WWII vet laid to rest after remains found

Died at Pearl Harbor after battleship struck by torpedoes

Jack Stumbo had mixed emotions while attending the burial ceremony of his great uncle and World War II veteran, Leonard Gellar. For those in attendance, it combined the somberness of a funeral with something of a joyful feeling that Gellar would be at rest — finally.

Gellar died in service of his country, one of more than 2,400 Americans killed in the attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. Gellar was stationed on the battleship USS Oklahoma, which

was moored at Ford Island. It suffered multiple torpedo hits, causing the ship to sink and claim the lives of 429 of its crewmen, including 21-year-old Gellar.

In January of 2018, his remains were found, and soon after, Stumbo learned of his ancestor and his bravery. This month, he and his family traveled to Hawaii to see Gellar honored and his remains laid to rest alongside several of his fellow USS Oklahoma

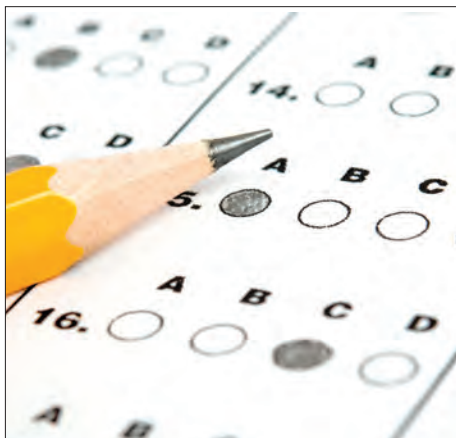

shipmen. “It felt really surreal,” said Stumbo, of Luling and a student at Hahnville High School. “Knowing he was just 21 when he died ... I mean, I’m 17.

School system ranks in Top 10 in LEAP mastery

St. Charles Parish Public Schools ranked seventh in the state in 2018-19 LEAP scores for the number of students in mastery and above, finishing among the top performing school systems in Louisiana.

Some 47 percent of students rated in “mastery, and above” down 3 percent from last year’s 50 percent in parish schools. The figure outperformed the state’s average of 35 percent.

LEAP scores are indicators of how well students in grades three through eight are performing in the basics – math, English and the language arts, and social studies.

In English and Language Arts results,



Students in mastery dropped to 54 percent this year from 61 percent the year prior. The state-wide figure is 44 percent.

58-lot subdivision planned for Destrehan

The St. Charles Parish Planning Commission will consider an estimated \$10 million development planned for Destrehan at its Aug. 1 meeting.

Businessman Todd Trosclair announced plans to pursue the project in April and is seeking approval for construction on a 75.6-acre tract of land.

The project calls for a 58-lot subdivision on 13100 River Road in Destrehan, which would

be called Saints Place. Also planned is a 17-lot light industrial park on 20 acres west of 405 Alpha Drive in Destrehan, extending towards I-310 along the south side of the railroad tracks.

Trosclair’s 310 Development LLC is named as the applicant for the subdivision. The company and P&L Investments in Destrehan are named as applicants for Plantation Business

Officer killed in line of duty remembered on anniversary of death

Deputy was responding to disturbance when attacked

Entering the police force carries the kind of risk that few are willing to take on, yet those who wear the badge do just that in the name of service.

That’s why those in the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office won’t allow the name of Deputy James Alan Arterbury to be forgotten.

July marks the anniversary of Arterbury’s death 46 years ago, when he lost his life at the age of 24 while responding to a disturbance at a Killona bar, the Nite Cap Lounge. He was the second St. Charles Parish officer to be killed in the line of duty.

When Arterbury entered the bar room on Independence Day of 1973, several people attacked him. According to court records, he arrived at approximately 8:30 p.m. that night and found an unruly crowd waiting. Arterbury returned to his truck, called for assistance, and retrieved his shotgun from the trunk.

When he walked toward the crowd, keeping the muzzle of the gun pointed skyward, the crowd became belligerent and surrounded Arterbury. Someone in the crowd grabbed the shotgun and shot it into the air. In the commotion, another man grabbed the deputy’s revolver from his holster.

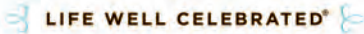

Treat immigrants with dignity

The following is an open letter from Rev. Deth Im, director of Training and Development for Faith in Action, urging us to treat all immigrant with Christlike dignity.

“My family immigrated to the U.S. in 1973, before war and genocide destroyed Cambodia. As I reflect on my immigrant experience, I’m grateful that time and again, I was blessed to be in relationship with people who treated me as neighbor rather than as other. To be clear, there have been times when I’ve been

‘otherized.’ Once in college, I was filling up my gas tank and a car drove by in which a guy yelled out the window, ‘Stupid Chink, go back to where you came from. We don’t want you here.’ The guys in that car saw me as other; that is, as different from them. Since I am different, they could treat me differently. Often to treat someone as other is to treat them without dignity. “Othering” can mean offering different resources to different people. It can be used to determine who is worthy and who is not. Tragically, it can result in the loss of life when someone determines that people are so different they deserve death such as what happened to Jewish congregants

at the Tree of Life Synagogue.”

