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Hahnville senior celebrates cousin’s life through football

Credits former Tiger champion as key mentor in his life

J’Cobe Scott said a prayer before every game he played for the Hahnville Tigers, with the knowledge his one-time mentor is looking out for him. “I say Vernon, play through me,” Scott said. “Tonight, I’m gonna do what you taught me.” Scott, a senior offensive lineman Hahnville Tigers football team, is calling upon his cousin Vernon Robiskie, who in 2011 passed away at the age of 33. Robiskie, the nephew of former NFL star Terry Robiskie, was a member of the 1994 Hahnville Tigers football team that won state championship honors, a talented offensive lineman who went on to play collegiately at Southern University and then played professionally in the Arena Football League. He also taught Scott much of what he knew about playing the position. Scott played this season – the 25th anniversary of that 1994 state champion – in his honor. He also wears uniform number 76, which was Robiskie’s number as a member of the Tigers. “He was my big cousin, and he taught me how to play the game of football,” Scott said. “He taught me my technique and made me the player I am. I remember him every time I play. I wear 76 because of him.

Work on Sunset levee elevation could begin in December

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An update on plans to upgrade the Sunset Drainage District levee ended a debate over whether it had significantly subsided and set in motion efforts to seek the funding to do the entire project. “There has been very little settlement in the levee over that five-year period,” said Oneil Malbrough Sr., GIS Engineering’s vice president of coastal design and infrastructure. A GIS survey done this year shows 85 percent of the levee subsided 3 inches or less with most of the remainder at six-foot or less difference compared to 2014 survey findings. Plans call for lifting the earthen levee to 7-1/2 feet consistently from the Davis Pond Diversion to the Tippy Pump Station, bringing the West

Bank Hurricane Protection system closer to 100-year protection. **“There has been very little settlement in the levee over that five-year period.”** — Oneil Malbrough Sr.

Councilman Paul Hogan, who has long raised concerns about the levee elevations and maintained the levee was sinking from lack of maintenance, welcomed the news about its integrity and work possibly starting up this year.

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Prep work underway on East Bark Park expansion

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Standing by an old oak tree discovered and saved on property that is becoming the much-anticipated expansion of the East Bank Bridge Park, architect Joey Murray says every effort is being made to preserve the trees.

And St. Charles Parish President Larry Cochran said he is looking forward to participating in discussions with the community on how to best take advantage of the expansion.

“Some of the things I would like to see considered are additional parking, more sports fields and a gym to name a few,” Cochran said.

Work is underway removing trees and vegetation from the 6.1-acre site, which Cochran said the parish bought for \$12,400 from P&L Investments IX in the fall of 2018. The property’s appraised value is \$940,000.

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Willowdale burglar sentenced for summer thefts

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A man who faced charges of burglarizing several homes in Luling’s Willowdale subdivision during the summer has been sentenced to five years in prison.

Richard Bearden Jr., 35, of 5113 Evans Drive in Marrero, pleaded guilty to three counts of simple burglary as result of a plea bargain. He received credit for time served but his sentence was not suspended, thus he has begun serving its remainder. The court recommended Bearden undergo treatment for substance abuse disorder and that he be allowed to participate in any other programs deemed necessary while serving his sentence.

Bearden was arrested in Marrero July 1 following an investigation into several reports of burglarized sheds/garages in the Willowdale/Davis Pond area over several weeks in May and June.

St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne reported via Facebook that much of the victims’ property was recovered from Bearden’s Marrero home and returned to their rightful owners.

According to a case report detailing the Luling burglaries, a number of items had been identified by their owners at a Harvey pawn shop, Bearden allegedly having pawned them days after they were stolen.

Bearden was also allegedly captured on video

surveillance footage at the pawn shop.

A victim told police that a friend found his garage door ajar, and that the victim later found the garage door locking mechanism on the floor of the garage. Another victim reported a burglar entered their unlocked, detached garage and stole numerous lawn/hand/electric tools.

After attaining a warrant with assistance from the Jefferson Parish Sheriff’s Office, police searched the Marrero home of Bearden’s girlfriend and found several electric hand and lawn tools at the residence. Bearden admitted his involvement to police voluntarily, according to the report, after the items were found.

Bearden is currently serving his sentence at Nelson Coleman Correctional Center.

Tinseltown Talks: A ‘Happy Days’ Thanksgiving

As the TV matriarch of the Cunningham clan in the sitcom “Happy Days,” Marion Ross appeared in over 250 episodes during the hit series 11-season run from 1974 to 1984. But one episode has special significance for the actress this time of year.

In “The First Thanksgiving,” broadcast two days before November in 1978, Ross’s character (also named Marion) leads the cast in a departure from the show’s usual Milwaukee-based setting. She narrates a flashback story set in the Plymouth Colony, with the cast doubling as historical characters, to remind her family that sharing and giving thanks are the traditions behind the annual festivities.

“Tom (Bosley) and I were dressed up as pilgrims and I had on a lovely outfit with a white bonnet,” recalled Ross from her home in Woodland Hills, California. “Then Fonzie (Henry Winkler) comes in wearing traditional clothes, but with his leather jacket over them!”

It was classic ‘Happy Days’ humor: Fonzie on a wooden motorbike; later, when he invites Indians into the pilgrims’ compound, he’s punished and restrained in the stocks but breaks free with a characteristic Fonzie move.

Ross’ own family roots trace back to Minnesota where she remembers Thanksgivings as being “rather brisk.”

“I was a middle child and the rambunctious one, so I would run out and shovel the snow off the walkway,” she recalled. Thanksgiving included a large extended family seated at

tables stretching into the living room. “I remember by the time I was about ten having the traditional meal of turkey, stuffing, pumpkin pies, and also rutabagas. Guests would say ‘Rutabagas? We feed those to the pigs!’ But we liked them mashed with salt and pepper.”

“In the end, they join our family for the meal,” explained Ross, who turned 91 in October, and published her autobiography “My Days: Happy and Otherwise” last year.

The pilgrim episode concludes by returning to then present-day Milwaukee. Marion serves the meal to her attentive family, adding: “This is a day to count your blessings – everyone has something to be thankful for.”

A prospective dog is being trained for the task, and the family has been told the dog should be ready no later than May.

“I can’t put into words how much this means,” Giammolva said. “There’s no way to express it ... friends, family, strangers, different organizations...we’re so incredibly grateful for so many people. To have that kind of support, the way we live day in and day out, it just gave us that little extra ‘oomph’ to keep going.”

Type 1 diabetes is a much more serious form of the illness, which can also be classified as the more common Type 2. It causes the body to create little or no insulin. Luke receives up to five shots a day of insulin and has a continuous monitor for his blood sugar. There is no cure for the illness, meaning he’ll continue to have to deal with these things in some form going forward.

The most difficult aspect of it is Luke lacks symptoms when certain things are wrong – with Type 1 diabetes, high and low blood sugar levels are dangerous, the low side more so. But without an alert from his monitor, he may never know, much less his parents, that he’s in any danger, and the monitor is not infallible.

Were the monitor to fail, the worst case scenario could be fatal, and there have been points where his levels fell during the night, triggering the alert for his parents to respond. The uncertainty at all times has made it a harrowing experience for the family since Luke’s diagnosis in July of 2018, and Giammolva called it completely life-changing.

It seemed like it would simply be their new normal going forward, but she found hope upon researching the utility of trained diabetic alert dogs, specialized service animals. Through saliva, the trained canines can sense a drop or rise in their owner’s blood sugar levels long before a continuous glucose monitor (CGM) does. A trained dog would know to retrieve insulin if needed.

Funding was the challenge, as an alert dog’s cost can be prohibitive when considering the necessary training and skill set required by the animal. Giammolva started by posting a GoFundMe page, which began to garner donations from those hoping to help. News of Luke’s plight began to spread – the boy has even made his television debut for a profile piece detailing his situation – and more and more helpers began stepping forward. The prospective dog is training with a family in New Hampshire currently. The Giammolva family has sent glucose samples to assist with that effort. Giammolva said Luke hasn’t met the pup yet, as the trainer suggested a meeting not happen until the dog was ready, lest Luke get attached. The dog being trained is only the most likely candidate at the moment, but it could be another dog undergoing training sent to Luke were the initial dog not cleared.

The dog represents a light at the end of the tunnel, though, and peace of mind. That’s something the family has yearned for. Luke was recently hospitalized following complications from a cold coupled with his condition, a scenario that’s become too common over the past two years. He’s also had an insulin pump added to his care about a month ago, but the transition to that has been difficult.

“You have to get the right ratios of insulin ... I think once the process is fleshed out, it’ll be better, but right now it’s been up and down,” she said. “We’ve had a few scary nights over the last month. In the back of my mind, I’ve had that thought, ‘The dog would have picked it up a lot earlier.’ The (insulin pump) is a great tool, but like the monitor it’s not 100 percent accurate.”

She recently made a post on Facebook thanking everyone who stepped up to make Luke’s pup-to-be a reality. With November representing National Diabetes Awareness Month, as well as Thanksgiving, she felt it made for appropriate timing.

Luke is also excited, and told his mother that he knows he’s going to fall in love with the dog.

“We’re all so excited,” Giammolva said. “Everything’s been so overwhelming and very humbling. I wish I could better express just how appreciative we are for everyone.”

Help is on the way

– that would take the Montz couple on the “The Loop.” They started with short trips at first, so when the big one came the couple was prepared for what was supposed to be the experience of a lifetime.

