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St. Rose native participates in Naval rescue at Double Hot Springs

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A Naval officer from St. Rose was part of a rescue team that recently rescued a severely burned man who fell into Double Hot Springs on the Black Rock Playa in Nevada.

HIRA Petty Officer 2nd Class Abdullah Nurmohamed, a St. Rose native, was part of the Longhorn Helicopter Search and Rescue Team from Naval Air Station Fallon who rescued the man on May 21 after being contacted by the Washoe County Sheriff about an activated rescue beacon via a personal GPS tracking device.

“The NAS Fallon SAR Team was activated at 6:16 p.m. ... and at 7:14 p.m. a crew of four departed for the 100-mile transit to the incident scene,” Lt. Conrad Schmidt of Naval Air Station Fallon Public Affairs said, adding that after arriving to the scene the crew instantly spotted the location of the survivor and made an immediate landing. “With the assistance of ground personnel, the crew carried the patient via litter into the aircraft.”

Schmidt said the survivor sustained severe burns on 36 percent of his body.

“With the survivor ... safely onboard the aircraft, the crew ... provided in-flight care during the 45-minute transit to Reno where the survivor was turned over to the Renown Emergency Room,” he said.

Other crew members participating in the rescue included Lt. Conrad Schmidt, copilot Lt. Elizabeth Frey, RCC Chief Petty Officer Jeffery Roscoe, and SMT Hospital Corpsman Jacob Parker.

This rescue was the fifth rescue of 2021 for the NAS

Fallon SAR Team.

The Navy-trained and equipped SAR unit operates three MH-60S helicopters as search and rescue/medical evacuation platforms with the primary

mission of military SAR alert for the Fallon Range Training Complex in Nevada.

Formosan termite swarm ‘a good thing,’ county agent says

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While termites are active all year around, it is the annual Formosan termite swarm that easily captures many people’s attention.

“It is referred to it as the ‘Mother’s Day swarm’ because they start right around that time,” Christopher Dunaway, an extension agent with the LSU Ag Center, said. “They’ll be done at the early part of July, but they for sure do damage year around.”

Dunaway said the swarms of insects that we see flying crazily around just about any outdoor light consists of millions of royal males and females called alates that are capable of mating and creating new colonies.

“These potential kings and queens have emerged from nearby colonies located in the soil, trees, homes and other structures,” he said. “They fly out on warm and humid nights seeking a mate and viable location to begin their new colony. A good location must contain a constant food and water source, maintain a habitable temperature range, be free of other pests, and must remain undisturbed while the population builds.”

Because most well-maintained homes do not possess these qualities, Dunaway said the swarmers are not a threat.

“Nearly every case of Formosan termites infesting a home can be tracked back to locations where the termites

entered the structure from mature colonies underground,” he said. “However, leaky roofs, rotting wood and debris-filled gutters can give these termites a foothold.”

Dunaway said most of the termites that are seen flying around never get the chance to start their new kingdom before they are eaten by frogs, lizards, ants and other animals.

“As odd as it sounds, the annual alate swarm is a good thing,” he said. “Formosan termites are subterranean insects, which means that they live in colonies located in the soil under the surface. They typically travel to food sources through hidden underground tunnels and attack them from below. Once inside of a structure they will continue to eat and remain hidden within the walls.”

When the termites burrow through the walls to make exit portals for the alates, the termites expose themselves and alert people to their presence.

“Even then, thousands of dollars in damage may have already occurred,” Dunaway said. “The best way to protect your home is to have it thoroughly inspected annually for signs of termite infestation and employ a preventative treatment. I’ve seen so many houses eaten up ... I’ve been to a house that was only three years old that was nearly



demolished ... within a few years you can get significant damage.”

But because treatments can fail, Dunaway said people should also inspect the trees on their property and associated public areas for signs of infestation.

“Infested trees can be the home of millions of termites that can infest nearby structures and will eventually cause the death of the tree as they eat away at the support material in the center of the tree,” he said. “Look for shelter tubes on the trunk and swarm sites at places where limbs were pruned. We’re losing tons of trees that could have lived another 100 years or more that are dying needlessly because of termites.”

