Public invited to comment on proposed Upper Barataria levee

Although it'll be 50-year storm height, St. Charles Parish may complete its long desired West Bank flood protection through a proposed \$514 million Upper Barataria levee.

The 18.3-mile levee would secure portions of seven south Louisiana parishes, including St. Charles Parish, from flooding caused by hurricane and tidal surges and heavy rainfall.

The public can comment on the project on Jan. 7 at 6 p.m. at the Edward A. Dufresne Community Center, 274 Judge Edward Dufresne Parkway in Luling.

Sam Scholle, the parish's senior projects manager, said the U.S. Army Corps

of Engineers study is aimed at determining the feasibility of the project.

Scholle said the state's Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority (CPRA), the Lafourche Basin Levee District, North Lafourche Levee District and St. Charles Parish are participating in the study. CPRA is the project's local sponsor and could be required to cover at least 35 percent of its cost with the rest to come in federal dollars.

"This means it's a lower level levee with a flood risk of one in 50 years rather than one in 100 years," Scholle said.

If approved and funded, the Upper

20 NOV. 30 For Destrehan mother and son, the flu brought a ‘miracle’

People describe the flu as a nuisance, or an uncomfortable ordeal, or perhaps a major inconvenience.

Virtually no one calls it a blessing. But for Destrehan’s Tara Schlosser and her 8-year-old son, Stefan, that’s exactly what it was.

“It was a miracle,” Schlosser said.

First, some background: Stefan suffers from a severe form of epilepsy. He is the biological son of Schlosser’s first cousin; his birth parents battled and eventually succumbed to drug addiction in January of 2013, leaving Stefan orphaned. Schlosser adopted him two months after that, bringing a young boy in desperate need of a loving and caring home into hers.

18 JULY 22 Arrest made in 40-year cold case

More than 40 years ago a hunter found the remains of 5-year-old Stephanie Hebert tied to a tree in a swampy area in St. Charles Parish, but the recent arrest of a Massachusetts man may provide a suspect in the haunting cold case.

Jason Vendrick Franklin, 72, was extradited to Louisiana and charged with raping Hebert along with two other children at the time of the child’s disappearance. He was indicted on one count of first-degree rape and two counts of aggravated rape.

Franklin is being held in Jefferson Parish Correctional Center on \$6 million bond, said Capt. Jason Rivarde with the Jefferson

Parish Sheriff’s Office (JPSO), who confirmed Franklin became a suspect in the child’s death in December of last year when additional information surfaced, although they declined to comment further in the ongoing investigation.

He was due in court Wednesday (July 10) for a status hearing.

16 JUNE 17 Squeal and Moo closes after one year

Just weeks after the one-year anniversary of its opening, the owners of Squeal and Moo Real Pit BBQ have closed their restaurant’s doors.

The closing became effective June 2. Kip and Lori Bergeron announced the closure via a post to Squeal and Moo’s Facebook page, noting the decision was not an easy one, but was ultimately one they had to make.

“With deep regret, we announce that the doors of Squeal and Moo Real Pit BBQ will permanently close today,” the post read. “This decision was extremely difficult because serving our community over the past year was such a pleasure. We are so

19 NOV. 23 Apparent game-winning kick called back as Hahnville falls

17 AUG. 16 Lawsuits filed challenging residency of parish president, sheriff candidates

Two lawsuits have been filed to disqualify two candidates in the Oct. 12 primary election in St. Charles Parish.

Henry LeBoyd filed suit in the 29th Judicial District Court versus Matt Jewell and Clerk of Court Lance Marino contending Jewell is not a qualified candidate for the office of parish president.

The case will be heard at 10 a.m. Wednesday in court in expedited proceedings per the law on elections, according to the lawsuit. Jewell must produce information proving he is a registered voter and has lived in St. Charles Parish for five years.

