Not everyone envisioned the future Becca Hillburn saw for herself.

Hillburn, a Hahnville High School alum, grew up hearing she should put aside her hopes of becoming a professional comic artist one day and perhaps pursue a more traditional line of work.

"People really didn't get me," said Hillburn, on the verge of publishing her second volume in her graphic novel series, 7" Kara. "I've always kind of been a nerd. I fell in love with comics when I was 13 ... a lot of people picked on me for wanting to go into this world, I think because I strayed from the pack.

"They didn't know anyone who was doing it. It was

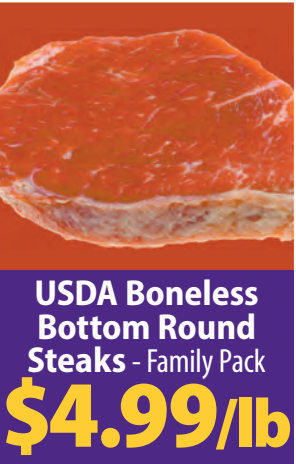

As Luling resident Jennifer Green tackles this school year, she will do it from two different vantage points – as a teacher and as a mother of school-aged children.

The wife to Travis and mother to two children - one entering 9th grade and one entering 6th grade - currently teaches 6th grade science at R. K. Smith Middle School.

Students earn tablets for exceeding math goals

If motivating middle school students to do required schoolwork is tough, then getting them to do extra work is nearly impossible.

Four local students, however, dug in their heels last school year and not only completed all that was asked of them, but strove for more. Their efforts will be rewarded when they return to school.

Albert Cammon Middle School’s Asyan Ulhassan, Harry Hurst Middle School’s Giovanna Humbles, J. B. Martin Middle School’s La’Quincianna Simmons and Raymond K. Smith Middle School’s Mariah Mott all earned new electronic tablets as their reward for completing the most Imagine Math lessons at their respective school.

“The goal was to complete 30 lessons per year,” Dr. Alice Cryer-Sumler, curriculum specialist and student support for the district, said. “Two of the four students completed as many as 55 lessons.”

She said Imagine Math is a web-based

program that is used to provide extra support for students who may need it. It’s currently used only in the district’s middle schools.

Imagine Math programs help

students establish deep understanding and confidence in their ability to communicate in the language of mathematics and make connections, Sumler said, adding the lessons build the aptitude to solve problems and justify reasoning both inside the classroom and in day-to-day life.

Hahnville student made 300 masks for donation, takes pride in helping others

Emily Duckworth wanted to help her mother out in the early days of the pandemic, and so she did – making a plethora of masks for the latter’s workplace.

She kept on going from there and made several more that she’d go on to donate to local nursing homes. When she was done, everyone was a bit safer, to the tune of 300 masks to protect from COVID-19 infection.

“I knew a lot of people had to wear them for a lot of reasons, be it at work or because they’re vulnerable ... and they’d have to go buy them,” Duckworth said. “I had the fabric and I didn’t really have to pay for anything. I wanted to help.”

The project took Duckworth, who just began her senior year at Hahnville High School, about a month to complete. Those on the receiving end of this kindness were touched by her selflessness, and in turn, Duckworth was as well by their appreciative gestures.

“(A nursing home representative) gave me a pin that said I became a maskmaker to save lives,” she said. “My mom’s work posted about it on Facebook. It made me feel pretty good.”

The instinct to help others is nothing new for Duckworth, who has long participated in service-oriented projects. As part of the International Organization of the Rainbow, a youth service organization that teaches young women leadership skills, she collected 200 pairs of shoes to ship to less fortunate areas in countries overseas.

She’s a third-generation member of Rainbow, after her mother and grandmother. In the fall of 2018, she and her mother volunteered with an

Adopt a Senior showed how community comes together

As society debates the issues surrounding the major events of 2020, it can sometimes be easy to forget that adversity often brings community members together, as opposed to sewing division.

Such an instance came earlier this year, as many River Parish residents made the effort to “Adopt a Senior” of the Class of 2020.

The school year abruptly ended due to COVID-19, and with it the high school experience for so many seniors who would never have a prom, a real last day of school, a senior trip or a chance to say goodbye to their classmates or the teachers who inspired them to excel.

That inspired a trend nationwide aimed at letting seniors know their loss wasn’t taken for granted and that their voices were heard. The River Region was no different, as several Facebook pages created by local residents brought together people for the cause, which saw members send gifts and words of encouragement to more than 1,000 seniors. The page, titled Adopt a 2020 Senior – River Parishes Edition, was created by Destiney Guillon, a St. Charles Parish teacher.

