DHS gymnast shines at USA championship

You could forgive Karma Jones for being a bit nervous.

The 16-year-old Destrehan High School student and talented gymnast was with her teammates on the biggest stage she had experienced: the 2021 USA Gymnastics Championships in St. Louis. She was competing in acrobatic gymnastics, which is like traditional solo gymnastics with a twist as the athletes work in teams of two and three.

But it wasn't pressure that was getting to Jones, per se. She had recently broken her finger, and the strength she did – or did not – regain in the digit was going to be vital in a sport where elevating teammates is at the core.

"I just tried to put my best foot forward," Jones said. "I

wasn't sure how we'd perform and was pretty surprised by the outcome."

They indeed put together a strong performance and took ninth place at the national championship event consisting of so many of the very best gymnasts in the country. Jones along with Alora McCastle and Tai DeJean earned the honor as teammates under the Superior Acrobatics and Cheer Sports gym banner in Harvey. The group competed at Level 9.

"It was really cool," Jones said. "There were so many people there from different places, all across the country. You get to see these people at all different skill levels putting on a show. It was a lot of fun."

Officer recognized for saving man’s life

Quick thinking and swift action from St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office Deputy Henry Sill saved a man’s life on April 4, and recently the officer was awarded the Knights of Columbus Officer of the Year award for his life-saving measures.

Sill responded to the April call of a man who had fallen out of a tree and was bleeding from his leg. Upon arrival, Sill discovered that the man had damaged his femoral artery and was still heavily bleeding, despite the makeshift tourniquet that had been applied.

“Deputy Sill assessed the situation and gave instructions to apply pressure to the wound,” St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne said. “Deputy Sill applied a second tourniquet as well as additional pressure to the wound to control the bleeding, while simultaneously visually scanning the area for a safe landing zone for the air care helicopter. Paramedics that were on scene advised that Deputy Sill’s quick action to apply direct

Mason Harding got a phone call, perhaps the toughest he’s ever received, and wasn’t quite ready for the blow.

“It came Saturday morning, from the coroner,” said Harding, 23, last week. “They told me my dad lost his battle with cancer, and he was no longer with us.”

Charles “Chuck” Harding was

diagnosed with his illness approximately a year and a half ago. The Luling man battled the illness bravely, rarely displaying outwardly its adverse effects upon him, according to Mason.

“I’ve never heard him complain about a thing, even

Crime rate down 22% thus far in 2021

Crime in St. Charles Parish over the first six months of 2021 is down more than 22 percent from last year, according to FBI statistics.

It indicates an upward tick in crime last year – theorized by St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne as being at least in part due to the COVID-19 pandemic – has not become a trend. The FBI’s uniform crime reporting statistics showed crime declining by a total of 22.3 percent over the seven major categories – murder, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, theft and auto theft – with 597 incidents in total this year, vs. 768 over the first six months of 2020.

The spike in crime rate in 2020 followed a 2019 that yielded the lowest mark of Champagne’s 26-year tenure as sheriff, with 1,316 total crimes reported that year. In 2020, 1,648 crimes were reported, which represented a 25 percent increase. It followed four years of decreasing crime numbers, however, and actually represented the fourth lowest mark in Champagne’s tenure.

“We are extremely pleased to see crime numbers return to the same downward trend during the first half of 2021 as they were prior to the pandemic,” said Champagne. “We are cautiously optimistic and hopeful that this downward trend will continue throughout 2021.”

The breakdown of each category is as follows:

*There have been three murders thus far in 2021, none in 2020 (100 percent

increase)

*Five rapes in first six months of 2020, two in 2021 (60 percent decrease)

*Six robberies in first six months of 2020, eight in 2021 (33.3 percent increase)

*318 assaults in first six months of 2020, 293 in 2021 (7.9 percent decrease)

*65 burglaries in first six months of 2020, 40 in 2021 (38.46 percent decrease)

*356 thefts in first six months of 2020, 222 thefts in 2021 (37.6 percent decrease)

*18 auto thefts in first six months of 2020, 29 auto thefts in 2021 (61.1 percent increase)

The Sheriff’s Office noted that in 2020 there were four total homicides, all occurring in the second half of the year.

“Last year, in 2020, we reported an overall annual increase in crime of 25.2 percent as compared to 2019, during the COVID Pandemic. We saw significant increases in thefts and domestic violence (assaults) during that period,” Champagne said. “Despite very few isolated incidents, our violent crime rate continues to be extremely low.”

The crime rate is documented through the UCR system, or Uniformed Crime Reporting system, and serves as the nationally mandated crime reporting format as per the FBI.

Champagne credited his officers and

School-based health centers will offer COVID vaccines

As the school year begins and many uncertainties remain due to the coronavirus pandemic, one thing is sure – St. Charles Parish public school students will have the benefit of school-based health centers.

In addition to operating two local community health centers, Access Health Louisiana runs two school-based health centers in St. Charles Parish - the Albert Cammon Wellness Center in St. Rose, which services the students of Albert Cammon Middle and St. Rose Elementary School, and the J.B. Martin/R.J. Vial Wellness Center in Paradis, which services the staff and students at those two schools.

The health system also provides health services for students at Luling Elementary at its Luling clinic location, located at 843 Milling Avenue.

“Two years ago, the school district put a gate in the fence dividing the (Luling) school property and clinic property,” AHL Director of Outreach and Development Chenier Reynolds-Montz said. “Ever since, students are escorted to and from the clinic by school and clinic staff to receive primary care and behavioral health services.”

The school clinics provide primary care services, including well checks, immunizations, sports physicals,

behavioral health offerings and acute and diagnostic services.

“We make an impact on these students lives by providing mental health and medical services while still allowing them to maintain attendance at school. Keeping them healthy and in class is our goal,” Michelle Babin, a family nurse practitioner at the J.B. Martin/R.J. Vial Wellness Center said. “It is important to have a consent on file for the wellness center, even if you feel you won’t need or use our services. There is always the chance that your child may become sick or injured while at school. The consent form saves time and allows your child to get the treatment they need much quicker.”

Lauren Ellis, a family nurse practitioner at the Albert Cammon Wellness Center, agreed.

“Children with completed consents on file can receive care without the inconvenience of their parents having to leave work and come to the school. In these difficult times, we are doing everything to make health care easy,” she said. “The Wellness Center at Albert Cammon Middle and St. Rose Elementary provides a safe environment for management of injuries and illnesses as well as

Acrobatic gymnastics sees each group work together to perform acrobatic moves, dance and tumbling set to music. There are three types of routines – balance, with a focus on strength, poise and flexibility; dynamic, which includes throws, somersaults and catches; and combined, which as one might expect, blends elements of both.

It’s not currently an Olympic sport, though some hope that will soon change. Whether that shift comes or not, Jones hopes to springboard from national competition to competing in an international competition once she works her way up.

Jones is already a 9-year gymnastics veteran, beginning when she was age 7.

“She’s been a captain for five years. She has just been amazing. She started off as a very quiet 7-year-old, and she’s super determined,” said Kelli Wilson, Jones’ coach. “Her attitude is, ‘whatever you ask me, I’ll do it.’ It’s wonderful to see how far she’s come over the years.”

When she was exposed to acrobatic gymnastics for the first time at her gym, she was intrigued – and soon hooked.

“I saw them doing all this cool stuff and thought, ‘OK, I definitely want to get into this.’ You get to work with other people and build a connection. It’s really fun ... you’re building different skills, and a lot of them seem really difficult and maybe impossible for you to do at first,” Jones said. “But then you work at it and learn it, and that’s the best reward – that skill is now yours, you have it.”

Now a team captain, she learns those skills through a tremendous work ethic. She estimates she spends about five to seven hours each day of working out at the gym, tumbling, stretching and working on conditioning. Building that connection with teammates, she noted, is among the most important aspects in a sport where trust and chemistry make a world of difference.

An interesting aspect of the sport is these teams are not necessarily comprised between all athletes in the same age group or experience levels, either: for example, while Jones is 16, teammates DeJean and McCastle are 13 and 7, respectively.

She takes her role as captain seriously, and believes that as much as anything she can offer athletically, leadership is of utmost importance.

“I really think my biggest strength is communication with my partners,” Jones said. “Helping them stay motivated and building them up so we can go out there and be confident as a group.”

All the while, she’s an honor student at Destrehan.

“I don’t procrastinate my school work,” said Jones of her ability to balance her workload. “As soon as I get home, I get to my homework and study.”

The season is over, but she’s already looking forward to her next chance to step out on the floor – and fly through the air.

“Last season I was at level 9, so I’m hoping to get to level 10 or higher soon,” she said.

a year,” Shavor said of her mom’s teaching career. “She’s currently at John L. Ory in LaPlace.”

Lauren said her mother’s St. Rose household contracted COVID-19 in late July. Sparacello’s 15-year-old son was the first to be diagnosed, and later the virus spread to the three other siblings and Sparacello. While everyone else has since recovered, Sparacello’s case was not as mild.

“While my siblings and I only got a few sniffles here and there, my mom was not so lucky,” Shavor said. “She ended up contracting Covid pneumonia, which has resulted in her having to be put in the ICU. She’s having a very hard time breathing on her own.”

Sparacello was airlifted to Ochsner Main Campus in Jefferson last week when a bed became available there.

“Ochsner wants all of its critical patients at a one place, and they had a spot open up,” Shavor said, adding that while the family has been getting increasingly good reports on her mother there are still very limited visitation options. “My grandma Marie Sparacello and I are doing our best to keep this household running in my mom’s absence, thus allowing her all of the time and energy she needs to get better. However, even with my two jobs, it’s becoming increasingly difficult to make up the difference for bills.”

Shavor has set up a GoFundMe for her family – titled Help Connie Sparacello and Her Family – to raise money for bills and medical expenses.

“A lot of people have contacted me asking if they can help so I created this on my family’s behalf,” Shavor said. “Every cent donated will be used for bills and food, and anything extra will be going to help cover my mom’s medical bills.”

Shavor said the flood of support from the community has been overwhelming.

“Oh my goodness it means so much,” she said. “I didn’t know who all would do it but the outpouring from the community has been so great. People have donated and sent money through Venmo and brought food ... it’s just so heartwarming to see so many people help and see how many people care and have been touched by her life. It means the world to us.”

INFUSIONS from 1A

Registered Nurse Matthew Frost, who has earned his Master of Science in Nursing: Health Care Systems and serves as the Oncology Director for Ochsner Health- River Region, said the goal of the infusions is to help a COVID-19 patient get a jump on the virus and reduce the likelihood of experiencing severe symptoms.

“Certain people diagnosed with COVID-19 are more likely to develop severe symptoms and be hospitalized, and receiving an antibody infusion may help,” Frost said. “Monoclonal antibodies are artificial antibodies created to fight the COVID-19 virus and if an eligible patient receives them early enough, these antibodies may help supplement their own immune system—especially if they have not started producing antibodies on their own yet.”

The infusions are offered by appointment only at 879 Milling Road in Luling, and all patients receiving the infusions must have a referral from a primary care or urgent care physician. The monoclonal antibody infusions take two hours from start to finish. Frost said as of Aug. 5, the hospital’s staff was able to see patients the same day they received their referral.

“Aug. 2 was the first day we began offering the infusion and we have seen an increase in daily visits each day,”

he said. “We have the capacity to do 32 infusions per day. With the uptick in COVID positivity rates in our community we expect our schedules will tighten, but we will make every effort to help as many patients as we can. So far the patients have been very appreciative. Our staff working the unit have shared that patients are thanking them multiple times per day for their service and told them they were so hopeful to feel better soon.”

As the hospital system continues to offer innovative COVID treatments, Ochsner officials said the demand for COVID testing is in high demand once again. Testing is available Monday-Friday from 3 – 8 p.m. at the Ochsner Health Center- Luling, located at 1057 Paul Maillard Rd. in Luling. The PCR test is for symptomatic patients 12 and older.

Ochsner is also still facilitating COVID-19 vaccinations at various River Region sites. Currently vaccines are offered every Tuesday from 3 – 4:30 p.m. at the Ochsner Health Center-Luling and every Thursday from 1:30 – 3:30 p.m. at the Ochsner Health Center- LaPlace Medical, located at 735 West 5th St. in LaPlace.

pressure and a tourniquet to the wound to control the bleeding and quick determination of a safe landing zone led to saving the patient’s life.”

Sill, who has been a police officer for eight years and with the parish for five years, said he credits 14 weeks of tangible training that he received from the St. Charles Parish Sheriff Office in 2018 for preparing him to assess the situation and make the right decisions that day.

“The training was intense in all aspects of law enforcement,” Sill said. “I feel honored and humbled to be recognized for doing something I truly love doing. My favorite part about being a police officer is being able to assist the community in its time of need.”

Champagne said protecting the lives of people in St. Charles Parish is a priority to the employees of the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office.

“Deputy Sill’s quick thinking and fast actions during a chaotic situation saved a human’s life,” he said. “I am very pleased with all of the men and women at the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office, and it is always a great honor for my deputies to be recognized for their actions.”

As for Sill, he said he has no doubts about whether he is in the right career.

“My profession brings me joy when I am able help the members of our society feel safe and confident to invoke trust in my abilities to protect and serve them,” he said. “When I see the pride and joy in my kids’ eyes when I’m in my police uniform, I know I picked the right profession.”

during the situation he was in,” Mason said. “Not once. He never wanted us to know the severity. Anytime he’d talk, he’d say, ‘Oh, I’m good. I’m good.’ That’s just how he was.”

Mason called it a devastating blow for he and his siblings, who also lost their mother in 2007.

“It hurts,” said Mason, who lives in Arkansas where he currently attends school. “I know they’ll never be able to watch me walk across the stage. It’s tough. We’re holding up pretty good but it’s tough.”

Charles was under hospice care before his death. Mason said due to his illness, he could not work nor could he afford housing. He also could not get life insurance, which was not available to him: Mason noted given Charles’ illness, he would have to be alive for two years with the condition before he could be granted a policy. He died six months shy of that mark.

Thus, after his passing, his children had to put aside their grieving in the face of a practical matter: they would have to cover the costs of the funeral, and could only afford so much.

Mason set up a GoFundMe to help offset the costs, which to date has seen nearly \$6,000 in donations.

“We’re definitely very grateful. I barely have enough money to cover myself ... I don’t have the money for this, and it’s the same for my brother and sister. He was going to have a cremation service and that was it, if not for this. His body was going to be burned and we’d get the ashes, and that would be the end. We’re so thankful for everyone who’s stepped up to help us.”

He said he was inspired by the outpouring.

“I know a lot of my friends donated, and I can’t even describe how much that means to me, to know I’m loved by so many people. And it’s the same for my brother and sister. There were some random people who donated to it as well ... it just shows that there are good people in this world. You hear about all the negatives but there are still good things that happen,” Mason said.

The donations so far have allowed him to shift his mind back to where it should



be at such a time: remembering a man who he said was as much a friend to him as a father.

“He loved to cook,” Mason recalled proudly. “He loved cooking for us. And he lived and breathed LSU ... he never stopped talking about it. He actually walked on with them (in football) back in his glory days. He had to step away from that because of a back injury.”

That didn’t derail Charles’ spirit, as he took up playing the tuba and earned a place with the Tigers’ Golden Band from Tigerland. Charles worked with computers as an IT specialist and also in the restaurant industry.

Most of all, he loved his children.

“He would always say, ‘I’m not your dad, I’m your friend,’” Mason said. “He was always there to talk ... he gave me plenty of advice, especially over the past six months, about being a man. And it was always good advice.”

“He was a great guy. He’d do anything to help anybody ... give the shirt off his back for anybody around.”

staff, a strong partnership with parish District Attorney Joel Chiasson as major factors in the rate decline.

One more notable credit he issued was to the people of the parish for their cooperation and drive to keep their community safe.

“We will continue to be vigilant and appreciate the cooperation of the people of St. Charles Parish, who in most cases do not hesitate to provide information about actual and potential crime and the perpetrators thereof. This is not the case in many jurisdictions. Cooperation and assistance from the public is also an essential factor,” said Champagne.

preventative care such as physicals and immunizations. Our staff includes a nurse practitioner, medical assistant and licensed clinical social worker to treat to whole student.”

This year the school-based health centers will also be offering COVID vaccines.

“Currently, Pfizer is the only vaccine approved for children ages 12 and up,” Reynolds-Montz said. “Parental permission must be given before a COVID vaccine is administered.”

HHS 21' schedule playoff tested

Will start season off with 7 straight against 2020 playoff teams

Hahnville's schedule is chock full of splashy names, promising several battles between the Tigers and other traditional powers from around Louisiana.

The Tigers will be tested early and often, including two clashes with River Parish rivals within the first four weeks – and seven consecutive games against 2020 playoff qualifiers to begin the season.

Hahnville kicks off its season at home with a battle of traditional state powers of the River Parishes, as it hosts West St. John in the season's first week.

different as these two kick the season off.

In Week 2, Hahnville gets a stern test in the form of host Mandeville, which marched to the Class 5A quarterfinals last season before falling to Acadiana. Mandeville went 8-2 in 2020 and 10-4 in 2019, and the Skippers are expected to be among 5A's upper class once again. This very well could be a playoff preview.

Cementing the fact Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet was not shy about testing his team in pre-district play, the third pre-district contest for Hahnville

district championship aspirations this season.

The Tigers open District 7-5A play Week 4 as it faces off with – drum roll – the archrival Destrehan Wildcats, Luquet's alma mater and a team that reached the 5A state semifinals last year. Destrehan felled Hahnville 36-23 last season, and the Tigers will be taking aim at earning

its first victory over the Wildcats since 2017. The Tigers will host the always-electrifying showdown this year.

In Week 5, Hahnville battles Thibodaux on the road. Last season the teams combined to score just shy of 100 points as HHS earned a 64-35 victory at home.

Then comes a road matchup against East St. John, which many expect to field the school's best team in years. Expectations are high in Reserve – and always are in Boutte. This is a game that will likely carry a true postseason-like atmosphere with it, and Hahnville will no doubt enter with a chip on its shoulder, looking to avenge a lopsided loss at Joe Keller Stadium in 2020.

Hahnville gets a break from 7-5A competition in week seven, but not a break from strong competition as a very good De La Salle team visits Tiger Stadium after going 10-1 last season. The Cavaliers were a 3A

quarterfinalist and have posted at least eight wins in each of the past seven seasons, one of the state's most consistent programs.

In weeks 8 and 9, HHS will look to stay ahead of H.L. Bourgeois and Central Lafourche. The Tigers have had the respective numbers of the Braves and Trojans over the years, and last season won both games by wide margins.

In Week 10, Hahnville

faces off with a team that's emerged as one of its most fierce rivals over the past few seasons – the Terrebonne Tigers. Hahnville will travel to Terrebonne for this one. Last season, HHS edged THS in a memorable shootout in Boutte, 47-40. Two years ago, HHS rallied from an early deficit to take down Terrebonne on the road, avenging a 41-0 loss at Terrebonne from a year prior.

Thousands of backpacks given away to local students

Community members, business owners, nonprofit organizations and churches from all over the River Region banded together this summer to make sure St. Charles Parish students were ready for their first day of classes.

250 students received free school supplies and 100 children received fresh haircuts and braids when Afro L'Amour and Lili's Beauty Supply hosted the third annual Back to School Giveaway and Fresh Cuts and Braids Event.

Organizer Brandi Jacobs of Luling said the event was a resounding success.

"The event was a huge success and blessing to the kids," she said. "The children said they were grateful to have supplies, uniforms and their hair styled for the first day of school. I want my boys to look back and say, 'My mom really did something ... she helped kids.'"

Jacobs said Lili's Beauty supply in Luling provides her with the space and products she needs to make the event successful, and that her desire to give back to the community is fueled from her own experience of being bullied as a child because she didn't have some of the things other kids had.

"I don't have much to give, but I do have talent," Jacobs said. "I understand how expensive it can be to get a child's hair done. I want the kids to go to school prepared and give the children something to look forward to with a touch of love."

