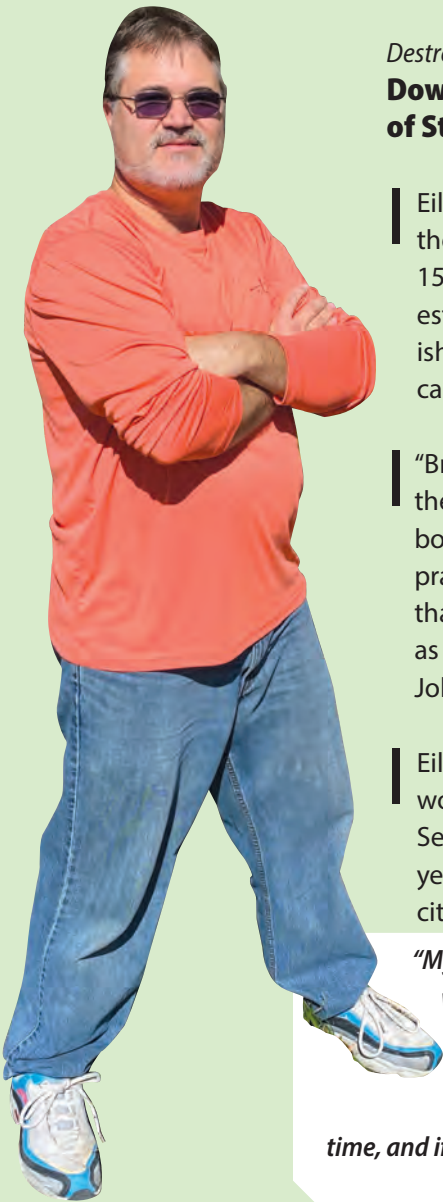

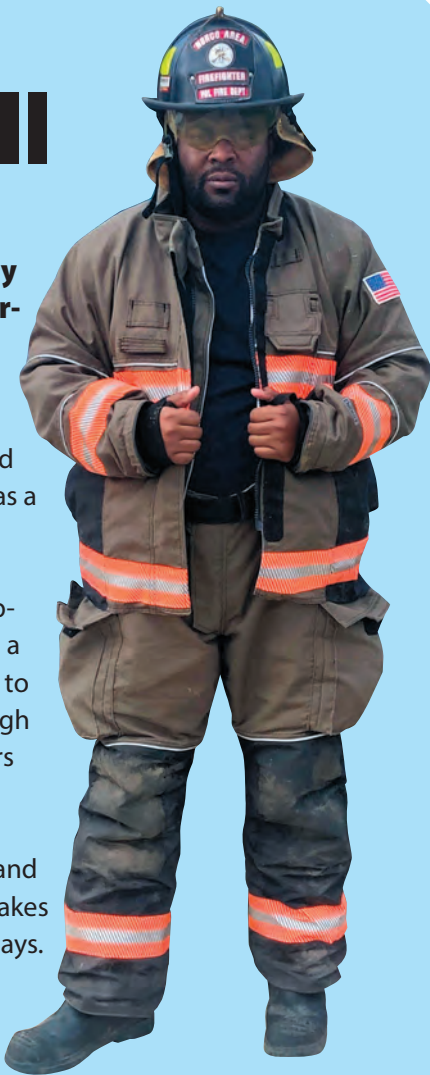
Durrell Marshall

A volunteer firefighter for the Montz and Norco communities, which he says makes him feel like he's back in his military days.