For Destrehan High School graduate Destinee Mikell and mother Yolanda Dent, their experiences represented each end of the cause, with Mikell receiving a welcome morale boost and Dent spreading the same to 11 adopted senior students.

“(The end of the school year) was so unexpected and sudden, and it brought me down,” Mikell admitted. “I wasn’t able to go to school and be around the people I loved. I was expecting to have all those things you wait for to end your

senior year, and then this happens.

“Seeing people ... some of them I knew and others I didn’t even know, reach out and show they cared was such a blessing.”

Some of her gifts represented things that will come in handy once she moves on to college, where she’ll be living in a dormitory. Some gifts were monetary, which likewise represented a big boost.

“It really made me feel good,” Mikell said. “Some people sent snacks, and pictures to put into my dorm room. It all really helps.”

She added that things like “drive by” parade celebrations for graduation and other events showed the good hearts of so many community members.

Construction officially underway for parish’s community college

With construction work underway, Boutte’s River Parishes Community College – United Way campus will officially open its doors in January 2021.

Initially slated for a fall 2020 opening, construction on the campus started at the end of July and is expected to take 120 days.

“We knew we would be off by a semester because of COVID. The pandemic occurred right as we were gathering bids, so as a courtesy to our contractors we extended the bid deadlines,” United Way of St. Charles Executive Director John Dias said. “The end result was that we got in very competitive bids, and Lamar was chosen to do the job.”

The campus is a result of a partnership with River Parishes Community College in Reserve, which agreed to manage the St. Charles Parish campus if the United Way found a building. The college will be a part of the Louisiana Technical College

School clinics aim to provide care during pandemic

As the coming school year approaches and many uncertainties remain due to the coronavirus pandemic, one thing is certain – St. Charles Parish public school students who utilize Access Health Louisiana’s (AHL) two school health centers will still have access to care, whether or not they are learning in a classroom or virtually at home.

In addition to operating two local community health centers in Norco and Luling, AHL runs two school-based health centers in St. Charles Parish - the Albert Cammon Wellness Center in St. Rose, which services the students of Albert Cammon Middle and St. Rose Elementary School, and the J.B. Martin/R.J. Vial Wellness Center in Paradis, which services the staff and students at those two schools.

“We are working closely with the St. Charles Parish school district to

ensure that students have access to healthcare services,” AHL Director of Outreach and Development Chenier Reynolds-Montz said. “Whether students return virtually or in person, we will be able to keep our school-based health centers running. We are using telemedicine to offer primary care and behavioral health services to students, and our pharmacy is

Shell Norco delivers 2,000 gallons of hand sanitizer for parish schools

If there are 1,900 classrooms in St. Charles Parish Public Schools, how long does it take to make and deliver 2,000 gallons of hand sanitizer if you are traveling from Canada to Louisiana with stops in Michigan and Texas along the way?

This word problem isn’t one students will find on their math work this school year, but here’s the answer – a little less than two weeks with teamwork and coordination from Shell Norco.

Last week Shell Norco General Manager Tammy Little presented 2,000 gallons of Shell-manufactured hand sanitizer, packaged in gallon pump bottles, to St. Charles Parish Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Ken Oertling.

The donation was ready just in time – the day before the district’s first day

people who donate, and they come out and help with serving food to the kids and passing out supplies.”

Keltric said this year’s giveaway was bolstered with support from the Killona Fire Department, St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne and his wife, Alice, Wade Scott and Ashton Noel of the Killona Landfill, Raymond Coleman with 3S Properties, Rick Whitney, the Crab Factory in Des Allemands, Judge Connie Aucoin, Councilwoman Holly Fonseca, Councilwoman Sandra Darensbourg Gordon, Bourgeois Gas Station and others.

“It’s a wonderful feeling that you get knowing you’re helping others,” Sarah said. “The best part of the giveaway is the number of kids that come out and the smiles on their faces and knowing that we can be a blessing to someone else.”

The school supply giveaway isn’t the only community event organized by the couple, who reside in Boutte. For the past eight years they have organized a holiday toy drive to ensure children from economically disadvantaged homes have a fun and memorable Christmas.

kind of like saying, ‘I want to be an astronaut.’”

But Hillburn did make it, as her published work can attest. The graphic novel showcased not only Hillburn’s artistic and storytelling talents, but also her hometown, as the story is set in Hahnville.

“I wanted to portray Louisiana in a different light than we see a lot in media,” said Hillburn, who currently lives in Tennessee but is in the process of moving back home. “I’m always surrounded by people who think it’s all about Bourbon Street, as if it’s always Mardi Gras or we get drunk all the time. And I get it, but there’s way more to Louisiana than that. The people are just a little friendlier and the food’s just not the same anywhere else.”

