Parish residents with 2 carts may see their garbage bill double

Hundreds of St. Charles Parish residents will receive a letter informing them they have 30 days to turn in their second garbage cart or see their garbage bill double.

The announcement comes days after the parish suspended its recycling program because of skyrocketing hauling costs for recyclables.

Contract Monitoring Specialist Chandra Sampey told the Parish Council at the Oct. 21 meeting that garbage service provider,

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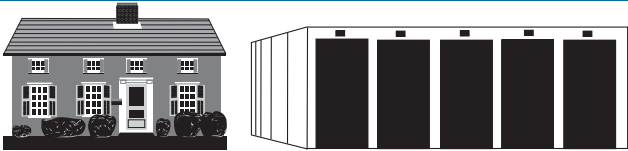

Louisiana had record tourism numbers for 2018

The state welcomed 51.3 million visitors, representing a 9 percent increase over 47.1 million visitors reported in 2017. Visitors spent \$18.8 billion, an increase of 7 percent over 2017. The travel and tourism industry generated \$1.9 billion in state and local tax revenue in 2018. Tax revenue generated through travel and tourism spending saves each household in Louisiana \$1,082 a year in taxes that would be needed to maintain current services.

“We’ve seen a continued growth over the past three years of hotel accommodations, attractions, and tourism jobs all across the Louisiana. This growth has enabled us to continue successfully increasing our visitation numbers to reach 51.3 million,” said Lt. Gov. Billy Nungesser. “By promoting Louisiana as a place where you can Feed Your Soul, we can attract more visitors, which means more tax revenue we can generate. Through continuing to prioritize efforts to promote Louisiana and with the ongoing support of our partners across the state, we can continue this success.”

Investing in tourism to promote and market Louisiana leads to thousands of direct and indirect jobs for the state. At the end of 2018, U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics data shows 237,200 jobs were the result of visitor spending in Louisiana, an increase of 2,600 new tourism-related jobs over 2017. A total of 6,700 new tourism-related jobs have been added in Louisiana since 2016.

Nungesser unveiled a new branding for the state in January 2018 – Louisiana: Feed Your Soul – to convey to the world that no other state can offer the incredible bounty of food, music, history, and culture that Louisiana can.

In January 2019, Louisiana received a Gold Adrian Award for advertising excellence for the campaign. The state was one of only 18 winners worldwide and three in the United States.

LABI outlines recommendations for state budget changes

Did You Know...

1. The Louisiana Legislature appropriated more than \$25 billion in the current fiscal year – a state budget that is 44 percent larger than 10 years ago and represents the highest per capita spending among states in the South?

Action Item: Enact cost controls on spending so the state doesn’t find itself in another deficit in a few short years.

2. Most of Louisiana’s \$25 billion state budget is considered off limits to annual review or reductions?

Action Item: Eliminate most statutory dedications and allow for annual

Action Item: Require interest earned on dedications to remain with the State General Fund.

Action Item: Review and reduce ALL government spending, including the portion that is sent to the local government.

5. Funding for K-12 schools has not been reduced in any of the recent

deficits? In fact, spending has increased by more than \$900 million in the State General Fund for schools over the past decade?

Action Item: Review ALL government spending and avoid additional reductions in areas of the state budget that have been repeatedly scrutinized, instead focusing on areas where costs and funding continue to grow.

6. The Medicaid budget for Louisiana has increased by more than \$1 billion over the past decade, just in the State General Fund share?

Action Item: Seek reforms to the Medicaid program that can improve access and quality of care while also controlling the exponential growth in costs of services.

Luling man will serve 3 years after setting trailer fire

Puppy was found injured after flames were extinguished

A Luling man was sentenced to three years in prison as result of a case stemming from an incident earlier this year in which he allegedly set fire to an abandoned Luling trailer and injured a puppy that was inside.

Ernest Thompson, 25, of 609 Paul Fredrick St. in Luling, pleaded guilty to a charge of simple arson as part of a plea bargain. He is currently serving his sentence, which was not suspended, and receives credit for time served.

