As school ramps back up and into the new year, St. Charles Parish Public Schools received some very high praise. St. Charles Parish's school system was ranked Louisiana's second best overall district by the national website Niche,

while earning the No. 1 spot among school districts in the New Orleans area. The system was also named the No. 1 place to teach in Louisiana and the state's No. 1 school district for athletes. St. Charles Parish Public Schools

Superintendent Dr. Ken Oertling cited his belief that a school district should be measured by more than test scores, and that the Niche ranking supplied some positive validation for the district's efforts to mold well-rounded students.

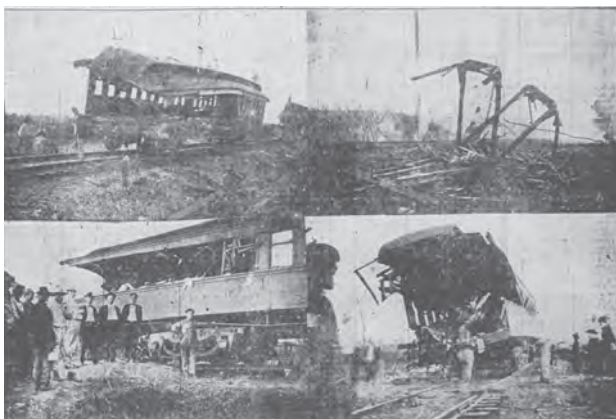
Remembering the railroad tragedy of Montz

History would record what was once known as the "worst rail disaster in the United States," and how the community of Montz became the keeper of this terrible memory.

"My father spoke of it often," said Coleen Perilloux, whose family is rooted in Montz. "At that era, people traveled more by train from the River Parishes than by automobile because not everyone had an automobile. It was the year before he got married and he took the train frequently from New Orleans to Montz."

Perilloux recalled her father telling

her that "until bodies were identified or someone spoke up about having someone on the train, no one really knew who some of the burned bodies were."

An expansion is underway at the St. Charles Parish Courthouse that is nearly doubling the size of the Registrar of Voters office, just in time for this year’s election.

“It will make it more convenient for people to come in and early vote,” said Registrar Brian Champagne. “They’ll have more space and, hopefully, make the process work better.”

Although the office has operated efficiently with limited space since the courthouse was built in 1976, more space is needed, particularly as more older, handicapped and mobility impaired voters are voting early.

Truck found in St. Charles Parish helps police arrest suspects in double murder

Two cousins found dead in Reserve, shooting captured on surveillance

A truck tied to a double-murder in St. John the Baptist Parish through surveillance video was found parked at a St. Charles Parish residence, leading to the arrest of two men authorities believe are responsible for the killings.

Theron Williams, 25, of New Orleans, was arrested at a Jefferson Parish apartment and taken into police custody on July 31 as a result, while 31-year-old Kelvin Taylor of LaPlace was arrested days later on Aug. 5.

The two have been implicated in the shootings of 20-year-old Kyron Perrilloux and 18-year old Kerell Sanders. The bodies of the two Reserve residents were found inside a car crashed into a ditch

Norco native turned early inspirations into musical fame

While saxophonist Quintin Gerard W. had already exhibited talent that gave him the potential to do great things as a musician, he fondly recalls one conversation years ago that gave him the direction he needed to funnel it.

“It all comes back to one day that I was speaking with Ellis Marsalis,” said Gerard W., a native of Norco who studied under Marsalis at Loyola University in New Orleans. “He said, ‘Let me tell you something ... my son is the greatest saxophone player on the planet right now. What are you going to bring to the art?’”

Gerard W. admitted those words coming from the father of renowned Branford Marsalis were quite intimidating at first, but soon they sunk in, and they began to define him — or, perhaps more accurately, they inspired him to define himself.

“He was asking me what makes me different?” Gerard W. said. “Who am I? There are saxophone players everywhere and they’re all good, all great at this level. So what am I gonna do that’s different from anybody else?”

Thus, the FnkySax Player was born, and under that

Remembering Montz’s lost plantation

Coleen Perilloux remembers the day in April of 1973 when she watched the demolition of Perilloux House, a plantation that had been in her family since the 1880s.

The family home, along with 43 others, only remains in memory after the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers claimed the location for an emergency levee.

“They gave us all 72 hours to get out and bulldozed everything,” she said.

On that sad day, Perilloux recalled how the building’s steps and railings were removed, possibly for wood.

“When I think of that pure cypress house with the huge beams in the attic put together with pegs, it makes me cry,” she said. “And, the beautiful glass paned doors with the wooden shutters to cover them at night, and the hand-forged latches, etc. So much went under the bulldozers.”

