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\$2M library sought for Hahnville

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With St. Charles Parish Council approval, the Library Board will collect the maximum allowed property tax this year in anticipation of building a new \$2 million Hahnville library.

Parish President Larry Cochran asked the council to support the move, particularly after rolling back the library millage twice to help cut parish costs.

The council unanimously approved the request with members Marilyn Bellock and Dick Gibbs not present at last Monday's council meeting.

Library Director LeAnn Benedict asked the council to roll the tax forward to the voter-approved maximum of 4.53 mills, up from the currently collected 4.35 to help build funds for the project.

Benedict estimated a home valued at \$200,000 with a homestead exemption will pay another \$2.25 this year.

"The approval by the council to roll forward our millage to the maximum rate, as approved by the voters in 2010, will put us in a better financial position to begin

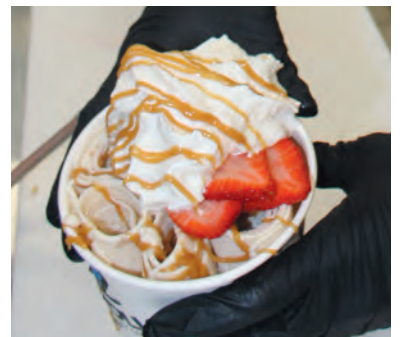

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The tragic passing of 19-year-old Sarah James, Montz native and Destrehan High School alumnus, left many in the local community reeling. It's also inspired them to rally around the James family in an effort to keep Sarah's name alive.

Her family has been raising funds toward establishing a scholarship in the former parish Student of the Year's name called the Sarah James Memorial Scholarship fund. Within the first eight days of the posting of a GoFundMe page for the scholarship, almost 250 people had donated to the cause to raise more than \$24,000.

After serving 52 years with the Hahnville Volunteer Fire Department, Tregre had become known as the man who was always ready to lend a hand, and it certainly applied to the fire department he helped establish as a charter member.

“I started with my dad because he was one of the original ones,” said son Jeffrey Tregre. “He was a great guy and was enthused about it. He liked doing the fire department stuff.”

He recalled a father’s dedication extending to keeping the department’s first red fire truck in a workshop building he had on Sycamore Street, where they grew up, until they raised the funds to build Hahnville’s first fire station on Lincoln Street.

Jeffrey recalled that time as a junior fireman, as well as the many times he was around the station growing up. He also remembered the many “can shake times” with them at the red light asking for donations and the fireman fairs that all helped raise money for firefighting equipment.

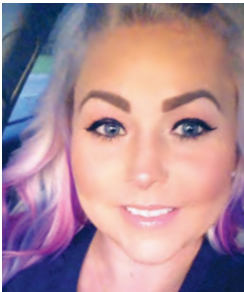

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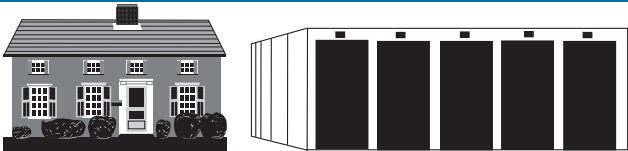

‘Otherizing’ our immigrant brothers

This current federal administration chooses to “otherize” more of our im-migrant brothers and sis-ters. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security can deny a green card or even initiate deportation for anyone “who is likely at any time to use or re-ceive one or more public benefits.”

This “otherizes” green card applicants and their dependents. It does not just include a laundry list of new possible benefits re-ceived (from Medicaid, SNAP, Housing

benefits and considers income, educa-tion and language proficiency) but even benefits applied for. This change in pub-lic charge could affect 20 million people.

If these criteria were in place when my family came to the U.S. and we needed Medicaid benefits or housing assis-tance, then it’s likely we would have been denied a green card that would have affected our application for citi-zenship. My life would have been drasti-cally altered; my experiences completely nullified.

This is a decisive time where we are being confronted with the choice to dis-card immigrants as “other” or to follow

the Christian sacred text to engage them as neighbor. You and I have a choice.