It began along the Gulf coast traveling down the coast of Florida up the east coast to Chesapeake Bay then to New York, up the Hudson River to Erie Canal to Detroit and then to lakes Huron and Michigan and to Chicago. They continued to the Illinois River and went to the Mississippi, Ohio and Cumberland rivers to Pickwick Lake and then to the Tennessee-Tombigbee (Tenn-Tom) River Waterway to Mobile and back to New Orleans.

Walsdorf said it was a journey rich with new adventures.

They watched dolphins swim alongside them, manatees floating quietly to the surface to nibble on the marine growth on the boat, and lots of pelicans and egrets.

“Epic” was how he described the longest trip they’d taken on their boat. Jonathan said the only difficulty will be topping it. They went through 64 navigation locks (35 of them alone were on Erie Canal). There were at least two days they were sailing out of sight from land, but the water was glass smooth making it easy to photo the dolphins escorting them, so there were no worries.

In the Great Lakes of Michigan, he added, “The water is so clear it’s like looking in your aquarium. It’s stunningly beautiful. Visibility is like 50 feet.”

The Walsdorfs stopped in about 100 towns, villages and cities along the way.

“The small towns were the most enjoyable places,” he said “The people were more friendly and more welcoming.”

They encountered stormy weather in Michigan and spent six days in the marina at Leland, a community of about 300 people, and were greeted with hospitality.

“We found gumbo file’ in a little grocery store about 1,200 square feet and a whole rack of Cajun spices,” he said. “It was cold ... 46 degrees in the morning. My wife got the urge for chicken-sausage gumbo. We found Andouille flavored sausage.”

They ate well and learned it’s a social thing for the locals to visit the marina to “see who’s in town,” and it proved this Montz couple were popular along the route. Their vessel, which states they are from the Port of New Orleans, drew

attention.

“There were people who brought us baked goods and it wasn’t uncommon to be offered a ride to the grocery store or to do errands,” he said. “It was so refreshing.”

They made friendships they hope will last a lifetime.

In Michigan, they met the sheriff and he knew St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne from the National Sheriffs’ Association. There were also at least four times they met people from Louisiana on the trip.

One of their epic moments was in Hudson Bay, as they came so close to the Statue of Liberty.

Another came on the way home as they passed the area where Jonathan used to fish and camp with his father on Rabbit Island in the Rigolets. He became emotional as he reflected on how his father instilled in him his love for the outdoors and why he enjoyed this trip so much.

Being a member of America’s Great Loop Cruisers’ Association is also valuable for these trips, Jonathan said. Members have the option to travel together or meet at places along the route.

“It’s one thing to want to do something, it’s different to set steps to achieve it,” he said of achieving his dream.

For Jonathan, the dream became real when he bought the Golfinho and traveled 18 days from Chesapeake Bay to New Orleans. Then it became a matter of waiting for his wife to retire and then a little more.

“My wife really wasn’t on board until the day we left,” he said.

Upon their return, however, she had a different view.

“She’s ready for the next trip,” Jonathan said. “She didn’t want to come home.”

And they are anticipating another trip, possibly to Key West

staff for coaching as they create goals and savings plans. Arnold, on the heels of a major move and getting situated with her work and finances locally, was progressing toward the goal of saving enough to purchase a car for transportation, but it was a high hurdle to clear.

That hurdle was knocked clean over when she learned someone had donated a car to her, allowing her to shift her focus on saving for housing — and be able to move about freely on the road, as previously A Safe Space had supplied her transportation when needed.

“It’s such a blessing ... an unexpected blessing that I received,” Arnold said. “You’re so grateful to have those kind of kind, graceful people in the world. I came here not knowing anyone, I have no family here. I was focused on saving for my own transportation, and out of the blue, I’m blessed with a car.”

The donor, who asked to remain anonymous for this story, was moved to make the gesture after hearing Safe Space Executive Director Shirley Sims speak about the program and its clients.

Sims’ fellow Executive Director, Ivy Williams, said the donor made a real difference for Arnold.

“We’re so grateful for this,” Williams said. “Charlotte had been saving for a car, and it was hard for her. This is a blessing and a big help for her in this process.”

Arnold relocated two months ago, and initially had been utilizing transportation provided by A Safe Space to get her to and from work, which was across the river from where she was staying. Charlotte, according to program directors, is an example of a success story: she had secured a job within a few days of arriving at the shelter and has been steadily proving

herself and climbing the employment ladder, and is working diligently at reaching her goals.

“I just got the oil changed,” Arnold said. “You never expect anything like this, and I can’t thank (the donor) enough. (The car) is nice, but honestly it could have been anything ... could have been an old Pinto, and it would have been beautiful to me all the same.”

Born and raised in Baton Rouge, Arnold found herself in Alaska by way of her program transition. It seems about as far a contrast from Louisiana as one could envision by how the two states are typically thought of, especially in terms of weather. She said that part hasn’t fazed her.

“It’s not so bad up there, not like people think. It’s such a dry cold,” Arnold said. “Sometimes, it feels colder here when the temperature drops because of the marsh. But I’m loving it.”

Perhaps more predictably, she’s enjoying the change in local cuisine.

“I’m stuffing myself with seafood gumbo and fried catfish, it’s all so good,” she said with a laugh. “Up there, it’s moose, deer meat and salmon.”

While she said she still has plenty to sort out and plan going forward, the one thing she feels rather sure of is that St. Charles Parish will be her home for a long time.

“It’s my fresh start. This is where I want to be,” Arnold said. “I’m focused on what I need to do and what I need to strive for. I’m just grateful. Doors have been opening for me left and right since I’ve been here. I’m doing a lot of prayer and meditation ... I know I’m here to stay. I’m going to see now how God is going to use me going forward.”

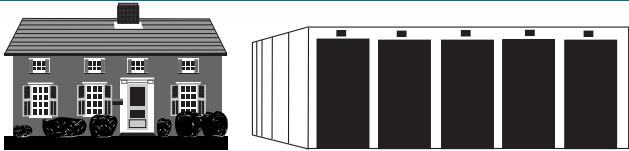

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But Parish President Larry Cochran cited the unnecessary concerns raised and responded, “Mr. Hogan took some unfinished, raw data and computed it himself and had this erroneous information. We were still compiling the information and we felt pretty good the way things were going.”

Hogan maintained the information he got from the parish was erroneous.

Cochran said he would help work with the CPRA to leverage the money needed

to do the entire project. He added, “It’s all good news.”

Councilman Billy Woodruff praised the former Sunset Drainage District board members who maintained the levee for doing a “fantastic” job. Levee maintenance was taken over by the parish.

Burk-Kleinpeter Vice President Sreeni Bollu said the Sunset levee runs through Des Allemands, Bayou Gauche and to the Paradis Canal. Bollu said it was

built nearly 100 years ago by the Sunset Drainage Levee District and has been maintained and lifted over time.

Malbrough said the CPRA has dedicated \$1.2 million for levee design and/or construction to lift the levee, but is pending an intergovernmental agreement. CPRA has budgeted another \$2.3 million for the project in 2021, bringing the project cost to \$3.5 million.

The Lafourche Basin Levee District, overseeing the levee, has asked CPRA to commit to the funding this year, which would allow doing the entire project rather than in phases.

Malbrough estimated the project would require 120,000 yards of dirt, which they will seek locally to save on cost.

Pending funding and weather, he estimated dirt moving could begin in December or January and the project done before the next hurricane season.

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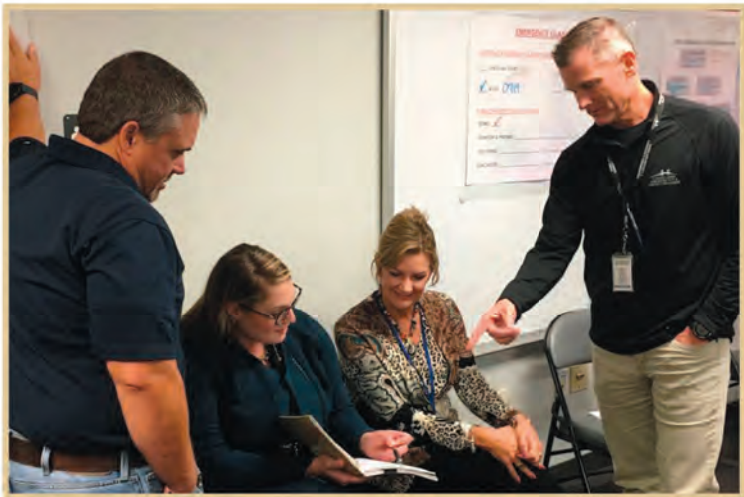

West Monroe visits DHS with trip to semifinal on the line

It's a cherished tradition at Destrehan, one made sweeter by the fact that it's never promised, but earned: donuts on Thanksgiving morning, as the team prepares for a battle in the late rounds of the postseason.

The Wildcats (9-3) will enjoy that treat once again as the No. 7 seed in 5A prepares to host one of the state's premier teams and power programs, No. 2 seeded West Monroe (11-1), in the quarterfinals of the state playoffs.

You might call Destrehan a reliable donut shop customer this

time of year. Destrehan has reached a state final, four state semifinals and has been a state quarterfinalist in all but one year since 2013. Following his team's very physical 17-7 victory at Covington last week, Destrehan coach Stephen Robicheaux's message to his team was clear: that effort is why you belong here, and it defined what it means to be part of the Destrehan program.

"These kids fought so hard through adversity," said Robicheaux, alluding to the team's three loss midseason stretch within

a month's time. "They pushed through and now they're suddenly in the quarterfinals. They've earned it."