7” Kara is the second book in Hillburn’s graphic novel series about the character and the world surrounding her. Kara, as the name suggests, is seven inches tall, making for a much different world to experience.

“She wants to get out and meet humans ... she doesn’t really have a whole lot of fear, which for someone seven inches tall, can be not so great,” Hillburn quipped, alluding to the dicey situations her protagonist might find herself in.

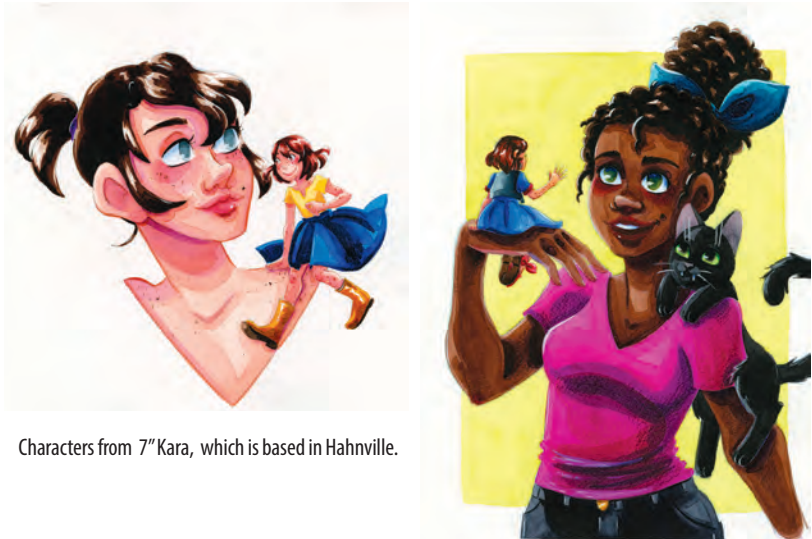
From a storytelling standpoint, Kara’s size offers Hillburn some unique avenues to explore, and not just through text. Hillburn is able to contrast size between characters to show where a power dynamic may stand, or how Kara might feel in a particular moment.

The ability to combine the visual medium with written word is something Hillburn said is incredibly freeing.

“It even allows you to overcome language barriers and transcend different reading levels. Everyone can grasp the story and what’s going on,” she said. “When you combine the visual art with text, you can tell deeper, more nuanced stories.”

The chance to tell these stories through the comic medium represents the realization of a dream for Hillburn, and she has worked toward helping young people in St. Charles Parish potentially do the same in the field – even as she’s lived out of state. Hillburn teaches comics and watercolor through the St. Charles Parish library system, while she also utilizes YouTube and a blog to share her wisdom.

Hillburn’s family still lives in the area, and she’s long hoped to be able to return. For that reason, she kept an open line of communication with people in the area about potential job opportunities, for example the school system – Hillburn’s mother was a teacher at J.B. Martin for approximately 20 years. The library was another place of interest, and her persistence paid off as she’s been teaching classes online through the library system for some time now.

“I love working with kids. They’re so amazingly cool ... they don’t have preconceived notions,” Hillburn said. “When it comes to drawing, a lot of adults have decided they can’t draw and don’t put in the time to learn. Kids will try. It’s reinvigorating. Seeing how they respond to art kind of gives me a new will to keep making stuff for them and to keep teaching them.”

She estimates book two in the 7” Kara series will be out before December. Book one can be found via her website, 7inchkara.com, while it is also in circulation in St. Charles Parish’s libraries.

Upon moving back, she’s planning to expand her teaching efforts as well, and ultimately hopes to see more artists from Louisiana joining the comic artist ranks.

“If this is something you’re interested in or wanting to pursue, there is so much room to tell a story,” Hillburn said. “Don’t let people talk you out of it. If you have a strong voice, there’s room for you in the comic world.”

my grandma cook in the kitchen and that made me want to start my own business.”

The young entrepreneur, who returned to middle school last week, sold 40 bottles of her sauce in the first two days of announcing her business on social media.

Students haven’t been on campus for more than four months and most of them are very excited to return... and we’re excited to see them,” she said. “Our leadership has been working tirelessly to ensure that we can safely return to school and continue to provide high-quality teaching and learning opportunities.”

While new safety measures - such as required temperature checks, masks and social distancing - will make for a different school experience, Green said she is looking forward to collaborating with other teachers and district staff to figure out creative ways to keep students actively engaged and learning while still maintaining a safe learning environment.

“My favorite thing about teaching is the ‘light-bulb moments,’” Green said. “When teaching science, we do a lot of questioning and exploring. Rather than giving the students a list of vocabulary words to study and information to memorize - which is probably how you and I learned science - students today actually conduct investigations, generate questions and make discoveries with

the teacher as a guide - and these activities lead to students developing an understanding of the concepts and content for each unit.”

