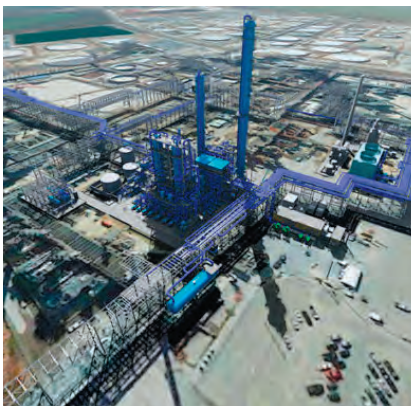
haunting cold case.

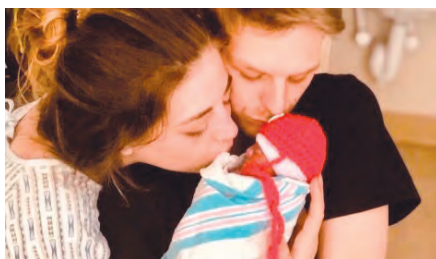

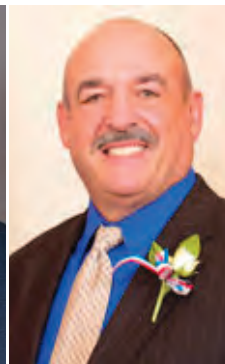

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As Barry hit, displaced Hahnville family still picking up pieces from December floods

After loss of home, belongings, they're trying to rebuild lives

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As Hurricane Barry materialized and brought with it fears of flooding, displacement and beyond, Dwayne Robinson and his family were far from the fray – this time.

It's only the case because the family of six are still picking up the pieces after severe flooding in December forced them from their Hahnville home, which was destroyed along with the majority of the Robinsons' belongings.

"Just two days after Christmas," Robinson said. "Two days after Christmas, we lost everything. It's been a hard pill to swallow."

Robinson and his family have had to endure many of the most prevalent fears that come with a major disaster event. They have no home to call their own, money is low as are possessions.

"We're starting, basically, back at square one," said Robinson, who along with his wife care for their four children, ages 15, 7, 3 and 2, respectively.

They were able to find shelter via hotel vouchers for approximately three weeks

before those ran out – the five briefly lived in the family's truck, and with their situation coinciding with the government shutdown, Robinson said assistance was tough to come by.

In late January, the family left Hahnville, and Louisiana, behind after Robinson, who

Hundreds of new laws slated for enactment

As the state stretches its governmental legs in this new fiscal year that commenced July 1, departments and agencies are preparing to enact, in some cases shape and most importantly enforce hundreds of news laws that were approved during the recent regular session.

On Thursday, Aug. 1, a large portion of the policymaking yield from the session will become law, courtesy of 254 bills endorsed by the House, Senate and governor.

All around the state there are roadways about to be renamed, like a portion of LA 34 in Jackson Parish that will become the “Second Lieutenant Harvel Moore Memorial Highway” at the beginning of next month. New regulations and guidelines will also be put forth to address hazing, human trafficking, real estate transactions, care in animal shelters and school safety reporting requirements, to name just a few issues that originated as bills and eventually became acts.

The laws effective Aug. 1 represent roughly 60 percent of the 423 bills passed through the process this past spring, with 282 originating in the House and 141 in the Senate. More than 100 acts from the regular session have already taken hold, while the remainder have varying effective dates that stretch into 2020 or, in certain instances, will depend upon the passage of constitutional amendments.

Funds and fees to bankroll government operations will be created on Aug. 1 as well, alongside a slew of new prestige license plates that drivers will be able to pay extra for, like the upcoming “War of 1812” and “Spanish Heritage” plates. The definition of an abortion will be revised, updated guidelines for post-conviction DNA testing will be triggered and it will become a crime to threaten a law enforcement officer via social media.

A family member of a slain law enforcement officer will also finally be allowed to purchase their loved one’s duty firearm upon death come Aug. 1. The state’s land-based casino in New Orleans will likewise enter into its new operating contract, enhanced labeling for milk products will be launched and all of the costs related to prospective bond, debt and tax elections will have to be disclosed and published.

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Robison case will be heard in St. Charles Parish

LHSAA appeals denied by judge

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The lawsuit filed by the family of former Hahnville High School quarterback Andrew Robison against the Louisiana High School Athletic Association (LHSAA) will be heard in St. Charles Parish, as result of two appeals by the organization being denied.

State appellate Judge Robert Chaisson denied motions by LHSAA representatives, one to have the case dismissed and a second to have the case tried in Baton Rouge. The lawsuit was filed last year in St. Charles Parish, and now the case will be heard there at a date still to be determined. Judge Timothy Marcel will preside.

The lawsuit alleges the LHSAA violated Robison's constitutional rights last year when it ruled the then-senior ineligible to compete in any Hahnville athletics following his transfer from Vandebilt Catholic to Hahnville.

The ruling came the week of Hahnville's jamboree exhibition to open the season, and what followed was a long back and forth battle between Robison – and Hahnville – against the prep governing entity.

The quarterback has since signed to continue his

football career at Nicholls State. His senior season was all but lost as result of the ruling, which sidelined him for Hahnville's first nine regular season games.