West Monroe defeated No. 15 Captain Shreve in round two to advance by a 38-21 score. It trounced Central Lafourche, a Destrehan district foe, in the opening round 47-7.

Since 2012, the Rebels have been to two state finals and three semifinal rounds.

Their attack is familiar to longtime observers of West Monroe: a giant offensive line, powerful rushing attack and

a suffocating defense that has allowed just 6.6 points per game this season.

While not an easy task, the Wildcats will have home field on its side—

many teams have been able to do it," Robicheaux said.

H-back Cayden Pierce is a huge key to everything the Rebels do. At 6-foot-1

and some positive history to draw from between the teams. Destrehan felled West Monroe in a state semifinal, 27-22, in 2014. Go back a little further and the memory is even sweeter for DHS fans: a 14-3 victory in the Superdome as the Wildcats secured what was then their second straight state crown.

The West Monroe offensive line starts with four year starter Ethan Boyer, a 6-foot 2, 330 lb. mountain of a lineman. Daniel Hawthorne and Shawn McDonald both have great size and experience as well.

"They run toward the tight end probably about 75 percent of the time. You've just gotta find a way to stop them, but not

and 210 lb., he'll line up at fullback, halfback, tight end and quarterback and keeps the chains moving. Derome Williams doesn't have that kind of size, but the 5-foot-7, 175 pound back is very explosive.

"Williams is a guy they go to whenever they want to run power or counter. He makes them go," Robicheaux said. "But Cayden Pierce, he's just physical, physical. He keeps the chains moving."

Robicheaux estimates the Rebels only look to pass about 25 percent of the time, but when they do they look for A.J. Fenceroy at wide receiver.

The key matchup to watch will likely be the size of the West Monroe line contrasting with the speed and quickness of

linebackers. We have to move a little bit and cause some disruption on the offensive line," said Robicheaux.

West Monroe is stout across the board defensively, boasting four shutouts on its resume during the course of the season. They're big along the defensive line, coming out in a four man front primarily. The linebackers and defensive backs are stout.

"You look for a weakness on that team and you just don't see one," Robicheaux said. "We'll definitely have our hands full Friday night. But you know what? There are 8 teams left in 5A, so if you're not up to the challenge by this point, you won't be moving on."

Late call on field goal sinks HHS

“I’ve been in a lot of locker rooms that are sad at the end of a season,” a stunned, somber Hahnville head coach Nick Saltaformaggio began, “but I’ve never been in a locker room that was just in pain.”

Those were Saltaformaggio’s words after the end to his Tigers’ season once again came at the hands of Zachary, the two-time defending 5A champions emerging a 21-19 winner at home over Hahnville in round two of the Class 5A play-offs. But this loss may have been the most painful of the four losses to the Broncos the Tigers have endured. And certainly, it was the most controversial.

An apparent game-winning 32-yard field goal by Hahnville’s Tate White sent Hahnville into celebration, but the fun screeched to a halt when attention was drawn to a flag thrown on the play. The kick was negated due to holding and Hahnville was forced to try the kick again following a 10-yard penalty. The second attempt fell short, cementing both a win for Zachary and a finish that

will be talked about for a long time to come - particularly for the Tigers.

“You’re not supposed to lose games like that in the state playoffs,” Saltaformaggio said. “Those calls don’t get made. They got made tonight, I guess. It is what it is.”

“It’s very, very hard for me to comprehend what just happened.”

A field goal being called back for holding is relatively uncommon, so when Saltaformaggio saw the flag, he said he thought it was likely on Zachary.

“(Holding) was the last thing in the world I was thinking,” Saltaformaggio said. “I figured maybe they were offsides.”

Zachary (9-2), the 5th seed in the 5A playoffs, advances to the 5A quarterfinals to face No. 20 Ruston.

There were several intangibles on the line for Hahnville (9-3) beyond the obvious of it being an elimination contest. Zachary had knocked Hahnville out of the post-season in three of the past four years, and this was a chance for the Tigers to not only knock out a

defending state champion, but to finally best a team that has become a true nemesis for the program.

This was also a season of great expectations for the Tigers, who began the season 8-0 and had true state championship aspirations.

Hahnville trailed 21-12 in the second half but surged back on a 95-yard touchdown pass by Drew Naquin to Darryle Evans with six minutes left, putting the Tigers back in business. It was the final big performance in a season of them for Evans, who finished with more than 200 yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns.

The Hahnville defense came up with the stop their team needed with just under three minutes left, recovering a Zachary fumble at the HHS 42.

Hahnville drove into range for White, who had made two field goals already on the night. The penalty cost him what would have been the third, and his biggest as a Tiger.

Keilon Brown paced the Zachary offense, as he has often over the

past four seasons. Brown passed for 200 yards and two touchdowns on the night, with Chris Hilton his top receiver with 85 yards.

It was a back and forth game all night long. Zachary led 14-12 at half-time, and the only two score advantage by either team came when the Broncos scored thereafter to take a 21-12 lead.

For Saltaformaggio, it was tough knowing a class of seniors that helped guide the HHS program to 47 wins in their tenure would see their run end in such a difficult way.

“When you’re playing at the two time defending champion on the road, you have to be able to deliver the knockout blow. We had a couple of

chances and didn’t get it,” Saltaformaggio said. “But our kids stayed in the game and played as hard as I’ve ever seen ‘em play. It’s just unfortunate what happened at the end ... there were tears of agony.”

“You can only hope you can come back and use it as fuel to drive your program. But it’s devastating. It’s gonna stay with us for a long, long time.”

Destrehan trio helps fuel LSU dream season, push for national crown

As LSU continues to roll in what’s been a season for the ages, three former Destrehan alums have helped propel the Tigers to an 11-0 record: junior wide receiver Justin Jefferson, junior defensive end Glen Logan and freshman running back John Emery.

Destrehan head coach Stephen Robicheaux said the experience of watching his former players be a part of what could be a historic season has been very special.

“To see Justin and Glen and John out there on Saturday nights and doing what they are, it’s an amazing kind of deal,” Robicheaux said. “It’s always good to see LSU have success, and they’re a part of that. They deserve the recognition,

because those guys are not only very talented, they’re just great kids, great people.”

At Destrehan, Jefferson finished his career with 944 yards and eight touchdowns as the Wildcats’ go-to outside receiver.

With LSU, he’s emerged as one of Heisman Trophy candidate Joe Burrow’s favorite receivers. This season he’s caught 75 passes for 1,037 yards and 12 touchdowns, a big part of a massive step forward offensively for the Tigers this season. His reception mark is a team high.

Robicheaux recalled a conversation with LSU wide receivers coach and former San Francisco 49ers assistant Jerry Sullivan about Jefferson that hinted at the standout receiver’s future.

“He said he saw something in Justin that was really special,” Robicheaux said. “He saw it early. It’s been so exciting to watch him develop into the player that he is. It’s fun to watch, but it’s not surprising. He’s got the kind of ability that makes it really difficult for anyone to match up with him.”

In Logan’s case, the run-stopping defensive end was sidelined for part of the season due to injury, but returned Oct. 12 against Florida. Prior to being injured, he had his best statistical performance of the season under the brightest lights, making an impact at Texas in a primetime, nationally televised battle of highly ranked teams. In that game, Logan tallied

three tackles, 1.5 for loss and recorded a sack. On the season, he has 15 stops and has chipped in a pair of pass deflections, but primarily has made opening running lanes difficult for opponents. “I think he’s a different player this year,” said Robicheaux. “He’s lost a

little weight and he’s more active and disruptive. He’s been taking on more of a leadership role for them. You can’t help but be excited for him. He’s such a great kid and he’s making a difference for LSU.” At Destrehan, Logan was a force that went noticed on the national

level. He left Destrehan as the No. 2 overall prospect in Louisiana as per Rivals.com and closed out his senior season with 54.5 tackles, 5.5 tackles for loss and four sacks. He had a breakout year in 2018, his first as a starter, recording 46 tackles, 4.5 for loss, and four sacks.

As the youngest member of the trio, Emery’s workload has been up and down throughout the season, as one would expect of a true freshman running back—that he’s found playing time in the SEC as a first-year player is perhaps a sign of how highly regarded his talent is by the LSU staff. Emery’s rushed for 178 yards and three touchdowns on 34 carries thus far this season and added six receptions for 60

yards. His best effort thus far saw him gain 79 yards on 12 touches against Utah State on Oct. 5. He also made a nice splash on social media prior to the season, when a video of Emery making an impressive run at practice circulated amongst fans hungry to see the former star recruit in action —Emery was regarded as ESPN’s top running back recruit in the country during his senior year at Destrehan, when he

rushed for 1,683 yards on 218 carries (7.7 yards an attempt) and scored 28 total touchdowns. “He’s obviously a special player and his work ethic is ridiculous,” Robicheaux said. “He’s such a great kid. On the field, he’s got all the characteristics you want of a really good running back ... he’s versatile, fast and has great vision ... he runs angry.

