20 floats, 58 units will roll with Krewe of Lul

The Krewe of Lul rolls for the 43rd year this Saturday with approximately 20 floats and 58 total units at the center of all the revelry.

The parade starts at noon in front of the Winnwood Shopping Center in Luling, with King Emile Buras and Queen Beatrice Buras reigning over the proceedings. Jean Anderson Fauchaux and Victoria Fauchaux Stephenson are the Grand Marshals.

"It's a great family event and the community is so behind it," said parade captain and spokeswoman Debbie Vial. "Our king and queen, our grand marshalls, all of them are residents of Old Luling. I know they're really excited."

The parade route will go from Winnwood onto Paul Maillard Road before taking a right onto River Road, a right onto Sugarhouse Road, another right onto Angus Road and circling back to the same shopping center.

Krewe of Des Allemands celebrating 25 years of revelry

It's traditional, family friendly and ready to roll – the Krewe of Des Allemands parade will mark its 25th year of revelry on Sunday.

"This is our town tradition. Why not come out and have a fun time," said parade spokeswoman Mitzi Tregle. "Why miss out? Why not support this community? We have family over and so much food, and we get to sit and visit."

Although the event is actually 64 years old, it's been 25 years since the community revived the parade, Tregle said. Prior to that, it was an event held by the American Legion and then Lions Club.

Tregle anticipates the parade will have its usual 10 to 12 floats among its nearly 30 units when it rolls at noon, instead of 1 p.m. because rain is forecast. Units also will include fire

Paradis man, longtime firefighter remembered for selflessness

Louise Diest remembers her husband as a giver, a teacher, and a man who despite something of a gruff exterior, loved to help others become the best they can be.

Henry Diest passed away on Feb. 3, surrounded by family. The Paradis man and longtime volunteer firefighter in St. Charles Parish had battled declining health since suffering a major heart attack in June of 2012, and in late January things had progressed far enough for doctors to put him on hospice care for his remaining days.

He proved a true fighter for years – Louise said he was technically considered dead three different times on the night of his first heart attack and doctors believed it to be a longshot he'd survive the night. He not only did that, but lived for nearly eight more years.

Henry was with the St. Charles Parish Volunteer Fire Department since 1998, working in Paradis, Bayou Gauche and Des Allemands. Even after his first heart attack rendered him unable to fight fires himself anymore, he stayed on with the department to teach up and coming fire fighters.

“He was definitely a fighter,” Louise said. “He was a very giving man and he loved the fire department. He loved teaching the kids who would become firefighters eventually ... he taught the right way to do things and not the lazy way, and explained why you did it that way.”

He found a kindred spirit in Louise, who has been an EMT since 2003 and has also worked with the

Paradis Fire Department. The two were married for 34 years.

The two didn't meet while on duty, though.

“We actually met at a gas station,” Louise said. “I was working there at the time ... he went there to see a friend of his and he actually told his friend that day he was going to marry me. We started talking and then dating ... and we went on to get married.”

They moved to Paradis in the summer of 1996. Their three sons all followed in their parents footsteps in service, one a New Orleans firefighter, one an EMT and one in the National Guard, working as an on-base mechanic.

"It's kind of a family thing for us," Louise said.

Emile and Beatrice Buras, this year’s king and queen of Lul, will have to search out plenty of people in the crowd when they roll this Saturday in the Krewe of Lul.

More than 100 family members will be in attendance to see them when Lul rolls this weekend, and the Luling couple is excited to begin the festivities.

“Oh yeah, we’re gonna have a large group,” said Emile. “This has always been a big thing in our family.”

Added Beatrice, “It’s going to be like our family reunion.”

The couple have long been a part of the Lul celebration, Emile noting they’ve been in that picture since the start of the Lul tradition more than 40 years ago.

“I remember our old house on Gassen Street, we’d have our family come over and we’d all walk down to Paul Maillard for the parade,” Emile said.

Still, being crowned came as a surprise.

“Because we’re in our late 80s, I didn’t expect anything like this,” Emile said. “But we’re really happy about it. We’ve always had big family gatherings at Christmas and during Mardi Gras, and this will be another big one.

“I’m looking forward to having the chance to see all of our relatives we don’t get to interact with every day. They’re all excited about coming down for it. We’re getting RSVPs from different ones each day. It’s overwhelming

but it’s good.”

Emile is recently retired after a long tenure in the workforce – he called it quits at 87 years old. He’s worked with Lion Oil, Monsanto, St. Charles Parish’s wastewater department and as a design engineer. He also spent time with the Army Corps of Engineers before taking on some engineering work in Kenner.

“I worked as a quality control inspector for them,” Emile said. “Two years ago, I retired for the last time.”

Beatrice, meanwhile, grew up in a big immediate family. She’s one of 11 siblings.

The couple moved to St. Charles Parish in 1954, upon Emile joining Lion Oil.

They have five children who “take care of us like you wouldn’t believe.”

“They do everything for us. We’re exceptionally lucky,” Emile said.

The two will be throwing a few different things when they take their “thrones,” including a few specialty bags for their great grandchildren who will be in attendance. Footballs, swords, umbrellas and other fun items will be in their arsenal as well.

The couple will also have their grandson Eric on route with them, helping out with throws.

Roy Lunk chuckled when speaking of what being selected as Krewe of Des Allemands royalty meant to him.

“It’s good to be the King,” he quipped.

Roy and his wife Patsye were chosen as this year’s Krewe of Des Allemands King and Queen, and while this is a first for them, they’re no strangers to the parade itself.