Judicial judges Emile St. Pierre, Lauren Lemmon and Timothy Marcel have recused themselves from the case. Ad hoc Judge Ashley Bruce Simpson, formerly of the 17th Judicial District in Lafourche Parish.

15 JUNE 24 Des Allemand’s woman’s murder will be subject of crime documentary

Jolene Dufrene says reliving her daughter’s brutal murder in a crime documentary will be painful, but she also considers it an opportunity to keep her daughter’s memory alive.

Los Angeles-based Renegade83 productions contacted Dufrene about featuring her daughter Lindsay Nichols’ case in an episode of a true crime documentary series for the Oxygen network. They’ve advised her the episode will focus on Nichols rather than the two men convicted in connection with her murder.

2-year-old fighting cancer

When little Payton started complaining about stomach pains, her parents did not expect the diagnosis for their then 18-month-old baby.

“It was a shock,” said her father Brian Maurice. “You see these stories all the time, but you never think it’s going to happen to you.”

An ultrasound revealed Payton had a grapefruit-sized tumor in her abdomen. It’s called embryonal rhabdomyosarcoma (RMO), an aggressive form of cancer considered a childhood disease that typically occurs in those age 18 and under.

Payton’s parents, Brian and Christy Maurice of Destrehan, are staying positive for their child, who Brian says picked up on their distress at first. When they realized why she was upset, they worked through their own emotions and stay upbeat around their daughter to promote her recovery.

They also are relieved it was caught before age 2, which improves chances of recovery. It is considered an immediate risk because the

cancer’s large and near other organs, but it has apparently not spread.

It’s good news for a child that Brian called the “life of the party.”

Family says they will bring new restaurant to Luling despite eviction

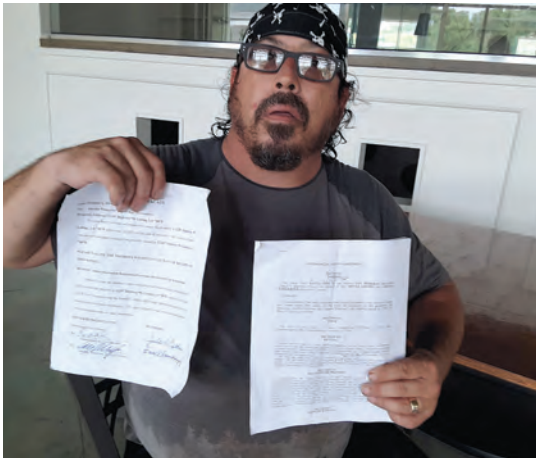
With much anticipation, the Wingerter were ready to open their new Luling restaurant when the unthinkable happened.

Teen was 100 feet from father’s home when killed

“If you had a dozen roses he was the biggest blossom,” said Jimmie Ray of Boutte about losing his son.

Taylor Bailey Ray was only 100 feet from his father’s home in Boutte when he was struck and killed by a truck on U.S. Highway 90 at Third Street. It was 4:07 a.m. Aug. 30 when Ray was apparently dropped off by friends at the RaceTrac and started to cross the highway, according to aunt Janell Fontenot.

Ray was hit by a 2006 Ford Ranger and declared dead at the scene, according to the Louisiana State Police’s preliminary investigation. The crash is still under investigation and results from toxicology reports are pending.

58-lot subdivision planned for Destrehan

The St. Charles Parish Planning Commission will consider an estimated \$10 million development planned for Destrehan at its Aug. 1 meeting.

Businessman Todd Trosclair announced plans to pursue the project in April and is seeking approval for construction on a 75.6-acre tract of land.

The project calls for a 58-lot subdivision on 13100 River Road in Destrehan, which would be called Saints Place. Also planned is a 17-lot light industrial park on 20 acres west of 405 Alpha Drive in Destrehan, extending towards I-310 along the south side of the railroad tracks.

Trosclair's 310 Development LLC is named as the applicant for the subdivision. The company and P&L Investments in Destrehan are named as applicants for Plantation Business Park Phase II.