All that remains are some handmade square nails used for cypress that her daughter retrieved from the debris. Perilloux had loops added to them and dipped in gold for family members to wear on a chain.

Perilloux House was also home to one of St. Charles Parish’s original families.

Felix Perilloux bought the plantation in Montz in the 1890s, which consisted of several hundred acres with a big raised house, many barns and a large

carriage house, she said. He built a grocery store, and a pavilion for dances and theatrical performances along with a wharf on the Mississippi River that was known as Perilloux Landing. He moved his wife, Louisa, and their five children to Montz from their home in Lions in St. John Parish.

Perilloux also moved two black families there, the Pierre family and Fifi family.

“Felix and his children were friends with all the people who lived where now stands the Bonnet Carre’ Spillway,” she said.

They were all displaced in the 1920s when the spillway was built.

The Corp of Engineers relocated the Perilloux House and the structure that once overlooked the river that then lost the first floor, and also lost was the pavilion, carriage house, barns, the landing, school house and many acres of land.

Coleen Perilloux’s father, Zephirin Louis Perilloux, inherited the plantation house, the same house the Corps destroyed in 1973. The other two-thirds of the plantation were inherited by Joseph Perilloux and Ida Perilloux. Joseph’s grandson is a vegetable farmer there and sells produce at the Farmer’s Market in the parish and New Orleans.

Ambitious DHS students hope to tackle academic competition

Establishing Academic Decathlon team among their goals

Decathlon and Olympiad are words that traditionally inspire thoughts of the best of the best competing in athletics worldwide.

But they can also be applied to the classroom as well. And if a group of ambitious Destrehan High School students have their way, we’ll begin to see just that on the local level – as well as the great many doors it can open along the way.

Several DHS students have been making a push to establish a “suite” of academic teams at the school, including USA Biology Olympiad, USA Science Olympiad, an American Mathematical Association competitor and an Academic Decathlon team.

It boils down to finding ways to expand the academic opportunities available, said DHS sophomore Bodhaansh Ravipati.

“So far, we have a very small but committed group of people who are working toward making these programs realities,” said Ravipati, who said the idea came while browsing online for tips to improve applications for college. “Academic competitions encourage students to explore their passions and to pursue their dreams.”

“These new academic competitions can help teach our student body to not learn for the purpose of college or jobs, but for the love of learning itself, a quality which has been shown to potentially improve overall student performance,” Ravipati said, adding participation in such events can open countless doors in the college application process.

Ravipati, who plans to major in public health and hopes to one day be

He believes even partial adoption of the ideas could increase student opportunities to build a better future for themselves, but could also boost student morale as a whole.

The Academic Decathlon sees teams generally consisting of nine members that compete against others in their division (determined by GPA). As in its athletic namesake, the decathlon sees the students compete in 10 events: art, economics, language and literature, math, music, science, social science, essay, interview and speech. The first seven are graded via half-hour multiple choice tests for each subject; the final three are graded by judges.

The Biology Olympiad has grown over the years, with just 1,700 students competing nationwide in 2011 to more than 10,000 students last year. The Science Olympiad even larger, with 7,800 middle school and high school teams across all 50 states competing each year. In the Science Olympiad, students compete in 23 events pertaining to various scientific disciplines, including earth science, biology, chemistry, physics, and engineering. There are tournaments on the state, regional and national levels.

come a doctor, said the response from Destrehan administration has been very positive. But as with any major change, sometimes hitches arise. Finding directors for the programs has been challenging thus far – it would require a major time commitment, of course. The short term goal has also shifted from an initial focus on the creation of a decathlon team to the Olympiad and mathematics team – the quota necessary to create a decathlon competitor includes participation of at least six students with lower than a 3.5 GPA, which means establishing a contender there will likely have to wait until next year.

But Ravipati is optimistic that ultimately, their goals are reachable. He pointed to the Destrehan robotics team as an example of what the school’s student body can accomplish in an academically-driven competitive setting. DHS has established one of Louisiana’s elite robotics programs and has competed several times at national championship tournament level.

New office under construction on Highway 90

It’s been a while since there’s been new construction on U.S. Highway 90 in Boutte, but a new building is underway for St. Charles Farm Bureau.

Office Manager Will Sirmon said the location, including the \$475,000 construction of a new office building, represents nearly 50 years of Farm Bureau doing business in St. Charles Parish.

Scheduled to open in October, the office will have three agents, two claims adjusters and three administrative assistants, Sirmon said.

