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Stafford Jackson's 22 years of service in the United States Army garnered him many medals and awards, the highest of which being The Silver Star for his actions in the Vietnam War.

Yet the St. Charles Parish native, undoubtedly a hero, is humble in talk surrounding his service and recognitions.

"It feels good to be appreciated ... it's much better to be called a hero now," he said. "The sentiment immediately after that war was not always one of appreciation, so it is much better to be called a hero than it was to be called something else."

Jackson was born on June 11, 1940. He grew up in Norco, a town he said greatly shaped him.

"Norco was really like one big village ... you didn't just grow up and learn from

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Four local women band together to Turn Rescues Into Pets

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Four local women have taken their shared passions for volunteering and animals and parlayed it into a new mission - Turning Rescues Into Pets.

St. Charles Parish residents Dani Hardy, Vicki Johnson-Cain, Candice Lafourcade and Heather Hernandez formed TRIP last November as a non-profit with a mission to help homeless animals get the medical supplies and third-party surgeries they need to get healthy and adoptable.

“The founding members of TRIP came together with a common passion to roll up our sleeves and help,” Johnson-Cain, who serves as TRIP’s vice president, said. “Our purpose is to rally behind our local shelters by fundraising, volunteering and spreading awareness.”

The four friends, who met through volunteering at the St. Charles Parish Animal Shelter, huddled at a coffee shop for three hours last year hashing out the needs of the pet community in St. Charles Parish. TRIP was founded as a non-profit after that meeting.

TRIPS’s main goals are to remove animals from homeless situations and shelters, provide

medical care, place animals in secure adoptive homes, provide affordable vaccine and spay/neuter services and provide resources for stray and feral cats.

Luling shooting suspect has lengthy rap sheet

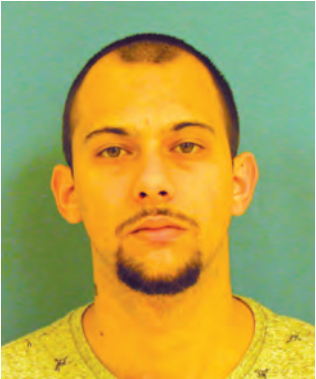

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A Boutte man is behind bars in Jefferson Parish after gunshots rang out in the 500 block of Kellogg Drive in Luling at 8:30 a.m. last Wednesday.

“The first arriving officers observed a white male getting into a pickup truck,” St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office spokesman Cpl. James Grimaldi said. “The subject, later identified as Tyler Dufrene, fled the scene in the pickup truck. After refusing to stop for emergency vehicles, who were pursuing him with their lights and sirens, several Sheriff’s Office deputies followed the vehicle into Jefferson Parish, but lost sight of the suspect’s vehicle. St. Charles deputies notified JPSO and requested their assistance.”

Dufrene, 22, shows a current address of 202 Schmill Street in Boutte. Grimaldi said it is known that his family resides in the 500 Block of Kellogg Street.

“Deputies made contact with several victims in the 500 block of Kellogg Drive, who were both friends and family members of the suspect,” Grimaldi said. “It was learned through witness statements that Dufrene was involved in an altercation with his girlfriend and refused to let her leave his residence. During the incident, the girlfriend was able to exit the residence and entered a vehicle with her young child, which was occupied by a family member of the girlfriend.

Lafon Center to host old school, drive-in movie doubleheader

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While the Lafon Arts Center is a relatively new and a cutting edge facility, it's going old school this month for its latest event.

The center will host a drive-in doubleheader movie event on Saturday, beginning at dusk and featuring – fittingly, with Halloween around the corner – Hotel Transylvania and Addams Family Values.

Concessions will be sold at the event and proceeds will go toward the Destrehan and Hahnville high school theatre programs.

The event was result of some brainstorming sessions aimed at finding ways for the center to provide entertainment options for the community while also respecting COVID-19 restrictions and requirements.

“Of course, we’re limited on the seating we can sell in the theatre, and that restricts us from being able to provide the leading quality of entertainment people have been finding out we’ve been having during our first couple of years,” said Chris Melohn, Lafon Arts Center Director. “So we had to think a little outside the box, and came up with something we hope we can continue to provide for folks while dealing with these parameters.”

The center will have two 40 foot inflatable movie screens set up outside on the lawn facing the center, with the audience vehicles facing outward.

“Our parking lot is shallow and long, so we’re going to have two screens out there so people aren’t arching their necks over,” Melohn said.