Green said her science classes do a lot of hands-on group projects, so the new school environment is allowing teachers to make better use of new technology platforms to make sure students are still engaged and collaborating with each other.

“I am also looking forward to the wonderful collaboration and co-teaching relationship I have with my co-teacher, Paulette Thomas. Her commitment to students is incredible and having two

educators in the classroom helps us make sure we are meeting each students’ individual needs,” Green said. “Working in St. Charles Parish, and especially at R. K. Smith, feels like working with family. Everybody is so caring and supportive, and there is also such a strong commitment to student success, and an equally strong commitment to teacher success and effectiveness.”

and distributed the four tablets to the principals and teachers of the students. Each school will present the tablets to the winners when the students return to school.

“I am hoping that the students learn that you may not have everything you need when you come, but if you work with us and do these extra things we can fill those learning gaps,” Sumler said.

Each middle school in the district has a math interventionist, Sumler said, adding they work tirelessly to provide extra support for students who may need it.

Sandra Loya at Albert Cammon Middle School, Makesa Melancon-LeVeck at Harry Hurst Middle School, Kim Zeringue at Raymond K. Smith Middle School and Tami Thompson at J. B. Martin Middle School all earned high praise from Sumler for the work they do with students.

“They work really hard to build relationships with the students and to encourage them to do the extra work so they can fill in the gaps,” Sumler said. “They are really good motivators.”

offering free home delivery of prescriptions so that families can receive their medications without leaving the house.”

The school clinics provide primary care services, including well checks, immunizations, sports physicals, behavioral health offerings and acute and diagnostic services.

“For parents who are new to telemedicine, our staff is well trained in explaining it and there are videos on our website to see what a telemedicine visit will look like from start to finish,” Reynolds-Montz said.

Nurse Practitioner Lauren Ellis, who works at the Albert Cammon Wellness Center, said the center is extremely important in treating an underserved population of children that might not otherwise have the opportunity for well visits and immunizations.

Ever since schools closed in March, Ellis said she has been conducting telemedicine calls to students who required continuous care and prescriptions to keep their health ailments, especially asthma, under control.

“Everybody cares about these kids and everybody wants the best care for them,” she said. “It’s going to look a lot different this year, but I’m happy we’ll still be able to be there for the kids.”

Ellis said because it is difficult for some parents to take off work and take their child to a primary care provider, the school clinic fills a large need in the community.

“It’s a difficult time for all of us,” she said. “We’re trying to

work with the community as much as possible while keeping everyone safe.”

Physician’s Assistant Christine McDaniel, who works at the JB Martin / R.J. Vial Wellness Center, said families of students who use the school-based clinics are never billed for service.

“The main thing we’re going to really try to encourage is that the kids keep up with their prescriptions, especially the kids with asthma and allergies,” she said. “We’d really like to encourage parents to get and keep immunizations up to date, as well as the well visits. We want to get kids back to their regular preventative care, and for the kids with chronic diseases, we encourage the parent to keep those diseases as controlled as possible.”

Reynolds-Montz said AHL’s aim is to keep the children as healthy as possible, adding The American Academy of Pediatrics also strongly supports the continued provision of health care for children during the COVID-19 pandemic.

“Since the onset of the pandemic, a significant drop in well-child visits has resulted in delays in vaccinations, delays in appropriate screenings and referrals and delays in anticipatory guidance to assure optimal health,” the AAP website states. “Pediatricians have rapidly adapted to provide appropriate elements of well exams through telehealth when clinically warranted. However, additional elements require in-person visits. Concern exists that delays in vaccinations may result in secondary outbreaks with vaccine-preventable illnesses.”

Reynolds-Montz said for services when telemedicine visits could not be used, the school clinics would be scheduling appointments to ensure proper cleaning time and social distancing protocol.

with the production of isopropyl alcohol at Shell Sarnia, continued to a Shell Lubricants site in Michigan for blending and then on to Houston where it was bottled, packaged, labeled and shipped to St. Charles Parish.”

Oertling said hand sanitizer is a key sanitation component in ensuring teachers and students can remain learning from the parish’s classrooms.

“We have many health and safety protocols in place for our teachers and students,” Oertling said. “The gift will directly help us accomplish those protocols.”



He added the donation could not have come at a better time, as hand sanitizer is a commodity that is not easy to come by.

“Keeping hands clean is one of the best ways to minimize the risk of spreading COVID-19 and other germs,” Oertling said. “This donation has a direct impact on our students’ wellbeing. We appreciate our association with Shell, not just for donations like this, but also for helping us continue to offer the many educational opportunities we have for our children.”

