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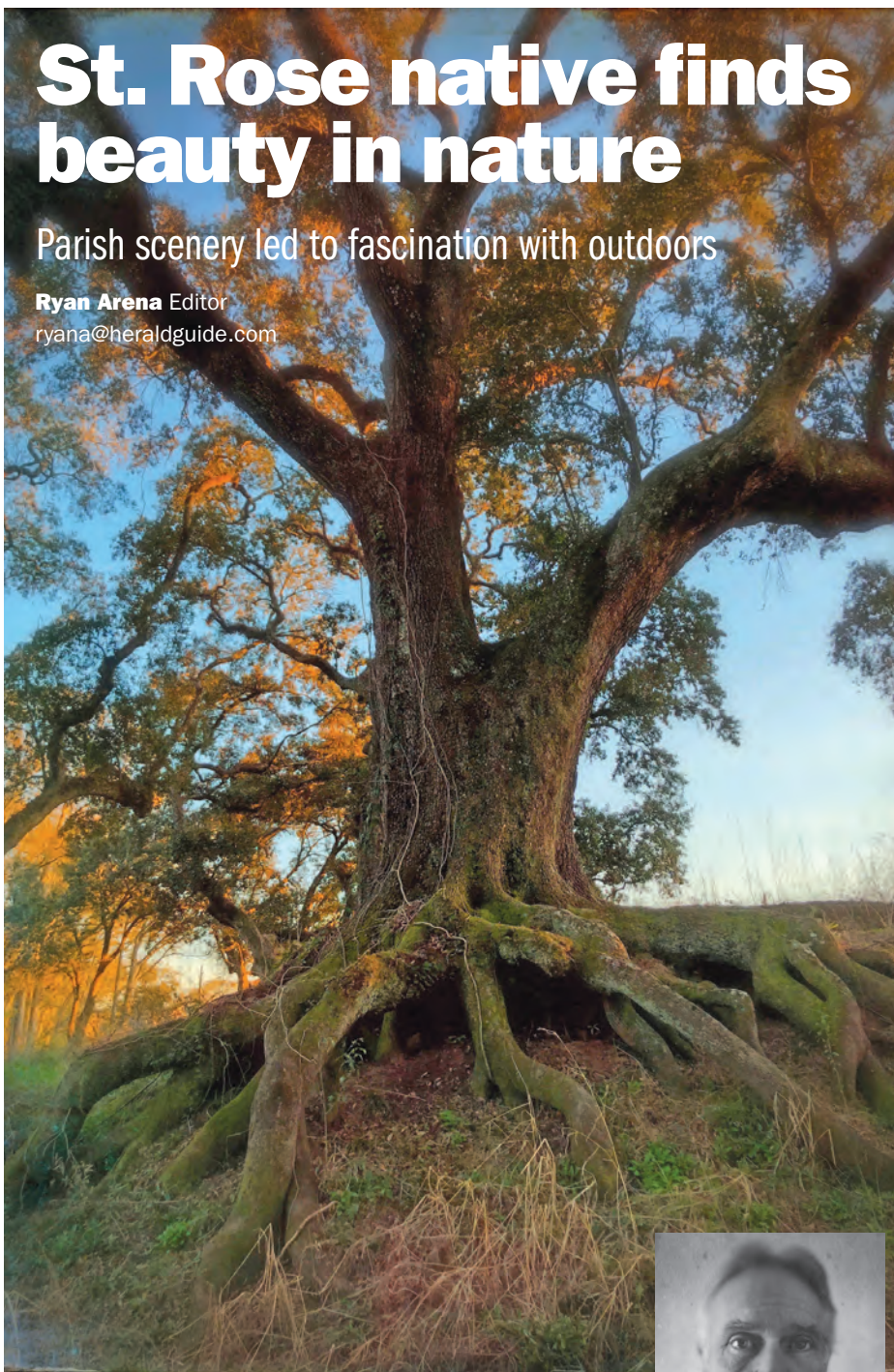
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St. Rose native finds beauty in nature

Parish scenery led to fascination with outdoors

Ralph Schexnaydre Jr. believes everyone has the potential to create, if they seek it out within themselves.

For the St. Rose native, his outlet is photography, which he calls his addiction.