We need to recognize that a person seeking help as an immigrant could be facing one of the most challenging pe-riods of their lives. Please support the work of informed service providers, who advocate for some of the most vulner-able members of our community. For those experiencing displacement, social isolation, mental illness, food insecurity, domestic abuse and addiction, people working with these poor people provide health, justice, and hope.

Will you stand with me and be a neigh-bor to those who need us most?

When Boggs ran
afoul of J. Edgar
Hoover and the FBI

In the spring of 1971, Congressman Hale Boggs of New Orleans, then the House Majority Leader, was making moves on Capitol Hill. A well respected member of Congress, Boggs had served in Democratic leadership since 1962. He helped guide President Lyndon Johnson’s Great Society programs through the House and even served on the Warren Commission.

But on April 5 of that year, Boggs gave a floor speech denouncing the Federal Bureau of Investigation and its powerful director, J. Edgar Hoover. A New York Times report noted he compared the FBI’s methods to “the tactics of the Soviet Union and Hitler’s Gestapo,” and Boggs called upon Attorney General John Mitchell to de-mand Hoover’s resignation. Boggs spe-cifically charged the FBI had wiretapped congressional offices and stationed agents on college campuses to spy on students.

According to media reports, political observers were shocked when Boggs pub-licly attacked Hoover, long considered the most powerful man in Washington. In a recorded phone call with President Richard Nixon, House Minority Leader Gerald Ford’s only explanation was that perhaps Boggs was “either drinking too much, or he’s taking some pills that are upsetting him mentally.”

Ford defended Hoover on the floor, while the attorney general said Boggs should apologize. Nixon had the major-ity leader removed from high-level meet-ings and restricted his access to classified information.

Back in Louisiana, then-Gov. John McKeithen personally called Hoover and assured him the state government did not share Boggs’ views.

Boggs doubled down on his charges against Hoover. Days after his floor speech, he told CBS News, “The country cannot survive under a man who in his declining years has violated the Bill of Rights of the United States.”

While he never backed away from the charges, the controversy eventually ended when he mysteriously disappeared in October 1972 while campaigning for a Democratic congressional candidate in Alaska.

Documents declassified since Hoover’s death have since proven that Boggs’ ac-cusations against the FBI were, in fact, true.

Prepare for another election season

Medicaid spending, and take steps to-ward a Constitutional Convention.

Summer is ending. It’s time to get back to business. Louisiana’s future is on the ballot this fall and the stakes are high. The moment is fast approaching where you, the voter, must decide how you want the next four years to look for Louisiana.

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Sinkholes from defective culverts being replaced along Hwy. 90

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The St. Charles Parish Council signed off on a \$163,955 contract to repair two sinkholes along U.S. Highway 90, but was advised it’s a move that has to be taken cautiously.

“We have no option other than to investigate and repair all this,” said Public Works Director Clayton “Snookie” Fauchaux.

One of the sinkholes is located east of Majoria’s shopping center and the other is in Paradis near Ruth Street.

Although the two locations are in the state right of way, the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development (DOTD) will not help replace the defective culverts, Fauchaux said.

“We did research,” he said. “We don’t have any evidence of the parish installing those, but apparently there was a permit from 1992 that either requested to change some of these culverts, to put some of these culverts in or to realign some of those culverts. Because of that permit, the state designated it as our issue.”

Fauchaux said DOTD has miles of roads and it has cut back on resources.

“They have one culvert truck for five parishes,” he said. “We try to participate in helping them as much as we can.”

Fauchaux emphasized Public Works walks a “fine line” everyday in trying not to be the owner of these assets in state ROWs, although there are times it can’t be helped.

Councilwoman Mary Clulee agreed, noting residents are affected the most by this and they need to be fixed.

But he advised it could bankrupt his department if this wasn’t carefully handled, and there are replacements being investigated along the highway.

“If the parish accepted all the assets just in the parish we’d probably deplete every penny in Public Works probably in the first quarter,” Fauchaux said.

