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She was born in the year women gained the right to vote and in the decade of the Great Depression. She has witnessed the terms of 18 U.S. Presidents, and in the first decade of her life the television was invented.

On July 28, Hahnville resident Ruth Lussan Horn will turn triple digits. Ruth's daughter, Janel Pizzolato, said even though her mother's mental health has declined and she's not aware of the significance of her birthday, a small family gathering will be held in honor of Horn turning 100.

Horn was born in New Orleans on July 28, 1920 to William and Mary Busalacchi Lussan. She grew up on Lussan Lane in Luling in

a house that is still there, but now functions as a lawyer's office.

Horn enlisted in the Navy and served as a Pharmacist Mate Third Class from Jan. 31, 1944 to Sept. 29, 1945. She later obtained her teaching degree from LSU and taught physical education and home economics in the Iberville, St. John the Baptist and St. Charles Parish school systems. She retired from the St. Charles Parish school system in June of 1979.

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A 40-year-old husband and father of two with deep roots in St. Charles Parish has been in the hospital for nearly three weeks fighting for his life.

Patrick Hall, a St. Charles Borromeo and Destrehan High School alumnus, was diagnosed weeks ago with coronavirus. Since then, his wife said, it's been a rollercoaster of symptoms, treatments and emotions.

"Today has been the best report we've had since he's been in the ICU," his wife Jaime said July 16. "We're so overwhelmed from the love and support."

The Hall family – Patrick, Jaime and

their two children Landon and Ashlyn – reside in Central. But that distance hasn't kept friends and family in St. Charles Parish from stepping in to help.

Businesses, residents adjusting to mandatory masks requirement

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Last Monday marked the first day of new statewide COVID-19 safety protocols installed by Louisiana Gov. John Bel Edwards, including a mandatory mask requirement for those entering businesses and other public areas.

Through his July 11 executive order, Bel Edwards also ordered bars in the state to shut down on-site consumption and limit their business to curbside pickup orders of food, and limited indoor social gatherings like wedding receptions, class reunions and parties to 50 total people. This order will expire July 24, but could be extended if reported infections do not



trend down enough.

For St. Charles Parish business owners, it represents another variable to adjust to – the presence of those

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DHS alum turns documentary filmmaker

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Keva Peters Jr. saw his interest in film sparked while a student at Destrehan High School, and it didn't take very long for that spark to create an inferno.

Peters, who studies film at Dillard University and whose documentary "The Bigger Picture: African-American Representation in Film" earned Most Outstanding Entry among Louisiana high school students in the 2018 National History Day competition, says his life's path became clear to him around the time he started working on that project.

The work, he said, didn't feel like work at all. "I'd work on it until 4 in the morning and then wake up at 6 to go to school," Peters said. "And I was fine with it. It didn't slow me down, because I was looking forward to getting to class and what we'd talk about that day."

He hopes to make a career in film direction, and is enjoying the journey toward that goal. Already, it's shaped many of his major life choices. He chose Dillard because of his love of film. He met his mentor and some of his most influential guides through his documentary, and his confidence in himself grew immensely when he saw how far his first major project took him – all the way to Washington D.C., where the fateful competition was held, in fact.

Currently, he's working on the script for another project, one he plans to dedicate to the friends he has lost due to gun violence, as well as to the lives of others suffering that fate.

But his path as a filmmaker started at DHS, where he said an elective changed his life forever.

"Intro to Film Class, with Miss Vicknair," Peters said. "I just thought, 'OK, that sounds great to round out my classes this semester.' But I ended up really liking it. We learned about all of the stuff that goes into film, types of film, how it can be used for good and bad and the hidden messages behind a lot of stories."

Immediately, Peters found himself among the most vocal students in the course.

"(Vicknair) and I would have what almost turned into these one on one conversations in class," he said. "It just really got my interest."

He took more courses from there, and his hands-on experience grew. He learned how to work with the camera and with microphone equipment, and ultimately how to take a scene from stage to screen.

All the while, he was reading up on film directors worldwide and learned as much as he could

from their stories. Once Peters started studying at the St. Charles Parish Satellite Center, he credits teacher Hunter Robinson as someone else who helped him harness his ability.