Before the Tigers' 10th game, Robison, whose appeal to the LHSAA was denied, won an arbitration appeal allowing him to return for the remainder of the season. The arbitrator ruled Hahnville, accused of recruiting Robison, committed no wrongdoings and that the Robison family completed a legitimate move from Houma to live in St. Charles Parish.

Robison helped lead Hahnville to two wins, including a road victory over No. 9 seeded Walker in the opening round of the Class 5A playoffs, but the Tigers bowed out to eventual state champion Zachary in round two.

He arrived at Hahnville with fanfare, as he had established himself as one of the state's most prolific passers at Vandebilt Catholic.

But Vandebilt did not renew the contract of Robison's father, Drew, before the teen's senior year. Drew Robison had served as the offensive coordinator of Vandebilt's football team and also head basketball coach, and the younger Robison would transfer shortly after.

does commercial roofing work was relocated by his company to Crescent, Texas. The transition hasn't been easy in the midst of so much upheaval.

"I can't say things have gotten totally better," Robinson said with a sigh. "Work is still slow, which has added to the stress of the situation. We were here about a month before we were able to get into a place ... but that didn't work out, and we're back in a hotel again. The little work I'm getting, and the same for what my wife earns at her job, is going right back to the hotel."

As they looked for a place to live, there were some who tried to take advantage of their situation.

"The guy said he was the landlord, but he had to go back to California to be with his son, who was ill," Robinson said. "He'd ask if we could send the money out to him, the key would be there waiting ... there was another situation where the guys were, with me at work, pressuring my wife to show up without me, all these things to get her to go by herself. We put an end to that, but it was creepy ... really nerve wracking."

While the Robinsons avoided falling prey with their money, it did little to lift spirits.

"It's discouraging. You lose everything, then you have people out there who will try to scam you out of the little you do have," Robinson said. "They tried everything. And now we're trying everything on our end to get back on our feet."

Among those efforts is a GoFundMe page he posted on behalf of his family (a Hahnville posting titled my family lost our home on Dec. 28, put up just after the family had lost its home). He admits he wasn't sure about doing so – or how it would ultimately work – but options are scarce.

"We don't have family nearby," he said. "My wife's mother passed away recently. I'm originally from California. It's not to say the family we do have didn't reach out ... but it's different to have someone right there versus not having anyone nearby."

Of the friends he has back in the Hahnville community, some were planning hurricane evacuations while Barry was closing in. The experience is something he hopes to never have to deal with again, and one he says he wouldn't wish on anyone.

"We're keeping high spirits," he said. "Trying to let God work. But it's difficult, no question. You can't help but feel the way you feel."

Court in session

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Destrehan resident argues parish is ignoring a safety hazard in a public servitude

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A Destrehan resident and St. Charles Parish government are at odds over removing two trees in a legal disagreement that’s lingered nearly eight months.

Destrehan resident Victor Buccola has again asked the parish to remove the trees because they are in a 20-foot drainage servitude behind 107 Burguières Lane.

At the July 1 Council meeting, Buccola again approached the council with the request for help with the trees.

Parish Risk Management Officer Rechell Champagne has told Buccola that the trees are owned by abutting property owner Frank Abbate at 173 Longview Drive and he should remove them. They are growing in the parish’s 20-foot drainage servitude, but Champagne said the servitude is for drainage only and “there is no evidence that the two trees impede the drainage flow” so “it would be a civil matter between property owners.”

But Buccola responded, “The civil law remedy you have suggested unnecessarily pits private landowners against each other, when in fact the parish of St. Charles is the responsible party given the fact these two trees are completely within a publicly recorded dedicated drainage servitude.”

But he maintains when the parish accepted the servitude without requiring the developer remove these trees, it also accepted responsibility for the trees. Buccola further argued the parish is legally obligated to police and maintain it and that includes caring for objects in the servitudes such as trees.

At the May 6 council meeting, Councilman Paul Hogan also questioned is this was a matter for Risk Management.

Parish Public Works Director Clayton “Snookie” Fauchaux said it is, but Buccola maintained the law requires the parish’s governing authority to make the determination on a case-by-case basis.

“Like it or not, SCP government accepts responsibility for trees growing within the public servitudes when the servitudes over private land are dedicated to the parish for maintenance,” Buccola said. “This council cannot shirk its responsibility to scrutinize this situation and make its own determination by simply ceding its power and authority to any single employee or any



other official or public body.”

Also, in an attempt to reach a compromise, Buccola attempted unsuccessfully to reach Abbate.

Despite the parish government’s position, he argued the tree removal is necessary, particularly when one of the two - an oak estimated at 45 to 50 feet tall - is leaning toward and hanges over property where his daughter plans on building a house.

Additionally, he argued the law obligates the parish to maintain and police the servitude, which includes tree removal as part of maintenance when necessary.

In November of last year, Buccola had then LSU Ag Agent Rene’ Schmit inspect the trees.

According to Schmit’s report, the oak is “a significant safety hazard due to its angle of weighted lean to the eastern side. This lean is greater than a 45-degree pitch and will remain ongoing.” He recommended removing the tree, particularly as “limbs are expected to continue growing and further cause the tree to lean.”