Hard Rock Construction of Harvey is the low bidder for the project, which involves replacing drainage structures causing the sinkholes. T. Baker Smith is the engineer overseeing the work.

making plans for a new Hahnville Branch,” Benedict said.

With the additional tax money, project planning could be started as early as next year, she said.

“As with all of our branch renovation and construction projects, we will look at what the community needs from us.”

“As we look to the future, the St. Charles Parish Library Board would like to undertake building a new branch in Hahnville to replace the existing Hahnville Branch,” she said. “In the past 17 years, every other branch in the parish has either been newly constructed or undergone a major renovation.”

Benedict said they are in preliminary planning and do not have a location selected or design plans. She said the project could cost more than \$2 million depending on whether land has to be purchased or is donated, and the size of the building.

“As with all of our branch renovation and construction projects, we will look at what the community needs from us,” she said. “We see the demand for study rooms, meeting spaces, innovative programming, and access to computers and other technology increasing across all of our library branches in addition to our traditional offerings of materials such as books, audiobooks, magazines and DVDs.”

The library’s 10-year property tax also comes up for renewal next year. Benedict said the amount

of the millage to be requested will be determined, but will be set at an amount that will also generate funds for the new library while maintaining all of the remaining branches.

Benedict agreed to Councilman Paul Hogan’s request that she meet with Tax Assessor Tab Troxler to determine if a millage hike would be necessary when going to the voters next year as industries come off tax exemptions.

She said the smaller the increase the better.

Councilman Terrell Wilson, who served on the Library Board, supported the request and said he observed the library system operate in a fiscally sound manner. Wilson said patrons in Norco are elated with the new library there.

Councilman Billy Woodruff asked Benedict whether they would use the existing Hahnville site, but she called it a site with “terrible visibility” and they’d prefer a new location.

Woodruff agreed.

According to the family, the scholarship is meant to be an ongoing, lasting means to enable students to pursue their goals and dreams in the medical or engineering fields. James majored in biological engineering at LSU and aspired to go into medicine, with hopes of helping others through her work. James was part of LSU’s BAE FastPath program, taking steps to one day become a medical doctor with a PhD.

In an interview with the Herald-Guide following her graduation as Destrehan High’s Salutatorian in 2018, James said “My Goal is to improve people’s lives, hopefully in a really impactful way.”

“To help her realize this goal, even after this senseless tragedy, we are asking for your support to set up a lasting scholarship in her name that will enable other students to pursue their dreams,” the family posted to the GoFundMe page.

More than 1,000 people have shared the page (titled Sarah James Memorial Scholarship on GoFundMe’s website) through Facebook.

Destrehan High School and St. Charles United Methodist Church are also accepting donation checks on behalf of the family to put toward the scholarship fund. James frequently volunteered with the church.

On the night she died, July 16, James was out with friends in Baton Rouge at approximately 11:30 p.m. While crossing a street near the campus of LSU, where James had just completed her first year studying biological engineering, she was struck by an SUV and suffered fatal injuries.

Robert Fisher, a teacher for gifted and talented art program students at Destrehan High, taught James for four years and the two became close. An academic scholarship in her name, he said, was fitting for remembrance of a truly gifted student.

“She was gifted in math, English, art ... to find someone

so brilliant and visually talented is rare ... she was an all-around student,” Fisher said. “That’s how many gifts God had given this little girl. She could do anything she wanted.”

He called the outpouring of support for the scholarship “a testament to how people feel about Sarah and her parents ... they wouldn’t give if they didn’t believe in the cause.”

One reason James was so beloved by so many was her giving nature. Fisher said James went out of her way to help her fellow students in his classes and in others, often stopping her own work to assist with others’.

“Even with Sarah being Salutatorian, it wasn’t just about Sarah to her. She did what she could to pull others up to help them along the way,” he said. “A lot of people get to the top and they want to stay there, and they help themselves get what they can and never reach back. Sarah wasn’t like that, and it made her special.”