There’s a revealing story in Christian scripture found in Luke 24:13-35. Two disciples were sad and scared, because they watched their teacher get murdered. As they were walking, their teacher joins them, but they do not recognize him. Then something beautiful happens. They invite this stranger who had joined them on the road to share a meal with them and it is at this point their eyes are truly opened.

Notice their actions include rather than ostracize. There were no preconditions for inclusion.

Minor movements in race
for House speaker

In recent internal House elections, at least, the job of speaker has been filled by a few unlikely contenders, or rather the guy no one saw coming.

That’s why the decision by Rep. Johnny Berthelot, R-Gonzales, a quiet and unassuming maybe-candidate for speaker, to not run for re-election helps solidify the developing field perhaps a little better than when the summer started.

To be certain, House Natural Resources Chairman Stuart Bishop, R-Lafayette, continues to raise money aggressively heading into the peak of election season. The chairman held a fundraiser in Lafayette last week that was attended by roughly 250 people, including a few government relations pros who made the drive over from Baton Rouge.

Sources close to Bishop’s bid say more than \$100,000 was for his re-election campaign, but the event served as a venue for the chairman to discuss his real goals.

Rep. Sherman Mack, R-Albany, is said to be making some inroads in his quest for the big gavel. A handful of prominent business leaders have taken an interest in his candidacy and some of those boosters are beginning to meet with lawmakers on Mack’s behalf. The real factor to watch for is when the leading candidates and their backers start merging with the interests and intentions of the gubernatorial candidates, which may already be happening at least on some level.

Also said to be looking at the top post are GOP Reps. Lance Harris of Alexandria, Alan Seabaugh of Shreveport, Barry Ivey of Central and a host of others. In an unexpected twist of legislative politics, a state House seat based in Lafayette will not have an incumbent in place by the time this fall’s elections roll around. Rep. Nancy Landry, R-Lafayette, has resigned from her post and is now the new chief of staff for Secretary of State Kyle Ardoin.

Already there are three contenders eyeing the seat, including former candidate and businessman Gus Rantz, energy executive Jim Dore and Jonathan Goudeau, a former law enforcement official and entrepreneur.

Rantz has decent name recognition from being on the ballot previously, but Dore is said to be wearing out his shoe leather. This could be a heated contest, with Goudeau serving as the wildcard.

Either way, it looks like Republicans will retain House District 31.

This week, the Louisiana Association of Business and Industry (LABI) released it’s 2019 legislative scorecard, which is available online at <http://labiscorecard.org/>. We encourage everyone heading to the polls this fall to give it a read and put some thought to the issues addressed.

This past session marked the end of a tumultuous four-year term where much was debated but little accomplished. As predicted, the fiscal session that ran from April to June was largely overshadowed by the upcoming fall elections where 47

legislative seats will be vacated due to term limits, members will be retiring or shifting to the opposite chamber, and all statewide officials are on the ballot.

The 2019 election is monumental and will impact the future of Louisiana for decades. The next governor and legislature will be tasked with redrawing the electoral lines for offices such as Congress, the state Supreme Court, the Public Service Commission, and the legislature itself. Meanwhile, the state’s economy is at a tipping point with two consecutive years of significant population losses, low workforce participation rates, and employment numbers that lag the nation.

Former grants officer to seek council seat

Passion for serving residents, results-driven leadership at center of campaign

Lifelong St. Charles Parish resident and former parish Grants Officer Holly Fonseca has announced her candidacy for Council-at-Large Division B.

A 10+ year veteran of local government, Fonseca was integral in the receipt of state and federal funding for water, wastewater, recreation, government buildings, emergency management, drainage and flood control improvements that have positively impacted the entire parish – most notably the West Bank Hurricane Protection Levee.

Her experience as both a civil servant and appointed executive staffer gives her a unique understanding of the inner workings of parish government, she said. She’s skilled at working collaboratively across all levels of government to achieve monumental goals.

“My career has been focused around results, including securing and managing \$100 million in grant revenue to complete 172 parish projects and programs,” Fonseca said. “I want to continue my successful track record while once again working for the benefit of all in our community.”

In her time with parish government, Fonseca served on the team responsible for implementing the long-term plan to complete construction of a closed West Bank Hurricane Protection Levee. As part of that effort, she helped gain voter approval of an ad valorem tax for levee systems that will ensure hurricane protection parishwide.

Fonseca fought for the prioritization of the Upper Barataria Basin Feasibility Study to receive federal and state funding. Congress fully funded the study in 2018 at a cost of \$3 million. It’s an important step in providing for eventual federal involvement in flood protection on the West Bank of the parish, she said.

She also served as project manager for the design and construction

“I can’t even conceive of making that sacrifice. It was emotional, knowing he died for his country. And knowing he’s my ancestor, related to me, it felt pretty special.”

Stumbo said his conflicted feelings came from knowing of that sacrifice, but also understanding that Geller was finally laid to rest and no longer in limbo.

“It made me think of the sacrifices the thousands of other people made, who were buried in that cemetery,” Stumbo said. “It felt good to see how much everyone still cared. This happened more than 70 years ago, but they still did all of this for him. It was kind of amazing.”

Three generations of Stumbo’s family were together at the ceremony.