Thompson was arrested Feb. 18. According to the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office, Thompson entered the trailer and set fire to it before he was witnessed

leaving and being driven away by another person. St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office spokesman Cpl. James Grimaldi said the trailer was abandoned and that no one resided there.

A witness reported the fire after seeing smoke coming from the abandoned trailer.

While firefighters called to the scene extinguished the flames, a white pit bull puppy was found inside with soot marks on its back, as well as an injured leg.

Police found Thompson in the area later that day and detained him before subsequently arresting him.

According to a post to the St. Charles Parish Animal Shelter’s Facebook page on Feb. 22, the rescued pit bull suffered a tibial tubercle avulsion fracture, or a bone pulled away on the knee, that will require pins and tension wire and is causing a severe limp.

Houma-based Pelican Waste & Debris, audited customers and found more than 600 residents have two garbage carts.

The company is paid per cart, Sampey said.

“The rule is in place because if they didn’t have that stipulation in the contract every resident in the parish would have two, three or four cans,” she said. “Those cans cost over \$79 per cart. Every company that has come through here in the last 20 years has struggled with keeping up with cart containers.”

The previous provider, Waste Solutions (formerly Progressive Waste), had not audited residents in more than six years, Sampey said.

Residents pay \$16.69 a month for garbage service per household, a cost that will double if they keep the second cart, Sampey said. They have the option to return the cart to avoid the increase. Residents can also buy a garbage bin from a retailer and Pelican will empty it at no extra cost although it will not maintain or service the cart.

Sampey said they are working with Pelican to notify residents with two carts and to help return them.

Those who don’t respond will see their garbage bill double, Sampey said.

Councilman Dick Gibbs responded, “This conversation stinks.”

Councilwoman Wendy Benedetto said

constituents have called to say their second cart was picked up, but Sampey said they stopped Pelican from collecting them until residents could be notified.

To turn in a cart, she said residents could contact her office at (985) 783-5102 Ext. 4490.

Garay, captain of DHS’ cheer team, has been cheering her entire life, including competition and school cheer at the games DHS football and basketball games.

She still reflects on one of the Arc clients saying to her, “Thank you so much for doing this for us.” Garay added, “It was really, really sweet.”

What stood out to her was watching the seven Arc clients really get into the cheering and dancing, as well as the crowd equally getting into the experience.

“Seeing the crowd yell back to them ... that was the best part,” Garay said. “Your disabilities do not determine your capabilities.”

Inclusion was this veteran cheerleader’s inspiration.

“It’s been a big passion in my life ... to use cheer to give back to the community,” she said. “It made me feel good and I knew I’d like this.”

Initially, Garay reached out to the Arc in early September, asking if they’d be interested in cheering with her at a game. Seven names were provided – six women and a man – and all wanted in.

“They were good listeners,” Garay said of rehearsing with them.

While they worked on cheers, she prepared the things they’d need for a genuine cheerleading experience. She made megaphones with their names on them, as well as water bottles, and provided T-shirts saying, “All you need is love and cheers.”

Fellow cheerleaders loaned them their pom poms and they were equally excited about taking part in the experience.

“I’ve always loved cheers and it was different to teach it to different people and learning how to teach each one individually,” Garay said. “They have disabilities, but they were awesome at catching on. It just took a little more time.”

“They had the biggest smile on their face. They were so happy about doing what we can do showing that for the crowd and that was such a good experience for me and for them.”

Hahnville and Destrehan face off in annual rivalry clash, on the eve of the postseason

The time is finally here. Friday night marks the ever anticipated Battle on the River rivalry game as Destrehan (6-3, 3-2) hosts Hahnville (8-1, 4-1) in the final week of the regular season.

On the line for Hahnville is the out-right District 7-5A championship. A loss could drop the Tigers into a potential tie with East St. John for the crown. A win would cement the Tigers with a high

For Destrehan, there is no district championship in the cards, but a win would be nonetheless very meaningful for reasons beyond parish bragging rights. After losing three of four games from Week 4 to Week 7, Destrehan has roared back to best two district teams

Destrehan, he says the Wildcats' program is another that accepts nothing less than the best effort on a daily basis.