The plat shows access being provided by new streets, which will have access to River Road by connecting to existing Campus Drive West. Except for Parcels A and B, each

proposed lot would have the required frontage along the new roadway.

3 rescued after spending 16 hours in marsh

John Wingrove had just dropped his line at his favorite bass fishing spot in Lac Des Allemands Sunday morning when he and his friend, Jesse Bates, heard someone yelling for help. They couldn't believe their eyes when they looked toward the shore.

"The guy and little girl were standing on a log in the water," Wingrove said. "They told me their boat sunk Saturday and they had stayed there all night long." In his more than 20 years of frequenting the spot, it was the first time he'd seen anything like this.

It was Kerry Schexnayder and his 7-year-old daughter, Rylie, who were clinging to the log and covered in mosquito bites.

As Wingrove and Bates, both of LaPlace, rescued them, a worried Schexnayder told them his brother was still in the marsh.

St. Charles deputy injured in Luling alligator attack

An approximately five-foot long alligator attacked and bit a St. Charles Parish deputy on Monday, as officers were attempting to help capture it after it wandered into the backyard of a Luling residence.

The officer, who was not identified by the St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office, suffered deep lacerations and punctures to his right arm. He was treated at University Medical Center and subsequently released, and is expected to make a full recovery, according to Sheriff's Office spokesman Cpl. James Grimaldi.

Officers on the scene were assisting a St. Charles Nuisance Animal Officer after the alligator wandered into the rear yard of a home on the 100 block of Evergreen Court. After using an animal catch pole to hold the alligator, a deputy attempted to tape the alligator so it could be safely relocated to the wild. As the deputy attempted to secure the alligator, the alligator pulled free from the deputy and bit him on his right arm.

LaChance, a Kenner resident, was buying the tickets for an eight-person pool of co-workers who will now split the money. They work in the Destrehan area, hence why the Corner Market was LaChance's venue of choice.

"I stop there pretty frequently ... it wasn't random," he said.

Those who knew him well have fond memories of him, and the same for many who didn't as well - the image of Collins riding his bicycle along the roads of the parish is one locals have seen over and over again, since he moved to St. Charles in 1974.

Destrehan High alum, former parish Student of the Year struck and killed by vehicle

The St. Charles Parish community suffered a tragic blow this week with the passing of Montz native Sarah James, whose life was claimed Tuesday night at the age of 19.

The Destrehan High School alumnus was struck and killed while crossing Nicholson Drive in Baton Rouge, nearby the campus of LSU where she was attending school, according to Baton Rouge police. The accident occurred at approximately 11:30 p.m.

James was a highly accomplished student. She was Destrehan High School's Class of 2018 salutatorian and St. Charles Parish's High School Student of the Year in her senior year.

She left Destrehan High with aspirations of going into medicine and perhaps one day becoming a doctor. She studied

biological engineering at LSU, and noted she was fascinated by the prospect of researching information that could lead to a major medical breakthrough.

1SEPT. 12

Woman jumps from bridge

The search has been suspended for a 47-year-old woman who reportedly jumped off Hale Boggs Memorial Bridge in Luling.

Spokesman John Michelli said the U.S. Coast Guard had been searching for the woman, whose identity has not been released, near the bridge along Interstate 310 based on bystanders reporting she jumped off the bridge around 8:26 p.m. Wednesday (Sept. 11). She is described as wearing a multi-colored shirt with black pants and weighing about 150 pounds.

Michelli said the St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office reported an abandoned vehicle was at the bridge and was tracing the vehicle's owner. He added the woman's father told deputies she had talked about jumping off the bridge.

Barataria levee would run from Hahnville to Raceland, across Bayou Des Allemands. The Corps says the new levee would protect 800,000 people from Gulf storm surge in a 50-year storm.

To get funding, Scholle said the study has to show flood losses would exceed the cost of the levee.

