Massive rainfall floods over 400 homes

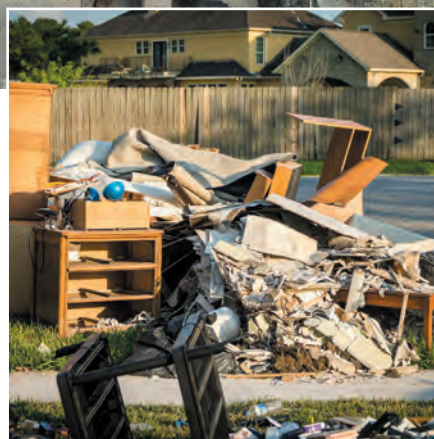

44-year-old says he’s lucky to be alive after 13 days on ventilator

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At 44 years old and with no preexisting medical conditions, Rosario “Boogie” Termine didn’t seem a likely candidate to be sent to the ICU after catching coronavirus. Likely or not, he now says he feels lucky to be alive after spending over one month in the hospital - including 13 days on a ventilator.

“I feel very lucky because I have a second chance at life, which I am grateful for,” Boogie said. “I don’t recall much of my hospital stay, but from my understanding I was really sick and very fortunate to be here today.”

Community pitches in to feed flood victims

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When Cheri Faucheux woke up on Friday, May 15, the first thing she did was go outside to check on her friends in the neighborhood.

According to the National Weather Service, the previous night’s torrential rainfall dumped up to 12 inches of water in St. Charles Parish within 90 minutes. The rain caused more than 400 homes to flood.

Faucheux, who lives on Destrehan Drive, said her home was spared in the flooding but

Pandemic adds hurdle in planning for hurricane season, but acting early can help

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Last week’s flooding throughout parts of St. Charles Parish brought with it an unwelcome reminder that COVID-19 does not bring with it a ceasefire with regard to other unfortunate events. It, in most instances, only complicates things further.

Almost certainly, among the last things the average local would like to think about these days are hurricanes. But with the added wrinkle of coronavirus thrown into the mix this year, that might well be what people already should be doing even ahead of the heart of hurricane season.

According to Joe Ganote, St. Charles Parish Director of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, a little bit of preparation now can eliminate a lot of headache down the line.

“You can simplify things by planning,” Ganote said.

“Be more prepared than you would if there wasn’t COVID. If I’m going to evacuate my family ... do we go to a hotel? Do I need my own PPE? How do you social distance if you leave your home? Are we going to have a spike of cases at that point or are we going to be on a downslope?”

“There’s no way to know that now, but you can start to make

those decisions early and make a plan for each scenario.”

The parish’s Emergency Operations Center (EOC) stays plugged in to the news, projections and predictions of experts leading into each hurricane season. Ganote said COVID-19 adds another layer to the planning process.

“Obviously with the pandemic, it’s going to be different. A lot has to do with sheltering and evacuation and cohorting patients ... identifying who has or has had COVID-19, and how we’re going to handle it,” Ganote said, adding statewide discussions have been ongoing on that subject.

For those who evacuate their homes but need localized shelter, the challenge will be determining the best way to ensure parish residents not

Norco Senator backing sports betting bill

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A push to expand gambling in Louisiana gained momentum this month as the State Senate legislative committee approved a bill that, if ultimately passed, would allow sports wagering on a parish by parish basis.

If the first bill, Senate Bill 130, continues to receive the needed support to become reality, it would allow state residents to vote in November whether to allow betting on collegiate and professional sports in their parish.

Sen. Gary Smith Jr. (D-Norco), the committee’s chairman, calls the gambling industry “our business partners” and said it’s time for Louisiana to be on even footing with other states that have gambling and gaming, most of which allow sports betting – like Oklahoma, Arkansas and Mississippi, the latter the most recent to allow sports gambling.

“We’re gonna say it’s legal, by way of this citizen’s bill, make it the best we can make it, and give our state all the tools it needs to compete with other states and not have our people at a disadvantage,” Smith said.

And with both sides of this partnership – the state’s citizens and the gambling industry – hurting from the damage inflicted by COVID-19 – Smith argues it can help salve the wound for each.