"It's because you have to do it, and nothing else fills that void for you," Schexnaydre said. "It's like eating and breathing, you have to create."

Schexnaydre finds inspiration from a variety of places, as he has when he first took up the hobby in the mid 60s after his parents bought the family's first Polaroid camera. But his specialty is landscape photography, for which he has developed something of a sixth sense for.

"When I'm out there, I'll see

something, put this and this together, this in the foreground ... and it's almost as if the landscape itself tells me, 'No, you need to be over a little further here, or down a little here,'" he said with a laugh. "There are times a landscape tells me how to take the picture. When I go shooting those situations, I go with an open mind and allow things to happen ... tune in to what's going on in that environment."

Such was the case with a grove of oak trees along Bayou Teche, just outside of Arnaudville. He came across the area while out "chasing smoke" in search of sugar cane fires to capture.

WWII veteran became avid runner in his 60s

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When Arthur "Mutsy" Gassen Jr. finally spoke about his time in World War II, he recounted how he was proud of his service and lived every day of life to its fullest.

"He had just started talking about it," said son Wayne Gassen of his father's wartime service. "He said he'd seen things that humans shouldn't see and that God blessed him to survive that. He thanked the Lord every day that he woke up and felt blessed to have another day."

At age 95, Gassen died as he lived – on the move.

Gassen and Wayne, both of Luling, were about a 10-mile bike ride on June 20. Wayne was waiting for his father

to catch up to him when he heard him yell in pain. When Wayne arrived at his father's side, Gassen was already unconscious.

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China takes notice of unique parish program

Barry Guillot became a teacher to make a difference, but he didn't anticipate Wetland Watchers having an impact in China.

"I just finished a really interesting interview with researchers at Columbia University and an educator from China interested in writing modules for Chinese middle schools that involve their students in real-world sustainability issues and strategies to give their students a voice in their communities," Guillot said. "Wetland Watchers Service-Learning Program is one of the programs they chose to model."

Service learning is an educational approach that combines learning objectives with community service to provide a learning experience while meeting societal needs.

"They're looking for ways for the students to have a voice in their community, and like the way with the Watchers that the students are doing the speaking and outreaches," Guillot said.

"I really felt good about that because that's one of the things I felt was strong about Wetland Watchers. I always told the kids you have no right to complain how things are going if you're just sitting in the stands. You really need to be down in the field playing to make a difference."

Researchers, which included a member from China, interviewed Guillot for an hour and completed four hours of paperwork about the program. Part of

the discussion was about teacher buy-in and how to get students to stay after school for the program, as well as focusing on tests.

Despite students having activities competing for their time, Guillot said they still make room for Wetland Watchers.

"I think they are really excited about the passion of the students and the commitment they have and how they replicate that so the middle school students are excited about learning," Guillot said.

The discussion focused on giving children a voice and solving real world problems.

Guillot said Wetland Watchers ranks as one of the Top 10 sustainability educational programs in the U.S.

Service learning can even help students make vocational choices, he said. Many Wetland Watcher students have gone on to work in environmental sciences and become vets.

Hahnville man who fired flare gun at victim earns jail time

Will serve five years after guilty plea

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A Hahnville man arrested last December after allegedly firing a flare gun at a nearby victim and striking him in the chest was sentenced to serve time in prison after pleading guilty.

Keith Chapman, 24, of 200 Sunset Court in Hahnville, will serve five years in prison after pleading guilty to a charge of aggravated battery with a dangerous weapon.

Though Chapman was sentenced to two years of prison, to be served immediately, for the battery charge, a five year sentence became active as result of Chapman violating his probation terms tied to an arrest in 2017. He will serve the two concurrently, meaning his term will be five years.

He was arrested for assault on Dec. 17 after he allegedly fired an orange colored flare gun at a 26-year-old man standing near the intersection of Smith Street and Sunset Court. Chapman was leaving the area in a vehicle when he fired the flare.

The victim, also of Hahnville, was not seriously injured, but was taken to a local hospital to be treated for a burn on his chest, according to Sheriff's Office spokesman Cpl. James Grimaldi.