Identifying the remains of those lost in the Pearl Harbor attack has been a long process for many. In September of 1947, members of the American Graves Registration Service (AGRS) disinterred the remains of U.S. casualties from the two cemeteries and transferred them to the Central Identification Laboratory at Schofield Barracks. The lab’s staff was only able to confirm the identifications of 35 men from the USS Oklahoma.

The AGRS went on to bury the unidentified remains in 46 plots at the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, known as the Punchbowl, in Honolulu. In October 1949, a military board classified those who could not be identified as non-recoverable, including Geller.

In 2015, the Deputy Secretary of Defense issued a policy memorandum directing the disinterment of the unknown bodies who perished during the battleship attack. That June,

personnel began exhuming the remains from the area for analysis. DNA analysis was able to match Geller’s remains with his family.

After Geller’s remains were found, his family had the decision of where to bury him – back in Oklahoma, where he hailed from, at Arlington National Cemetery, or at Pearl Harbor, where he passed. The decision was made to do so alongside his fellow shipmen.

Kristin Stumbo, Jack’s mother, said there was a strong turnout, in fact more than she’d expected.

“There were 12 family members there, but a lot of locals from VFW, and others who I think had been following the situation from the local paper, I guess ... it was a really great ceremony,” she said. “I thought it was joyful in a lot of ways, for everyone to see he was finally at peace.”

Kristin noted an admiral presented her mother-in-law – the closest living relative to Geller, his niece – with the American flag. Taps was played in Geller’s honor, as well as a 21-gun salute. His bones were wrapped in uniform with all of his medals of honor.

“Even for not knowing him directly, it was definitely emotional,” Kristin said.

The family was given letters that were sent from Geller’s mother to her son following the bombing, marked “return to sender.” Though she knew what had happened, Kristin said, “she still had hope.”

Kristin’s mother-in-law, meanwhile, was able to find a bit of peace of her own. She’d heard stories about Geller all her life from her father. While Geller was identified, so many of his fellow soldiers were not – there are more than 72,000 World War II soldiers unaccounted for, and less than half of that number are classified as potential recoveries. Geller was one who was.

“They didn’t know where he was or anything ... I think just knowing how much it would have meant to her dad, that (his brother) was finally properly buried, meant so much to her,” Kristin said.

diagnosed with testicular cancer six years ago. He underwent chemotherapy to treat the illness, but he went on to suffer pulmonary embolisms, blood clots in his legs, 19 stints, a hernia, two different types of e. coli, a heart attack – and, eventually, his second cancer diagnosis, this time esophageal cancer, which resulted in more chemotherapy and surgery that left him with a shortened esophagus.

“That’s all that’s been happening, which is a lot,” said Brignac’s wife, Rose. “It’s been an emotionally, physically and

mentally exhausting experience. We’re ready to be on the other side of this.”

But Shorty fights through the exhaustion, with his wife by his side battling along with him. He calls Rose his inspiration, noting “I couldn’t have done any of it without my wife. From day one, she’s been my caretaker.”

Rose said it’s been a hard journey, some days harder than others, but the family’s faith in God and the love they have for each other and the people in their lives have spurred them onward.

“We’re about to have our ninth

grandchild ... you just put one foot in front of the other,” said Rose, who lost her mother earlier this year and has taken leave from her work at R.J. Vial Elementary School. “He’s a fighter. I’m a fighter and a cheerleader for him, always researching what he should be eating, talking to doctors ... I know his love for me and for his family makes him fight, and my love for him makes me fight right along with him.”

In August, Shorty will undergo a PET (positron emission tomography) scan that will hopefully show a clean reading. From there, the goal is to have gained enough weight to undergo a pericardium strip surgery that would address a hardening of his pericardium, after bacteria played a role in causing it to thicken. A specialist in Ohio put him on a regiment to prepare him for the surgery.

“As much weight as he’s lost, and having gone through 39 procedures already, he couldn’t make it out of surgery, otherwise,” Rose said.

They’ll receive a lift soon. The Fishing for Frankie tournament, now in its 11th year, will benefit Shorty. It will be held at Somme’s Marina in Des Allemands. Check-in begins at 4:30 a.m. and weigh in will commence at noon.

The tournament began as a way to honor the memory of Frankie Champagne Jr., a resident of Luling who passed away in 2007 following a battle with lung cancer and who was known for his generous and uplifting nature.

Audrey Raziano, Champagne’s sister, said she never imagined the event would endure as it has for over a decade.

“I just never dreamed it would last this long. It’s so crazy,” Raziano said. “Our family grows every year. It feels like each recipient becomes part of the family.”

Last year, 54 boats entered and the event raised more than \$20,000.

Rose said she couldn’t express enough gratitude on her and Shorty’s behalf for the gesture.

“There are really no words. What can you say to describe how thankful you are, how appreciative you are, how amazing you think this community is for so many people to come out and do anything they can to help,” Rose said. “It’s just amazing.”

In math, the school system performance in mastery and above showed 47 percent this year, down 2 percent from last year's 49 percent. Statewide, the figure is 34 percent, up from last year's 32 percent.

In social studies, parish students performance in mastery and above remained level at 40 percent year to year. The system outperformed the state mastery rate of 28 percent.

There are five levels of achievement on the LEAP test – advanced, mastery, basic, approaching basic, and unsatisfactory. By 2025, the average performance of students has to be at the mastery level in order for a school or district to be rated an “A.”