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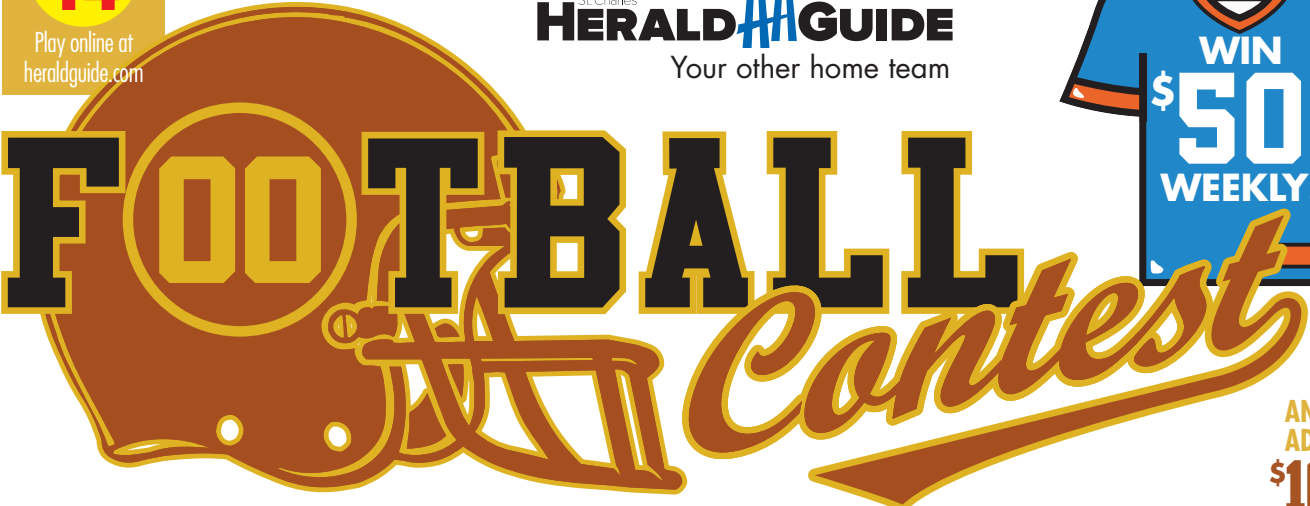

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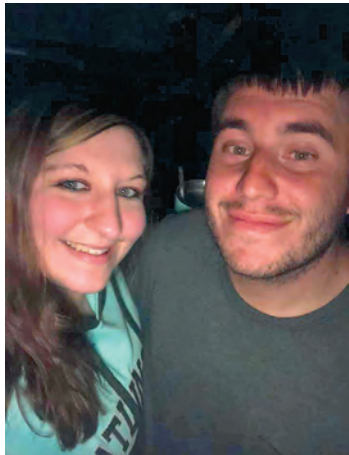

Facts and friendly reminders this flu season

Flu season is here, just in time for cool temperatures, holiday preparations and festive events. No one wants to be sidelined this time of year, so let's revisit some flu season tips to keep you and your family healthy.

FACT #1 – The flu vaccine is effective. A flu vaccine is the single best way to guard against this potentially serious virus. Everyone 6 months and older should get the flu vaccine every season. By getting a flu shot, you also help prevent the spread of flu, especially to people who are vulnerable to infection, like babies and the elderly. A 2017 study showed that flu vaccination can significantly reduce a child's risk of dying from the flu.

FACT #2 – It's important to get a new vaccine each year. The flu virus changes from year to year, so medical researchers at the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC) create specific vaccines for the versions of the virus expected to be dominant each year.

FACT #3 – The flu vaccine DOES NOT give you the flu. You may have some



side effects from the vaccine – soreness at the site of the shot, mild body aches or low-grade fever. This is not the flu. The vaccine is made from inactivated (dead) viruses that cannot infect you. These inactive viruses help you build up antibodies which protect you against getting the flu. Remember: it takes about two weeks for the flu shot to provide protection, so the earlier you get it, the better.

FACT #4 – There is a flu vaccine for most people, even those with egg allergies, certain chronic health conditions, or who are pregnant. If you think you can't get a flu vaccine, talk to your

healthcare provider to be sure. Babies under 6 months are too young, which is why everyone older than 6 months should get vaccinated.

In addition to getting a flu shot, you can help protect yourself, your family, and your community against the flu with these simple habits:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze, then throw away the tissue and wash your hands with soap and water.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.

Some flu seasons are more severe than others and I am already seeing flu cases in my practice. By following the above guidelines, you can help keep yourself, your family and your community safer from the flu.

Ready, Set, Grow!

Shorter days? Check. Cooler weather? Check. Turning clocks back? Check. ...So it must be fall now. While spring always brings folks out to beautify landscapes, don't overlook the colors you can add to your landscape now. Up north they may be covered in snow shortly, but we can enjoy our year-round growing season in The Gulf South.

We can keep fall and winter color in our beds starting now. What you'll probably experience is a nice show early on, then the blooms peter off as plant growth slows in winter. Early spring, then, will have an even more spectacular display. The fall-planted annuals will last until hot weather or until you pull them up to make room for warm-season flowers.

As with any plant bed you'll want well-drained, fertile, loose soil. While River Parish soil is usually quite fertile, you probably don't enjoy well drained or loose around here. Raised beds are an excellent option. Weeds are less problematic and there are limitless ways to build them. Many can be quite attractive.

Select the location of your bed knowing most flowering plants prefer full sun. But check the tag. Some prefer partial or dappled shade. You may have an "envie" for a particular plant and can put the bed where you want it. But wherever the bed is, you can find plants that fit well in that situation.

If you're taking the raised bed route, you'll want to use treated lumber or some other material (bricks, plastic, etc.) that will not rot. Build the bed at least 6-8" tall and fill with bagged potting soil or bulk soil. Fill the bed with enough room to add a layer of mulch / compost on top after you've planted.

If you're planting in the ground, add a few inches of mulch or compost on top, then till it in. This will help retain level soil moisture and to improve "tilth," which describes how well a shovel (or roots) can penetrate. Work in a scattering of 13-13-13 in the ground or raised bed to help start the plants along.

When shopping for annuals, choose plants that have not yet begun to bloom if possible. No, they won't look as good as their more-mature brethren. But they will also establish more



readily, grow more, and let you enjoy the blooms longer. Any blooms already on the plant will drop soon so won't do you much good.

Before you head to the nursery, plan out your bed. Many annuals like snapdragons and pansies can be planted 6-8" apart. Larger plants like Amazon Dianthus and ornamental cabbage will do better spaced up to a foot apart. Measure, space, and count how many you will need.

Most people grab a flat or two at the nursery, then try to jam it all into the existing space when they get home. The result is a bed that looks great on day 1 but becomes overcrowded. Besides aesthetics, plants in this situation will not reach their full potential and may be stressed enough to have worse disease and insect problems.

Your initial reaction when looking at the finished product should actually be, "I paid all that at the nursery and dug in the ground all day for this?!" Don't worry; they'll fill in quickly and look great for months to come.

CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT made and effective as of the 22nd day of November, 2019, by and between ST. CHARLES PARISH acting herein by and through its President, who is duly authorized to act on behalf of said Parish, hereinafter called the Owner, and SHREAD-KUYRKENDALL & ASSOCIATES, INC., a corporation acting herein by and through its Contracting Officer, hereinafter called Engineer. Whereas the Owner desires to employ a professional consulting engineering firm to perform engineering services for the S190501 ALPHA DRIVE FORCE MAIN RELOCATION AND UPGRADES, formerly known as SP190501 EVALUATION OF LIFT STATION AND LINES (GORDON ST AND E CAMPUS DR) project as described in Ordinance No. 19-11-8 which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

- 1.0 GENERAL
The Owner agrees to employ the Engineer, and the Engineer agrees to perform professional services required for the project described above. Engineering will conform to the requirements of the Owner and to the standards of the agencies participating with the Owner in the Project. The Engineer will coordinate all work between the Owner and all participating agencies and regulating agencies, if needed. Written authorization to begin Conceptual, Preliminary, and Design phases of the project will be given to the Engineer by the owner. The Owner may terminate the Contract by written notification and without cause per Section 7.0 during any phase of the project.
- 2.0 CHARACTER AND EXTENT OF BASIC SERVICES OF THE ENGINEER
2.1 General
2.1.1 Engineer shall provide for Owner professional engineering services in all phases of the Project to which this Agreement applies and as hereinafter provided to properly plan and execute the work on the project(s) assigned to the Engineer. These services will include but will not be limited to serving as Owner's professional engineering representative for the Project, providing professional engineering consultation and advice, and furnishing customary civil, surveying, geotechnical, structural, mechanical, electrical, instrumentation and control engineering services and construction engineering and inspection.
2.1.2 In general, the Project consists of the Design and Construction Management of the following major elements:

The relocation of the force main from Alpha Dr lift station to Gordon St lift station to within Parish servitude. Based on proposed development in the area it is also desired that the both lift stations (Alpha Dr and Gordon St) as well as the force main between them are upgraded to handle the increased demand. All work shall be done in accordance to State regulations for Clean Water State Revolving Fund loan to be obtained by the Parish.

2.1.3 Services provided by the Engineer shall be performed in accordance with generally accepted professional engineering practice at the time and the place where the services are rendered.
2.1.4 Engineer shall obtain from Owner authorization to proceed in writing for each phase of the Project.
2.1.5 Engineer shall provide minutes of all meetings with St. Charles Parish to include but not limited to meetings regarding any phase of the Project, Pre-Bid Conferences, Progress Meetings, Technical review Committee Meetings, etc.
- 2.2 Conceptual Design Report Phase (Previously Completed)
2.2.1 Reviewing available data and consulting with the Owner to clarify and define the Owner's requirements for the Project.
2.2.2 Conducting a Pre-Design Meeting Workshop with the Owner.
2.2.3 Advising the Owner as to the necessity of providing or obtaining from others additional data or services. These additional services may include photogrammetry, reconnaissance surveys, property surveys, topographical surveys, geotechnical investigations and consultations, compilation of hydrological data, materials engineering, and environmental assessments and impact statements.
2.2.4 Identifying and analyzing requirements of governmental authorities having jurisdiction to approve the design of the Project, and participating in consultations with such authorities.
2.2.5 Providing analyses of the Owner's needs, planning surveys and comparative evaluations of prospective site plans and solutions.
2.2.6 Preparing a comprehensive Conceptual Design Report presenting selected solutions to the Owner with the Engineer's findings and recommendations. The Report will contain as a minimum:
• Discussion of project background and need.
• Schematic layouts, sketches, or photographs.
• Conceptual design criteria with appropriate exhibits to indicate clearly the considerations involved.
• Any special material specifications including major equipment specifications.
• A preliminary cost estimate for each alternative.
• Engineer's conceptual opinion of probable costs for the selected alternative.