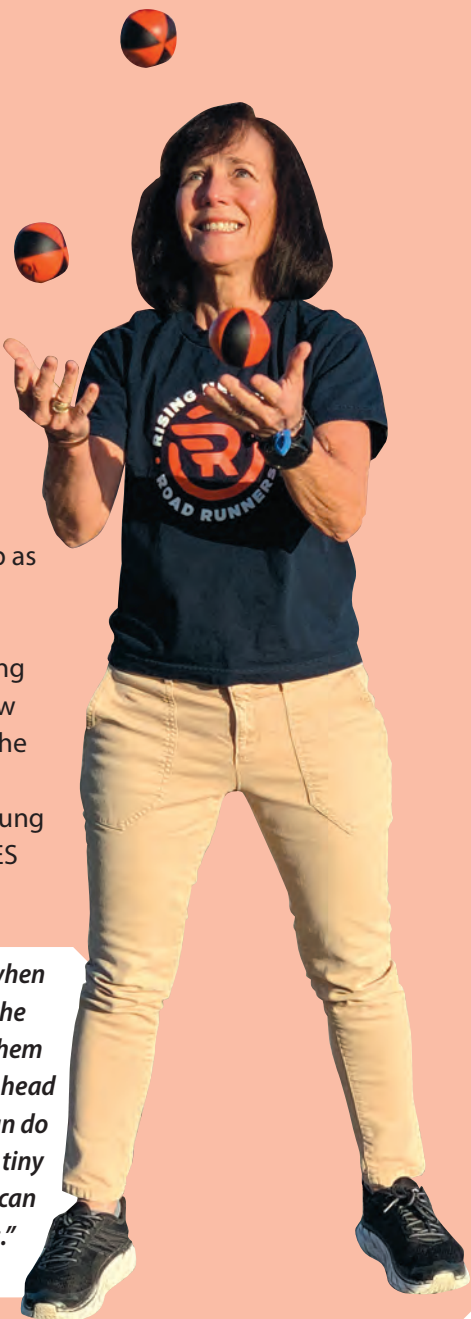

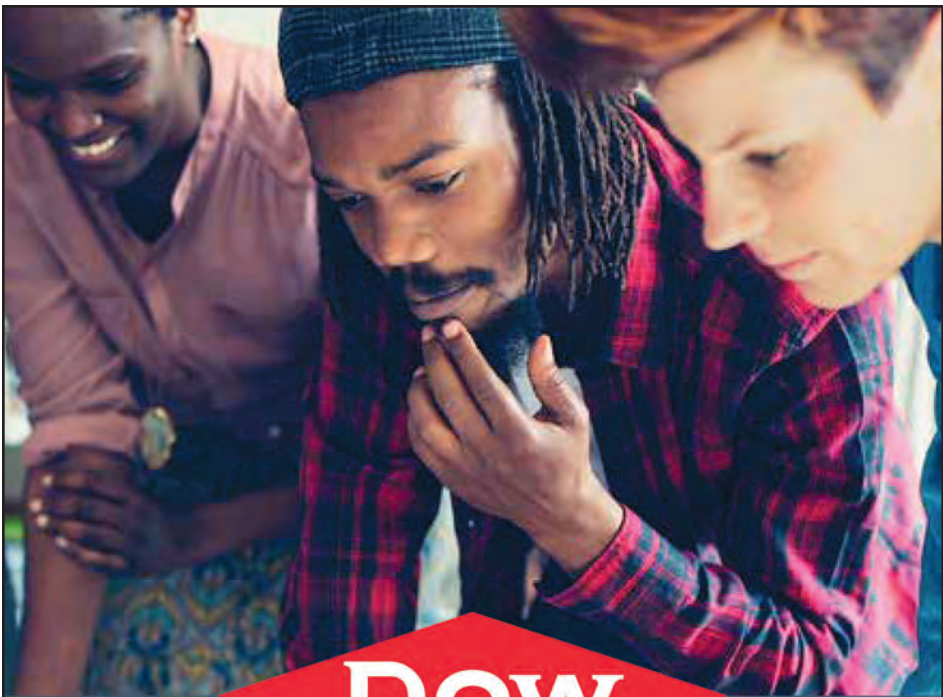

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12-year-old arrested for murder of infant sibling

A 12-year-old in St. Charles Parish has been arrested and charged with first-degree murder in connection with the death of a six-month-old, according to the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office.

The 12-year-old and six-month-old were siblings.

According to the Sheriff’s Office, they received a medical emergency call on the West Bank of the parish on Nov. 15 pertaining to a six-month-old not breathing. Life saving measures were

performed, but were unsuccessful.

During an autopsy, the death of the infant was ruled a homicide.

After an in-depth and still ongoing investigation, sufficient evidence was obtained to request an arrest warrant for the 12-year-old sibling of the deceased infant, the Sheriff’s Office says.

On Nov. 16, the 12-year-old was transported to a juvenile housing facility pending further court proceedings.

“This is an horrific and tragic situation,” St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg

Champagne said. “The homicide did not involve the use of a dangerous weapon. Due to sensitivity of both the victim and suspect being juveniles, we are unable to comment any further. We have been in constant contact with the 29th Judicial District Attorney’s Office throughout the course of this investigation.”

Champagne said at this time his office is not planning to hold any press conferences or conduct any media interviews.

Man arrested in connection with shooting in Luling

The St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office is currently investigating a shooting that occurred on Elm Street in Luling just before 7:00 a.m. on Nov. 20.

According to the sheriff’s office, 911 calls related to a male subject outside of a residence on Elm Street in Luling firing a rifle several times were received.

“Deputies arrived on scene within minutes and established a perimeter around 30 Elm Street, where the subject was seen entering the residence,” a release stated. “By 7:07 a.m.,

deputies were able to make contact with the subject and safely took him into custody.”

Officials said although this is still an active and ongoing investigation, it is believed that the suspect, a 36-year-old Luling resident, was “intoxicated and possibly on some type of hallucinogen narcotic that led to his dangerous behavior.”