Erin Granier, assistant superintendent of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment, said yearly LEAP scores are analyzed to identify areas of relative strength and improvement.

Following the analysis of these scores, professional learning for teachers and administrators is designed to support the implementation of quality curriculum aligned to Louisiana Student Standards, Granier said.

“The district continues to concentrate on supporting teachers in our core business of teaching and learning, which includes aligning curriculum resources and assessment practices to support instructional planning and curriculum delivery,” she said.

This year’s results show St. Charles Parish Public Schools outperforms most districts across the state.

“However, there is still room for growth,” Granier said. “As we move forward, the focus on analyzing

individual student achievement data that drives effective instructional practices will remain a priority to ensure students attain mastery of standards. Standardized test achievement data coupled with Growth-to-Mastery targets will allow administrators and teachers to support individual student growth.”

She said stakeholders at all levels of the organization, including “School Board members, dedicated teachers, devoted administrators, supportive parents, family and community members all contribute to the success of students.”

Overall, in basic and above (basic, mastery and advanced percentages combined), the district consistently outperformed state averages.

In grade 3, Norco Elementary ranked highest with 88 percent in ELA, 93 percent in math and 69

percent in social studies.

In grade 4, Ethel Schoeffner Elementary ranked among highest students in basic and above with 88 percent in ELA, 90 percent in math and 73 percent in social studies. Norco Elementary ranked among the highest number of students performing in testing at 83 percent in ELA, 90 percent in math and 80 percent in social studies.

Harry Hurst Middle School students ranked highest in grade 6 with 85 percent in ELA, 84 percent in math and 79 percent in social studies. In grade 7, J.B. Martin Middle School had 83 percent in ELA, 77 percent in math and 69 percent in social studies. In eighth grade, Harry Hurst Middle was among high performers with 87 percent in ELA, 82 percent in math and 84 percent in social studies.

James was a highly accomplished student. She was Destrehan High School’s Class of 2018 salutatorian and St. Charles Parish’s High School Student of the Year in her senior year.

She left Destrehan High with aspirations of going into medicine and perhaps one day becoming a doctor. She studied biological engineering at LSU, and noted she was fascinated by the prospect of researching information that could lead to a major medical breakthrough.

James loved helping people. “My goal is to improve people’s lives, hopefully in a really impactful way,” James told the Herald-Guide last year following her graduation. “The more I thought about it, I knew I wanted to go into medicine.”

She gave her time to lend a helping hand along her way to that goal. She regularly volunteered with the Matthew 25:35 food pantry in Destrehan, and was also involved in a mission trip to Mexico in which she worked with a construction team to help build houses for the underprivileged in the summer of 2017, and returned there in 2018 to assist with medical care.

“You hear about how bad some people have it in the world, and you don’t really realize it until you see it,” James had said of her volunteering efforts. “It’s very eye-opening, and to know you’ve made a positive difference in someone’s life by helping to build a house, or a school, is very rewarding.”

James’ family relocated to Montz when she was 11 years old. She was born in Red Deer, Alberta, Canada and later lived in Lake Jackson, Texas.

While at Destrehan, James was the president of the school’s National Honor Society, a member of the student council, and a member of the tennis team and was named captain in her senior year. She served as her class’ vice president while with the student council for two years.

Her peers noticed she had the potential to do special things. James was voted “Most Likely to be President,” “Most Likely to Cure Cancer,” and “Most Likely to Impact the World” during her time at Destrehan.

She was a quick learner who understood how to apply herself in much of what she did. Andy Rougeou, who coached James while he headed the St. Charles Parish tennis program, recalled James learning to play as a novice and how quickly she blossomed.

“She understood she was playing against kids her age, but who had five or six years of experience on her ... she was fine with that and so willing to learn,” Rougeou said. “She had that special intangible about her. She always asked so many questions, down to the details of exactly how you hold the racket, how fast do you swing it ... tennis isn’t a game you quickly pick up, but before her on court game ever came around, she understood it. She had a true desire to learn.”

James not only became team captain at Destrehan as a senior, but was a state finalist at the LHSAA tennis championship tournament.

When he learned of her death, he said he had to read it over and over again because it was so difficult to accept.

“I read it five times, I just didn’t understand,” Rougeou said. “We’ll never understand why something like this happens, or what her family and friends are going through right now. You never want anyone to feel that way ... I know I’ll always remember her.”

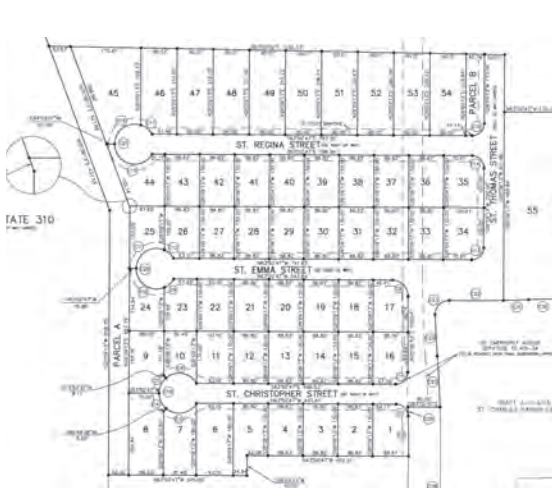
The location is the former Pan American Southern Refinery site.