Little said Shell Norco was excited to work with the school district.

“I hope to bring positive affirmations to teachers amidst all the negativity that others choose to spread so that they know they are appreciated,” Edwards said.

“This new school year will be unprecedented and will present many challenges for our teachers and students,” Bourgeois posted on the Facebook page. “We feel it is so important that our teachers know they have our support. What better way to do that than to pray for each one of them?”

Each week, Bourgeois said page moderators will pick 50 teachers or faculty members from a school to focus prayer efforts on.

“We will do this for each school until everyone is prayed for, and then move to another school,” she said. “Sometimes people are unsure of their words when they pray and like to look at words when they pray, so I wrote out a prayer that people can use if they want to.”

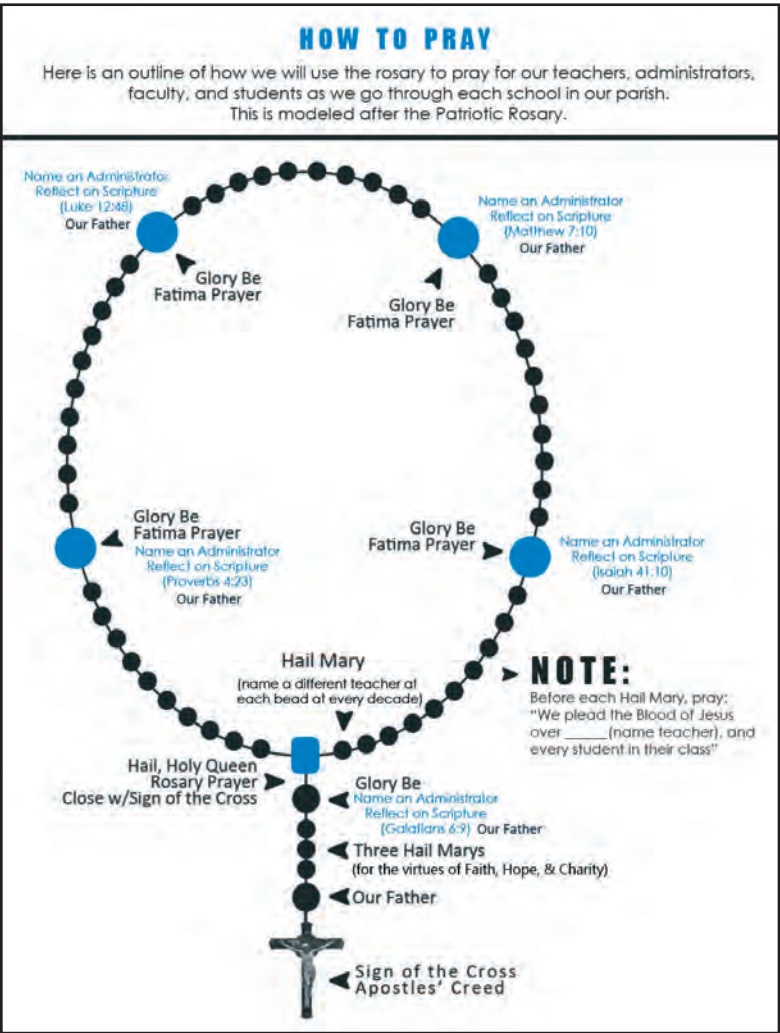
Looking at teacher’s and faculty members’ names, she said, will hopefully lead to a more personal and meaningful prayer experience for participants.

System and open to all students.

RPCC St. Charles Campus Director Penelope Shumaker, who was the campus director at the RPCC Reserve campus for many years, said the college system has long been aware of the need for a St. Charles Parish location.

“All attempts on our part weren’t successful until this partnership came together,” she said. “We have been partnering with many St. Charles industries for many years and this will only enhance our ability to provide higher education and work force training in their back yard.”

The United Way purchased a 3.9-acre site at 13143 Highway 90 for the community college’s future location. The project will cost an estimated \$3.3 million, including \$1.4 million to renovate the 16,389 square-foot bingo hall and the addition of 439 square feet. The renovation will provide a facelift for the center section of the building.

Even with the physical campus not open, Dias said prospective students are able to take online classes this semester.

In the midst of the pandemic, United Way was able to provide new programs to the community – including grocery and pharmacy services and online tutoring – and the organization intends to stay sensitive to the community’s needs, Dias said.

“The bottom line is we feel like this is our chance to change generations through education,” he said. “We will never be able to measure the amount of people whose lives will change because of this, but we know it will make a difference.”

Dias said the campus’ goal is to serve a wide range of students – including people right out of high school wanting to learn a trade, students wishing to start at a smaller institution before transferring to a large university and people working in a minimum wage job looking for an advancement opportunity.