"For as long as this rivalry has stood ... we need to pull our weight," Saltaformaggio said. "To me, a rivalry is when one team wins, then the other, then maybe three to one and then two

good play at linebacker. "

He sees a close game on the horizon, though he says his team has to get back to playing at its peak. While last week represented Hahnville's first loss, Saltaformaggio believes the team hasn't played its best ball for about a month.

Saltaformaggio that controlling the ball and tempo will be the critical aspect of Friday's game, and that comes with being the more physical team up front. Who can accomplish that will be the victor, he believes.

For the Wildcats' offense, finding that

"We've had a knack for getting talented teams who are playing their best on our schedule," Saltaformaggio said. "Destrehan's exactly that. They've found their footing. We need to be ready, because I don't think we've been playing our best football. Against a Jesuit or a Destrehan, that gets you beat."

Destrehan head coach Stephen Robicheaux hasn't had three losses at this point in a season for quite awhile. But context and timing mean plenty, especially in November when it comes to prep football. The Wildcats team that decisively dispatched Thibodaux and Central Lafourche in consecutive weeks looks far different, and healthier, than the one that lost three of four prior contests.

Heading into the annual rivalry showdown, and the postseason that follows, that timing couldn't be better.

"We're excited where we are right now," Robicheaux said. "Not concerning the losses, but the way we're playing. Damarius (Jackson, DHS quarterback) is playing at a high level right now, and our defense has played pretty well throughout the whole year. We've got a tough challenge in Hahnville, all of that said. They've won eight so far and that isn't by accident. They've put skins on the wall."

Robicheaux agreed with

success will hinge on how successfully the team can block Adonis Friloux and the Hahnville defensive front.

"You have to get two hats on Adonis," Robicheaux said. "He's that special. You can't really account for him with one guy. But you have to be creative, because he's not the only one they have. Logan Brimmer's done a great job. That group as a whole has been good across the board, and behind them, they have Pearsall, a stud in the middle at linebacker. He seems like he's been there 20 years, he's difficult."

Robicheaux has been in the middle of this rivalry for years and says the only predictable aspect of it is that it's completely unpredictable.

"You throw the records out," he said. "Teams that should have won didn't, teams that should have lost found a way to win. Games you see as a blowout end up closer than you'd think."

It's a special tradition, he added.

"There's always the craziness, the hype that comes beforehand. But once it takes off, it's about two programs who have had a lot of success facing off. St. Charles Parish puts on an awesome show every year with it. Players and coaches, we all know one another, and it makes it so much fun," he said.

"I don't know how you ever could," Saltaformaggio said. "In the six years

They were tough acts to follow. But the Wildcats’ Kyle Edwards and the Tigers’ Darryle Evans both were ready to face exactly that challenge, and both are in the midst of sensational senior years, cemented among the state’s very best running backs.

The two share many bonds as players, chief among them their love of contact. Williams and Emery could both run through tackles, but defenses perhaps feared their knack for blasting off for explosive plays most; Edwards and Evans, meanwhile, are tone-setters, the power game their respective calling card.

Edwards has rushed 167 times this

season for 1,007 yards and 15 touchdowns, adding another 99 yards and a score through the air. Evans has tallied 1,017 yards and 18 touchdowns on 161 rush attempts, with 222 yards and three scores added through the air.

Like Emery before him, Edwards has long had the eye of major collegiate programs, and he too is headed to play for SEC royalty next fall: in August, he committed to play for Nick Saban at the University of Alabama. At 6’0, 210 pounds, he runs with power and purpose, overall fitting the bill as a prototype Southeastern Conference rusher.

At times this season, with injuries befalling key offensive teammates, Edwards has been up to the task of carrying the Wildcats offense on his back when necessary.

Hahnville coach Nick Saltaformaggio said that getting to Edwards when he’s the ballcarrier is only the beginning to the process of slowing the star back down.

“His physical strength is incredible,” Saltaformaggio said. “I’ve watched him

have a few runs where he was tackled, he was all but down, and suddenly he pops out and scores. When you’re playing against a guy who, not only is it the SEC after him, but the University of Alabama, as well as the University of Michigan, those schools want him to play football for them ... you get an idea of what you’re about to go against.”