Dawn Jacobi, gifted mathematics teacher at DHS who was also very close with James, called her longtime student “an exceedingly caring person.”

“She never hesitated to reach out and help others. Sarah personified Mahatma Ghandi’s quote, ‘Be the change you want to see in the world,’” Jacobi said. “She was a special person who will be remembered for her light-filled legacy and purpose-driven life. Sarah set an example of excellence for all to emulate.”

Her name will live on

“We’ve been doing this for about 15 years,” said Eliza Eugene, Blessed to be a Blessing founder. “United Way brought us together with A Safe Space (formerly the Alpha Daughters of Zion) and along with the parish’s government, schools and Sheriff’s Office it’s been a wonderful team effort that’s allowed us to execute this event with great success. We’ve had such a good turnout before and we expect to again.”

The children are in for more of a treat than the school supplies alone – but those supplies can be a big lift for families trying to make ends meet just before the start of the school year, which begins less than a week after the rally.

“The average cost to send a child to school is \$200,” said Eugene. “So with supplies provided, we can relieve a family of some of that responsibility while making sure children have the tools they need for school and a healthy start.”

Creating an environment that gives a child every opportunity to succeed in school can go a long way to determining their path.

“It means so much. If we can help a child prepare for school, it’s that much more likely they go on to have success. They’re less likely to end up in the juvenile justice system. It’s why this is such an important cause for all of us,” Eugene said.

Beyond the supplies though, event coordinators and backers have gone the extra mile to make the rally a fun and memorable experience for its attendees.

There will be free food – hot dogs, ice cream, pizza, snowballs and cupcakes among them - and characters in attendance including Daffy and Donald

Duck, the Cookie Monster and Hello Kitty. There will also be several fun activities, including face painting, a mechanical bull and an obstacle course. There will even be a petting zoo, which might attract some animal loving teens and adults along with the surely excited children.

“It’s what we call a ‘kid-centric’ day,” Eugene said. “It’s laid out so kids can not only come get supplies, but have a great time as well and a fantastic experience.”

Eugene credited local industry, along with the United Way, for making much of these extra bells and whistles possible.

“They’ve always stepped up to the plate, along with United Way, with these donations that make it possible to ensure we meet the needs of kids in our community,” Eugene said.

In addition to the guest speakers, there will be break-out sessions to discuss the importance of education, social media safety, substance abuse prevention and health and wellness.

A blood mobile will also be on hand for those who would like to make a positive difference through a donation.

To receive the school supplies, each child must be accompanied by a parent and must be a parish resident.

Families will have the opportunity to learn about the services available in the community. Representatives from several organizations will be on site to share information about their programs and resources.

average. Median household value was reported at \$226,600 compared to the state average of \$152,900

Destrehan’s poverty rate was listed as 6.7 percent compared to the state average of 19.6 percent.

St. Charles Parish Councilman Dick Gibbs, who represents District 3, said average household income is an estimated \$13,000 higher than the national average.

“At that time, we didn’t have tax money ... just what we raised,” he said.

Jeffrey went on to become a fireman at age 18 and served as assistant fire chief for many years.

“He just liked dedicating his time to the parish to help with firefighting,” Jeffrey said.

Chief Matthew Allshouse added, “For someone that was with the department from the start and still up until his accident to be so dedicated in the direction of the department gave many members great respect for Mr. Arthur, including myself.”

Tregre also was retired from St. Charles Parish Government, a U.S. Marine veteran, honorary lifetime member of the Hahnville Volunteer Fire Department, and a member of Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary Catholic Church.

Former Fire Chief Reggie Gaubert said Tregre served on numerous department committees, and used his carpentry and

plumbing skills to help maintain the fire stations.

“He was definitely committed,” Gaubert said. “Whatever we needed, he saw to it we got it.”

He and Tregre’s son remember the man who was always there to help.

“I think it was his way of life,” Gaubert said. “He always was helping people. This was one way he could give back to his community and help people in his community. He didn’t hesitate.”

step in and give them a hand. (Principal Kelli Oertling) was really excited to have it redone. I think the kids will enjoy it more.”

