected to increase as the campaign evolves.

The facility is located **14902 River Road, Norco, St. Charles Parish**. Upon the effective date of the final permit, the LPDES permit shall replace the previously issued LPDES permit.

The principal discharge from this existing source is made into the Mississippi River, waters of the state classified for primary contact recreation, secondary contact recreation, propagation of fish and wildlife and drinking water supply. The refinery also discharges to local drainage, thence to Cross Bayou Canal, thence to Bayou LaBranche, waters of the state classified for primary contact recreation, secondary contact recreation and propagation of fish and wildlife. Under the SIC Code 2911, the applicant proposes to discharge refinery process wastewater, process area storm water and non-process area stormwater; tank draw water; hydrostatic test water; utility wastewaters; miscellaneous non-process wastewaters; Diamond Green Diesel process wastewaters, process area stormwater and non-process area stormwater; and wastewaters from 4 SMR units from an existing petroleum refining facility.

During the preparation of this permit, it has been determined that the discharge will have no adverse impact on the existing uses of the receiving waterbody. As with any discharge, however, some change in existing water quality may occur.

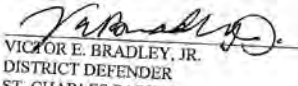