“That industry’s become a good partner for the state. It produces a lot of good jobs, stable jobs, for thousands of Louisiana’s citizens, many who have made careers out of it,” Smith said. “Gaming has produced a very stable and viable source of revenue for the state. It brings in more than oil, gas and tourism at this point. And with all of these outlets shut down for two-plus months, it’s just another element that

reduces revenues for our state.”

Smith said while sports gambling’s legality varies by state, people across the nation spend millions each year betting on sports, and have done so prior to its legalization in many places. It’s no different in Louisiana, but what can change, he says,

is it can be done in a more safe manner with proper oversight.

“We know people in Louisiana bet on sports,” Smith said. “This will give them a legal and safe place to do so if they’re going to do it. We already have legal gaming, so this is just another aspect of it. We haven’t had all the ills that were talked about when (gaming issues) those things were passing all these years ago. It’s been a very regulated industry.”

Last year, the Senate approved a bill to legalize sports wagering, but it did not pass in the House of Representatives. Smith believes it’s more well-positioned this time around to push through.

that she is surrounded by neighbors who weren’t as fortunate.

“It was right there,” she said of the rising water. “It was so close.”

The first friend she checked on is the mother of two small children. Overwhelmed with feeling like she couldn’t do anything to help, Fauchaux told her friend the least she could do was feed them lunch.

Then she had an idea.

Fauchaux hopped on Facebook and asked her virtual friends if they’d like to donate \$10 for her to order pizzas and deliver them to residents who flooded.

Money started pouring in.

“I bought 40 pizzas the first round,” she said. “I also got cases of water and bags of chips, but it was going quick, so I ordered another 35.”

Fauchaux said many of the residents who flooded had friends and family members over at their homes helping them to clean up, so it added to the number of people to feed.

“But the money kept coming in,” she said.

Fauchaux visited Krispy Kreme on Friday with the intent to purchase donuts for people to eat on Saturday morning. But when she explained to the manager why she needed so many donuts, Fauchaux said what he did shocked her.

“He just started loading my car up,” she said.

In total, Krispy Kreme donated nearly 1,700 donuts – roughly \$1,500 worth of breakfast - for flood victims.

Determined to continue to help flood victims and use every dollar that was donated, Fauchaux distributed Powerade and chips on Saturday and on Sunday

passed out goody bags filled with treats and various home air fresheners.

“Over 70 people have stepped up and dipped into their wallets and helped in any way they could,” she said. “And half of these people are not from this parish ... can you even imagine after 60 days on lockdown that the day we are able to start to get back to normal you are hit with an even worse problem?”

Fauchaux said she is overwhelmed with gratitude for all the donors who have made it possible for her to spread some joy to people who are going through so much.

On one delivery run, Fauchaux said a young boy was crying because he couldn’t understand why his mom was throwing away all his toys. On another delivery, a homeowner asked Fauchaux to place a case of donated water on her truck’s tailgate. Fauchaux said the bed of the truck was filled with family photos the owners were trying to dry and salvage.

“People keep thanking me, but I keep telling them, ‘your community is doing this for you ... I’m just the delivery person,’” she said. “It makes them feel good that the community is behind them.”

“It’s been a fun experience,” she said. “Just something to take their minds off all of the learning that’s going on and to be able to take us on fun adventures ... every time I get a tag on Facebook I can’t wait to see what I did that day.”

Dufour said she hopes the activity helps her students to know she cares about them even though she can’t physically be with them. She vividly remembers how she felt on March 13, the day Gov. John Bel Edwards announced schools would be closing out of coronavirus precautions.

“On that Friday it was a half day of school and so it was rushed,” she said. “We told the kids, ‘Bye ... see you Monday ... have a good weekend’ and put them on the bus.”

It wasn’t until a faculty lunch later in the day that the teachers learned of the school closures.

“I instantly felt like a zombie,” she said. “That whole day I was upset because I couldn’t tell my kids ‘bye’ ... it’s been really hard not being able to have that closure.”

Dufour said it was amazing to see her students’ excitement when she dropped off the flat version of herself.