“We’ve lived here in Des Allemands all our lives. We view the parade yearly,” he said. “We’ll have some grandchildren and great grandchildren riding with us, and we’re both really looking forward to that.”

They estimate as many as 60 family members will be there celebrating with them.

“Hopefully it’ll be a beautiful day and a nice crowd out there,” said Patsye. “I’m sure it will be a nice crowd if the weather is beautiful, it usually is. We started going in 1957, and it’s been a yearly event for us since.”

Roy retired 24 years ago from working with Texaco. Patsye, meanwhile, is retired after 40 years as a nurse.

“I miss it. I really enjoyed my work,” she said. “We’ve been working with our church since then, we help out there a lot.”

And at church was where the two learned they would reign over the festivities this year. Both said they were surprised at being named king and queen.

“We knew nothing about it,” Patsye said. “The entire experience has been really nice so far.”

Among their throws will be some of Roy’s homemade fishing lures, something he crafts regularly as a hobby. Those will actually serve as the name of their float, “Roy’s Lures,” though their children will be the ones riding in the float itself, with the king and queen traveling along the route by convertible.

Frankly, Roy knows his audience.

“Des Allemands is a fishing community,” Roy said. “We’ve been giving out (the lures) since we found out about everything.”

Sunday will mark something of a rare milestone for the two. Few have had the opportunity to ride as royalty at both the Krewe of Des Allemands and Krewe of Lul parades, but the Lunks have something of a claim to that: as Roy was a longtime member of the St. Charles Parish Council on Aging board, he and Patsye were selected to represent the council as its king and queen as they rode in the Krewe of Lul.

They say the celebration has already proven a good time, as anyone who attended the Krewe of Des Allemands Ball might attest.

“They had to turn away people,” Patsye said. “The fire marshals said there were going to be too many. We really had a nice time. And with so much family there, it makes it really nice.”

Jean Anderson Faucheux has been a part of her share of the Krewe of Lul’s parades. For her sister-in-law Victoria Faucheux Stephenson, not so much.

Parade experience aside, though, they’ll have one thing in common when Lul rolls this weekend: they share the distinction of being the Krewe’s grand marshals in 2020.

Jean began riding in the Krewe of Lul 31 years ago, rolling with the “Gassen Street Gang.” She’s lived in Luling since 1960, moving down to Louisiana from South Dakota that year.

“I was surprised when they asked me. ‘Oh, they don’t want any Yankee to do it,’” Jean quipped. “It’s an honor. This is a wonderful parish. I love the people down here ... everyone is so friendly. I was thrilled to be asked, and especially thrilled to be asked along with Vickie.”

She’s retired after 44 years working as a nurse at St. Charles Parish hospital, serving as its nighttime house supervisor before stepping away.

“I spent most of my career there, working with the people in the parish,” Jean said. “The building was only six months old when I started there.”

When she rode with the Gassen Street Gang, her group was known to go all out, winning first place awards for their elaborate costumes and float decorations. The first year of the Gassen Street group’s participation in the parade, the theme was “Mickey Mouse’s 50th Birthday,” with a float built like a big birthday cake

– with Minnie popping out. The next year brought a Wizard of Oz theme, with a witch and tornado.

“We always went all out with it,” Jean said.

She found a new sister-in-law when Victoria married Jean’s brother, the late Bobby Stephenson, former principal of Hahnville High School.

“I was never involved with the Lul parade,” Victoria said. “I’d go every year and watched them put their beautiful floats together. But when Miss Debbie (Vial) asked me to be the grand marshal along with Jeanie, it was ‘Oh my gosh, yes!’ But I’m a bit overwhelmed now. Even with Jeanie involved, I didn’t realize how much went on behind the scenes.”

Victoria has lived in Luling virtually all her life – she moved with her family to Luling when she was just six weeks old. She worked at the St. Charles Parish Courthouse for many years with the LSU Cooperative Extension Service.

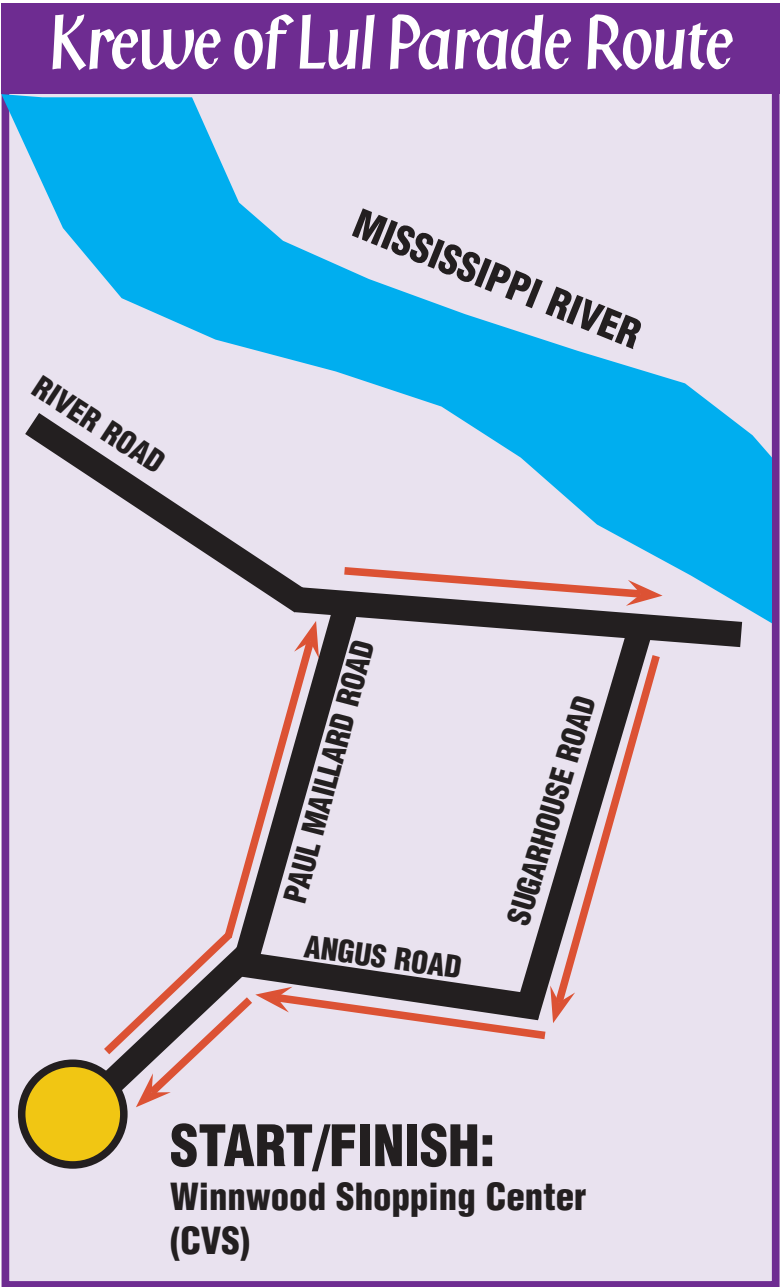
“I wasn’t born here, but I’ve always felt like a native daughter,” Victoria said. “I worked at the courthouse for 40 years. My husband was principal at Hahnville High ... my roots here are deep.”

