

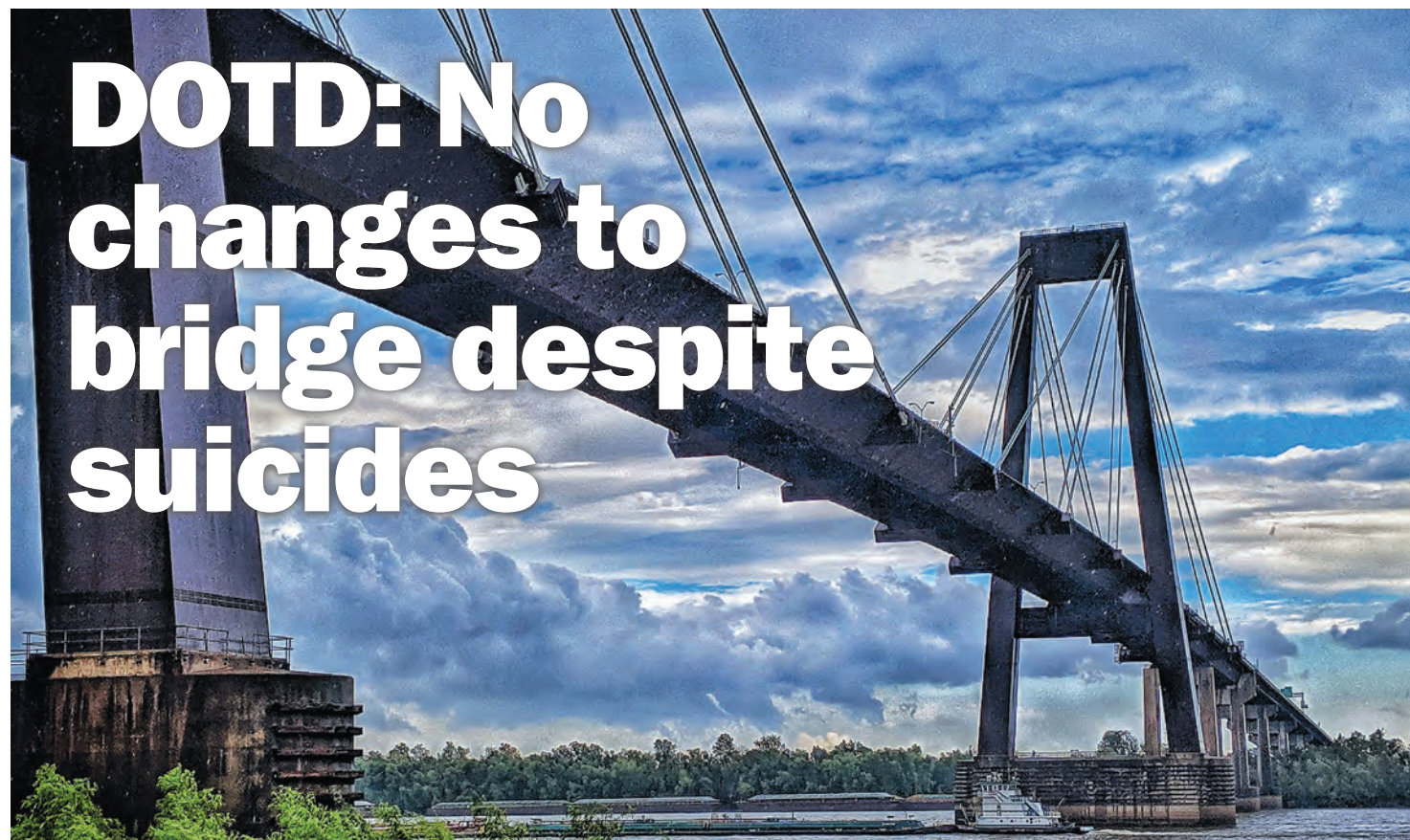

When 47-year-old Lisa Belsom of River Ridge left her house last Wednesday, she told her father that she was going to jump off the Hale Boggs Bridge.

Later, at around 8:26 p.m., witnesses reported seeing a woman jump from the Luling bridge into the Mississippi River. The next day, Belsom's body was found in Plaquemines Parish, said Plaquemines

Parish Chief Investigator Charles Guey. An autopsy determined she died on impact from "multiple blunt force injuries related to a fall."

