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500 homes destroyed in parish, 7,000 received major damage

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St. Charles Parish Hospital CEO Keith Dacus, St. Charles Parish President Matt Jewell and SCPH Associate Medical Director Dr. Victoria Smith discussed the current state of the hospital and parish and what long-term challenges each may face when St. Charles Parish Hospital hosted a Hurricane Ida Recovery Facebook Live on Friday.

Smith guided the conversation, which began with the current state of affairs at the hospital and within the parish. Talk later pivoted to what on-going challenges may be within the parish and hospital system.

“All departments, services and providers are all back in their office,” Dacus said. “The hospital is open ... all clinic offices, pharmacies and outpatients services are open as well.

Dacus said the hospital was evacuated on Aug. 29 as Hurricane Ida took aim at St. Charles Parish, but that the ER stayed open in anticipation of residents’ needs.

“It’s a long road we’ll have to get the hospital back into the state it was in,” Dacus said, adding that one of the long-term issues the hospital system will face is extensive roof damage. “All services

are being provided ... they just might not be in their original location ... we’re open and excited to see everyone.”

Smith said the many appointments and services canceled because of the storm are currently being rescheduled.

“We’re being very proactive in reaching out to patients to get them back in, but we know people are dealing with communication challenges,” Smith said. “We know that this has been just so challenging, especially in St. Charles Parish.”

Smith added present-day medical care is also complicated with the pandemic.

“We really want to encourage you not to put off your regular health care on top of dealing with any challenges you may be having at your homes,” she said. “We don’t want you to let your health slide.

Wrestling squad helps pin down cleanup efforts in community

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Joy Maddox wasn’t sure where to turn to even start the process of regrouping after Hurricane Ida, but she knew she needed help.

The aftermath of Ida hasn’t been easy for the residents of St. Charles Parish, and for Maddox and her family, the considerations went beyond the damage her Paradis home incurred – which was considerable. Maddox’s mobility is hindered by knee and hip replacement surgeries, and she cares for her 77-year-old mother who is on oxygen. Her 16-year-old grandson is autistic.

And through all of this, her 36-year daughter was hospitalized and placed into ICU Aug. 6, a term that necessitated eventual brain surgery which she underwent last week. She’s since been discharged, but she was hospitalized through the storm and her surgery delayed.

The four all live together, but as was the case for so many, Ida brought severe damage upon their home and community as a whole. It was a tough blow as it was, but especially so considering Maddox had just purchased the home on Aug. 20 after renting it for the past two years.

“Eight days later, wouldn’t you know it. We were devastated to see it,” said Maddox, who remains evacuated. “We’ve lived here for two years and

we like it here, like the people here, so of course we wanted to stay. We don’t have a lot of close friends here ... with taking care of my daughter, my mom and my grandson, it’s not conducive to a lot of socializing.

“So, there’s a lot of wind and water damage. Financially, we’re not in a situation to fix it or do it ourselves ... you feel kind of helpless.”

She did reach out to a family friend, Celina Gregory, and as it turned out Gregory knew someone that might be able to help Maddox get the ball rolling on recovering her home. She reached

Luling church housed, fed lineman

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Luling resident Rebecca Zirkle Matthews, a member of and secretary at New Life Community Church, said she has been blown away at the community’s response after Hurricane Ida.

“We have been housing and feeding lineman since they came to the area after the storm,” she said. “We are also allowing the community members to come in and pick up what they need from our donations supplies. Melanie Fontenot and Beth Dupuy have been amazing ... they really took the reins and volunteered tirelessly.”

Matthews said the church’s involvement in storm recovery started immediately after the hurricane.

“Right after the storm the Cajun Navy got in touch with us about setting up a distribution center at the church,” she said.

Church members and community volunteers have been instrumental in manning the center as well as housing and feeding linemen, Matthew said. The church, which has still been offering weekly worship services, has also had a daily dinner available for the community.

“It’s a little weird because the church has become a distribution center in there ... it’s like, ‘Move the rice over and sit where you can,’ she said laughing. “But it’s been amazing ... the amount of people who have stepped up in the community, especially since all

of us have damage from the storm. It’s great to see people come out and help each other.”

Matthews said the distribution center was opened through September and filled with supplies from the community, as well as other churches who donated to the cause. She added that recovery efforts at the church, which is located at 134 Lakewood Drive in Luling, would end in September but that the church would continue to assess the needs of the community and meet them as possible.