She’s also quite eager for her first parade riding experience.

“The crowds are so great, and I’ve always been stationary in one spot. So to

experience it from that new perspective, I feel like it’s going to be awesome,” she said. “Everyone you know is always on the route, but they’re scattered around. Now you’re excited to see everyone.”

The two will be throwing out special cups and scrolls to commemorate the occasion. Fittingly, on the scrolls, three landmarks are depicted: St. Charles Parish Hospital and St. Charles Parish Courthouse, each depicted as they were when the respective women worked at each, and the “Faucheux house” of Victoria’s grandparents, as it was when they lived there.

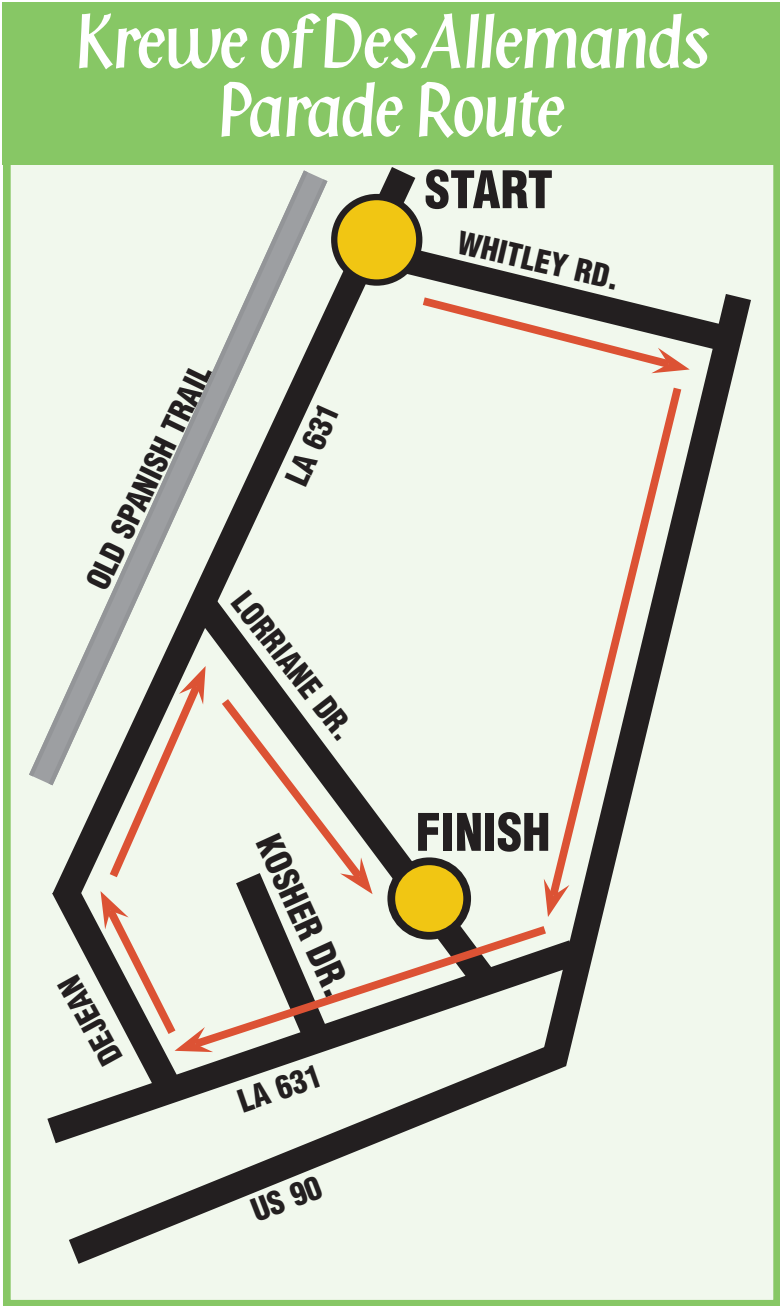

Grand Marshals Venis Parks & Katherine Cortez Orgeron

Krewe of Des Allemands Grand Marshals Venis Parks and Katherine Cortez Orgeron are not only lifelong members of the community they'll be riding through as royalty this weekend, they've also long spent their days giving back to it.