St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne said this is an isolated incident with only one suspect, who is currently in custody.

“There is no other preserved threat to the public,” Champagne said. “Although some neighboring residences sustained damage related to the gunfire, there are no reports of any injuries associated with the incident.”

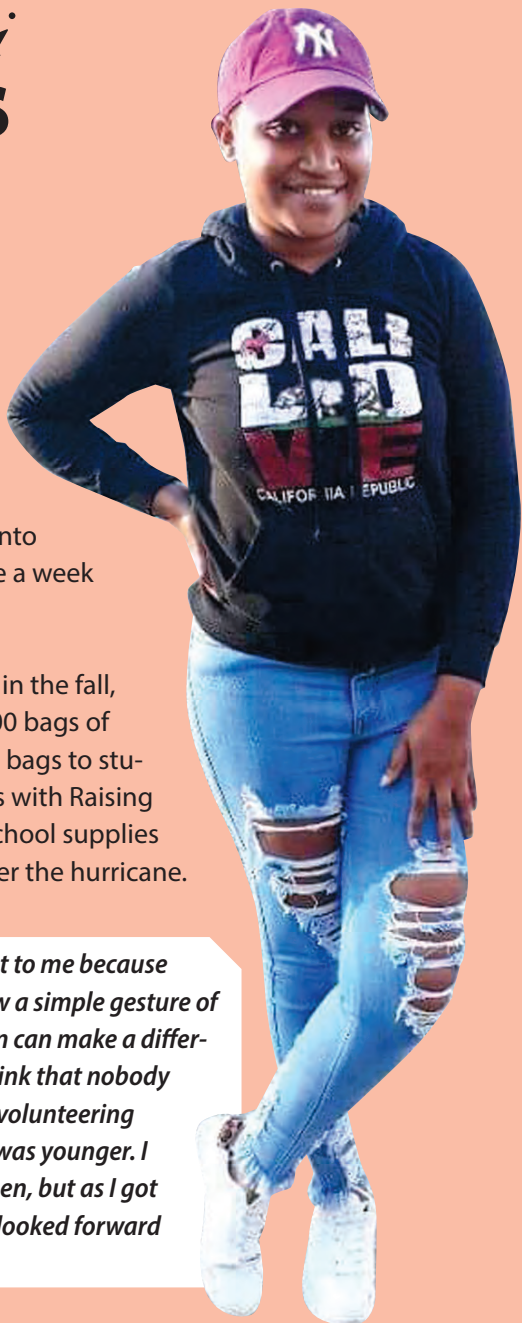

Wildcats roll into playoffs, will host Ouachita Parish in round one

Winners of seven consecutive games – the latest of which an exciting victory over archrival Hahnville – Destrehan now seeks to channel that momentum into another run to the Superdome, starting with a round one win this Friday night in Wildcat Stadium.

Ouachita Parish (1-4), the No. 28 seed in Class 5A, will visit No. 5 Destrehan (7-1) for an opening round matchup at 7 p.m. Friday.

Destrehan's win over Hahnville secured the outright District 7-5A crown, the Wildcats nailing down an unbeaten 6-0 mark in league play. The rivalry battle was a back and forth seesaw of momentum that Destrehan ultimately won led by two strong efforts by its senior leaders: Razan Keller rushed for more than 200 yards and scored three touchdowns, while Tyler Morton intercepted two passes and recovered a fumble.

It also extended a trend in a few of the Wildcats' big games this season, most notably one that played out in a comeback win over East St. John earlier this

season: Destrehan fell behind Hahnville 16-7 at halftime, but dominated the second half. Once again, the Wildcats proved to be a team that finishes strong.

“I think that's a tribute to our players and to our coaching staff for getting these kids refocused. They've done a good job connecting with our kids, making sure they understand what we need to adjust and getting corrections made at halftime,” said Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott. “They really focus on each position, then hit that reset button to where we go out and turn it up a notch.”

For Ouachita Parish, the opening round game comes after a two-week layoff. A number of positive COVID-19 cases within the program were reported

in early November, causing the team to shut down its final two weeks following a 23-14 loss to West Monroe, without a clear indication of what it might mean for the team's playoff fortune.

The Lions held on, though, and despite an unimpressive record bring an interesting profile: three of its four losses came by single digits: to an 8-0 Union Parish team, 44-41; to 7-1 Haughton, 14-7; and the nine-point loss to West Monroe, which was 4-1 before it was forced to shut down for the final two weeks. Ouachita's other loss came 24-0 to Ruston, and the Lions' lone win was a 62-26 victory over Bastrop (4-4).

“Their record is 1-4, but you can't go by that,” Scott said. “They lost to some of the top teams in the state. Their district is full of some really good teams, and they played those teams tough. All of their games were close.”