"Right now, the Corps doesn't look at economic business losses or business interruption losses or loss of U.S. Highway 90 for a length of time and what it does to the economy or impact to the whole southern region or U.S.," he said. "We're trying to convince them

to do that. Currently, they look only at residential structures."

Hurricane Katrina deluged Louisiana, but its impact was felt nationally in lost goods and services, Scholle said.

Corps spokesman Matt Roe said completion of the study is anticipated by 2021. If the project is feasible, it would need Congressional authorization and funding to begin work.

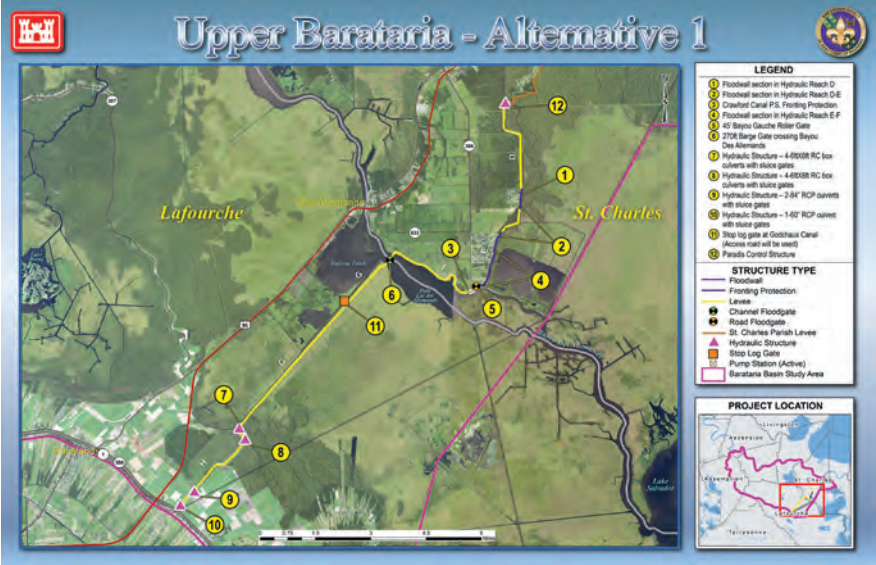
The levee would be parallel to Highway 90 that connects to Bayou Lafourche near Raceland. The 18-mile alignment includes two miles of flood walls and a 270-foot barge gate across Bayou des Allemands, which would tie in with the current St. Charles Parish levee.

"The levee design will be optimized with a minimum height of 7.5 feet, possibly higher in some areas and on hardened structures,"

Roe said. "Additionally, to improve resiliency in the event of overtopping we are looking at adding armoring to the levee alignment."

Armoring and additions like turf matting would add another \$187 million to the cost.

Roe said Corps regulations have not changed on assessing feasibility, but he did say it has



more recent and accurate hydraulic models for projecting coastal storm surge damages along with rainfall in the upper portion of the basin.

He added, "This new information, along with the large storage capacity within the basin, led us to have a tentatively selected plan and we are moving the study forward to the next step."

LDH receives federal grant to combat maternal opioid misuse

Will partner with Woman’s Hospital in Baton Rouge to improve care for new mothers

The Louisiana Department of Health has been selected as one of 10 states that have been awarded the Maternal Opioid Misuse (MOM) Model grant by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services Innovation Center.
The grant will allow the department and its partner hospital, Woman’s Hospital in Baton Rouge, to address gaps in the care of pregnant and postpartum Medicaid members with opioid use disorder.
The model is CMS’ next step in a comprehensive strategy to combat the nation’s opioid crisis. Through this program, the department will take the lead in testing whether the coordination and integration

of clinical care and other services can improve the quality of care and reduce costs for mothers and infants.
Opioid use disorder increases the likelihood that pregnant and postpartum women will experience poor maternal outcomes, including preterm labor and complications related to delivery.
Such problems are frequently made worse by malnourishment, interpersonal violence and other health-related social needs.
Infants exposed to opioids face negative outcomes such as a higher risk of being born preterm, having a low birth weight, and experiencing the effects of neonatal

abstinence syndrome.
“To best address the opioid crisis in the State, the Louisiana Department of Health is bringing together the resources and funding to effectively respond to this health challenge,” said Dr. Rebekah Gee, secretary of the Louisiana Department of Health.
The grant will also expand access to care and infrastructure, as well as create sustainable coverage and payment strategies that support ongoing coordination and integration of care.