"He kind of acted as a production company owner, and treated us as his directors. If we got stuck, then he stepped in," Peters said. "He taught me to rely on my instincts and trust in my talent."

When it came time to create "The Bigger Picture," he researched those who could help him convey messages out most effectively and sought them for insight and interviews. His inspiration was that this topic was something he felt he hadn't yet discussed in a class setting.

"The impact of film on people's day to day lives and on people in the industry," Peters said. "I came up with the subject of the history of African-American representation in the film industry from there."

He pointed to the 1915 film "The Birth of a Nation," a silent drama directed by D.W. Griffith.

"It was a cinematic masterpiece, but also at the same time, it led to the rebirth of the Ku Klux Klan," Peters said. "Which of course had a huge impact on the day to day lives of African Americans in our country."

New Hahnville residential development denied by Planning Commission

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Plat approval for phase two of Hahnville's River Place Estates, which would have included 21 new residential lots near 14855 River Road in Hahnville, was denied by the St. Charles Parish Planning Commission in a meeting earlier this month.

The approval would have granted design, not bid or construction, permission.

The major subdivision request was made by JCJR St. Charles, LLC – a company owned by parish District Attorney Joel Chaisson II - and Highway 18, LLC.

According to submitted documents, the developer submitted a preliminary plat and the required drainage impact analysis to the planning department and the required preliminary storm water pollution prevention plan (SWPPP) to the Environmental Regulatory Manager/MS4 Administrator on June 9.

The written opinion of Public Works Department Director Miles Bingham was that he viewed construction-related challenges as substantial.

Joey Murray of Murray Architects addressed the commission on behalf of JCJR prior to the vote.

"I just want to be clear. We're not here for construction approval," he said. "We can't get to that stage until the primary plat has been approved and we know what we're designing for."



Walter Pilie, a Destrehan resident, was just one of the parish residents who addressed the commission and questioned the plat's sewage, drainage and street plans. Many residents expressed concern about adding new homes to the area, especially considering the recent flooding issues the parish has experienced.

After the vote denying approval, Murray addressed the commission and asked for a reconsideration. He argued the plat approval would actually speed up drainage relief to the area because of the extensive studies that would have to be done prior

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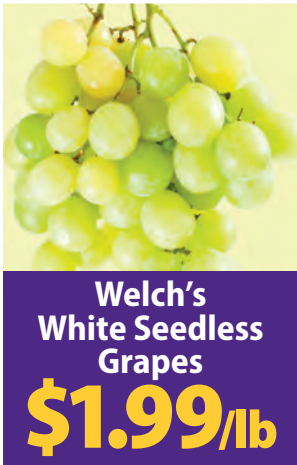

“She was always so gracious and eager to help,” Connie Gonzales, one of Ruth’s former students, said. “She was one of my favorite teachers. Later in life I often called her for advice on recipes I was trying to perfect and she always enjoyed helping. You could tell how she loved her students. She always had a smile on her face for her students and we all loved her.”

Horn married the late Daniel Horn on March 2, 1946 and went on to have five children - Ronald, Robert, Joan, Janel and Jill. She now has 10 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

After marrying Daniel, Horn lived in White Castle, Vacherie, Lafayette and Shreveport before returning to St. Charles Parish. She now lives across the street from Janel.

“She taught us how to enjoy life,” Janel said. “We always went to Mardi Gras parades and all the football games no matter where they were. She was close to her sisters - Bet who lived in Morgan City, Helena who lived in Baton Rouge and Puddin who lived in Luling. We grew

up knowing the importance of family and feel so fortunate to have grown up around our families.”

Family memories of Horn involve shopping – “grocery shopping at Schweggman’s and shoe shopping at Imperial Shoes on Canal Street,” said daughter Joan – as well as card games, especially 500.

“I have fond memories of playing cards with MawMaw and PawPaw,” Ruth’s grandson Justin said. “MawMaw taught me how to play 500 and I became really good at it.”

