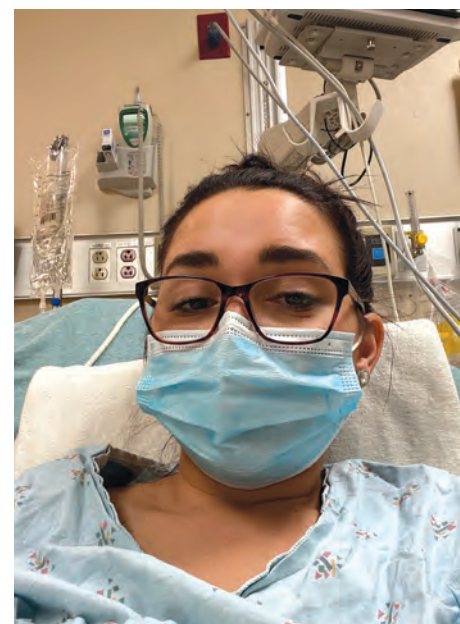
## Sudden heart problems for 30-year-old mystify doctors

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Day after day, at just 30 years of age, Kara Potts has the same unwelcome thoughts creeping into her mind.

"I feel like everyone is looking to each other, waiting for someone to do something ... and every day, I'm waiting here wondering if I'm about to die," Potts said.

Potts is on a heart transplant list and has a pacemaker installed. The latter has not fully addressed issues that surfaced in late 2019, when she began experiencing pulmonary issues and was hospitalized. She has been diagnosed with chronic respiratory failure, tachycardia, bradycardia, sic sinus, asthma,

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# Hahnville 5-year-old battles rare neurological disorder

The lives of Maria Strickland and her 5-year-old daughter Morghan changed drastically in February, the two taking a turn down an uncommon and at times scary path due to a condition that mystifies even the experts.

Morghan, a Luling Elementary kindergartener and nicknamed Moogie, was recently diagnosed with functional neurological disorder (FND), in which there is a problem with the functioning of the nervous system and how the brain and body sends or receives signals. It can involve a wide variety of symptoms, including but not limited to limb weakness and seizures.

Strickland said Morghan’s plight began with a seizure in February, although it wasn’t officially classified as such.

“The EMT came out and did an EEG (a test detecting electrical activity in

# New logistics hub development coming to Luling

A new 200-acre master-planned light industrial distribution park is coming to the West Bank of St. Charles Parish.

Construction of Phase I of the Luling Business Park and Enterprise Center – a 250,000 square foot Class A distribution building – is slated to start in late 2021. The project will be located at 260 Judge Edward Dufresne Parkway.

The development was recently announced by Rio Morado, L.L.C.. The company is a locally owned company of the Besthoff family, which has a long history of property development in the Metro New Orleans area.

Virginia Saussy, a communications consultant for the project, said the Luling site was strategically picked by the developer for its proximity to the Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport, its interstate highway connections to New Orleans and Baton Rouge markets and the pro-business reputation of St. Charles Parish.

“The Luling Business Park and Enterprise Center will further diversify our economy and bring job opportunities for local residents while providing much-needed Class-A distribution space for the region as on-line ordering and drop-shipping ventures continue to grow exponentially,” St. Charles Parish President Matthew Jewell said. “We welcome the Besthoff family to our parish with open arms and wish them much success in this endeavor.”

Besthoff family spokesperson Andrew Marcus said the site’s new building will offer over 1 million square feet of flexible distribution space.

“After extensive due diligence, we believe this is the best possible development site for distribution in the region, and St. Charles Parish has been great to work with through the whole process,” he said.

# Small business owners welcome end of mask mandate

In accordance with Gov. John Bel Edwards’ recent executive order, St. Charles Parish President Matthew Jewell announced last week that the mask mandate in St. Charles Parish has been lifted and that businesses now retain the authority to require masks for their employees and patrons.

The news was welcomed by many small business owners across the parish.