Parks can remember growing up when Bayou Gauche Road was a simple mud road. His legacy in the community was established for good when he was one of the founders of the Paradis Fire Department, and today he is its only surviving founder.

"I'm very proud of that," Parks said. "They gave me a plaque for it ... I'm thankful for all the good it's done for people over the years and any part I had in helping that happen."

At 93-years-old, Parks is long retired, but will be recognized by countless revelers at the



Des Allemands parade. He'll be throwing cups and medallions commemorating the occasion and he says he's looking forward to seeing all the familiar faces in the crowd.

"Hopefully everyone has a good time," Parks said. "This is going to be an experience for me, for sure. I know I'll be seeing a lot of people I know."

He grew up as one of seven siblings. The youngest among them, his brother Gary, 79, will be driving Parks' float.

"It'll be great to have him along," Parks said.

Orgeron, meanwhile, learned she was chosen as one of the Grand Marshal's at an event that was already celebratory – her

granddaughter's baby shower.

"Oh my gosh," she said of her reaction. "We've rode in the parade for years and years. It's an honor to be chosen."

Orgeron works with St. Charles Parish Public Schools as a bus monitor for special education students. Her day to day interactions with the children, she said, are deeply rewarding. She recounted one wheelchair-bound child who could not talk, whom she sat with and sang to.

There's nothing like the feeling of having made their day, she said.

"I didn't know how many children we had in our schools with special needs, but when I started my job, I saw it," Orgeron said. "Some of them might not be able to talk, or walk around, but when you talk to them and get them to smile it's truly wonderful."

Orgeron has made costumes for floats in past years and fondly remembers how their group's floats got "fancier and fancier" by the year.

The event is a fitting get-together for everyone in such a tight-knit community.

"Just seeing all of the people coming back here to see the little hometown parade we have," Orgeron said. "I can't wait to see the people and see their faces ... it's my favorite part of riding. Everyone's like a family."

Lent is a time to go into the desert with Jesus and to confront our demons

Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent is Feb. 26.

Some people will automatically say, “It is time to give up candy, alcohol or smoking.”

That’s not the true spirit of Lent. Lent is a time for change and conversion. It’s a time to move our center of gravity from selfishness to others, from self-love to love of neighbor, from lust to love.

Lent gives us an opportunity to go into the desert with our Lord and to confront the demons within us – to ask the question, who or what are we really worshiping in life? Lent is a time to see if we really believe that the only real power in the world is love.

Lent is an opportunity to look at our priorities in life to see whether they are Jesus’ priorities. It’s an opportunity to examine our attitudes and see if we have “the mind of Christ.”

In the spiritual life as with all life, attitude is everything. Our actions follow our attitudes. If we have a bad attitude, we will do bad things. If we have a Christlike attitude, we will do Christlike things. So it is very important that we develop a Christian attitude based on Jesus’ teachings.

The ashes we receive on Ash

Wednesday are our pledge to change and become more Christlike. It’s like a pledge card we fill out when we are making a contribution to the church or other charitable organizations.

That piece of paper is only as good as our follow-up. If we give the amount we pledged, then the piece of paper has meaning. If we don’t follow through, it’s meaningless.

So too are the Ashes. We receive the Blessed Ashes as a pledge before God and the Church that we are willing to join our fellow Christians in a 40-day journey of conversion. Often when we hear the word “repent” or “be converted,” we think it applies to someone who no longer believes in God and has taken up a sinful life.

People who attend church regularly, who pray frequently, who support of the work of the church, often dismiss this call as not applying to them.

However, conversion is a lifelong process for every Christian. Lent is a special time in which we focus as God’s family on conversion, changing ourselves. We all need to change.

Our change is not just from something but a change to something. We need to change our self-centered ways of doing things to caring about others. We need to change our tendency to worry about “what’s in it for me” to how can I help the

needy.

We need to change our need to have and buy things and take responsibility for others and the world in which we live. We need to change our attitudes of promoting war to promoting peace; from destruction of the Earth to reverencing God’s creation; from despair to hope; from fear to faith; from self-hate to self-love. This includes the sinful things we do and our sins of omission.

The Blessed Ashes of themselves do not do anything. They are not magical. Someone can pour a bowl of Blessed Ashes on our heads and if we are not willing to change our lives and become more Christlike, nothing happens. Nothing!

We bless the Ashes and distribute them to the faithful as a sign that we as a Church Community are willing to be converted. Our willingness to make a public commitment to be the person God wants us to be is a holy act. The Lenten formulas remind us of our need to change.

The United States Bishops remind us in Go and Make Disciples, “Conversion is the change of our lives that comes about through the power of the Holy Spirit . . . Unless we undergo conversion, we have not truly accepted the Gospel.”

May we all have a Christlike and blessed Lent!

New IRS contribution limits

A look at the maximum amounts you can put into retirement accounts this year.

The IRS just announced the annual contribution limits on IRAs, 401(k)s, and other widely used retirement plan accounts for 2020.

Here’s a quick look at them.

*This year, you can put up to \$6,000 in any type of IRA. The limit is \$7,000 if you will be 50 or older at any time in 2020.

*Annual contribution limits for 401(k)s, 403(b)s, the federal Thrift Savings Plan, and most 457 plans also get a \$500 boost for 2020. The new annual limit on contributions is \$19,500. If you are 50 or older at any time in 2020, your yearly contribution limit for one of these accounts is \$26,000.

