Hahnville woman raises nearly 40K for teen who suffered heart failure

Meshell Northcutt calls Nicholas Eirich “a walking miracle.”

The Hahnville woman and the best friend of Eirich’s mother, Gena, helped raise more than \$30,000 for Nicholas’ family in early 2019, when the then 14-year-old was diagnosed with heart failure and needed a life-saving transplant. Eirich got the transplant, the surgery was successful, and things progressed for the better.

But Eirich, now 16, was unfortunately not done with this fight.

Approximately 19 months after being diagnosed for the first time with heart failure, Eirich began to feel sick on a late Sunday night in September. He contacted his cardiologist who

advised him to seek hospital care. Upon arriving, he received frightening news.

“They told him his body was in severe rejection of his heart,” Northcutt said. “They gave him a 50 percent chance to live.”

Shop tax free in St. Charles Parish on Friday, Saturday

This weekend will be the perfect time to purchase a new appliance, stock up on essentials or knock some Christmas gifts off the list, as Friday, Nov. 20 and Saturday, Nov. 21 have been designated as a sales tax holiday.

Louisiana shoppers will see state sales taxes suspended state-wide during those two days, and St. Charles Parish shoppers will see local sales taxes suspended as well.

The two-day event is a result of state and local approval. During the 2020 Second Extraordinary Session of the Louisiana Legislature, HB 26 was passed by the legislature and signed as ACT 16 by Gov. John Bel Edwards to provide for a state sales tax holiday.



The St. Charles Parish School Board voted to expand the sales tax holiday to include local sales tax, which will allow local shoppers to save additional money on purchases in St. Charles Parish. The board’s approval came during its Nov. 4 meeting.

“People usually shop local when we participate in the sales tax holiday,”

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Destrehan woman recounts traumatic New Orleans carjacking

When Destrehan resident Erica Thompson Broussard went to pick her 6-year-old son James up from therapy on Nov. 9, the unimaginable happened. “We were carjacked at gun point,” she said. “The behavioral technician walked James out and to the car and I stepped out of the driver seat to walk around to put him in his booster seat. At this exact moment a car sped into the parking lot, allowing the passenger to hop out of that car and into mine. He put a gun to my face.” Broussard said the incident took place in the 3900th block of Bienville, near the corner of Bienville and North Carrollton, in New Orleans at 5:01 p.m.

“I placed my hands in the air and tried to stand between the car and James,” she said. “Both cars then sped off, each going a different direction. My car doors were still opened. It was still daylight ... and there were multiple people out in the parking lot.” Broussard said her purse, wallet, James’ school bag and supplies, groceries and many personal items were in the car. “I am still extremely shaken up,” she said. “I’m feeling very overwhelmed and vulnerable. James is physically unharmed and that is the most important

Parish’s COVID test positivity rate remains low

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The most recent numbers reported by the Louisiana Department of Health reflect that St. Charles Parish continues to earn low COVID test positivity rates. For the reporting period of Oct. 22-28, the test positivity rate for St. Charles Parish was 3.5 percent. That number rose slightly to 3.8 percent for the period of Oct. 29-Nov. 4. The low rates mean bars in St. Charles Parish can continue to operate. Under Gov. John Bel Edwards’ current proclamation, parishes with a 5 percent or less COVID-19 test positivity rate for two consecutive weeks can allow bars to re-open with restrictions. Per Edwards’ order, bars must abide by the following

guidelines: bars are permitted to operate with table service at 25 percent capacity up to 50 patrons, no walk-up bar service is permitted, alcohol sales at all venues must end by 10 p.m. and must close by 11 p.m., and all seating must be socially distanced. Other parishes in the state, including Ascension Parish, were recently forced to prohibit bars from having on-premises consumption amid new coronavirus concerns and high test positivity rates.



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Krewe of Lul planning to roll in 2021

At least one parish parade is planning to roll in 2021, as the Krewe of Lul has set dates and entry fees for its Feb. 13 parade.

The first of many meeting dates for parade participants is Dec. 9, and parade organizer Debbie Dufresne Vial said she and other parade captains are excited about the opportunity to put on the parade.

“We had a ball on the 40th anniversary and we had discussed continuing to maybe do a ball every other year or at intervals and we had tentatively thought of doing it this year, but all that was scratched,” she said.