Attendees are encouraged to dress up in costume for the event in recognition of Halloween.

“We want it to be fun and themed. Even though people are going to be in their cars and distanced, we thought it would be a fun opportunity to get dressed up, particularly for the kids.

We don’t know what trick-or-treating will really look like, so this is a chance to wear that costume and enjoy some Halloween movies,” Melohn said.

Traditional concession items like popcorn, chips, candy and soda will be sold, but in addition to that there will be jambalaya and Subway box dinner options available for pre-order (orders must be in by 7 p.m. Friday via the Lafon Arts Center website). Outside food is not permitted, as the concession proceeds are aimed at helping DHS and

Parish will not keep residents from trick-or-treating, but says to follow safety precautions

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As many people begin to plan costumes and buy candy ahead of Halloween night, local and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention officials are asking people to be mindful of coronavirus safety precautions.

“Residents should continue to follow CDC recommendations and guidelines as well as the Governor’s executive order related to COVID-19,” St. Charles Parish President Matthew Jewell said of Halloween festivities.

The CDC offers several considerations to help protect individuals and their families, friends, and communities from COVID-19 during Halloween.

In order to make trick-or-treating safer, the CDC advises people giving out candy to avoid direct contact with trick-or-treaters and give out treats outdoors, if possible. An example of executing these recommendations would be to set up a station with individually bagged treats for kids to take, the CDC website states.



CDC officials warn that a costume mask is not a substitute for a cloth mask, and that people should not wear a costume mask over a cloth mask as it can make breathing more difficult.

Social distancing and the frequent use of hand sanitizer are also recommended.

things that stick with people.”

Blocker moved to St. Charles Parish as an adult. Her time volunteering at St. Charles United Methodist Church led her to start a ministry focused on helping the homeless.

“I was volunteering at my church at the food pantry and at the time I seemed to be going into town and lot and would see the homeless underneath the free-ways and the bridges,” she said of her trips to New Orleans. “My friend Erica and I made 35 or 40 bags ... they didn’t have a whole lot in them at the time, but we would walk around and give them out. That’s how it started.”

What started then in 2017 has since grown into Blocker and others distributing approximately 75 bags four times a year to the homeless people of New Orleans through the ministry she founded - Proverbs 14:31 Homeless Ministry.

The name refers to Proverbs 14:31 in the Bible, which states “Whoever oppresses the poor shows contempt for their Maker, but whoever is kind to the needy honors God.”

Blocker said each of her outreaches has the goal of treating homeless people with respect.

“I really believe that treating people with dignity is just the most important thing,” she said. “I was homeless. I know how it feels ... I know how people look at you and I know how people act. I know how they turn their noses up and it breaks my heart.”

Each bag Blocker distributes has about 20 items in it.

“Some of the top items needed are crew socks, gloves, mittens, hats and caps,” Blocker said. “Oh, and coffee mugs that they can get something warm in and drink on it for a while ... insulated coffee mugs are really a necessity to the homeless during the winter months.”

Other items often handed out include small fleece blankets, hand sanitizer, body warmers and individually

packaged food and snacks.

The next outreach is planned for Dec. 4, and Blocker said she will start collecting and sorting items the second week of November.

“My community in Ormond in Destrehan is just an amazing and giving community,” she said. “They never disappoint. We’ve never gotten less than what we ask for.”

Blocker said she has partnered with local businesses for supply drives in the past, and there have been many people helping along the way.

“There’s one volunteer who has been with me since the beginning - Peyton Tunstall,” she said. “I don’t like to drive into the French Quarter, so he has been my driver and helper. If not for St. Charles United Methodist Church, Anytime Fitness Destrehan and Peyton Tunstall, I’m not sure I could have hung in there.”

“When I see people with nothing than what they have on their backs, that’s what keeps me going,” Blocker said. “It absolutely keeps me going.”

your immediate family, you were nurtured and supported by everybody,” he said. “A lot of different people taught all of us how to grow and become the best version of ourselves.”

Jackson joined the infantry as a 20-year-old. He said a lack of local jobs at the time had him looking to do something different with his life.

He would go on to serve two combat tours in Vietnam, participating in the Vietnam Counter Offensive Phase III and IV.