- Project Master Schedule.
 - Discussion as to what permits are needed, time to acquire approvals, and potential adjacent land owner authorizations/servitudes that need addressing.
 - Discussion of the type of additional services, mentioned in 2.2.3, that will be needed.
- 2.2.7 Meeting with the Owner and presenting findings of the Conceptual Design Report.
- 2.2.8 The Conceptual Design Report and Engineer's documentation and opinion of costs, along with the following documents and files, shall be delivered to Owner within 30 calendar days, or as otherwise stated in the written authorization from Owner to Engineer to proceed with Conceptual Design.
 - Five(5) copies of the report for review.
 - Once the report has been finalized, submit two(2) copies of the revised report plus one(1) electronic file copy in PDF format, and one(1) electronic file copy of the Master project schedule in Microsoft Project format.
 - All files will be titled so as to distinguish between conceptual, preliminary, and final design stages.
- 2.3 Design Memorandum Phase
2.3.1 The Design Memorandum or Preliminary Engineering Design Report will summarize the process and design criteria established in Conceptual Design and initiate acquiring necessary permits and servitudes. The document will be used in the development of final design plans and specifications and will serve as a guide by designers and other interested parties.
- 2.3.2 The Design Memorandum will consist minimally of the following sections:
 - Site Development – project site plan that includes anticipated construction area required and any known servitudes or property owners.
 - Hydraulics - if necessary
 - Treatment Processes - if necessary
 - Design Criteria including a listing of all standard specifications to be used by type(concrete, piling, steel electrical, roads/foundations, etc)
 - Preliminary Drawings –11X17 minimum size
 - The following indexes: Drawings, Division 00 St Charles Parish Bidding/Contract Documents showing revision number, Division 01 St Charles Parish General Specifications showing revision number, and Division 02-16 material and equipment specifications, to be used in final design.
 - Engineer's preliminary opinion of probable costs.
 - Updated Project Master Schedule.
 - Summary of estimated quantities – initial bid schedule
 - Instrumentation & Control Philosophy
 - Power Requirements
 - Additional data that will be needed, such as topographical, geotechnical, and project surveying.
- 2.3.3 The engineer will deliver to owner within 15 days following Design Memorandum authorization, a detailed description(including specifications) and estimated cost of required additional services such as site survey, topographical survey, or geotechnical investigation. In addition, the engineer will also deliver estimated time and cost to apply for regulatory permits from local, state or federal authorities. The owner will have the option to utilize their own surveyor, land/servitude acquisition consultant, permit consultant, or geotech firm.
- 2.3.4 Meeting with the Owner and presenting findings of the Preliminary Design Report.
- 2.3.5 The Preliminary Engineering Design Report and Engineer's documentation and opinion of costs, along with the following documents and files, shall be delivered to the Owner within 30 days or as otherwise stated in the written authorization from Owner to Engineer to proceed with Preliminary Engineering.
 - Five(5) copies of the report for review.
 - Once the report has been finalized, submit two(2) copies of the revised report plus one(1) electronic file copy in PDF format, and one(1) electronic file copy of the updated Master project schedule in Microsoft Project format.
 - Two(2) copies of the drawings(11x17 minimum).
 - Once the drawing review is complete, submit one copy of the revised drawings plus one(1) electronic file copy of each drawing in AutoCADD format(release 2000 or later) and in PDF format.
 - All files will be titled so as to distinguish between conceptual, preliminary, and final design stages.
- 2.4 Design Phase
2.4.1 Prepare for incorporation into Contract Documents final drawings based on the accepted preliminary design documents to show the scope, extent, and character of the work to be furnished and performed by Contract (hereinafter called "Drawings") and Specifications which will be prepared in conformance with the sixteen division format of the Construction Specifications Institute.
- 2.4.2 Preparing and furnishing to the Owner a revised opinion of probable total project costs based on the final Drawings and Specifications.
- 2.4.3 Preparing the contract/bid document that includes St. Charles Parish's Standardized Construction Contract files and the added engineer's specifications for review and approval by the Owner (and the Owner's legal and other advisors).
- 2.4.4 Meeting with the Owner and presenting the final design.
- 2.4.5 The Final Design Services shall be completed and Engineer's documentation and opinion of costs, along with the following documents and files, shall be delivered to the Owner within 30 days or as otherwise stated in the written authorization.
 - Three(3) copies of the contract/bid document for review.
 - Once the contract/bid document has been finalized, submit two(2) stamped copies of the revised document plus one(1) electronic file copy in PDF format, and one(1) electronic file copy of the updated Master project schedule in Microsoft Project format.
 - Two(2) copies of the drawings – D Size for review.
 - Once the drawing review is complete, submit two stamped copies of the revised drawings plus one(1) electronic file copy of each drawing in AutoCADD format(release 2000 or later) and in PDF format.
 - All files will be titled so as to distinguish between conceptual, preliminary, and final design stages
- 2.5 Bidding Phase
2.5.1 Produce Contract Documents (specifications and 22" by 34" drawings) for each Project for bidding purposes.
- 2.5.2 Assist Owner as necessary in advertising for and obtaining bids for construction, materials, equipment and services; and maintain a record of prospective bidders to whom Bidding Documents have been issued, attend Pre-Bid Conferences and receive and process fees for Bidding Documents. Distribute Bidding Documents to potential bidders.
- 2.5.3 Issue addenda as appropriate to interpret, clarify or expand the Bidding Documents.
- 2.5.4 Consult with and advise Owner as to the acceptability of subcontractors, suppliers and other persons and organizations proposed by the prime contractor (herein called "Contractor") for those portions of the work as to which such acceptability is required by the Bidding Documents.
- 2.5.5 Consult with Owner and confirm in writing the acceptability of substitute materials and equipment proposed by Contractor when substitution prior to the award is required by the Bidding Documents.
- 2.5.6 Attend the Bid Opening, prepare Bid Tabulation Sheets and assist Owner in evaluating bids or proposals and recommend, in writing, contract awarding. In addition, Engineer shall assemble contract documents as specified in Exhibit A on page 19 attached hereto and made a part hereof, for presentation and execution.

- 2.5 Construction Phase

During the Construction Phase

2.6.1 General Administration of Construction Contract. Engineer shall consult with and advise Owner and act as Owner's representative as provided in Articles 1 through 17, inclusive, of the Standard General Conditions of the Construction Contract of the Engineer's Joint Contract Documents Committee. The extent and limitations of the duties, responsibilities and authority of Engineer as assigned in said Standard General Conditions shall not be modified, except as Engineer may otherwise agree in writing. All of Owner's instructions to Contractor will be issued through Engineer who will have authority to act on behalf of Owner to the extent provided in said Standard General Conditions except as otherwise provided in writing.

2.6.2 Visits to Site and Observation of Construction. In connection with observations of the work of Contractor while it is in progress.

2.6.2.1 Engineer shall make visits to the site once per month minimum, or more frequent visits as deemed necessary by Owner and/or progress of work during the construction periods to observe as an experienced and qualified design professional the progress and quality of the various aspects of Contractor's work. Based on information obtained during such visits and on such observations, Engineer shall endeavor to determine in general if such work is proceeding in accordance with the Contract Documents and Engineer shall keep Owner informed of the progress of the work.

2.6.2.2 The purpose of Engineer's visits to (and representation by Resident Project Representative if utilized) the site will be to enable Engineer to better carry out the duties and responsibilities assigned to and undertaken by Engineer during the Construction Phase, and, in addition, by exercise of Engineer's efforts as an experienced and qualified design professional, to provide for Owner a greater degree of confidence that the completed work of Contractor will conform generally to the Contract Documents and that the integrity of the design concept as reflected in the Contract Documents has been implemented and preserved by Contractor. On the other hand, Engineer shall not, during such visits or as a result of such observations of Contractor's work in progress, supervise, direct or have control over Contractor's work nor shall Engineer have authority over or responsibility for the means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of construction selected by Contractor, for safety precautions and programs incident to the work of Contractor or for any failure of Contractor to comply with laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes or orders applicable to Contractor furnishing and performing their work except as provided in 2.6.3. Accordingly, Engineer can neither guarantee the performance of the construction contracts by Contractor nor assume responsibility for Contractor's failure to furnish and perform their work in accordance with the Contract Documents.

2.6.3 Defective Work. During such visits and on the basis of such observations, Engineer may disapprove of or reject Contractor's work while it is in progress if Engineer believes that such work will not produce a completed Project that conforms generally to the Contract Documents or that it will prejudice the integrity of the design concept of the Project as reflected in the Contract Documents.

2.5.4 Interpretations and Clarifications. Engineer shall issue necessary interpretations and clarifications of the Contract Documents.