“We are glad to see the mask mandate being lifted and we are optimistic that fewer restrictions, along with the availability of the vaccine for those who choose to receive it, will lead to people being able to enjoy themselves again,” Ron St. Pierre, an operating partner at Truck Farm Tavern in St. Rose, said. “We will not require customers or employees to wear masks. # Mother who lost son to gun violence aims to help others with ministry, book

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Monica Brown Coleman has lived every mother’s worst nightmare - her only son, Jared Mealey, was brutally murdered in St. Rose nearly nine years ago.

“I am a Christian and I pray about a lot of things,” Coleman said. “But I was like, ‘God, I don’t know what to do with this ... this is overwhelming. It was so rough ... I literally thought I was losing my mind and at one point I think I really did.’”

Coleman’s journey of grief eventually led her to start her own ministry - God Still Cares. Her goal is to reach out to other parents who have lost children.

“It started when I thought, ‘What can I do for people? What have people done for me in my process?’” Coleman said crying as she recounted the generosity shown to her during the most difficult time in her life.

As a part of God Still Cares, Coleman puts together a package of various items, each one that was important to her in her grief journey. A candle is included for illumination on particularly dark days, as is a picture frame that allows parents to display their child’s photo. A journal is also included.

“Those were the things that were given to me,” Coleman said. “It took my about a year to be able to look

Jarrow said Patterson was exactly who he needed to talk to that day.

“She just sat there and she listened,” Jarrow said. “After that she hugged me and held me .... she gave me so much reassurance. I knew I would be OK after that. It’s important to remember that everybody is going through something - big or small.”

Patterson said she advised Jarrow the best she could but felt that he really needed prayer more than advice.

“We prayed together and agreed that God was in control,” Patterson said. “We hugged and then parted ways.”

Jarrow said that the interaction changed his day, and that it’s important to believe in the inherent goodness of people.

“The only thing the media is posting about is when a white cop kills someone who is black,” he said. “The media is pushing that out there and it is causing so much hate. Too many cops are getting killed and too many civilians are getting killed ... everybody just needs to respect everybody.”

As for Patterson, she believes meeting Jarrow was a divine appointment.

“Coincidences don’t just happen, God does,” she said. “I believe that it was God’s plan for our paths to cross, because I needed that moment just as much as he did. I ask that every God believing person, regardless of faith, please say a prayer for Mr. Jarrow because God has big plans for him.”

those years, so when I came back from the service I asked and she said ‘yes.’”

Lillian said the best part about raising their family in St. Charles Parish was teaching their children how to live off the land and be self-sufficient.

“You couldn’t just go buy what you needed, so you grew it,” she said. “I knew my kids were safe ... it’s different out here than in a big city.”

Howard always had a huge garden in their backyard, and Lillian said they would keep what they needed, sell what they didn’t need or trade for what they didn’t have.

The Savoies have two children, four grandchildren, three great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. They said their determination has been their relationship’s strength, and that their advice to younger couples would be to not give up.

“Life is difficult, and it definitely won’t go as planned,” Lillian said. “It takes more than just love.”

Howard echoed his wife’s sentiments.

said his grandparent’s marriage is a model for what everyone should use to ensure a life-long relationship.

“They are two of the most caring, loving and giving people I have ever known,” he said. “They are always wanting to give to community members, friends and even strangers. Howard said all the hard work he and Lillian have put into their marriage has been worth it.

parent by Principal Brian Lumar,” the statement read. “During the course of the investigation, it was learned that Lumar and the parent/victim had arranged a meeting on March 31, 2021, to discuss matters related to the student.”

According to the statement, the parent told police that after she arrived in the reception area of the principal’s office, she was advised by Lumar to leave the reception area and re-directed to meet him in another private office location on school grounds.

It was during that meeting, the parent said, that Lumar allegedly committed a sexual battery against her, without her consent, and she left the school’s campus.