“We’re grassroots in our parish,” he said. “We’ve been

here 40 to 50 years. We’re homegrown and all the agents are from here.”

The 3,960 square-foot building is the property of Farm Bureau, which was funded by Farm Bureau Bank, he said.

“If it hadn’t been for Farm Bureau Bank, we couldn’t have pulled this off,” Sirmon said of the project. “If you don’t have a ton of cash you can’t bring a business in this area,” he said. “I was shocked.”

Sirmon also had owned the land for the office since 2002.

“It’s a great location because it’s the last thing you see when you leave that high traffic area,” he said. “And heading out, it’s one of the first things you see when you come into the area.”

Man convicted of stealing \$12K from Catfish Festival now charged with hundreds of counts of fraud

Allegedly stole \$13K from 88-year old woman

Wayne Guillot Jr., who was convicted in 2016 after pleading guilty to stealing more than \$12,000 from the 2014 Catfish Festival, was recently arrested and charged with more than 600 counts of bank and computer fraud, according to the Jefferson Parish Sheriff’s Office.

Guillot, 45, was arrested on Aug. 12. He was also arrested in June and in Lafourche Parish on charges of issuing worthless checks and forgery, the latter a felony count.

Guillot, formerly of Des Allemands, was the former chairman of the Catfish Festival, which is annually held at St. Gertrude Catholic Church. He received a 10-year prison sentence for the 2014 theft of Catfish Festival funds, with six of those years suspended.

According to a report by NOLA.com, he was released in 2017 for good behavior. The NOLA report also noted an 88-year-old woman was victimized among Guillot’s alleged crimes, with more than \$13,000 stolen from her bank accounts via credit cards activated in her name.

The St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office sought him in late 2015 after he fled

police following the Catfish festival theft, placing him on CrimeStoppers in October of that year as a fugitive accused of filing \$12,351 in fraudulent invoices paying himself the money from the St. Gertrude Catholic Church.

Guillot, who was serving as festival chairman at the time, claimed the invoices were for festival purchases.

When a search of church records revealed Guillot’s alleged fraudulent invoices, a church spokesman noted they contacted the Diocese and were advised to press charges. The church was insured for the loss.

St. Rose residents win fight against proposed townhouses – for now

Filling the St. Charles Parish Council chambers last Monday, St. Rose residents won their months long fight with a developer that sought a special permit to build four townhouses on a lot in their neighborhood.

"Townhouses are not forever homes," resident Jay Smith told the council. "They are bought and most of the time turned into rentals."

The council unanimously rejected the permit request.

Smith, who has lived more than 30 years on Riverview Drive and faced living across from the proposed site, maintained townhouses weren't a good fit for his neighborhood made up mostly of single-home dwellings.

Accompanied by at least 50 neighbors, Smith asked the council to reject D Luxe LLC's second request for a special permit to build four townhouses on Riverview Drive. The company's earlier request died when the Planning Commission tied in a 3-to-3 vote and then recommended approving it when it was submitted a second time.

"We're the same people who voted for you," he told the council. "Now support us."

Collectively, residents raised concerns about limited parking, sewer problems, devaluing property and the townhomes not being a good fit for their community.

Councilwoman Marilyn Bellock, who represents the area and lives on Riverview Drive, expressed her support for the residents, but also warned the property is zoned light commercial and that would allow the developer to instead put a commercial operation there.

Councilman Dick Gibbs, who agreed with the potential of the land going commercial per its zoning, agreed with Bellock along with fellow members Wendy Benedetto, Paul Hogan, Mary

Clulee, Julia Fisher-Perrier and Traci Fletcher (members Billy Woodruff and Terrell Wilson did not attend the meeting).

Developers Kenneth and DeAndray Martin own the nearly one-acre lot and told the council they intended to put a quality product on the site.

Kenneth Martin Jr. said the project would not negatively impact the community.

"Anything they asked we were willing to do," Martin said. "We want to put something pleasant ... affordable on the property. We make a great product and we comply with everything."

DeAndray Martin added they'd prefer to build residential on the property.

"I want to give them something that would be better for their neighborhood,"

she said.

But residents spoke against the move for nearly two hours to the council.

Resident Vicki Smith, who has lived in St. Rose for more than 30 years, said when they asked Kenneth Martin to build a single-family dwelling there he replied he'd just build commercial there.

"The four townhomes will cause more infrastructure problems," Smith said. "I just hope you understand where we're coming from. These townhomes don't conform. I invested my life in St. Charles Parish and now you want to put townhomes directly in front of me."