“The biggest lesson I learned from my time in Vietnam was that in order to achieve something greater than ourselves we really had to learn to get along with people,” he said. “I would not have succeeded if I didn’t get along with folks that were different from me. I honestly enjoyed serving because I was able to be around so many different people. That helped make a tough situation much easier.”

Jackson also served in two tours in Germany, and as a Platoon Sergeant, Platoon Leader and First Sergeant in the 1st Battalion, 11th Infantry at Fort Carson.

In his final assignment, he served with the 1st Battalion, 22nd Infantry as the Battalion S2 Operations Sergeant. Additionally, he served as the Acting Headquarters First Sergeant and accomplished the task of planning and executing skills testing for the entire battalion.

Jackson, now 80 years old, is somewhat sheepish when recounting the details of February 12, 1968 – the day that

earned him The Silver Star.

At the time, Jackson’s company was on a search and destroy mission near Dak To.

“Oh yes,” he said laughing when asked about the day. “They opened fire on us. I was concerned, but not really scared. I had the nerves at that time ... you had to be brave.”

Jackson’s Silver Star paperwork details his courageous actions that day.

“For gallantry in action while engaged in military operations against an armed hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam ... as the company was making its way to the top of a hill, it was brought under heavy enemy automatic weapons,

mortar and rocket fire,” the paper states. “Given the mission of destroying an enemy machine gun bunker, Sgt. Jackson directed his squad’s fire upon it as he advanced toward the insurgents. During his movement he came under intense enemy automatic weapons fire and grenades, but continued on. Reaching the bunker, Sgt. Jackson grabbed the machine gun, dislodged it from its position and tossed in grenades, silencing it.”

Jackson’s actions resulted in the elimination of the entire enemy machine gun crew and the capture of a .31 caliber machine gun.

“Staff Sgt. Jackson’s personal bravery, professional skill and exemplary devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service,” the award concludes.

Jackson said that day was memorable, but that he did not find his actions on it totally remarkable.

“We were trained like that,” he said. “At the end of the day I was just so glad I was still alive.”

Jackson married his wife Robbie in 1971 and had two daughters, Terri Thomas and Kimberly Jackson. Now a Colorado resident, he said the best choice he ever made was going into the military.

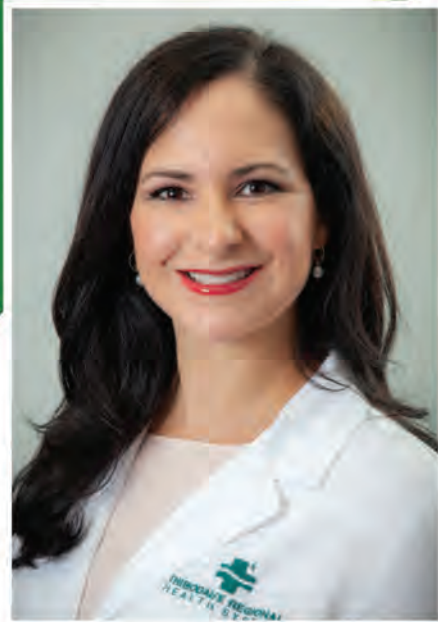
“My time in active combat taught me that having a strong military is a good thing,” Jackson said. “It also made me more firmly believe that everyone should work to be of service to our country in any way they can.”

“We’re really excited to be able to offer this to the community,” Smith said. “I know that people are wanting to get out and do something and we haven’t had anything like this in a while to do. We’re really excited to have it ... it was totally unknown if we would be able to have it up until a month ago.”

Smith said the event serves as an important fundraiser for the plantation every year, but that the funds are especially needed this year.

“From a financial standpoint, this is a big deal for us,” he said of the event. “It’s our biggest fundraiser of the year and it’s really needed this year with the cancellation of field trips and the decline of traveling tourism. This will help us float along through this trying time and into 2021.”

Coronavirus safety measures will be in place during the event, Smith said, adding all food and craft vendors will be required to wear a mask.

“The arts vendors will have hand sanitizer, and there will be hand sanitizer stations placed around the property,”

he said. “Masks will be required in lines and while coming into the festival, as it serves as a gathering point.”

Masks will also be required while inside any of the grounds’ buildings, while in line for food and while inside the craft vendors’ booths.

As a build-up to the event weekend, Destrehan Plantation is selling \$5 raffle tickets. The grand prize is the use of the Mule Barn for a special event (up to a \$5,000 value) and the second prize is a weekend stay in the plantation’s Marie Celeste creole cottage.

