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Frontline health worker takes first steps since COVID fight began

It's been an extremely difficult year for Peter Woullard.

But, little by little, things are getting better.

Last spring, Woullard experienced the worst fear of healthcare workers battling on the frontlines of the COVID-19 pandemic: a severe and debilitating case of the virus, which caused him to spend nearly 30 days on a ventilator and the better part of five months receiving care in different medical facilities. Though he lived through the ordeal, he lost function in his extremities and had to relearn several day-to-day tasks – the ability to talk, to eat on his own, and has been in the process of learning to walk again.

Through hours and hours of physical and occupational therapy, he's made steady improvements. Last week, Woullard was able to stand and take his first steps since he was hospitalized for

the virus in March of 2020.

"I've still got a little ways to go," said Woullard, 52. "But I'm hanging in there ... I'm not giving up for sure."



"I'm just trying to get stronger, to get back to where I was before."

Mother, daughter team up to bless parents with Layla's Angel Baby Gowns

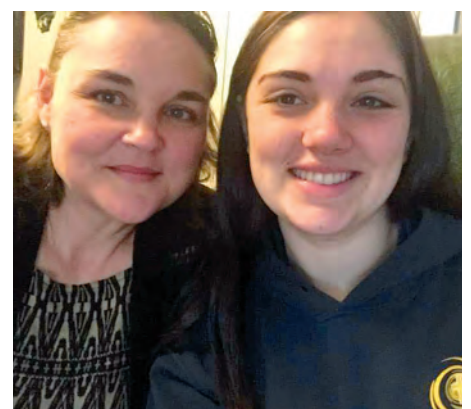

When Courtney Fasola unexpectedly lost her unborn daughter Layla to trisomy 18 in 2019, she told her mother Stephanie Comardelle Parria that she wished she had something to dress her in.

"They didn't make any clothes the size that I needed," Fasola said, adding she was 19 weeks into her pregnancy when she lost Layla. "They had wrapped her in medical gauze ... I just wished I had something else."

Parria, fueled by her daughter's wish, began to collect supplies and sew clothing for the smallest of angels.

"Layla's Angel Baby Gowns was born," Parria said. "I've sewn since the 7th grade. I had some material and I had put in on Facebook that I was going to start sewing gowns for these babies."

Immediately donations started pouring in.

Patricia were two of the many healthcare workers to face what was an unknown, scary situation on a daily basis – both worked at St. Charles Parish Hospital, Woullard as a behavioral health unit technician and Patricia as an operating room assistant. As such, both were regularly at risk to COVID exposure.

During a shift one afternoon, he fell ill suddenly – and unexpectedly, as Woullard arrived for work that day and recorded a normal temperature upon admission. But about two hours after wrapping up work with a patient, he began shivering. His temperature shot upward, and he was suffering from a high grade fever with a recording of 103.

“I called my wife and let her know I wasn’t feeling well,” Woullard recalled. “I wanted to go straight home. It really caught me by surprise, because I really didn’t realize I was as sick as I was.”

While COVID may have been a thought for him, he said he truly did not believe he had contracted the virus and expected his symptoms to recede. But his test for the virus proved positive, and the situation would only get worse as days went by.

“My kidneys shut down,” Woullard said. “It just took me over, really.”

A little more than a week after his positive test, Woullard was back to the hospital, this time as a patient. His kidney failed and he was placed on dialysis. He went into cardiac arrest, and at one point he coded – the belief was the odds were against him and he might not make it. While he battled through, he went on to suffer a stroke.

He finally turned the corner. “I was beyond excited that he woke up and spoke to me,” said Alissa Amedee, a nurse at Ochsner Medical Center in Kenner, shortly after he was discharged. “I’ll never forget some of his first words to me ... I was telling him I was going to FaceTime his wife later that day so she could finally see him without the breathing tube. It had been about 15 days. He responded, ‘Yeah, it’s been hours.’ I couldn’t help but laugh with him. He didn’t even realize all he had fought through to be there and awake that day.” Woullard remembers the people who helped guide him back to health, including Amedee, and