“During the course of the investigation, detectives were able to corroborate the victim’s statement through sufficient evidence, and thereafter an arrest warrant was obtained from a 29th Judicial District Court Judge,” the police statement read.

The Sheriff’s Office said Lumar was contacted on May 3 and informed of the active warrant issued for his arrest. Shortly before 6 p.m. he turned himself in and he was booked into the Nelson Coleman Correctional Facility.

Sheriff Greg Champagne also thanked the St. Charles Parish School Board and Superintendent Ken Oertling for fully cooperating with police throughout the investigation.

According to the Sheriff’s Office, Lumar has been charged with Louisiana Revised Statute 14:43.1.1 relative to misdemeanor sexual battery, which is ‘the intentional touching of the breast or buttocks of the victim by the offender using any instrumentality or any part of the body of the offender, directly or through clothing.’”

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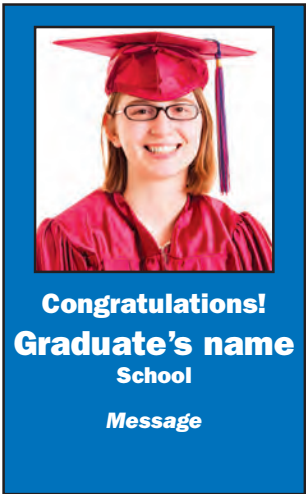

anemia, and sodium deficiency. She also has two valves that leak blood back into her lungs. While the pacemaker worked for a brief time to alleviate her symptoms, chest pain in December of last year necessitated another trip to the emergency room, where blood clots in her lungs and legs were discovered.

Her heart rate regularly and habitually spikes to over 170 beats per minute – she notes her body reacts as if she is working out at a gym all day, every day, and it creates severe fatigue.

“I don’t want anyone else to have to fight so hard for their health and their life like I have,” said Potts. “I feel like I’m at the point where I’m just surviving, and not even really living my life.”

Financially, it’s crippling. Potts, a single mother of two, is taking medication for her heart that costs \$1,200 for a month’s supply, and she says her insurance will not cover it. She has to wear customized compression hose, which are nearly \$500 a pair. Her insurance rates have gone up as well.

“They say when she has congestive heart failure, they will approve it,” said Potts’ mother Ronda, a Hahnville resident who created a GoFundMe page (titled “Help with Kara’s achy breaky heart”). “By then, it will be too late.”

Potts, who lived in Destrehan for years before moving to her current home in Texas, said her unwanted and difficult journey began on an October night in 2019 where she was home alone and began to feel like she was having a heart attack.

“I couldn’t breathe. I couldn’t move, and I was very scared,” she said.

A visit to the doctor and a cardiogram showed she had indeed suffered a minor heart attack, along with pulmonary hypertension and vocal chord dysfunction – the latter meaning when Potts tries to exhale, she cannot because her throat restricts it. Her heart rate climbed to 145, and she and the doctors could not get it to go down. An EKG revealed electrical signal issues in her heart, and she spent the week in the hospital. A month long measurement recorded over 2,000 missed or skipped heartbeats.

Her doctors were perplexed – and at least one, she said, was skeptical.

“The first thing he told me, as soon as he walked in, was ‘I think you have anxiety. I think this is in your head and I think you need to see a psychiatrist,’” Potts recalled. “He handed me a referral to see one ... I mean, that will shut you down real quick. I felt like he didn’t care enough about me to listen.”

It was enough for her to determine she would not be seeing him again, but she still needed answers – and fast. A stress test at a subsequent doctor’s visit saw her heart rate spike to 210. She sat down, but they could not get her heartrate under 147 for eight minutes, and the doctor ordered more tests.

“I saw six different cardiologists, and a few of them said ‘This is all in your head,’” Potts said.

Her situation accelerated on Aug. 11 of

2020. Her blood pressure bottomed out and she was admitted for hospital care, but no true solution was found.

After forwarding her records to a cardiologist in Houston – one she trusted enough to drive for four hours to meet for appointments – however, the message changed.