The fact that Belsom, and several others, have resorted to jumping off the Luling bridge in order to end their lives has raised questions about whether anything can be done to prevent the deaths.

It is estimated there are 125 suicides a year in the United States where people jump off of a bridge. Barriers have been added in an effort to prevent these suicides in some states. Louisiana is not one of them, according to the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development (DOTD).

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# Renovations, upgrades underway for several St. Charles schools

The ball is officially rolling on several major projects that will see St. Charles Parish’s public schools receiving upgrades and renovations courtesy of the 2019 sales tax bond that earmarked \$15 million for those purposes.

Work on the projects began this year and the goal is to have all finished by the end of 2023, according to John Rome Jr., Chief Plant Services and Security Officer for St. Charles Parish Public Schools.

The 2019 bond is the third major bond project over the past decade. The 2012 bond issue led to the elimination of portable classrooms and addition of new school wings. In 2015, the targeted areas were upgrades to safety and security measures, including camera, fencing, lighting upgrades and safety-related building modifications.

Some of the projects planned using the 2019 bond funds include; a roof replacement at E.J. Landry Alternative Center; stadium concrete and grout repairs at Destrehan and Hahnville high schools; a track replacement at Destrehan High School; renovations to three buildings

at Mimosa Park Elementary; gym expansion and renovation at Destrehan and Hahnville high schools; drainage improvements at the Performing Arts Center, R.K. Smith Middle and the Satellite Center; and a main canopy

and concrete replacement at Destrehan and Hahnville high schools and the Satellite Center.

“It’s a long list of projects ... this bond gives us the chance to address the maintenance and preservation of our existing facilities,” Rome said. “We’re ready to get running on this first phase, and over the next few years, everything

# Luling teacher is ‘climbing another hill’ in cancer battle, but remains determined

It’s been a six-year battle with ocular melanoma for Kellie Growl and one that just took another hard turn with two tumors showing slight growth again.

This rare eye cancer claimed the life of Louisiana Gov. Kathleen Blanco, but Growl is staying positive and grateful to the many people who have helped her. Among them is St. Charles Parish Public Schools, which has given her the leeway needed to continue working as a math resource teacher at Luling Elementary School while also getting treatments.

Growl was told she had Stage 4 melanoma, which had spread from her eye to her liver in a year.

“I’m okay with it as just another hill to climb over, but thankful that I still have a treatment option to work with what I have,” she said. “I try to find the positives in every aspect of this journey. It’s not great I have two tumors growing, but I’m happy that they have an option for me to try that will, hopefully, help shrink the tumors.”

Growl will begin this week with two immunotherapy treatments intended to stimulate the body’s immune system to defend itself from metastatic melanoma.

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# Man charged in teen's murder will serve 20 years in jail

Pleads guilty to manslaughter, obstruction

The man charged for the 2018 murder of 19-year-old Savahn Stewart of Luling was sentenced to 20 years in prison after he pleaded guilty to manslaughter and obstruction of justice.

Leonard Celestine, 25 and of 1108 Paul Fredrick St. in Luling, has begun serving the non-suspended sentence as result of a plea bargain. He was initially charged with second degree murder, obstruction of justice and illegal carrying of a weapon.

Celestine was indicted in August by a grand jury on a second-degree murder count, stemming from the May 18, 2018 shooting that claimed the life of 19-year-old Savahn Stewart, also of Luling.

Celestine allegedly shot Stewart to death after a confrontation between the two escalated. The incident took place in the 1000 block of Paul Fredrick St, near Celestine's home.

Stewart was taken to St. Charles Parish Hospital, where he died from his injuries. Celestine fled the scene and

was reportedly riding as passenger in a vehicle that was stopped by a St. Charles Parish detective on Interstate 10 north-bound later on the night of the shooting. Celestine's brother, Jerry Celestine, was driving the car, according to police. Both men were arrested and taken into custody.

Third-party watch underway in insurance race

In a statewide race drawing very little coverage from the mainstream press, Insurance Commissioner Jim Donelon appears to maintain a traditional incumbent’s edge over challenger Tim Temple,

whose most recent television commercials are nonetheless capturing the attention of Louisiana’s politicians.