Horn’s granddaughter, Claire, recalled helping her grandmother by serving food and drinks for ladies Pokeno nights, “so that I could get to play a round of it with her to win nickels.”

Described by many as a wonderful mother and grandmother, Horn also loved vegetable gardening and traveling.

“Her and daddy were members of the Busy Bees and they hardly missed a trip with them,” Janel said. “She was an avid seamstress and cook. She made a lot of our clothes, even for our Barbie dolls.”

Cooking is another passion many attributed to Horn.

“I remember helping her make pralines, fudge, peanut brittle, divinity and cookies to give as teacher Christmas presents,” Janel said. “We helped make blackberry jelly every summer and helped with canning vegetables.”

Horn’s daughter, Jill, also has many food-based memories of growing up.

“I remember Mamma feeding us cow’s tongue after telling us it was roast beef and eating frog legs and telling us it was fried chicken,” she said. “I rarely ever remember eating sandwiches for dinner. We always had a hot meal. She was a great cook.”

Ryan, Ruth’s grandson, said one of his most cherished memories of growing up close to his grandparents was waking up early on Saturday mornings and walking over to have breakfast.

“Usually it was raisin toast, orange juice and morning TV,” he said. “MawMaw was always present and offered us warmth, love and a little discipline when we needed it.”

with COVID-19 has inspired local friends and family to organize a benefit dinner for him and his family.

Organizers said there will be extra meals available for anyone who would like to go the day of the benefit and pay then.

“My aunt Jeanne Hall, who is also Patrick’s aunt, told me this morning, ‘Family takes care of family,’” Marcus Lambert, one of the event organizers, said. “We’ve been asking what we can do to help ... it’s a helpless feeling to not be able to do anything. We know how to cook, so we wanted to step up and help him out.”

Lambert said all money generated from the benefit will assist Hall’s family in his care, medical treatment and other needs.

Hall’s coronavirus battle began when he visited an urgent care clinic with what he thought was a sinus infection.

“They diagnosed with him a sinus infection and gave him an antibiotic and a cortisone shot,” Jaime said. “They tested him for the flu and he was negative.”

That was June 24.

On June 29, Hall went home early from work feeling sick. His symptoms included fever, chills and difficulty breathing. The couple headed back to urgent care, where Hall was tested for coronavirus.

“The next morning, he couldn’t move or breathe,” Jaime said of June 30. “They admitted him for observation and by the next day he was on the covid unit there. He was there for just three days and went straight to ICU and has been there ever since.”

Jaime said the situation has been hard on the entire family.

“It’s been a long road,” she said. “Just so many emotions and so much helplessness. Patrick is a great person. He’s a great father and a good husband and provider.”

At a doctor’s urging, Jaime, Ashlyn and Landon were tested for coronavirus. All three tested positive and were forced to quarantine for 10 days.

“I was not able to be by his side,” Jaime said, adding her mother-in-law Cindy drove from Destrehan and

lived in a camper in their driveway so Hall could have a steady visitor.

Jaime said she and her children all remained asymptomatic during the quarantine.

“My ten days were up yesterday,” Jaime said July 16, adding her quarantine ended a day after the hospital enacted a no-visitor policy because of an uptick of cases.

“Because they knew I had been waiting the ten days to go and see him they gave me an exception,” she said. “I sat next to him and told him what a fighter he is and how many people are praying for him. I assured him how extremely loved he is and his job here on earth is not complete. I then prayed with him as tears feel down my face.”

The day after her visit she said husband’s doctors gave her Hall’s best report so far.

‘It’s the power of love,’ she said. “It’s going to be a long road, but we’re fighters. We’re not giving up and we have a whole army of prayer warriors. Everyone has been phenomenal. We’ve been strong in our faith and believe God is in control.”

As of July 21, Jaime said although Hall was still in critical condition, doctors were making strides in being able to reduce his sedatives. He was recently able to be taken off paralytics.

“The doctors are daily fighting a new battle,” she said. “One day it’s the heart and then it’s the lungs and then the kidneys ... it attacks everything ... but he’s fighting. So many people have lifted Hall up for his healing. What better gift could he receive?”