It'll be a challenge, Scott said, and another reminder that in Class 5A, a lower seeded team isn't something to take for

granted, given the quality of the classification's programs throughout.

Ouachita looks to run the football first, something it will have in common with the Wildcats. Boris Richard (6'2, 205 lbs.) and Marcell Henderson (5'10, 172 lbs.) are the team's brand of “Thunder and Lightning” in the backfield.

“They kind of complement each other, that inside and outside skill set,” Scott said.

The Lions also have speedy wide receivers, including Dearrio Jacobs, at the disposal of quarterback Zach Shaw.

Defensively, linebacker Carmyciah Glass leads a defense that switches between three and four man fronts.

“They all come off the ball hard on the line,” Scott said. “(Glass) is very active. They present a challenge.” “It's a tradition rich, very good program out of North Louisiana. We know the type of job they do. Watching them on film, they play extremely hard and they've got talent. We'll have our hands full.”

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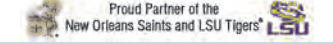

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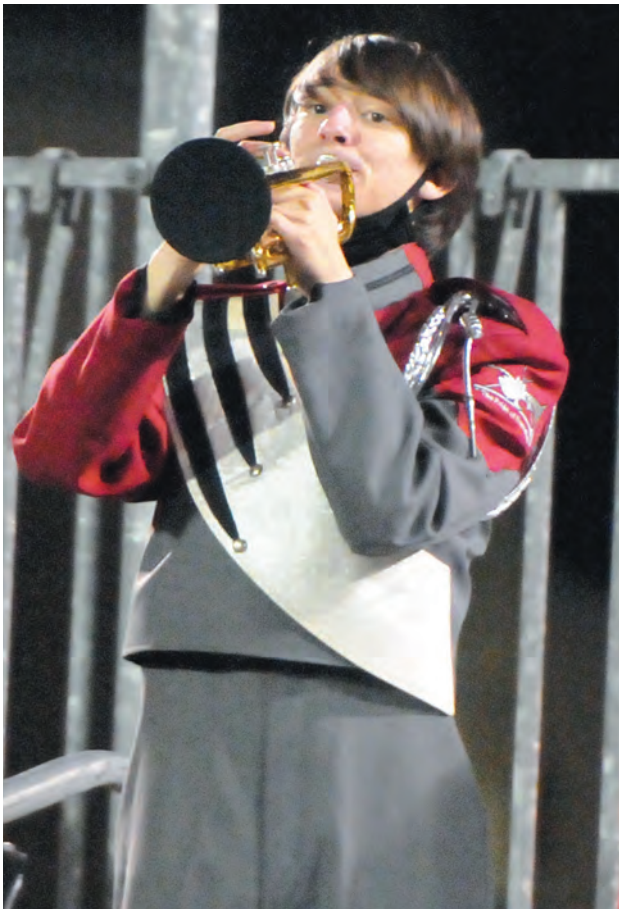
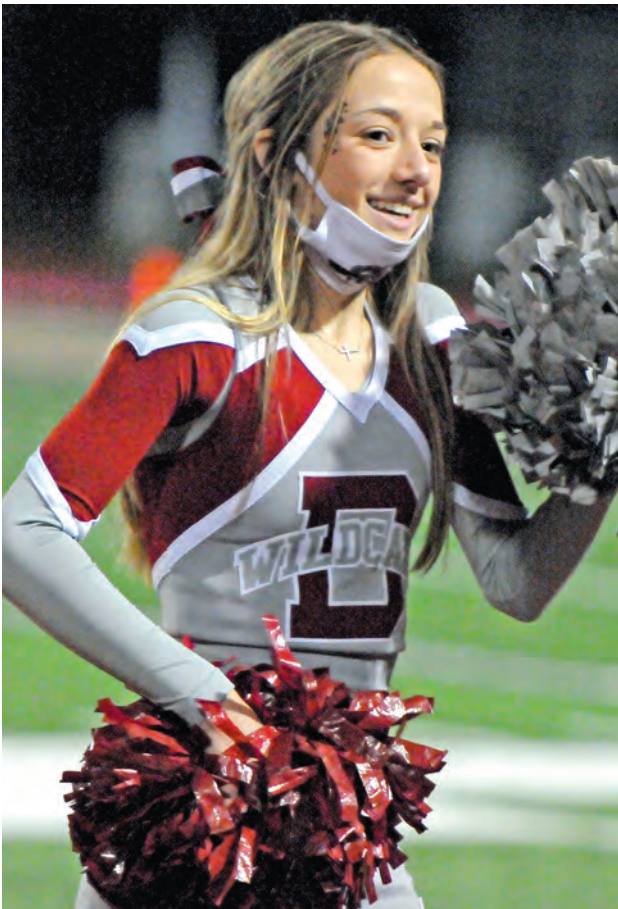
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Tigers headed up to Ruston for round one

Following its loss to Destrehan on Friday, Hahnville knew it would be faced with a road trip in round one of the playoffs. The Tigers just didn't know how far they'd have to go.