Vial said even though the board made the decision to not have any 2021 krewe royalty, they are still looking forward to hosting the event.

“I’m very excited,” Captain Quincee Berthelot said. “I believe that the community is ready to be around family and friends for a joyful time.”

Parade entry fees have been reduced for 2021, and no entries will be accepted after Feb. 1. The parade is set to roll on Feb. 13 at noon.

Captain Wanda Candies said



she, as well as her granddaughter Berklie Candies, are very excited about the parade.

“Everyone looks forward to the parade,” Wanda said. “It’s a great family day in the community.”

Captain Charles Oubre agreed.

“I know people look forward to this every year and will give excitement to the community,” he said. “Since we have been told by local government officials there would be no restrictions currently, we decided to proceed with caution and will abide by any government mandates that may develop.”

Boutte’s community college is thriving online, physical opening set for 2021

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While construction work on the physical campus is still wrapping up, Boutte’s River Parishes Community College – United Way campus has already made a splash this semester with online classes.

RPCC St. Charles Campus Director Penelope Shumaker said 59 students are currently enrolled in and taking completely online classes through the college while everyone waits for the physical location to be completed.

Those students and the large number of course hours they are taking, Shumaker said, has already established the Boutte school within the Louisiana Technical College System – while the St. Charles Parish campus may be the most recently established, it is already not the smallest campus.

“We in St. Charles had more credit hours than another campus,” Shumaker said. “Our students are taking more classes, and when we go back to classes in January there will be some hybrid classes and not just fully online classes.”

United Way of St. Charles Executive Director John Dias said he was encouraged by the college’s first semester, even if it was completely online.

“I think it’s a very, very positive report that even online we’re not the smallest campus,” Dias said. “It really shows the demand for this in the community.”

The college will officially open its doors in January 2021. The campus is a result of a partnership with River Parishes Community College in Reserve, which agreed to manage the St. Charles Parish campus if the United Way found a building.

Shumaker said while the Boutte campus is fully staffed, the addition of more adjunct instructors would mean the campus could offer more classes. Currently there are math,

English and biology courses scheduled for the spring 2021 semester.

Small spring class capacity due to COVID, Shumaker said, means she anticipates classes filling quickly.

The United Way purchased a 3.9-acre site at 13143 Highway 90 for the community college’s future location. The project will cost an estimated \$3.3 million, including \$1.4 million to renovate the 16,389 square-foot bingo hall and the addition of 439 square feet. The renovation will provide a facelift for the center

section of the building.

Dias said administrators will be able to move in their offices by the end of November, adding construction and renovation work has proceeded without any major setbacks.

“I’m very comfortable giving a strong, ringing endorsement with Lamar, the local contractor,” Dias said. “We’ve been really happy with their performance. When we lost power with the storm, they rented generators so that they could continue to work. We’re very happy with them and very happy with the progress.”

Dias said the campus’ goal is to serve a wide range of students – including people right out of high school wanting to learn a trade, students wishing to start at a smaller institution before transferring to a large university and people working in a minimum wage job looking for an advancement opportunity. He said the school’s academic and program offerings will grow each year as the school becomes established.

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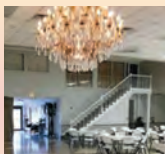

He was intubated and put on life support immediately, and over the course of the next two weeks his body would battle a litany of serious problems. He went into kidney failure. He developed infection where tubes were inserted into his chest for life support. He suffered severe muscle damage to his legs and a lot of muscle had to be removed. He developed a resistance to one of his anti-rejection medications.

“He went through a lot. He’s still going through a lot,” Northcutt said.

Through it all, he had to battle through with more support coming from afar than before – due to COVID-19 precautions, he could not have visitors as frequently, Northcutt herself noting she was at the hospital with the family for much of the initial situation, but could not be this time.

There was real fear Eirich would need another heart transplant. Thankfully, it wasn’t the case – medication adjustments and treatment over his hospital stay helped him turn the corner.

“He’s able to tolerate his medicine again,” Northcutt said. “His kidneys can function ... he’s been able to get the stitches out and start walking again. Things are getting under control.”

Northcutt believes he had some divine protection. Eirich’s father Ross, while attending a vigil held for Nicholas, came across a woman who herself had a scar across her chest from an apparent heart surgery.

