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After her own teacher helped her find confidence, Mimosa educator pays it forward

As a child, Jamie McGowan loved to play teacher. But it was playing a different role, ironically, that truly set her down the path of becoming an educator.

When McGowan was in the 8th grade, her teacher saw something in her.

“They were getting ready for the play Peter Pan, and she asked me if I’d like to volunteer,” McGowan recalled. “I was very shy ... I said I’d maybe try out to be one of the Lost Boys or something like that. She said, ‘No, I want you to try for Peter Pan.’ I tried out, got the role and that really boosted my confidence and got me headed in this direction.”

That teacher, Susan Collins, passed away after a battle with cancer, but she left a lasting impact on McGowan and, the latter says, on many other students.

“She took time with everyone and saw everyone’s uniqueness,” McGowan said. “She didn’t pass by any student. She saw something in all of us. She was a major influence in my wanting to be a teacher because I saw how she lifted people.”

Today, McGowan teaches students at Mimosa Park Elementary maintaining that same spirit. She impacts students inside of her classroom, and many outside of it as well after taking on several leadership roles in both school and district capacities.

The recent Teacher of the Year nominee serves on the Mimosa Park Elementary Social and Emotional Wellness Team and the Equity Committee. After serving on School Improvement Team committees, she stepped into the chairperson role. She serves as the grade-level Right to Intervention representative while being a mentor teacher, Math Institute participant, and

ELA Trainer of Teachers. As an eLearning teacher last year, she networked with other teachers across the district to share her expertise and brought additional best practices into Mimosa.

And, in a school system learning on the fly how to educate students who may be learning from home, she became a Google turn-around trainer at Mimosa.

“I’ve always wanted to be that person people are able to look to as an example, and this year really was one of the first times I’ve felt like I’ve really been able to make that bigger impact,” she said. “Beyond just the classroom of grade level, but throughout the district, with different students from everywhere that I got to teach. It’s been really exciting.”

All of this takes energy – luckily, McGowan has plenty.

“I’ve always had an excitement about all of this,” McGowan said. “Even when I was younger and getting ready for school, I’d be asked, ‘Why are you so excited to go to school?’ But I just have always had this excitement for learning new things. Show me something once, I’ll do it a little bit and then get it, and then be off and running like a kid in a candy store.

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Following in father’s footsteps, band director teaches life lessons through music

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Music is one thing that always made sense for Michael Danigole.

His father was a band director, and today, Danigole follows in his footsteps at R.J. Vial Elementary School in that same capacity, helping music make sense for his students and teaching them a few life lessons along the way.

“Music was something I always really enjoyed, so this was the natural progression for me I guess,” said Danigole. “I’ve taught (band) on every level and seen it on all levels. The most rewarding part is just seeing the kids succeed.”

A saxophone player in his own days as a student, Danigole says the band tends to be a special place for its members, a group where many different personalities come together to create something larger than themselves and form, in many cases, lifelong friendships.

“The band is one organization on school grounds where you have samplings of all kinds of people ... outgoing, introverted, and they all thrive together and become this family,” Danigole said. “They’re going into and through a lot of the same kinds of things together. It really is a unique bond. You’re contributing to your own success but also for others as well.”

Sometimes, a student comes through lacking confidence, but finds it through

their new experiences and successes with the band.

“When you see kids make that growth and succeed when maybe they weren’t that sure themselves whether they would or not ... they achieve at a high level, that really means something,” Danigole said. “The building of self-esteem that comes with that is immeasurable.”

R. J. Vial Principal Christina Mullins said Danigole routinely volunteers to take on additional duties and participates on committees when needed to provide additional support for students wherever and whenever needed.

“He has the best interest of his students at the forefront of his teaching practices and has creatively persevered through teaching music during a pandemic both virtually and in person,” Mullins said.

Danigole said the willingness to volunteer comes from a desire to lead by example.

“If I don’t do anything to make my work environment a better place, I can’t really expect or ask anyone else to,” he said. “And I enjoy the people I work with. I like being around them, so I’m glad to help out however I can do it.”

This will be Danigole’s third year at R.J. Vial. Prior

R.K. Smith teacher ties past to present in her lessons

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One thing you’ll never hear Victoria White tell her 7th grade students at R.K. Smith Middle School: listen to me because I’m an adult.