Pretty far, as it turns out. Hahnville, the 20th seed in 5A, drew No. 13 Ruston in round one. The two teams will battle at Grambling State this Friday night once the Tigers arrive following what should be an approximate five hour drive.

"It'll be a business trip, and we're focusing on that message with our guys," said Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet. "You know, they've played all of their home games at Grambling, and it's a chance for our guys to play at a college football field. So that's a new opportunity for most. We've got to have a great week of practice. We'll enjoy our trip up there, but it's a business trip, and we've got to treat it like that."

Ruston (5-2) v. Hahnville (5-3) isn't a traditional round one type of matchup, given the caliber of the two traditional powers. It's a game one might expect to see on a Thanksgiving week in a normal season – that would usually fall on the season's quarterfinal week, not in the first round.

"I don't think either of us were that thrilled to draw the other this early," Luquet said. "They've played a fantastic schedule. I feel we're better than a 20 seed."

Ruston's two losses came to Acadiana and

Catholic-Baton Rouge, respectively. It posted wins over Airline, Neville, Woodlawn-Shreveport, Ouachita Parish and West Ouachita, all but one of those by decisive margins.

Hahnville's faced a steady diet of run-heavy football teams of late, following games against Jesuit and Destrehan. Ruston will follow suit, a traditional I-formation, power running team that bases its passing attack off of play action.

"They're old school. The fullback is a yard behind the

quarterback, the tailback seven yards deep. Dive, power and some counter," Luquet said. "They run a bootleg or waggle off each run look."

Among them is running back Ke'Travion Hargrove, a senior and the centerpiece of the offense. Plowing a lane for him is fullback Devian Wilson, a 250-pound junior. Quarterback Jaden Osborne keeps the chains moving both via the pass and his own ability to scramble.

The Bearcats run a 4-2-5, putting a lot of speed on the field. Defensive end Jalen Penegar is among the team's standouts.

"They're a fantastic tackling football team," Luquet said. "They do a great job of running to the football. And with a team like Ruston that's well-coached as they are, you know they'll be where they're supposed to be."

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Wildcats best Hahnville to seal district title

All season long, St. Charles Parish anxiously awaited the final week showdown between Destrehan and Hahnville, and the action proved worth that wait.

A stellar second half effort by Destrehan proved the difference in a back-and-forth battle, the Wildcats emerging 36-23 victors over host Hahnville at Tiger Stadium Friday night, securing the District 7-5A championship – and parish bragging rights.

Tyler Morton had two interceptions and a fumble recovery and Razan Keller rushed for 227 yards and scored three touchdowns to lead Destrehan (7-1 overall, 6-0 in district).

H a h n v i l l e
(5-3, 4-2) led 16-7 at halftime, but
Destrehan outscored the Tigers 29-7
from there.

“We made a few mistakes early ... but when the second half came, we came together as a group,” said Keller. “Once we realized, ‘We’re Destrehan. We stick together,’ we came back in the second half, fixed our mistakes and just dominated.”

Said Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott, "We were giving them short fields in the first half instead of taking care of the football. In the second half, we came out to establish the line of scrimmage on both sides of the ball ... we played to our strengths."

It's the seventh consecutive win for Destrehan, and its third straight win in the series with Hahnville.

Hahnville got on the board first on a 25-yard run by Trey LaBranch, who scored at the 5:58 mark of the first quarter to push HHS up 6-0.

Destrehan had an immediate answer, Jai Eugene capping the ensuing drive with a 1-yard keeper run set up by a punishing Keller run that looked to be stopped before Keller barreled through several defenders. DHS led 7-6.

“I tried to hit them in the mouth early,” Keller said, “and wear them out, make them back down from there.”

Hahnville's next big play came on the defensive side of the ball, as Taji Sullivan recovered a Destrehan fumble near mid-field. Hahnville drove down and cashed in on a Naquin pass to Collin Zeringue for a redzone touchdown, making it 13-7 with 7:13 left in the first half.

But it was a costly drive for Hahnville, as the Tigers' leading rusher Trey LaBranch went down with a foot injury prior to the score.

Hahnville kept applying pressure, though. A fourth down sack of Eugene by Cincere Simmons forced a turnover on downs. Hahnville drove down to the Destrehan 3-yard line – a fourth down conversion on a Naquin pass to running back Cole Villaseñor on a wheel route extended the drive – before Destrehan's defense held, and HHS kicker Tate White booted home a field goal to make it 16-7.