“She told him, ‘Jesus told me to tell you that Nicholas is going to be OK,’” said Northcutt. “He had to go back into church to get his phone, and as he turned to walk away, he said felt this sense of calmness for the first time since all of this started. He looked back and she was nowhere to be found, like an angel. And things started improving from there, like a miracle.”

Nicholas was born with a congenital heart defect that required open heart surgery at just nine days old. He not only survived, but appeared to be totally healthy, though he has gone through routine medical check-ups in order to ensure it remained the case. It did until January of 2019, when Gena and Ross learned Nicholas’ heart was failing. He was immediately transferred to Ochsner’s main campus hospital in need of a heart transplant.

It was unknown, initially, if he was even a candidate to be placed on the transplant list due to a complication caused by his condition: his lungs were struggling because of his weakened heart, making it questionable if he could make it through the transplant. It was ultimately determined he would be able to endure it, though there were a few scares that his body was rejecting the heart.

He survived, just as he did this year. But his 2020 scare served as a sobering reminder that this will be a constant process.

“Your body is constantly trying to reject a new heart ... it can be 10, 15, 20 years and it can reject it,” Northcutt said. “He’ll get to where he can go less often and not have to live at the doctor’s office, but it’s something that

Parish Sales Tax Director Paula Jeansonne said. “Our school board members believe this is good for our local businesses.”

The sales tax holiday will waive the state’s 4.45 percent sales tax and the parish’s (government and school board) 5 percent sales tax collected. Sales tax will not be charged on the first \$2,500 of a purchase, and non-qualifying purchases include vehicles and meals.

Officials said the holiday is also aimed at helping businesses and residents across the state and in St. Charles Parish recover from Hurricane Laura and the COVID-19 pandemic.

Jeansonne said there is no penalty for local businesses who many choose to not participate in the holiday, and that there are ways consumers can be reimbursed if a local business does charge taxes.

“We understand that it is difficult and maybe too costly for a business to adjust their registers, so we will provide a refund for the local sales taxes to anyone who requests,” she said. “They can come into the school board office or email us at salestax@stcharles.k12.la.us.”

has to be monitored.”

As she did the first time, Northcutt established a GoFundMe page (titled #teamNicholas – the journey continues) to help the family with the significant

medical expenses incurred. She noted it was a particular strain as Gena Eirich was unable to work during the situation as she stayed at the hospital with her son. The fundraiser has raised nearly \$10,000, while others have contributed at blood drives done to benefit the Slidell teen, both through blood and financial donation.

“So many people have been touched by their story ... it’s amazing to see communities coming together, from people who will never even know him to others who see him every day,” Northcutt said.

Northcutt grew up with Gena, and the former considers the Eirichs family. She said it hurts to see them having to battle through this situation for a second time, and said she wanted to do whatever she could to help.

“It’s just unfortunate that when things like this happen in life, the inevitability is you still have bills, children who need you ... you still have to sustain yourself outside of this horrible incident,” she said. “I just wanted to help them any way I could and take a small fraction of stress away.”

the United States,” Odiong said. “Everyone who comes to the chapel will experience Jesus Christ through his Holy Mother. It will be a place of prayer, healing and conversion.”

Groundbreaking for the Luling chapel took place in December 2017, and Odiong said the completion of the special project would not have been possible without the support of the church community.

“I am thankful to all parishioners and friends who contributed by way of prayer, gifts and talents to building the Blessed Mother’s house in Luling,” he said. “This project is a labor of love, a fervent prayer to God for the good of our community and the wellbeing of our nation.”

Odiong said Dr. Keith Melancon – a Hahnville native and Des Allemands resident who passed away Sept. 28 after a lengthy cancer battle – and his wife Susan played a vital role in the launch of the chapel build.

“They were one of the first families to jump on the idea of the chapel ... in fact they were the first to host a meeting in their home to spread awareness of the project,” he said. “The intention was to build a chapel in honor of Our Lady of Guadalupe, but we had not given it a specific name. However, in an email inviting friends to their home, Dr. Keith described the chapel as a healing chapel. So, it is from Dr. Keith that the chapel came to be known as the Healing Chapel of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The Melancon family is one of the many financial donors of this project.”