The timeline

- » **Dec. 4, 2018:** Victor Buccola sends an email to parish government requesting removal of two trees.
- » **Jan. 17:** Buccola meets with the parish’s Risk Management officer to discuss the removal.
- » **June 19:** Risk Management Officer Rechell Champagne advises Buccola it’s a civil matter between property owners. He responds by saying

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St. Charles Borromeo Church’s roots date back 296 years

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Built on the West Bank by the Capuchin priests in 1723, the Little Red Church was long ago claimed by fire but evolved into the symbol of strength and faith that now stands as St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church in Destrehan.

The church was relocated to the East Bank in 1740, this time standing as a log cabin church, said Ronald Rodrigue, the church’s administrative assistant. When it burned down 66 years later, it was replaced with a new wood-framed church painted red (the Little Red Church). In 1877, an arsonist set fire to the church rectory destroying most of the records dating back to colonial times.

By 1921, a new St. Charles Borromeo Church was built and dedicated a year later. The Little Red Church remained on the church grounds for years and was torn down.

“I am convinced that the key to the long existence of our Catholic church parish is a well-balanced diversity of families who have taken ownership in our spiritual home,” said Rodrigue. “We are not afraid of getting our hands dirty and are willing to work hard to protect the many blessings our gracious Lord has provided in this ‘Parish of Plenty.’”

The parish’s longevity is based on a “culmination of many generations of Catholic families,” Rodrigue said. “As we live together as a faith community strengthened by the Sacraments, we begin to understand the importance of God’s existence in our lives from birth to death. Consequently, we have a very strong Catholic school and cemetery nestled in this tranquil, peaceful environment we call home.”

St. Charles Borromeo church, with its Spanish style architecture, also represents “strength and stability in both the construction and faith of the people that have worshipped inside its protective walls for many generations,” he said. “These buildings have survived many hurricanes and a few explosions from nearby industries. It does present maintenance and new construction challenges because costs have increased greatly in recent decades and the skills available to reproduce these structures are difficult to find.”

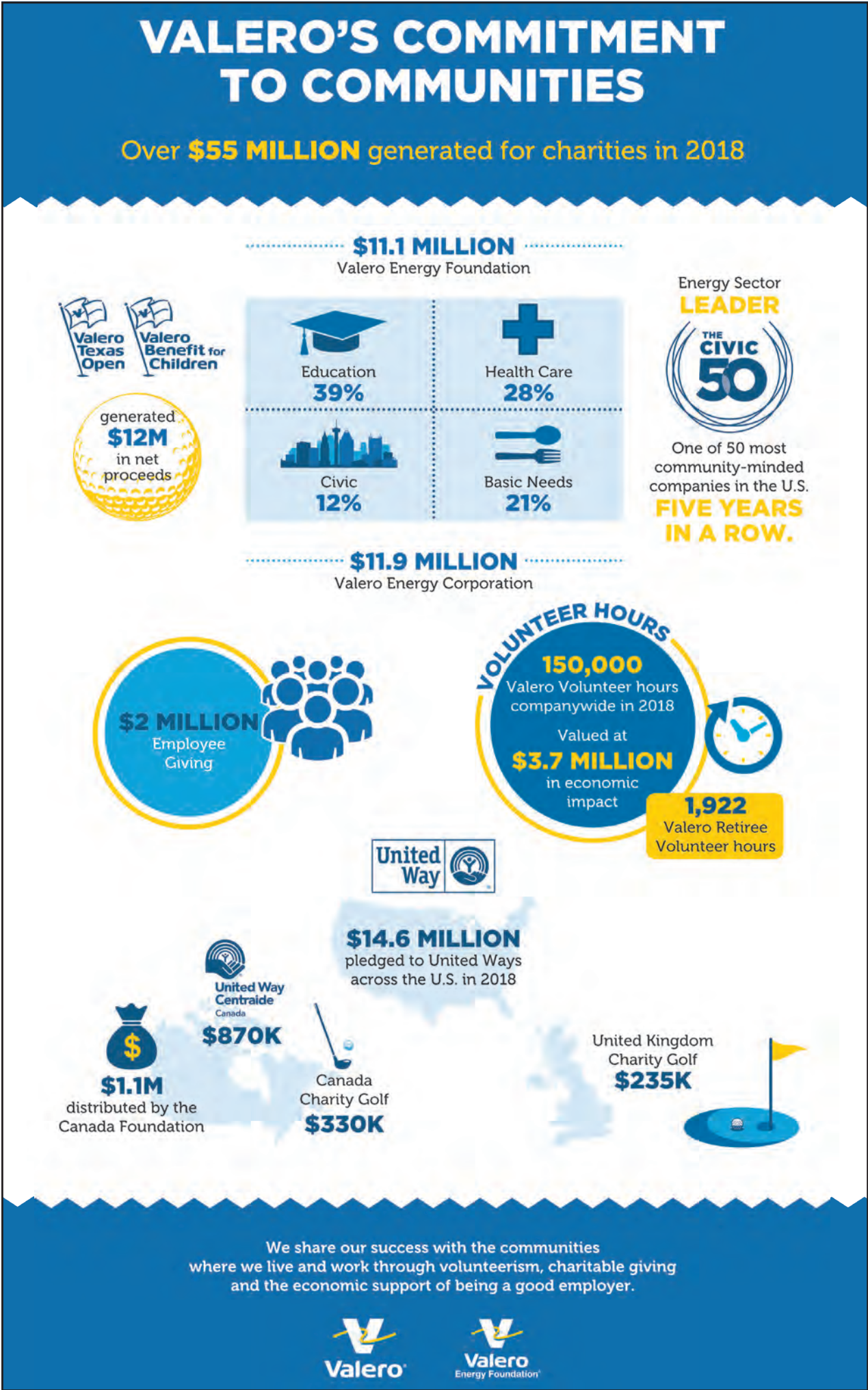


The new St. Charles Borromeo Church was dedicated on Jan. 25, 1922.