2.6.5 Shop Drawings. Engineer shall review and approve (or take other appropriate action in respect of) Shop Drawings (as that term is defined in the aforesaid Standard General Conditions), samples and other data which Contractor is required to submit, but only for conformance with the design concept of the Project and compliance with the information given in the Contract Documents. Such reviews and approvals or other action shall not extend to means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of construction or to safety precautions and programs incident thereto except as provided in 2.6.3.

2.6.6 Substitutes. Engineer shall evaluate and determine the acceptability of substitute materials and equipment proposed by Contractor and make a recommendation to Owner for his approval.

2.6.7 Inspections and Tests. Engineer shall have authority, as Owner's representative, to require special inspection or testing of the work, and shall receive and review all certificates of inspections, testing and approvals required by laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes, orders or the Contract Documents (but only to determine generally that their content complies with the requirements of, and the results certified indicate compliance with, the Contract Documents).

2.6.8 Dispute between Owner and Contractor. Engineer shall act as initial interpreter of the requirements of the Contract Documents and judge of the acceptability of the work thereunder and make recommendations on all claims of Owner and Contractor relating to the acceptability of the work or the interpretation of the requirements of the Contract Documents pertaining to the execution and progress of the work.

2.6.9 Applications for Payment. Based on Engineer's on-site observations as an experienced and qualified design professional, on information provided by the Resident Project Representative and on review of applications for payment and the accompanying data and schedules:

2.6.9.1 Engineer shall determine the amounts owed to Contractor and recommend in writing payments to Contractor in such amounts. Such recommendations of payment will constitute a representation to Owner based on such observations and review, that the work has progressed to the point indicated, and that, to the best of Engineer's knowledge, information and belief, the quality of such work is generally in accordance with the Contract Documents (subject to an evaluation of such work as a functioning whole prior to or upon Substantial Completion, to the results of any subsequent tests called for in the Contract Documents and to any other qualifications stated in the recommendation). In the case of unit price work, Engineer's recommendations of payment will include final determination of quantities and classifications of such work (subject to any subsequent adjustments allowed by the Contract Documents).

2.6.9.2 By recommending any payment Engineer will not thereby be deemed to have represented that exhaustive, continuous or detailed reviews or examinations have been made by Engineer to check the quality or quantity of Contractor's work as it is furnished and performed beyond the responsibilities specifically assigned to Engineer in this Agreement and the Contract Documents. Engineer's review of Contractor's work for the purposes of recommending payments will not impose on Engineer responsibility to supervise, direct or control such work or for the means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction or safety precautions or programs incident thereto or Contractor compliance with laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes or orders applicable to their furnishing and performing the work. It will also not impose responsibility on Engineer to make any examination to ascertain how or for what purposes any Contractor has used the moneys paid on account of the Contract Price, or to determine that title to any of the work, materials or equipment has passed to Owner free and clear of any lien, claims, security interests or encumbrances, or
- that there may not be other matters at issue between Owner and Contractor that might affect the amount that should be paid except as provided in, but not limited to paragraph 2.6.3.

2.6.10 Construction Closeout Document. Engineer shall receive and review maintenance and operating instructions, tests and approvals which are to be assembled by Contractor in accordance with the Contract Documents (but such review will only be to determine that their content complies with the requirements of, and in the case of certificates of inspection, tests and approvals the results certified indicate compliance with, the Contract Documents); and shall transmit them to Owner with written comments.

2.6.11 Inspection. Engineer shall conduct an inspection to determine if the work is substantially complete and a final inspection to determine if the completed work is acceptable. If the completed work is acceptable, the Engineer shall recommend in writing, a Notice of Substantial Completion to the Owner and the Contractor that the work is acceptable (subject to any conditions therein expressed).

2.6.12 Pre-Construction Conference. Engineer shall assist Owner in conducting a Pre-Construction Conference with Contractor for the project to discuss construction-related matters. Engineer will supply two stamped copies of the Construction Drawings incorporating addenda items generated during the bid process plus one(1) electronic file copy of each drawing in AutoCADD format(release 2000 or later) and in PDF format titled to reflect "Construction Drawings"

2.6.13 Owner shall select independent material testing labs. Engineer shall review testing results and based on these results, recommend to Owner the acceptability of material provided by the Contractor and used in the Project.

2.6.14 Limitation of Responsibilities. Engineer shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any Contractor, or of any subcontractor or supplier, or any of the Contractor's or Sub-Contractor's or supplier's agents or employees or any other persons (except Engineer's own employees and agents) at the site or otherwise furnishing or performing any of the Contractor's work; however, nothing contained in paragraphs 2.6.1 through 2.6.12 inclusive, shall be construed to release Engineer from liability for failure to properly perform duties and responsibilities assumed by Engineer in the Contract Documents, inclusive of but not limited to 2.6.3.

2.6.15 Work Directive Changes and Change Orders. To be provided as appropriate to construct the project and in accordance with State and Local Laws.

2.7 Close-out and Operational Phase

During this Phase, Engineer shall:

2.7.1 Provide start-up services for the new facility.

2.7.2 Prepare training materials and provide 2 hours of training for Owner's staff to operate and maintain the new facility. The program consists of classroom training and hands-on training using the installed equipment.

2.7.3 Assemble 0 complete sets of equipment manufacturer's operation and maintenance manuals in proper order for Owner's future reference.

2.7.4 Assemble 2 complete sets of approved shop drawings in proper order for Owner's future reference.

2.7.5 Provide technical consultation and assistance in correcting warranty items.

2.7.6 Provide assistance in connection with the refining and adjusting of new equipment or system.

2.7.7 Prepare a final set of stamped project drawings reflecting "as built" along with one(1) electronic file copy of these drawings in AutoCADD format(release 2000 or later) and in PDF format titled to reflect "as built".

2.7.8 In company with Owner, visit the Project to observe any apparent defects in the completed construction, assist Owner in consultations and discussions with Contractor concerning correction of such deficiencies, and make recommendations as to replacement or correction of defective work.

2.7.9 Engineer shall have 45 days from Contractor's Substantial Completion date to complete requirements of Contract sections 2.7.4 and 2.7.7.

2.8 Resident Engineer and Inspection

2.8.1 Engineer shall furnish, if requested, a Resident Project Representative (RPR), assistants and other field staff to assist Engineer in observing performance of the work of Contractor. The RPR(s), and the level of support supplied, shall be subject to approval by the Owner.

2.8.2 Through more extensive on-site observations of the work in progress and field checks of materials and equipment by the RPR and assistants, Engineer shall endeavor to provide further protection for Owner against defects and deficiencies in the work of the Contractor.

2.8.3 The RPR shall be the Engineer's agent at the site, will act as directed by and under the supervision of Engineer, and will confer with Engineer regarding RPR's actions. RPR's dealings in matters pertaining to the on-site work shall in general be with Engineer and Contractor keeping Owner advised as necessary. RPR's dealing with subcontractor shall only be through or with the full knowledge and approval of Contractor. RPR shall generally communicate with Owner with the knowledge of and under the direction of Engineer.

2.8.4 Duties and Responsibilities of RPR.

2.8.4.1 Schedules. Review the progress schedule, schedule of Shop Drawings submittals and schedule of values prepared by Contractor and consult with Engineer concerning acceptability.

2.8.4.2 Conferences and Meetings. Attend meetings with Contractor, such as Pre-Construction Conferences, Progress Meetings, Job Conferences and other project related meetings, and prepare and circulate copies of minutes thereof.

2.8.4.3 Liaison:
 - Serve as Engineer's liaison with Contractor, working principally through Contractor's superintendent and assist in understanding the intent of the Contract Documents; and assist Engineer in serving as Owner's liaison with Contractor when Contractor's operations affect Owner's on-site operations.
 - Assist in obtaining from Owner additional details or information when required for proper execution of the Work.

2.8.4.4 Shop Drawings and Samples:
 - Record date of receipt of Shop Drawings and samples.
 - Receive samples which are furnished at the site by Contractor, and notify Engineer of availability of samples for examination.
 - Advise Engineer and Contractor of the commencement of any work requiring a Shop Drawing or sample if the submittal has not been approved by Engineer.

2.8.4.5 Review of Work, Rejection of Defective Work, Inspection and Test.
 - Conduct on-site observations of the Work in progress to assist Engineer in determining if the Work is in general proceeding in accordance with the Contract Documents.
 - Report to Engineer and Owner whenever RPR believes that any Work is unsatisfactory, faulty or defective or does not conform to the Contract Documents, or has been damaged, or does not meet the requirements of any inspection, test or approval required to be made; and advise Engineer of work that RPR believes should be corrected or rejected or should be uncovered for observations, or requires special testing, inspection or approval.
 - Verify that tests, equipment and systems start-ups and operating and maintenance training are conducted in the presence of appropriate personnel, and that Contractor maintains adequate records thereof; and observe, record and report to Engineer appropriate details relative