Arterbury was shot in the back with his own gun, leaving the crowd to scatter. He was taken to a local hospital, where he died several hours later, never to return home following his shift.

It happened just three years into his law enforcement career.

The shooter identified in the document, Johnson Washington Jr., was convicted of first-degree murder.

Arterbury’s memory is honored with a

display at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial. He received a Purple Heart posthumously from the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office, and the Sheriff’s Office named the headquarters of its community services division after the fallen officer, christening it the Alan Arterbury Memorial Building in his memory.

He is also honored at the Sheriff’s Office’s Fallen Heroes Memorial, along

with Sheriff Lewis Ory, Deputy Nelson Coleman and Deputy Jeff G. Watson, fellow officers who fell in the line of duty. Each year, the Sheriff’s Office holds an annual memorial service to honor those men, and also all Louisiana officers killed in the line of duty in that year.

“These people showed up to work every day to serve and protect their community, and one day they never came home,” Capt. Pat Yoes said. “They and their families paid the price. It’s our obligation to never forget the sacrifice they’ve made.”

of the \$11.7 million Edward A. Dufresne Community Center in Luling.

The couple opened the store in February and said the community has been “awesome,” lending a ton of support.

she said. “Everybody was giving me milk jugs, which helped a lot.”

By the Fourth of July, they had what they needed for the project – 58 jugs.

“It didn’t take long once I figured out how to do it,” said the 68-year-old grandmother. “I’d change it a little bit. It was just this grandma had to take breaks from wrapping the jugs. I would wrap two jugs together with the duct tape and then put four until it was figured out.”

Soon into construction, Schneider was told assembling the jugs cap down, rather than up, would be wiser in case

a cap came off. This way, the jug boat would still float.

In all, it took about a week to construct “with a lot of breaks,” she said. The kids got busy with swimming so grandma inherited the project, but she pressed on determined to make it a fun project for her grandchildren.

“Anything is possible if you put your mind to it – you can do it,” Schneider said.

When the moment of truth came at her daughter’s swimming pool, an estimated 15 children and grandchildren

stood around and announced, “Who thinks it’s going to float?” Only one kid had the nerve to say no.

So they placed it in the water and

grandson Evan, newly 13 years old, rode it first.

The jug boat floated.

“I was well pleased,” Schneider said of her creation. “But then I thought, I’ll have to make a bunch more so all the kids can have one.”

But there wasn’t time to worry long because the boat was taken to Bayou Des Allemands and placed in the water. Again, Evan rode it first, but her niece’s husband was the brave one who paddled the farthest in the bayou.

Schneider was happy, and even advised them to approach Papa Joe for an old trawling motor to add to the boat, which they are in the process of doing.

This Des Allemands resident took after her father who liked to make things and the jug boat fit as an ideal project. They built a Thomas the Train bed for her grandson, which taught Schneider about bending wood and other skills she’s carried into her other projects.

“The tree house, I built it last summer,” she said. “Of course, I’m still working on

it, but they can get in it. It’s at least two stories. I just need to add more rails, but I did have help with it.”

And then there’s the jug boat, which is another proud addition to Schneider’s creations.

“I always felt it would float,” she said. “They might have all been worried, but I wasn’t.”

It’s a long four months of sand everyday. So I made the best of the situation to bring joy.”

She did bring amusement at a time when Barry, tropical storm turned hurricane turned back to tropical storm, painfully crawled

on shore Saturday at 5 mph and just lingered. In what seemed like an eternity, Landry brought a bright spot to Louisiana’s otherwise gloomy, stressful wait on where the storm would land.

Offering a dynamic lineup of performances, the Dr. Rodney R. Lafon Performing Arts Center's 2019-20 season tickets are available for adult and childrens' productions.

"We are so excited about it," said Center Director Christopher Melohn. "What makes this inaugural season exciting is it's mixed dance, music, theater, visual arts and film. It's a true performing arts center experience, which makes it a really special season to premiere."

Friloux commits to University of Houston

Hahnville’s star defensive tackle heads into senior year with collegiate decision settled

One of the nation’s top defensive prospects on the gridiron resides at Hahnville High School – and the soon-to-be senior left no mysteries as to where he’s headed next.

Adonis Friloux announced recently that he has committed to play the University of Houston, making his intentions officially known through a Twitter post.

Friloux, a 6-foot-2, 268 pound defensive tackle, offered gratitude to numerous people for helping to guide him in his journey so far.

the colleges that have recruited me and gave me a chance to play for their program ... to thank all my coaches from the Hahnville Tigers that helped shape the foundation and fundamentals for the game that I love ... I want to also thank my Mother and my Dad ... my family, friends, trainers and the entire parish for their patience, sacrifices, support and unconditional love while I pursued

my dreams of playing football,” Friloux wrote.

“With that being said, I am extremely excited to announce my commitment to the University of Houston. Go Coogs.”

Friloux chose Houston over several other Division I offers, including Ole Miss, Tulane, Colorado State, ULL, ULM and Nicholls State, according to Rivals.com. He also has drawn interest from LSU and Texas, among other notables.