The school’s academic and program offerings will grow each year as school becomes established.

“This campus represents the United Way stepping up and showing the community a bold action, because the community has supported us in such a bold manner with their donations,” Dias said. “More education and more job training provide more options in terms of employment and more options are always good. I think higher education is a real anchor to communities.”

Dias said there is no downside to RPCC’s expansion into St. Charles Parish.

“It’s good for students, it’s good for their parents, it’s good for employers and it’s good economically for the businesses around it,” he said. “We just feel like that’s a big positive stone that you throw in a pond that has a lot of positive ripples.”

Shumaker said one of the missions for the campus is to make a difference in serving the unemployed and under-employed residents of St. Charles Parish.

“As campus director, that is a mission I will focus energy towards accomplishing,” she said. “This will help to reduce the poverty rate of the parish and enrich the lives of those residents. Students seeking higher education can obtain their associates degree at much lower costs before going on to pursue the next levels, and with our transfer degree programs our degrees transfer to all state universities.”

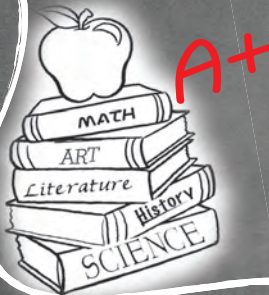

What St. Charles Parish Public Schools is doing to keep students & employees healthy & safe:

- Requiring face coverings for all employees, essential visitors, and students in grades 3-12
- Requiring temperature checks for all employees, students, and essential visitors
- Enhancing cleaning protocols
 - Contracted with Disinfx, Inc. to provide professional disinfecting services
 - Cleaning high touch points outside the classroom every two hours
 - Cleaning desks, playgrounds, and buses between each transition of students
 - Disinfecting high touch points/high traffic areas and buses at end of each day
- Placing signage as social distancing reminders
- Arranging desks to be separated and face the same direction where possible
- Avoiding sharing of learning aids when possible and cleaned between users
- Restricting non-essential visitors/volunteers

What we ask families to do to keep everyone safe & to help keep our schools open:

- **Take Temperatures**
Families are asked to monitor students for symptoms and take student temperatures daily before going to school. If your child is experiencing symptoms or has a temperature of 100.4 or higher, please keep your child at home.
- **Wash Hands**
Have your child wash his/her hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds prior to boarding the bus or arriving at school.
- **Pack a Face Covering**
Be sure your child has a face covering prior to sending him/her to school.
- **Pack a Water Bottle**
Water fountains at schools will be unavailable, but water bottle filling stations will remain operational.

New guidelines we are implementing to keep students & employees healthy & safe while in school in accordance with guidance from LDOE, LDH, & the CDC:

- Due to maintaining static groups on buses, the only bus changes allowed are to honor custody judgments.
- Movement is minimized, and students move in the same direction when possible.
- Students must wash/sanitize hands upon arrival at school, every two hours, before and after eating, before and after using play equipment, and before exiting school.
- Parent appointments must be made through the office in advance.
- Lunch guests are not allowed.
- Off-site field trips are discontinued until further notice.
- Large events may take place virtually or may be scheduled throughout a period of time to limit the size of the gathering.

Pelicans flame out of playoff picture in NBA restart

Have questions to answer for next season

Welp. That was quick.

For a sports fanatic, the only thing better than seeing the pros back at it in competition – after seemingly an eternity without – is seeing a New Orleans team with something to play for. The Pelicans entered the NBA's restart bubble with a lot of hype at their back, as last we saw them, they were playing their best basketball with rookie star Zion Williamson

rounding into form as the impact player that was promised. The Pels were a popular pick to emerge as the Western Conference's final playoff team.

But then – ah, sure, I'll make the obvious one – their bubble burst. As did ours.

Tough pill to swallow considering the excitement that was building for the team about a month ago. Reports were that Williamson, his once injured knee now healthy after months of recuperation, was dominating workouts. He certainly looked the part, too, from the photos and videos emerging online.

But then he was sent away from the bubble, a family situation cited as reason for departure. He was gone for a little under two weeks, and upon reporting back to Orlando with his team, fans were greeted with a familiar, somewhat deflating scenario: Zion, who had apparently fallen out of shape, was on a hard minutes restriction. He was outright held out of the team's third game of the restart, and was never really let loose.

It mirrored his return from injury earlier in the season. Making matters more frustrating for many fans was the secrecy surrounding his departure. Note: they cited a family emergency, and I 100 percent back the team and

the media around the team for respecting Williamson's privacy. Frankly, it's something you don't see often anymore and we could stand to see more of. That said, the team also treated Williamson's status as he rehabbed his preseason injury with a cloak of secrecy, so this latest instance came as an unwelcome avalanche of cold water.

