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Superintendent's first years marked by COVID, Ida

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Upon being chosen as the new superintendent of St. Charles Parish schools in 2019, Dr. Ken Oertling no doubt knew there were challenges awaiting him in the coming years, some of them major.

He, nor anyone else, could have possibly envisioned exactly what awaited.

This school year is his third in his position after succeeding former Superintendent Felecia Gomez-Walker. His first saw the school year cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic. The school district was tasked with overhauling its operations to safeguard against the illness in Oertling's second year. And now, in his third, Hurricane Ida wreaked havoc parish-wide, damaging each of the district's campuses, displacing countless

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Melissa Perrier knew her home had been ruined before ever stepping foot back into Norco.

Melissa, her husband Craig and their 7-month-old daughter Cami were evacuated in Lake Charles for Hurricane Ida – they intended to stay home, but made the decision to leave the morning of the storm once it was established Ida

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Mason Slicker wasted no time in helping out his community in the aftermath of Hurricane Ida.

"I was riding my bike around and tarping roofs ... for free for people who couldn't pay, of course," the 16-year-old Hahnville High School sophomore said of what he did immediately after coming home from evacuating.

And his volunteering efforts only ramped up from there.

"My aunt works for United Way,

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Over 20,000 parish homes and businesses being reassessed following Hurricane Ida

Immediately following Hurricane Ida, the St. Charles Parish Assessor’s Office commissioned aerial photography of the parish to assist with damage assessment.

It was the first step, St. Charles Parish Assessor Tab Troxler said, in a complete reassessment of all personal and business properties within the parish.

“There is significant damage across the entire parish, varying greatly from minor to a total loss,” Troxler said. “It will be a challenge for us to complete this task, however, we are being assisted by various assessor’s offices from other parts of the state. We want this process to be easy and with the least amount of red tape as possible. I’m doing this the way I’d want it done for me as a resident.”

Troxler said his office is using technology, aerial photography and field workers to reassess property values. The lower values will mean less taxes due for home and business owners.

“This process is allowing us to complete area assessments more efficiently and reduce the burden for property owners,” he said, adding the post-storm reassessment is similar to a regular reassessment process done at four-year intervals as per state law. “There is no need for residents to contact the assessor’s office at this time

while reassessments are still being determined. If more information is needed from a homeowner or business owner during this process, a representative from the assessor’s office will reach out.”

In addition to aerial photography, the entire parish has been photographed from the street using a 360 vehicle camera. Troxler said field crews have already completed initial assessments of businesses.

“With the exception of Grand Isle and Lafitte, our property owners suffered far worst damage than in Orleans, Jefferson and St. Tammany parishes in general,” he said. “Not only in the

Temporary day care set up by Sheriff’s Office helped employees with recovery

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One of the most common problems in the fallout from Hurricane Ida for those who live and work in St. Charles Parish has been what to do for childcare during the day, with schools closed and many day care centers closed due to the storm fallout.

For the parish’s first responders, like deputies, their duties to serve a community that now needed them as much as ever

allowed for little time to find a solution. So, St. Charles Parish Chief Deputy Rodney Madere and a few fellow staff members proposed one, and it’s already made a difference.

The Sheriff’s Office recently opened a temporary day care center for its employees to allow for a return to work. The center is open at the

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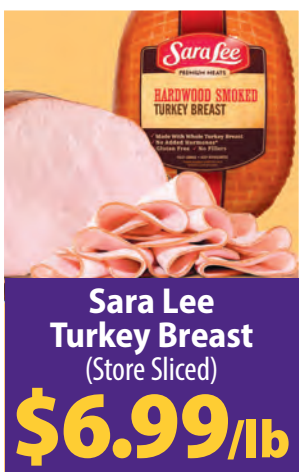
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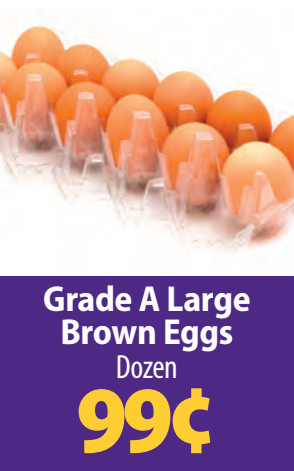
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Hahnville choir members helped feed community after Ida

teachers, students, parents and staff members and hurling school operations into limbo.