The baby survived just a few hours, but Murla said the family has been determined to raise awareness about anencephaly, which causes the absence of a major portion of the brain, skull and scalp that occurs during embryonic development. These children are typically born blind, deaf, unaware of surroundings and unable to feel pain. The disease has been connected to low folic acid, although medical professionals debate its cause and hereditary connection.

“Without those 17 hours, we wouldn’t have been able to raise awareness,” Murla said. “It’s really been a blessing that Luke is able to touch and raise awareness long after his short life.”

Luke’s parents, Alexandra Manguno and Chris Ditta of Harvey, knew their son had anencephaly from one of his early ultrasounds. Doctors encouraged them to abort the fetus, but the couple declined. Their son lived longer than most babies with the disease and many are stillborn, yet they still hoped for more time.

The child was born weighing 3 pounds, 8 ounces.
During their brief time with Luke, the couple felt his tiny hand squeeze their fingers.
“They made it a point to have skin-to-skin

contact so he knew he was loved,” Murla said. “He actually passed in my sister’s arms.”
But in that time, they responded as a family to the tragic loss.
“That is part of the beauty of what Luke was,” he said. “He probably brought out strength in all of us that we didn’t know existed. The strength is not to take the easy way, not aborting the baby and knowing you’ll have to say goodbye to your child.”
At Luke’s service nearly two weeks ago, Murla also wrote a poem for him and read it at the funeral.
“Luke you are now an Angel so spread your wings and fly,” he wrote. “And on occasion come visit and dry an eye. Thank You Lord for giving us this beautiful gift albeit brief. Now please lay your healing hands on Alex and Chris and soothe their pain and grief.”

Murla set up a GoFundMe account to help his parents with medical and burial costs, but he said it was also aimed at raising awareness about anencephaly.
With Luke’s passing, the family mobilized to help move on with the burial and reach out to the public that he said has drawn “one blessing after another.”

His parents have made contact with the Anencephaly Hope Public Group, which assisted the couple. They spread the word in the media about taking precautions, which can include taking folic acid.
“It reaffirms how precious a gift life is and how much an impact it can be,” Murla said. “Time is long, but life is short, and any life can have a great impact.”

Anencephaly awareness

- » Anencephaly is a serious birth defect in which a baby is born without parts of the brain and skull.
- » Getting enough folic acid before and during early pregnancy can help prevent neural tube defects, such as anencephaly. Since the U.S. began fortifying grains with folic acid, there has been a 28 percent decline in pregnancies affected by neural tube defects (spina bifida and anencephaly).
- » Anencephaly can be diagnosed during pregnancy or after the baby is born. The disease would result in an abnormal result on a blood or serum screening test or it might be seen during an ultrasound (which creates pictures of the body).
- » There is no known cure or standard treatment for anencephaly. Almost all babies born with it will die shortly after birth.

Association (NCA), which has served as the unincorporated area’s leadership since it was formed. As the group’s founding president for 24 years, he has represented an organization that has sought to make it a better place to live and work, as well as be accepted by St.

Charles Parish.

At age 90, though, the “mayor” has announced he is retiring effective Aug. 27 when the NCA names its new president.

“Needless to say, I don’t feel very good because it has become such an active part of my life, and I know I will really miss it,” Digirolamo said. “However, for the good for the association, it’s time for me to give it up.”

Although retiring as head of the organization, he will stay on as president emeritus in hopes of seeing the completion of the Norco Revitalization Program, which is now in its fifth phase funded by Shell’s Norco Economic Development Foundation.

“The one item that I’m very excited about is the establishing of the Norco

Town Square, which will be owned, maintained and upgraded by the NCA,” he said. “Current plans are to have a display honoring all Norco veterans and a marker commemorating the visit of President Franklin Roosevelt to Norco in 1937.”

He envisions the town square serving as a central location for Norco, which Digirolamo said they hope will help revitalize the area, which he said was once a bustling economic hub.

Digirolamo still wants to improve some of Norco’s older homes and businesses, and especially hopes to do the same for some of the area’s less fortunate people.

“Norco is a very old community and with the influx of new citizens and their input our goals are fluid and continually changing,” he said.

Improving drainage has been and continues to be a top item on his list of area projects.

“Over the years we have worked with the parish and tried many different ideas,” he said. “However we still have some homes that flood and that is unacceptable.”

Despite improvements, the area still floods, he said.

“We still have drainage problems, however, I do think when the current plan in place is complete our drainage system will prevent homes from flooding,” Digirolamo said.

Aided by the 305-member NCA, Digirolamo said if he’s achieved anything

it’s because he was surrounded by “people that are better than you and I must say that was the one thing I was best at doing.”

Under his leadership, the NCA welcomed industry.

“Over the years, we have shown that industry and communities can safely co-exist and improve our way of life by protecting our environment and through awarding community grants, manpower, providing playgrounds throughout Norco, etc.,” he said.