A DeRidder native, Temple is the president of Temptan and his father was a founder of Louisiana Workers’ Compensation Corp. As of last month he had \$855,000 in the bank, and has thus far invested \$1.1 million in personal money in his campaign.

A major beneficiary has been former Insurance Commissioner Robert Wooley, who endorsed Temple and has been paid \$120,000 in consulting fees from the campaign since November.

Donelon, meanwhile, has \$1 million in the bank backed by an aggressive fundraising machine. Donors say they believe at least \$750,000 will be spent between now and the primary, possibly more.

Based on internal polling of campaigns not connected to the insurance commissioner’s race, Donelon is maintaining the same sort of lead he has enjoyed at this stage in previous cycles. Temple, however, has shown a spike due to his recent ad buy, which is expected, and there’s more to come.

If Temple wants more votes, he’ll have to get people interested in the content, consultants argue, which is a high hurdle, and he’ll need to knock some votes off of Donelon. That’s where third party activity may come into play in this race, and those involved in the election are waiting for it with open eyes and ears.

Inventorying Your possessions

It is helpful for insurance purposes

It’s great to have insurance against damage and loss, but if you can’t show proof of your possessions, it may result in a protracted settlement process with your insurance company.1

Four Tips for Creating an Inventory. Creating an inventory may take a bit of upfront work, but it can pay future benefits in smoothing the claims settlement process with your insurer as well as increase the potential of receiving the maximum payment possible.

Possessions. A visual record of your possessions is the best proof of ownership. When videoing your home contents, make sure you are methodical and thorough in going through all your rooms and storage spaces. Speak while you are taping to describe each item; include any relevant information (e.g., “this is a signed first edition of “Moby Dick.”).

Tip No. 2 – Document Value of Your Items. Scan or video receipts of the items in your home. Indicate the make and model where appropriate. If you have artwork or antiques, consider creating a record of any appraisal you may have received on your collectibles.

inventory doesn’t help much if you keep it in the house and your home burns to the ground. If your video is digital (highly recommended), consider storing the file in a “cloud” account rather than on your computer, or alternately, on a USB stick stored in a safety deposit box.

Tip #4 – Keep Your Inventory Updated. Failure to regularly update your inventory may mean unintentionally leaving off expensive new purchases.

Get started by asking your insurance agent if they have an inventory checklist, which may help you remember to include items that you might otherwise overlook.

“It’s unfortunate that public infrastructure is sometimes used in the most unfortunate of ways and not for what it was designed for,” said DOTD spokesman Rodney Mallett. “However, at this time we don’t have plans to install any other safety measures other than what’s in place. State bridges are designed to meet the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) safety standards and are designed for driver safety.”

Pedestrians are not supposed to be on the inter-state bridges or shoulders unless it’s for emergency use, Mallett added. The railings on the bridges are designed for the safety of pedestrians who may be in an emergency situation.

“Our safety section evaluates safety data from across the state and we prioritize how we use these funds based on the needs of the traveling public (vehicles, pedestrians, cyclists) on the roadways,” he said.

Last year, a deputy witnessed a man jump over the railing of the bridge to the Mississippi River below, but his ease at accessing the bridge wasn’t considered “a design issue,” according to authorities. Seven people have jumped off the Hale Boggs Bridge since 2012.

In San Francisco, following nearly a decade of

debate over whether a bridge barrier would work on the Golden Gate Bridge, officials initiated work on a four-year project to install a \$200 million stainless steel net along the bridge. Anticipated to be in place by 2021, it is being located 20 feet down from the bridge’s sidewalk, extending 20 feet over the water.

Part of the justification for the net was a study of the bridge showing 90 percent of those prevented from jumping did not commit suicide at a later date.

Officials hope the net will deter people from trying to jump off the bridge. Even if they do, the net’s upward slope is expected to catch jumpers so they can be retrieved by the bridge district.

St. Charles Parish Councilman Paul Hogan doesn’t believe barriers will help solve the issue.

“The bottom line is if someone wants to kill themselves, they will do it one way or another,” Hogan said. “They will find a way to kill themselves. So the safety net will catch them ... what if they climb to the edge and jump off? Then what do you do?”