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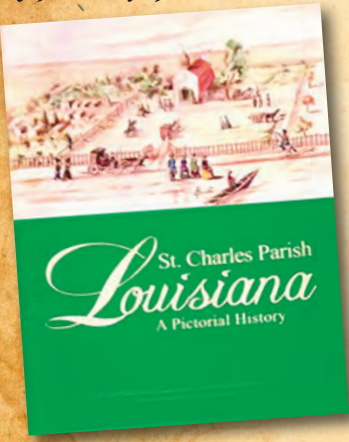

His overall takeaway was that despite a natural ebb and flow to progress, things have moved forward and consistently improved over time.

“There are good times and bad times, but when you constantly see improvement, you should continue down the path,” he said.

The positive reception to his film emboldened him in his desire to make it in the film business.

“It showed me how far my passion and desire for this could take me,” he said.

Peters, who started a GoFundMe page to help get his new project off the ground (titled Funding Short Film), has been energized by the script-writing process once again. This won’t be a documentary, but a short story inspired by the painful and too early loss of close friends. He’s taking on an emotional topic, but he said he believes the time is right to tell this story.

“I’ll go back to the neighborhood where we hung out ... when I see something like a tree my friends and I would play on, I take notes,” he said. “I’ll have two characters just from that tree. I let the message come to me rather than the other way around ... I realized I have to place myself in the world I was once in when I lost my friend.”

to construction.

A motion to continue discussion passed, allowing time for Chaisson to also speak after the vote.

“This development is actually spurring the talks with the Union Pacific Railroad and the talk about getting the jack and bore, so I please ask you to reconsider and let me take that next step,” Chaisson said.

A motion to reconsider the vote failed.

Construction on Phase I of the project has already begun. The parish council, during a February 17 meeting, unanimously approved a move to rezone 34.8 acres for single-family homes by JCJR.

Murray said the approval covered the project’s first phase, or 42 lots. Depending on demand, he said a second phase would be planned.

“There’s a huge demand for lots,” Murray noted in February.

The Planning Commission’s July vote followed a contentious July 6 Parish Council meeting, in which the council tabled St. Charles Parish President Matthew Jewell’s proposed temporary moratorium on major subdivisions, instead asking that it go before the parish’s

Planning and Zoning Commission.

“Recent flooding has made it clear that it is time for St. Charles Parish to have a systematic master plan that allows new homes to be developed in a way that does not hinder the quality of life for current residents and homeowners,” Jewell said after introducing the moratorium earlier this month. “For far too long, we have simply added new developments and put additional burden on existing infrastructure without improving the conveyance canals and culverts that deliver water to our pump stations.”

The proposed moratorium would be in effect for 18 months, or until the parish-wide drainage and sewerage master plans are complete.

In order to dodge the moratorium, should be it be mandated, subdivision proposals would need to have made it through the plat approval phase to continue into the construction phase.

The next Planning and Zoning Commission Meeting is scheduled for August 6 in the Council Chambers at the parish courthouse, located at 15045 River Road in Hahnville.

representing one of precious few constants during the COVID pandemic. Businesses can be cited and fined up to \$500 if found to be in violation of the order by allowing employees or customers to be on site without wearing masks. Customers can be asked to leave if non compliant, and if they refuse, they can be cited for trespassing and law enforcement could get involved.

But it’s not necessarily even that simple.

“We’ve been compliant ... we don’t have a choice if we don’t want to be fined,” said Barry Majoria, co-owner of Majoria’s Supermarket in Boutte. “We require our employees to wear them. We do have signs posted, based on the law, that people are required to wear them, but if you have a medical condition and say you cannot, I can’t question you about that, of course. So that’s the hand we’re dealt, and the one we’ll play.”

Janet Long, owner of Bayou Pets in Destrehan, echoed Majoria.

“With us, people tend to come in and get their stuff, then get out. They’re not

lingering,” Long said. “The people who have come in, and stopped and looked at fish, they’ve had their masks on. Mostly, the ones who haven’t, aren’t in here very long.”