Evans, meanwhile, has not received that level of collegiate attention, a fact Saltaformaggio has been outspoken about throughout the season – “Evans is special,” Saltaformaggio said after Evans put on a show in a win over Central Lafourche. “And it’s a shame nobody seems to know about him outside of the people at Hahnville.”

While Evans was productive in 2018, the Tigers’ offense struggled as he split carries with another standout back, Brandon Comardelle. He missed the late stages of the year after suffering a knee injury.

But he returned to full health in 2019 and has carried the lion’s share of the carries for Hahnville, his team’s clear

offensive centerpiece. Saltaformaggio has used the phrase “best player, best play” for his philosophy for key spots offensively, and “best player” universally has referred to Evans in such cases.

Destrehan coach Stephen Robicheaux said Evans has a particular knack for shedding tackles.

“You watch him on film and the first person who gets there never tackles him,” Robicheaux said. “Getting to the ball and making the tackle is our focus this week. He’s the best running back I’ve seen in a long time at breaking tackles. He’s shifty and powerful, and he always seems to be able to get hit three or four times and take it to the house.”

Both coaches agree on one thing for sure: the team that is able to control the ball and the line of scrimmage is the one that will likely emerge as victor—as such, Edwards and Evans will each likely have much to say as to which team earns bragging rights along the river this season.

A look at the recent history of the DHS and HHS series

It’s the kind of series that’s others outside the area envy. Destrehan v. Hahnville has given us twists and turns over the years that have led to the annual matchup being recognized nationally as one of the country’s greatest rivalries.

Destrehan leads the epic series 42-25 all time (credit to Lori Lyons for that

fact) and have won six of the past seven meetings between the teams. Hahnville is attempting to generate some traction in the other direction, meanwhile: a win Friday would represent the second in three years against its archrival.

A look back at the past five meetings between the teams and how they played

out:

2018: Destrehan 28, Hahnville 15. The Tigers rode into this game amid turmoil, having lost two of its first three and embroiled in a battle with the LHSAA concerning starting quarterback Andrew Robison and head coach Nick Saltaformaggio, who were ineligible and suspended, respectively.

As this rivalry has gone historically, though, you can never truly count out one side, and Hahnville came ready. The Tigers hung tough, rallying from a 14-0 deficit to take a 15-14 lead at one point. But the Wildcats were ultimately too much to overcome. John Emery gained nearly 200 yards from scrimmage and his 14-yard touchdown with just under 10 minutes left effectively sealed the win for DHS.

2017: Hahnville 20, Destrehan 13. It was a victory HHS coach Nick Saltaformaggio called “a long time coming.” Destrehan had dominated the win-loss column in the rivalry prior to the Tigers win here, the latter’s first in five seasons over their archrival.

It came during the peak season of “Pookamania,” with Pooka Williams starring en route to nearly 300 yards from scrimmage, including 235 yards on 28 carries, 44 yards through the air and two touchdowns. The Tigers led 20-3 at

one point and held off a spirited comeback by the Wildcats.

2016: Destrehan 31, Hahnville 28. One of the classic games between these two teams came here, where Bradley Quinn booted a clutch 27-yard game-winning field goal to cap the Wildcats’ victory, the team’s fifth straight over the Tigers.

While Quinn was a hero for DHS, he was far from the only one. Wildcats’ quarterback Kohen Granier was sidelined with a knee injury during the game and did not play in the second half. In stepped sophomore J.R. Blood, who played beyond his years to engineer points in the second half, including a game-winning drive. It was Blood’s first action as a varsity player.

2015: Destrehan 49, Hahnville 23. This one belonged to a powerful Destrehan squad from the start as DHS remained unbeaten. Kohen Granier tossed four touchdown passes, two of those to John Williams while one each to Justin Jefferson and Mike Young—those three play for Memphis, LSU and Notre Dame, respectively, to give an idea of the Wildcats’ firepower that season. Williams and Young each topped the 100 yard mark for Destrehan, while Devonte Craven led Hahnville with a pair of scores.