“He immediately had me come down. He told me we need to get you a pacemaker before this kills you,” Potts said. “(They’re) just waiting for you to die before doing anything.”

By September, the pacemaker was implanted and Potts noticed a difference.

“She called and told me she could instantly tell a difference and was excited that she felt better,” Ronda said. “It was life changing ... Kara was thrilled that she was able to resume her life. She looked healthy again.”

It was fleeting. That December, she began suffering chest pain again. By February, her cardiologist told her he had done all he could for her, short of putting her on the transplant list, which he did.

“I don’t want to have a heart transplant if I don’t have to,” Potts said. “It’s on the list of potential outcomes, but hopefully the last resort. I don’t want to do that at 30.

“I’ve seen so many doctors and been diagnosed with so many things ... and the one thing nobody can figure out is how it’s all tied together.”

She said her doctor has sent her a six-week supply of a new heart medication, but thus far it hasn’t worked.

“He has one more thing he wants to try ... he says my heart is like a 70-year-old’s when it comes to electrical function, though,” Potts said. “It’s so frustrating. Day to day, people look at you and don’t know what you’re dealing with because you don’t look unhealthy. But mentally, physically, this wears on you.”

labeled as a ‘seizure-like activity,’” Strickland said.

Issues began developing from there. Morghan’s behavior began to change at times in unpredictable ways.

“She started acting strange,” Strickland said. “She would be barking like a dog. One day she’s a dog, one day she’s a cat, one she’s a robot ... the neurologist said it’s hard to explain, because there is no absolute explanation for it. It’s so rare there’s not a lot

care for Morghan.

The latter point is one reason Strickland began a GoFundMe recently (titled Functional Neurologic Disorder) – unable to work, her income has been limited, but more specifically the page is aimed at purchasing specialized equipment to make Morghan’s environment safer – a pediatric wheelchair, tub support and a supportive bed with railings, as well as an outside supportive ramp.

It would help Strickland’s peace of mind for more than one reason, though there are difficulties those items cannot address. Strickland suffers from sickle cell anemia, and there are certain situations where she simply cannot help her daughter – if she has an attack while in the tub, she wouldn’t be able to pick her up, she would simply have to drain the water and wait.

Strickland said she, as well as Morghan’s doctors, are unsure of what, if anything specifically, triggers an episode.

known about it. Whatever her brain is doing, her body is reacting to what it’s telling her.”

But the fallout from Morghan’s first seizure event carried on past those quirks. She would have more seizures, and episodes where she would lose the ability to walk, to feel, talk or touch. She lost a tooth due to one attack. In essence, Morgan completely locks up.

“Sometimes it’s 30 seconds. Sometimes it lasts all day,” Strickland said. “When she comes out of it, it’s like it was, my daughter and I talking ... I can hear her voice. It might be two hours later when she has the ability to walk again.”

It’s been a lot to absorb for the two of them.

“All of this is new to me,” Strickland said. “It was very scary at first. We’re learning how to manage it ... when it first began, I called the police, the fire department so many times. I panicked, and I become a different person when I panic. They would ask me questions ... and I just couldn’t answer them. ‘I don’t know.’ ‘I don’t know what this is.’”

A tough element for Morghan has been separation from her friends each day in school, as she has had to remain home from Luling Elementary since February. One attempt to return ended immediately when she suffered an attack.

“That’s so stressful,” Strickland said. “Every time we leave the doctor’s office, she asks me, ‘Can I go back to school now?’ I have to tell her no, not yet.”

Strickland said plans are being formed as to how Morghan can safely return to class, but until that is worked out, she will remain at home, as will her mother – Strickland has had to withdraw from work to stay with and

“We’re trying to figure it out. It could be lights, it seems like sometimes,” Strickland said. “She was by a certain game at Chuck E. Cheese and the lights started circulating ... we had to call the EMT. She went into an episode and wasn’t coming out.”