Chapman's probation was revoked as result of his conviction, activating the five-year suspended sentence he received in 2017 after pleading guilty to charges of possession with intent to distribute a Schedule I controlled dangerous substance (CDS) and possession of a firearm while in possession of a CDS.

He is serving his sentence at Nelson Coleman Correctional Center.

School system's roots stretch back to 1879

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Sal Digirolamo had two favorite teachers at Norco Primary – Miss Montz and Miss Schoeffner – who are among his fondest memories of the old school on Apple Street.

"She would cook grits for us in the morning," Digirolamo recalled about Schoeffner, the school's principal and teacher. "She was just one hell of a good person."

There were students who couldn't afford to bring a lunch to school, but she was there with help for them, he said. Schoeffner served in the school system from 1917 to 1965, and was the first female educator recognized with a school named to honor her – Ethel Schoeffner Elementary.

Montz, his second-grade teacher, was equally loved by Digirolamo. He described them both as dedicated, caring and devoted to teaching and discipline. He especially recalled Schoeffner's love

for students, calling her "one first-class teacher."

Digirolamo was a student at the school when then President Franklin D. Roosevelt was on his way to the Bonnet Carre Spillway.

"Roosevelt passed down the street and I could swear he waved at me," he said.

In 1879, the St. Charles Parish Public School System was established under

the jurisdiction of the police jury. There were 10 schools throughout the parish with white schools at Gassenville (Luling) and Hahnville, and black schools at Boutte Station, Bethlehem Baptist Church in Hahnville and other black churches and benevolent societies in the parish.

For St. Charles Parish, in 1930, during the tenure (1913- 44) of Superintendent J.B. Martin, the passage of a bond election provided the funds to build and expand schools.

Martin, the great grandson of Jean Baptiste LaBranche, was called "the Father of St. Charles Parish Schools."

"It had been said that many of the great advances made in education in St. Charles Parish can be attributed to the determination and conscientious

Roses and
Thorns of the
2019 Session

The 2019 legislative session has finally come to a close.

For those that thought this would be a quick and uncontentious two-month session for lawmakers, boy were they wrong. This session, even without another budget crisis, did not run short on its list of roses or thorns.

There were a handful of bills that passed that enhanced the environment for the oil and gas sector. The oil and gas industry will be able to participate in carbon dioxide sequestration thanks to Rep. Raymond Crews filing House Bill (HB) 163. This bill allows the Office of Conservation and the Commissioner to promulgate rules to permit carbon sequestration. This bill, now law, was a collaboration between industry, regulators and lawmakers to provide another environmentally friendly way to deal with excess carbon while producing energy.

Additionally, LOGA worked hand in hand with Rep. Blake Miguez to provide some clarification to the tax code. Due to a “unique” interpretation of Louisiana tax codes, oil companies in three parishes have recently assessed property tax on goods that was previously not taxed. Thankfully, this measure passed and on the October ballot will be a constitutional amendment to provide for a property tax exemption for goods bound for the Outer Continental Shelf, providing needed clarity for Louisiana’s offshore operators.

Louisiana will also experience one of the largest infrastructure investments in decades. Thanks to the teamwork of Rep. Tanner Magee, Sen. Rick Ward and a coalition of pro-industry and business groups, Louisiana is set to receive nearly a \$700 million investment for transportation projects. The best part about this investment is we, the taxpayers, are not on the hook for the tab. Instead of using taxpayer dollars, HB 572 directs BP Deepwater settlement dollars to these infrastructure projects, like the LA 1 Improvement Project that connects to Port Fourchon.

Ready, Set, Grow!

Summer is now officially here, and it’s officially real darn hot outside. Summer heat is stressful on most plants, even those well adapted to this kind of climate.

Their signs of heat stress include wilting, yellowing, and lack of production (for fruits). Usually, watering will cure it; do so with appropriate frequency and depth. Vegetable gardens want water about every two to three days when it’s not raining. Any single rain event less than an inch will not get to your plants’ roots. Always water slowly and deeply; try not to wet foliage.

Lawn grass is best watered once a week. Place a rain gauge in the yard then watering, assuming you’re using a sprinkler.

See how long it takes to get to an inch or more of rain equivalent. Now you know how long to water the lawn each time. Watering any plants in the morning is also a good way to avoid disease.

