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Luling couple left legacy of success, friendship

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When it comes to the success of his long-time Boutte shop, Maison Décor, Shane Matherne credits a couple of exceptional role models.

“I’ve always believed in teaching my customers well, and I tell them, ‘Hey, if I didn’t treat you guys like this, my mom and dad would come down and slap me,’” Matherne said with a laugh. “They’d tell me, ‘You’ve gotta treat those people right!’”

Matherne’s mother passed away in 1997 after a battle with cancer, and his father passed on in February of last year. Gyms adhering to safety protocols as they reopen

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When Gov. John Bel Edwards partially reopened the state in Phase 1 earlier this month, he made provisions for fitness centers to open at a reduced capacity. And while gyms around the parish are bustling, two fitness center owners said it has become apparent that physical fitness is not their members’ only motivation to break a sweat.

Michelle Oubre, owner at Anytime Fitness in Destrehan, opened the doors to her facility on May 26.

“I’m super excited,” she said. “We’re promoting social distancing and in all of our studios we have x’s marked on the floors.”

Ten people will be allowed in each of the gym’s three class studios, and Oubre said the capacity of the entire center will also be closely monitored.

“We’re following all the safety protocols set by the state and cleaning every hour,” she said, adding employees will be wearing masks.

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Summer rec sports cancelled, refunded; skills clinics added

Plans being made for early start to fall sports

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St. Charles Parish announced the cancellations of the majority of its summer camp and sports programs, and that it would refund all registration fees and dues.

However, the parish's parks and recreation department also took perhaps its first steps back toward conducting business as usual, releasing dates for a series of summer sports clinics that include baseball, softball, basketball and agility training.

The cancellations were made due to COVID-19 and availability of space, said St. Charles Parish Director of Communications Samantha de Castro. Baseball, softball and T-ball competition were among the casualties, as were all summer camp programs but Swamp School, which will have a delayed start and be held from July 6-10 and July 13-17.

The clinics, de Castro said, were arranged to allow for summer activities that would allow for small groups to gather and practice skills together. She added the parish is working on a plan that would allow its fall sports programs to begin early.

All registration for the skills clinics will close at 11:59 p.m. on June 4.

For basketball, there will be three five-day sessions in June, the first June 8-June 12, the second June 15-June 19 and the third June 22-June 26 at the Edward Dufrene Community Center. All registration will be conducted online. Space is limited to 30 spots per session and registration will be first come, first serve. The clinic will be for ages

7-14. Fee is \$50 per child, per session. Baseball clinic sessions will be held on the same dates. Age groups include 7-10 and 11-14 boys. The clinic will be held at the West Bank Bridge Park fields 1-5. Spaces are limited to 75 spots and registration is first come, first serve. \$50 per child, per session. The 7-10 year old sessions will be conducted from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. each day, while 11-14 year olds will attend from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

For softball, the sessions will be held at the East Bank Bridge Park fields 1 and 2 on the same dates. Age groups are 7-10 year old girls (9 a.m. to 12 p.m. each day) and 11-14 year old girls (1 p.m. to 4 p.m.). The cost is \$50 per child, per session. Spaces limited to 50 participants and will be accepted first come, first serve.

The agility training will be conducted at the Edward Dufrene Community Center through a partnership with Ochsner Performance Training. Sessions will be Monday, Wednesday and Friday each week from June 8-June 25 and from July 6-July 23. Age groups are 7-10 (2 p.m. to 3 p.m.) and 11-14 (3:15 p.m. to 4:15 p.m.) The price for a full six week session is \$100, for three weeks it is \$60 and for one week it is \$25.

To ensure safety, there are several protocols in place as per CDC guidelines for each clinic, including temperature check at check-in, hand hygiene, social distancing (groups during the agility clinic, for example, will work at separate stations over two courts) and participants must bring their own water and cannot share equipment.