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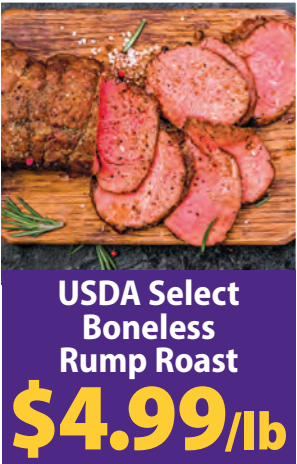
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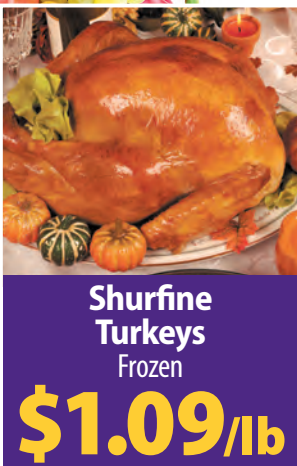
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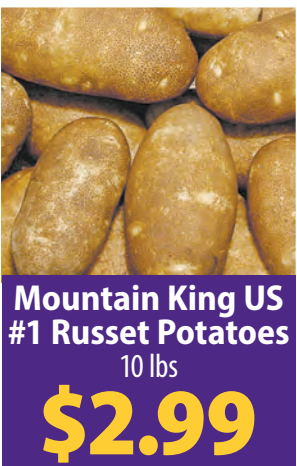

Sandra said currently the family is sorting through a huge influx of clothes, but that a common request

During a trip to their home to collect belongings, Gabrielle asked Raelene to grab all her jewelry-making supplies.

“She had tons of beads and she asked for all of her jewelry making stuff ... and it just kind of went from there,” Raelene said. “She told me, ‘I want to donate money to people who lost their homes.’”

The mother and daughter duo devised a plan to help.

“We heard how bad the school was and we knew a lot of teachers put a lot of time and money into their classrooms and that a lot of them had lost their homes and classrooms as well,” Raelene said, adding they have been in contact with Norco Elementary administration and plan to donate the money to teachers there.

Gabrielle has raised over \$500 by selling her custom jewelry pieces to family and friends who live all over the country, and Raelene laughed when she said her daughter is currently working overtime to catch up on all her orders.

“It makes me feel happy that the teachers can get new things,” Gabrielle said.

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From repairing homes and gifting gas cards to donating supplies and feeding the community, Valero sprang into action to support its employees, community partners and neighbors in St. Charles Parish following Hurricane Ida's Category 4 landfall on Aug. 29.

Within one week of landfall, Valero had supported its employees' recovery with 9,400 meals, 156 homes repaired, 35,000 gallons of fuel for vehicles and generators, 700 gas cans, 60 pallets of water or sports drinks, 200 chainsaws, 200 residential generators and 300 extension cords.

Valero also announced a contribution of \$500,000 to agencies on the front lines directly serving communities affected by Hurricane Ida, and held a series of fuel card giveaways for St. Charles Parish Hospital and parish government employees, as well as St. Charles Parish firefighters.

In Jewell’s segments, the parish leader spoke about the complexities of debris pick-up and how it – in addition to the restoration of parish-wide internet service – top the list of long-term storm-related challenges. He also said there was extreme damage to many government buildings, including the courthouse.

Jewell said although a second debris management site is now open on the East Bank of the parish, it may be another month or longer until all debris is picked up.

“Our parish received a considerable amount of damage from one end to the other,” he said. “We’ve done a damage

assessment.”

The assessment details that 500 parish homes were completely destroyed in the storm, while 7,000 homes received major damage. Another 14,000 homes, Jewell said, received some degree of storm damage.

“Literally every structure in St. Charles Parish has had some sort of effect from Hurricane Ida,” he said.

Jewell spoke of the importance for parish-wide internet to become available soon, as many local residents are working from home and needing the internet for school or telemedicine appointments.

While there is still considerable work to do, Jewell said, a month of progress has made a world of difference.

out to Abby Chabert of Luling, a parent of a member of the Brother Martin wrestling team – the team was traveling in the area and pitching in to help members of the community with cleanup efforts.

“I asked if she knew anyone helping out ... the next thing I know, there are six truckloads of teenage wrestlers, their coach and several parents going around to help people. I don’t know them, they don’t know me, but they heard about our needs and took it upon themselves to do it,” Maddox said.

“I’m in close contact with our Crusader wrestling head coach, Andrew Nicola,” said Chabert. “When we checked on each other and our wrestling families, everyone just asked who needs help. A few parents reached out and dropped their wrestlers off at the United Way distribution site on Highway 90. Coach Nicola, his wife, Amy, and their new baby, Ava came too.”