As far as initiations to a new position go: this one is unique.

Prior to the storm and a year removed from first implementing COVID-19 protocols, the experienced gained by a school year of addressing COVID left the district in better shape entering 2021-22.

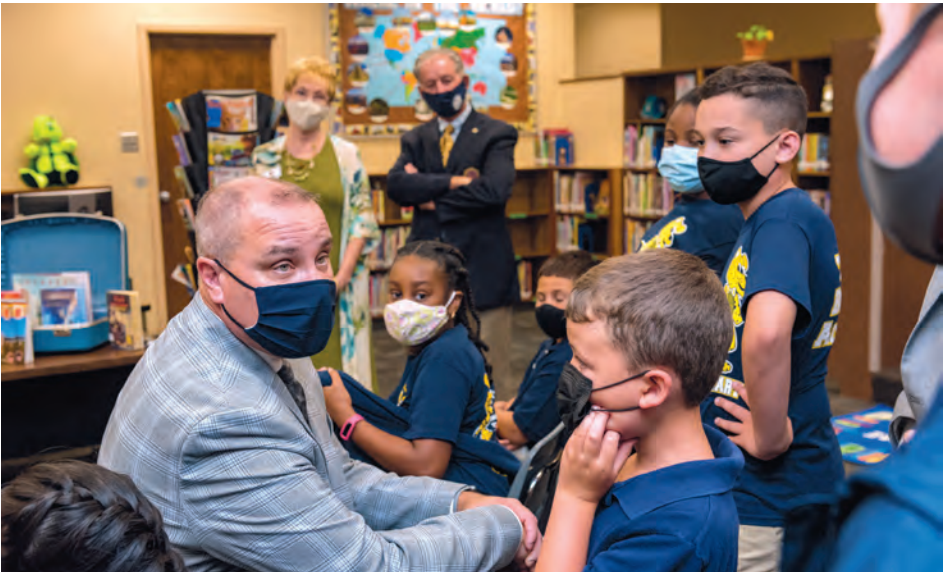
"We were in a better place," Oertling said. "Based on last year's plan and the implementation of it ... while we experienced some additional concern with the Delta variant, we felt we pushed through those challenges. And then, of course, Ida hits."

Oertling's outlook and approach haven't wavered, nor those of the many school district employees working to bring students back into the classroom – forward is the only direction to go, and there's no time to dwell on what's happened.

"We've gone through some pretty challenging times, as a whole," Oertling said. "If you look at the last two and a half years, from the start of COVID to now, it's something our whole school system has had to take on. At the same time, it doesn't define who we are. And the things we faced and had to address with COVID, I think, prepared us for some of these challenges we're facing today (post Ida).

"Challenges are opportunities. If you don't look at challenges as opportunities, then all you see are the barriers, and none of the possibilities."

Last week, the parish saw the first

school reopenings since the storm, with students returning Wednesday. These schools - Ethel Schoeffner Elementary School, Luling Elementary School, Mimosa Park Elementary School, R.J. Vial Elementary School, St. Rose Elementary School, Albert Cammon Middle School and J.B. Martin Middle School – represent the first of three phases of reopenings, based on the damage done by Ida and work needed at each site. This week, a second phase of schools were preparing to reopen. Closer to the end of the month, the third and final phase is targeted.

Reopening for COVID-19 a little more than a year ago brought its own set of challenges. That, in many ways, was a different animal, with several months between the early closing of the 2019-20 school year and the beginning of 2021. This time, the school year had already

begun, and the wheels had to begin turning toward recovery immediately.

"(The process) literally began Day 1," Oertling said. "We call it Hotel Central Office ... we have six or seven staff members who slept here those first two to three weeks ... every school was impacted, but at the same time, every employee was impacted in various capacities."