The NCA also started the Handy Man Committee, which provides services to those in need, such as handicap ramps and small home repairs. A beautification committee handles upkeep of flower beds and installs seasonal banners and more. It re-established the Norco Christmas Parade, and is in the process of creating a restrictive covenants committee to handle code violations.

Digirolamo’s success with improving Norco comes from his deep roots there.

“When you are doing things you really enjoy with people that really care, being president for 24 years was fun and very hard to give up,” he said. “I wish I could have stayed longer, but I could tell it was time to give it up. It’s not just the many things we were able to accomplish but the many close friendships that developed and the joy of working with so

many that really cared about Norco and not for personnel gain.”

Shell spokeswoman Rochelle Touchard agreed.

“There is something special about growing up in Norco,” Touchard said. “You don’t have to ask Mr. Sal to explain that. You just have to spend a little time with him and you’ll understand that his Norco roots produced a man driven by an incredible love and passion for his hometown. His commitment to family is always first but his community concern and pride never fades. Some people might call him a pillar of the community but I think of him as a foundation. Thanking him for lifelong service goes without saying. My only question would be ‘How can we find big shoes like yours to fill?’”

Digirolamo thanked his wife, Deanie, for her support to him as NCA president. He also wanted to name fellow NCA founders: Ronald St. Pierre, Gerald Songy, Alex H. Livingston, A.J. “Buddy” Chauvin, Nick Digirolamo, Lynn “Tony” Louviere Sr., J.P. “Paul” Mire and Fru Waguespack. Most of them are deceased while St. Pierre has relocated.

“Norco is in my opinion is a great place to live and work and I would like to see it stay that way,” he said. “One big happy family.”

meetings this year, has also persistently questioned Cochran’s move to grant the holiday.

“I oppose it because a holiday is a day that’s common to everybody and more specifically a day commemorating a special event,” said the councilman. “It’s just ironic this policy is put in place at the beginning of an election year.”

The election primary, which includes the parish president seat, is Oct. 12. Cochran has announced he will seek a second term in office.

This year, Cochran issued an ongoing policy of allowing full-time civil service and appointed employees to receive a day off for their birthday. In addition to the holidays recognized and approved by the Civil Service Board, the board has also adopted rules which have stated that the parish president may declare additional holidays at his discretion.

Adrienne Bourgeois, the parish’s interim public information officer, added, “With the idea of avoiding the complete closure of parish government on one designated day, Parish President Cochran felt that this policy was a proper way to balance honoring of our devoted parish employees and maintaining an efficient and productive government for our residents.”

The parish has 750 employees with 552 of them being full time. Total budgeted cost for employees with benefits for 2019 is \$46 million.
In a May 30 opinion to Hogan, Parish

attorney Robert Raymond states the parish president has authority under the Home Rule Charter as chief executive officer of the parish and is responsible for administration of all parish departments, which includes oversight of parish employees. The Home Rule Charter provides for a Civil Service System governed by its board with duties that include assisting the parish president on maintenance and improvement of personnel standards. It has stated the parish president can declare additional holidays at his or her discretion.

This is the first time an additional “holiday” or day off with pay has been granted that Hogan can recall in his 12 years on the council.
“It appears to me to be an attempt to buy votes, as I see it,” he said. “Otherwise, this would have been a policy in place for years.”

A day with pay

He was found by animal control officer Jessica White, who brought Thomas back with her to the animal shelter, as well as his fallen friend, so the pit bull would feel comfortable leaving.
Upon arriving at the shelter, he was diagnosed with heartworm disease. He began receiving treatment, and soon began to raise his profile and popularity at shelter events, where he became something of an ambassador.

Troxler brought Thomas to an adoption event held at Lakeside Mall, and he was a hit with those in attendance.
“He was a perfect gentleman that day,” Troxler said. “He quietly laid by my feet, even with kittens we brought for the adoption day. One of the workers there that day recently came with her children to visit the shelter and asked if Thomas had been adopted.”
The answer to that question was no, at that point in time. But after his public debut, Thomas went on to make appearances with Troxler at high school and middle school career days as she highlighted veterinary medicine, and also at parish summer camps. Of course, he was a popular name called during visits to the St. Charles shelter as well, and people loved to take the friendly canine out for a walk. Children adore him, which made him a prime go-to for public events.
Still, while Thomas had won the hearts of both staff and volunteers at the shelter, he was overlooked for more than

six months as he waited for a family to call his own.
That is why there was plenty of joy to go around recently when shelter workers received the news: Thomas had officially been adopted by a new family in Virginia Beach.
Thomas was part of a recent transport of nearly 30 dogs to the Virginia Beach SPCA in search of prospective adopters

for longtime shelter pets. It took just three days on the adoption floor for Thomas to find his new home.
“I know there are a lot of happy tears being shed right now for him at the St. Charles shelter,” said Suzy Swims of the Virginia Beach SPCA. “He’s everybody’s favorite boy.”