“A lot of the parents didn’t tell the kids that we were coming,” she said. “It was just pure excitement.”

Oubre said her students, as well as their parents, were happy to receive the fun surprise. One of her students even made her a paper version of themselves, which Oubre recently took on a Target trip.

“I think they were definitely excited - not only for us putting in some extra effort – but for their kids to have some normalcy,” Burst said of her students’ parents. “For them ... just to have a little piece of school in their house while they’re helping to support education at home definitely seemed to help.”

Dufour said she hopes the effort left an impression on her students.

“My number one hope is that my kids remember me and that they remember the fun times and always know I was there with them and I’m always here for them no matter what,” she said.

only get to safety, but stay as safe as possible while a storm passes.

“It’s incumbent on us to have enough PPE for them and to be able to triage people at our assisted evacuation points,” Ganote said.

For the EOC, vigilance on the matter is a way of life. For the average person, maybe not: for every significant storm a resident has experienced, he or she may be able to recount several others where reality didn’t meet the “hype.” Ganote said while that may be true, the cost of being wrong in such a circumstance isn’t worth it. The danger for some, likewise, may be that mental fatigue over COVID-19 might lead them to kick the can down the road when it comes to getting ready.

“We talk every year about complacency,” Ganote said. “We’ve been fortunate that we haven’t had to evacuate, knock on wood. A lot of people, I think, have been even more in tune because of COVID, and they’re asking questions about what the protocol should be,” he said. “But for others, maybe they’re thinking, ‘Well, I just got off lockdown, I’ll worry about it in August.’ We’ve had a storm pop up already in the Caribbean, here we are in May, and we’re starting to get active already.”

Those set on staying, he said, should be sure to have enough resources to survive for three days and understand outside services may be limited following a major storm scenario.

“But we always encourage people in those cases ... just go,” Ganote said. “If you come home and your house is dry? Great, you had a two-day vacation.”

As for the storm season projections, Ganote says early on, it appears we could be in for a busy one. Citing Colorado State University as producing the most consistent and accurate year-to-year predictions, Ganote said they project 16 storms, including eight hurricanes – four of those major.

“The next prediction comes out June 4, and historically the projection always seems to increase by a couple. It usually won’t go backwards,” Ganote said. “We’ve had a crazy 2020 anyway, and I’m planning for a busy season.”

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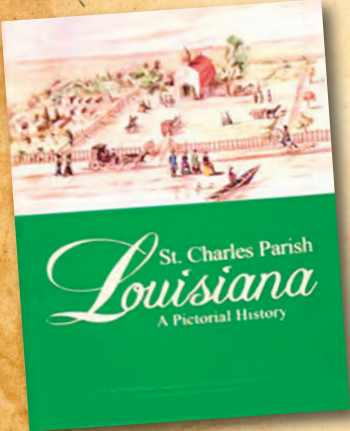
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Hahnville names Luquet as next head football coach

Was offensive coordinator for team in 2019

Hahnville High School has chosen the successor to former head football coach Nick Saltaformaggio, as Tigers' offensive coordinator Daniel Luquet will be the next man to lead the program.

Luquet is regarded as a rising offensive mind.

The news was made official at this week's meeting of the St. Charles Parish School Board.

Luquet, 37 and an alumnus of Destrehan High School, spent one year as a Hahnville assistant after a five year run at Woodlawn, four of those as the school's head coach. He also served as an offensive assistant for six seasons at Destrehan, a run including the school's 2008 state championship. The latter saw him shine as he quarterbacked as a player, leading the Wildcats to a 10-0 regular season record in 2001.

At Woodlawn, his teams posted a record of 18-25 before he departed to accept the offensive coordinator position at Hahnville.

Saltaformaggio announced he was leaving Hahnville in early April after six seasons

with the team. He did so to accept the same position with his alma mater, Holy Cross, leaving St. Charles Parish to fill its second head football coaching vacancy this year. Destrehan hired Marcus Scott to lead its program in March, following the retirement of longtime Wildcats coach Stephen Robicheaux.

Luquet is regarded as a rising offensive mind in the sport. Hahnville quarterback Andrew Naquin improved significantly under his tutelage in 2019, the junior finishing with 1,352 yards, 12 touchdowns and three interceptions after a sophomore season that saw him finish with 585 yards, two touchdowns and eight interceptions while sharing time.

Meanwhile, the running game was a force, tallying over 2,000 yards and 34 touchdowns, the bulk of that total tallied by star back Darryle Evans. His shotgun spread attack aims to get the ball in the hands of multiple playmakers isolated in open space against defenders. LHSAA says it will permit summer workouts, early football practice in update

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As Hahnville High School names a head football coach, the LHSAA has put forth a memo supplying answers to some burning questions about fall sports for the 2020-21 school year.

The organization noted all activities will hinge ultimately on the decisions of Louisiana Gov. John Bel Edwards and will correspond to what each phase of the state's reopening allows. But in an effort to provide a framework of answers to the questions of an increasingly "antsy" field of coaches, LHSAA Executive Director Eddie Bonine addressed some of the

more frequent inquiries. Most notably, the governing body will permit schools to hold summer sports practice beginning June 8.

*With the official end of the school year calendar, will athletes and coaches be permitted to return to campus for summer work? Yes. The LHSAA noted its bylaws dictate that in the 46th week of the NFHS calendar, the start date for all summer sports and work. This year, that means the start date would be May 17. However, the association elected to

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Jordan's Last Dance

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Sunday saw the conclusion of The Last Dance documentary, AKA the closest things sports fans have had to regular appointment viewing in quite some time.

For me, it was a really cool experience. Like many others, my formative years as a young sports fan came with Jordan as the world's most recognizable athlete. I devoured everything I could find about those early 90s Bulls teams, while the late 90s ones laid to rest some of my favorite teams (hey, I was a contrarian teen and Jordan had to be stopped!). Some of the stories covered in the documentary I knew about, several others I had no recollection of. All of it was a lot of fun to take in, and a needed shot of nostalgia. A few thoughts ...

*If you gave me a weekly series called "Jordan Tales of Revenge" I'd watch the heck out of that. Forget all this other stuff about championships, money, winning, historical significance ... I want more content concerning MJ taking that Bulls rookie and sonning him on the back of an exchange completely invented in Jordan's mind.

*I still get chills when I see that simple, to the point press release: "I'm back." That's how you do it.

*The most powerful moments in the series were the those showing Jordan's emotion over the loss of his father, including the one of MJ sobbing after

closing out the Seattle Sonics in the NBA Finals on Father's Day – the first championship Jordan won upon his return to basketball, and the first without his dad.

A somewhat distant second, but still impactful, was Jordan breaking down into tears and needing to request a break when speaking about his demanding style of leadership. I wasn't sure if those tears were because he knew that he sacrificed the love of several of those teammates in favor of respect, fear and their performance, or if it was because he was remembering just how much winning meant to him and felt to him in those days. Probably a combination of it.

*The most surprising part of the documentary, for me, actually revolved around Pippen as opposed to Jordan. His claim that he'd probably sit out of that final play in the '94 Knicks series if he had the same situation to do over today was really jarring, especially seeing as it came after hearing all of his teammates say, "Man, that's not the real Pip." Pippen basically followed up with, "Nah, that's TOTALLY Pip."

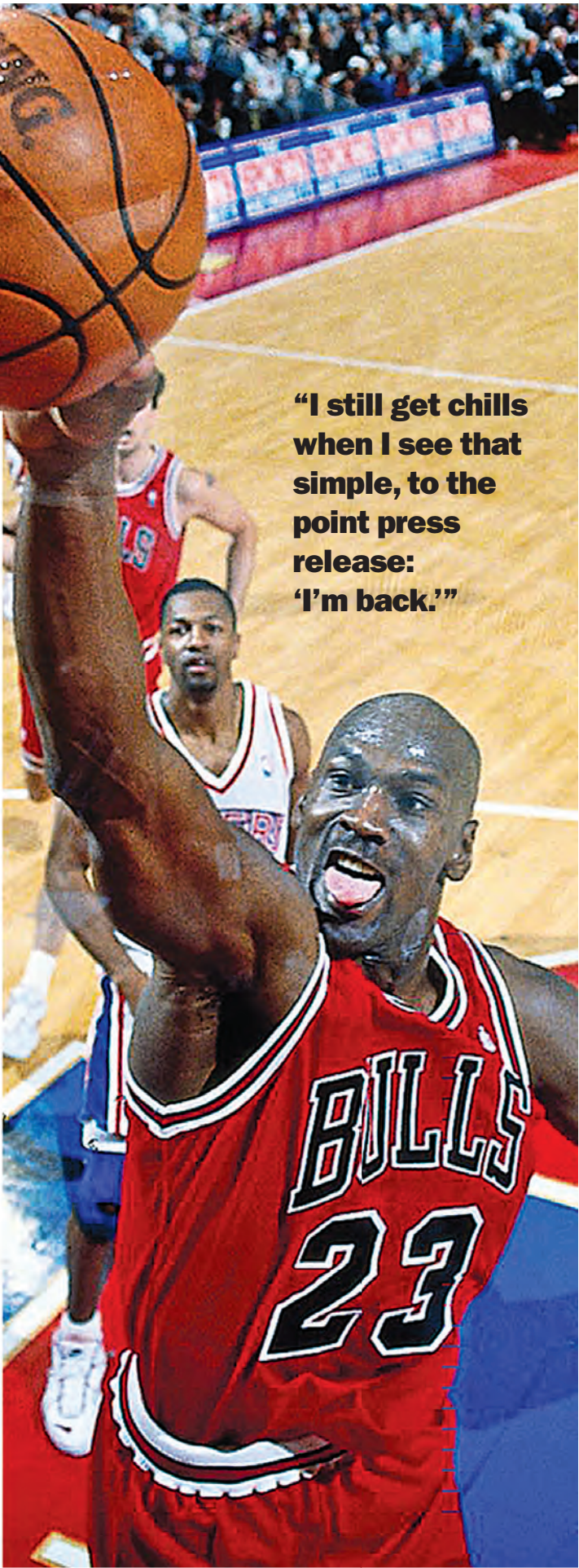
*Speaking of Kukoc, his recollection of his obliviousness back then to all of the subplots revolving around him made me laugh quite a few times. Here's this young guy making his name in Europe, all he's doing is playing basketball to the best of his ability, and his future Bulls

teammates across the world are SEETHING with resentment over the hype their general manager is putting upon him. On the aforementioned scenario with Kukoc taking the final shot against the Knicks, instead of Pippen, Kukoc just shrugging his shoulders with "What's the problem? I hit a bunch of buzzer-beaters that year!" followed by a montage of those shots was pretty hilarious.

*Jerry Krause was really good at his job. That's not sarcasm, by the way. Krause was painted as the bad guy throughout the entirety of this documentary, but removing the emotion over him breaking up the '98 team reveals he made some gutsy, gutsy moves to put a winner around Jordan.

Trading for the draft rights to Scottie Pippen, who played at Central Arkansas and wasn't even a scholarship athlete as a collegiate freshman (and this was the No. 5 pick overall – not a blind stab later on); signing Dennis Rodman when his personality red flags were considerable; firing Doug Collins in favor of Phil Jackson after Collins led the Bulls to their first Eastern Conference Finals. These were not obvious moves, but Krause saw the board clearly and put the team in position to succeed.

The man established himself as one of the great executives, even if history is less kind than that toward him.

extend that date to June 8 in an attempt to allow all schools to begin work on equal footing.

*Are athletes going to be given an extra year of eligibility due to the pandemic? No. The LHSAA noted it will adhere to its existing bylaws as per eligibility. While each case made for additional eligibility will be looked at on its own merit, a case made citing COVID-19 as its primary reasoning won't be entertained.

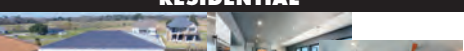
*Will football coaches be permitted to start football activities early? Yes. Furthermore, any schools choosing not to participate in spring football practice at all may start their fall practice in week five of the NFHS calendar. No schools participated

in spring football practice due to the coronavirus measures in place, so all would be eligible if they choose, including Destrehan and Hahnville.