In his junior year, Friloux tallied 60 solo tackles and 47 assists, 13.5 sacks and made 18 tackles for loss. He forced four fumbles, recovered three and intercepted a pass.

In short, he proved to be a massive

disruptor along the line of scrimmage, and attracted the attention of a wide number of Division I schools.

“I think he’s one of the top 3 defensive linemen in our state, said Hahnville head coach Nick Saltaformaggio. “It’s a shame he’s not one whole inch taller, whatever difference that makes, that one inch, keeping Power 5 (conferences) away from him. Because when you line him up against guys one, two, three, four and five inches taller, he just wears them out. He has great, great punch ... unbelievable strength and 20 to 30 yard quickness ... there’s not one weakness in his game.”

HHS, DHS wrap up summer season

Hahnville’s summer baseball season came to a close on the third day of the American Legion State Tournament Sunday, as it fell to powerhouse Gauthier Amedee 10-0 in five innings.

The Tigers, playing under their traditional summer banner of Otto Candies, split their two opening games, falling to Lakeshore 11-0 on Friday but rebounding to defeat rival Destrehan/ES&H on Saturday 5-0.

The loss to Gauthier Amedee wrapped up in five innings due to the 10-run rule.

HHS finished with a 19-16 record this summer, a positive step following a prep season that saw the team struggle before

finishing the season with a late surge.

“All summer, even through state tournament, we competed very well,” said Hahnville coach David Baudry. “We pressed some guys into situations they weren’t ready for, as we were limited in

our availability with pitchers ... (the win over Destrehan) we played very well, though, and it kind of placed an exclamation point on the summer.”

Gauthier Amedee – coached by former longtime Destrehan baseball coach Marty Luquet – led 1-0 after an inning, a score that held into the fourth inning. At that point, a lengthy rain delay held off the proceedings at Delgado’s Kirsch-Rooney Stadium, with play resuming Sunday evening after several hours.

Once the teams resumed, Gauthier wasted no time, scoring nine runs in the bottom of the fourth inning, highlighted by a pair of RBI singles by William Reed, who finished 2-for-2 with three RBIs.

Hahnville couldn’t find its offensive footing against Brock Barthelemy or Layton Lee, the two authier pitchers combining for five innings of two-hit, scoreless ball. Mason Long and Seth Whitney supplied the lone two hits for Hahnville.

The Tigers earned the right to play on Sunday after scoring a win Saturday in what was an elimination game against Destrehan.

Collin Zeringue capped off a strong summer on the mound for the Tigers, pitching a one-hit shutout over seven innings. He struck out 11 and walked two to earn the win.

“As he had success this summer, he got more confidence ... his last two outings, he had good stuff, was able to locate and

pitched with confidence. He has a bright, bright future,” Baudry said.

Mason Long led the Hahnville offense by going 2-for-3 with a run scored and an RBI. Max Farrell scored two runs, while Collin Galland, Drake Simar and Whitney each drove in runs for Hahnville.

Destrehan’s summer season had a bumpy finish at the American Legion State Tournament over the weekend, with a 10-0 loss to Jesuit and a 5-0 loss to Hahnville at the double-elimination tournament bringing the summer to a close.

Jesuit scored three first inning runs to set the tone for a day that saw the Blue Jays bring the game to a close early, in five innings by the 10-run rule. Riley Cardinal and Nathan Rhodes collected the lone hits for the Destrehan offense.

Against Hahnville, Destrehan fell behind early again and couldn’t garner any

ground against Hahnville starter Collin Zeringue, with Noah Simon picking up the day’s lone hit.

For the Wildcats (8-13-5), who earned the District 7-5A championship in prep season, it came down to the growing pains that come with an almost entirely new lineup of players, after the departure of a large senior core.

The lack of runs at state wasn’t a trend for the Wildcats, who had several strong run scoring efforts during the course of the Legion season, though the team’s bats did run hot and cold. Cardinal and Noah Simon are two new starters Mire said asserted themselves this summer, but said there will have to be more consistency once the team hits prep ball next spring. The two earned roles as the team’s cleanup and leadoff hitter this summer, respectively.

Friloux joins a Houston program that just this past April saw star defensive tackle Ed Oliver drafted ninth overall in the NFL Draft after three years with the Cougars. Oliver started as a true freshman and made 22 tackles for loss in his debut season, going on to finish his run with 53 tackles for loss and 192 total tackles in his career.

Saltaformaggio said Friloux certainly took notice of that.

“I can see why he chose Houston ... they had a guy up there who they compare Adonis favorably to, who was a top 10 pick in the NFL Draft,” Saltaformaggio said. “They’re going to play him in a position he can excel, at 3-tech. And Adonis is a bright kid who knows the game ... he realizes going to Houston gives him the opportunity to play in premier bowl games. They did a great job of recruiting, when it came down to it.”

When NBA Finals MVP and superstar Kawhi Leonard made his decision last weekend to leave Toronto

It was a refreshing departure from a three-year span of Warrior dominance, following Kevin Durant’s signing with the franchise after a 73 win season.

Obviously, the Warriors didn’t win it all last season. Injuries had much to do with that, as I’m sure even the most ardent Raptors fans would admit, and that’s part of the game. But a sport where “if the best player on the team is injured, we may have a shot” isn’t a very compelling one at all.