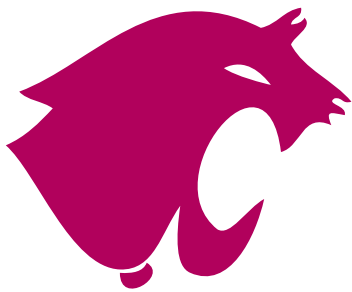

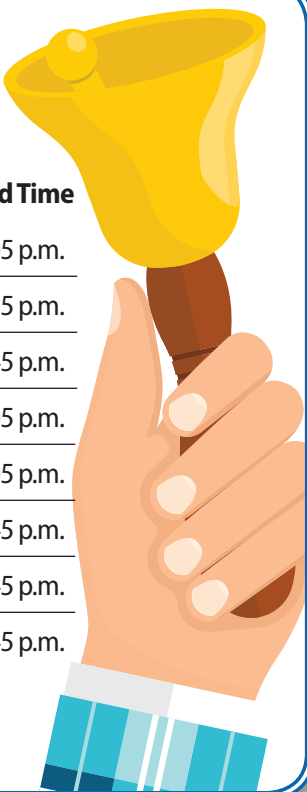

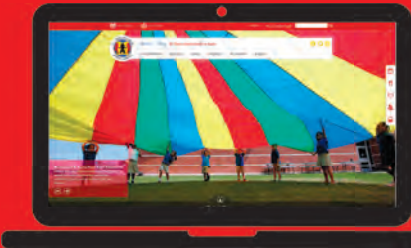
- **Shirt** – collared white or designated school color shirt. (Elementary students may wear official school spirit shirts as designated by the school.)

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Faster start will be critical for Tigers in 2019

Will end regular season with Jesuit, Destrehan

Nick Saltaformaggio's Hahnville teams have long established a distinct trend – his Tigers find their way early, absorb a few lumps along the way, and finish the regular season with a fury.

While it's surely caused some early season headaches for Saltaformaggio and his coaching staff, it hasn't been such a bad deal for Hahnville, which has effectively entered each postseason with great momentum and established as a legitimate threat.

But upon review of the Tigers 2019 schedule, Saltaformaggio said that another slow start is, flat out, not an option.

"We have to find a way to win early, because the back half of our schedule is really rough," said Saltaformaggio, now heading into his sixth season as Hahnville head coach. "If we do what I think we're capable of doing, I think it'll be a really strong season. But we'll know early on ... if we start 1-3, 2-3 again, we're probably not a playoff team."

Off the bat, one will notice the biggest difference in the schedule comes with the annual Hahnville-Destrehan super rivalry matchup. For the past four seasons, that game has kicked off District 7-5A play for both teams.

This year? Week 10 – the final week of the regular season.

Were both teams to play to their peak, that could well be a district championship matchup with even more hype – is that even possible? – than usual. But for a coach rightfully most concerned about his team's best avenue for success, Saltaformaggio says he could have done without the clash falling on Week 10.

"Honestly, I don't like it, because we play Destrehan a week before the playoffs, if we qualify," Saltaformaggio said. "We're playing them a week after our district bye, and that's gonna be no picnic, either."

Much as Destrehan did for its bye over the past two seasons, Hahnville found a

Week 9 dance partner in Jesuit.

"It's hard to set a game for that bye when you're Hahnville," Saltaformaggio said. "You've got Jesuit/Destrehan waiting in those final weeks. We have to win early on, or we'll leave ourselves in a bad position."

Hahnville opens with road games against Denham Springs and Mandeville before returning to Boutte for its home opener against Higgins.

Denham Springs, who HHS defeated in the opening round of the Class 5A post-season in 2017, has continued to improve, while Mandeville boasts Division I talent on its offense at quarterback and receiver.

Both teams air the ball out and figure to be a trial by fire for a Hahnville secondary that Saltaformaggio said has a lot to prove this season.

"Where we are right now, we have to get better in the secondary," Saltaformaggio said. "It's a weak point until we prove otherwise."

Hahnville will open district play against a Terrebonne team that went 9-1 last season, then HHS will host East St. John. Both opponents handed Hahnville difficult losses in 2018.

"Terrebonne beat us 41-0, and East St. John won 21-7 in a game that honestly wasn't as close as that score indicates," Saltaformaggio said. "We have to find a way to have success in those games and give ourselves a chance."

Parish hoops camp next week

Focuses on improving fundamentals

As is an annual tradition in St. Charles Parish, when Brian Lumar hosts the parish's Parks and Recreation summer basketball camp next week, all of the lessons taught will revolve around a simple core philosophy – and one that's led Lumar to plenty of success over the years.

"Play hard, play smart and play together," Lumar said. "If you live by those three things, you'll be successful no matter what you do."

The camp will be held July 23-26 at the Edward Dufresne Community Center, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day. It is open to all boys and girls ages 6-16.

The campers will be grouped according to age and talent level, making it a destination both for beginners and those looking to take another step in their ongoing development.

"It doesn't matter if you've never played together or if you're real good," Lumar said. "Everyone will be taught, observed and corrected in all phases of the game. We do as much as we can in a week, and by the end everyone's had a fabulous time."

Passing, dribbling, rebounding, defense and shooting are those central phases. Campers will participate in different drills after receiving instruction, while there will also be competitions to keep things lively and fresh throughout the week – five on five and three on three games and free throw competitions among the examples.

The camp has been held since the opening of the community center, and Lumar has experience conducting basketball camps extending long before then.