She says respect is a two-way street, and real respect cannot come without trust.

“Those two things go hand in hand,” said White, in her sixth year teaching social studies at R.K. Smith and her seventh year overall as a teacher. “Once you have both, you’re able to build ground where students will work for you because they want to make you happy ... they know even if I am correcting them,

it’s because I want what’s best for them. It’s not ‘listen to me because I say so.’

“Once you lay down that foundation, you build a community. You’re a family in that classroom. And that breeds success.”

That philosophy is part of what makes White, in R.K. Smith Principal Harold Blood’s words, a calming influence that makes students feel comfortable and secure when asking questions.

“She instinctively knows how to put people at ease. She’s one of the nicest people you would ever want to meet,” Blood said. “Students love being in her

social studies class. They say she makes it fun and exciting, and I’d say that’s because of her knowledge of the subject and her continual efforts to stay abreast of the curriculum and of current events.”

In her own days as a student, White did not know early on that she wanted to be a teacher. But she said it’s simply in her blood: her mother was a longtime teacher in St. Charles Parish, and White said that was a major influence on her childhood.

“We’d be out of school during the summer, but she had us waking up doing our routine like we were still in school. She was always teaching us from home,” White said. “She just had that personality, like I think all teachers have similarly ... just always willing and eager to teach.”

Her father, likewise, would have his

own influence. A history buff, he loved to tell White stories about the past, and she said that is part of what guided her to teach social studies.

And like her father, the past fascinates her, because you can see so much of it in the present.

“You can directly relate it to what’s happening now,” White said. “I work

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Hahnville High welding teacher helps students develop plan, find success

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While Chris Henning teaches welding classes at Hahnville High School, his course isn't limited to just the finer points of that trade: he aims to help students find direction, and more importantly, a plan.

"A lot of students are young and don't really have that outlook on what life is going to be like after high school," Henning said. "So, I like to ask them a series of questions ... what happens if you're on your own? Is the job you have right now going to allow you to make a good living? Nine out of 10 times, the answer is no."

Henning starts posting on the dry erase board. Car insurance, rent, and other necessities add up quickly.

"When they start looking at the numbers and realize, 'Hey, I don't really have a plan out of high school,' they may think this is a good fit," Henning said. "Or another trade. We'll go over the average pay, the average salary for each and kind of let them figure it out."

He's a straight shooter with his students, and his honesty is one reason why his class is always in high demand. It's a trait he prides himself on, and something that made an impression on him when displayed by his own welding teacher years ago.

"When I was in high school, I didn't have a clue what career path I wanted to go down until I took that class," Henning

said. "The teacher I had was really fun, cut and dry like I am. He was brutally honest, and I kind of got hooked on it. So, for me to be able to do the same thing, maybe for a kid from a less fortunate family, and help get him into a good trade so he can provide a good life for himself, that's what

it's all about."

He teaches the ins and outs of the profession – good and bad.

"I don't sugar-coat anything. I tell them the pros and the cons," Henning said. "What you can and can't do. You go

Luling Elementary teacher shows students the 'why' first

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Jennifer Saldana was always a strong language arts student, but she admits when it came to math, she had her struggles growing up.

When she decided to pursue a future in education, Saldana learned she was far more passionate about teaching than she realized. And when the now-Luling Elementary teacher began her career, she came to truly believe in not only the role of a teacher itself, but also in the curriculum itself.

"As I continued teaching, I learned that I really didn't know all that much," Saldana said. "The way we're teaching kids now isn't the way I was taught, and I think that had a lot to do with why I struggled in certain areas (like math) in school."

"I don't remember when it clicked, but there was a moment where I decided, 'I'm going to do this, give it my all, teach this way and really make sure these kids have a strong foundation in the subject matter.'"

For Saldana, understanding the "why" of a subject is as important as the "what" or the "how."

"You have to have a conceptual understanding, why the numbers work the way they do ... not just procedure, but the whole of it," Saldana said. "Because when you get older there is that procedural part of it. Without conceptual understanding, there's kind of a missing link, and I want to make sure that doesn't get broken with the young ones."

Saldana has taught at Luling for 17 years, and as she prepares to enter year 18, she says she's as energized as ever to return to her third-grade classroom, where she teaches all subjects.