He advocates providing mental health services, as well as educating the public on how to identify warning signs shown by those dealing with issues that might lead to suicide.

“People need to be made aware of what to look for in people with issues,” Hogan said. “Sometimes people show issues or they hide them very well.”

The councilman recounted a relative in Florida who had a good job, two kids and showed no signs of suicidal behavior. His wife later discovered her husband’s body after he hung himself in another room at their home.

“You can ban bridges or buildings or trees where they can jump, but it’s about personal responsibilities and problems,” Hogan said.

She completed trials with them in January of 2015, and now she will take the same treatments again. She was told all her tumors had shrunk 50 percent or more by April of 2016 during her last round of treatments.

After returning from MD Anderson two weeks ago, she determined she’d do the therapies again, but this time as formal treatment for cancer.

The road to this point has been equally challenging. Since being diagnosed, Growl has dealt with downfalls like the tumors continuing to grow that required her taking chemotherapy intravenously into the liver, but three rounds into the treatment it was determined it wasn’t working. Then she went to MD Anderson again and the immunotherapy was recommended again.

“I’m good,” she said. “I have a very positive outlook, having faith and going into any circumstance with as positive a mindset possible will help you conquer any battle.”

Six years into her fight with cancer, Growl knows the statistics show she has a tough battle ahead, but she is staying the course.

“Mindset is 90 percent of my treatment,” she said. “The 10 percent comes from the medications and doctors. God has everything in control, ultimately. I just know he’s with me on this journey and I have more to do here before it’s my time.”

It was a 1990 high school graduation ring with the name Kasey Hunter engraved inside. The ring was from Shiloh Christian School. It had been in Nanna’s little rings and things dish in the kitchen for nearly 10 years.

But it did worry her a little and one day recently, as Brad stood in the kitchen, it occurred to her that he could use social media to find the ring’s owner.

Brad saw the name and looked it up on Facebook. He only found one person named Kasey Hunter on the social media site and messaged her with photographs of the ring. It was a match.

Hunter doesn’t remember how she lost the ring, but when she saw the message she was shocked.

“I was like, ‘Oh my goodness.’ I was really shocked,” she said. “I was a little skeptical about his grandmother finding it in a garage sale, but we talked a little bit and they decided to reach out to me. I was the only Kasey Hunter on Facebook.”

Brad said he’d bring the ring to her and the next day they met at Wayne Jacob’s Smokehouse in LaPlace, where she works. Hunter lives in Reserve.

“I kind of hear stories like this all the time, of people helping each other,” Brad said. “There are acts of kindness that are sort of long shots, but they become a good deed. Every now and then it works out.”

Encouraged by his business partner to do the right thing and the memory of his former girlfriend losing her ring, Brad had decided he’d help return the ring to its owner.

“She was really, really happy,” he said. “On Facebook, she said it was her ring and couldn’t believe it.”

The ring came from a middle-high school now closed and formerly in Gretna.

“Brad was a really nice young man, a sweet guy for doing this,” Hunter said. “It was really nice of him to drop it off.”

Hunter expressed gratitude to Brad and his grandmother for this incredible kindness.

“It was really sweet of them to look for me and reach out, and give it to its rightful owner,” she said. “It’s unbelievable. Who would have thought my ring would show up after I kind of shrugged it off?”

Hunter told them she owed them lunch, and they’re going to the restaurant where she can finally meet Juanita, who was determined to return the ring.

Once back in her hands, Hunter mused, “It still fits.”

will roll in.”

The bond comes from sales tax revenue, thus the projects require no increased taxes for the public.

Some of the work has been completed already, like the Destrehan and Hahnville high stadium grouting and concrete repairs, which was finished over the summer.

One of the projects ticketed for completion soon is the installation of a new track at Destrehan High’s football stadium. Danny Hebert will be the engineer handling the task. This track installation will be similar to the one that took place at Hahnville High’s stadium in 2012, mirroring its blueprint while the track system installed will match. Rome said the authorization of bids will likely come in October, with acceptance of the winning bid most likely in January or February.

“That gives us time to accept the low bid, sign the contract, get all the materials and start on it right after track season,” Rome said.