Eclipsing that entire matter was the team's listless play throughout the restart. New Orleans went 2-5 through its first seven games of the restart and were already eliminated by this week's start. Of playoff contenders, they were among the very first teams bounced. The tough run included a large lead blown against Utah in the opener before being doomed

regularly by slow starts from there. The Pels, by the numbers, had the easiest schedule entering the restart.

Sadly, it represented classic Pelicans. Hey, the franchise has been here for about 20 years, so we can use classic. A fall just as the fanbase has reason to buy in.

But what does it mean? Long term, probably not much. Williamson showed how dominant he can be prior to the league's shutdown, and Brandon Ingram showed himself to be a legitimate star. The team surrounding those two is also very young, and the Anthony Davis trade means the Pelicans are rich with draft picks and cap room to make improvements. The team's flexibility and valuable assets give the franchise an upward mobility it hasn't had since Davis' first years here, when then GM Dell Demps traded off the mountain of assets he had himself for Jrue Holiday and some magic beans.

There will be changes, though, almost

assuredly. Talk that Alvin Gentry may coach his last game this week seems valid, as with one year left on his deal, an extension doesn't seem likely. COVID may complicate this process, though, as transition between seasons is sure to look much different than usual. Lonzo Ball may have played himself out of a lot of money with a disastrous restart. Williamson will have to find a way to stay in optimal shape and limit injuries – the two could go hand in hand.

Through the right moves and some in house development, it seems like a team primed – legitimately – to make a leap to the postseason next year. And though disappointing now, perhaps its fitting: the team will bank another lottery pick to add to the mix, and Zion Williamson's first NBA playoff series should see him play in front of New Orleans fans and not a largely empty arena in Orlando. It's nice to have sports back in some way, but until the fans are back in the fold, we're not quite there yet.

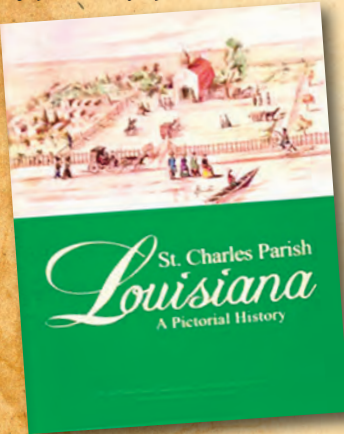

LSU gymnast and Hahnville High alum Kamryn Ryan, along with five teammates, has been named Scholastic All-American, the Women’s Collegiate Gymnastics Associate announced Tuesday.

Rebecca D’Antonio, Olivia Gunter, Ashlyn Kirby, Maddie Rau and Caitlin Smith joined her among LSU selections. A student-athlete earns scholastic All-America honors with a 3.5 or higher overall grade point average on the WCGA’s adjusted grade scale. The 2019-20 squad combined to earn a 3.319 GPA for the year. She was St. Charles Parish’s Student of the Year in 2019.