Watering plants in pots is simple, but will be needed more often. Just feel the soil now and then and keep it somewhat moist. If plants begin to shrivel, you’ve waited too long; do better next time. And whenever watering pots, give enough so water leaks out of the pot’s bottom holes.

Potted plants may also be moved into more shade if hydration is a challenge. Something grown in full sun in spring may now be stressed in the same place. Try to get plants where they’ll at least

have a break from the most intense mid-day heat. And choose morning sun over afternoon/evening sun when possible.

Choosing the most heat-tolerant plants will help. Okra can still be planted in July, as well as cucumbers. We can plant fall tomatoes now, too; just be sure they’re heat-set varieties like Bella Rosa or Phoenix. Cauliflower can also be planted starting this month, but it will require a lot of attention and hopefully some shade setup that can be removed later.

Heat-loving ornamentals include sunflowers, zinnias and cosmos. They can be planted from seed. Any seeds will dry quickly, so they need attentive watering too.

He described one of the trees with approximately eight feet of its roots exposed “like large fingers penetrating the earth below,” and another with its roots crossed like human legs, its feet buried in the earth.

“The place felt like a cathedral,” he said. “Awe inspiring”

He found the trees four years ago and has been photographing them ever since, calling them his “Sacred Trees.”

When shooting, he likes to capture more than just a scenic image. Ideally, he wants his pictures to each tell a story, or perhaps more accurately, to capture the story that environment is communicating to him as a photographer.

“I went back a few weeks ago to see them ... they were just as majestic,” he said. “I could still feel the struggle of how these trees had survived, maybe not just to survive, but to thrive. They became a metaphor for survival in the face of catastrophe. They became the guardians and protectors of the area around them, their deep foundations keeping the earth intact, and allowing the other trees to survive as well.”

Much of what he does, he describes as an attempt to express the majesty of nature, and the unique sights it offers.

“You don’t run across things like that very often,” he said. “Oak trees all age differently. Growing up in

South Louisiana, you see a lot of old oak trees, especially in St. Charles Parish. These just seemed to have a story that needed to be told.”

As he alluded to, his St. Charles upbringing has a lot to do with why he’s so in tune with nature and the many stories to be told through its creations.

“I grew up very close to nature,” Schexnaydre said. “Two blocks away from the Mississippi River. Three away from the swamps. As a kid, we went hunting, fishing, all those things we do growing up in South Louisiana. So, from an early age, I always had some affinity for landscape. It’s been a recurring thing in my life. I want to do it in all sorts of ways.”

He began taking photos at the age of 12. He also captures his artistic visions through his drawings, a skill he sharpened through his high school years by making banners and decorations for homecoming and prom dances.

Locally, shooting along the river banks stands among his favorite locations to find inspirational imagery.

One thing he says he’s learned over the years of refining his art is that the simplest things can offer a powerful message.

“We’re all bombarded with so much visual distraction every day ... I think as humans, we cope with a lot of that by shutting ourselves off to it, to not pick up all that stimulation,” he said. “But I find a lot of inspiration in things I think most would find to be just visual clutter. Keeping my mind open, allowing myself to really perceive a scene ... it’s a major component of what makes a wonderful photograph.”

“I rubbed his shoulder and told him, ‘Dad, I love you. We all love you.’ I knew he could hear. He started breathing harder. He just couldn’t respond.”

Two women walking on the levee ran over to assist Gassen, giving him CPR until EMTs arrived. Gassen died at the hospital from complications of a heart attack, but his son said he was a fighter until the end.

A corporal in the Army, Gassen was proud of his service.

The Luling resident served the country as a rifleman for the U.S. Army in the European African Middle Eastern Campaign in Italy from 1944-45 with the 3rd Battalion, 337 Infantry Regiment. He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal, Combat Infantry Badge, European African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal and Good Conduct Medal. Gassen went on to work 46 years at Avondale Shipyard, where he retired. He was a high school graduate who had the mind of an engineer, Wayne said.

“He made stuff for everybody,” he said. “He could make things.”

Gassen had an infectious smile and prided himself on an active lifestyle.