That installation would take place

over next summer and be completed, ideally, by the beginning of next school year.

Another major upcoming project with school athletics will be the renovation and expansion of the Hahnville and Destrehan high gyms, which were constructed originally when the two schools were at the 3A level of enrollment—the schools have long been classified as 5A, which groups the schools with the largest enrollments together for competition.

Typically, Hahnville and Destrehan play one another in basketball at R.K. Smith Middle School, which has a gym

that can seat more people than either high school’s home gym—and even then, the rivalry has been known to bring attendance to maximum capacity. Moreover, the LHSAA mandates that a 5A playoff game must be played in a gymnasium that seats at least 1,000 patrons.

“We don’t have that now, but we will after the renovations,” Rome said. “We want our facilities to live up to that 5A standard no matter the sport.”

The expansion will also create additional space that can be used for P.E. and health class instruction, as well as after hours for other sports and extracurricular activities.

“Space at the gym is always at a premium with so many groups competing to utilize it, so we want to offer an opportunity for more people to use it and get the most mileage out of that, and less having to compete for time there,” Rome said.

Rome credited the district’s Chief Financial Officer, Donna Post, as well as his staff, and the School Board for

enacting a comprehensive plan to address the district’s needs.

“At the end of the day, it’s all about providing a safe, well-maintained and functional learning environment for our students and our teachers,” Rome said.

His boat and home were destroyed, and almost all of his possessions lost.

“It was a short delivery, so I packed a few pairs of shorts and four T-shirts,” Harrison said. “It was a five-day thing. So now that’s all I have left.”

He wasn’t shocked by it, though.

“When the eye went over Elbow Cay, I knew there was no hope at that point,” Harrison said. “And (his boat) was on really good mooring. All the moorings disappeared.”

He added that with his lifestyle, the chance of a storm displacing him goes with the territory.

Harrison has lived completely “100 percent solar” since 1988. He did not have air conditioning or refrigeration in his home and catches rain water to drink. He estimates he reads a book a day, and when he’s not reading, he’s working.

“I live a really simple lifestyle,” Harrison said.

He comes from a military family and has been all over the world, be it for that reason or, later on, his sailing experiences. He worked as a chemical plant engineer for years before he realized he needed a change in his life.

“I just got tired of the noise, the pollution ... I was getting too stressed out,” Harrison said. “I had heartburn every night. The day I quit, that all went away.

“I realized I can have some fun before I die.”

He’s been to France, Portugal, Fiji, New Zealand, Australia, and all over the Gulf and East coasts of the U.S.

“My family growing up moved all over the place ... I guess I never stopped,” Harrison said with a chuckle. “I’m still a nomad ... like an old 60’s hippie. Not quite, but close enough, I guess.”

Since the storm, he’s had to learn to adjust to life back inland. He’s staying with his brother, currently, and plans to buy a boat and move back to Des Allemands.

“I’m gonna see what develops. I don’t have a big plan for it all right now,” he said. “I’m getting re-integrated. I don’t drive, so I don’t have a vehicle ... so that’s one thing in terms of getting re-established. In the U.S., that’s a necessity.

“I’ve been depending on my brother, but I don’t know how long he’ll want to drag me around. He’s been a very good brother to me, but I’m trying to find another boat as we speak.”

In many ways, he’d almost forgotten what life here is like.

“I’m amazed at the abundance here,” Harrison said. “Even just going to the grocery in the Bahamas and doing the same thing here, in terms of quality and quantity, it’s such a dramatic difference.”

Harrison’s son, Kris, established a GoFundMe page (Barry Harrison Hurricane Dorian relief fund) to help raise funds for Harrison to regroup.

The father appreciates the help, though he also carries a positive attitude about his recent misfortune.

“You know, it’s just part of the deal ... with my lifestyle, you occasionally get a storm if you live in the south. And I don’t like the winter,” Harrison said. “There’s nothing you can do ... now I’ve just gotta pick up and get going.”