*Are you self-employed, or do you own a small business? You may have a solo 401(k), which allows you to make both an employer and employee contribution. The ceiling on total solo 401(k) contributions rises \$1,000 in 2020, reaching \$57,000. This is also the 2020 employer contribution limit for simplified employee pension (SEP) plans.

*If you have a SIMPLE retirement account, next year’s contribution limit is \$13,500, up \$500 from the 2019 level. If you are 50 or older in 2020, your annual SIMPLE plan contribution cap is \$16,500.

*Yearly contribution limits have also been set a bit higher for Health Savings Accounts (which may be used to save for retirement medical expenses). The 2020 limits: \$3,550 for individuals with single medical coverage and \$7,100 for those covered under qualifying family plans. If you are 55 or older next year, those respective limits are \$1,000 higher.

Robicheaux retires as Destrehan football coach

Stephen Robicheaux announced his retirement as Destrehan’s head football coach Friday.

Led Wildcats to two undefeated seasons with state championships, won 82 percent of his games

A prep coaching icon stepped down from his post Friday morning, as Destrehan High School head football coach Stephen Robicheaux announced his retirement.

Robicheaux, 57, led Destrehan to the Class 5A state championship game in 2019, his final season at the helm of a program he steered to great heights that included two state championship victories - each capping undefeated seasons —and four total appearances in the state championship game. He leaves Destrehan with an overall head coaching record of 186-41 over his 18 years as the Wildcats’ head coach.

The veteran coach informed his players Thursday night of his

decision, and made the announcement public on Friday.

Robicheaux said the decision to make the move now came, in part, through his entry into the Deferred Retirement Option Plan (DROP), an optional program allowing one to freeze regular monthly retirement benefit funds and have it deposited into a separate account, while still working and drawing a salary from a TRSL-reporting agency or school.

“My wife and I decided three years ago we’d probably go into the program, because I’d be 55 years old vs. 25, and not the other way around,” Robicheaux said. “So (this year) we knew we had a big decision to make. We felt

like it was the right time. The program is in a great place, and I have the opportunity to go home and spend some time with my wife, my kids.

“What it’s all about (is) trying to help kids ... someone reaching out to let me know I made a difference in their life. ”

“It was a tough decision, obviously. I’ve grown up here.”

And the Destrehan community, in turn, watched his maturation from a young assistant to one of the state’s elite head coaches. Robicheaux has been with the Wildcats program for 26 years. He served as Destrehan’s defensive coordinator

under Scott Martin before taking the head coaching helm upon Martin’s departure.

What followed was a coaching run remarkable

streak would ultimately finish at a school record 30 wins in a row.

Robicheaux stepped down for a two year stretch following the 2009 season, accepting a position as St. Charles Parish Public Schools’ safety coordinator, a role he served in for two years before returning to the Wildcats’ sideline once again in 2012.

Destrehan missed the postseason in his first season back. But a year later, the Wildcats started a run that saw the program go unbeaten in regular season play from 2013 to 2016. Destrehan reached five state semifinals over Robicheaux’s final seven years with the team.

“I knew I was at a special place,” said

Robicheaux. “I knew the expectations. The only thing I ever wanted was to build on what Chipper Simon, Tim Rebowe and Scott Martin had done, continue on with the great tradition of this program. I think we’ve done a decent job. You have great kids, great assistant coaches and a great support structure, and Destrehan High School has that.”

He said while his 2012 return does represent precedent for a coaching comeback one day - he won’t rule it out completely - it’s not something he foresees.

“I think it’s time. I retired once and came back, but I really think in my

Brimmer roars to state championship for Tigers

Head to head with the only wrestler he'd failed to defeat in his 44 matches as a senior, Logan Brimmer was yet confident and poised in his state championship final match against defending champion Cole Ulfers of St. Paul's.

He had a plan and executed it to perfection—and as result, Brimmer reigns as Division I's 220 lb. state champion after besting Ulfers by a 5-2 decision, the Tigers' senior finishing a stellar senior season with 44 wins and one loss.

"It felt unreal and surreal," Brimmer said. "It didn't feel real while it was happening. It felt like I was dreaming."

The championship match was the lone victory for Brimmer that did not come via pinfall in a dominating tournament effort. On his way to the championship round, Brimmer defeated Ashton Freeman in the semifinals by a pinfall at 5:19; Tyler Tullier of Central-Baton Rouge by pinfall

(1:42) in the quarterfinals; Kendrick Burton Jr. of East Ascension by pinfall (1:42) in round two and Blayden Laidlaw of Sulphur by pinfall in round one (5:18).

Ulfers had matched up with Brimmer once before this season and got the better of the latter. This time, Brimmer, along with HHS wrestling coach Dan Erwin, tweaked his approach and found the formula to avenge his lone loss.

"It was really a couple of small things ... a

very simple gameplan, and Logan executed it perfectly," Erwin said. "(Ulfers) nearly got one on us early, thankfully it didn't backfire. He was prepared well for something Logan went for early, and nearly got a takedown, but Logan was ready and he actually got the first takedown."

It was a meteoric rise for Brimmer, who entered this year's state tournament as Division I's No. 2 seed at 220 lbs. Ulfers was the top seed.

He entered this season

driven to succeed, motivated by the loss that ended his season a year ago. Brimmer entered last season's state tournament as the state's no. 4 seed. Needing one more win to earn a spot on the winner's podium, Brimmer was disqualified for an illegal move. Erwin noted Brimmer was far ahead in points in the contest.

"That was one of his biggest motivations," Erwin said. "He said at the beginning, 'I'm not doing that again.'"

He rededicated himself. The two-sport star put together his best season on the football field, playing defensive end for the Tigers, then transitioned back into wrestling.