Dunaway said a video on how to

“We hit it off from day one,” Poupart said. “He’s a truly great guy. I’m not the best guy in the world, everyone has their flaws and all. But he is, hands down, a fantastic guy, and anyone that’s ever met him would tell you the same.”

Bruce, 37, is going through a very trying time, however, due to an ongoing health situation that began about nine months ago during a dinner outing for Bruce and his wife.

“They were walking into the restaurant and his arm was around her, and then he started having some twitching going on,” Poupart said. “She asked, ‘What are you doing?’ and he said he wasn’t doing it, that he had no control of it.”

The situation escalated: Bruce was having a seizure and had to be brought to the hospital for care and examination. His hospital stay brought a diagnosis of a cavernous malformation, an angioma - or two-centimeter vascular tumor - located in his brain’s motor cortex. It’s benign but still problematic as it’s prone to bleeding and, if left untreated, could lead to permanent brain damage resulting in loss of mobility among other difficulties.

Bruce’s seizure was not his last, and it’s caused on and off paralysis of the left side of his body. Medicine has curtailed the volume of seizures, but he still regularly suffers from intense headaches, one incident of that led to a visit to the emergency room.

For the most part, the medicine has allowed him to resume day to day life. But it’s a bandaid solution at best: Bruce requires surgery to remove the angioma and has been referred to a surgeon in Phoenix who specializes in his particular condition and has an extremely high success rate dealing with the problem.

Bruce’s insurance, governed by a non-traditional private sharing group, has been unwilling to cover the surgery at the location Bruce’s neurologist recommended. This battle has been drawn out, difficult and costly and is still uncertain, Poupart said.

Though at this time it looks as if they are starting to

negotiate the coverage of some of the very costly surgery itself, there are still unknowns and a lot of medical bills have piled up. Other extra expenses include paying for travel to and from Phoenix, a hotel for his wife, Maria, and perhaps several weeks away from his business while recovering.

The couple has a young daughter to care for, as well.

“The unfortunate fact is the cash price of this surgery is \$155,000,” Poupart said. “But for insurance to cover it, the charge is \$450,000. I’m not sure how that all works, but I feel like the insurance company would be more

likely to pay for it were it the cash price ... it just seems like more people would get the care they need.

“That neurosurgeon is the only one who has a 100 percent success rate with this situation ... he’s considered the world’s leading authority on it. It’s not really an option for him to just go to someone else, especially because there’s a lot that can go wrong with this due to the tumor’s location. If something goes even a little wrong, he could lose the ability to move his arm ... it’s crazy.”

It’s led Poupart to start a GoFundMe for Bruce, titled “Brain surgery for Jonathan” that has already raised nearly \$55,000, and he plans to put on a car show to raise further funds in the coming weeks.

He began the GoFundMe page despite a bit of protest from his friend.

“He’s really against doing this kind of thing ... he thinks other people would have more pressing things, and I just have to tell him, ‘Jonathan, yours is pretty important,’” Poupart said. “This has already been delayed with all the insurance haggling and it’s a ticking time bomb. People have really stepped up to help ... that’s a testament to him. He’d give you the shirt off his back.”

Poupart offered a quick anecdote to illustrate that.

“A friend of ours recently was in a car accident and the car caught fire, in New Jersey ... he had third degree burns,” Poupart said. “And they had a GoFundMe, and I found out from someone else Jonathan donated to that one, as we have one for him. And I mean, that’s the way he is. The guy works around the clock to provide for his family. He puts them first. He puts everyone else first.

“If anyone ever deserved to get some help, it’s that guy. I tell people, even if you can’t donate, just share the page because a dollar here, a dollar there ... it can make the difference.”

the Wildcats' Class of 2021. She was able to reflect on not just what he accomplished, but – finally – what she herself had turned into a reality. LaBryson was her sixth child to graduate from Destrehan, following in the footsteps of siblings Lou'Donovan (2013), Lexus (2013), Lamitra (2015) Lamaar (2016) and La'Kyron (2017), as well as Mom herself.