Tina said the couple accumulates more decorations each year, particularly after Halloween when displays are drastically reduced and other items are on sale.

“Our regulars will come in and say, ‘What’s new?’” Tina said. “And parents use it as a reward system ... they tell me that they’ll tell their kids, “If you’re good in school then you get to go drive by the haunted house.”

Tina said she and Jack have always loved Halloween.

“When my husband and I started dating, my daughter was 2 years old and from our first Halloween together we always did costumes and decorations,” she said. “We were neighbors ... that’s how we met ... and both of us would decorate our little bushes by our condos.”

Prep and planning for the annual Halloween display starts months ahead of time.

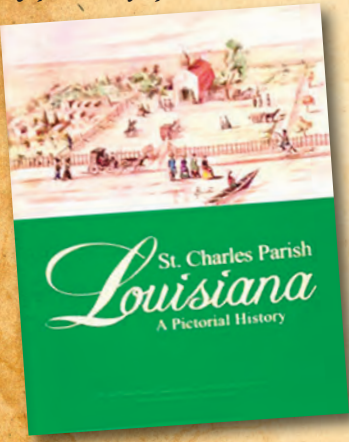

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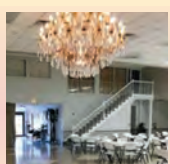

“The shelter environment can be hard, so whether it’s animal enrichment, medical supplies or procedures or transport, anything we can do to improve or shorten the shelter stay makes for a happier pet,” Lafourcade, TRIP’s treasurer, said.

Hardy, who serves as TRIP’s president, said after the group was formed in November it took months to receive all of the proper tax-exempt statuses and get all of the paperwork in place to become a 501(c)(3) organization.

“Then COVID happened, and we haven’t been able to have a fundraiser,” Hardy said. “We’re excited about what we can do, but COVID has just not made anything easy. It’s us held back, but also given us time to learn.”

The group has relied on T-shirt selling campaigns and donations to fund projects during their first year. Hardy said a local Eagle Scout also designated TRIP as the beneficiary of their Eagle Scout project.

“We looking at doing a virtual walk/run, virtual silent suction and some like/share giveaways until things get somewhat back to

normal to hold any live events involving the community,” Johnson-Cain said.

Hardy said TRIP has partnered with other parish shelters, as well as organizations such as Mardi Paws and Wings of Rescue, to learn more and facilitate more help for animals.

“St. Charles Parish has just been amazing ... there’s so many pet lovers here and every time we put out a need there are so many people who step up to help ... it’s so humbling,” Hardy said. “We’ve been able to go above and beyond. Any time the shelter needs something, we’ve been able to fundraise.”

Johnson-Cain said TRIP’s founders, all of whom work other full-time jobs, are active and dedicated volunteers who spend hours at the shelter walking, bathing and helping to socialize the animals to help get them adopted.

“Slowly but surely were making a difference,” Hardy said. “We’re definitely going to try. We just want to help the pets.”

“As this occurred, Dufrene allegedly produced a firearm and fired it in the direction of his girlfriend’s vehicle.”

Grimaldi said after shots were fired, one of Dufrene’s family members tackled him and a brief physical struggle occurred.

“The family member was able to disarm Dufrene and ultimately secure the weapon,” Grimaldi said. “During this altercation, the family member sustained minor scratches and injuries consistent with witnesses’ description of the incident. Witnesses stated that Dufrene then entered a separate family member’s vehicle, without permission, and fled the scene as deputies arrived.”

Deputies with the Jefferson Parish Sheriff’s Office and Westwego Police Department located and pursued the stolen vehicle occupied by Dufrene.

After Dufrene subsequently crashed the vehicle on Lapalco Boulevard in Westwego and fled into a wooded area, he was placed under arrest and transported to University Medical Center where he was treated for injuries sustained during apprehension.

Currently Dufrene is in custody of the Jefferson Parish Sheriff’s Office on charges that include aggravated flight from officers and possession of stolen property.

“The St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office is honored to have such a great working relationship with the Jefferson Parish Sheriff’s Office and Westwego Police Department,” Grimaldi said. “It’s always

great to work hard hand in hand in assisting with these investigations and we’re very appreciative of their help.”

Grimaldi said Dufrene will eventually be transferred to the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office for active warrants related to Wednesday’s incident. Those include including false imprisonment, two counts of aggravated assault with a firearm, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, aggravated criminal damage to property, simple battery, theft of a motor vehicle and aggravated flight from an officer.