- to the test procedures and start-ups.
- Accompany visiting inspectors representing public agencies having jurisdiction over the Project, record the results of these inspections and report to Engineer.
- 2.8.4.6 Interpretation of Contract Documents. Report to Engineer and Owner when clarifications and interpretations of the Contract Documents are needed and transmit to Contractor clarifications and interpretations as issued by the Engineer.
- 2.8.4.7 Modifications. Consider and evaluate Contractor suggestions for modifications in Drawing or Specifications and report with RPR's recommendations to Engineer and Owner. Transmit to Contractor decisions as issued by Engineer.
- 2.8.4.8 Records.
 - Maintain at the job site orderly files for correspondence, reports for job conferences, Shop Drawings, and samples, reproductions of original Contract Documents including all Work Directive Changes, Addenda, Change Orders, Field Orders, additional Drawings issued subsequent to the execution of the contract, Engineer's clarifications and interpretations of the Contract Documents, progress reports and other Project related documents.
 - Keep a diary or log book recording Contractor hours on the job site, weather conditions, data relative to questions of Work Directive Changes, Change Orders or changed conditions, list of job site visitors, daily activities, decisions, observations in general, and specific observations in more detail as in the case of observing test procedures, and send copies to Engineer and Owner.
 - Record names, addresses and telephone numbers of all Contractors, subcontractors and major suppliers of materials and equipment.
 - Keep pictorial record of progress of project.
- 2.8.4.9 Reports:
 - Furnish Engineer and Owner periodic (daily) reports as required of progress of the work and of Contractor's compliance with the progress schedule and schedule of Shop Drawing and sample submittals.
 - Consult with Engineer in advance of scheduled major tests, inspections or start of important phases of the work.
 - Draft proposed Change Orders and Work Directive Changes, obtaining backup material from Contractor and recommend to Engineer Change Orders, Work Directive Changes and Field Orders in accordance with State and Local Laws.
 - Report immediately to Engineer and Owner upon the occurrence of any accident.
- 2.8.4.10 Payment Requests. Review applications for payment with Contractor for compliance with the established procedure as set forth in the Construction Contract for their submission and forward with recommendations to Engineer noting particularly the relationship of the payment requested to the schedule of values, work completed and materials and equipment delivered at the site but not incorporated in the work.
- 2.8.4.11 Certificates, Maintenance and Operations Manuals. During the course of the work, verify that certificates, maintenance and operation manuals and other data required to be assembled and furnished by contractor are applicable to the times actually installed and in accordance with the Contract Documents, and having this material delivered to Engineer for review and forwarding to Owner prior to final payment for the work.
- 2.8.4.12 Completion.
 - Before Engineer issues a Certificate of Substantial Completion, submit to Contractor a list of observed items requiring completion or correction.
 - Conduct final inspection in the company of Engineer, Owner and Contractor and prepare a final list of items to be completed or corrected.
 - Observe that all items on final list have been completed or corrected and make recommendation to Engineer concerning acceptance.

2.8.5 Limitation of Authority.

- 2.8.5.1 Resident Project Representative
 - Shall not authorize any deviation from the Contract Documents or substitution of materials or equipment unless authorized by Engineer or Owner.
 - Shall not exceed limitations of Engineer's authority as set forth in the Agreement or the Contract Documents.
 - Shall not undertake any of the responsibilities of Contractor, Sub-Contractor or Contractor's superintendent.
 - Shall not advise on, issue directions relative to or assume control over any aspect of the means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures of construction unless such advice or directions are specifically required by the Contract Documents.
 - Shall not advise on, issue directions regarding or assume control over safety precautions and programs in connection with the work.
 - Shall not accept Shop Drawing or sample submittals from anyone other than Contractor.
 - Shall not authorize Owner to occupy the project in whole or in part.
 - Shall not participate in specialized field or laboratory tests or inspections conducted by others except as specifically authorized by Engineer.

3.0 SERVICES OF THE OWNER

- 3.1 Provide full information as to the requirements of the Project.
- 3.2 Assist the Engineer in planning and design services by placing at his disposal all existing plans, maps, field notes, statistics, computations and other data in its possession relative to existing facilities.
- 3.3 Guarantee access to and make all provisions for the Engineer and his subconsultants to enter upon public property as required for performing the services.

4.0 COMPENSATION

- 4.1 For performance of Basic Engineering and Resident Engineering and Inspection as outlined in Section 2, Paragraphs 2.1 through 2.8.5.1 inclusive, required by the Owner, the Owner shall authorize and pay the Engineer as per the following:
 - 4.1.1 Owner shall pay Engineer for the performance of Basic Engineering services as outlined in Section 2, Paragraphs 2.1 through 2.7.9 inclusive, a professional engineering fee based upon either a percentage of the construction cost of the project or a lump sum estimate by the Engineer.(mark the method of compensation with an X)

 X Percentage of construction method is to be used, the fee shall be determined by referring to curve A on page 20 (Exhibit B) of this Contract, which indicates the rate of compensation for Basic Engineering Services expressed as a percentage of the construction cost. This curve is from American Society of Civil Engineer's Manual No. 45, 1980 Edition.

 Lump Sum amount of \$ paid according to section 4.1.1.3

- 4.1.1.1 The fee for basic engineering services shall be based on a percentage of the construction cost of the bid amount submitted by the lowest responsible and responsive bidder.
- 4.1.1.2 An estimated construction cost based on the Engineer's conceptual opinion of probable cost for the project shall initially be used for the determination of interim fees until the more detailed Engineer's revised opinion of probable total project costs based on the final Drawings and Specifications referred to in Section 2, Paragraph 2.4.2 of this Contract is available.
- 4.1.1.3 Payment for basic engineering services shall be made based upon Engineer's estimate of the proportion of the services actually completed at the time of billing and shall be made in partial payments at monthly intervals for the following phases:
 - For performing services outlined in Section 2.2, Conceptual Design Report Phase, Paragraphs 2.2.1 through 2.2.8 inclusive, Owner agrees to pay Engineer as follows:
 - \$19,500 paid previously for a Preliminary Engineering Report, dated August 2019. Monies paid out for the report are a part of the overall fee.
 - For performing services outlined in Section 2.3 Design Memorandum Phase, Paragraphs 2.3.1 through 2.3.6 inclusive, Section 2.4 Design Phase, Paragraphs 2.4.1 through 2.4.5 inclusive, Owner agrees to pay Engineer as follows:
 - Seventy percent (70%) of the total basic engineering service fee. Said fee shall be payable in partial payments on a monthly basis. Said fee also includes the \$19,500 from Section 2.2, Conceptual Design Report Phase
 - For performing services outlined in Sections 2.5 Bidding Phase, Paragraphs 2.5.1 through 2.5.6 inclusive and Section 2.6 Construction Phase, Paragraphs 2.6.1 through 2.6.15 inclusive, and Section 2.7, Close-out and Operational Phase, Paragraphs 2.7.1 through 2.7.9 inclusive, the Owner agrees to pay Engineer as follows:
 - Thirty percent (30%) of the total basic engineering service fee. Said fee shall be payable in partial payments on a monthly basis.
- 4.1.1.4 Payment for basic engineering services on projects that do not require construction services, such as feasibility studies or drainage studies, shall be made based upon Engineer's estimate of the proportion of the services actually completed at the time of billing and shall be made in partial payments at monthly intervals for the following phases:
 - For performing services outlined in Section 2.2, Conceptual Design Report Phase, Paragraphs 2.2.1 through 2.2.8 inclusive, Owner agrees to pay Engineer as follows:
 - Thirty percent (30%) of the total basic engineering services fee. Said fee shall be payable in partial payments on a monthly basis,
 - For performing services outlined in Section 2.3 Design Memorandum Phase, Paragraphs 2.3.1 through 2.3.5 inclusive, Section 2.4 Design Phase, Paragraphs 2.4.1 through 2.4.5 inclusive, Owner agrees to pay Engineer as follows:
 - Seventy percent (70%) of the total basic engineering service fee. Said fee shall be payable in partial payments on a monthly basis.
- 4.1.1.5 If the Project, or any portion thereof, is not constructed for any reason, the final fee for basic engineering services shall be negotiated between Owner and Engineer as per section 7.0.
- 4.1.2 Owner shall pay Engineer for the performance of Resident Engineering and Inspection as outlined in Section 2, Paragraphs 2.8 through 2.8.5.1 inclusive, at monthly intervals based on either the hourly rate included in Exhibit C on page 21 of this Contract or by an agreed upon rate between the Owner and Engineer. Payment can be by billable hours for a not to exceed amount.

- 4.2 If authorized in writing by Owner, for the performance of, or for obtaining from others Additional Services which are not considered normal or customary Basic Engineering or Resident Engineering and Inspection Services, the Owner shall pay Engineer in accordance with Paragraph 4.2.1 through 4.2.3, based on monthly invoices submitted by the Engineer, within sixty (60) days of receipt of Engineer's invoice.

- 4.2.1 For Additional Services provided by the Engineer such as, but not limited to, wetlands permitting, land and right-of-way acquisition, surveying, NPDES and LADEQ permit renewal or acquisition work, etc. Owner shall pay Engineer based on either the hourly rate included in Exhibit C on page 21 of this Contract or by an agreed upon rate between the Owner and Engineer. Payment can be by either billable hours, lump sum, or not to exceed amount.
- 4.2.2 The following documentation shall be required for payment to Engineer and shall be attached to the monthly invoice.
 - A copy of the Owner's written authorization to perform the service.
 - Timesheets for all hours invoiced.
 - Invoice copies, logs or other substantiation of nonsalary expenses.
- 4.2.3 For Additional Services that Engineer acquires from subcontractors and/or subconsultants, Owner shall pay Engineer a fixed sum previously agreed upon by Owner and Engineer, such sum to be established in each case when the scope of the work involved has been determined and before any of the Additional Services are provided. The use of subcontractors and/or subconsultants shall be subject to the provisions set forth in Section 10, Paragraph 10.4 and Section 11, Paragraph 11.4 of this Contract. The following documentation shall be required for payment to Engineer and shall be attached to the monthly invoice.
 - A copy of the Owner's written consent for the subcontractor and/or subconsultant to perform the service stating the Owner's and Engineer's agreed upon fixed sum established for the service performed.
 - Evidence that the subcontractor and/or subconsultant is insured as required by Section 10, Paragraph 10.4 of this Contract.
- 4.2.4 For Additional Engineering described in Section 5, Paragraph 5.1.1, Owner shall pay Engineer for the fee negotiated at the time the work is assigned by the method stipulated in the contract amendment.