He brings plenty of knowledge to the table, having excelled both as a player and a coach. The Hahnville High principal is enshrined in the Loyola University Hall of Fame as a player and led Hahnville High to two state finals as head basketball coach, one of those seasons netting him state

Whether on the court or in the classroom, Lumar enjoys spreading his knowledge to the next generation.

“I love teaching kids,” he said. “I had the opportunity to play and find success. What people don’t always realize is it’s not always about who runs the fastest or jumps the highest, but who’s able to be fundamentally sound in all phases. That’s what can really get you over the hump.”

Hahnville goes on the road in Week 7 for a matchup with Thibodaux. Then the Tigers host three in a row against Central Lafourche, H.L. Bourgeois and Jesuit, before going to Destrehan to close the season.

Saltaformaggio said success early on – or at any point in the season, realistically – will come down to cleaning up the team’s weaknesses from a

year ago. Turnovers, penalties and mental errors cost Hahnville chances in several games, and the team will have to shore up its kicking game early after the departure of both its placekicker and punter from 2018.

This Tigers team will be more experienced than the 2018 squad, however, with several key players returning on both sides of the football.

While the schedule is a difficult one, the presence of several teams Saltaformaggio feels are a threat to post strong records is a positive, both from the standpoint of testing his team and from one of garnering power points and playoff seeding, he said.

“You’d love to go 10-0, but I’d rather go 8-2 or 7-3, but with a top 8 or so seed, than unbeaten and losing playoff positioning,” Saltaformaggio said. “With the non-district opponents, you’d like to win them all, but if you can even beat two of Jesuit, Mandeville and Denham, that will get you a lot of points.”

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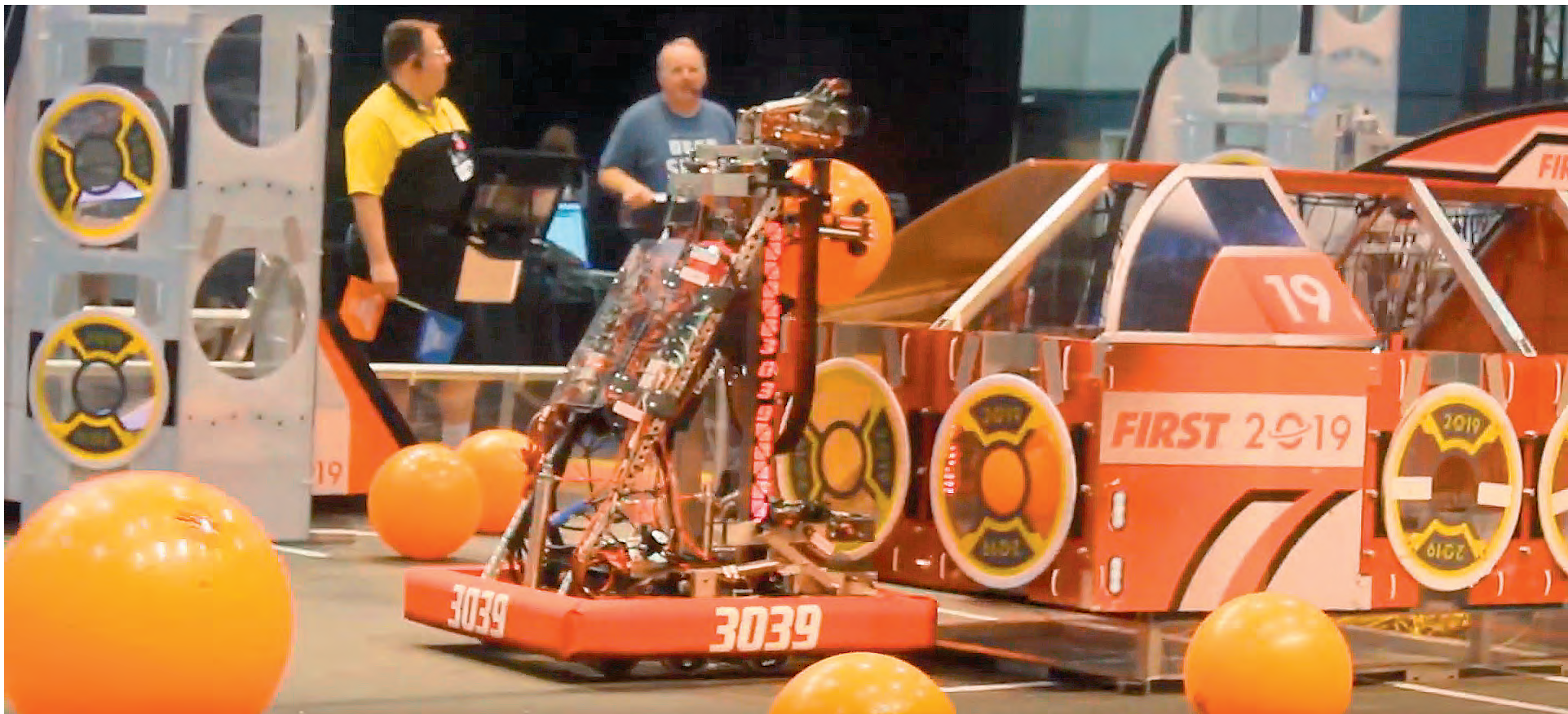
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This is more than just robots

Brian Young's job is mechanical, but it comes with a profound sense of satisfaction over his students being so excited about DHS Robotics and S.T.E.M. initiatives that they keep working on projects after hours.