One reason is the feeling of family she has when with her students or speaking with their parents – or even former students and their families.

"St. Charles Parish is such a close-knit community, so when I see or hear about the kids through their family members and I hear what they've gone on to do ... just this past week I heard of two former students going into the military.

It makes me so proud," Saldana said. "When I hear other kids come up to me and say, 'I remember we did this in your class,' that completely warms my heart."

The past year was a challenge, she admits. As her teaching methods include plenty of group activities and

collaborations, the distancing and separation was taxing. Even so, she said she knew it was for the best.

"The district was wonderful with guiding us ... everything we did was worth it. Ultimately it allowed us to get back into the classroom," Saldana said. "I'd read a book to them aloud, and it was difficult with the mask on, and having the kids spread out in the room I had to try to make sure they could hear it. But I told myself, it's worth it ... this could be through a computer screen."

Negrotto

Pamela Elaine Bussell Negrotto, 76, of Bayou Gauche, La., died at 2 a.m. Sunday, July 18, 2021, in St. Charles Parish after an extended illness.



Born in Delhi, La., on Sept. 23, 1944, to the late Herbert W. Bussell and Ruby Lee Stokes, Negrotto was raised in Epps, La.

Cotton was king in Epps, and the Bussell family earned a living picking crops. Negrotto would later say the work was hard but fun. "I remember the long, hot days turning rows and filling the large blanket at the end of the row," she later said.

It was Negrotto's intention to pursue bookkeeping after graduating from Epps High School. But she went to beauty school instead and worked briefly as a hairstylist. "I knew right away that wasn't going to be the career for me," Negrotto said, smiling at the memory.

The Louisiana native relocated to St. Charles and met Johnny Marino, the parish's late sheriff. At his urgence, she joined the sheriff's office. In January 1977, Negrotto accepted a job as a 911 dispatcher. During her 39-year SCSO career, Negrotto rose through the ranks and oversaw the Juvenile Division and, later, the School Resource Office and Domestic Violence programs in the Special Services Division.

In September 2005, Lt. Negrotto formally retired from the agency, but continued to serve in a part-time role through

September 2017.

"I came up when women weren't dispatches, they were dispatchers. Early on, Sheriff Marino saw something in me and I was able to grow," Negrotto said shortly before her death. "There have been a number of good people who encouraged me and helped me throughout my career. I didn't do it alone."

Current Sheriff Greg Champagne said of Negrotto, "She was always a pleasant soul to work with who impacted the lives of many. Pam will be missed."

Likewise, retired Special Services captain Pat Yoes, president of the National Fraternal Order of Police, lauded Negrotto's compassion, mentorship and knowledge of the law. "She knew the law and what needed to be done," he said.

Fellow retired SCSO lieutenant and longtime friend Pam Schmitt cited Negrotto's commitment to the parish's youth. "There's no question she turned around a number of lives – young and older. She championed local children and women who were the victims of abuse. She wanted better for them and continued to seek out programs to help," Schmitt said. "You would be hard-pressed to find someone who cared or gave more."

Negrotto enjoyed photography, playing the guitar, sipping wine with friends, and crisp fall nights around a fire. She was a Saints fan, rooted for all St. Charles Parish youth teams, and loved her family and friends.

She is survived by her sister, Julia "Judy" Brown, and nephews Shawn (Kelly) Quarles, Chad (Janine) Brown and Jason Brown.

She is preceded in death by her parents, and sisters, Barbara Bussell and Margaret Smith.

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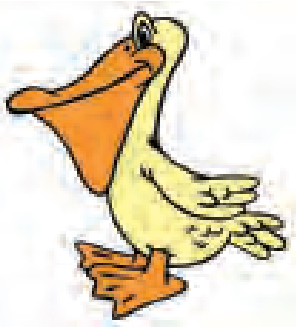

“It’s just part of who I am.”

She has taught kindergarten in St. Charles Parish for 15 years. Over that time, she’s learned the importance of building a strong connection, both between herself and her students. She also fosters the chance for students to form one with one another.