Destrehan rolled right down the field to start the second half. Several strong

runs up the gut resulted in a touchdown when a fumble at the goalline was recovered in the endzone by DHS, cutting the lead to 16-14.

Hahnville extended the lead on the next drive, capped by Andrew Naquin's 30 yard scramble for a touchdown to make it 23-14.

Destrehan ran the ball over and over down the field on its next drive, Keller finishing through contact for his first touchdown of the night, making it a 23-21 Hahnville lead. Morton followed up by forcing a fumble, and his fellow senior made good on the turnover again when Keller scored again on a 10 yard run – and added a two-point conversion – to make it 29-23 early in the fourth quarter.

Hahnville needed points, but Destrehan forced a fourth down just past midfield. Naquin lofted a pass to the sideline, but Morton forced his second turnover in as many drives on an interception to give his team the ball back.

“We’ve been in games like this before,” said Morton. “We made adjustments coming out after the half ... we went straight man-to-man and picked it up from there.”

Destrehan closed the deal from there. The Wildcats marched for more than seven minutes, Keller scoring his third and final touchdown of the night with 34 seconds left to make it a 36-23 final.

Local educator releases debut book aimed at helping teens

Destrehan native Dr. Christie Cognevich, who graduated as salutatorian of Destrehan High School in 2002, is living out her publishing dreams with the recent release of her debut title - Depression: Tips and Insights for Teens.

The book is published by Rowman & Littlefield. “Ever since I was little, I wanted to be a writer,” Cognevich said. “I’m just really excited and proud I put this book out into the world. All throughout school I was always writing poetry, and I wrote my first novel - which was terrible - when I was 12, but I was very proud of it at the time.”

Cognevich, who teaches at Mount Carmel Academy, earned a BA and MA in English literature from the University of New Orleans and a PhD in English literature from Louisiana State University. She is currently earning an MFA specializing in creative writing for children and young adults from the Vermont College of Fine Arts.

“It’s not the first book I thought I would publish,” she said of her debut title. “I always envisioned publishing a novel first, but I think it’s the most important thing I might ever publish.”

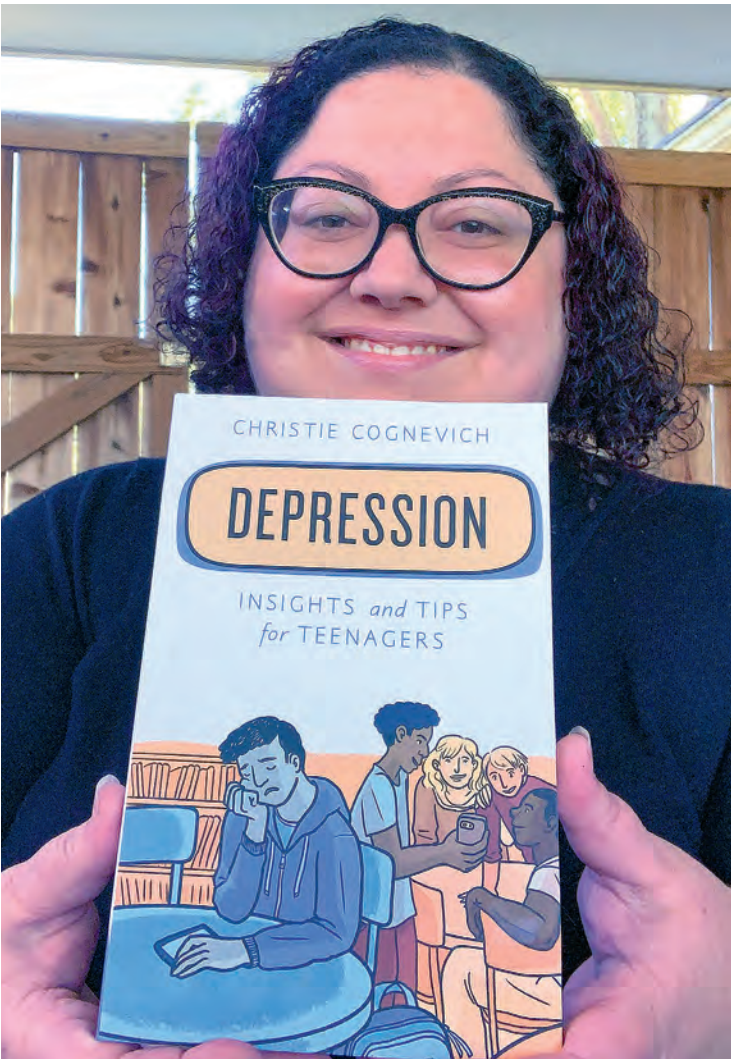
Cognevich said her book offers relatable situations and strategies to guide young adults struggling with mental health.