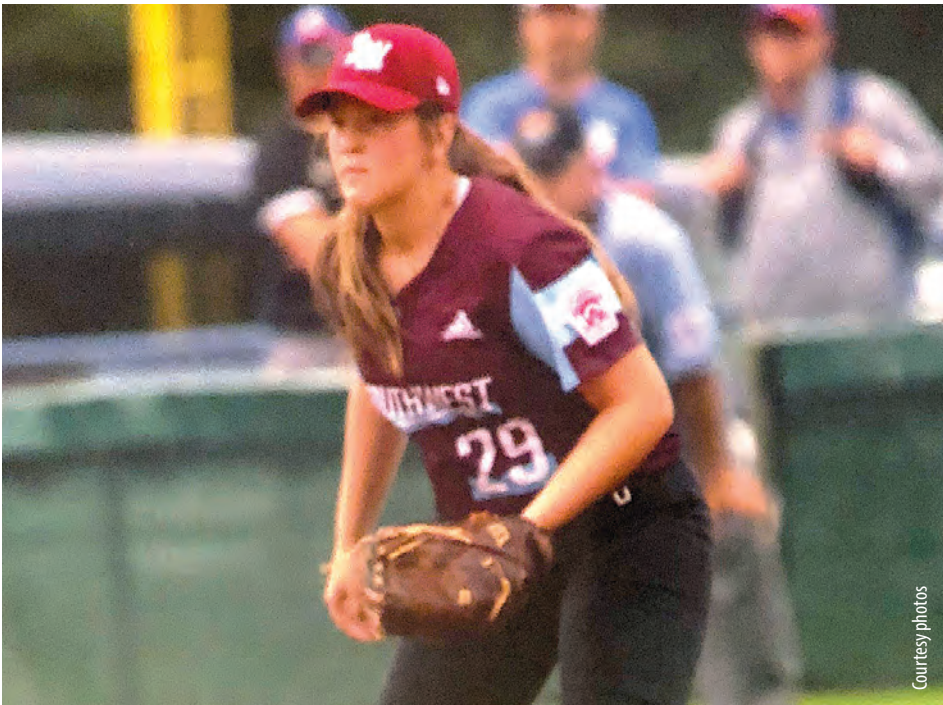

Walker recovered an onside kick and a pooch kick to steal possessions on its first two kickoffs of the night, while coach Chad Mahaffey's team also scored touchdowns on a halfback pass and a double pass. Destrehan turned it over four times and had a kick blocked.

One of the game's

"He really helped us tonight," Robicheaux said. "He kind of negated (Thomas') big play ability, though he still got a few catches. Quincy got a big interception late that kind of sealed the deal ... we needed it. Thomas is

one of the better receivers I've seen in awhile. He can really go get it."

The two teams combined to score 35 points in the first quarter, Destrehan leading 21-14 at its end after a Kyle Edwards 53-yard run put DHS ahead.

Damarius Jackson rushed for three touchdowns. Edwards and Razan Keller each rushed for more than 100 yards. Kelvin Lea scored on defense after the linebacker forced and recovered a fumble, returning it more than 90 yards to paydirt.

### Kristy Lapeyrouse weight history

- » Weight gain started with birth of her first son.
- » Her weight peaked at 298 pounds.
- » Self-discipline with eating right and exercising helped her to drop to about 250 pounds.
- » After joining Anytime Fitness, she dropped to around 230 pounds and feels she's progressing to her goal of weighing less than 200 pounds.

**P**eaking at 298 pounds, Kristy Lapeyrouse is pleased with having lost a little over 60 pounds and gladly still losing weight.

The weight gain started with the birth of her oldest son.

"I had gained a lot of weight because I was on bed rest and tried to lose weight, but I wasn't able to do it," Lapeyrouse said. "It was staying there."

Nearly five years later, she was pregnant again and this time with twins.

"I was still heavy," she said. "I had complications during my pregnancy where my blood pressure went up and I had problems holding fluid."

These health issues put her in the hospital for four weeks and her doctor initially advised she have a C-section and then decided she complete the pregnancy, which came six weeks later.

It wasn't an easy move,

particularly when Lapeyrouse's tests revealed her liver was failing, but then the unexplainable happened.

"Every time they did it [the test] my blood work got better," she said. "I probably shouldn't be living right now because of that situation."

After the birth of her twins, she

observed, "I just got bigger."

A year later, Lapeyrouse said she was depressed about her weight, "still eating bad and not feeling very well."

The turning point came when she went shopping for a dress for a Christmas party.

"My clothes didn't fit anymore and I was tired all the time and depressed," she said. "I was not loving myself, and trying to lose the weight with the kids was not very easy. "Everything looked horrible. The dresses were pretty, but I made them horrible."

By then, she weighed 298 pounds.

At that moment, she decided to start eating healthy, walking and lifting weights at home, as well as trying different diets and workouts, for about four years. Her husband and children were supportive, but her weight yo-yo'd by five to 10 pounds.

"I was getting aggravated," Lapeyrouse said. "I was eating good and doing workouts, but couldn't figure out why the rest of the weight wasn't coming off."

She'd managed to reach 250 pounds, which was about a year ago.

Then a friend told her about Anytime Fitness in Destrehan and its many programs.

"I went for a week free on a pass and I really enjoyed it," Lapeyrouse said. "In the first three months, I didn't lose anything but kept going five days a week. After three months working out at the gym, my weight started to fall off."

She lost 10 pounds and then it got a little slower at three to four pounds off a month.

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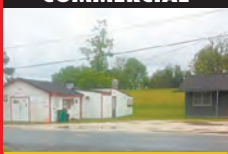

She also does spin class at the gym, as well as live and digital classes five days a week. She is consistent with going to the classes and it’s helping.

“It’s helping me lose the weight and tone the muscles, Lapeyrouse said. “I feel a lot more energy and I’m happy pretty much all the time, even though I’m not where I want to be I don’t let it get me down. I stay motivated.”

Lapeyrouse said it’s important not to put oneself down, and to join a gym and try different workouts. Spin class helps burn calories. She eats plant proteins, vegetables and chicken. Her superfood is spinach, and she has a “cheat day” where she rewards herself for her progress.

It’s also good to have three boys, particularly twins who keep an eagle eye on their mother. When they check on her, they say, “Mom, are you supposed to be eating that? They know what’s junk.”

WHEREAS, a vacancy exists in the office of Justice of the Peace, Justice of the Peace District 1, Parish of St. Charles, due to the resignation of the Honorable Aleshia J. Smith, effective July 31, 2019; and

WHEREAS, Louisiana Revised Statute 18:621 requires the Governor to call a special election to fill a vacancy in the office of a judge when more than twelve (12) months of the term remain unexpired, in accordance with the provisions of La. R.S. 18:621, and/or the dates for elections set forth in La. R.S. 18:402.

NOW THEREFORE, I, JOHN BEL EDWARDS, Governor of the State of Louisiana, by virtue of the authority vested by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Louisiana, do hereby order and direct as follows:

SECTION 1: A special primary and general election shall be held throughout the jurisdiction of the Justice of the Peace District 1, Parish of St. Charles, for the purpose of electing a justice of the peace to fill the vacancy in the office.

SECTION 2: Any qualified person desiring to become a candidate for the office shall file a notice of candidacy, accompanied either by a qualifying fee or a nominating petition, as required or authorized by law, with the appropriate election official in the manner and form, and under the procedures and conditions, provided by La. R.S. 18:461 *et seq.*, and all other applicable provisions of the Louisiana Election Code, La. R.S. 18:1 *et seq.*, during the period commencing Wednesday, January 8, 2020, and ending at 4:30 p.m. Friday, January 10, 2020.

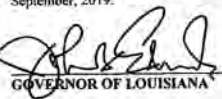
SECTION 3: The special election shall be held and conducted under the applicable provisions of the Louisiana Election Code, La. R.S. 18:1 *et seq.*

SECTION 4: The primary election shall be held Saturday, April 4, 2020, and the general election shall be held Saturday, May 9, 2020, at the times and places and in the manner, prescribed by law.

SECTION 5: The Secretary of State, Commissioner of Elections, Parish Board of Election Supervisors, Clerk of Court, Registrar of Voters, and all other persons charged with any power, function, right, duty or responsibility in conducting elections in the jurisdiction of the Justice of the Peace District 1, Parish of St. Charles, are hereby authorized, requested, directed and empowered to exercise every lawful function and to do every act necessary to conduct the special election, to cause the returns to be made, to canvass and promulgate the results, and to perform all related and incidental functions.