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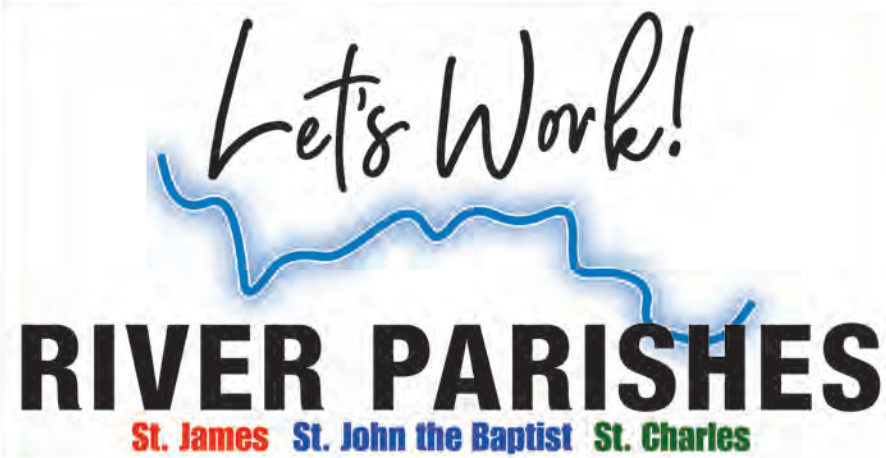

work for Valero-St. Charles – see that nice beard you’ve got? Got to go. They’ll ask, ‘Wow, really?’ Yep. If you start sugar-coating things, you lead them down the path but then they maybe get into a job and see the downside for the first time, and it turns them away ... and all that learning time they invested may seem like a waste of time.”

Henning, a St. Charles Parish native who lives in Boutte, enrolled in ABC (Associated Builders and Contractors) school when he was young. He proved a quick study, and often would leave his own welding area to help students

“That’s where it all started,” Henning

He was hired on with ABC as a full-time instructor in 2013. Later on, he was offered a job at Hahnville in 2018, which he called a tough decision as at the time he was working at a refinery and enjoyed the job.

“But I also really enjoyed teaching at the same time. I ended up going the teaching route and that’s something I definitely don’t regret,” he said.

Nothing can replicate the pride he feels when a former student sees him outside his home doing yardwork and

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Zion Williamson and Brandon Ingram of the New Orleans Pelicans will see some help arrive tonight via the NBA Draft - along with a new frontcourt teammate, Jonas Valanciunas, landed via trade.

Pelicans eye tonight's draft, but trade shows belief the time is now

The Pelicans got their head coach, and now they're wasting no time reshaping the roster.

In a trade announced this week, the Memphis Grizzlies sent Jonas Valanciunas and this year's Nos. 17 and 51 draft picks to New Orleans, while Memphis received Steven Adams, Eric Bledsoe, the Nos. 10 and 40 picks in this draft, plus a top 10 protected 2022 first-round via the Lakers (from the Anthony Davis deal). The teams also swap second round picks this year, the Pelicans moving down 11 spots from 40 to

51. It shows the Pelicans are serious about making a big step this season, freeing up to potentially \$36 million in cap space. Valanciunas will earn \$14 million for the coming season, while Adams and Bledsoe combined for over \$35 million in outgoing salary.

The deal also cements the fact Pelicans team president David Griffin has taken a blowtorch to what he clearly felt was a bust of a 2020 offseason - in addition to jettisoning two of his major acquisitions in Bledsoe and

Adams, he also fired Stan Van Gundy after hiring him to lead the team as its head coach last season.

Fans won't likely miss Bledsoe, who saw a major decline in his efficiency and productivity across the board last year. It was his worst output in scoring, field goal percentage, free throw percentage, free throw attempts, assists, steals and rebounding over the past nine seasons. He also didn't win many people over when he famously commented he "wasn't paying attention" after committing a late-game miscue in an April loss to the New York Knicks.

Adams was a bit more popular, but he also saw a drop off in several statistical categories and was starting to be seen as an albatross when it came to building the roster because of his contract. He was brought to provide

toughness and anchor the team's defense - he did set the example for the first, and remained a smart and talented interior defender and rebounder. But he was not much of an offensive threat and his lack of shooting ability cramped offensive spacing - admittedly a wide concern following his acquisition initially.