He also believes it could lend some help for Lakewood teachers.

“I think it’ll make it a lot easier for teachers to watch everyone, because everyone’s right there in one spot,” he said.

Waits credited the idea to his mother, Tanya, who learned of the potential need while part of PTO (National Parent Teacher Organization).

“(Oertling) mentioned how badly the hard surface area needed work,” Tanya said. “The lines were faded ... you can barely see them. When she started talking about that, I thought maybe Zachary could help out. And he needed a project ... he loved the idea as soon as I mentioned it. It just seemed like a really natural fit.”

To complete the project, he rented pressure washers and disc attachments, purchased three different paint colors, new chain basketball nets, painters tape, paint rollers, paint brushes and scrub wire brushes, the latter to eliminate the old paint lines.

Waits raised money to help offset the costs, which he estimated would run approximately \$800 to \$1,000, through a

GoFundMe page, and also accepted direct supply donations.

With that project complete, the Lakewood students have a freshly redone play area to have fun with. And on top of the reward of being able to help give back, he is also on the verge of achieving something that’s rather rare: just 4 percent of Scouts have earned the honor of Eagle Scout, since the inception of the program in 1911.

Waits joined Cub Scouts in the 1st grade and became a Boy Scout in the 5th grade.

“As you go through the ranks, it becomes less about skills and more about involvement with your troop, earning merit badges and doing work in the community,” he said.

East St. John annually in district competition. It plays Lutcher each year for

the jamboree, and has faced off with St. Charles Catholic in each of the past two seasons. Destrehan-St. James has been a dormant matchup, comparatively, for awhile, though Robicheaux fondly remembers some of the past classic matchups between the teams as if they were yesterday.

like always.”

Sponsored by NASA’s Texas Space Grant Consortium, teachers from across the U.S. who increased their knowledge of space education through this professional development summer institute.

“I feel like our schools are really helping students develop the skills they will need in the 21st century and beyond by providing so many opportunities for them to work collaboratively, share ideas, ask questions, and think critically,” she said. “It’s awesome to think that I get the opportunity to teach students who may be involved in getting us to Mars in the future.”

Green recently returned from LiftOff, a collaborative effort of Texas Space Grant Consortium members and

affiliates, NASA and industry. Teachers apply for the program and are selected competitively.

The workshops are organized around an aerospace or space science theme drawn from NASA’s diverse engineering and scientific research programs. The theme for LiftOff 2019 was Legacy of Apollo, celebrating the 50th anniversary of our landing on the moon.

“This was such a special time to be at NASA as our nation prepares to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Apollo 11 moon landing,” Green said. “One of the most encouraging parts of the week at NASA was hearing from the different astronauts, scientists, and engineers about the paths that led them to NASA.”

These stellar people came from diverse backgrounds and had varied interests and skills, she said. With their insights, the sky isn’t the limit – it’s just the beginning.

“As we plan to be back on the moon by 2024 and then on to Mars, there are so many skills that will be needed ... not just scientists and engineers, but also technicians, artists, farmers, business administrators and more,” she said.

Green learned this impressive effort takes great minds working together to make it happen.

“Sitting in mission control and watching the specialists monitor the activity on the International Space Station, another thing really stuck out to me – nothing they do at NASA is a one-person job; from landing on the moon to landing a rover to Mars to sending astronauts to the International Space Station, everything they do is a team effort,” she said.

Opening the weeklong institute was a presentation by former Astronaut Clay Anderson who shared “Turn Pages into Dreams.” Two additional astronauts spoke to the educators during the week: Apollo XIII astronaut Fred Haise shared his momentous experience and Jerry Ross shared his experiences as a seven time space walker.

Celebrating the Apollo anniversary, teachers heard from several scientists and engineers from the astromaterials department from NASA Johnson Space Center. John Gruener shared “What We Learned from Apollo,” Paul Niles talked about the new “Moon2Mars” initiative, and Samuel Lawrence spoke

on “Exploring the Moon in the 21st Century.”