But Wayne said his father didn’t start running until age 60, a move encouraged by his beloved wife, Amelia. The World Fair Run in New Orleans was their first race. Then came 5-K and 10-K runs like the United Way of St. Charles’ Bridge Run, with them sometimes running three races a weekend. They also participated in the Louisiana Senior Olympics Games and won gold medals. Like her husband, Amelia was running until she passed away three years ago at age 88.

Gassen was an avid runner and cyclist, a member of the Pacers, NORSI, and NOTC running clubs. His children also joined them although Wayne said he’d volunteer to help more than run, and fondly recounted the Pacers theme as “Drinkers with a running problem.”

Having retired himself a year ago, Wayne was spending more time with his father during that time. He recounted his father’s refusal to give up gardening because he enjoyed giving vegetables to friends and still cut his own grass despite his advanced age.

Wayne mused many people have asked

him if his father had a good mind and replied, “His mind is good. I wish he’d forget some of the things I did.”

Described as a “southern gentleman,” Gassen loved people and was very close to his family. He was an avid LSU and Saints fan.

“We don’t have any regrets,” Wayne said. “We loved him.”

Wayne said his father, as well as his grandmother, had a strong Catholic faith and passed it on to him and his four siblings. Gassen often asked them if they went to church and they knew there wasn’t an excuse not to go.

Gassen was an active member of St. Anthony of Padua Catholic Church in Luling. Father Anthony Odiong commented to Wayne about his father always being in a suit and tie at church.

And Wayne recalled his father as “an awesome dad ... an awesome man.”

A life well lived

That may be true, according to nuisance officer Kenny Schmill, but not for the reasons many theorize.

Alligators tend to be seen out and about more often during the spring and summer, because it represents the time they’re moving to breed or relocate to a new habitat.

Schmill, who has been a “nuisance hunter” for 45 years, said he doesn’t necessarily know that there have been more calls placed to him this year than last. But on the whole, he says, the population of alligators is growing – and will continue to do so.

“It’s not the high river,” Schmill said of the notion the higher water is driving alligators into roadways. “The water really has nothing to do with it. When it rains three or four days straight, sometimes the thunder will get them to move and you find more. But in 2007 we

had the worst drought in 100-something years, and I was still picking them up. They don’t really need water.”

Instead, if there is a greater number of alligators seen out and away from the water, he believes that may be because there simply are more alligators, period.

“They usually give out 32,000 tags to hunt them ... but there might be 10 percent of those people, if that much, hunting them at all,” Schmill said. “There’s really been no money in it ... who’s gonna go hunt them for \$5 a foot? It’s not worth it.”

Supply and demand comes into play when alligators are being harvested by farmers.

“They’re raising 100,000 of them on the farm ... people who hunt alligators can try to get people to buy the skins, but the farmers are raising them to seven feet, ideal size ... they grow them faster, with

no blemishes on them,” Schmill said. “So it is what it is. The number of them is just going to increase more and more ... it’ll rise even more if nobody hunts them during the wild season.”

But outside of the farm, he estimates 20 percent of the gators he encounters were farm raised originally.

Alligators also tend to be among the top survivors in the animal kingdom, so their numbers aren’t exactly dwindling via natural causes.

“There’s a reason they’ve been here 300 million years, along with the roaches,” he said with a chuckle. “They survive.”

As for those surviving, live gators people come in contact with, Schmill said they’re more afraid of humans than the humans are of them.

But were one to feed them, it complicates matters.

“If you feed them, they’re just gonna

come right back,” said Schmill, who responds to approximately 80 nuisance calls per year. “The ones I come get and put back, they’re just gonna come back.”

The Good Hope School was one of nine schools opened following the 1930 bond election. The facility was closed in 1969 due to racial desegregation. Albert Cammon Middle School in St. Rose is named in Cammon’s honor. Gloria Robottom Curreau was principal of Hahnville Colored School. Martin chose her to help develop the school system. Meanwhile, Allemands Elementary was moved down the bayou and back up to Des Allemands. The Fashion School in Hahnville also became one of the parish’s schools.