Resident Tim Kelly said he bought his **ST. ROSE on 10A**

Wise people have an easy time recalling
their blessings, not their worries

In a recent interview on National Public Radio's StoryCorps, Walter Dixon, a 90-year-old veteran of three wars, spoke to his son Russ Dixon about how, after a case of mistaken identity, he returned home to find that his world had moved on without him.

Walter Dixon had been married for just five days when he was shipped off to Korea for his second war deployment. About a year later, at age 22, he was

declared dead. When they published his obituary in the local paper, his wife back home in Waynesville, MO., had no way of knowing that this news was premature. In reality, the enemy captured Dixon as a prisoner.

Dixon was captured while trying to aid his fellow comrades. He saw five men from his unit get hit by hostile fire. One soldier had both legs broken, so he took his field jacket off and wrapped it around his legs to hold them together. When he returned to his weapon, the Chinese forces supporting the North Koreans came up behind him.

When the bodies were later found, Dixon's jacket, which carried letters from his wife in the pockets, was the evidence that mistakenly counted him as a deceased soldier. For the next two and a-half-years, he was held a prisoner in a North Korean camp. It was a harrowing experience.

Dixon escaped five times, but each time they caught and punished him. When the fighting ended, the Red Cross arrived at the camp and notified the prisoners of their release.

Qualifying yields
uptick in intraparty
legislative races

Out of the 96 legislative races on Louisiana's October primary ballot, 42 of them will pit members of the same party against each other.

The tally includes 25 all-GOP House and Senate elections and another 17 races with nothing but Democrats, based on last week's qualifying process and related information compiled by the Secretary of State's Office.

That means about 44 percent of all of the competitive legislative elections this cycle — or those with two or more contenders — will come down to intraparty battles.

Consultants and other campaign professional suggest it's an unprecedented figure, and that the trend is strengthening.

Moreover, the uptick in intraparty legislative races signals a transition to full partisanship in the Legislature, which has experienced a gradual but aggressive Republican takeover during the past three election cycles.

In other words, the transition and segmentation are complete — or, as Baton Rouge pollster Bernie Pinsonat is fond of saying, if a Capitol politician is in the middle, that Capitol politician is probably roadkill.

On both sides of the aisle, it no longer matters whether a candidate is a Democrat or a Republican, Pinsonat and others have noted along the trend line; what matters now is how Republican or how Democratic the candidates appear.

A larger drive for this R vs. R and D vs. D development has been Louisiana's unique open primary system, also referred to by some as a jungle primary system, where all candidates are pitted against each other on the same ballot, regardless of party.

Last year, Louisiana Republican Party Chairman Louis Gurvich offered up an op-ed to newspapers around the state last year complaining about the only statewide race on the ballot in 2018.

That's when a special election was called for secretary of state, but Gurvich's could have well been reserved for the ongoing cycle.

Your Diversified Portfolio vs. the S&P 500

How global returns and proper diversification are affecting overall returns.

"Why is my portfolio underperforming the market?" This question may be on your mind. It is a question that investors sometimes ask after stocks shatter records or return exceptionally well in a quarter.

The short answer is that even when Wall Street rallies, international markets and intermediate and long-term bonds may underperform and exert a drag on overall portfolio performance. A little elaboration will help explain things further.

A diversified portfolio necessarily includes a range of asset classes. This will

always be the case, and while some investors may wish for an all-equities portfolio when stocks are surging, a 100% stock allocation is obviously fraught with risk.

Because the stock market has advanced so much over the past decade, some investors now have larger positions in equities than they originally planned, and that may leave them exposed to an uncomfortable degree of market risk. A portfolio held evenly in equities and fixed income ten years ago may now have a clear majority of its assets in equities, with the performance of stock markets influencing its return to a greater degree.

Yes, stock markets – not just here,

but abroad. U.S. investors have more global exposure than they once did. International holdings represented about 5% of the typical investor's portfolio back in the 1990s. Today, they account for around 15%. If overseas markets struggle, the impact on portfolio performance may be noticeable.

In addition, a sudden change in sector performance can have an impact. At one point in 2018, tech stocks accounted for 25% of the weight of the S&P 500. While the recent restructuring of S&P sectors lowered that by a few percentage points, portfolios can still be greatly affected when tech shares slide, as investors witnessed in late 2018.

“It’s certainly an honor to be recognized for the work we do outside of just testing,” Oertling said. “We’ve always taken the approach we want to educate the whole child and not only provide them an excellent education, but also to grow as students and people.”

Niche ranks school systems based on “a rigorous analysis of academic and student life data from the U.S. Department of Education along with test scores, college data, and ratings collected from millions of Niche users.”