That meeting took the idea of helping out into a concrete plan to do so as soon as possible. Chabert was in contact with some families in need, and soon Maddox’s name came up. Chabert reached out to Maddox to get permission to help out on her property

The group took the time to clear Maddox’s yard of debris.

Chabert said. “Then the neighbor behind her asked for help and they did that one, too.”

“It was a domino effect. And just before those three, we were down the road helping another family. All from word of mouth. These kids were just doing the next right thing. Now that the team is back at school they all want to help.”

While Maddox said the family still has much to do – and will need help to do it - it went a long way toward putting her mind at ease on at least one major step.

“Not a single wrestler questioned the space. They just got to work,” Chabert said. “Her yard was a total disaster and when we pulled up I thought it was going to take a while. Our coaches led the way and worked side by side. It was amazing and made me so proud to be part of it. Our boys used it as a work out.”

That night, while staying in Natchitoches, she received a photo text showing the progress made.

“This is an amazing group of kids,” Maddox said. “I offered to pay them and they refused. They wanted absolutely nothing in return. This was their last weekend off from school, and they could have used that to stay home and relax, but they wanted to help. That’s pretty special to me.”

After clearing Maddox’s yard, a 94-year-old neighbor asked if the group might be able to help out with her yard.

“They didn’t even question it,”

Chabert returned to help the effort at Maddox’s home Friday with a group of Tulane medical students, helping to rip up and remove carpet from the damaged interior.

“I’ve had so many reach out directly to me for help so I’ve been reaching out for more help to get more boots on the ground because our community needs us,” Chabert said. “Everything seems to be a waiting game or there’s a list or a cost. Some of these people just can’t do it so if I can help I will. When all this storm mess happened I was fortunate that we had minimal damage compared to others.

“Maybe I was spared so that I can help others? Who knows? Everyday I try to live with a purpose and Hurricane Ida has surely paved a path for those of us fortunate enough to help.”

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Wildcats welcome CLHS, look to stay unbeaten in 2021

Destrehan began the 2020 season with a loss. And like last season, 2021 is off to a late start thanks to matters outside the Wildcats' control.

But in no way is it a slow start. Through two weeks of play, the Wildcats have maintained a full sprint.

So far this season, Destrehan has outscored its two opponents 87-7, wins over Hahnville and H.L. Bourgeois. The Wildcats lines are dominating, the running back corps is deep, and quarterback Jai Eugene

has shown a connection downfield with each of his top three receivers, Calvin Bullock, Daniel Blood and Leslie Jefferson.

This Friday, Destrehan (2-0, 2-0) aims to make it three wins in a row as it plays host for the second straight week, this time welcoming Central Lafourche to Wildcat Stadium. The game was initially scheduled to be played at Central, but was moved to Destrehan.

Central (0-2, 0-2) has struggled through its first two games of the season:

a lopsided loss to Lutchter in the Trojans' season opener, 53-6, then a 26-8 loss at Terrebonne last week. Both games were on the road.

The Trojans bring a very young team into the matchup, the starting lineup peppered with underclassmen. Over the years, the program has developed a reputation for presenting a tough matchup even when outmatched in personnel. But the team has seen major struggles over the past year-plus: in 2020, it went 0-8, including a 42-0 loss to Destrehan. Central has lost its last 15 games since beginning the 2019 season with a 5-1 mark.

"They run a spread offense, and they have good skill guys. The quarterback (Carson Orgeron)

likes to get the ball to (Porter Zeringue and Ceontrey Raymond)," said DHS head coach Marcus Scott. "They do some good things offen-

sively. We really have to align properly and make sure we're ready to go on defense."

The Wildcats' 45-0 win over H.L. Bourgeois indicates this is a Destrehan team with a strong focus – there was no apparent letdown from its season opening rivalry win over

tice," Scott said. "We track penalties in practice, track missed tackles ... we're still looking to improve, really, because we still haven't played a perfect game. We still have chances to get better."

Destrehan's defense forced the Braves into a few turnovers early, then

took advantage of the strong field position – when it wasn't scoring itself. Linebacker Jermaine Stewart and safety Kevin Adams each crossed the goalline for defensive touchdowns to get DHS off and running. Prior to that, the scoring got started on Jai Eugene's touchdown connection with Leslie Jefferson.

Trey Nixon, Shane Lee and Brandon Freeman each added rushing touchdowns on the night.

Adams' touchdown was the latest big play for a junior safety who has developed a reputation for having a nose for the football. The Wildcats' defense has been unforgiving, with no points allowed over the past seven quarters. Adams and fellow junior safety Lynard Harris are among the reasons why. The two have earned significant playing time since each were freshmen, and now give Destrehan a wealth of winning experience on the back end of its defense.