Part of that uncertainty is due to the fact that the condition has been historically relatively overlooked by both clinicians and researchers. Conventional tests like MRI brain scans and EEGs come back as “normal” for patients with FND – hence the label upon Morghan’s “seizure-like activity” after her first incident. Up until recently, it was dismissed in some circles as being psychological, or a situation where repressed trauma or stress is converted into a physical symptom.

It is now understood that FND is a legitimate cause of disability and distress and is a disorder of the nervous system functioning, and that how it manifests varies from person to person. It’s exact prevalence is unknown, as are the causes.

What is known is that it is rare in children under 10 years old – making Morghan’s situation highly uncommon.

The good news is there are encouraging studies that support the potential reversibility of the disorder through treatment, in effect “retraining” neurological pathways.

Strickland sighed.

“It’s going to take time. It just is,” she said. “Her personality is still here. Her understanding is there. But when she goes into an attack, and she can’t do anything, it just breaks my heart.”

“These arrests were a result of a joint investigation with the Louisiana Bureau of Investigation and Homeland Security Investigations,” Cory Dennis, a Louisiana Attorney General Office spokesperson, said.

Schmill and Wall were booked into the St. Charles Parish Correctional Center, and Judge Connie Aucoin of the 29th Judicial District set a \$50,000 bond on each arrestee.

Schmill bonded out on April 21, and Wall bonded out on April 23.

April Ball, manager of Taste of Tokyo in Destrehan, also was happy to hear about the lifted mandate.

“Many of our customers were very ready,” she said. “I don’t know that the mandate lift will improve business ... I don’t think people were letting the masks keep them from going out and doing what they wanted and needed to do, but I know it will make them more comfortable.”

Ball said her restaurant will not require customers to wear a mask, but that the establishment’s employees will still be wearing theirs.

Nealie Savoie, who owns Luling’s Cherry Lane Boutique with her sister Angelle LeBlanc, said she and her employees will continue to respect the masking practices of their customers.

“Either way we’ll respect our customers,” she said. “If someone comes in with their mask on and they choose not to take theirs off, we’ll mask up as well.”

Savoie said she’s personally happy that people will have a choice whether they choose to mask up, but that the store would continue to cater to shoppers who may not be comfortable being without a mask.

“We have customers who come often who have immunity issues or cancer and we mask up for their safety,” she said. “We want them to feel safe and comfortable shopping with us.

Based on the Edwards’ order, masks are still required on public transit, in K-12 schools, colleges and health care facilities. State buildings such as the DMV will also continue to adhere



to mask wearing and social distancing.

The mask mandate is lifted for all St. Charles Parish government buildings, including the courthouse. Additionally, temperature checks will no longer be required to enter government buildings.

Masks are still required in parish courtrooms per orders by the 29th Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Charles.

Due to the size of the parish council chambers and the inability to properly social distance, masks will still be required during meetings taking place in the council chambers.

at a photo of him though. Some parents can and some can’t. It’s different for everyone.”

Coleman said her ministry started and then eventually grew organically.

“It started out as word of mouth because I couldn’t even watch the news for a while,” Coleman said. “I would have people who would call and tell me about friends they knew who lost a child, so I would get their address and drop it off ... so many people are losing their kids to violence.”

Coleman said reaching out to people in their darkest days – days she unfortunately understands – has been difficult yet rewarding.

“I truly feel the pain,” she said crying. “I truly feel the pain. All I can do it give them the benefit of my experience.”

The practice of journaling was particularly helpful and therapeutic for Coleman in her grieving process.

“When you’re in grief you want to say things, but you can’t,” she said. “But the writing really took me out of that

zone. There were times when the grief was so profound that I didn’t know what to say, but I could write it down.”

Writing down her feelings, as well as the details of the three-year court process that eventually led to two people being convicted in her son’s death, prompted Coleman to write a book. She is about half-way through the writing process, and hopes to be completed in 2022.