5.0 CHARACTER AND EXTENT OF ADDITIONAL ENGINEERING

- 5.1 The Owner reserves the right to request Engineer to provide Additional Engineering and/or Additional Services described in Section 5, Paragraphs 5.1.1 through 5.1.2.11 inclusive. It is mutually understood that the Owner reserves the right to reevaluate any/all Interested Engineering Firms concerning Additional Engineering or Additional Services as described in Section 5.0. The Owner shall issue written authorization to the Engineer to provide Additional Engineering and/or Additional Services prior to the performance of any Additional Engineering and/or Additional Services as described in Section 5, Paragraph 5.1 through 5.1.2.11 inclusive.
- 5.1.1 Additional Engineering. Provide Basic Design and Construction Engineering Services for a negotiated fee. The fee for Basic Engineering Services related to the design and construction for the associated work shall be negotiated at the time the work is assigned and this Contract shall be amended to include that work in accordance with Section 4.0 of this

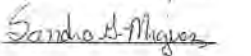
- Contract.
- 5.1.2 Additional Services. Furnish or obtain from others Additional Services of the following types. The fee for Additional Services shall be authorized at the time the work is assigned in accordance with Section 4.2 of this contract.
- 5.1.2.1 Providing necessary design topographic surveying for the Project to obtain existing grading, locations and dimensions of existing structures, and elevation of critical elements.
- 5.1.2.2 Furnish survey personnel to lay out and stake out for construction, giving line locations and grade stakes at the required intervals.
- 5.1.2.3 Prepare to and serve as an expert witness for the Owner in any litigation.
- 5.1.2.4 Furnish one or more full time Resident Inspectors who will direct his and/or their efforts toward providing assurance for the owner that the completed project will conform to the requirements of the Contract Documents. This shall not be construed as the actual direction of construction work being performed by the Contractor, nor make the engineers responsible for construction techniques, sequences or procedures or the safety precautions incident thereto. A written resume will be submitted to the Owner for each Resident Inspector assigned to the Project. The Owner retains the right to disapprove the use of any Resident Inspector the owner feels is, for any reason, not qualified.
- 5.1.2.5 Act as the Owner's representative in coordination of and be present during negotiations between Owner and other Governmental Bodies, Utility Companies, Transportation Companies, etc. (Prepare necessary data for such activities and review and make recommendations on data submitted by such agencies.)
- 5.1.2.6 Services resulting from significant changes in the general scope, extent or character of the Project or its design including, but not limited to, changes in size, complexity, Owner's schedule, character of construction or method of financing; and revising previously accepted studies, reports, design documents or Contract Documents when such revisions are required by changes in laws, rules, regulations, ordinances, codes or orders enacted subsequent to the preparation of such studies, reports or documents or are due to any other causes beyond Engineer's control as approved by Owner.
- 5.1.2.7 Providing renderings or models for Owner's use.
- 5.1.2.8 Preparing documents in addition to those furnished under Design Engineering and Construction Services for alternate bids requested by Owner for Contractor's work which is not executed or documents for out-of-sequence work.
- 5.1.2.9 Providing any type of property surveys or related engineering services needed for the transfer of interests in real property.
- 5.1.2.10 Assistance in connection with re-bidding or renegotiating contracts for construction, materials, equipment or services.
- 5.1.2.11 Provide technical consultation and advice on the completed project after the initial thirty (30) day start-up period.
- 6.0 OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS,
- 6.1 Documents including but not limited to plans, specifications, maps, basic survey notes, sketches, charts, computations and all other data prepared or obtained under the terms of this authorization shall become the property of the Owner and shall be made available for Owner's inspection at anytime during the Project and, shall be delivered to the Owner prior to termination or final completion of the Contract.
- 6.2 Engineer may retain a set of documents for its files.
- 6.3 Reuse of Documents. Any reuse of documents or materials without written authorization or adaptation by Engineer to the specific purpose intended will be at Owner's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to Engineer or to Engineer's independent professional associates, subcontractors, and consultants.
- 6.4 No materials, to include but not limited to reports, maps or other documents produced as a result of this Contract, in whole or in part, shall be available to Engineer for copyright purposes. Any such materials produced as a result of this Contract that might be subject to copyright shall be the property of the Owner and all such rights shall belong to the Owner, and the Owner shall be sole and exclusive entity who may exercise such rights.
- 7.0 TERMINATION.
- 7.1 This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice.
- 7.2 The Engineer, upon receipt of such notice, shall immediately discontinue all services in connection with the performance of this Agreement and shall proceed to cancel promptly all existing orders and contracts insofar as such orders or contracts are chargeable to this Agreement.
- 7.3 The Engineer shall, as soon as practicable after receipt of notice of termination, submit a statement showing in detail the services performed and payments received under this Agreement to the date of termination.
- 7.4 The Owner shall then pay the Engineer promptly that portion of the prescribed fee to which both parties agree.
- 7.5 Failure to meet delivery dates stated in Contract sections 2.2.8, 2.3.3, and 2.7.9 are considered substantial failures. (ADDED 2/02)
- 8.0 COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND ORDINANCE.
- 8.1 The Engineer hereby agrees to comply with all Federal, State and Local Laws and Ordinances applicable to the work or services under this Contract.
- 9.0 SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS
- 9.1 Owner and Engineer each bind himself, his successors, executors, administrators and assigns to the other party to this Agreement, and to the successors, executors, administrators and assigns of each other party in respect to all covenants of this Agreement.
- 10.0 INSURANCE
- 10.1 The Engineer shall secure and maintain at his expense such insurance that will protect him and the Owner, from claims under Workmen's Compensation Acts and from claims for bodily injury, death or property damage which may arise from performance of services under this Agreement. Insurance for bodily injury or death shall be in the unencumbered amount of \$500,000.00 for one person and not less than \$1,000,000.00 for all injuries and/or deaths resulting from any one occurrence. The insurance for property damage shall be in the unencumbered amount of \$250,000.00 for each accident and not less than \$1,000,000.00 aggregate.
- 10.2 The Engineer shall also secure and maintain at his expense professional liability Insurance in the unencumbered sum of \$500,000.00.
- 10.3 All certificates of Insurance SHALL BE FURNISHED TO THE OWNER and shall provide that insurance shall not be cancelled without ten (10) days prior written notice to the Owner. The Owner may examine the policies.
- 10.4 Engineer shall include all subcontractors and/or subconsultants as insured under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates for each. All coverages for subcontractors and/or subconsultants shall be subject to all the requirements stated herein.
- 10.5 St Charles Parish shall be named as an additional insured on general liability insurance policies.
- 10.6 For all purposes under Louisiana law, the principals of this Contract shall be recognized as the statutory employer of all contract employees as provided in LSA-R.S. 23:1061.
- 11.0 GENERAL.
- 11.1 The Engineer shall indemnify and save harmless the Owner against any and all claims, demands, suits or judgments for sums of money to any party for loss of life or injury or damages to person or property growing out of, resulting from or by reason of any negligent

act by the Engineer, its agent, servants or employees, while engaged upon or in connection with the services required or performed hereunder.

For breach or violation of this warranty, the Owner shall have the right to annul this Contract without liability.
- 11.4 This Agreement being for the personal services of the Engineer shall not be assigned or subcontracted in whole or in part by the Engineer as to the services to be performed hereunder without the written consent of the Owner.
- 11.5 Should either party to this Agreement have to file suit in order to enforce the provisions of hereof, the losing party hereby agrees to pay the attorney's fees of the prevailing party.
- 11.6 No member of the Governing Body of the Owner and no other officer, employee or agent of the Owner who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the planning and carrying out to the Program, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract, and the Engineer shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.
- 11.7 No member of the Governing Body of the locality and no other public official of such locality, who exercises any functions or responsibilities in connection with the planning and carrying out of the Program, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Contract, and the Engineer shall take appropriate steps to assure compliance.
- 11.8 The Engineer covenants that he presently has no interest and shall not acquire interest, direct or indirect, in the project area or any parcels therein or any other interest which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of his services hereunder. The Engineer further covenants that in the performance of this Contract no person having any such interest shall be employed.
- 12.0 ACCESS TO SITE.
- 12.1 Owner shall be fully responsible for obtaining the necessary access authorizations to allow Engineer, its agents, subcontractors and representatives, to have access to all areas of public and private property as required by Engineer in order to perform its services under this Agreement.
- 13.0 WARRANTY.
- 13.1 Engineer warrants that it will perform its design services with the degree of skill and to the standard of care required of the engineering profession to meet all Federal, State and Local requirements
- 13.2 If Engineering Services for project designed by Engineer does not meet those requirements noted in 13.1 above, then to the extent that this occurs as a direct result of Engineer's failure to meet the standard of care in its design services, Engineer will indemnify the Parish for Engineer's share of the costs incurred to bring Engineering Services for project to the limitations mandated.
- 13.3 The obligations expressed in 13.1 and 13.2 in no way limits the Engineer's obligations expressed elsewhere in this Contract.
- 14.0 EXCLUSIVE JURISDICTION AND VENUE
- 14.1 For all claims arising out of or related to this agreement, ENGINEER hereby consents and yields to the exclusive jurisdiction and venue of the Twenty-Ninth Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Charles and expressly waives any (a) pleas of jurisdiction based upon ENGINEER'S residence and (B) right of removal to Federal Court based upon diversity of citizenship.