Archbishop Gregory Michael Aymond will visit the chapel on Saturday, Nov. 21 to dedicate and consecrate the building. This event, slated for 6 p.m., is open to the public. For those who cannot attend, the dedication will be livestreamed.

Another upcoming celebration for the Feast Day of Our Lady of Guadalupe will take place at the chapel Dec. 12,



when a 5:30 p.m. rosary will be followed by an outdoor candlelight mass. All who have prepared for Mary’s Mantle Consecration will be consecrated to the Blessed Mother at this mass. Attendees are asked to bring their own chair.

“My hope for the chapel is that the entire south, from Texas to Florida and indeed all of America, will come to this chapel to pray and honor the mother of God and Our Mother because she is the spring of new hope for the Christian faith in our time,” Odiong said. “Many will come to faith or rediscover their faith and ask and pray for her intercession by praying the rosary. We anticipate an abundance of healing, miracles, signs and wonders for the conversion of



many.”

Odiong said after the Archbishop’s blessing, the chapel will be open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and after hours with permission.

thing to us. It will take all of us time before we truly understand the lasting impacts of this traumatic event.”

The entire incident, Broussard said, was over within 45 seconds.

“His therapy center were angels throughout this,” she said. “And so was a Rouses worker who was trying to get to his shift - he called 911 and stayed to talk to the police ... he even got the first three digits of their license plate.”

Broussard said she hopes that her story serves as a cautionary tale to everyone - especially women who

may be distracted with getting kids in the car – to always be careful and be aware of your surroundings.

“The police told us that this is a huge problem right now in Mid-City, especially close to the Bienville street area,” she said. “I literally just read the story of the woman’s car and dog being stolen at The Fly last week. And reading these stories you never think that it could happen to you ... well it did. So please be careful out there in this crazy world we live in, and hug your loved ones a little tighter tonight.”

“We will never be able to measure the amount of people whose lives will change because of this, but we know it will make a difference,” he said.



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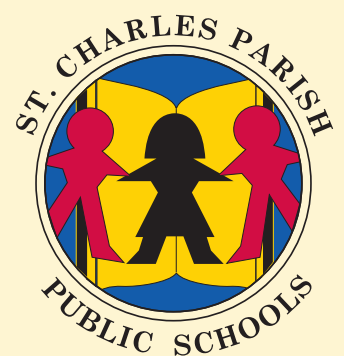

It’s Destrehan. It’s Hahnville.

And it’s this week.

The unofficial – actually, why not just go ahead and call it official? - Super Bowl

The stakes: if Destrehan (6-1, 5-0) wins, it will secure the district championship outright, with an unbeaten record in 7-5A play. If Hahnville (5-2, 4-1) wins, however, the potential for a two way shared district championship is on the

exposure and quarantine. Both were district games.)

Destrehan will attempt to keep a couple of streaks alive with a win on Friday. The Wildcats have rolled to six wins in a row since their opening week loss to St. Paul’s, and last week rolled over Central Lafourche on the road, 42-0. DHS would love to head into the playoffs with their seventh straight win, and what would potentially be a third straight win over Hahnville, following wins in 2018 and 2019.

Hahnville, meanwhile, is licking its wounds after unraveling in the second half last week in a 47-21 loss to Jesuit at Tad Gormley Stadium, which snapped a three-game winning streak for the Tigers.

In some ways, these teams are the inverse of one another. Hahnville brought back a high-scoring, experienced offensive group from last season, but a young defense full of first time starters. Destrehan retained the majority of its starters from a stellar defense in 2019, but only one full-time starter from its offensive group.

When the Tigers’ offense and the Wildcats’ defense are on the field, it will be the epitome of strength on strength: Hahnville has scored seven or more touchdowns in several games this season; Destrehan’s defense has allowed just seven touchdowns all season.

“You never know how these games will shake out,” said Destrehan head coach

Marcus Scott, who said his team began the week of practice in a business-like manner. “When you have a rivalry game, you really can throw all of the stuff on paper out. It’s truly based on execution. It’s also based on which team handles all of the pregame stuff, the hype of the game, the best.”