The team that initially hit the ground running included John Rome, Kade Rogers, Andy Mire and Teresa Brown, who Oertling said have been working "before, during and since the storm" to get schools reopened as quickly as possible.

"Seven days a week, 12 to 20 hour days. They've sacrificed a lot," Oertling said. "When we talk about this return effort, it started five hours after this storm had passed."

They were the first of many who came together and worked hard to make a return happen, keep parents informed and make each campus safe to attend, with several uncertain elements out of their hands for weeks – such as the return of power to each campus.

"We know the importance we have to our communities and to our families as a support system for our students," Oertling said. "Not just academically but socially, emotionally, in terms of mental health and nutrition. We gladly accept that responsibility and we know it's important to get open to be able to provide that support. But we have to do it in an operationally safe way."

That last part has been the most challenging aspect, he said – returning safely meant quickly assessing and addressing logistical issues.

The reopenings thus far were made possible by a common goal and the relentless work of so many toward it – one reason, perhaps, why Oertling doesn't spend much time dwelling on his own strange circumstances in his first years as superintendent – these are different times for everyone, he says.

"To see the impact that storm has had on our community, I think we all certainly feel a greater sense of purpose to open our schools," Oertling said. "I feel inspired every day by the people who work alongside me on a daily basis and who realize the importance of what we're doing. And to be able to get back and see the faces of our teachers, administrators and ultimately our students, it's pretty phenomenal."

destructiveness, but also in terms of sheer numbers. As such, we need to reassess all properties to determine the extent of damages. Due to the varying degree of damage from property to property, a single reduction would not be fair.”

Troxler said his office will use a five-tier system – with a rating of one indicating minimal damage and score of five signifying a complete tear down - to categorize damages and reduce values accordingly. Once reassessments are completed, they will be posted online and available in the assessor’s office for review by residents.

“We have 20,000 plus properties to review, which we hope to complete by the beginning of November,” he said. “At that time property owners will be able to view the changes we made to their property assessment by visiting us online. We feel the vast majority will agree with our findings and will not need to do anything further. Like many others, I personally have suffered extensive damage to my home and the last thing I need is another form to fill out or another line to stand in.”

Troxler said residents who feel the assessor’s office did not quite capture all damages will then be encouraged to contact the office for further review.

“The goal is to remove the burden from residents at this time when most are busy dealing heavily with insurance companies and/or FEMA,” he said. “I can promise you it will be good but it will not be perfect. I think 98 percent ... maybe even 99 percent ... of folks will see their reassessment and be very comfortable.”

Troxler said the expedited reassessment process means that his office has about eight weeks to do a job that is normally done in eight months.

“Typically tax bills are due by December 31 ... but because of the work that has to be done and timing the taxes due will likely have to be pushed back into sometime in the first quarter of 2022,” he said “That’s a huge decision.”

Nothing is set in stone on that matter yet, Troxler said, adding that the many public entities that rely on property tax dollars would be greatly affected by an extension for home and business owners.

department’s training facility.

“We had all of our deputies at work, and a lot of our support staff wishing to return immediately after the storm,” said Cpl. James Grimaldi, Sheriff’s Office spokesman. “One of the problems was we had no day cares open in the parish, many families and friends still evacuated, and the few people that were home did not have electricity and had damaged homes not suitable for child care.”

By opening a temporary child care at work, it allowed everyone to be able to return to work. It also helped ease employees’ minds that their child/children were safe and well taken care of, Grimaldi said. He noted many sheriff’s deputies were working 16-hours or more a day, and the center provided a measure of stress relief – also supported by the fact that with their children close by, they were able to visit with them periodically during a shift.

The center averaged between 30 to 36 children a day who were looked after by staff members who volunteered to be reassigned to the day care after the storm. The selected employees working in the day care had some type of experience ranging from either prior employment in child care, or were parents or grandparents with experience caring for children.

The day care was open for several weeks and was expected to be able to close by last week’s end, with enough services restored in the parish for a return to normal operations.