This season, though? Oh, this is compelling, both on a national level and local one:

*An inter-city rivalry perhaps like never before in the Kawhi/Paul George-led Clippers against the LeBron/Davis-led Lakers. That one will have some bad blood, given how Leonard’s long-winded free agency courting was sure to leave one of the two teams scrambling for players to fill their cap space.

*A league where several teams have a chance to win it all – or advance from either conference. For years, we knew LeBron was emerging from the East, or at least we felt like we did. The West was more of a mixed bag, with the Lakers, Thunder, Spurs and Warriors all taking turns atop the heap. The Warriors era with Durant felt like an eternity, though, one of those tenures where several teams

*The Pelicans have an arch-nemesis! The Lakers may not be division foes, but we’re nonetheless invested in their success – or the lack of it. To paraphrase a few others with a stock market comparison, Pelicans executive David Griffin has shorted the Lakers’ future results by socking away so many future first round picks and swap options from them. Staying up to watch some of those West Coast games might have a little more bite to it going forward ... we have a rooting interest! AKA, any team that could accelerate their demise by handing them a sound defeat.

*Zion Williamson gave us a taste, but that’s all. The highlight of him ripping the ball from a Knicks summer leaguer and dunking it was perhaps the perfect image to show who Williamson is and what he brings: explosiveness and the kind of raw power the league has rarely seen.

A few thoughts on the roster it appears the Pelicans will go to battle with this season ... it appears to be the deepest and most talented the club has had in a long time. In terms of that depth, I don’t know any team in franchise history that’s arguably gone 11 or 12 deep, yet if we assume the three first round picks this year will each get their time along with the known NBA quantities on roster ... I get the feeling Alvin Gentry may somehow figure out how to push the tempo even faster, with what amounts to hockey line subs at his disposal.

J.J. Redick and Derrick Favors were two veterans that filled the exact needs of the roster: shooting from the outside and a true center and shot blocker.

There are enough of these vets, along with Jrue Holiday, to make a playoff push feel possible.

And were that to happen ... could I interest you in a different rivalry between LA and L.A., one pitting the Pelicans’ former face, Anthony Davis, against its new in Zion? I can hear the home crowd now. And it is rabid.

Destrehan woman shares secret of 111-pound weight loss

When Karrie Parr hit the 100-pound mark, she started focusing less on weight and more on strength.

“I just wanted to be stronger,” Parr said. “I moved into not spending all my time on cardio and more on strength training.”

Top three calls to make to get ready for hurricane season

Preparation is key when it comes to hurricane season.

Here are three health-focused calls you need to make before the most active part of hurricane season starts:

Call No. 1 – Call your primary care provider (and your child’s pediatrician too!)

You’ll need to ask for an updated copy of your medications list.

If you evacuate for an extended period, you’ll need current prescriptions to get refills on any medications. While you’re on the phone, ask for a current copy of your vaccinations, too. This is essential in case you need to seek medical assistance while out of town.

Call No. 2 – Call any specialist doctors you may see for chronic conditions

It’s important to check in with any specialists who help manage any serious, chronic conditions – such as



diabetes, congestive heart failure, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD) or End-Stage Renal Disease (ESRD).

For ESRD patients on dialysis, be sure to contact your center for emergency plan instructions.

By starting the conversation now, you’ll have a plan in place if you must evacuate and are unable to see your regular physician for an extended period.

Share your evacuation plans with your specialist and ask for a list of recommended physicians to connect with based on your evacuation plans should you need medical assistance.

If you are pregnant and close to your due date or are considered high-risk, your OBGYN may recommend and help you identify an alternate birth location in the case of an evacuation.

Call No. 3 – Call your pharmacy

I recommend having at least a week’s supply of your regular medications with you in case of a mandatory evacuation or a scenario where you might be sheltering in place for an extended period.

Call your pharmacy in advance to see what medications you can get refills for. And don’t forget to confirm your pharmacy’s alternative locations in case of an evacuation.

We aren’t guaranteed a calm and uneventful hurricane season, so making sure you stay healthy during inclement weather is important!