“This book also helps young adults who want to better understand their mental-emotional processes and grow their ability to cope with life’s many difficulties,” she said, adding the book is filled with real-life stories and illustrates a wide range of stressors and emotional difficulties faced

by teenagers. As an educator, Cognevich said the subject matter became personal as she saw teenagers struggle. “One of the things I wanted to write about or write for was teenagers who were struggling with depression or stress or really anything that was holding them back,” she said. “Especially because, despite there being many resources in place for them, it can be extremely difficult for them to ask for help.” The publisher Cognevich contacted was already working on revising a line of previously published books, and her proposal was a perfect fit for the series about adolescent empowerment. “Apparently they liked it, because I just signed a contract about two weeks ago to write a second one on stress for adolescents,” she said. “So the process begins again.”

Cognevich said while her first book was finished pre-pandemic, her second book will definitely include relevant examples of how the pandemic suddenly changed so much, and how that may continue to factor into a teenager’s stress level. She said she’ll use the same strategy from her first book for her second book - interviewing numerous teenagers and mental health professionals so that as many diverse opinions and experiences as possible can be relayed to readers.

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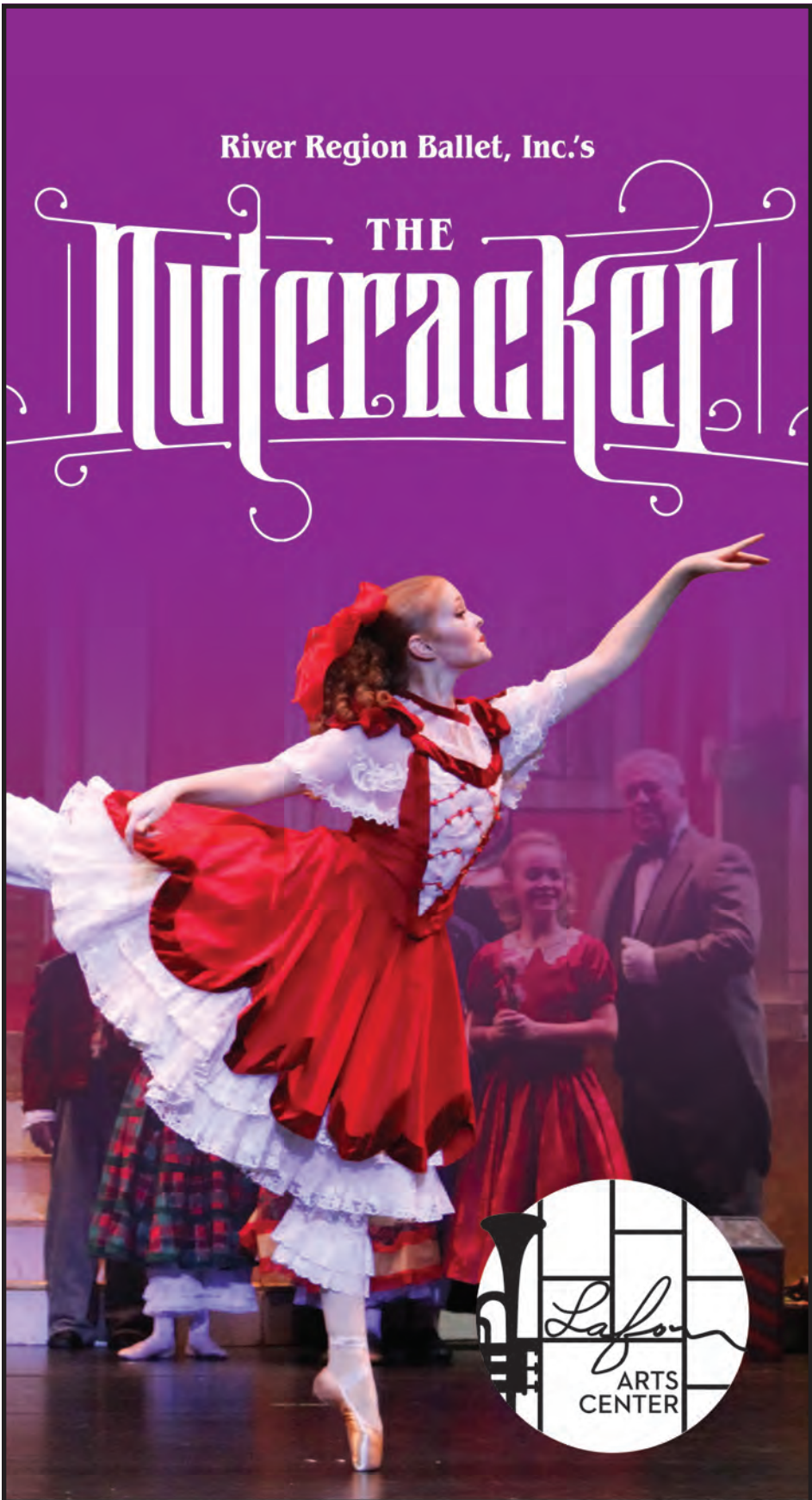