Teachers increased their knowledge of working and living in space while visiting scientists and engineers in the Astromaterials Lab where they viewed the Apollo Moon Rocks, Genesis Lab, Stardust Lab, and CT chamber. The experience continued during tours of the Food Lab, Neutral Buoyancy Lab, and Spacesuit lab. Norm Chaffee, Apollo-era rocket engineer, provided a thorough explanation as he walked the teachers through the Saturn V rocket.

The workshops also provide teachers the rare – and for most, unique – opportunity to spend a week working with professional scientists and engineers at the cutting edge of space exploration.

“Going ‘behind the scenes’ at NASA and meeting astronauts, networking with other educators from around the country to share lesson ideas, and becoming certified to check out the Lunar and Meteorite Samples were definitely some of the highlights of the program,” explained Green. “I can’t wait to share what I’ve learned with my students in the upcoming school year.”

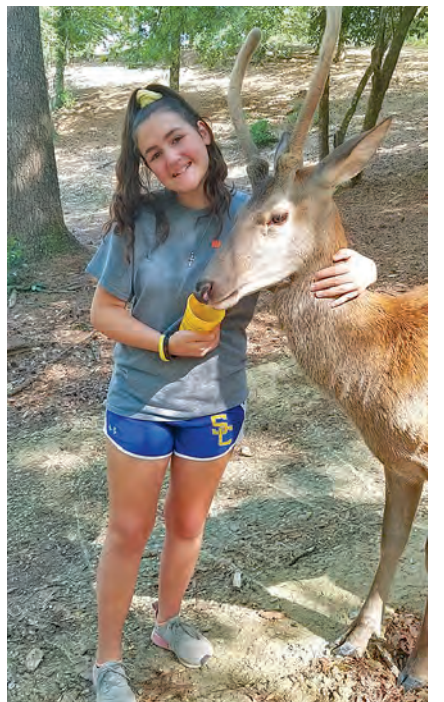

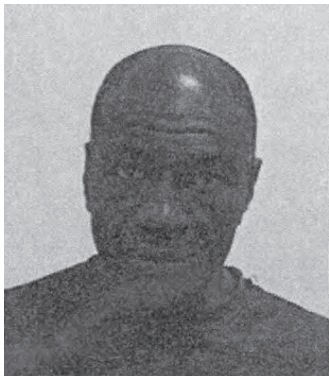

CONTRACT

This agreement entered into this _____ day of _____, 2019, by Hard Rock Construction, LLC, hereinafter called the "Contractor", whose business address is 1255 Peters Road, Harvey, LA 70058, and the St. Charles Parish, hereinafter called the "Owner".

Owner and Contractor, in consideration of premises and the mutual covenants; consideration and agreement herein contained, agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1

STATEMENT OF WORK

- 1.01 Contractor shall furnish all labor and materials and perform all of the work required to build, construct and complete in a thorough and workmanlike manner:
- 1.02 The abovementioned work shall be completed in strict accordance with Contract Documents prepared by: T. Baker Smith, LLC.
- 1.03 It is recognized by the parties herein that said Contract Documents including by way of example and not of limitation, the Drawings and Specifications dated March 18, 2019, Addendum Number 1, the Instruction to Bidders, Supplemental Instructions to Bidders, Louisiana Uniform Public Works Bid Form, General Conditions, Supplementary Conditions (if applicable), any Addenda thereto, impose duties and obligations upon the parties herein, and said parties thereby agree that they shall be bound by said duties and obligations. For these purposes, all of the provisions contained in the aforementioned Contract Documents are incorporated herein by reference with the same force and effect as though said Contract Documents were herein set out in full.
- 1.04 The Work is generally described as follows: Rehabilitative construction to remove and replace deficient drainage structures causing (2) sinkholes along Highway 90.