“Had Dufrene’s family member not intervened and disarmed him during the altercation with the firearm, there is no telling how this may have turned out,” Grimaldi said. “We are very appreciative for this family member’s heroic efforts.”

Dufrene has a criminal history that includes several violent charges, including armed robbery, attempted murder, narcotics-related charges, disturbing the peace by fighting and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

In 2018 a grand jury declined to indict Dufrene and another local man. Each were charged with second degree attempted murder and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon following a Nov. 21, 2018 incident in which a man was shot in the back on Luling Estates Drive.

Dufrene was arrested in Texas for that incident after nearly seven months of being sought by police.

newborn Pubert, whom isn’t very well-received by his older siblings. The family hires a nanny named Debbie who has bad intentions – an eye on marrying, and killing, Uncle Fester and collecting his share of the Addams’ Family fortune. Melohn said that if this month’s drive-in is well received, there are preliminary plans to perhaps continue it on as a regular event.

“If all goes well, we’ll try to do a holiday themed one in December,” Melohn said. “If the community shows this is something they want, we’ll keep putting our energy into it. If not, we’ll look for other opportunities for engagement. Our sponsors have been incredible. They’ve backed us and believed in this from the beginning, and we’ve been able to do this without using any tax dollars to produce the event.”

It’s a litmus test during what is an evolving reality for the arts center, its patrons and the school system’s theatrical community. Because of the uncertainty surrounding COVID-19 and the limitations it creates, Melohn said that at the moment, it’s not known when traditional live productions will be able to take the indoor stage once again.

“Unfortunately, that’s all based on where we go with the pandemic,” he said. “The social distancing requirement doesn’t look like it’s going anywhere for the time being, so we’re kind of on standby with that. We’ve had a lot of great things on the docket for the coming year, and all of those companies are affected, whether they’re postponing tours or rebooking for the following season. We’re keeping in contact with everyone to ensure that when we do reopen, people can come enjoy all of the programs they’ve come to expect.”

In the meantime, he hopes a silver lining can be found through the brainstorming events like the drive-in that could, in theory, remain in rotation even when things return to normal.

“It forces you to think outside the box and maybe in doing so, you find some programs that could become longstanding in the future,” Melohn said. “And you might look back 10 years from

now and realize you found something the community loves to do.”

All tickets sold will be pre-order via the Lafon Arts Center website, and tickets will be scanned beginning at 5:30 p.m. Attendees are asked to arrive as close to 5:30 p.m. as possible and the event should last approximately 3.5 hours in total.

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Wildcats look to slow Lucas, Terrebonne

THS standout has rushed for more than 500 yards, 8 TDS

After a season-opening loss on the road, Destrehan has reeled off two wins in a row behind a developing offense and a suffocating, experienced defense. That defense will face one of its stiffest tests to date in 2020 when explosive Terrebonne comes to town on Friday night.

The primary concern for Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott’s defense, as one might imagine, is Jaylin Lucas, Terrebonne’s dynamic offensive weapon equally dangerous in the running and receiving game. Lucas scored four touchdowns in Week Two against Hahnville, just one big performance in a string of them: so far, he’s rushed for 595 yards and eight touchdowns. The bulk of that came in the season’s first two weeks, as Lucas had his first relatively slow week of the season last Friday, held to for 57 yards on 29 carries by the Thibodaux defense.

So it’s not impossible to stop Lucas – though if that fails for Destrehan (2-1, 1-0), you’re left with a player who tallied eight

a lot of communication that’s required. So whenever you have a player of that magnitude, it’s tough to hold him down.

But Scott also stressed that while Lucas, the cousin of former Terrebonne quarterback and current Florida State Seminole Ja’Khi Douglas, is every bit as dangerous as his reputation would suggest, he’s far from the only Terrebonne threat. Quarterbacks D’Brendon Hill and Kyrin Robinson rotate, and both represent dual threats to pass and run. Receivers Evan Oliver and Chavez Brown are among those who have made big plays downfield for the Tigers.

“And they have a big, physical offensive line,” Scott said. “They have a full complement of weapons.”

Defensively, defensive end/tackle Maason Smith is one of the nation’s top recruits, and blocking him will be the chief challenge for the Destrehan

to topple Thibodaux last week. Alongside him is Kadan Smith, fellow defensive tackle, and Tylan Matthews, both of whom bring size and disruption up front for Terrebonne (2-1, 1-1).