When Scott looks at Hahnville, he sees a team full of playmakers. Limiting any one player won’t be enough, he said. The

most successful avenue, then, would be to make life difficult for HHS quarterback Andrew Naquin – but that is easier said than done, Scott said.

“He makes it all go,” Scott said. “He can make all of the throws from the pocket, he can get out and run and he can extend plays and make throws on the move,” Scott said. “Whenever you have a quarterback playing at his level, you’ve got a good shot. He’s definitely a veteran guy who has seen a lot of different looks over

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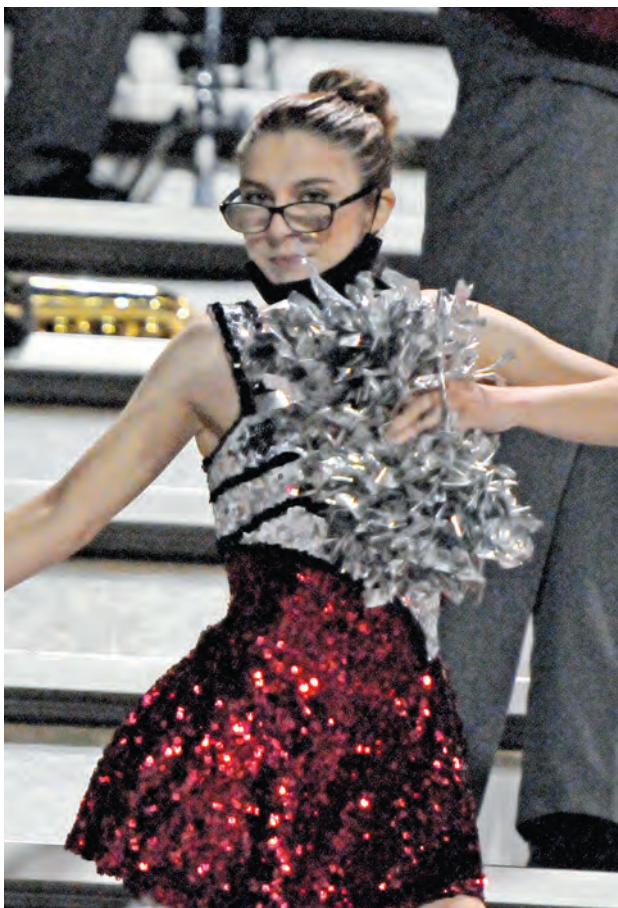
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Head coaches reflect on ‘special’ rivalry

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Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet has a unique perspective when it comes to the Hahnville-

Destrehan against Hahnville in his prep playing days. He’s experienced it as an assistant coach,

coordinator under former head coach Nick Saltaformaggio.

A lifelong resident of the River Parishes, Luquet knows very well how this game captures the community’s imagination.

“You never know what’s going to happen. There’s that ebb and flow between these teams where you can really throw out the records,” Luquet said. “These kids know each other, play against each other in middle school, in recreation ... you have aunts, uncles, siblings, cousins who have all been part of this rivalry on one side or another.

“You and I could go to work and sit at desks across from each other, and we’re friends 52 of 53 weeks. But that one week, it’s a matter of is Hahnville going to win or is Destrehan going to win? It makes it special.”

Luquet has a vivid memory of the rivalry from his playing days.

With Destrehan facing a Hahnville team loaded with talent, it shook off an early deficit to rally back

again.”

The Destrehan kids followed through a year later, winning decisively

and Gold cannot ever stray that far outside of his attention.

“I’ve been answering questions about Hahnville for a month, now,” Scott said with a chuckle. “It’s one of those things within a community that just brings extra energy along with it. This is one of the best rivalries in the country, not just locally.”

While Scott never played for either school, like Luquet he is no stranger to what it is to play in a major rivalry, and the intensity that comes with it. The former Jesuit Blue Jay remembers going head to head in one of the storied rivalries of the Catholic League – Holy Cross week meant just that much more more than other games. He’s experienced it as both a player and as a coach.

“My first game against Holy Cross was actually Jesuit’s 500th victory,” Scott said. “I was just a sophomore and at that time, I didn’t realize the scope of it until I got older and started meeting people who went to both schools and saw how much it meant to everybody.”

Ehret/West Jefferson is another big rivalry he’s been a part of – from both sidelines, as he’s spent time with each school. And then there’s the River Bell Classic from his collegiate days at Nicholls State, when it would be time to square off with Southeastern.