Valanciunas comes as Adams' 1-for-1 replacement at center, and he is off of his career best season. He averaged 17.1 points and 12.5 rebounds a game, finishing third in the league in double-doubles. He was second in the league in offensive rebounding per game, and while he also is not a floor-spacer, he's begun to grow in that area, hitting 21 of 57 shots from the outside last season for a clip of 36.8 percent. He also shot a career high 59.2 percent, and it

becomes easy to dream of what the frontcourt could be capable of between the 6'11, 265-pound center, Zion Williamson and Jaxson Hayes in the team's frontcourt.

Griffin has long wanted to rebuild this young team while moving toward the playoff mix, not wanting the bad habits of a tanking team to take root. So far, it's kept the team from rock bottom, but two runs at the postseason have fallen flat.

Perhaps that is why Willie Green got Griffin's call to be the new man in charge as head coach. Green was part of Monty Williams' staff in Phoenix which quickly crafted a very young Suns team into an NBA Finals squad and Western Conference Champion, going from outside the playoffs to that height in one year.

That leap came with one very important

addition last offseason - Chris Paul - and recalling this may direct one's attention back to the near \$40 million in cap space New Orleans just generated. There is young talent up and down the roster. Could one veteran leader be what the doctor ordered? Twitter speculation was abuzz with talk the Pels could be interested in Toronto's Kyle Lowry, one of the bigger names on the market and the leader of a long-time Eastern Conference contender.

The team could also retain its own free agents - Lonzo Ball and Josh Hart - and bank on growth from its recent draft picks in Kira Lewis and Nickeil Alexander-Walker. That would retain some flexibility, but also require a leap of faith. It seems likely this deal was intended to free up money to bring in a known-quantity.

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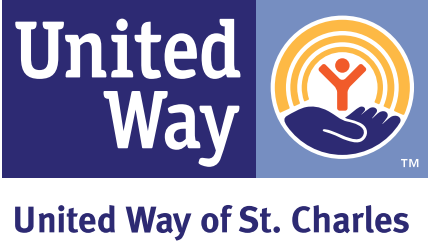
















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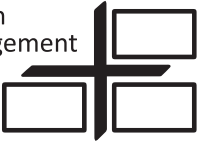

St. Charles Parish Public Schools announced its policy today that this school year, healthy meals will be offered every school day to all students at no cost. Typically, a student's household must meet income eligibility requirements to qualify for free or reduced-price meals. However, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) issued guidance that allows schools to offer meals to all students at no cost for the 2021-2022 school year.

While no application or eligibility determination is required for your student to receive free meals this school year, income eligibility requirements will likely resume in the 2022-2023 school year. As such, St. Charles Parish Public Schools will process household applications during School Year 2021-2022 to ensure student eligibility for free or reduced-price meals **during the first 30 days of the 2022-2023 school year** while 2022-2023 applications are being processed. Each school/site or central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed upon request.

The 2021-2022 application for Free/Reduced Price Meals is available online at www.MySchoolApps.com. Applying online is the fastest and most efficient way to apply for meal benefits. However, paper meal applications may be obtained from the school cafeteria or the Child Nutrition Department. Households should fill out one application for the household and return it to the school. Complete either a paper application or an on-line application, but not both. Additional paper copies are available at each school. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. The information provided by the household is confidential; it will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility. Information may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

Criteria for Free and Reduced-Price Meal Benefits to Start School Year 2022-2023
The following criteria will be used to determine a child's eligibility for free or reduced-price meal benefits at the beginning of School Year 2022-2023:

Income

1. Household income that is at or below the income eligibility levels

Categorical or Automatic Eligibility

Paper applications should be returned to the cafeteria manager at your child's school or to the attention of Lori Levy, Free and Reduced Secretary, Child Nutrition Department. Those individuals filling out the application will need to provide the following information:

1. Names of all household members

2. Amount, frequency, and source of current income for each household member

3. Last 4 digits of the Social Security number of the adult household member who signs the application or, if the adult does not have a social security number, check the box for "No Social Security number"

4. Signature of an adult household member attesting that the information provided is correct

Categorical or Program Eligibility
St. Charles Parish Public Schools is working with local agencies to identify all children who are categorically and program eligible. St. Charles Parish Public Schools will notify the households of these children that they do not need to complete an application.