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Luling boy earns national acclaim

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Nico DeSalvo has big dreams.

The 11-year-old Luling boy, who began wrestling at just four years of age, hopes to one day become a four-time national champion collegiate wrestler, a world champion and an Olympic champion. And if that sounds like a pie in the sky idea, a quick read of his accomplishments in the sport will likely change that perception quickly: he's ranked as the nation's No. 14 competitor among ages 12 and under by USA Wrestling, and at his weight class, he's ranked even higher, third in the country. It's believed he's the first youth wrestler from Louisiana to earn multiple national crowns.

He's garnered over 100 medals, is a multi-time state champion and a two-time national tournament champion. It's believed he's the first youth wrestler from Louisiana to earn multiple national crowns, and is one of just two youth wrestlers from Louisiana ranked on the list, along with his teammate Caleb Kirk—the two wrestle for Bayou

Elite Wrestling Team under coach Ryak Fitch.

"I love this a lot," DeSalvo said. "My dad's done martial arts since he was a young kid too. I thought it would be fun ... after my first year, I felt like, 'Hey, I'm kind of getting good at this.'"

He also does ju-jitsu training with his father, Darren DeSalvo, at his gym in Boutte. Cyclone Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu.

"He wrestles 365," he said. "In Louisiana, wrestling hasn't become as big as you see in some other places. To get really good in this sport, you have to travel and face others who do this year-round. People say, you don't want to burn them out, but this is what he wants to do. We'd never want to push him to do something he doesn't have the passion for, but if it's what he wants, we're gonna provide what he needs."

The key? Nico doesn't view it as work.

"My mindset is it's impossible to burn out on a sport if you love the sport," Nico said. "You can't burn out if you love

something. Every time I win, it makes me want to go even more. I always feel like there's something to prove."

He called his first national tournament win "overwhelming," as while he entered with confidence, he knew he was facing the best the country had to offer.

"I started to cry, I was so happy. I jumped in the air ... it was like, 'Did I really just do this?' I knew it would be tough but that if I pulled it off, it would change everything."

His skills have gone noticed by some of the mat's most exceptional stars. David Taylor, one of Nico's heroes, met the latter and his family at a wrestling World Cup event in Iowa, weeks after Nico earned his 2018 national tournament championship. Taylor, who reigned as the freestyle world champion at 2018,

recruited Nico to join his dual team—a thrill for the 11-year-old, who has a bobblehead of Taylor in his room.

His mother, Leslie, said she's most proud of the dedication she sees her son displaying at such a young age.

"It's so much hard work ... everyone sees the wins and the glory, but we see him pushing to make it happen," she said. "His work ethic is really amazing."

As for that national ranking, Nico's proud — but in no way satisfied.

"I was actually a bit disappointed when I saw it, because I want to be the best," he said. "But I realized this isn't out of just a couple kids ... it's the whole country. A trillion people could be in third, and I'm there ... I do want to be No. 1, though."

Saltaformaggio called it his favorite rivalry or series he's been a part of as a head coach over the years.

"Because of how important it is to our school system, our parish, the people who graduated from this school and from their school ... I understand the importance of this game," he said. "And it's time for Hahnville to put up."

The one real point of disagreement about the game for the coaches came in terms of its timing, one week before the playoffs – the teams had faced off in the middle of the season in recent years.

"I don't love having it right now," Robicheaux said. "You'd kind of like to

get it out of the way a few weeks earlier ... the one thing is, beyond all the hype, it's a really physical football game. You know that going in, and it's right before the playoffs."

Saltaformaggio felt that way before the season, but his thoughts have changed. "Honestly, I didn't think I would, but I really do (like having the game Week 10)," Saltaformaggio said. "Playing Jesuit a week ago gave us an idea of what we have to work on to get better. And playing these teams, a Jesuit then a Destrehan, it allows us to focus on the moment. There's no looking ahead or time for a letdown."