St. Charles also earned high marks in other areas. It was named the third safest school district in the state; ranked as having the state’s third best group of teachers; and as the state’s fourth most diverse school district. Among New Orleans area schools, it also ranked as the best place to teach, the best for athletes, as having the best teachers, as most diverse and as the safest.

St. Charles Parish Public Schools has perennially placed near the top of these rankings over the past several years. In 2018, it ranked as the top school district in Louisiana on the Niche list, while a year before that it placed third overall.

Oertling said the recognition is

TRAGEDY from 1A

It was Nov. 11, 1912 when a speeding freight crashed into the train and cost 14 people their lives, leaving many more injured.

The Picayune headline was, “Midnight Excursion Train Halted at Montz, by Mishap, Run Into by Speeding Freight Which Crushes and Cremates Cars Crowded With Passengers for Woodville (Miss).”

The scene was chaotic and graphic. “The wreck occurred in a remote location, slowing medical assistance from reaching the victims,”

according to the book, St. Charles Parish, Louisiana: A Pictorial History. “The water supply was inadequate and there were few buckets to use. Injured passengers able to flee the train sought refuge in the nearby cornfields, which were illuminated by the wreckage flames.”

The Associated Press reported the wreck was caused by the freight crashing into the rear of the excursion train. Five of the 10 coaches burned and many of the bodies of victims were believed to have been cremated. Passengers from the front coaches rushed to the burning ones and dragged injured and dead from the flames.

“Both the dead and wounded were scattered about the cornfields of Montz,” according to accounts. “Many long hours passed before a doctor was able to reach the scene.”

It would not be until the next day before the injured received medical care in New Orleans.

A weeklong investigation soon followed that included convening a St. Charles Parish grand jury, as well as a joint inquiry of state and interstate commissions at Baton Rouge. It was the first of its kind to be conducted in the U.S.

The results led to blame being directed toward the Yazoo and

Mississippi Valley Railroad Co., as well as employees. They were cited for “poor judgment, poor training and poor equipment.”

The AP further reported that a statement issued by the rail company said the the wreck was caused by a brakeman who failed to obey orders and signal the freight train.

The Montz Train Disaster

- » Nov. 11, 1912: A freight train rear ends an excursion train, a wreck that becomes known as the “worst rail disaster in the United States” at the time.
- » Five of 10 coaches reportedly catch fire.
- » An estimated 14 people are killed, some believed cremated in the intense flames of the fires.

Both Champagne and Parish President Larry Cochran pointed to an uptick in early voters, rising from around 100 to more than 500. They had started putting voting machines in the hallway to accomodate that increase.

‘We needed to tackle that one immediately,’ Cochran said. “It’s a better environment, not only for the Registrar of Voters, but also for our citizens.”

The expanded office will allow room for more than twice as many voting machines, from five to up to 12.

“It will improve everything we do,” Champagne said. “It’ll make us more efficient. It will have records and proper storage.”

Champagne said they will return to the office in the week of Sept. 9, although the staff is there moving records.

At an estimated 600 square feet, the office had remained at is original size since the courthouse opened in 1976. Champagne said the expansion has been discussed for years by previous administrations, and Parish President Larry Cochran developed a plan with the cooperation of Clerk of Court Lance Marino.

Marino’s office is providing the added space for registrars, while regaining space or offices to the rear of his office. It also will soon be reconfigured to facilitate services.

Cochran said the multiphase project is long overdue.

“The expansion and remodeling is aimed at giving people the space they need,” he said.

Overall, Cochran said they are assessing the departments’ space needs in order to update the courthouse efficiently.

near Airline Hwy. and East 22nd St. in Reserve.

Detectives pieced together the case through the use of a crime camera and business surveillance camera footage that reportedly recorded the shooting, in which a pickup truck pulls alongside a car before those inside the pickup began to fire, mortally wounding the two victims. According to the St. John the Baptist Sheriff’s Office, no motive has been determined.

Through the surveillance footage and the use of license plate recognition cameras, detectives were able to identify the gray Chevrolet Silverado, later finding it parked in the driveway of an

unidentified St. Charles Parish home. Taylor, St. John police believe, was the driver of the vehicle.

Whoever had been in that truck apparently attempted to repair damage incurred by the vehicle during the incident. Detectives believe shots had been fired into a door of the truck by one occupant, and the door had been replaced. Police later recovered the damaged door, according to the St. John the Baptist Parish Sheriff’s Office.

Both men have several previous arrests on record, according to the St. John Sheriff’s Office which noted 12 prior arrests of Williams and seven arrests of Taylor.