For Smith, who at one point held four jobs at once to ensure her children's care, it was a milestone to say the least.

“My emotions were all over,” said the New Sarpy mother. “It means so, so much to me. I had them all so young ... the struggle I went through, trying to work, making sure they go to school, going to school myself ... when I say it takes a village, friends and family helped to give them rides to and from games, because I couldn’t be there. For awhile, it was just me working and I had to keep the bills paid.

"It was really emotional. I was a graduate of Destrehan. To see all six of my kids come through ... there are teachers there who were there when I was a student. It really hit me hard. I'm so proud of all of them."

Smith's oldest, Lou'Donovan, was born when Smith was just 17 years old. Lexus came next, in 1994 during Smith's senior year at DHS. She worked hard to support the two new additions to her family and to secure her diploma in 1995.

Lamitra was born in 1996, and Smith married that same year. Lamaar was born in 1997, La'Kyron 1999 and LaBryson in 2003.

The marriage did not work out and Smith and her husband divorced, leaving her to care for her six children as a single mother.

“It meant I simply had to move forward for my children and do better for my children,” said Smith. “I worked and worked and worked. There were times I wondered, ‘What am I going to do? How am I going to do this?’ They were so close in age, and you tried not to get overwhelmed.”

She maintained a strong work ethic, and at times, she labored relentlessly, jumping from one job to another and then another, sometimes in the same 24-hour period. When it was time for Lexus to go to college, Smith held down four jobs at once.

“Sometimes, I wouldn’t even know what day of



the week it was,” she said. “I just knew I had to go to work. Whatever they needed for school, I was going to have it for them.”

She remarried in 2008, but that did not slow down her grind.

“(My husband) asked me ‘Why are you doing all of this?’ And I told him, at the end of the day, I thank God for you, for all you do for us, but at the same time, these are mine. These are my children and so, I know you love me and you want to help, but I’m gonna keep on going. That was just my thing,” she said.

That hard work did not go unnoticed by her children, who lived by the example she set.

"I never had to go down to the jailhouse. I never had to worry about drugs or any of that with them," Smith said.

One day they sat her down and let her know exactly why that was.

"They told me 'we're so humbled and grateful to be your kids. We always wanted to be respectable and show love to other people, and not cause you any trouble, because we saw how hard you worked for us.' And ... that means the world to me, that they saw how hard I worked and all I put into them," she said.

improvements to current policies, procedures, guidelines, practices, etc., we act on it and as such, will be revising the graduation dress code,” she said. “We appreciate this being brought to our attention so we can continue our work towards more inclusive and equitable practices.”

Media outlets such as the Washington Post and CNN ran with the local story of a supposed dress code violation at the HHS graduation last month and the educator who saved the day – or in this case – the graduation.

John Butler, a HHS paraeducator, was attending the school’s graduation as a parent – his daughter Jaelyn was set to graduate that night.

Daverius Peters, a member of HHS’ class of 2021, was attending the ceremony as a graduate, but was barred from entering the building when a school representative insisted that his shoes did not adhere to the dress code.

“I was waiting outside the facility for my wife and my other daughter to show up,” Butler said of when Peters ran over to him and explained the shoe situation. “He found me and looked very concerned he said, ‘Mr. John, they won’t let me graduate and receive my diploma.’”

Butler said his initial reaction was confusion. “I was just confused,” he said. “I just wanted to make sure he had the right information.”

After Butler walked over to the door with Peters and talked to the school representative, Peters was still denied entry.

“She was adamant that he couldn’t wear the shoes,” Butler said. “At that moment it was a no brainer to take the shoes off my feet. He was happy to wear them.”

The fit wasn’t perfect. Butler wears a size 11 and Peters wears a size 9, but the shoe sharing gesture allowed Peters entry into his graduation.

“I walked around the whole graduate barefoot,” Butler said. “I was getting quite a few looks. My wife showed up after it happened and as we were going to our seats she looked at my feet and asked where my shoes were.”