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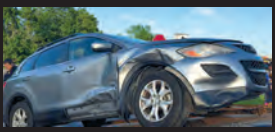

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to reimburse eligible applicants for eligible costs for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by Tropical Storm and Hurricane Barry occurring between July 10-15, 2019. This notice applies to the Public Assistance (PA) program and the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) implemented under the authority of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5207.

Under an Emergency declaration FEMA 3416-EM-LA was signed by the President on July 11, 2019 and under a major disaster declaration FEMA 4458-DR-LA was signed by the President on August 27, 2019, Amendment No. 1, signed on September 30, 2019, Amendment No. 2, Signed on October 10, 2019 the following parishes have been designated adversely affected by the disaster and eligible for PA: Allen, Iberia, Lafayette, Lafourche, Plaquemines, St. Landry, St. Martin, St. Mary, Terrebonne, and Vermillion. The President also authorized Public Assistance – Categories A and B (debris removal and emergency protective measures) for the following parishes: Ascension, Assumption, Cameron, East Baton Rouge, East Feliciana, Iberville, Jefferson, Livingston, Orleans, Pointe Coupee, St. Bernard, St. Charles, St. Helena, St. John the Baptist, St. Martin, Tangipahoa, and West Feliciana. Additional parishes may be designated at a later date. All parishes and tribal entities in the State of Louisiana are eligible to apply for HMGP assistance.

This public notice concerns activities that may affect historic properties, activities that are located in or affect wetland areas or the 100-year floodplain, and critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. Such activities may adversely affect the historic property, floodplain or wetland, or may result in continuing vulnerability to flood damage.

Presidential Executive Orders 11988 (Floodplain Management) and 11990 (Protection of Wetlands) require that all federal actions in or affecting the floodplain or wetlands be reviewed for opportunities to relocate, and evaluated for social, economic, historical, environmental, legal and safety considerations. Where there is no opportunity to relocate, FEMA is required to undertake a detailed review to determine what measures can be taken to minimize future damages. The public is invited to participate in the process of identifying alternatives and analyzing their impacts through this notification.

For certain types of facilities, FEMA has determined that there are normally no alternatives to restoration in the floodplain/wetland. These are facilities that meet all of the following criteria: 1) FEMA’s estimate of the cost of repairs is less than 50-percent of the cost to replace the entire facility, and is less than \$100,000; 2) the facility is not located in a floodway; 3) the facility has not sustained major structural damage in a previous presidentially declared flooding disaster or emergency; and 4) the facility is not critical (e.g., the facility is not a hospital, generating plant, emergency operations center, or a facility that contains dangerous materials). FEMA intends to provide assistance for emergency protective measures, debris removal, and for the restoration of facilities to their pre-disaster condition, except for certain measures to mitigate the effects of future flooding and other hazards may be included in the work.

For routine activities, this will be the only public notice provided. Other activities and those involving facilities that do not meet the four criteria are required to undergo more detailed review, including study of alternate locations. Subsequent public notices regarding such projects will be published if necessary, as more specific information becomes available.

In many cases, an applicant may have started facility restoration prior to federal involvement. Even if the facility must undergo detailed review and analysis of alternate locations, FEMA will fund eligible restoration at the original location if the facility is functionally dependent on its floodplain location (e.g., bridges, flood control facilities, and piers), or the project facilitates an open space use, or the facility is an integral part of a larger network that is impractical or uneconomical to relocate, such as a road. In such cases, FEMA must also examine the possible effects of not restoring the facility, minimize floodplain/wetland impacts, and determine both that an overriding public need for the facility clearly outweighs Executive Order requirements to avoid the floodplain/wetland, and that the site is the only practicable alternative. State of Louisiana and local officials will confirm to FEMA that proposed actions comply with all applicable state and local floodplain management and wetland protection requirements.

The National Historic Preservation Act requires federal agencies to consider the effects of their undertakings on historic properties. Those actions or activities affecting buildings, structures, districts or objects 50 years or older or that affect archeological sites or undisturbed ground will require further review to determine if the property is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (Register). If the property is determined to be eligible for the Register, and FEMA’s undertaking will adversely affect it, FEMA will provide additional public notices. For historic properties not adversely affected by FEMA’s undertaking, this will be the only public notice.