“That defensive front creates problems,” Scott said. “They’re big and they

Smith is another who should play at the next level.

“A tandem like that across from you means you’ve got your work cut out,” Scott said.

The Destrehan running game has been rounding into form behind its offensive line and three primary ballcarriers – quarterback Jai Eugene Jr. and rushers Razan Keller and Shane Lee.

The three complement each other in different ways. With Eugene’s ability to get outside the pocket, it makes it difficult for teams to crash down on the running backs. Keller, a senior, is the backfield’s bruiser, a powerful running back who is no stranger to carrying the ball in big games after last season’s postseason run to the Superdome. Lee, meanwhile, is the rare freshman player who gets major playing time for Destrehan, and brings an ability to stretch runs out to the outside.

“Razan has the big game experience, a guy who played in the state

championship game,” Scott said. “And Shane, it’s rare to find a freshman with his level of composure. Moments don’t seem too big for him.”

No surprise: Destrehan once again boasts a strong one-two punch at running back, a familiar sight to DHS faithful.

“When I was here (as defensive coordinator) before, we had Kristian Mosley, with John Emery spelling him,” Scott said. “Then it was Emery and Kyle Edwards with him. Last year, it was Kyle, with Razan behind him, and now it’s Razan and Shane is his complement. We’ve had a string of backs recently who come through and complement each other’s skills.”

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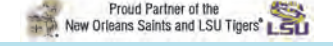

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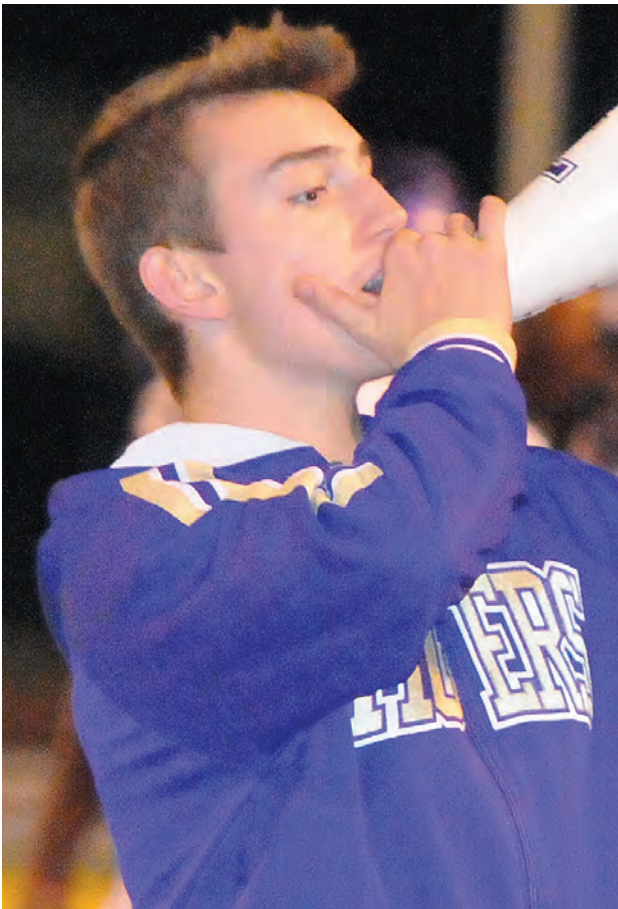
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HHS faced with tough Thibodaux defense

Coming off of its first loss of the season to an inspired East St. John team last Friday night, Hahnville returns home to Tiger Stadium for its homecoming game, where it will host a

Thibodaux team perhaps far more dangerous than its record would indicate. So far this season, Thibodaux (1-2, 1-1) has seen some struggles through three weeks – but not much of that

has come on the defensive side of the ball. THS has allowed just 26 total points this season, 10 coming in last week's 10-7 loss to district and local rival Terrebonne. It won its first district game of the season in dominant fashion, 54-2 over Central Lafourche, and fell 14-13 in Week One to McDonogh No. 35 in a non-district battle.

The Terrebonne/Thibodaux score might seem of particular note for Hahnville supporters. Hahnville (2-1, 1-1) also holds a win over Terrebonne, that coming 47-40 in a Week Two shootout.