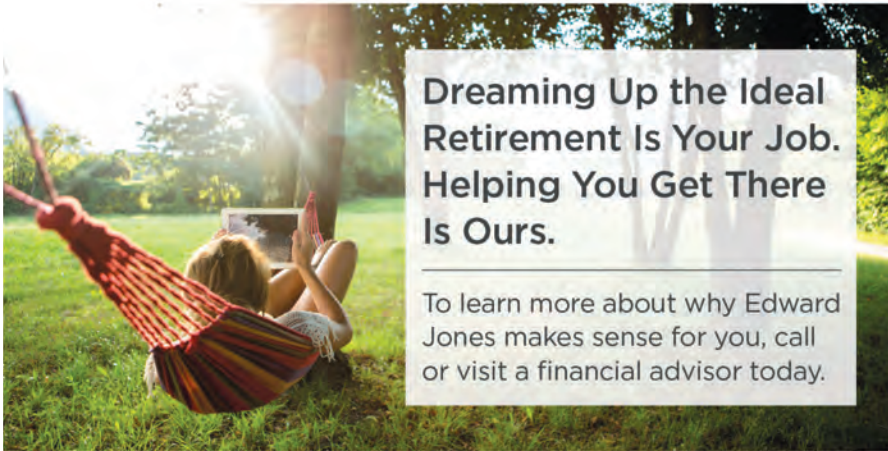

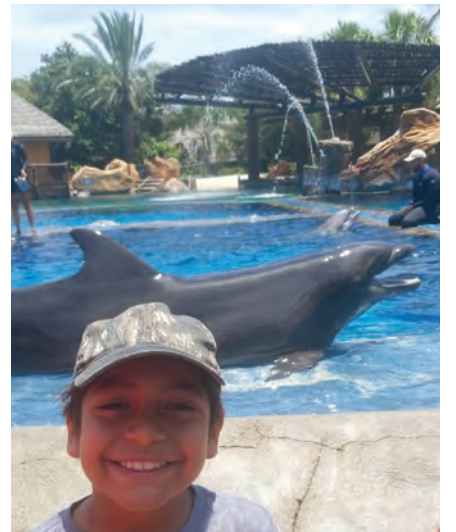

learned she was pregnant with their third child in November of 2017. She couldn't really diet, but she could start the mental process to ready for one and it came in January of 2018.

2018 became her year.
"I just started with my Apple watch, closing every ring every day," Parr said of using the rings as goals and the one she was closing in on was exercising at least 30 minutes a day.

At this point, she weighed 294 pounds.
"I've never been a tiny person, but I've always been in good shape and good health. When I became a mom, it just all went away," Parr said. "I gained 80 pounds with my first child and never lost that and with my second I gained more and I never lost that weight."

Added to the stress of running her own business, she was working long days and eating whatever was available and that was usually takeout.

"It's not like you suddenly wake up and

weigh 300 pounds," Parr said. "There was no time to do anything. I knew I was unhealthy, but I didn't know how to break free from the bad habits. It was through a lot of soul searching that I looked at my unhealthy habits, and I had this breakthrough – I didn't want to do this anymore."

Bottom line – Parr said she started following her heart instead of her head.

By January of last year, the plan to focus on herself went into high gear.

Parr started exercising every day even though she had an eight-week-old baby, two-year-old and five-year-old. Social media played a role in her maintaining goals, which she did by issuing challenges online like doing pushups at home. Others joined in and soon she had numerous people participating in them and then messaging her their thanks for helping motivate them, too.

Her life flipped from a big cup of coffee at Starbucks and two hours of shopping

in Target in Seattle to going to the gym. Although her diet changed to calorie counting, she stayed on the exercise track and that helped her lose another 10 pounds in two weeks. It was a "game changer" for her, which allowed having items like fast food or wine, but in moderation.
"It felt really good and I had gone to buy new clothes," she said. "You have those small wins and 50 pounds lost is a big accomplishment no matter what your size."

By June of 2019, Parr had lost about 50 pounds.
In January of this year, she found nDurance gym, just a few streets away from her residence and it was an important find because she was stuck at 80 pounds lost. Gyn owner Brandi LeBlanc took her the next step forward.

"It completely changed the game for me and I went from 80 pounds lost to over 100 pounds in six months," she said.

"When you get closer and closer to your goal, it gets so much harder, though."

But, mentally, Parr was already in a better place.

She became more ambitious and ran in a marathon two weeks ago, although she learned a person can work out too much. She took a break and returned ready for still another step up in her plan.

"The next milestone was when I hit the 100-pound mark in May," Parr said. "I was so happy with myself just for getting to that number."

Now, having met her goal, she is focusing on being stronger and more toned, and she knows herself.

"Fight every day to find your joy, then fight every day to keep it because no one else will fight as hard for it and your families happiness depends on you having joy in your heart," Parr said. "I found mine ... now I'm just working on keeping it and focusing on it one day at a time."

The 2019-2020 application for Free/Reduced Price Meals is available online at www.MySchoolApps.com. Applying online is the fastest and most efficient way to apply for meal benefits. However, paper meal applications may be obtained from the school cafeteria or the Child Nutrition Department. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out **one** application for the household and return it to the school. Complete either a paper application **or** an on-line application, but not both. Additional paper copies are available at each school. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. The information provided by the household is confidential; it will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Information may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

All children in households with any household member receiving benefits under Assistance Programs (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Family Independence Temporary Assistance Program (FITAP) or Food Distribution Programs on Indian Reservations (FDPIR)) are eligible for free meals. For school officials to determine eligibility, each household that is now receiving benefits from Assistance Programs must provide the case number of a household member as well as the signature of an adult household member.

All other households must provide the following information on the application: names of all household members; the amount of income (before deductions for taxes, Social Security, etc.) that each household member receives; how often the person receives the income; where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare; the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct; and the last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member who signed the application, or a statement that the household member does not possess one.

Children categorized as foster, homeless, runaway, migrant, or enrolled in state-funded Head Start or Even Start programs, **if known**, are automatically eligible for free meals. School officials will determine eligibility for free meals based on documentation obtained directly from the program office and notify the household of their eligibility for benefits. The household must notify the school if it chooses to decline benefits. The household should **complete an application if they are not notified of free meal eligibility by August 8, 2019**.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for meal benefits.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy, Monique Age-Romero, Child Nutrition Director, will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make either an oral or written response to the following:
