Virtual museum features 300 years of parish history online

Thanks to the work of a few devoted St. Charles Parish historians, and those believing in their cause, a window into the region’s past is officially at your fingertips.

A Wednesday gathering that included parish leaders and other public figures at the East Regional Library in Destrehan commemorated the official launch of SCPHistory.org, a website serving as a virtual museum showcasing St. Charles Parish history.

The site is the brainchild of the St. Charles Museum and Historical Association, which has partnered with the parish’s library system to ensure the virtual museum remains a resource for years and years to come. The project was headed by Rita Carlson, Joan Becnel, Sue Friloux and the late Marilyn Richoux.

According to the Historical Association, St. Charles Parish is among the first to establish this type of web museum. The site, now open for the public, includes public photos, audio and video files, stories, yearbooks and facts covering some of St. Charles Parish’s most pivotal events and milestones.

“We started talking about it in 2010 because that’s when we knew we would not have a brick-and-mortar museum ... a deal fell through and we didn’t have the wherewithal to start all over again,” said Friloux. “We tried all those years to find an appropriate location ... you can find an old building and spend so much on

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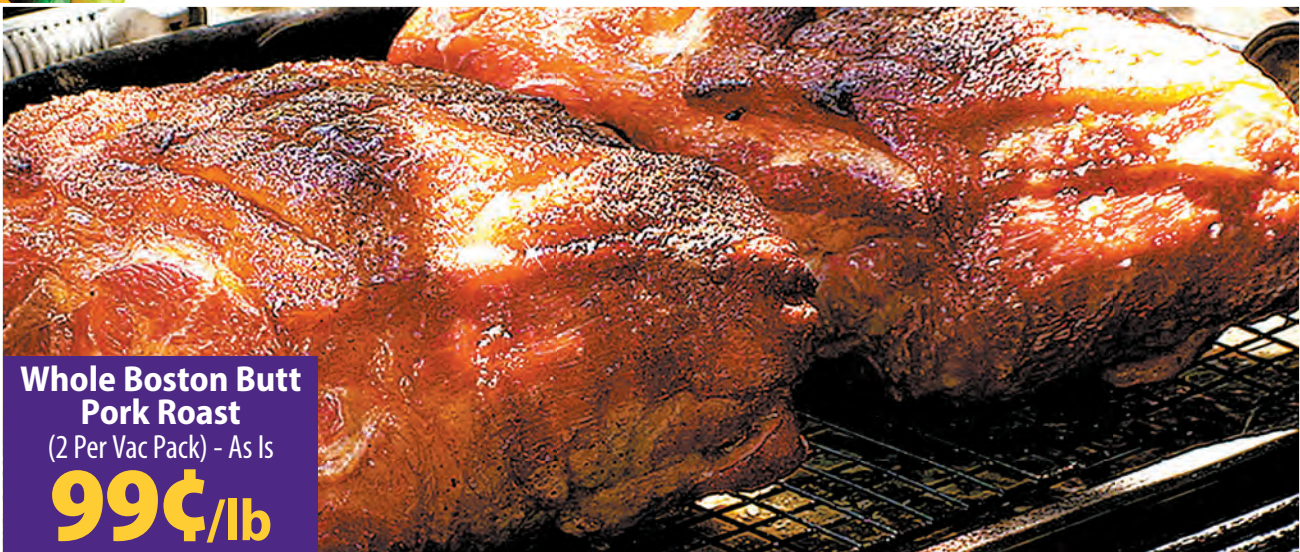

School district considering 27 applicants in search for next Destrehan football coach

This week marks the beginning of interviews for Destrehan High School’s next head football coach, with St. Charles Parish Public Schools selecting from a pool of 27 applicants.

This first round of interviews will narrow down the field, with a second round of interviews scheduled to take place March 16 and 17, according to Kade Rogers, the school system’s athletic director. Rogers said the plan is for the coaching search committee to make a recommendation to the School Board by March 25.

The process will determine the successor to longtime DHS head coach Stephen Robicheaux following his retirement last month. Robicheaux departed after leading Destrehan to the Class 5A championship game last season, that marking the program’s fourth Superdome appearance during his tenure. He led the Wildcats to two state championships and held a win-loss record of 186-41 over his 18 seasons as head coach.

While the district has not released the names of the candidates, Rogers said among them are applicants from Michigan, Virginia, Kentucky, Texas and Arkansas, as well as several throughout the state. Three current Destrehan assistant coaches are among the applicants.

Rogers said that given Destrehan’s reputation as one of the state’s elite programs, it’s not surprising that the opening received a great deal of interest, though he conceded 27 applicants “is a lot” for an opening.

“I think it speaks a lot about the

program, the facilities, the school system and all of the benefits that come with one of the premiere programs in the state of Louisiana,” Rogers said. “We want to make sure we make the best decision for the student athletes of Destrehan High School. And it’s something that impacts not just our student athletes, but the school and community as a whole. We want someone who can uphold the tradition of Destrehan.”

Rogers said the “X’s and O’s” side of things will carry heavy weight, but that there’s much more to consider in terms of the qualities the district seeks in the school’s next coach.

“It’s multiple levels,” Rogers said. “Of course, game management and philosophy plays a lot into it but there’s so much more to it ... being involved in the community, coaching the whole student-athlete. Four years isn’t a long time in the grand scheme, maybe, but it’s a long time to make an impact on a young life.”

Rogers did not note which of the three DHS assistants were among applicants. A staff rich in head coaching experience served under Robicheaux. Defensive coordinator Malter Scobel (Brother Martin) and fellow assistants Chad Blanchard (Patterson), Tim Taffi (Riverside) and Rhett Peltier (Loreauville) each have recent tenures as head coach of a program. Longtime offensive coordinator Greg Boyne was also noted in past seasons by Robicheaux as someone likely to become a head coach in the prep ranks, and seems another likely candidate.

You can't take it with you

The call from the east coast arrived at 6 a.m. An old boss of mine had passed away due to an aneurysm. Oddly, just three minutes before his passing, his wife was pronounced dead from a heart attack at his bedside.

I met Stan (not his real name) in 1981 when I was hired by a convenience store chain to oversee a group of six stores. A twenty year veteran close to retirement, Stan distrusted young supervisors.

The convenience store industry is a funny business. You have to offer 3,000 items from every possible product category to attract customer traffic, yet more than half of what you sell consists of low-profit beer, soda and cigarette categories. Hence, each store barely makes money and there isn't enough income to have management supervision on all shifts.

Left unwatched, in those years before security cameras, many employees made the choice to steal by not ringing sales and then pocketing the customers' payments.

Naïve to this weakness of human nature, I almost quit a hundred times after polygraph examinations identified one key employee after another as a thief. How do you build a cohesive team when each month you have to strap your employees to a lie-detector to question their honesty?

As luck would have it, Stan was the best in the business at "shortage control." He had a no-nonsense reputation of quickly firing anyone he suspected of dishonesty - and those suspicions often included the store managers who operated each store.

But Stan had a soft side too. Each month he'd ride stores with us supervisors to perform written inspections. One day, after yet another store manager let me down with a bad score, Stan walked over, put his arm around my shoulders, grinned and said, "Boss, wouldn't it be nice to have a job that paid 50 grand a year and was based entirely on your own efforts?" The old man DID have a heart.

Five years later, Stan had a heart attack and had to take permanent retirement disability. I was given his job. Now I REALLY understood why Stan had been Stan.

Stan lived near one of our stores and we'd occasionally run into him there and teasingly ask if he'd tapped into that profit sharing account yet. He'd just chuckle, shake his head and change the subject.

I left the company in 1991 to follow a writing career but kept up with Stan through a close mutual friend. She was the one who called at 6 a.m. to report the news of his passing.

A day later she called again to report the funeral plans - and a conversation she'd had with Stan's daughter. The daughter had come across Stan's profit sharing statement. The daughter asked my friend a haunting question. "He worked for 25 years to accumulate all this money. He's been retired for 12 years. Why didn't he and mom do all those things they were always talking about doing someday? They could have done anything. There is \$750,000 in that account."

My friend had no answer.

Free arts festival features hands-on activities, student achievements

A hands-on visual arts studio, theatrical digital media studio, piano studio, dance studio and percussion ensembles are just some the creative fun that awaits attendees of St. Charles Parish Public Schools' 13th annual ArtsFest.

"Art allows our students to express themselves, build critical thinking skills, and take pride in authentic reflective

experiences," Superintendent Dr. Ken Oertling says. "Our commitment to the arts is evident in a number of ways, one being our annual ArtsFest."

Over 500 students from kindergarten through high school participate in the event, says Ginny Medina-Hamilton, who serves as Director of Gifted, Talented, and the Arts for the school district. She added another 500 typically attend the event.

New to the festival this year are piano classes, which will be offered in addition to existing dance, drum, and art classes. An expansion of food truck options will also be available this year.

Medina-Hamilton says the School Board designated March as Arts in Our Schools Month to honor the hard work of students and teachers, and ArtsFest celebrates both students' final products and the skills and standards being met in classes on a daily and weekly basis.

"We often take talent for granted and forget that talent

can only take us so far – skill, dedication, and perseverance are what take us wherever we want to go," she says. "Our students are learning that in their arts classes."

Stevie Crovetto, Director of Public Information for the school system, said the festival will give the attendees the opportunity to "see examples of how students, teachers, and the community of St. Charles Parish produce, perform, and value the arts in our public schools."

The festival, which is free and open to the public, will take place on Saturday, March 14, from 10:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. at the new Dr. Rodney R. Lafon Performing Arts Center, 275 Judge Edward Dufresne Parkway in Luling.

"It's so rewarding when someone from another area comes to ArtsFest and is in awe at the celebration of Arts Education in St. Charles Parish," Medina-Hamilton says.

renovate it, or a new building where obviously the cost is high.

"So we were sitting in this very room and decided, 'Why don't we do something else? All of this stuff we've gathered ... what are we going to do with it all?'"

The suggestion was made to scan it and save it, which got the ball rolling.

"That was part of it, in terms of the objects we have. But what about the content? It can't be out there on its own," Friloux said.

The basis of the website was formed using text from St. Charles Parish, Louisiana: A Pictorial History.

The site includes incredible detail, with 18th, 19th and 20th century headings directing visitors to in-depth historical accounts of the most important periods of each. Another section of the site brings visitors to view video footage, including documentaries of various lengths (The Luling Ferry Disaster is a full 55 minute video, while a profile of Raymond K. Smith clocks in at just under seven minutes). Timelines, interviews, town histories, profiles of notable figures and musical legends and much more are quickly accessible.

Development of the website began in 2014, with students of the St. Charles Parish Satellite Center working on the project under teacher Brian Gough. Following that semester of work, Glory Mendelson continued development and worked for several years with the Historical Association. Renee Simpson finalized development of the site as webmaster.

The Association raised money through grants to fund the hosting/maintenance of the site and to pay those providing written pieces for content. Developing the other content came from a variety of avenues, including diligence by those behind the projects and volunteers within the community with ideas, items or personal accounts of significant events to contribute.

"We started with a timeline of each century when we did our book. We thought of all the

significant things pertaining to each and asked, 'Do we have more information on that? Or on that?'" Friloux said. "That was like the spine of the stories, but there had to be more. We spent years chopping it up."

Even on Wednesday, after the launch, community members attending the launch event were offering potential additions.

And make no mistake: while the site is rich in detail and ready for public consumption, it is not – nor will it ever be – a finished product, said Friloux. This is a project meant to be updated as time goes on.

"People came up to us (Wednesday) saying 'Hey, I have these old books' ... we keep answering, 'Yes, yes, yes and give them to our webmaster.'" Friloux said. "The story all along here has been that we have an idea to do something, and there have been people stepping up to help."

Friloux said she and her colleagues know they won't be around forever to continue preserving history. The site's existence, and the partnership with the library, help ensure their work will live on.

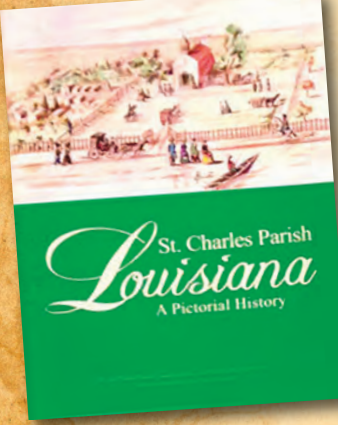

members. That trip was to audition for American Idol, and on Sunday night the country was able to go behind the doors of that audition and discover that Becnel received an elusive “golden ticket,” which means she advances in the show and will travel to Hollywood where she will perform in front of a live studio audience.

“That day was so intense,” Becnel said of her now-televised audition where she sang for musical star judges Luke Bryan, Katy Perry and Lionel Richie. “I kind of got a little taste of what it’s like to be a superstar because there were cameras everywhere and I was being pulled into a million directions. I learned a lot in that one day of what it’s like to be in the industry.”

Becnel said the audition was uncomfortable for her because it was a new environment for her to perform in.

“I walked out of the room saying, ‘That was rough,’” she remembered. “I knew I didn’t do my best because I just was not in my element. I’m so used to being in front of crowds and having all of that energy from people. I knew if I got the golden ticket I’d be more in my element and more comfortable.”

Because she knew she would be performing live at the 2020 Los Isleños Fiesta in Chalmette on Sunday

night when American Idol aired, Becnel planned ahead and had huge screens at her performance. She paused her musical set and watched, with the festival’s crowd, her televised audition as it aired.

“It was absolutely incredible ... just very moving,” she said of watching her clip with the audience of nearly 1,000 people. “It was a moment I’ll never forget. It’s just the best way I could have watched it.”

Becnel recorded her first CD, “I Believe,” at 12 years old and formed her own band by age 13. In the years since, she’s made several television and radio appearances on local news outlets, as well as has performed

throughout Louisiana and surrounding states at events such as Alligator Fest, Andouille Fest, French Quarter Fest and Sacred Heart Fair. She’s also performed on stage with famous Louisiana artists and bands including Vince Vance, Irma Thomas, Rockin’ Dopsie Jr. and The Topcats.

“Our culture is so supportive here in Louisiana,” Becnel said not only of everyone following her career, but also of other local musicians who have mentored her. “Our culture is to be passionate about music. It’s such a blessing and it’s made me who I am.”

Becnel said she’s unsure of when her next performance will air on the show, but said that she can’t wait for everyone to follow along throughout the season.

Until the end of the season, American Idol will air Sundays and Mondays at 7 p.m. central on ABC.

Guinnane first went under the razor in 2013 for the cause, a move that she said was inspired by her desire to do whatever she could to help.

“I can’t find a cure for cancer myself, but this is one thing I realized I can do,” Guinnane said, adding her family and friends were initially shocked but ultimately supportive of her decision.

Well, almost all of her family. While one of her grandmothers donated money and was excited, Guinnane said another one wasn’t as

enthusiastic.

“She said, ‘There’s got to be something else you can do to raise money,’ Guinnane remembers with a laugh.

Having raised over \$4,000 the first time she shaved her head, Guinnane is once again setting her sights on raising \$4,000 this year for the cause - and this time the matter is personal.

“Since I last shaved my head, I have had a student with cancer, a student in remission, and made a friend who is a survivor of childhood cancer,” she said. “I also lost two adult family members to cancer, so this has become more personal for me than it was before.”

Lakewood Elementary Principal Kelli Oertling says she couldn’t be more proud to have Guinnane on staff.

“She’s such a great role model for our students, and her willingness to go above and beyond is evident daily,” Oertling says. “She’s a true difference maker.”

Just like in 2013, Guinnane’s hair will be donated to Wigs for Kids, an organization dedicated to providing hair pieces for children who have lost their hair due to medical conditions. Her shave, along with those of all of this year’s participants, will take place at 11 a.m. on March 21 at Finn McCool’s Irish Pub in New Orleans.

In what she describes as a giant block party that includes a silent auction and raffle, the pub will host its 11th annual St. Baldrick’s event this year. The public is invited to attend.

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Hahnville reaches state basketball tourney for first time since '09

Tigers rallied from 14 points down in second half to topple No. 2 seed in state quarterfinals

Hahnville's state semifinal game against Alexandria was played Wednesday night, after Herald-Guide's press time. Check out our website for the updated result, statistics and game story.

Hahnville officially qualified for the Top 28 boys basketball championship tournament after upsetting No. 2 seed Ouachita Parish on Saturday night to advance to the state semifinals, 70-67.

The Tigers (26-9), the 10th seed in Class 5A, faced No. 6 Alexandria in its semifinal matchup Wednesday night in Lake Charles. (That game was played after publication press time). The Tigers last made the state semifinals in 2009, when Hahnville made a run to the Class 5A state championship game.

HHS trailed throughout much of Saturday's quarterfinal, with Ouachita (25-6) leading after each of the first three quarters. But Hahnville exploded for 33 fourth quarter points, almost doubling their previous output on the night after scoring 37 through the first three quarters combined.

"We dug in, man. We dug deep," said Hahnville coach Yussef Jasmine, who will lead his team into the semifinals in his third season as the Tigers' head coach. "We came down here to win and that's what we did. We slowed them down a little bit, stretched them out a little bit, were able to get

them in some foul trouble and pull away."

The Tigers trailed by eight at halftime, and OPHS scored the first six points of the second half

to extend its lead to 39-25.

But Hahnville turned the game. It battled back to close within five heading into the fourth quarter, 42-37. The teams battled back and forth throughout the fourth, with Hahnville taking its first lead of the second half with less than three minutes left to play.

"We locked in defensively," Jasmine said of

what keyed the rally. "Offensively, we had been kind of stagnant, they were keeping us on one side of the floor and we weren't getting ball reversals ... so we made an adjustment and stretched them out. We opened up the court a little and created some driving lanes."

Jasmine called it a small adjustment, but its effect proved mammoth as the

Hahnville offense moved into another gear.

With a semifinal berth there for the taking, sharpshooting guard Claudell Harris Jr. came through in a big way, sinking two 3-pointers in crunch time to help spur a Tigers run, pushing Hahnville ahead 62-53 with less than two minutes left in the fourth

quarter. Dylan Lorio scored five of his seven points in the fourth quarter.

The win meant much on several different levels for Jasmine. This is his first time reaching the state semifinals in his head coaching career, which began in 2007 at East St. John before he made the cross-district

quarter - in just over a minute, Hahnville outscored Ouachita 10-0 to take command.

"It was quick," Jasmine said. "We talked about tempo, tempo ... we were able to get out in transition and create some open shots. Once we were getting stops, we got out and ran ... I think we kept pushing and pushing, and kind of wore them down."

Ouachita made a late push to close within three, but Hahnville held on from there.

Alexandria (30-6) defeated No. 14 seed West Monroe 62-56 Friday night to advance. It defeated West Ouachita in round one and Captain Shreve in round two.

Kaden Pierre led Hahnville with 23 points, while Harris scored 19 and Tyren LeBeauf scored 14. Each did major damage in the fourth quarter, with LeBeauf scoring 10, Pierre nine and Harris

jump to Hahnville in 2017.

He became Hahnville's fifth head coach in six seasons following the departure of current HHS principal Brian Lumar, who went into administration after leading Hahnville to two state finals. Building a winning culture was his first priority, with a group of players who hadn't had stability.

The youngest of those players are his veterans now, players who believe they should win - and find a way to make it happen.

"It's a blessing to be in this position," Jasmine said. "It's an overwhelming feeling. We've worked so hard to build a family atmosphere here. Not just among our 14 players, but our coaches, and our fans. We had our great fans here who made the trip tonight. They did their part, our players did theirs and our coaches did theirs. It's so exciting to be a part of this."

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Quarterfinalist season reflects rise of Hahnville Lady Tigers program

Suffocating defense, stellar transition game were keys to district championship, playoff run

Though Arrianna Smith guided Hahnville to its best season in more than a decade, last week the Hahnville head coach was still shaking off the effects of her Lady Tigers’ season ending quarterfinal loss at Benton – it’s just the competitor in her, one that dates back to her playing days at Hahnville and Nicholls State.

“I don’t think it’s something you just move on from,” Smith said of the 75-46 quarterfinal loss. “I feel like I’m just kind of waking up from it to be honest ... I’m still thinking about it, what we could have done better, what I could have done better. In the back of my mind, all those scenarios of how we could have prepared differently or better, and showed up to play like I know we can.”

Benton (27-5) took control from the start of the quarterfinal matchup. Benton led 16-7 after the first quarter and took a 19-point lead into halftime, 37-18.

Qua Chambers led No. 2 seeded Benton (27-5) with 27 points, while Jada Anderson added 19. For Hahnville (27-5), the No. 7 seed, Kori Joseph scored 12 to lead the way.

“You can blame travel, or preparation, or make any excuse you want, but at the end of the day it’s the quarterfinals and Benton was ready to go,” Smith said. “They were lights out. Even players who didn’t score much on film, they shot it lights out. Kudos to Benton, they played a great game.”

For Benton, it was one of what has become four consecutive dominating playoff wins, each of them by margins of 24 points or more. Its quarterfinal win snapped a 15-game win streak for Hahnville and was Benton’s 12th victory in a row. Benton went on to advance to the Class 5A championship game with a 63-39 win over Natchitoches Central.

But while it wasn’t the ending to the season Smith or her players envisioned, it couldn’t wipe away the tremendous strides the Lady Tigers made in what was a landmark year for the program. Smith’s Tigers gradually improved from her first season to this, her fourth, landing a shared district championship last season before winning it outright in 2019-20.

25 years after Smith graduated from Hahnville, the Tigers reached their first

state quarterfinal since 2008, and this season saw the team earn its first play-off wins at all since 2012. Both of those wins, over West Ouachita and Denham Springs, came in dominating fashion.

Behind its trademark press defense and a deadly transition offense, Hahnville was dominant more often than not this season — after the growing pains of Smith’s first season with the team, in which the Tigers posted a losing mark, the team has improved its win total each season.

Four seniors have been alongside Smith for the duration of that journey:

Danae Lorio, Yelah Moses, Paceley Williams and LeJonne Blackmon.

Smith said she hurt for those players the most after the loss. She also said their contributions to the evolution of the Tigers program won’t be forgotten.

“They’re given this program growth and given perspective to our younger girls coming up,” Smith said. “It’s like you’re going through a tunnel, then you start seeing the light at the end ... our seniors started seeing that light, I think, and the possibilities for our team. That persistence from their freshman year to now, they went out and made it happen.”

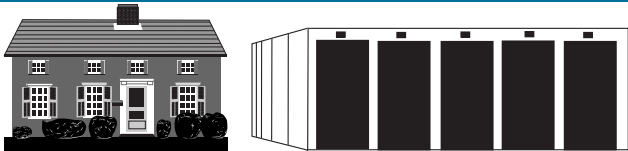
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St. Joseph's Day

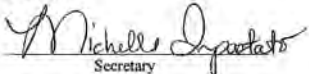

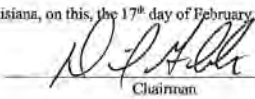