Political History: Alexander Hamilton and the Louisiana spy

July 11, 1804 marked the 215th anniversary of former U.S. Treasury Secretary Alexander Hamilton being mortally wounded in a duel.
It was a legendary political battle — literally and figuratively — that culminated in Weehawken, NJ, pitting the 49-year-old Hamilton against the 48-year-old Aaron Burr, then the nation’s third vice president.

Burr claimed he was insulted by Hamilton and demanded the duel to save face. He indeed got the last word, as Hamilton was shot and died just a day later.
Charges were brought against Burr and a grand jury got involved, but nothing stuck and he served out the remainder of his term as vice president.
That’s when Burr headed southwest, reportedly to conspire with Gen. James Wilkinson, the future governor of the Louisiana Territory, about carving a new form of government out of the region.
In the mid-1800s, Louisiana historian Charles Gayarré was able to prove that Wilkinson was actually a high-ranking spy for the Spanish Empire.
As for the Burr incident, however, Wilkinson’s role has taken on a softer tone, since it was him who personally alerted President Thomas Jefferson of Burr’s intentions to secretly liberate Spain’s American colonies.

HEALTH SCARE from 1A

Initially, doctors couldn't get a clear read on what the issue was. At first, it was thought he had air caught in his chest (Pneumomediastinum), but he was sent for a better look. A scan came back unclear, so he was sent to a second facility, where a scope found a serious problem: an eight centimeter hole in his esophagus.

A stint had to be inserted to address the issue, but it wouldn't immediately solve the problem, nor lift the heavily medicated Glenn out of a great danger he was unaware of. He went septic, with his stomach and intestine contents seeping into other parts of his body. The hole had to be stitched up, but that was considered a last – and only – resort to save his life.

“If that doesn't happen, Glenn isn't here with us today,” Tracy said.

He had to be placed on a breathing machine, suffered a heart attack and had blood pressure spikes all threatening his health.

“They told us to call the family,” Tracy recalled. “We understood he was critical then. It was incredibly scary ... they said he was ‘minute to minute.’”

The heart attack had to be treated on site where he was, as his condition was considered too critical to move him elsewhere. Furthermore, every time an effort was made to “wake him up” from his medicated state, he would be too disoriented and try and pull out his feeding tube – from Sept. 9 through early November, he was unable to eat or drink anything and lost more than 100 pounds.

“It was the bad patient in me,” Glenn quipped with a chuckle.

Throughout the process, better news would come in small doses. He was able to be taken off machines, then he was well enough to leave the hospital's main campus for rehabilitation. While there were no promises made about his eventual well-being for a long time, because there couldn't be, each step eased some anxiety for Tracy and the couple's two children.

“At that point, I knew he was on the right path. It would be a long path, but he was headed in the right direction,” said Tracy.

In many ways, it had already been too long a path for Tracy, who endured not only the prospect of losing her husband for an extended amount of time, but lost her father during the process after the latter's long battle with cancer.

“My brother and I were supposed to go see him before he passed away,” Tracy said as both husband and wife sat tearful. “I didn't tell (Glenn) ...

he didn't know. They were supposed to do his tracheotomy done the day of the funeral. I asked to delay ... I had to be in two places at once. It's still really hard.”

When Glenn did finally come to and able to fully communicate once again, he quickly found himself in shock.