“It takes a lot of extra time on my part, but you see that learning, enthusiasm and excitement and that’s what I love to see in the kids,” he said. “I always say I became a teacher so I could make a difference in other people’s lives. Nicholls upgrades a testament to Rebowe's success

Former DHS head coach has Colonels program skyrocketing

Fresh off of leading Nicholls State to its first conference football championship in 13 years, Colonels head football coach Tim Rebowe is seeing his program blossom—and to the winners go the spoils.

The money will be used to fund the expansion of Barker Hall to include a football operations center at the south end zone of John L. Guidry Stadium.

Rebowe, former head football coach of the Destrehan Wildcats, led his team to an 9-4 record and the Southland Conference title in 2018. In the wake of that progress came the announcement that Nicholls will soon begin construction on a \$6.5 million football facility, of which \$2.52 million will be paid by an anonymous outside donor. It marks the largest single monetary donation in the

The football program, which shares Barker Hall with baseball and athletics administration, will move into the football operations center, which will include a new locker room, players' lounge, team meeting room with stadium-style seating, training room, equipment room, coaches' and staff offices, position and group meeting rooms, catering kitchen, and showcase lobby. The team room will

also function as a gameday club seating area, which will produce revenue for the benefit of all 17 programs. The expanded Barker Hall will also allow the current footprint to be repurposed and revitalized for several other programs and functions.

back to back years. Its 49-30 first round win over San Diego is the first playoff win since 1986. Rebowe is 25-22 overall at the school, only the second head coach in school history to hold a career winning record (Sonny Jackson is the other, from 1981 to 1986, going 39-28-1).

In the wake of that progress came the announcement that Nicholls will soon begin construction on a \$6.5 million football facility, of which \$2.52 million will be paid by an anonymous outside donor.

Construction is expected to be completed in time for the 2020 football season.

For Rebowe, who was DHS head coach from 1992-1994 and whose overall tenure at the school spanned from 1988-1994, this is his second run at Nicholls, the first spent as an assistant coach from 1995-2000. After assistant coaching tenures at Louisiana-Monroe and Louisiana-Lafayette, he was hired in 1995 to head the Nicholls program, as the 11th head coach in its history.

The Colonels have been on an upward swing throughout his time at the helm. His first season produced a 3-8 record, and the second 5-6—but year two saw a winning conference record. Nicholls broke through in his third year, going 8-4 overall, 7-2 in conference play, and earning a bid to the Division I FCS playoffs.

2018 marked the first time ever
Nicholls qualified for the postseason in

Defense is Rebowe's trademark, in particular his work with defensive backs. In 1996, his tenure as defensive backs coach coincided with Nicholls ranking seventh in the nation in defensive passing efficiency. In 2005, while coaching safeties with ULL, he helped craft the 11th best passing defense in the nation, one that allowed just 190 yards per game. He's coached a number of successful corners and safeties who went on to be drafted or signed to the NFL level, chief among them Chris Harris, former ULM cornerback who has evolved into one of the league's elite cornerbacks with the Denver Broncos.

Of course, his days as Destrehan head coach also coincided with the tenure of another famous DB – Ed Reed, the now NFL Hall of Famer. Rebowe went 26-11 during his time at Destrehan, including a run to the Class 5A championship game in 1993.

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Tigers set as top seed of Legion district playoffs

Following up on strong end to prep season

Like the prep season, 2019’s summer baseball and American Legion slate saw a slow start for Hahnville. But this time around, it didn’t take long at all to right the ship – and then some.

Hahnville’s summer team, playing once again under the banner of Otto Candies, shook off an 0-5 start to win 14 of its last 18 games, including an unbeaten run through district play and a top seed in this week’s Second District East playoff tournament. Chalmette, Shaw Curtis and Pedal Valves (a combination of several local schools) will await them as competition. Hahnville will have a bye in the tourney’s first round, which begins Friday.

“This summer’s been a lot of fun,” said HHS coach David Baudry. “This is a great, hard-working group of kids. And they’re playing well ... really playing well.”

The Tigers (16-12) have been putting together complete team efforts with strong work in each phase. Collin Zeringue has been a major break-out star in multiple ways: he has had a dominant summer at the plate, batting .414 to go with 27 RBIs, while also posting a 2.76 ERA on the mound over five starts as a pitcher.