Long noted the expected protocol for business owners now is to ask a customer without a mask to put one on. If a customer says no, the store owner or manager is to ask the person to leave, and if the customer then refuses, they could be cited for trespassing. The latter point, in particular, bothers Long.

“I mean, if they tell me no, I’m supposed to call the police? No, there’s no way I’d ever call the police on one of my customers,” Long said.

Kristi Brocato, owner of The Basketry in Luling, said her store is recommending masks, but has mixed emotions about how enforcement of the mandate can be carried out.

“What I ask my customers is, no matter how you feel about it, either way my business is responsible if you don’t follow the mandate,” Brocato said. “I won’t force you to wear it and I won’t refuse you service. But I do ask them to do it

for me, so we don’t get in trouble here.

“Obviously, I want to keep everyone safe. And I don’t like the mask requirement, but I also know so many people that have had COVID and who are or were close to death, who have died, so if that’s what we have to do, then that’s what I’ll do.”

For the St. Charles Parish residents who must now comply with the order, some wholeheartedly agree with Bel Edwards’ order.

Rachel McFall of Norco doesn’t have the luxury of risking the odds with COVID due to her auto immune disorder.

“I may look young and healthy, but I get sick very easily,” McFall said. “I wish people understood that masks are a

very easy thing to use whether it’s to get groceries or get gas. Doctors, dentists and surgeons use them every day and they’re fine. People need to think about others and do the right thing.”

Fellow Norco resident Shelby Kliebert said she and her husband were “100 percent” for it.

“We have a three month old at home and since we don’t know how his little body would react to COVID, we require everyone who comes in contact with him to wear a mask,” Kliebert said.

Not everyone agrees, however.

“Mask mandates are unconstitutional and not law,” said Keri Burford of Destrehan. “When I get some actual scientific data, through experiments and collection of data, then I will comply ... otherwise stop scolding me for making my own decisions for myself.”

Said Jeremy Schmill of Boutte, “I don’t agree with it. I work all day in the heat and I just want to cool off ... I can’t go in the store to get a drink without the mask.”

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Destrehan reshapes basketball programs with new coaching hires

Green makes jump from White Castle, Miller from Lusher to lead boys, girls teams

Destrehan High School has named new head coaches for their boys and girls basketball teams, announcing the appointments of Troy Green Sr. and Jenn Miller to lead those respective programs at Wednesday night's meeting of the St. Charles Parish School Board.

Green succeeds former boys basketball coach Todd Bourg and brings a state championship pedigree. The coaching veteran of 19 years spent 15 of those as a head coach, eight of those at White Castle where he led his teams to two state championship victories (in 2017 and 2018) and four district championships. His overall coaching record is strong, nearly 100 games over .500, at 289-199. Green is a former Class 1A LSWA Coach of the Year. Green played college basketball at Southeastern Louisiana. He's also spent time in the coaching ranks with Litcher, Donaldsonville, and Livonia.

“I’m excited about it,” Green said. “Coaching at

the 5A level has been a personal goal of mine. St. Charles Parish is a strong school district. I’m ready to take on the challenge.”

He departs a school where he had deep roots entrenched. Green attended White Castle as a student and starred on the court as a multiple time All-State performer.

Green said he puts a lot of focus on being stout defensively and creating offensive opportunities, turning stops into transition buckets. That can come in different forms. At White Castle, his 2017 team was built on a group of long athletes, each 6’4 and above, and the Bulldogs played a slower paced, half-court type game. In 2018, after

the graduation of six seniors, the style shifted to a quicker tempo. Both teams earned the 1A state championship.

“Being selfless and buying into what’s best for the team goes a long way,” Green said. “We did some different things and were successful ... (at Destrehan) we have an athletic group of kids. I’m really looking forward to working with them.”

Meanwhile, Miller has coached the past seven years at Lusher Charter after 12 years of coaching in Florida, where she led her program to the Florida Class 5A Final Four in just her fourth season as a head coach. She succeeds former Ladycats head coach

Meagan Stock. She played college basketball at Florida State from 1995 to 1997 after a stellar prep career in her hometown of Charleston, West Virginia at Charleston Catholic High School, she earned honorable mention All-American honors in USA Today for her final two years, as she emerged as one of her state’s most dangerous scorers.