Bonine noted this point is only providing the framework to what the LHSAA will allow, and that the organization has "very limited authority" as it relates to summer activities. The local education authority governing each school will hold the bulk of responsibility as to when and if people are allowed back on school facilities. To that end, Bonine also cited concern regarding potential inconsistency between private and public schools, as well as parish to parish and campus to campus.

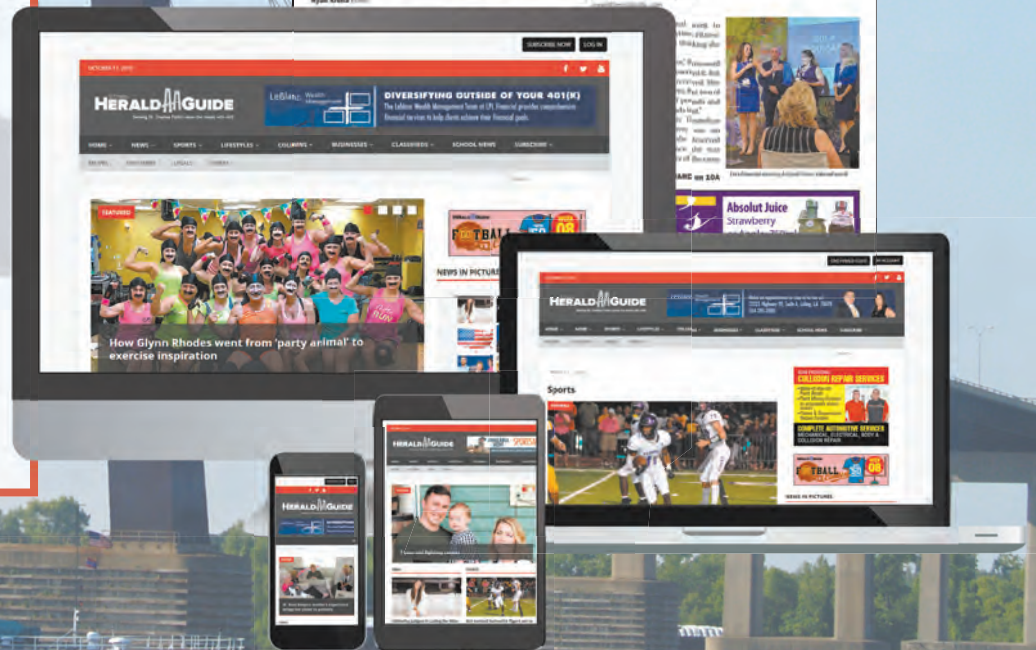

Mid-Stream Transfer Operations primary location for the derricks and weigh rigs on the Mississippi River between River Miles 0 to 505, Inner Harbor Navigation Channel, and the Intracoastal Waterway from Mississippi River to Harvey Canal in the following parishes: East Carroll, Madison, Tensas, Concordia, West Feliciana, Pointe Coupee, West Baton Rouge, East Baton Rouge, Iberville, Ascension, St. James, St. John the Baptist, St. Charles, Jefferson, Plaquemines, Orleans and St. Bernard. Upon the effective date of the final permit, the LPDES permit shall replace the previously issued LPDES permit.

The principal discharge from this existing source is made into the Mississippi River between River Miles 0 to 505, Inner Harbor Navigation Channel, the Intracoastal Waterway from Mississippi River to Harvey Canal, waters of the state classified for primary contact recreation, secondary contact recreation, propagation of fish and wildlife, drinking water supply, oyster propagation, agriculture, and outstanding natural resources. Under the SIC Code 4491, the applicant proposes to discharge maintenance ballast and void water, treated sanitary wastewater, and equipment deck washdown water from an existing marine cargo, midstream bulk material handling, and general stevedoring facility.

During the preparation of this permit, it has been determined that the discharge will have no adverse impact on the existing uses of the receiving waterbody. As with any discharge, however, some change in existing water quality may occur.