Mystery Machine hits road, brings Scooby Gang to life

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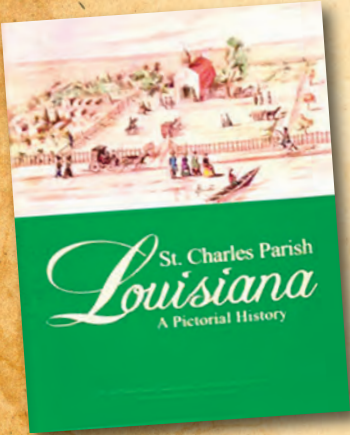

Gov. John Bel Edwards announced Monday that Louisiana has made enough progress in suppressing the spread of the coronavirus to move into Phase 2 of reopening, a move that will further loosen restrictions on businesses and social gatherings.

“The people of Louisiana have done an incredible job flattening the curve here, and I’m thankful for their compliance and hard work,” Edwards said. “Likewise, the state has matched their efforts by ramping up both testing and contact tracing ...all of this has allowed us to get to a place where we can move into Phase 2 on Friday.”

Edwards said he would sign a new proclamation Thursday, June 4, that would officially move the state into Phase 2. The new set of rules will take effect Friday, June 5, and be in place for at least three weeks.

Under Phase 2, retailers, restaurants and all other businesses that have been operating at 25 percent capacity for the past few weeks can up their capacity to 50 percent. Bars and breweries without a food permit are allowed to reopen at 25 percent capacity.

Spas, massage parlors, tattoo parlors, bowling alleys, arcades, trampoline parks and event centers are all allowed to open under Phase 2.

Michael Hernandez, along with Jed Spurgeon, owns the tattoo shop Precision Ink in Boutte.

“It’s been really hard these past few months having basically all your income potential taken away and not knowing when the end would be in site,” Hernandez said. “Watching other businesses that don’t practice the same sterilization procedures as we do be allowed to open, even if it

were at a reduced rate, just honestly didn’t seem fair.”

Edwards said individuals at a higher risk for contracting coronavirus, including the elderly and people with underlying health conditions, should continue to stay home. He encouraged everyone to wear masks when outside of the home.

“Everyone should consider their own risk and the risk of those in their households as they plan their public outings,” Edwards said. “There are still thousands of active COVID-19 cases in Louisiana and public health experts have increased warnings about asymptomatic people being able to spread the illness unknowingly.”

Carnivals, amusement parks, water parks, fairs, contact sports, children’s indoor play centers, theme parks and music halls will remain closed during Phase 2.

Carole DeZarn, a Luling resident who owns Softtouch Permanent Makeup in Metairie, said she is very happy that Phase 2 means she will finally be able to get back to work.

“My clients have been waiting almost three months for their beauty treatments and permanent makeup,” she said. “I am a saver, but we have lost a lot of income, still continued to pay rent and utilities and insurances.”

Jerry and Dorothy “Dot” Matherne – “She was always Dot. She didn’t like to be called Dorothy,” Shane said – began raising their family in St. Charles Parish in 1956, when Shane was born. The couple lived in Larose before Jerry secured a job with Monsanto and moved to what would be their lasting home. The two raised four children, two boys and two girls.

Jerry would go on to ultimately retire with Monsanto, while Dot was a stay-at-home mom. But in the mid-70s, the couple decided to pursue their ambitions of opening a “little goodies shop,” ultimately taking the form of Mr. Snowman. The business sold snowballs and ice cream, and it was open from Easter through Labor Day each year. It was just the beginning.

“St. Charles Parish was very small at the time,” Shane said. “My dad said, ‘You know, it would be a good thing for kids if we opened this up.’ We never thought it was going to turn into anything big, but it just kind of grew over the years, and it kept growing. Eventually, it became kind of a landmark.”

Accelerating that growth was the store’s evolution. Dot had a reputation as an excellent cook, and those who knew that began asking if the shop would begin serving other items – hot dogs, nachos, roast beef, barbeque beef, fried shrimp, fried oysters and, of course, hamburgers were among the additions to the menu, each from Dot’s own special recipes. The restaurant started gaining strong footing and, on the advice of a restaurant consultant, the name of the business was changed to Shane’s World’s Best Hamburgers, Serving Mr. Snowman Desserts.

“(The consultant) liked my name and said, ‘Why not call it Shane’s World’s Best Hamburgers because I absolutely loved those hamburgers,’” Shane said. “That came in the early 80s.”

Business got so hot that the family opened a second restaurant in Pensacola Beach, Fla. A third opened in Avondale – and 10 more were in the works to be opened in Baton Rouge as the business was launching into a full-fledged franchise.

But tragedy struck before those stores could open. Dot, the driving force at the heart of the restaurant’s success, was diagnosed with cancer. The Mathernes made the decision to step away from the business entirely.

“The business was pretty much all my mom’s influence,” Matherne said. “I consider her to be one of the wisest people I’ve ever known. She had an answer for

everything. I wish I were as smart.”

Jerry was pretty darned sharp too. The couple had a knack for management in several areas. As youths, Shane and his brother Robert started a professional band called the Young Dreamers, with Jerry and Dot managing them.

Manage they did – and then some. The brothers credit their parents with spurring them to reach heights that included playing for two sitting U.S. Presidents, for the Special Olympics and several times on the famed Jerry Lewis nationally televised telethon.

“We were the No. 1 variety band in New Orleans for several years, and that’s all a credit to my mom and dad,” Shane mused.

The common denominator in these successes? Perhaps it was simple: likeability. Shane says that, without question, Dot was a people person, as was Jerry.

“Dad always said Mom never met a stranger. She knew everybody,” Shane said. “They were so intertwined in our community. When I think about all the friends they had, people they knew and the things they’ve been involved with – and that we were involved with through them – I just think ‘Wow,’ when I get that chance to reflect.”

While the gym was closed, Oubre said her staff members spent time calling members to check up on them.

“We’re all hardwired for connection and movement. The majority of the people we talked to are so ready to come back in,” she said, adding quarantine highlighted for many members how much of a role exercise and movement play in maintaining their good moods and temperaments.

“We’ve been open eight years here and we have a very tight knit group of members and a lot of relationships have developed here,” she said. “They miss exercise, but they also miss each other.”

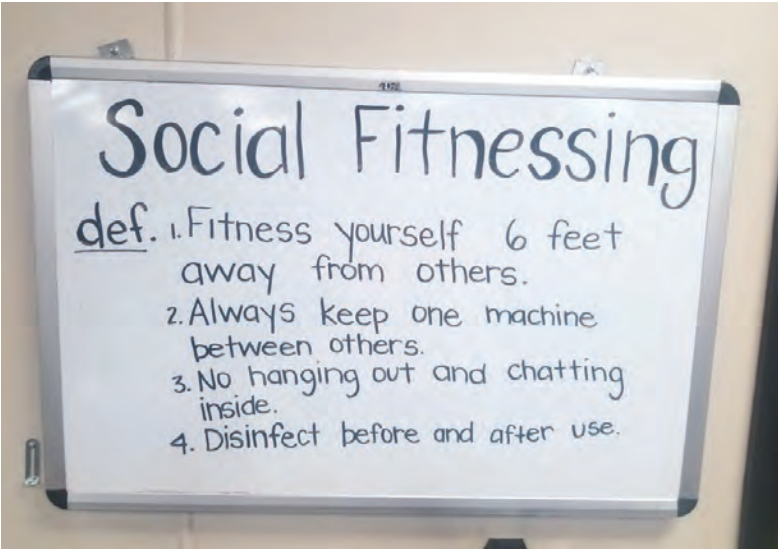
While she could have opened earlier, Oubre said she wanted to take her time to ensure both her employees’ and members’ safety.

“It’s almost like we’ve had to create a whole new business program,” she said of the operation of the facility.

Oubre said the facility will take baby steps into fully re-opening. Until then, she said outdoor and online classes will continue to be held.

Brandi LeBlanc, owner of nDurance Fitness in Destrehan, said re-opening on May 15 meant so much to her, her staff and her members.

“You miss those one-on-one intimate

conversations,” she said.

LeBlanc said her gym is stocked with hand sanitizer and cleaning supplies, although acquiring the needed cleaning supplies took some creativity because the normal products they use can’t be found.

“We need normalcy,” she said. “It’s not just about physical well-being, but mental well-being ... we had Zoom classes while we were out, but it’s just not the same ... people just want to be with other people.”

Her facility’s 4-acre campus will allow for plenty of outdoor workouts, and LeBlanc said as long as there is a need she will continue to offer Zoom classes for people who are at a higher risk of catching coronavirus, or for those just not ready to come back to the gym.

Beth Creed, an nDurance member, said she is grateful for the normalcy the

gym re-opening has brought.

“I come to the gym very early in the morning ... I need to come to the gym and get away from it all and just concentrate on my physical well-being and my mental well-being as well,” she said.

PLAY BALL! Former DHS baseball coach among the first in return to live sports

‘They were ready for it’

Live sports have largely been a mere memory since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in the U.S. several weeks ago.

But recently those magic words “Play ball!” finally rang out. Marty Luquet couldn’t be happier to hear them, a sentiment he no doubt shared with his players and the strong crowd in attendance on Saturday evening.

Luquet got to return to the dugout to coach the sport he loves as his Gauthier-Amedee team played a doubleheader against the Southland Hogs in American Legion competition, providing catharsis for the longtime Destrehan High School baseball skipper and two squads of prep players who had their seasons ended prematurely thanks to the unprecedented COVID-19 pandemic.

“It was great to be back on the field,” Luquet said. “The kids are excited and we had a very large crowd. They spaced themselves out and got to watch these kids in action. It’s just great to be back.

“Especially for the senior guys, there

was no closure for (the players). Their seasons just ended. Their careers just ended. It just wasn’t right. I knew they’d be excited to be out here. This is all so different than anything we’ve ever been through.”

Gauthier lost the first game of the

doubleheader in tough fashion, losing a lead with two outs in the bottom of the seventh inning to a Southland walk-off home run. Gauthier was leading in the second game, 4-3, when rain began to fall and necessitated play be suspended. Gauthier went on to win the game when play resumed on Monday.

“It was a tough way to lose, two strikes,

two outs, up a run and then a homer. But they still loved it. They had so much fun,” Luquet said.

Luquet and his players are among the lucky few at the current time who are permitted to get on the field. Because the LHSAA is currently not allowing high school programs participate in any kind of team activities (as to not allow some schools to get a head start on others electing to continue distancing due to the pandemic), the majority of teams based from a given high school cannot participate in Legion, including Hahnville and Destrehan, which have each played summer ball under or outside of the legion banner annually.

Gauthier-Amedee, however, is one of a handful of teams that doesn’t draw from any one school – the Wombat’s roster is a mixture of St. Amant, Dutchtown and East Ascension players, and Luquet does not coach any of them in prep competition. The Southland Hogs are another with that kind of construct, as are the St. Charles Parish-based Gibbs Cardinals, previously known as Pedal Valves.

“The three of us are really the only ones into the swing of it right now,” Luquet said. “Destrehan, Jesuit, Holy Cross, they can’t under the high school guidelines. At Riverside, we can’t. We can’t get together at all. But these guys aren’t my players (in prep ball). They travel under American Legion baseball.”

Luquet retired in 2014 after a long, successful run at Destrehan and a head coaching career that saw him amass a record of 447-251 over 24 seasons, including tenures at O. Perry Walker and St. James. His record was even sharper

in his years specific to Destrehan, as he won 310 games and lost 137. He led Destrehan to the playoffs in 14 consecutive seasons and guided the Wildcats to two Class 5A state championship games.

He admits coaching never left his heart, and he couldn’t stay away from the diamond very long. He began coaching with Gauthier-Amedee during the summer of 2017. In 2018, the Wombats captured the American Legion state championship under his watch.

But it didn’t quite scratch the itch completely, and he joined the Riverside baseball program as an assistant coach in late 2019. This was his first season with the team – but 10 games in, the season was suddenly over.

“I retired, and I went right back to coaching. I couldn’t stand just sitting around at home. Then 10 games in, they sent me back home. I had a voluntary retirement and then a forced one,” Luquet quipped.

As for the gameplay on Saturday, it went as a fan might expect: pitchers were way ahead of the hitters, Luquet noted, given there’s been scant time in the batting cage for players since the middle of March. Gauthier was able to get in one day at a hitting facility prior to its season opener.

But though the doubleheader was cut a bit short, it supplied what these players, parents and coaches have craved for so long.

“There was a great turnout. They were ready for it, to see those kids,” Luquet said. “The greatest thing in the world is watching your child play ball and seeing them do what they love to do.”

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The girl behind the glitter

Festivals, parties and parades – or just a random Wednesday. They're all the perfect time to party, and one local resident has handcrafted the perfect accessory for any occasion.

Tara Vicknair, a Destrehan native and now Montz resident, whipped up her first batch of face and body glitter last year on a whim.

"I love to host parties," Vicknair said. "My husband and I were having a king cake party at our house ... you know the ones where everyone brings a different king cake and you all just live your best life ... I am a very 'theme-y' person and I have to go all out when I do stuff, so of course I needed all things purple, green and gold."

When she decided she wanted face glitter for the party, she took matters into her own hands.

"I didn't want to pay \$20 for a small jar of something I thought I would only use once or twice ... funny thought now I know," she said. "I decided to see if I could make my own and voila ... it came out great."

When her friends at the party asked where she got it, Vicknair gave them the extra jars and then made more.

That was in February of 2019. Almost immediately after the party she began selling her glitter creations on Facebook, and she was selling wholesale to stores just a month later.

Glitter Over Nola was born.

At the time, Vicknair was working as the lead receptionist and assistant manager at a New Orleans veterinary clinic.

“Did people think I was crazy?,” she said of starting her sparkly side business. “Yes ... well I mean not necessarily crazy, but my husband Zach had several good laughs about me making ‘that glitter stuff’”.

She said Zach literally laughed out loud when she told him she had put the glitter products on Facebook Marketplace to sell.

"Now we make jokes about me being a glitter mogul," she said laughing. "Of course from the very beginning he has supported me 100 percent, I just don't think he expected the outcome to be as it has been."

Vicknair now glitters as her full-time job, which keeps her busy and gives her flexibility as a mom to 12-year-old Matthew and 5-year-old Ryan. She has no official employees, but said she has plenty of help from friends and family.

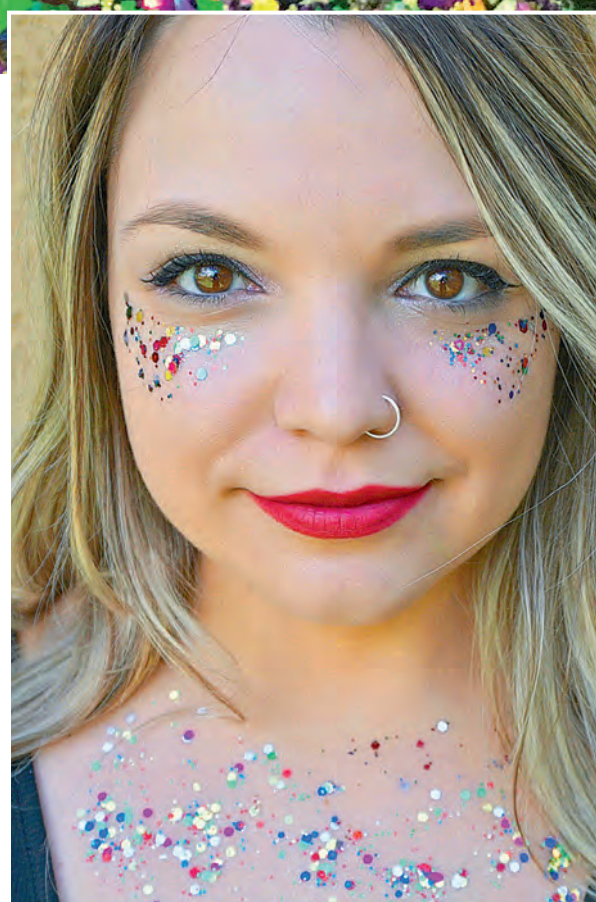
“My husband and oldest son are my delivery boys,” she said. “I have two amazing friends, Megan and Natosha, and my of course my mom, Ida, who have helped me work my booth at craft fairs and events.”

Glitter Over Nola offerings currently stand at well over 50 color combinations and range in price from \$5 to \$20. Vicknair's products are currently stocked at Luling's Cherry Lane Boutique, as well as a variety of stores in Metairie and New Orleans.

Customers can order via social media pages and the website - www.glitterovernola.com – and Vicknair said the site features exclusive products such as Mini Jar Mix & Match Sets and Glitz Lip Kits.

“Getting messages from customers saying how great the product is or pictures of glittered faces with uplifting messages about my product is so gratifying, even more because I know that I did it on my own,” Vicknair said. “I hand mixed each batch of glitter and filled every single jar ... everything to do with my product is done by me in some way, down to the label.”

And while the coronavirus pandemic may have slowed down business and production, it also inspired a new product launch for Vicknair – Glamitizer, a



hand sanitizer with glitter in it.

“Everyone was buying up all the sanitizer and nobody could find,” she said. “I happened to already have a main ingredient, so I got some other stuff and gave it a whirl ... of course since my business is literally all things glitter, I had to make it sparkly.”

Vicknair's friend suggested she call it Glamitizer.

"How could I not?" Vicknair said. "It just fits so well."

Vicknair said the most surprising thing about starting her business is being recognized by strangers in public.

“I’ve gone places and had people stop me because they recognize me from my social media posts or saw my picture in an ad,” she said. “We went to a restaurant and I was wrangling the boys out while my husband paid and a lady stopped him to ask if his wife’s name was Tara and was she the ‘glitter girl?’”

From wearing the glitter to sharing posts on social media, Vicknair said her friends and family have been extremely supportive.

"I am a really lucky person, and so very thankful," she said.

If the following violations are not rectified within (5) days of this published notice, the parish will proceed in bringing the properties listed in compliance with Chapter 16, Article III Sec. 16-24 through Sec. 16-28, (As amended). The fee for performing these services shall be at a rate of 0.037 per square foot of the lot cleaned. The contractor's fee for performing these services shall be at the rate of 0.029 per square foot of the lot cleaned. In the event a mini-clean up is required prior to performing the above services, a fee of \$58.61 per mini clean up plus actual disposal fees will be assessed, not to exceed then (10) mini-cleanups per property in violation. On property where trash and/or debris accumulation is such that it requires heavy equipment, bulldozer, front-end loaders, etc. a fee of forty-three dollars and ninety six cents (\$43.96) per cubic yard will be assessed. An administration fee of \$36.63 may be assessed on each invoice. The fees in this section shall be increased or decreased on February first of each year by a change in CIP applicable to the US cities average group, all urban consumers, all items published by the US Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, for the preceding twelve-month period ending each November. The change shall become effective beginning with the period ending November 30, 2000. PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT made and entered into the 21st day of May, 2020, by and between ST. CHARLES PARISH acting herein by and through its President, who is duly authorized to act on behalf of the Parish, hereinafter called the OWNER and Calvin, Giordano & Associates, Inc. acting herein and through its President, hereinafter called the CONTRACTOR. Whereas the OWNER desires to employ the CONTRACTOR to perform the services described herein for a Parks and Recreation Master Plan Update.

1. GENERAL

- a. The OWNER engages the CONTRACTOR to perform specific professional services identified and described in the Scope of work. CONTRACTOR services shall conform to the requirements of the OWNER and all participating regulating agencies.

2. SERVICES OF THE CONTRACTOR

- a. The Parish hereby agrees to contract with the contractor, and the contractor hereby agrees to perform services in connection with the St. Charles Parish Parks and Recreation Master Plan Update. The services consist of the work defined in the following Scope of work.
- b. SCOPE OF WORK: Update the existing Recreation Master Plan from 2012, as described in the CGA Proposal No. 20-3591, which is attached hereto and made part of this agreement.

3. PERIOD OF SERVICE

- a. The CONTRACTOR shall complete and produce all deliverables described in the Scope of work in the CGA Proposal No. 20-3591 within 240 calendar days of execution of this AGREEMENT.
- b. In the event that delays are experienced beyond the control of the CONTRACTOR, the schedule may be revised as mutually agreed upon by the OWNER and the CONTRACTOR.

4. CONTRACTOR'S COMPENSATION

- a. The method of payment for this AGREEMENT is LUMP SUM.
- b. Total compensation for the completion of the Scope of work described in Section 2B, shall be \$56,400.00 as stipulated in the attached CGA Proposal No. 20-3591.
- c. Such payment to be made to CONTRACTOR within thirty (30) days after receipt of CONTRACTOR'S invoice by OWNER.

5. SERVICES OF THE OWNER

- a. OWNER shall assist CONTRACTOR in carrying out the Scope of work by placing at his disposal all existing relevant data and records in its possession.
- b. CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for searching said data and records provided and shall request specific clarification of the information as needed.
- c. OWNER guarantees CONTRACTOR access to all public property as required in order to complete the Scope of work.

6. TERMINATION

- a. This AGREEMENT may be terminated without cause by either party upon ten (10) days written notice.
- b. Immediately after receiving such notice, the CONTRACTOR shall discontinue advancing the services under this AGREEMENT.
- c. CONTRACTOR shall invoice an ascertainable sum proportionate to the

lump sum fee amount described in the CGA Proposal No. 20-3591. The percentage of services completed shall be based upon the Scope of work set forth in the CGA Proposal No. 20-3591.

- d. In no event shall the fee exceed what is set forth in the AGREEMENT.

- e. OWNER, upon receiving the completed or partially completed deliverables, and after the final fee is mutually agreed upon, shall make payment within thirty (30) days.

- f. In the event that this contract is terminated, OWNER shall have the option of completing the Scope of work in house or entering into an AGREEMENT with another party to complete the work.

7. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND ORDENANCES

- a. The CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to comply with all Federal, State, and Local Laws and Ordinances applicable to the Scope of work under this AGREEMENT.

8. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

- a. This AGREEMENT is not assignable.

9. INSURANCE

- a. The CONTRACTOR shall secure and maintain at his expense such insurance that will protect him and the OWNER, from claims under the Workmen's Compensation Acts and from claims for bodily injury, death or property damage which may arise from performance of work under this AGREEMENT as defined in the attached scope of work.
- b. All certificates of insurance shall be furnished to the OWNER within five (5) days after execution of the AGREEMENT and shall provide that insurance not be cancelled without ten (10) days prior written notice to the OWNER.
- c. St. Charles Parish shall be named as additional insured on general liability insurance policies.
- d. OWNER may examine all insurance policies.
- e. For all purposes under Louisiana law, the principals of this AGREEMENT shall be recognized as the statutory employer of all contract employees as provided in LSA-R.S. 23:1061.

10. OTHER

- a. CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and save harmless the OWNER against any and all claims, demands, suits or judgments for sums of money to any party for loss of life or injury or damages to person or property growing out of, resulting from or by reason of any negligent act by the CONTRACTOR, its agents, servants or employees, while engaged upon or in connection with the services required or performed hereunder.
- b. This AGREEMENT constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. There are no understandings, agreements, or representations, oral or written, not specified within this AGREEMENT. This AGREEMENT may not be modified, supplemented or amended, in any manner, except by written agreement signed by both parties.

11. EXCLUSIVE JURISDICTION AND VENUE

- a. For all claims arising out of or related to this agreement, CONTRACTOR hereby consents and yields to the exclusive jurisdiction and venue of the Twenty-Ninth Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Charles and expressly waives any (a) pleas of jurisdiction based upon CONTRACTOR'S residence and (b) right of removal to Federal Court based upon diversity of citizenship.