After breaking out as a contender as a junior, another year of refining his craft paid dividends.

"I felt like I could move around faster ... it was just different this year," Brimmer said. "I drove myself harder to be that guy. I had a different kind

of drive. That goes back to the guys who came before me and what they inspired me to do."

Brimmer was referring to a tradition of great Hahnville grapplers, including Kendrick Jones, a former state champion, and Tre'Von Honor, a two-time state runner up. Both came back during the season and Brimmer found inspiration in their words.

At one point, he won 31 matches in a row. At state, he was taken down just one time: on the season, opponents were able to secure takedowns of Brimmer on just seven occasions.

"Coach told me during one tournament, after someone took me down, 'You do realize that's the first time someone's taken you down this season,'" Brimmer said. "I thought that's just crazy. I never realized it. When I'm wrestling, I'm just focused on working and never stopping."

Erwin said Brimmer is

an example of hard work paying off.

"He's not just a guy who is a freak athlete and won a title," Erwin said. "He's put the work in."

Brimmer said his first round match was a tough one ("I wouldn't have let myself lose in the first round, though.") and his semifinal match against Freeman had a perilous moment where Brimmer tried to throw the latter, but was stopped and ended up on his back ("I thought I could get pinned there. I rolled out of it, but that was the scariest moment.")

But in the end, he logged four falls in a row, then dethroned the defending champion.

"It's been a lot of fun," Brimmer said. "All of the congrats ... my friends almost aggravate me with it. They almost don't call me by name anymore, just 'state champ.' I like it, but I'm still the same person."

heart, it's time for something else. What that is? I'm not sure yet," he said, before quipping, "Maybe it's time to go get a real job and work 40 hours a week. Who knows?"

"I have grandbabies now. My wife has done so much for me, sacrificed, to make this all possible ... now it's time for me to give a little back. I think it's time for me to hang my whistle up."

St. Charles Parish Public Schools athletic director Kade Rogers said Robicheaux left a legacy of winning both on and off the field.

"He was so successful on the field, but even more so off the field,"

Rogers said. "He truly developed great relationships with student-athletes and always moved with the mindset of 'what is best for our students?' He put them first, and he'll be sorely missed."

Rogers said the district plans to move quickly to find a successor. There will not likely be a shortage of candidates: Destrehan has several former head coaches on its staff and the program's high standing would in theory draw a number of outside applicants as well.

Robicheaux said he's received messages from numerous former players, colleagues and

community members. But he noted it one particular message that made him emotional: from a former team manager, thanking him for their years together.

"He said, 'Coach, I can't thank you enough for what you did for me. You made me feel important as a manager ... I graduated college this year.'" Robicheaux said. "That got me to break down. Because that's what it's all about, trying to help kids. Someone reaching out to let me know that I made a difference in their life. That kind of took me to my knees."

The lost ‘little tree’ is remembered

It’s been nearly two years since the demise of the little cypress tree that stood alone in the shimmering waters off Bayou Gauche that was appreciated by so many people.

One morning in August of 2018, witnesses reported the tree still standing and then saw a barge moored to it later in the day. When the barge was removed, the tree had been ripped by its roots and laying on its side in the water.

Many lamented its loss and were even angry over losing what they considered a landmark for the area.

Annabel Matherne Hogan remembered the tree, too.

“This beautiful tree was a landmark for our Dufrene family from Bayou Gauche during its early beginning in [the] early 1940s,” Hogan said. “My grandma, Memere Leonise Dufrene Matherne, once moored her houseboat – camp boat near it when land surrounded it” at that time.

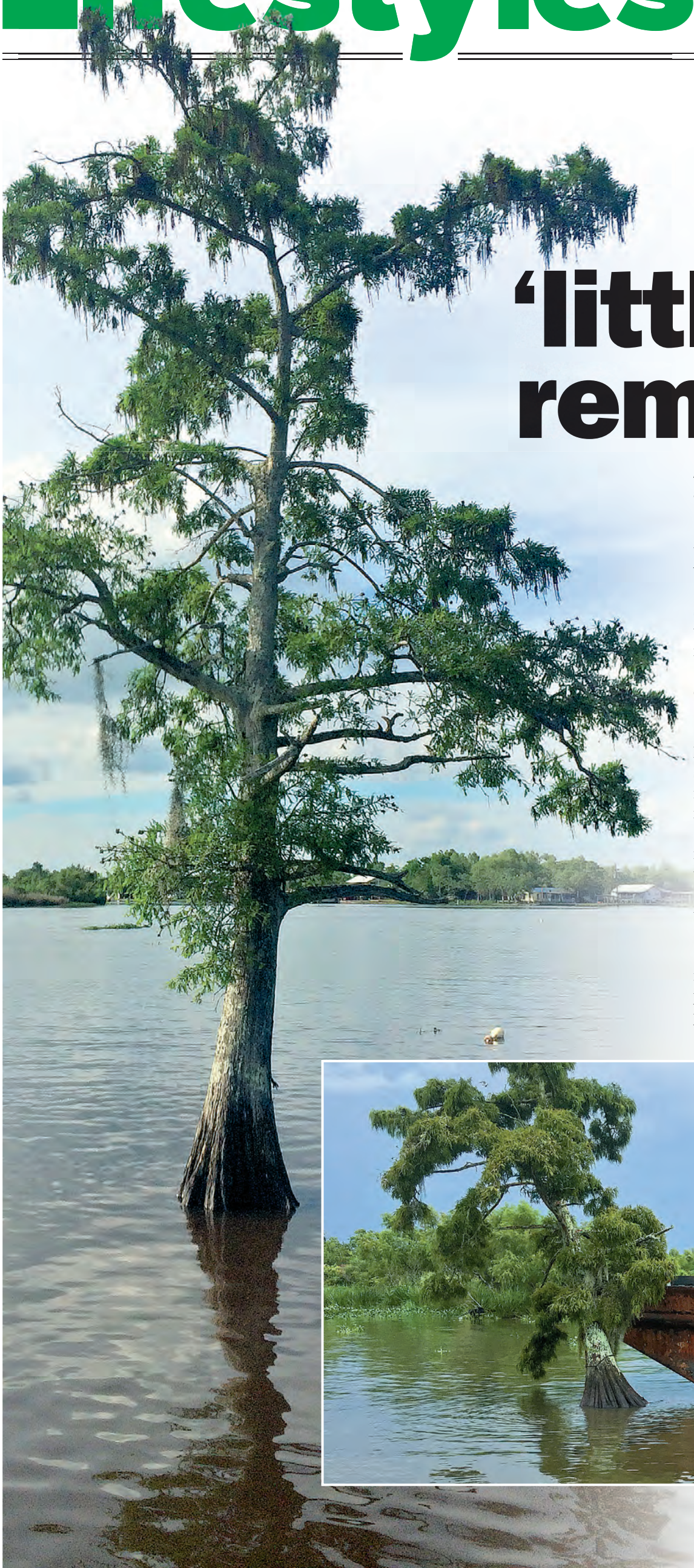
At 76 years old, Hogan has lived in Bayou Gauche since birth. She recalled when Entergy first installed electric lines there, as well as the little tree that was a quarter of a mile from her camp boat.