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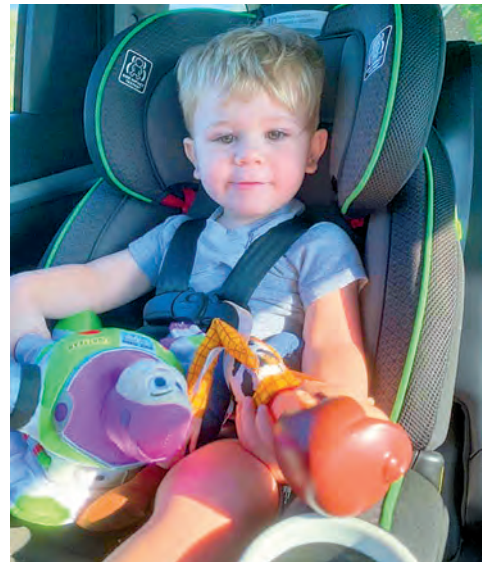

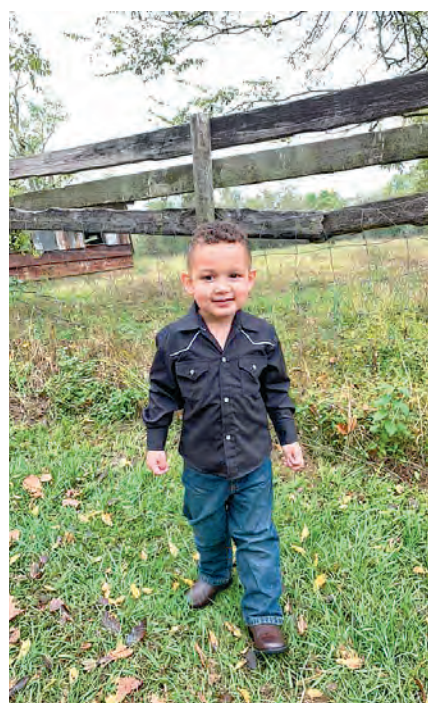

St. Charles Parish Hospital parts ways with CEO

St. Charles Parish Hospital and Terrell Neal, who has served as the hospital's Chief Executive Officer since late 2019, have parted ways.

The hospital confirmed the news last week through a statement, noting that Neal's departure is already in effect. "Terrell Neal has left St. Charles Parish Hospital to pursue other opportunities. We wish him all the best in his future endeavors," the statement read.

Ochsner said the board of directors of



the St. Charles Parish Hospital Service District will be naming an interim CEO in the coming days and will partner with Ochsner upon the search for a permanent replacement.

Neal was officially named as hospital CEO earlier this year, but he served in the role on an interim basis prior to that after replacing former CEO Austin Reeder in late 2019, following Reeder's departure to become vice president of hospital operations at Ochsner Medical Center.

Neal also served as the hospital's Chief Nursing Officer and Chief Operating Officer, roles he continued on with in addition to his duties as CEO. His tenure with the hospital began in May of 2017.

Upon officially being named CEO earlier this year, he was credited for helping to generate significant improvements in quality, experience and safety culture during his tenure, and also for supporting new services and capital improvements toward growth in the region. At the time, Neal said one of his primary focuses was on continuing to expand the community's access to high quality health care via new and existing hospital services.



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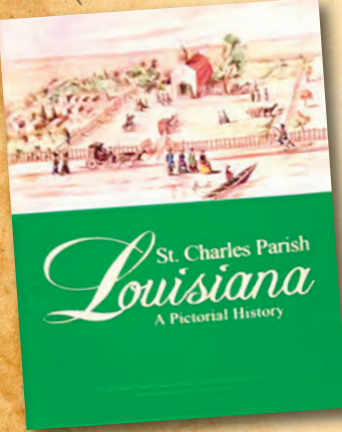


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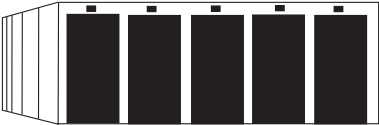

WHEREAS, notwithstanding any other provisions of law to the contrary, the sales tax levied by the Parish of St. Charles, shall not apply to the first two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) of the sales price or cost price of any consumer purchases of tangible personal property occurring on Friday November 20, 2020, and Saturday November 21, 2020; and,

WHEREAS, for purposes of this resolution, the St. Charles Parish Sales Tax Holiday will be enforced in accordance with the terms and provisions of LRS 47:305.54.