“She told me, ‘you can't walk right now.’ Well, sure I can walk. I'm the same guy I was, I thought,” Glenn said. “Then I looked down and, wait a minute, there's nothing left, just skin and bones. I was in disbelief. Everything they'd told me was true. I couldn't adjust to it. For almost three months, I have no recollection. I would have never dreamed this is where it was going.”

As to what fully triggered the problem, Glenn said there hasn't been a conclusive answer. His case was rare, so much so that the couple noted the doctor who placed the stint in Glenn was having his students study the case due to how odd it was.

“They couldn't pinpoint anything. Maybe it was a variety of things contributing,” Glenn said. “But it was so rare. Nobody had heard of it.”

The journey isn't over. Glenn has just begun what's expected to be a long rehabilitation process, but he's coming along. At first, he couldn't walk from his couch to his television. He's now able to make it out to the street and “move around a little bit.”

“It's very challenging,” he said. “Every day brings a different obstacle. They tell me I'm making great progress, but that I have a ways to go.”

While he was hospitalized,, neighbors, friends and others in the community lent a helping hand. Neighbors would cook meals for their two teenage children while Tracy attended to Glenn. Others donated to help offset their medical expenses as Glenn is sidelined from work. \$1,700 has been donated to a GoFundMe set up for the cause (titled Help for the Carman family).

“We're definitely surprised and so humbled by the outpouring of support,” Tracy said. “I came home in September maybe five times ... they took care of things for us and we're so grateful.”

“What a blessing,” Glenn said. “People have been amazing.”

He's not quite finished with hospital care. Within the next two months, he'll have to return to have the stint removed – the hole is not quite closed yet, but is much smaller now. The breathing tube will have to be placed back in, he'll have to be medicated, and an uncomfortable experience all too familiar will be revisited.

But it's his second chance at life, one he doesn't remotely take for granted.

“It changes your whole perspective on things,” he said.



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Luquet returns with Riverside

Former DHS head baseball coach returns to the diamond

Former longtime Destrehan head baseball coach Marty Luquet walked away from the prep baseball diamond in 2014, but it wasn't long before he had the itch to coach again.

He scratched that itch a bit while coaching summer ball in the form of the Gauthier Amedee American Legion baseball team, which he led to a state championship and the Legion World Series in the summer of 2018. And, after five seasons away, he's now making a full-fledged return to the prep game, joining Riverside Academy as its Baseball Coordinator and an assistant coach on the staff of head coach Craig Laborde.

Luquet will be responsible for aiding the progression and growth of the school's baseball program, working with players ranging from varsity to elementary levels.

He brings great knowledge: over a 24 year head coaching career, he amassed a record of

447-251. He also brings great passion for the game and teaching how to play it.

"I loved coaching in the summer with Gauthier Amedee and I worked with really good players ... but there's just something about coaching and getting a team prepared for the prep season," Luquet said. "I'm getting the opportunity to do that. I

just love to coach. They're very, very young, most of them are 10th graders. It's a chance to coach them early."

Luquet said after departing Destrehan in 2014 he didn't stray too far from the prep game, going to see his Gauthier players at Dutchdown and East Ascension.

"I'd go out and watch them play, but it was

hard, because they're out there playing baseball and you're not out there with them," Luquet said.

"Now, I will be. I'll still get the chance to coach them during the summertime. I'm kind of getting the best of both worlds."

While at Destrehan, Luquet went 310-137 and led the Wildcats to 14 consecutive playoff appearances. Destrehan reached the state baseball tournament six times, including two Class 5A state championship games. He has three state Coach of the Year honors to his name, in 2002, 2003 and 2005.

Luquet began his coaching career at J.F. Kennedy High School and was the head coach at O. Perry Walker from 1982 to 1991. He also served as head coach at St. James High School before taking over at Destrehan in 2001. More than 30 players

under him at Destrehan went on to play baseball collegiately.

As it turns out, he

simply wasn't ready for retirement.

"I wasn't," he said. "I won't be teaching anymore, but I'll be coaching, which is what I love the most."