The ultimate purpose the day care provided was not just to allow for a temporary care area, but to help speed the total recovery effort for the Sheriff’s Office employees – and the parish as a whole as well, as deputies were also able to turn attention toward distribution of items to aid in the recovery of residents in need.

“After the storm, we were receiving shipments of commodities, food, clothing, cleaning supplies, and just about everything you could imagine,” Grimaldi said. “These items were being donated from across the country. Having our staff back allowed us to efficiently sort, organize, and package these items to be distributed to citizens throughout our parish.”

Donations also helped kickstart the day care itself.

“When we started it, we didn’t have much,” Grimaldi said. “We reached out for donations and we had everything from toys, clothes, baby supplies, tables, chairs, arts and crafts supplies ... you name it.”

It was one of a number of services set up at department headquarters for similar purposes, ranging from laundry services available on site and hot lunch and dinner provided by the Sheriff’s Office or organizations who donated for the purpose.

“We have had countless organizations that came in and offered to tarp deputies’ roofs, gut damaged homes, or provide services required to help recover,” Grimaldi said. “This was

immeasurable due to most of our employees working 16-hour days, seven days a week.

“All and all, the endless support from our citizens, our brother law enforcement agencies, our church groups, and other various organization has been overwhelming and proved to be extremely helpful in the recovery and return to normal operations. We have worked our hardest and will continue providing the best services possible to aid recovery and protect the citizens of St. Charles Parish.”

Dupuy said she had no reservations about asking the high schoolers for help.

“I had complete trust and confidence in them. I knew I would not have any issues ... they are all hard workers and ready to do anything I ask,” she said. “Most of them were looking for something to do and some way to get involved ... they kept asking to come back.

“They really enjoyed helping others and I was really impressed with them.”

St. Charles Parish - located at 13001 US-90 in Boutte - on Oct. 17 from noon to 4 p.m., and a third expo will be in Larose on Oct. 23 from noon to 4 p.m. at 115 West 10th Blvd.

Attorney Candice Colucci, an expo representative, said the events are free and open to the public.

“What we started realizing after a disaster like this is that most people haven’t been through this before and they don’t know what they don’t know,” she said. “Knowledge is power and sometimes just asking those questions and just running things by experts in the industry can make you more confident about the process you’re going through. The insurance companies are professionals ... they do this every day. Unfortunately, a lot of the time they don’t have your best interest at heart.”

Colucci said the expos are an opportunity for residents to bring in their insurance policies, pictures of their homes, correspondences with their insurance companies, denial letters, construction contracts and any other storm-related material and have it all reviewed by professionals. Vetted general contractors, roofing companies, tree removal companies, public adjusters and other vendors will also be on hand to answer questions and review recovery options.

“Dealing with an insurance claim and dealing with contractors ... it’s very difficult,” Colucci said. “It’s okay for you not to understand what’s happening. You’re not alone ... that’s always the feeling people have after these disasters. We encourage them that you’re not alone. It’s always good to air that story out to make sure you’re being treated fairly.”

Any contractors of businesses interested in having a booth at the expos should fill out the form at <https://forms.gle/vWLxz-bRnGXwWmDU79> by Oct. 14. Colucci said all companies will go through a background check and must have a valid Louisiana license.

Hahnville produced a breakthrough performance on the road at Thibodaux last week to secure its first win of the season – and in dominant fashion at 31-0, to move to 1-2. On Friday night, it returns to Tiger Stadium where a challenge awaits in non-district action.

De La Salle has emerged as one of the state's strongest programs over the past several years, and promises to be a key litmus test for the host Tigers.

Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet. "When we scheduled this game back a few months ago, we felt like we needed to get a couple more teams with playoff experience on our schedule, to get our guys ready for what we'd see in the playoffs. They do a good job of playing with two tight, fullback, in a lot of different formations. And it's something that our defense has to continue to get better at recognizing different formations for us to be suc-

cessful: this is his third season as Cavs' starter, and he's won plenty of big games over Louisiana football royalty.