Over the years, Hogan said erosion had taken its toll, leaving the tree standing in the water several feet from the shore.

Hogan was among numerous people who eulogized the little tree.

Local fisherman Troy Gaubert said he’s admired it for years on his many fishing trips on the bayou and asked for help on the Facebook page, “Life in Bayou Gauche.” It drew an unexpected response from people who called for action and preservation.

Right: The barge that was moored to the tree.



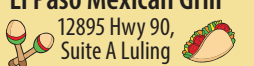

There are four main heart valves – mitral, tricuspid, aortic and pulmonary – that separate the compartments of the heart. Together, they keep the blood moving in the right direction. So, what happens to your heart when you have a problem with one (or more) of your heart valves?

Common issues include the valve being too narrow (this is called stenosis) or if the valve is leaking (doctors call this regurgitation). If the valve is leaking, your heart must work extra hard to pump blood and if your valve is too narrow there’s not enough space for all the blood to travel through.

Symptoms start to arise when the heart is no longer able to deliver blood



to all the organs. Depending on which heart valve is in trouble, symptoms will be more evident than others. Three signs you might have heart valve issues are: shortness of breath, chest pain and leg swelling.

To diagnose a heart valve issue, a doctor listens to your heart with a stethoscope so they can hear the sounds the valves make when they open and close. If a heart valve problem is suspected, the

next step is to order an echocardiogram (an ultrasound of your heart) to confirm.

Many valve problems can be managed using medications to make the heart more efficient despite the valve problem.

In some cases, medication does not work so the heart valve needs to either be repaired or replaced.

A new technique called trans-catheter aortic valve replacement (TAVR) has proven to be a good solution for certain patients with narrow heart valves (aortic stenosis).

TAVR has revolutionized the treatment of aortic stenosis. During this procedure, a new aortic valve is inserted in the heart through a very small incision in the leg.

The new valve essentially replaces the old narrow valve in the aortic position. By minimizing the invasiveness of the procedure, most patients have a quick recovery and can go home as early as the next day after the procedure.

Remember – if something feels off, it’s important to listen to your heart

(literally and figuratively) and get checked out!