ARTICLE 2

ENGINEER

- 2.01 The Project has been designed by T. Baker Smith, LLC, who is hereinafter called "Engineer" and who will assume all duties and responsibilities and have the rights and authority assigned to Engineer in the Contract Documents in connection with completion of the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents.

ARTICLE 3

CONTRACT TIME

- 3.01 The Contractor shall complete all of the Work under the Contract within 45 calendar days from the date stated in the Notice to Proceed.

ARTICLE 4

LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

- 4.01 Owner and Contractor recognize that the Owner will suffer direct financial loss if Work is not completed within the Contract Time specified plus any extensions thereof allowed in accordance with these General Conditions of this Contract, and therefore, time is of the essence. They also recognize the delays, expense and difficulties involved in proving in a legal proceeding the actual loss suffered by Owner if the Work is not completed on time. Accordingly, instead of requiring any such proof, Contractor and Surety agree to forfeit and pay Owner Five Hundred dollars \$500.00 per day as Liquidated Damages for delay (but not as a penalty). Such Liquidated Damages will be assessed for each calendar day that expires after the Contract Time. This amount represents a reasonable estimate of Owner's expenses for extended delays and the costs associated therein. This provision shall be effective between the parties ipso facto and without demand or putting in default, it being specifically agreed that the Contractor by his mere failure to complete the work on or before the date specified shall be deemed in default.

ARTICLE 5

CONTRACT PRICE

- 5.01 The Owner will pay and the Contractor will accept in full consideration for the performance of the Contract the sum of:
- a) (\$163,955.40) One Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand, Nine Hundred Fifty-Five Dollars and Forty Cents based on unit prices specified within this contract document. Contract price is firm and subject only to modification by written Change Order agreed to and signed by both parties and the Engineer and approved by the St. Charles Parish Council.

ARTICLE 6

PAYMENT PROCEDURES

- 6.01 Contractor shall submit Applications for Payment to the Engineer in accordance with Article 15 of the General Conditions. Applications for Payment will be processed by Engineer as provided in the General Conditions.
- 6.02 Progress Payments. Progress payments will be based upon estimated quantities of contract unit price items or upon estimated percentages of completion of the schedule of lump sum values of labor and materials incorporated into the Work or suitably stored, on the last day of each month or other mutually agreed regular monthly date ending the progress payment period, less retainage.
- 6.03 Application for Payment Form. The form of the Application for Payment must be suitable to the Owner. The Owner reserves the right to withhold payment until the form of Application for Payment is deemed acceptable by the Owner.
- 6.04 Retainage. Per Paragraph 15.01.D retainage shall be withheld and payments will be made by the Owner in the payment amount of:
- a) Ninety percent (90%) of the approved payment applications for projects with contract of less than \$500,000.00; or
- b) Ninety-five percent (95%) of the approved payment applications for projects with contract prices of \$500,000.01 or greater.
- 6.05 The normal retainage shall not be due the Contractor until after Substantial Completion and expiration of the forty-five (45) day lien period and submission to the Engineer of a clear lien certificate and invoice for retainage.
- 6.06 Final Payment. Upon the final completion of all Work, the Contractor may request a final inspection and may make a final Application for Payment as provided by Paragraph 15.06 of the General Conditions.
- 6.07 Final Acceptance. When Final Acceptance is granted by the Owner, the Owner shall file the certificate with the Recorder of Mortgages for St. Charles Parish.
- 6.08 At the expiration of the lien period the Contractor shall obtain a certificate from the Recorder of Mortgages of the Parish of St. Charles that the Contract is clear of any liens or privileges, and said certificate shall be presented to the Owner for final payment and release of retainage, less any such sums as may be lawfully withheld under the Contract.
- 6.09 Claims. Pursuant to La. R.S. 38:2242, when the Owner receives any claim of nonpayment arising out of the Contract, the Owner shall deduct such claim from the Contract Sum. The Contractor, or any interested party, may deposit security, in accordance with La. R.S. 38:2242.2, guaranteeing payment of the claim with the Recorder of Mortgages for St. Charles Parish.