said the power of prayer is also a reason why he’s here today. “She prayed with me in the hospital,” Woullard said. “My wife, my family, they prayed that whole time. My Lord and Savior, he’s a giving God, a loving God and by the grace of Him, I’m still here. He was in my heart, in my nurse’s heart, and made sure I was OK. I thank so many people that had a lot to do with my recovery. One thing I know, prayers work and I’m still praying today.” Patricia gave her husband credit for showing such strong will. “Peter is a fighter. He is a miracle,” she said. “God did not bring him this far to leave him. Peter has his good days and bad, suffering with fatigue, foot pain, body pain, but he’s still pushing through with God’s help. That coronavirus disease is real. It’s no joke.” He had, and still has, a long journey to recovery before him, having lost muscle mass and range of function in his arms and legs. He suffered nerve damage in his legs, hands and feet. “I first started attending therapy in October ... I’ve been doing both occupational and physical therapy several times a week,” Woullard said. “I lost a lot from laying up in the hospital for that long. I know it’s going to take some time before I’m able to work again and get back to a normal lifestyle.” As he works toward his goal of a full recovery, many are still offering that support. More than \$2,000 has been donated to a GoFundMe page (titled Help Peter build a walk in shower due to COVID19) set up by the family to make the bathroom in their home more accessible for Woullard while his mobility is limited. As he took his first steps since his plight began, last week also marked a different milestone for him, as Woullard received his first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine, and he hopes to see many more follow suit. “Everyone needs to get vaccinated ... I’ve walked in those shoes as someone with it,” Woullard said. “They can learn from me ... if anyone has any questions about COVID, about what it can do to you, I can tell them all they’d ever need to know ... thank God I’m still here.”

“Once that part is done, we should be right about 95 percent there,” said Courtney Aburn-Reisz, Reed Foundation Program and Development Director, who said the hope is to be able to hold an opening ceremony in the early summer. The two day build event will start at 7:30 a.m. each morning. Volunteers will be limited for COVID precaution, and those interested may e-mail Reisz at courtney@edreedfoundation.org. An access road and parking lot was recently completed at the state-of-the-art park, which will offer a multi-use turf field, two basketball courts, a playground and walking path among its amenities. The 40×100 field will be able to host football, baseball and soccer games. The park will also have a Founders Walkway, where local organizations, families, groups or individuals can purchase a personalized, engraved

brick that will help comprise the walkway and be a lasting part of the park going forward. Reed’s desire to build a park in his hometown stems from his belief that it’s a need for his community after the park he grew up with was eliminated in order to build homes in the area. Ed Reed Park is being built near the streets of Turtle Creek and Preston Hollow where Reed, who was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame last year, spent his childhood. The thought is the park provides access to safe facilities, positive programs and mentors, while serving as a symbol of hope and healthy choices for children, according to the Ed Reed Foundation. The park is being built on land acquired by the Reed Foundation in the St. Rose area and its construction has been a collaborative effort between the Ed Reed Foundation, fundraising efforts, St. Charles Parish

and other organizations. The park has been a feature project of his foundation, which directs its efforts at providing opportunities for positive advancement for at-risk youth. “It’s really never been more important to have an outdoor, safe environment where you’re going to have fun activities,” Reisz said. It’s been a long journey for the park – an initial target opening date was October of 2019. Reed, who annually hosts a football camp at his alma mater Destrehan High School, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2019. He is currently serving as the chief of staff for the University of Miami football program, a position he accepted in early 2020.

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offered to hospitals, birthing centers, funeral homes and directly to grieving families completely free of charge.

“We are in need of donated wedding dresses, formals, bridesmaid dresses, flower girl dresses, mother of the bride and groom dresses, formal dress suits and pants suits, christening gowns, communion gowns, men’s vests and ties for little angel boy and girl burial outfits,” Parria said. “Also we are in need of soft flannel, receiving blankets, soft fleece for buntings, tiny blankets and wraps.”

“Because I never got to meet her, I feel like every dress I do she’s with me,” Parria said of her granddaughter Layla. “Courtney helps design and deliver the packages.”

To help fund the organization, Parria has also started to create memory bears and pillows. All profits, she said, go back into the organization.

Fasola said she has been overwhelmed by the outpouring of support for the effort from the St. Charles Parish community.

“I come home all the time and I see a wedding dresses on my porch,” she said. “One neighbor even donated a sewing machine. Everybody has been very generous. We support families who have lost the littlest of souls far too soon.”