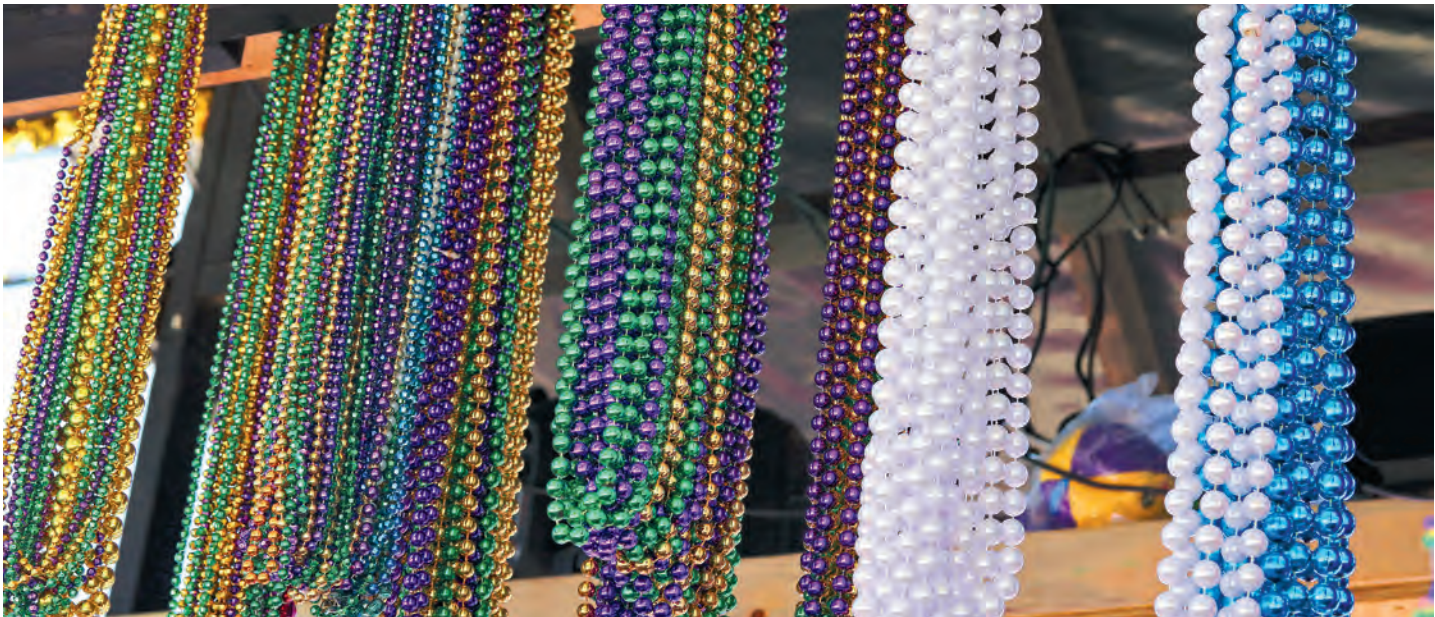

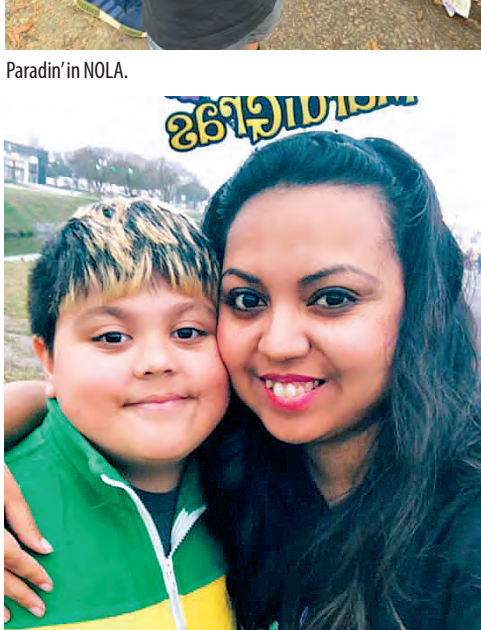

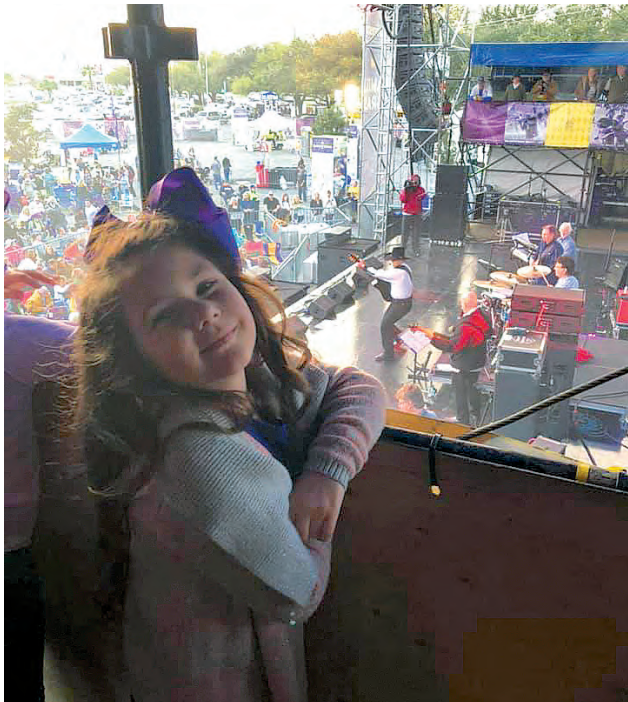

Gaubert and others hoped to save the tree, but it was beyond help.

Resident Earl Matherne gathered information that led to the barge number and well permit and reported it to the Louisiana Department of Natural Resources (LDNR). The information pointed to Costa Energy in Irving, Texas, which could not be reached by press time.

Since that time, LDNR has taken action against Costa Energy.

Matherne said the company has been ordered to plant five to 10 trees (a minimum of 12 feet tall) near the spot where the cypress was destroyed in an attempt to mitigate the damage.

LDNR will enforce the planting and notify Matherne when it’s done.

“The company will be responsible for the survival of the trees,” Matherne said.

Hogan, as did Matherne, acknowledged the cypress tree as a longtime landmark.

“It has been missed by our family,” Hogan said.

Her family lived on the land and water.

They came from at least three generations of living on houseboats until they moved into houses on land. In those many trips on water,



she recounted seeing the little tree when they left the lake.

“It was literally a landmark for marking the edge of the water and the property,” she said. “It was where people used to have their camp boats parked.”

As the land eroded, the tree eventually stood alone in the water.

Like many residents there, Hogan admired the tree. And when Gaubert and Matherne tried to get the state to intervene, she wanted to thank them for their help.

“I love cypresses,” she said. “I just didn’t like the idea that it wasn’t there anymore and a landmark I hoped to share with my grandkids was gone. I didn’t want the tree to go before its time.”

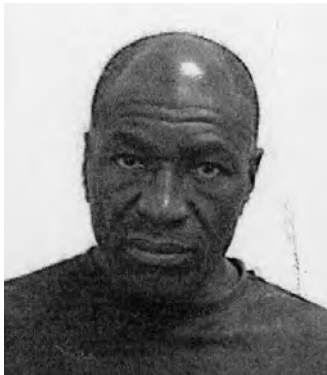

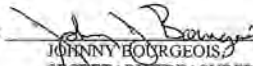