"Outside of a couple of guys up front, the experience we had coming back was Lynard Harris and Kevin Adams," Scott said. "Those guys play very hard and do a lot of things out there to help us. They've also each played in a lot of big games already, and the great part of it is they're both juniors, so there's a lot more to come for each of them."

"We're all about attacking the football and being aggressive, and we've had a great team effort from our defense as a whole. Those two do a good job leading the way for us."

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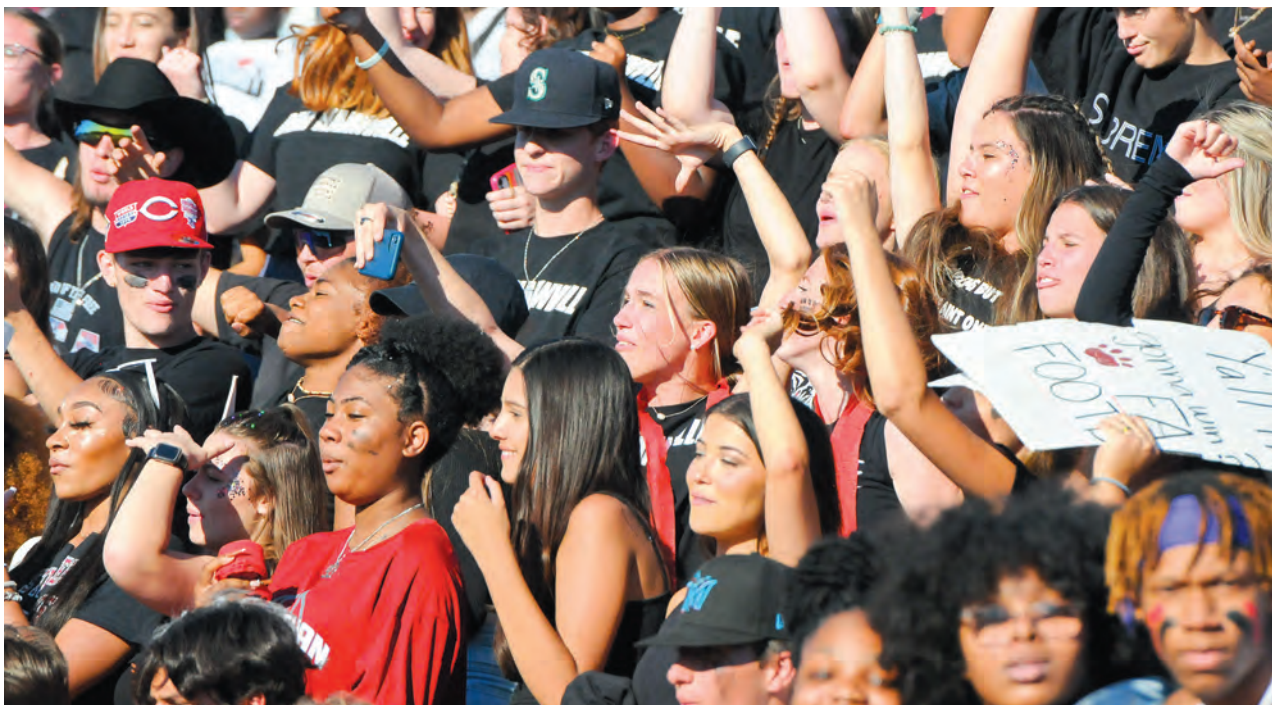
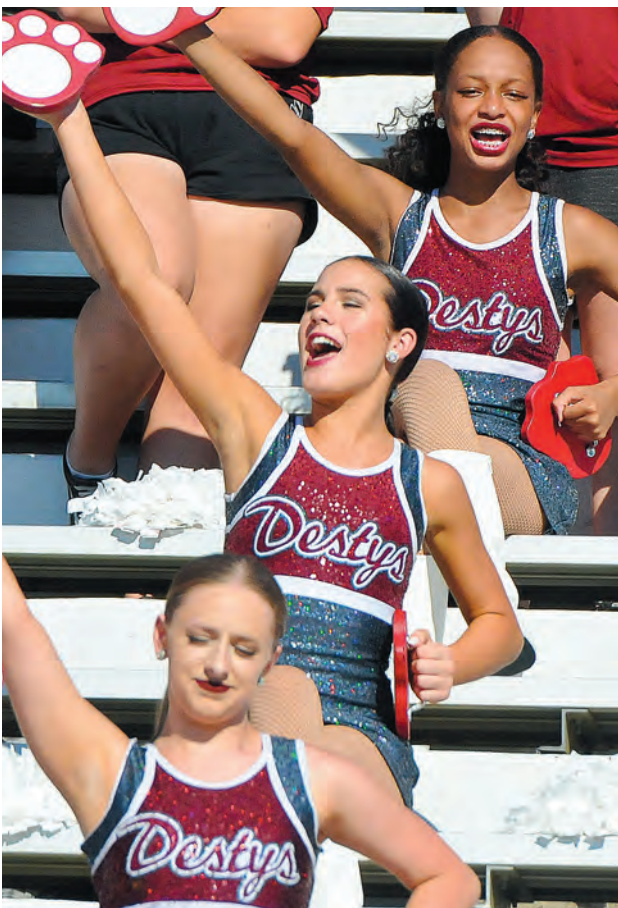
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Tigers seek turnaround performance on road