“As for my part, I grow a crop that my grandfather, Felix, grew as a hobby – vetiver,” she said. “My vetiver sells in the gift shops of a few plantations upriver and is the progeny of Felix’s vetiver.”

Coleen said the only remnant of that era is the house she owns, which her father built of cypress in the 1920s when he returned from New Orleans to help his mother with the place.

For Coleen, growing up in Montz was “heaven on earth.”

“There were the fields, the river and home,” she said. “We had St. Isidore Church built by Father Basty and we went to school at Montz School through third grade and then, on to St. Charles Borromeo in Destrehan. Everyone knew

one another and helped one another. In the 1950s LP&L expropriated all of Keller Town where about 12 Keller families had lived for generations.”

By 1985, she bought the property and house from her brothers and sisters.

Coleen added, “I never plan to let go of it and hope that my children and grandchildren will keep it in the family ... just as the Mississippi flows 300 yards from the property.

- » 1890s: Felix Perilloux bought a plantation in Montz, which consisted of several hundred acres. His wife and children soon follow him there
- » 1920s: They were all displaced when the Bonnet Carre’ Spillway was built.

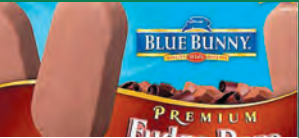

Cardinals wrap summer in National Semifinal

Pedal Valves end a run to remember at Legion World Series

In only its fourth season after it was established, the Pedal Valves Cardinals captured the attention and imagination of baseball fans statewide.

Cory Cook and Stephen Kline of De La Salle; Patrick Boudreaux of Riverside; Kolby Bourgeois of Lutchter; Ron Franklin and Stephen Powers of Rummel and Kolby McWilliams of St. Martin's.

"It was pretty amazing to go out there with these guys and be playing on national television," said T.J. Thomas. "It was a special experience I think for all of us."

"This team doesn't have selfish players. All of these guys are about winning and doing what it takes, nobody's in it for themselves. I think that was a big reason we had the success we did."

The Cardinals (38-9) were eliminated by Fargo, N.D. Post 2 (54-7), 10-4, on Monday night. It was a tough break for the team in many ways, as it was Pedal Valves' first loss in the World Series; the semifinal round and onward are single elimina-

game loss before winning three straight.

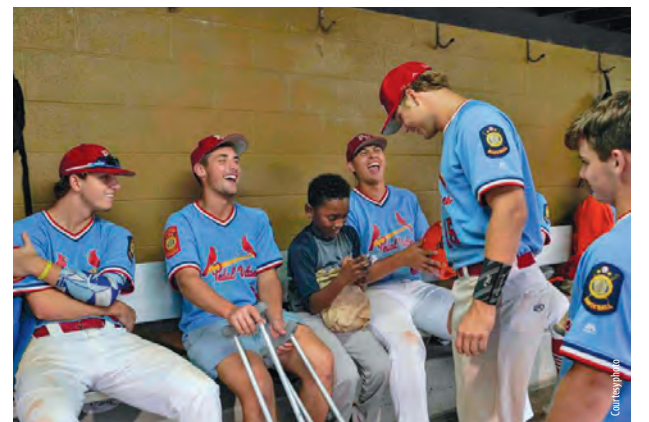
back to Louisiana — it would have been the state's first since Jesuit-based Retif Oil did it in 2012 —but it did nothing to erase a summer of

Scrimmages will showcase 2019 Wildcat, Tiger lineups

St. Charles Parish has long starved for the return of football. And indeed, it's that time of year.

Those looking for a preview of what the parish's high school football landscape will look like in 2019 have their chance at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, as both Hahnville and Destrehan will host their respective pre-season scrimmages. Hahnville will square off against Northshore, while Destrehan locks up with Salmen.

The Wildcats are coming off a 13-1 season, their lone loss coming in the Class 5A semifinals against Zachary. With heavy turnover to both its offensive and defensive lineup, Thursday represents a chance to see how the Wildcats come together.

Meanwhile, for Hahnville, 2018 saw a 6-6 record and a season of distraction that the Tigers look to quickly put behind them, though it wasn't without success — HHS scored a road playoff win at Walker to open the '18 postseason before also bowing out to Zachary. Hahnville brings back the majority of its key players from a season ago.

What to watch at Destrehan:

*QB Damarius Jackson is a senior and first year

starter, and he brings a unique element to the quarterback position for a DHS team that's relied on pocket passers for many seasons. The 5'9 Jackson extends plays and is a threat to do great damage with his legs. He played well in the team's spring game, and this is his next test.