Butler said he posted a photo of him in his socks and Peters in his shoes on his private Facebook page just for his friends to see.

“I was originally posting it because it was a feel-good story just for people on my friends list, but somebody screenshotted it and shared it,” he said. “I made it public after so many people had screen-shotted it.”

Butler said he held onto Peters’ shoes until after the ceremony.

“His family was already seated,” Butler said. “We met up at the end, so we swapped shoes then. It means a lot to me that he saw me and he felt like he had a good shot at accomplishing what he needed. I was happy I was able to build that rapport with him. We just need to do better as a parish to support our young people. I’m for what is right.”

Snider said a special family connection to St. Thérèse of Lisieux makes winning the award even sweeter.

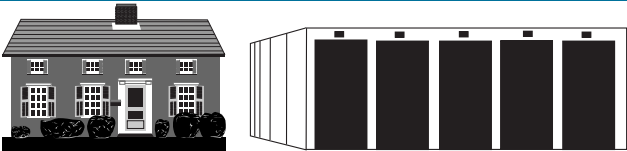

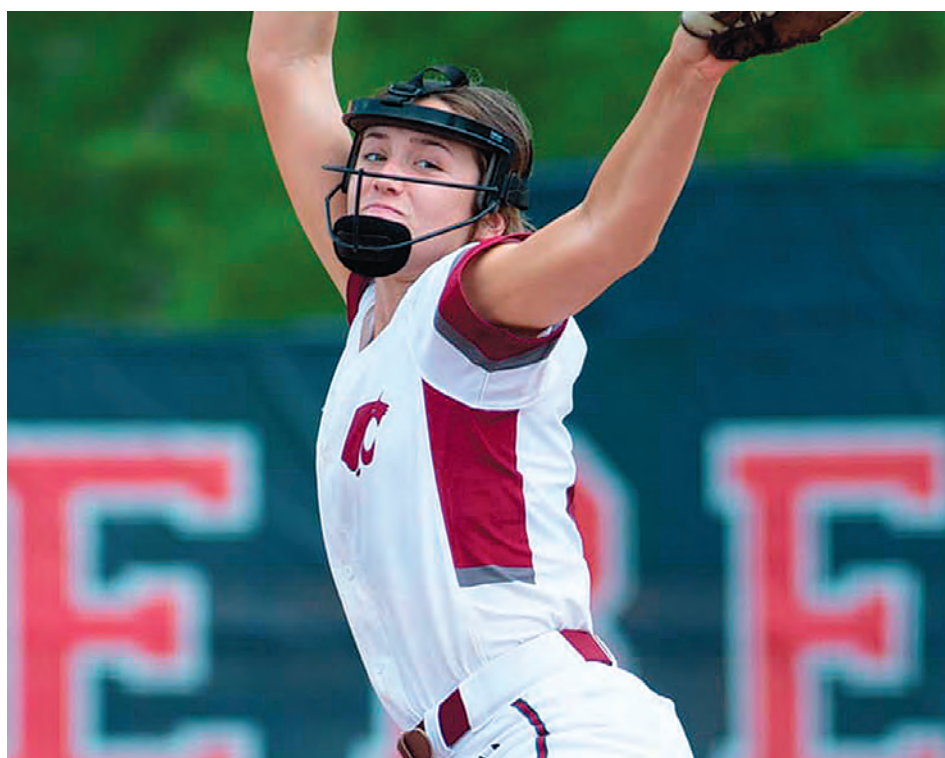

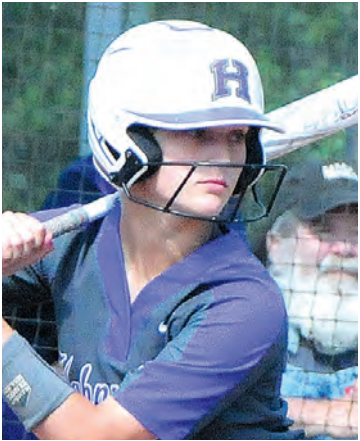