An 0-2 start at Hahnville is a rare beast – one of many oddities during a season that’s been anything but normal. Never before had Hahnville opened a season against Destrehan, let alone back-to-back dates with the the latter and East St. John to start a campaign. The three teams entered the season to be, in the view of many, the most likely to sit atop District 7-5A as champion. With losses to both, that outcome would appear to be out

of Hahnville’s reach now, barring some upsets down the line. But the Tigers very much still have the post-season in their sights, but as Tigers coach Daniel Luquet warned, that work cannot wait. It must begin now, with a win Friday night at Thibodaux. “I definitely saw some growth from week one to week two, and we’ve had a good two days of practice so far,” Luquet said Tuesday. “But yeah, we’ve got to go win. Especially with three games coming up after this week at home, if we can get this W, you start feeling better about what you’re doing. But we have to continue to play defense the way we’re playing. And we can’t turn the ball over.” Thibodaux has begun the season 1-1, with a season-opening win over East St. John, 16-14, followed by a 13-7 loss to Assumption in non-district action. Thibodaux went 4-5 last season, advancing to the playoffs before

bowing out in Round 1 to John Ehret, 21-14. Last season’s battle between the teams went the Tigers’ way, 64-35 in what was Hahnville’s highest scoring output of the season. That’s been the trend in recent years – Thibodaux’s last win in the series came in 2014, by a 19-16 score. Since that THS win, the games in the series have skewed toward higher scoring totals. But thus far this season, both offenses have struggled to get into a groove.

“They do a really good job of limiting your possessions,” Luquet said. “They get in some big fronts and really try to suck the air out of the ball. They do a good job over there calling an offense that fits their personnel. Big tight ends, they’ve got some running backs who like to block and if you have a quarterback who makes smart decisions, that works out well. And on defense, they make you drive the length and make a mistake.” Thibodaux’s top

playmakers on offense include running back Owen Murillo and wide receiver Caden Brown. The defense has played well despite the departure of cornerstone defensive lineman Jameian Buxton, who transferred to Warren Easton after his family’s home was damaged by Hurricane Ida. For Hahnville, the key is eliminating mistakes, Luquet said, and it would be hard to argue against that point. The Tigers allowed East St. John no

passing yards last Friday and drove into prime scoring position multiple times, but four turnovers left Hahnville with almost nothing to show for it in an 8-3 loss.

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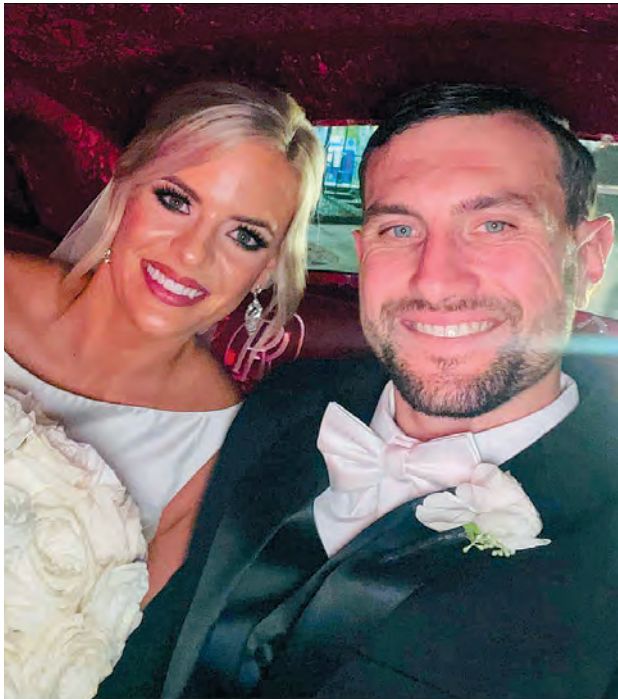