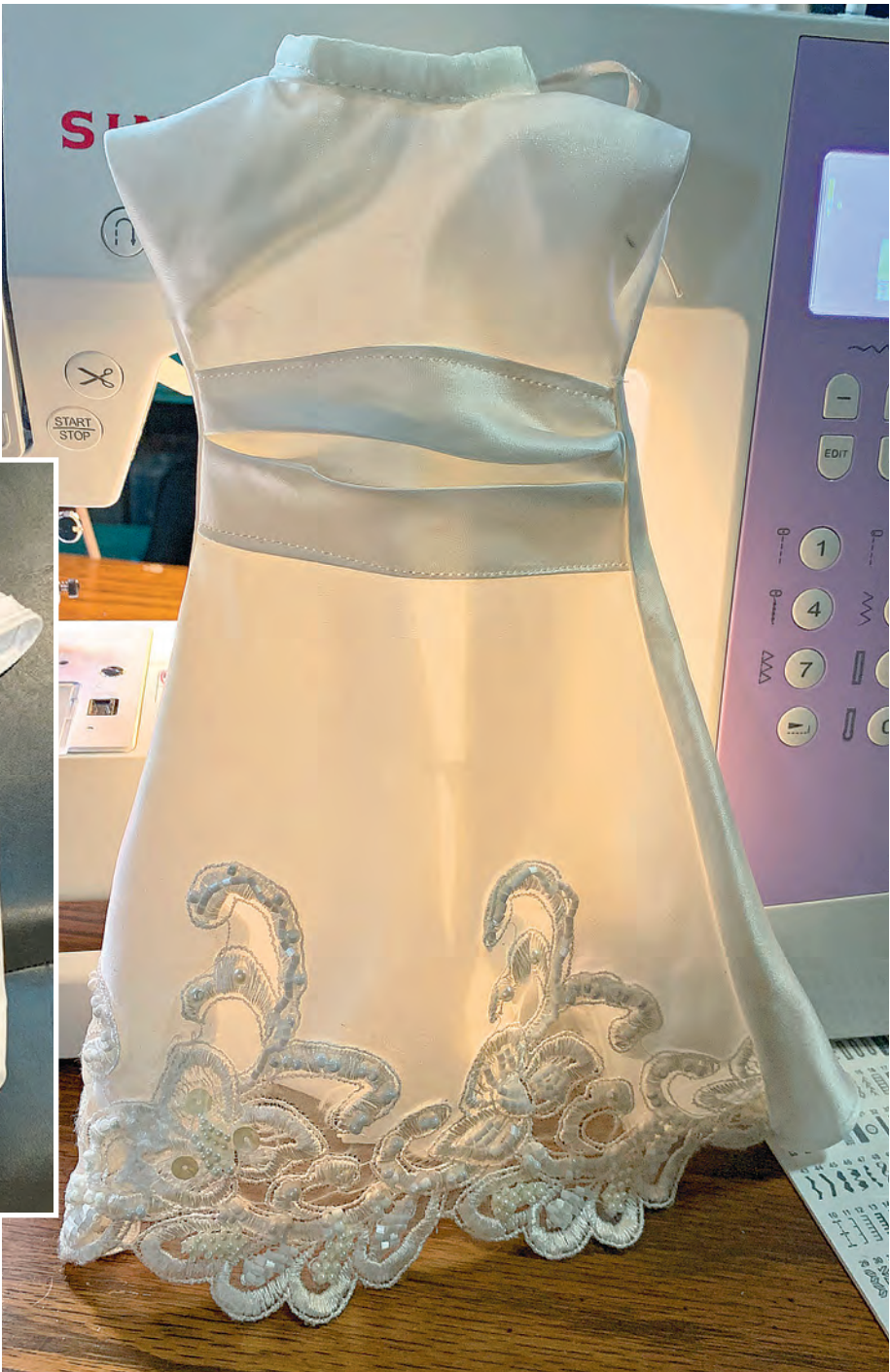
Knowing that Layla’s life is being honored, Fasola said, has made all the difference in her grieving process.

It was a banner day for Hahnville track and field on Friday as both the Tiger boys and girls teams reigned as champions, each winning first place at the annual Don

event. Kevell Byrd earned girls' track MVP honors while Mallory Whitaker earned girls' field MVP honors, both of Hahnville. Destrehan's Daniel Blood took field MVP honors on the boys side.

Both teams won their groups decisively. The Hahnville boys scored 163 points, outpacing second place Belle Chasse's 110. The girls won by an even wider margin, doubling the score of second place Belle Chasse, 224-107.

Destrehan finished third among girls and fifth among boys.

Lutcher, St. Augustine, and Houma Christian also competed at the

Whitaker has earned field MVP in several of the Tigers' meets this season, while one of Byrd and Alexandra Johnson has earned the track honor each time out in 2021. It's helped add up to a season thus far in which the Hahnville girls have won all but one meet they've participated in this season, with the lone outlier a second place finish.

"Especially for our seniors, I think having lost

that junior year, where you really start getting noticed by coaches at the next level ... people coming to track you and see you ... they all came out with an attitude of 'I have something to prove,'" said Hahnville track and field coach Brittany Bonnaffons.

Bonnaffons said the boys came through in a big way while dealing with some injury issues. A young team performed at a high level in spite of it.

It was similarly a complete team effort on the girls side, with the difference coming in the number of first place wins. The track has been a particular source of domination for HHS, where having both Byrd and Johnson to not secure individual wins and bolster the relay squads has been a boon.

"Kevell is a beast, and so is Alexandra," said Bonnaffons. "Those two girls are probably, we believe, among the top three sprinters in the state."

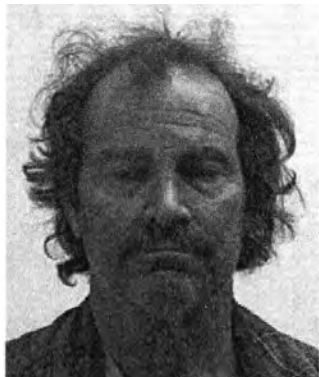