“Nine years ago I couldn’t believe that anything good could come out of my son’s death,” she said. “But now I can see that I’m stronger and I can see that this is my purpose ... this is my calling. Even as a young child I had a heart for people ... it was there, but I never knew what I would use it for ... but it was this and I had to accept it.”

Coleman said she still faces triggers that plummet her into dark days – triggers like birthdays or holidays or even seeing a blue bag of Doritos (Mealey’s favorite) at the store.

“You feel it and you have to go through it,” she said of sad thoughts. “Sometimes I still go to that dark place, but I don’t stay as long as I used to.”

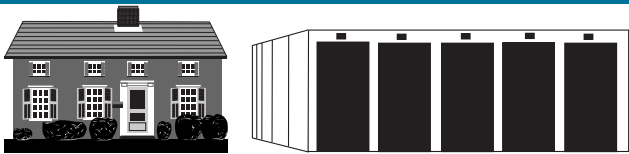


Coleman said she is eternally grateful for the hard work of the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office and District Attorney’s Office for working tirelessly in Mealey’s case.

“For three years they diligently worked to get justice for me and my family and I am forever grateful for them,” Coleman said. “I just want people who did not know Jared to know who he was ... he touched a lot of people’s lives and I want them to know that his spirit is still here with us.”

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## Tigers, Wildcats headed for state meet Saturday

Tigers earn boys, girls district title sweep

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After a rare district championship sweep by the Hahnville boys and girls track and field teams and a strong showing at regionals, the Tigers take aim at bringing home some hardware Saturday at the Class 5A state track and field championship meet at LSU's Bernie Moore Stadium.

The Tigers will be represented in 12 different events across the boys and girls sides at Saturday's meet after several qualifying performances at the Region III-5A meet, led by Billy Davis' championship performance in the high jump event (6-04).

"It's great especially for our seniors, because they're able to go now and have that opportunity they missed out on last season," said Hahnville head track and field coach Brittany Bonnaffons. "And for our younger kids, they have those seniors to go with and learn from, because for some of our kids this is their first time competing at a meet that big.

Eli Taffi and Daniel Blood are likewise leading a Destrehan contingent to Baton Rouge. Taffi is headed to the state meet after winning the regional championship in the discus (132-10) while Blood earned the championship in the triple jump

(42-05). On the girls side, Kaylee Keller is headed to state after a third place finish in the girls 100 meters (17.48) while the girls 4x100 relay (Kaylee Keller, Ja'leah Gibson, Amire Henderson and Breion

Richard) is also headed to state after a second place finish (50.87) as well as the 4x200 relay team (Sydney Hymel, Ja'Leah Gibson, Amire Henderson and Breion Richard) after a third place finish (1:49.57).

The Hahnville boys captured fifth place at the regional, while the girls earned a third place finish.

Kayla Lavin earned second place in the pole vault (10-0). The

4x200 relay team (Kevell Byrd, Na'Chaye Holmes, Genesis Lee and Alexandra Johnson, 1:45.20) took second place. Kevell Byrd took second in the 100 (12.27) and third in the 200 (25.68). Alexandra Johnson earned second place in the 800 (2:27.12) and in the 400 (57.74). Mallory Whitaker placed second in the high jump (4-10). The 4x400 team (Alexandra Johnson, Genesis Lee, Kevell Byrd and Na'Chaye Holmes, 4:10.36) captured second place.

All top three regional finishers will compete at the state meet.

"It's exciting to see what they're going to do. I've talked with them about nerves ... don't be the one to fault. A lot of people do phenomenal things over the course of the season and it ends up falling apart because of a mistake. We have the capability to do very well up there, we just have to execute," Bonnaffons said.

The regional performance came on the heels of a district sweep. The Hahnville boys captured the district championship for the 5th consecutive season, outpacing second place H.L. Bourgeois 142.5-114.5. Meanwhile, for the Lady Tigers, it's the first district crown

of what they hope will be a string of their own, notching the win by eight points over second place Thibodaux, 126-118.