Max Farrell has played in approximately half

of the Tigers’ games this summer but has packed a punch when on the field, batting .510. Mason Lucky (.329) and Ethan Chacon (.306) have also made an impact with the bat.

Jack Stumbo (3.70 ERA in a team leading 31 innings pitched) and Seth Whitney (3.32 ERA in 24.1 innings) have been among strong contributors on the mound.

“We had to find consistency both offensively and in our pitching staff, and we’ve been able to do that,” Baudry said. “Defensively, I think we’ve been exceptional.”

That defense has been helped by the return of Mason Long from injury, who Baudry noted is still catching up with his bat but has been really strong behind the plate. The team’s infield and outfield have both delivered, with the team’s primary four outfielders – Adam Lorio, Adam Barbier, Farrell and Whitney collectively opening a lot of eyes.

“That’s probably the most impressive thing I’ve seen,” Baudry said. “They’ve been fabulous, really running down balls like it’s nothing. I’m really proud of their ability to work, improve and get better.”

Hits keep on comin’ for Pels offseason

– in a good way

Sure, history has repeated itself. Yet it feels so different, doesn’t it?

This offseason, the Pelicans once again had trading away a superstar player on their agenda: once Chris Paul, now Anthony Davis. But despite that, this is clearly and, in my mind, irrefutably a completely different kind of NBA operation than we’ve been exposed to down here in our community and region. This is a front office with a plan.

That much became clear when examining the terms of the Davis trade. For years, the Hornets/Pelicans made moves that indicated its decision-makers needed to make a playoff push – or else. Win now – or else. Jobs on the line, desperation in the air.

This time, the Los Angeles Lakers were desperate. And the Pelicans secure.

It’s a rare day indeed for a team in the Pelicans’ position to trade a Davis and be better for it. And I cannot promise you that they’ll go down as the winners of this trade, either. But I can promise you this: they won the negotiation. And this franchise is far better off today, even without Davis, than it was a year ago.

Pelicans VP of basketball operations David Griffin is shrewd. He knew Davis could leave after a year and leave his team with nothing. He also knew other teams in the league would be reticent to make their strongest offers because Davis’ agent, Rich Paul, had poisoned that well, all but letting everyone that might deal for his client know they’d have Davis for a year before he blew out of town for L.A. And Griffin knew the Lakers knew this.

But he had an ace in the hole. Ironically, it’s the same ace in the hole the Lakers had to secure the inside track to acquire Davis to begin with, and the same ace in the hole Griffin had in Cleveland, when he crafted that city’s first ever NBA champion.

Griffin’s ace in the hole was LeBron James.

Because no matter what pressure fell on the Pelicans to trade Davis, Los Angeles couldn’t wipe away the simple fact that James is 34, and will be 35 this December.

Ultimately, the idea that Davis could walk after a year was less threatening to the Pelicans, who stood to lose him for nothing, than it was the Lakers, who would be put in the position of, were a deal not done, effectively having to sit out of free agency a 2nd straight year and punting another of James’ twilight years, or walking away from Davis entirely and perhaps leaving James without a true second star going forward.

Griffin was able to wait for the Lakers to come to him. And because of that, he captured what almost amounts to a full decade of Laker draft capital.

But the Pelicans also, effectively, could have the rights to any or all high Laker first round picks from 2021 to 2026. Griffin put the Pelicans in position to become VERY fortunate were things to break wrong out West.

In 16 days of the offseason, he reshaped the entire roster, selecting three players in the first round and signing a pair of potential difference-makers in J.J. Redick and Derrick Favors. The roster looks to go 11 players deep. And the future looks bright.

As of June 17, Trishan Charles has lost 76 pounds. The start of her weight-loss journey began with coping with stress. “Between November 2018 and New Year’s 2019, I lost about 30 to 35 pounds due to stress,” Charles said. “I completely stopped eating and was just living on coffee and water. When I would feel too weak I would eat a little something and than go back to just coffee and water. I was not purposely trying not to eat I just didn’t have any type of appetite to eat anything.”

The Destrehan resident was dealing with the cost of having two sons in college at the same time, but she welcomed being able to turn it into a positive experience.

In January, after she returned to her job as a bus driver for St. Charles Parish Schools, friends’ encouraging words started her thinking.