“You look at that 10-7 score and say, ‘Wow, how did they hold Jaylin Lucas (Terrebonne star who scored four times Week Two at HHS) to that much?’” Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet said. “It’s because they tackle. They tackle extremely

well, play sound football and they keep guys in front of them to make them work down the field.”

Several players are back from last season's Thibodaux defense, including returning All-District selection Lamar Winston, a 6'2, 250 pound defensive tackle who will move around the formation depending on situation and matchup. Ferronte Miller is another playmaker at outside linebacker who also starts at running back.

Offensively, Thibodaux lost much of its firepower from last year's high-octane scoring unit, but one of its most dangerous weapons returns in quarterback Luke Alleman, last season's All-District quarterback in 7-5A.

“That’s their number one guy and he’s a phenomenal football player,” Luquet said. “The guys they lost last year are guys

starting for their respective college teams now, so he's lost some weapons,

but he's a very smart, athletic kid who does a good job throwing on the run. He's been using his legs more this year. We'll have to be sure to keep him in the pocket, be physical with his wide receivers and we have to make him make throws.”

The Thibodaux offense truly clicked in Week Two against Central Lafourche, by far the team's best offensive showing. As Luquet alluded to, Alleman has been a factor in the running game this year, and totaled more than 140 yards on the ground and three touchdown runs in that win. Miller also scored on two explosive runs.

Pooka opts out of 2020 season

The Big 12 Conference's Special Teams Player of the Week to tend to mom's health

Kansas Jayhawks star running back Pooka Williams announced Monday that his junior season is over, as the Hahnville alumnus is opting out of the 2020 season.

According to Williams via Twitter, the decision was made as his mother battles health issues, citing a need to be at her side.

“Today, I made the very difficult decision to opt out of the rest of the season to be closer to my mother and family in Louisiana,” said Williams through a statement posted to Twitter. “Family and health are the most important things to me. Right now, I need to be with my mother, who is battling health issues.”

Williams thanked Kansas head coach and former LSU coach Les Miles and the Kansas football program for their commitment to him and understanding of the situation.

“I believe in the direction of Kansas football and what Coach Miles is building. Rock Chalk Jayhawk,” Williams said.

While Williams made no announcement for his

plans beyond 2020, he may have offered a hint via an additional Twitter message accompanying his statement where he noted “I’m going to miss all my guys and coaches, it’s forever Rock Chalk.”

Were he to declare for the NFL Draft, Williams has been projected to be selected by various prognosticators to be selected, potentially, among the top 100 players, and as one of the draft's top sleeper prospects.

Williams led Kansas in rushing in each of his first two seasons with the Jayhawks. This season, however, he got off to a relatively slow start after back to back 1,000 yard seasons. Williams rushed for 196 yards and two touchdowns on 51 carries this season, though the 2020 campaign was hardly devoid of Pooka Magic before his announcement Monday – he was named the Big 12 Conference's Special Teams Player of the Week after returning a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against West Virginia Saturday.

In his freshman year with Kansas, he rushed for 1,125 yards and seven touchdowns, averaging seven yards a carry, and added 33 receptions for 289 yards and two touchdowns. Last season, he followed up with 1,042 rushing yards and three touchdowns on 203 carries to go with 27 catches for 214 yards and two scores.

Williams led Hahnville to the 2017 Class 5A championship game in a season he took the prep world by storm in Louisiana, rushing for nearly 1,500 yards in the post-season alone and more than 3,000 on the season. It represented the highest single season rushing total in Louisiana's prep football history.

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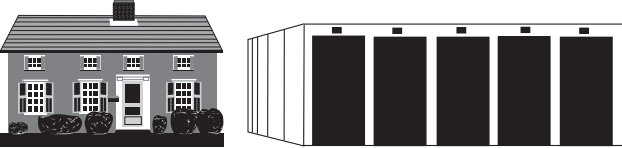
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Destrehan junior leading state in hitting, Ladycats to prominence

Off to its best start in years on the volleyball floor, Destrehan began turning heads after its 15-6 start to this season – and so has its best player. Perhaps more impressively than her total, however, is she also ranks as the state’s most accurate hitter on a heavy volume of attempts, earning scores on 42 percent of her attempts. Boyne arrived at Destrehan as a freshman two years ago and quickly established himself as a starter and key building block for the Ladycats’ program under head