He is enjoying the prospect of being able to mold young players so early in their development phase while also having the chance to impart wisdom to help win games at the

varsity level.

"It's like you're giving hitting lessons from the 4th grade on," he said with a chuckle.

With the varsity, he sees a talented group as well that simply needs seasoning.

"Riverside has a great history in baseball," Luquet said. "They've had a lot of success over the years, and there's a lot of young talent in this group. Once I had a chance to work with them, I got pretty excited about it ... this has brought back that excitement I had for all those years coaching at Destrehan."

Hahnville is building on its success from a season ago.

The Lady Tigers won 21 games last season and a share of the District 7-5A championship, and with a strong core group of returning players, 2019 was filled with promise. The team is making good on that, posting a 10-3 record over its first 13 games of the season.

Hahnville will square off with Destrehan Friday at R.K. Smith to open up district play.

"That's always a great atmosphere," Smith said. "You'd love to get off to a strong start with a win in that game."

YEAR IN REVIEW



St. Charles Parish's own Reece Roussel became a star this year. He helped lead his Eastbank team to the Little League World Series championship and made a huge mark on the record book in the process, batting .739 and collecting the most hits ever in the World Series tournament, 17.



It was a whirlwind football season for Hahnville. The Tigers started 8-0, then dropped back to back games before scoring a decisive playoff win over Chalmette. A controversial finish saw the Tigers' season end at Zachary in round two, with a final record of 9-3.



Destrehan advanced to the Division II quarterfinals this season after the most dominant regular season in the program's history. The Ladycats finished the campaign 19-2 and allowed just nine goals all season long.



Destrehan was counted out, but the Wildcats didn't care. DHS rallied from a 4-3 start to the season to reel off seven wins in a row en route to facing top-seeded Acadiana in the Class 5A championship game. While DHS fell short ultimately, the 8-3 loss stood as a memorable defensive battle to cap another sterling season for the program.



After the departure of several key seniors from its 2018 club, Hahnville made a point to show there was plenty of talent left to make a push in 2019. HHS saw a new single season home run mark, set by Kathryn Smith, and went 22-10 before falling in a tight round two ballgame against Ouachita Parish.

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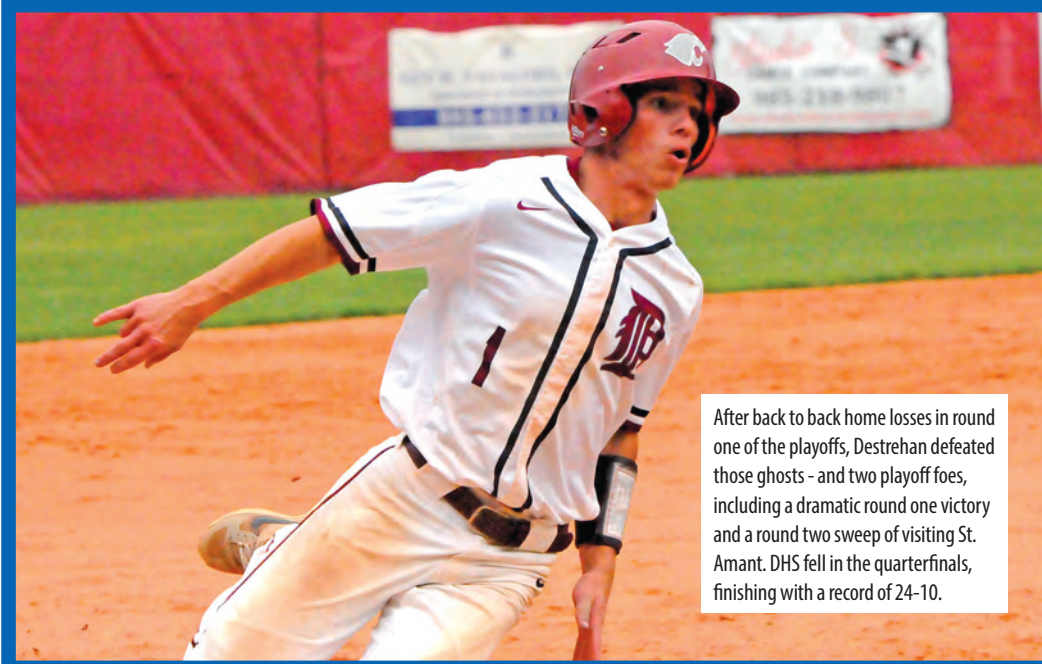
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It was a heartbreaking end for Hahnville in round two of the playoffs, but one that showed great promise for a young team: the Tigers pushed eventual 5A champion Thibodaux to the brink of elimination. HHS finished the season with a 21-14 record.