“It’s incredibly exciting,” Miller said. “I wish we weren’t in the middle of a pandemic, because I really can’t wait to get to work and see where we can go.”

Miller said she was ready for a change, and after a friend notified her the Destrehan job was open, she jumped at the opportunity. Destrehan represents a program with a strong recent tradition, with the team going unbeaten in the 2016-17 season en route to the 5A state championship, but also represents a rebuilding challenge.

“Seeing where they’ve been very recently and striving to get back to that top level, it’s an exciting prospect,” Miller said.

That title team might represent something of a template for what Miller would like to build – a team that can put relentless full court pressure on opposing ball-handlers while being proficient themselves at beating the press. Like Green, she believes it all starts at the defensive end.

Carlie Dalgo's passion for music is on display weekly at Hope Church, and the 2020 Hahnville High School graduate says she feels like it is just the beginning of her ministry journey.

“Ever since I was really, really little I’ve always had a love and a passion for music,” she said.

When she was 12 years old, Dalgo and her family began attending Hope Church, which had just launched.

"They needed a keyboard player, so I took lessons and fell in love with it," she said. "It became a passion for me."

Singing at different community events has been a highlight for Dalgo over the past few years, but she said singing at church is different.

“I feel very passionate ... I guess is the right word,” she said of helping to lead worship. “For me it’s not just a performance ... it’s worship and my heart is just to show people that Jesus loves them.”

Dalgo plans to study psychology at Nicholls, and her career goal is to become a Christian mental health counselor.

"I've always had a heart for mental health," she said. "I struggle with anxiety myself."

Dalgo said she's viewing the career choice as an additional way she can blend her deep faith in God with one of her passions.

"It's a deeper level I can add to my ministry," she said of counseling.

While she'll miss HHS, she said attending school was complicated by hereditary angioedema, a rare medical condition that she was diagnosed with at 4 years old. The hereditary blood disorder causes swelling, and Dalgo said during high school her attacks were hard to control.

"I lack a protein in my blood stream, and it causes me to swell, so growing up I missed a lot of school," she said. "I loved school, but it was hard for me to make up all the work."

Now on a preventative medicine, Dalgo said the condition has become more controllable.

"I only missed three to five days my senior year due to attacks," she said. "I used to miss three to five days a month."

With her health stable and her sights on the future, Dalgo said she's excited for the next steps in her ministry journey.

"I am so excited because I would have never imagined doing it, but I love how it correlates with what I'm going to college for," she said of youth ministry. "I'm excited for this new role and this journey."

The 2020-2021 application for Free/Reduced Price Meals is available online at www.MySchoolApps.com. Applying online is the fastest and most efficient way to apply for meal benefits. However, paper meal applications may be obtained from the school cafeteria or the Child Nutrition Department. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out one application for the household and return it to the school. Complete either a paper application or an on-line application, but not both. Additional paper copies are available at each school. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. The information provided by the household is confidential; it will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Information may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

All children in households with any household member receiving benefits under Assistance Programs (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Family Independence Temporary Assistance Program (FITAP) or Food Distribution Programs on Indian Reservations (FDPRI)) are eligible for free meals. For school officials to determine eligibility, each household that is now receiving benefits from Assistance Programs must provide the case number of a household member as well as the signature of an adult household member.

All other households must provide the following information on the application: names of all household members, the amount of income (before deductions for taxes, Social Security, etc.), that each household member receives; how often the person receives the income; where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare; the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct; and the last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member who signed the application, or a statement that the household member does not possess one.

Children categorized as foster, homeless, runaway, migrant, or enrolled in state-funded Head Start or Even Start programs, if known, are automatically eligible for free meals. School officials will determine eligibility for free meals based on documentation obtained directly from the program office and notify the household of their eligibility for benefits. The household must notify the school if it chooses to decline benefits. The household should complete an application if they are not notified of free meal eligibility by August 6, 2020.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for meal benefits.