*Quincy Brown. The Mississippi State commitment is an often-spectacular vertical receiver who demands extra coverage. After announcing he's Mississippi State bound, he may well celebrate with a touchdown – or more.

*A relentless defensive line. The Wildcats are very, very fast up front, with a former middle linebacker – Noah Taliancich—and former quarterback—Michael Jackson—at defensive tackle and end, respectively. That's what defensive coordinator Malter Scobel's scheme thrives on, and it could be interesting to see how Salmen handles that pressure.

What to watch at Hahnville:

*Andrew Naquin had the kind of up and down season one might expect of a sophomore thrust into the starting quarterback position in Class 5A, but improved

as the season went on. Hahnville coaches have noted great progress, and if Naquin takes a big step, it seems likely the Tigers will do just that as well.

*Offensive coordinator Daniel Luquet's new offense. Luquet joins the Hahnville staff this season and will have this team operating with a very new look via his spread offensive attack. There's little doubt the Tigers will remain run heavy under head coach Nick Saltaformaggio, but Luquet is a creative offensive mind with a strong track record, and the Tigers' backfield should have a chance to have great success, led by running back Darryle Evans.

*Stopping the big play. Hahnville's front 7 should rival just about any in the state, with size, toughness and athleticism across the board. Saltaformaggio has noted since the spring that if Hahnville is to reach its goals, the defensive backfield must step up to the challenge. There's talent there, led by cornerback Syre Lewis, and if this unit has a big day here, it could bode very well for the season ahead.

Tampa, Fla. to earn both championships—and a spot in the World Series. Pedal Valves has earned the Louisiana state championship three times in the team's four years of completion thus far.

Once there, the Cardinals made themselves at home in Shelby. They outscored opponents 35-8 to leap out to

three wins and earning their pool (division) title.

Before getting to the semifinal round, Pedal Valves rallied from two early three-run deficits to blast off for 13 runs in its last three inning at bat, leading to a 14-6 win over Albuquerque, N.M. Post 2 on Saturday night to finish pool play. Thomas had three hits in the game

to lead the way. Bourgeois highlighted the effort as well with a three-run home run. The win allowed the team a day of rest, after officially clinching its spot in the semifinal round with a dominant 9-1 win over Festus, Mo. Post 253

Des Allemands painter loves telling the story

Sitting on a chair with brush in hand in her kitchen, Kellie Breaux intently painted the fine details of an alligator against a twilight swamp scene on an aged cedar plank.

With soft light pouring in from a window and her TV nearby, this is where her creativity pours onto the canvas.

"I love painting on wood," Breaux said applying another stroke to the alligator. "I love the wood grains."

Swamp scenes are a favorite for this Des Allemands artist, but her work is really only limited by her imagination. And it's pretty open to new ideas as shown by a menagerie of paintings on her walls and fireplace mantle, and even her cedar kitchen tops made from wood she got from an old mill nearby. It showcases Breaux's ability to turn nearly anything that catches her eye into an artistic piece, which includes sculpting, woodcarving, porcelain dolls and furniture.

"I've always done art since I was young," she said.

She attributes her creativity to her mother and why she signs her every work as "Patiki" in lasting appreciation and memory of what she taught Breaux. It originates from her mother's name of "Pam" and Breaux's nickname, "Tiki," and her every work bears this signature.

"Every time I paint a painting it reminds me of my mom," she said. "When I worked with my mom, she would sculpt and I would do the painting ... all the fine stuff I would finish. It was so special. My signing the Patiki name keeps her in my heart. She's my inspiration."

Breaux said she took after her mother with art, but her dad the carpenter helped, too.

"If I needed anything, my dad would just run out to the shed and finish it," she said. "It was a family thing and it was pretty cool."