Two years ago, Hahnville's girls finished third – and just three points out of first place.

"You can win a state championship with six or seven dominant competitors, but it's not enough for a district championship," Bonnaffons said. "It took everyone. It was really exciting to see the younger girls realize, hey, 'my fifth place was the difference.' Those two points from this one, two more from that one ... they added up in a meet we won by eight."

For the boys, Bonnaffons credited the focus of a group that maintained the hunger for more.

"It's that spirit of excellence. Sometimes you take it for granted and you never want your kids to be complacent," Bonnaffons said. "They were confident but not overconfident and they got the job done.

"That's a credit to the kids and also our coaches. We really have a good staff. There are things I don't have to worry about because I know each coach has got it handled, and that makes a huge difference."

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# Pooka signs with NFL’s Bengals

Says he’s ready to prove doubters wrong

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Former Hahnville and Kansas Jayhawks star Pooka Williams has signed with the Cincinnati Bengals, joining former LSU Tigers Joe Burrow and Ja’Marr Chase up north.

Williams, who opted out of the 2020 football season midseason, citing a desire to be close to home to tend to a family matter, was hoping to hear his name called during the three-day draft event. While that moment never came, a call from the NFL ultimately did, and with it the chance Williams was waiting for, the chance he says is all he wanted.

“I’m just ready to get to work and start proving a lot of people wrong,” said Williams.

He joins a Bengals backfield led by Joe Mixon. The Bengals lost third down and change of pace rusher Giovani Bernard to Tampa Bay this offseason, and Williams’ skillset makes him a contender to potentially fill that role. He signed shortly after the conclusion of the NFL Draft.

Williams said as the draft unfolded, he didn’t have a specific expectation of when, if or where he’d be selected, though he had talked to several teams. Leading up to the draft, many analysts were projecting Williams as a Day 3 (rounds 4-7) selection or a priority undrafted free agent - he was a popular

choice for many as a late-round sleeper. Several conversations with the San Francisco 49ers had positioned them as among the more likely destinations, but it wasn’t to be.

Williams said he knew one way or another, however, his chance was coming.

“I was kind of numb to it as it was going on, because I knew once I got the opportunity I was going to take full advantage,” he said. “So I wasn’t showing a lot of emotion, I was just waiting to see what was next.”

Like the 49ers, the Bengals spoke to Williams leading up to the draft, and ultimately it represented a strong match for both sides.

“I really liked the coaching staff. They had a plan and let me know I’d have an equal chance to compete and earn a chance to play,” Williams said, adding he’s excited to join a roster with his former Kansas teammate and offensive lineman Hakeem Adeniji and Chase, his close friend and former teammate with the Louisiana Bootleggers 7-on-7 team.

“I’m looking forward to going there to compete for a spot, and I’m not going out without a fight,” he added. “I’m really glad for this opportunity and I’m ready to get to it.”

Williams rushed for more than 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons at Kansas, including a true freshman year that saw him average an eye-popping 7.0

yards a carry. He scored 14 combined rushing and receiving touchdowns over the two year span.

In 2020, Kansas’ offense struggled, and Williams’ production suffered. The 5’10, 170 pound running back rushed for 198 yards and two touchdowns on 51 carries prior to stepping away from the program. His final week at Kansas came with accolades, however, as he was named the Big 12 Conference’s Special Teams Player of the Week after a game in which he returned a kickoff 92 yards for

a touchdown at West Virginia. During Williams’ senior season at Hahnville, he cemented a lasting legacy. He led Hahnville to the 2017 Class 5A championship game in a season he took the prep world by storm in Louisiana, rushing for nearly 1,500 yards in the postseason alone and more than 3,000 on the season. It represented the highest single season rushing total in Louisiana’s prep football history. He scored 40 touchdowns that year and was named Louisiana’s Mr. Football.