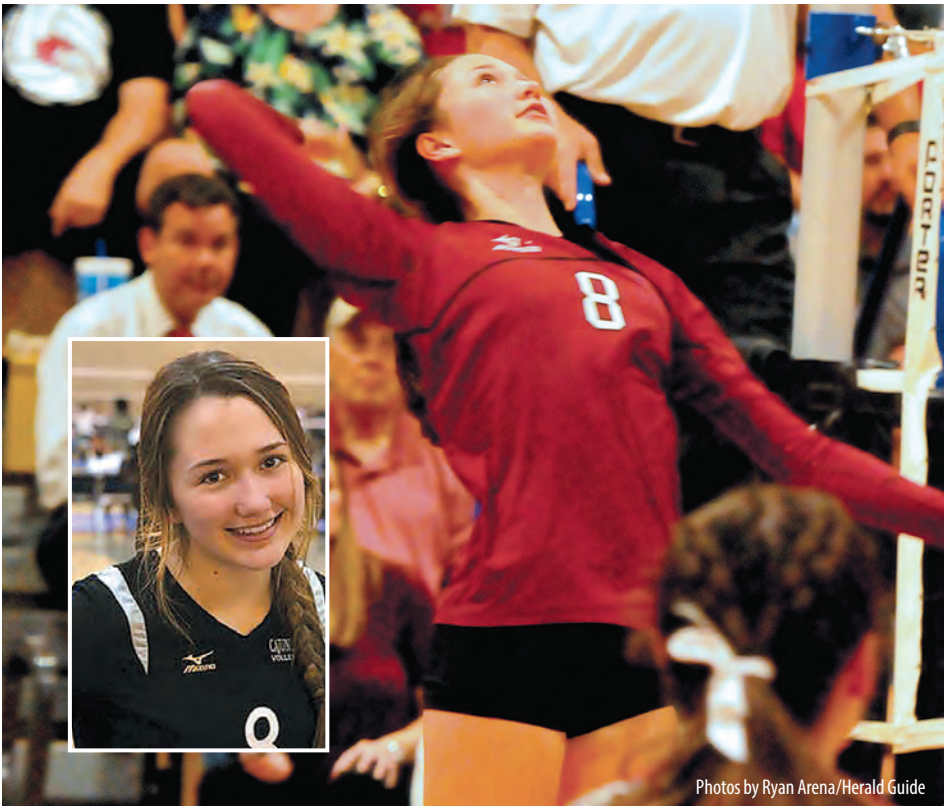
coach Edward Borgstede, who was at the time newly hired. Boyne recorded 191 kills that season, and since then she’s only gotten better. It’s been a major leap for

her in 2020, and the same is true of her team. “We have really great chemistry on this team,” said Boyne. “A lot of us have been together since our freshman year, and there’s a strong bond there. We’re all friends off the court, and that helps a

lot. It’s really exciting.” She’s a confident player, but that’s a trait she said has been learned over the past couple of seasons. While her play stood out as a freshman, it took some time for her to feel like one of the team’s leaders. This season, she takes pride in that role. “It happened as I grew up here. I felt like I became more of a leader ... I didn’t have that confidence as a freshman,” Boyne said. “It feels good to have people look to you and you’re able to help them out.” Even with that additional confidence, the 5’11 hitter never imagined blossoming into the state’s hitting leader. “I’ve never experienced anything like this,” she said. “It feels great. I couldn’t do this without my teammates, though

– all of my defenders, passers, hitters, and my coaches, too.” Making a deep playoff run would feel even better, though, for a player who began sharpening her skills as a six year old, when she started playing the sport. Boyne said she and her teammates began to sense this season could be a special one even prior to the first match of the year. The vibe was different and the excitement

was heightened. Like other prep sports, volleyball’s season was hardly guaranteed several weeks ago. When the green light came, Boyne said it brought the anticipation for the season to an entirely new level. “You could see everyone so excited at practice, and there was just this energy around it,” Boyne said. “It felt so good being able to play and to be back on the court. For me, it felt like after all that work put in during the summer, it was exciting to be able to kind of show it off. “Even when we’ve lost matches, there’s been this confidence that we don’t lose. We shake it off and get ready for the next game. Nobody gets down on themselves. We have that connection as teammates, and it really comes out on the court.”

The fees in this section shall be increased or decreased on February first of each year by a change in CIP applicable to the US cities average group, all urban consumers, all items published by the US Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, for the preceding twelve-month period ending each November. The change shall become effective beginning with the period ending November 30, 2000. The department of finance shall notify the department of planning and zoning in writing annually of the revised fees.