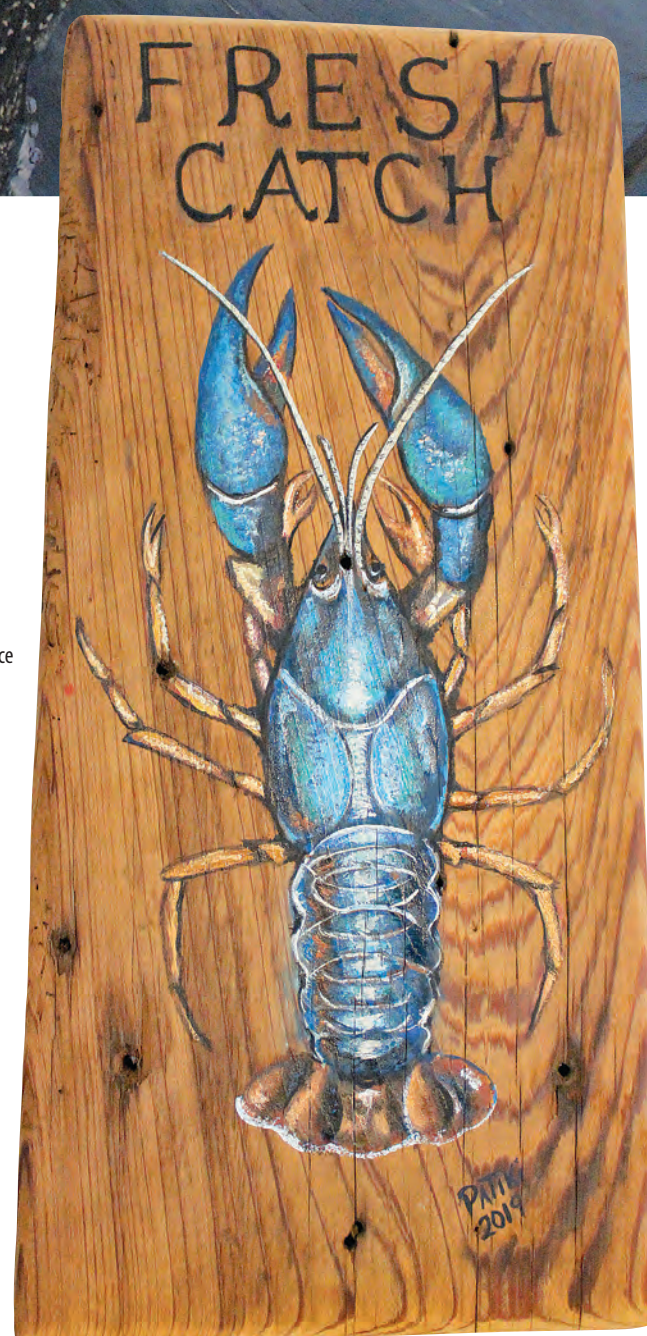
By age 25, she was dabbling in more painting and soon decided it was time to put her talent to use.

“What I really love most is what people want me to paint for them,” she said of designing personal pieces. “They send me a photograph and want me to do something for them.”

Breaux enjoys painting to order, and it became clearer to her that painting was so relaxing it was like therapy.

From there, her claim to fame has become based on staying true to her developing eye for painting and it’s paying off.

Her folk art style has generated attention.

Breaux said the Louisiana paintings (literally a painting on Louisiana-shaped wood) are varied with collages.

The Revival Art House in Ponchatoula has contacted her about displaying her work there. There’s a demand for her Louisiana work, but there is here, too.

A piece of driftwood given to her became a swamp scene with a wood duck, bearing nature’s beautiful colors in the plumage.

Reclaimed or leftover parts of cedar planks from a nearby mill, like the one she is painting the alligator on, are becoming prized works. One of them bears her original work of the “beer swamp” with bottles of beer depicted with roots like cypress trees, and another bears the LSU stadium and tiger.

Breaux has a piece of piling from her mother’s house and plans to paint the Des Allemands bridge (big bridge and little bridge) on it. This would rank among her favorite projects because of the family connection, but she also singled out the Fleur de lis with a football because she’s a football fan and the entryway table at her home.

“I just make things I want,” she said. “I’m always painting my walls. I’m all about color.”

Her artistic eye seems to be always

roaming about for the next interesting project.

“I’m a starving artist,” she mused. “It’s my passion. I love being creative.”

And for those who want to share the experience, she offers the opportunity to have a “paint party” with a per-person charge where she supplies wood and paint to any individual who wants to paint, too.

“Usually it’s signs, including Santa Claus, the Grinch, the Saints or flower,” she said of groups that have gone as high as 21 people. “It takes a couple of hours. It’s fun to do.”

And Breaux hopes there will be many more times she gets to sign “Patiki” to her work. With every one completed would come her mother’s joyous affirmation. “Every time I would finish a piece, I would sign it,” she said. “She’d always say, ‘Damn, we’re good.’”

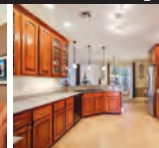

The fees in this section shall be increased or decreased on February first of each year by a change in CIP applicable to the US cities average group, all urban consumers, all items published by the US Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, for the preceding twelve-month period ending each November. The change shall become effective beginning with the period ending November 30, 2000. The department of finance shall notify the department of planning and zoning in writing annually of the revised fees.

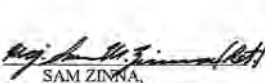