“I’ve been fortunate to be involved with all of them,” Scott said. “It’s one of those things that make all of this special to be a part of.”

Destrehan rivalry – he’s seen it from so many vantage points and from both sides of the river.

Luquet’s experienced it in the huddle, when he was quarterbacking

helping to devise ways to fell the Tigers while on former DHS head coach Stephen Robicheaux’s staff, and then later trying to best the Wildcats as Hahnville’s offensive

for victory.

“They were led by Nick Cannon, Ryan Keys and LaRon Landry,” Luquet recalled. “And a lot of other really good players ... to be honest, they were probably better than us. They jumped up on us in the first half. We kind of nickel and dined them in the second half and ended up winning. They were a better team than we were, but we played a complete football game that day.”

Another battle he remembers well came when he was a member of Robicheaux’s staff in the latter’s return to the team after a two-year absence – a 47-44 Hahnville win in double overtime that knocked the Wildcats out of playoff contention.

“Sergio Medina ran in the winning score,” Luquet said. “I remember that locker room and all of the kids talking, saying ‘this will never happen

and illustrating the constant ebb and flow to the rivalry Luquet alluded to.

For Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott, this will be the third season he’s been directly involved in the rivalry, including two seasons as Robicheaux’s defensive coordinator in 2016 and 2017. That said, the ‘16 season was hardly his introduction to the heated series.

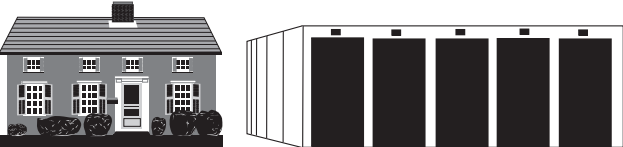
“My family, on my dad’s side, they’re from St. Charles Parish, so I’ve known about this for a long time,” Scott said.

Experiencing it firsthand was eye-opening, all the same, he said.

“I remember coming out (in 2016) in pregame, hours before kickoff, and both student sections were already packed,” Scott said. “It was already an electric atmosphere.”

From the vantage point of head coach, the Purple

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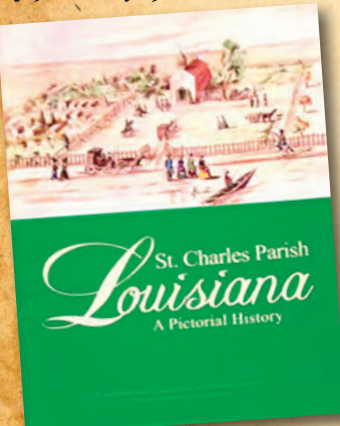
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the past three seasons. You're not going to fool him. He's seen just about everything, so it comes down to execution for us."

Running back Trey LaBranch, Scott said, can score any time he touches the ball.

"He can make you miss and he can run by you ... you have to always be aware of him," Scott said. "They have so many weapons, though, so it's not like you can eliminate him or any other one person and stop their offense."

Defensively, Scott has been impressed by Hahnville's Cincere Simmons, the Tigers' defensive lineman who has made

a big impact both against the run in his first season with the team.

"He's a really active player who causes a lot of problems," Scott said. "From the interior he has a really good first step. And he's not alone. (Chris Scott) is another guy who's really stout. Then in the secondary, they'll bring (Corey Lorio) over from the offense and you have to be mindful of him."

Defensive back Alijah Hamilton, meanwhile, is a player Scott is familiar with from John Ehret. Hamilton transferred from Ehret to Hahnville two years ago, the season Scott arrived there as head coach, so their time overlapped.

"So I'm very familiar with him, and he's a very good player," Scott said.

Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet said the Destrehan defensive front is likely the best his team will have seen all year, once the season concludes.

"Jhase Gooden, Dylan Gibbs and Michael Jackson, those guys really do a good job controlling the line of scrimmage," Luquet said.

When that front asserts dominance and creates havoc, then the Wildcats' secondary is free to ball hawk. Last week, defensive back Jaden Harding returned an interception for a score to illustrate a prime example of how dangerous the

back end of the DHS defense can be.

The most dangerous player among them is safety Tyler Morton.