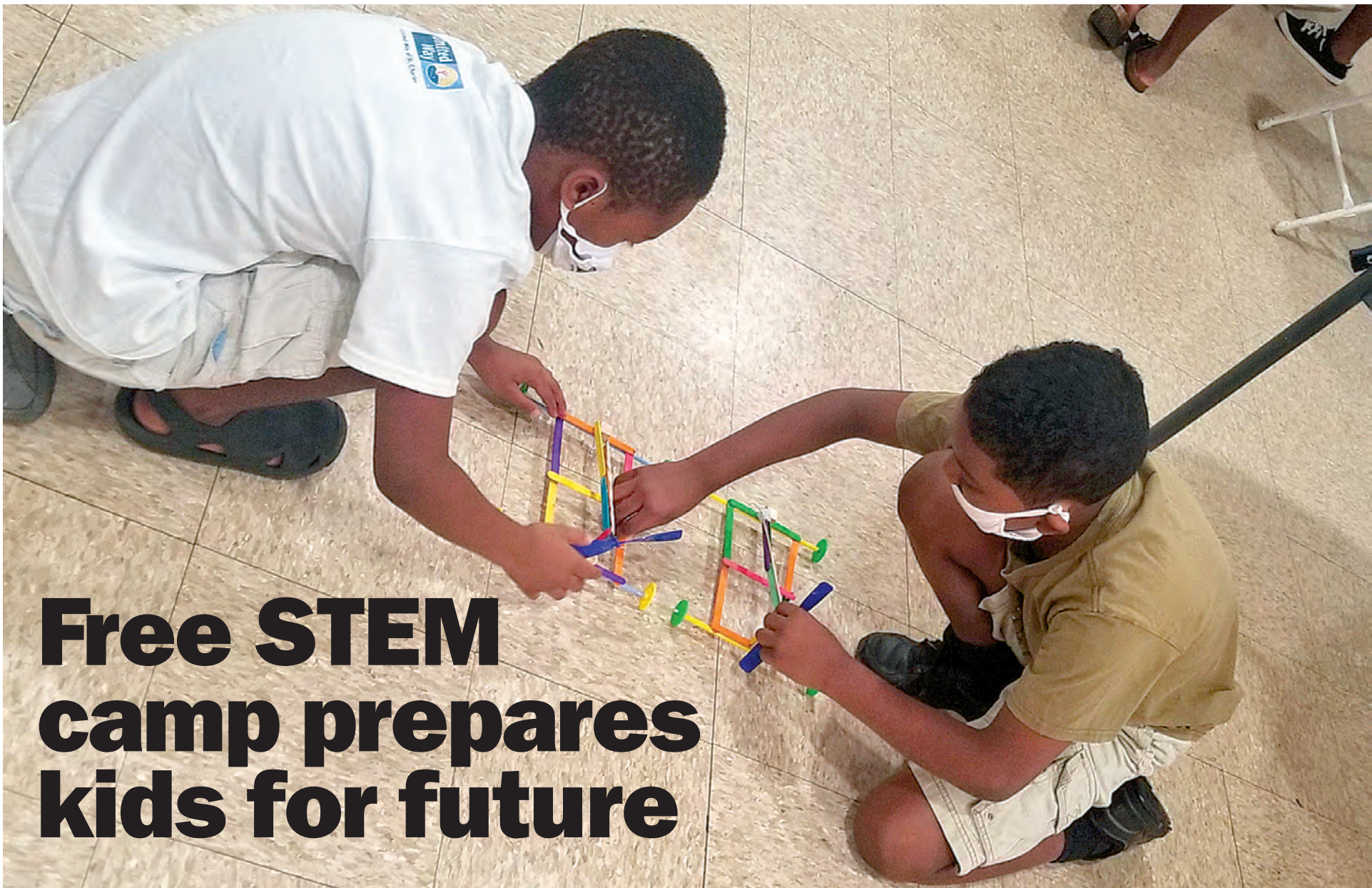

Free STEM camp prepares kids for future

When Shamira Williams volunteered at a New Orleans STEM camp a couple of years ago, she just knew that local children in her community needed the opportunity to attend something like it. After realizing nothing like it existed in St. Charles Parish, the Boutte resident was inspired enough to start researching how to do one herself.

“I spoke with Ms. Marilyn Diggs,” Williams said. “She’s well known and does a lot of community outreach and used to work for the school system.”

Together Williams and Diggs began to plan the camp, and Williams began researching different experiments and possible camp study topics.

“It was a lot of work to research,” Williams said laughing. “I just kept thinking that we don’t have that type of camp here. We have summer camp and sports and stuff, but we didn’t have STEM. I just kept thinking that I can do something like that here.”

Williams said the camp was very well received by the community, despite her nervousness.

“I was so, so nervous because it was our first time,” she said of the 2019 camp. “But now my goal is to make it bigger and better every year.”

For the second year in a row, the free camp was offered last month to any child between the ages of 7-12 years old. Campers learned about a wide array of topics, including the cardiovascular system and how it relates to COVID. They also built functioning heart models, used stethoscopes and built hydraulic bridges and kazoos.

“If science class was like summer camp, we wouldn’t have a STEM pipeline problem,” Williams said. “I just want the kids to come out and have fun.”

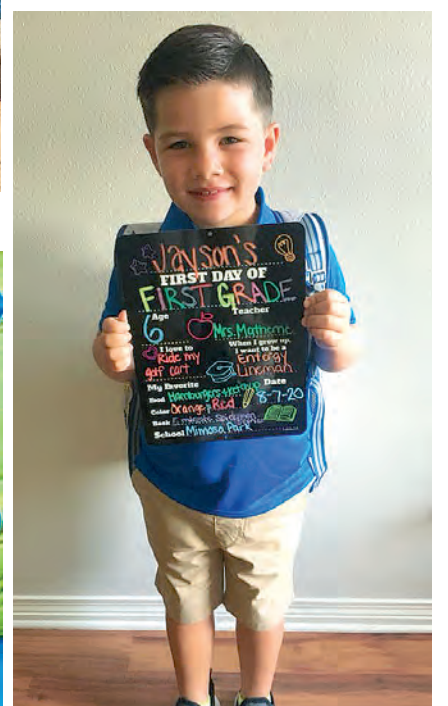