“I was talking to a friend and they were talking to me about pressing through and keeping a smile on my face, but at the time I was only smiling on the outside and crying miserable on the inside,” she said. “I soon realized that they were right. I could not change the things that I was personally stressing over and, at that moment, I decided to change my negative weight lost into a positive one.”

And she did. By Jan. 3, she started going to the Anytime Fitness gym in Destrehan at least three to four times a week and started the 100 Workout Challenge and completely changed her eating habits. She began a meal plan, replaced sodas with water – six to eight bottles of it a day.

I do try to keep up with his plan. In the beginning, I couldn’t do 15 seconds on the StairMaster. I am doing much better today, I can stay on it for a least 12 minutes now ... baby steps.”

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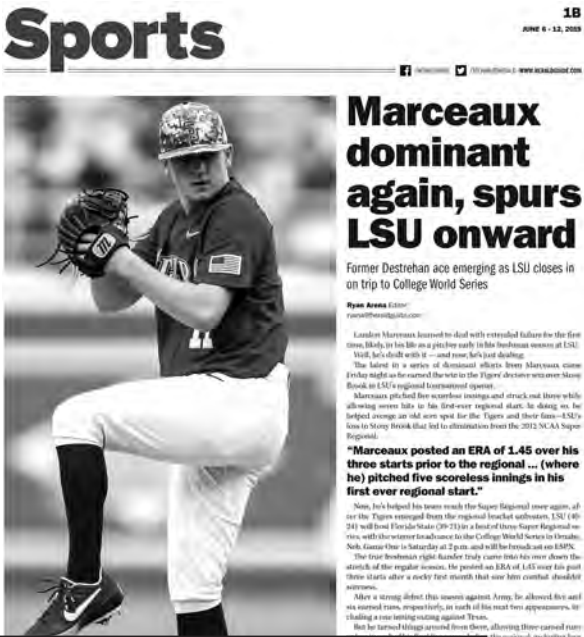

WHEREAS, a vacancy will exist in the office of District Judge, 29th Judicial District Court, Division C, Parish of St. Charles, due to the resignation of the Honorable Emile R. St. Pierre, effective December 1, 2019; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana Revised Statute 18:621 requires the Governor to call a special election to fill the vacancy in an existing judgeship when more than twelve (12) months of the term remain unexpired, in accordance with the provisions of La. R.S. 18:621 and/or the dates for elections set forth in La. R.S. 18:402.

NOW THEREFORE, I, JOHN BEL EDWARDS, Governor of the State of Louisiana, by virtue of the authority vested by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Louisiana, do hereby order and direct as follows:

SECTION 1: A special primary and a special general election shall be held throughout the jurisdiction of the 29th Judicial District Court, Division C, Parish of St. Charles for the purpose of electing a judge to fill the vacancy in the office.

SECTION 2: Any qualified person desiring to become a candidate for the office shall file a notice of candidacy, accompanied either by a qualifying fee or a nominating petition, as required or authorized by law, with the appropriate election official in the manner and form, and under the procedures and conditions, provided by La. R.S. 18:461 *et seq.*, and all other applicable provisions of the Louisiana Election Code, La. R.S. 18:1 *et seq.*, during the period commencing Tuesday, August 6, 2019, and ending at 4:30 p.m. Thursday, August 8, 2019.

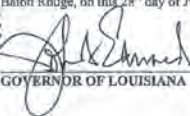
SECTION 3: The special election shall be held and conducted under the applicable provisions of the Louisiana Election Code, La. R.S. 18:1 *et seq.*

SECTION 4: The primary election shall be held Saturday, October 12, 2019, and the general election shall be held Saturday, November 16, 2019, at the times and places and in the manner, prescribed by law.

SECTION 5: The Secretary of State, Commissioner of Elections, Parish Board of Election Supervisors, Clerk of Court, Registrar of Voters, and all other persons charged with any power, function, right, duty or responsibility in conducting elections in the jurisdiction of the 29th Judicial District Court, Division C, Parish of St. Charles, are hereby authorized, requested, directed and empowered to exercise every lawful function and to do every act necessary to conduct the special election, to cause the returns to be made, to canvass and promulgate the results, and to perform all related and incidental functions.