In another event, St. Charles Parish and United Way of St. Charles once again joined forces to host their annual Youth Rally/Backpack giveaway event, where 700 backpacks were given away.

Kacy Kernan, United Way of St. Charles Director of Community Impact, said the dedication to the event even through the pandemic of the past year-plus is because the cause is an important one. She noted the average cost of school supplies for a given child in 2021 is close to \$200, making this time of year a challenging one for many parents.

"Many years ago, it was our goal to create an event where families who needed the help could come out, learn about community resources, and get a kick start on the supplies they need for school," Kernan said, also noting that over the years the event has blossomed into a partnership with organizations

NOTICE is hereby given, pursuant to article IV, section 21 (D) (1) of the Louisiana Constitution, that on July 30, 2021, Entergy Louisiana, LLC ("ELL") an electric public utility providing retail electric service to customers in fifty-eight Parishes of the State of Louisiana, filed with the Louisiana Public Service Commission ("LPSC" or the "Commission") in LPSC Docket No. U-35991, First and Second Supplemental Applications requesting a Financing Order, a new Rider Financed Storm Cost IV ("FSC IV") rider schedule, and a new Rider Storm Cost Offset IV ("SCO IV") rider schedule, to implement various rate changes for recovery in rates of costs related to Hurricanes Laura, Delta, Zeta and Winter Storm Uri pursuant to Act No. 55 of the Louisiana Regular Session of 2007 ("Act 55"), as supplemented by Act No. 293 of the Louisiana Legislature's Regular Session of 2021 (together the "Restoration Law").

In order to pursue financing authorized by the Restoration Law, ELL and the Louisiana Utilities Restoration Corporation ("LURC" or "Corporation") have requested that the Commission approve and authorize the Corporation to finance, through the issuance of system restoration bonds, ELL's system restoration costs associated with Hurricanes Laura, Delta, and Zeta, and Winter Storm Uri and related relief under the Restoration Law. The Corporation and ELL have requested Commission authorization for the issuance of system restoration bonds in one or more series in an aggregate principal amount equal to the sum of \$2.181 billion of net system restoration costs, which includes the costs of reestablishing and funding a storm damage escrow in the amount of \$290 million, carrying costs and unamortized debt costs on interim financing, and issuance costs.

To finance these costs, ELL proposes to implement Rider FSC IV Rates, on behalf of LURC, effective by billing on the first day of the first billing cycle of the next revenue month following the issuance date of the system restoration bonds. Assuming system restoration bond issuance on February 1, 2022, Rider FSC IV Rates will be implemented with the first billing cycle of March 2022. The Rider FSC IV Rates, as periodically adjusted, will continue in effect until all system restoration bonds shall have been paid in full and all financing costs of the system restoration bonds shall have been recovered in full. ELL requests Commission determination that the calculation of the Rider FSC IV Rates will apply to all rate classes, including any Special Contracted Rate customers and will be non-bypassable, which means that, with limited exception, all existing and future LPSC-jurisdictional ELL customers will be responsible for these charges.

Other adjustments required to compensate for certain costs or benefits relating to elements other than those relating to the financing transaction, including accumulated deferred income taxes and other savings pursuant to Restoration Law Financing, are proposed to be reflected in the Rider SCO IV.

If the Commission were to issue a financing order for the full amount requested by ELL and were it to adopt the rate design reflected in Riders FSCIII and SCOI (pertaining to Hurricane Isaac): (1) the system restoration charge, billed on behalf of the LURC, on the monthly electric bill through Rider FSC IV for one of ELL's LPSC-jurisdictional residential customers using 1,000 kWh is estimated at \$5.10 per month; (2) the first year's Rider SCOI imposed on the monthly electric bill of one of its LPSC-jurisdictional residential customers through proposed Rider SCOI using 1,000 kWh is estimated to be a credit of \$0.32 per month; and (3) the net effect of Rider FSCIV and Rider SCOI on a residential customer using 1,000 kWh is estimated to be \$4.78 per month, which equates to an increase of 4.1%.