"When they get pressure with five, with six, it gives guys like Tyler Morton a chance to do what he does on the back end, and it makes them really difficult," Luquet said. "The reason they've given up so few scores is everything they do is so complimentary to one another."

The Tigers' defense, meanwhile, must be prepared to match Destrehan's intensity and physicality, starting with running back Razan Keller and offensive lineman Eli Taffi.

Keller has asserted himself more and more as the season has gone on, and the powerful runner embodies the offense's physical mindset. The same goes for Taffi, who was the Wildcats' lone full-time starter that returned from the '19 offense.

"Razan was the second guy behind Kyle Edwards last year, but he got a lot of premier, significant carries in the play-offs, in the Dome," Luquet said. "He's not new to this rivalry."

"Up front, Eli Taffi anchors them ... he's a physical, strong kid. He has the guys around him playing well. He's such a good guy to have up front and be that experienced returning veteran, because

those guys rally around him. And they should, because he's a heck of a player."

Daniel Blood and Calvin Bullock are tough matchups at wide receiver, Luquet

said. And Luquet sees quarterback Jai Eugene Jr. growing by leaps and bounds week after week in the Wildcats' offense.

"You can't say enough about Jai Eugene," Luquet said. "I've known Jai's dad a long time. He's such a humble kid and just keeps getting better and better. They do a really good job calling plays to his strengths and it shows in their success."

In addition to supplying food, the office also provides utility assistance, home repair programs, emergency assistance programs and other offerings.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend Article VIII, Sections 6(B)(1), 7(B)(1), and 7.1(B)(1) of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to the membership of postsecondary education boards of supervisors; to authorize the governor to appoint persons who reside out-of-state to the boards of supervisors under certain circumstances; and to specify an election for submission of the proposition to electors and provide a ballot proposition.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to amend Article VIII, Sections 6(B)(1), 7(B)(1), and 7.1(B)(1) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§6. Board of Supervisors for the University of Louisiana System
Section 6. ***

(B)(1) Membership; Terms. The board shall be composed of fifteen members, of whom ~~two members shall be from each congressional district and the remaining member or members shall be from the state at large,~~ appointed by the governor with consent of the Senate. **Two members shall be from each congressional district. The remaining member or members shall be from the state at large. However, if there is more than one at-large member, at least one at-large member shall be a resident of the state and, upon recommendation of the board, the remaining at-large member or members may reside out-of-state.** The members shall serve overlapping terms of six years, following initial terms fixed by law.

§7. Board of Supervisors of Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College; Board of Supervisors of Southern University and Agricultural and Mechanical College
Section 7. ***

(B)(1) Membership; Terms. Each board shall be composed of fifteen members, of whom ~~two members shall be from each congressional district and the remaining member or members shall be from the state at large,~~ appointed by the governor with consent of the Senate. **Two members shall be from each congressional district. The remaining member or members shall be from the state at large. However, if there is more than one at-large member, at least one at-large member shall be a resident of the state and, upon recommendation of the board, the remaining at-large member or members may reside out-of-state.** The members shall serve overlapping terms of six years, following initial terms fixed by law.

§7.1. Board of Supervisors of Community and Technical Colleges
Section 7.1. ***

(B)(1) Membership; Terms; Initial Membership and Terms. The board shall be composed of fifteen members appointed by the governor, as provided by law. In addition, the board shall have two student members as provided by law. All members selected and appointed by the governor shall be appointed with the consent of the Senate. Of those members selected and appointed by the governor, there shall be two members from each congressional district and the remaining member or members from the state at large. **However, if there is more than one at-large member, at least one at-large member shall be a resident of the state and, upon recommendation of the board, the remaining at-large member or members may reside out-of-state.** The board should be representative of the state's population by race and gender to ensure diversity. The members selected and appointed by the governor shall serve terms of six years, except that the initial members shall serve terms as provided by law.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on December 5, 2020.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at said election there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to allow the governor to appoint a person who resides out-of-state to serve as an at-large member of a public postsecondary education board of supervisors? (Amends Article VIII, Sections 6(B)(1), 7(B)(1), and 7.1(B)(1))

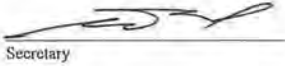

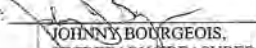