"We don't just want to be great," said Young. "We want to spark the interest of S.T.E.M. to the younger kids, and we work really hard to do that. As long as we're reaching younger kids, we feel like we're doing a good deed."

It shows in what Young has described as their "most prolific season in school history" with multiple wins in the region. These students also help inspire younger children to consider the program.

Young, who teaches electricity and electronics at Destrehan High School, realized that all around him are children enthralled with technology like cell phones, flat screens or X-Boxes, but don't often know how they're designed or built.

This isn't real world experience, and he's about that in a big way in the classroom.

"Our robot embodies every aspect of S.T.E.M. from math to science in technology, and we hit everything," Young said. "We use all those four letters. The robot is the final product."

Some 22 years in a classroom at Destrehan High School has taught Young about the importance of students

- » Young had no plans on becoming a teacher, but after two rounds of layoffs in the mid-1980s oil glut he decided to find another job.
- » He saw an electronics instructor position advertised at a local junior college and applied. He got the job and nine months later was named head of the Electrical Engineering Technology Department.
- » In 1998, Young joined Destrehan High School as a teacher and has been there since.

doing the First Robotics Team and S.T.E.M. camps taking them a significant level higher. Global studies show an estimated 75 percent of students who did it were more successful in the S.T.E.M. program in college, as well as helped guide them into S.T.E.M. career fields.

"S.T.E.M. is like the greatest program in the world," he said. "It gives these kids a challenge and it strains the brain, and it makes them a more viable person who succeeds in the real world."

And Young is about his students making it in the real world, posing a fine line between just quitting or thinking through the problem. But there's also ensuring the quality of the product and meeting expectations, which the students respond well to in the class.

“In these camps and on my team, they can take what they learn and we supe it up and apply it to the real world,” he said. “We can design and trouble shoot it. You can quit and cry or you can fight through the problems and get it to work.”

With an engineering background and degree, Young knows firsthand why it works. Although he didn’t see himself becoming a teacher early on, he did come to see S.T.E.M.’s importance for students and also realized he loved teaching.

“People say I’m into this, but I don’t see it,” he said. “I’m just being myself.”

Young worries people may see him as cocky, but he feels strongly about others seeing his robotics team as a strong one. And he wants the team to legitimately feel the same inside, too.

“I try to send a real-world message to my students and telling them to look deep into the mirror at their inner soul and asking them, ‘are you the kind of guy that Shell or Valero would pay \$100,000 to?,”’ he said. “I try to motivate students who don’t want to do it, and give them more about life and how they can be successful.”

Much of this philosophy came to Young when he taught at junior college and witnessed men repeatedly coming there to up their careers because they were unhappy with doing what they were doing until retirement. They worked in chemical plants, but as painters or plumbers, and when he asked them why they were coming to school he got the same answer – “They realized this is what they’re doing until 65 years old.”

He wanted to pass this knowledge to his students in hopes they would not make the same mistake, and he’s seen it work even in the hard cases.

“I try to be brutally honest with them,” Young said. “It seems to have worked for me.”

Young conceded he could not make a student good, but he could motivate them to want to be good. Additionally, he realized how happy it makes him to see his students succeed.

“If they’re not happy, it hard for me to be happy,” he said. “Everybody has their day. I’m 59 years old and I’m not a spring chicken anymore, but when I leave I want people to say, “That guy there did a good job teaching our kids, promoting S.T.E.M. in our schools through the DHS robotics program and the S.T.E.M. outreach programs.”

This DHS teacher believes he’s not ready for the pasture yet, but has a few more things he wants to do first. He’s reflecting on those successes, and can’t help but be happy when he see students coming every day to work on robotics.

“That’s their home,” Young said with pride. “They’re working on a new project and practicing on 3-D modeling skills. They’re working on a second robot for the Mississippi competition coming up next week. I think you know you’ve established a good culture when students still come to the workshop and still work.”

The 2019-2020 application for Free/Reduced Price Meals is available online at www.MySchoolApps.com. Applying online is the fastest and most efficient way to apply for meal benefits. However, paper meal applications may be obtained from the school cafeteria or the Child Nutrition Department. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out one application for the household and return it to the school. Complete either a paper application or an on-line application, but not both. Additional paper copies are available at each school. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. The information provided by the household is confidential; it will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Information may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

All children in households with any household member receiving benefits under Assistance Programs (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Family Independence Temporary Assistance Program (FITAP) or Food Distribution Programs on Indian Reservations (FDPIR)) are eligible for free meals. For school officials to determine eligibility, each household that is now receiving benefits from Assistance Programs must provide the case number of a household member as well as the signature of an adult household member.

All other households must provide the following information on the application: names of all household members; the amount of income (before deductions for taxes, Social Security, etc.) that each household member receives; now often the person receives the income; where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare; the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct; and the last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member who signed the application, or a statement that the household member does not possess one.

Children categorized as foster, homeless, runaway, migrant, or enrolled in state-funded Head Start or Even Start programs, if known, are automatically eligible for free meals. School officials will determine eligibility for free meals based on documentation obtained directly from the program office and notify the household of their eligibility for benefits. The household must notify the school if it chooses to decline benefits. The household should complete an application if they are not notified of free meal eligibility by August 5, 2019.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for meal benefits.