After back to back home losses in round one of the playoffs, Destrehan defeated those ghosts - and two playoff foes, including a dramatic round one victory and a round two sweep of visiting St. Amant. DHS fell in the quarterfinals, finishing with a record of 24-10.



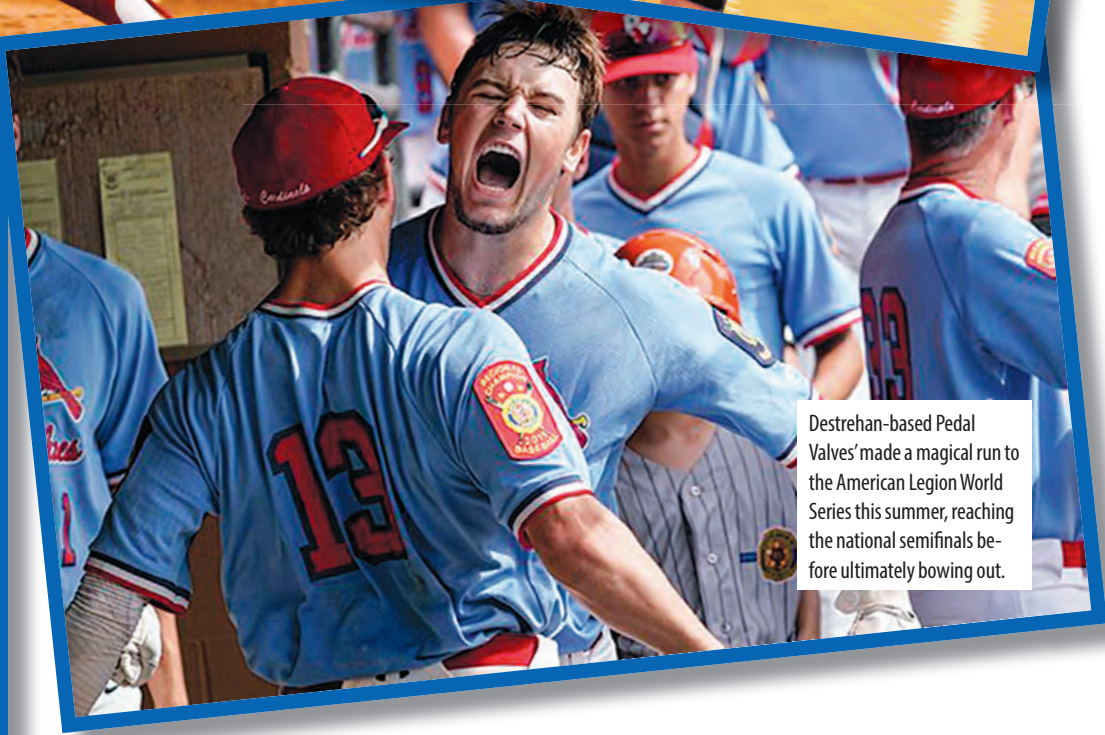

It was a breakthrough season for the Lady Tigers, who went 21-13 and earned a share of the District 7-5A championship behind a suffocating defense.



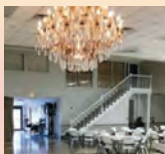