"He's experienced every kind of big game. When you play in two state championships and state semifinals like he has, he pretty much has seen everything ... there's no moment in the game that's too big for him. He controls the offense. He understands ... an atmosphere like Tiger Stadium, as crazy as it is, it's not go-

Last season, De La Salle went 9-1, with the team's only loss coming in the Division II state championship game to St. Thomas More. DLS has reached that game to finish as state runner-up in each of the past two seasons; the Cavaliers have advanced to at least the Div. II state semifinals in each of the past five seasons.

"They're a good program ... look, that's a battle tested team," said

Senior quarterback Cole Milford passed for two scores in last week's win, one to Jace Bienemy and another to Kentrell Molette. Running back P.J. Martin keys the ground game, and he finished last week with 120 yards and a touchdown.

Milford is plenty

ing to rattle him. We have to keep him in the pocket and make him a thrower instead of a runner, and that will give us a strong chance to have success."

He's also going to be well-scouted – and vice versa – in this respect: the passer is the twin brother of Tigers' middle linebacker Jude Milford.

"I think that's going to be exciting for them ... you play against your brother and that brings a lot of emotion," Luquet said. "Of course, you understand it's not you versus him, it's Hahnville vs. De La Salle."

While Cole Milford has been in place for quite a while, head coach Graham Jarrott is in his first season on the job. Jarrott is back home, an alumnus of De La Salle.

Caden Jones is a mammoth offensive tackle at 6'7, 275 lbs., who has been offered by LSU. He's one major reason why Martin stays very busy in De La Salle's run-heavy attack – and Martin can make great use of the running room Jones and the line affords.

"(Martin) is a phenomenal back," Luquet said. "He does a great job pressing the hole, bounce, bounce ... he does a really great job getting behind that second puller, riding it as long as he can until he sees grass and then he bounces it out ... they want to run the football, control the clock and keep your offense off the field."

Defensively, cornerback De'Ante LeBranch

is a playmaker, as is linebacker Keidrick Richardson, another who has drawn an LSU offer – he received it last season as a just a 14-year-old freshman.

"(Richardson) is a good player. They leave him in the middle by himself, play a Cover 4 shell, and he plays sideline to sideline," Luquet said. "I think they're really good up front. I think they've got four guys who really have great motors. They do a lot of stunting up front and I think they work really well with each other."

Last week saw the game Hahnville and its supporters have been waiting for from first-year starting quarterback Donovan Friloux, who drew his first

two career starts against the likes of Destrehan and East St. John. He finished with four total touchdowns last week in Hahnville's 31-0 win over Thibodaux.

So far this season, Troy Kendrick has again been the top downfield target for the Tigers, with 13 receptions for 208 yards and a touchdown. Just behind him is Titus White, who is enjoying a breakout season with eight receptions for 147 yards thus far. Running back Cole Villaseñor missed last week's game, but his two games of work pace the Tigers in rushing with 133 yards this season on 23 carries. Joshua Joseph has added 108 yards on 24 attempts.

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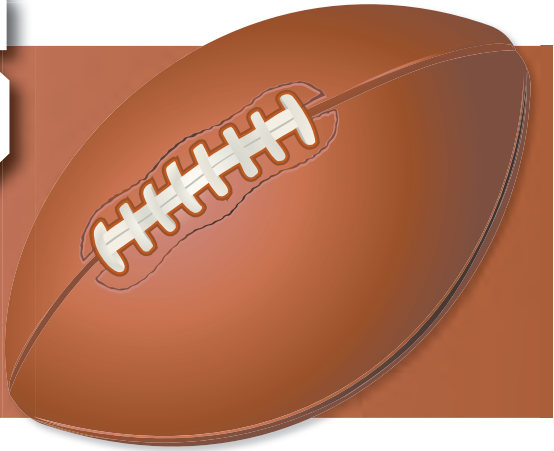

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Wildcats on fire, await matchup with Terrebonne

Trio of special teams scores highlighted win over CLHS

Destrehan’s three special teams touchdowns last Friday served as a warning to its opposition: the Wildcats can hurt you in every phase of the game – and do so relentlessly.

The team’s 56-6 win over Central Lafourche saw a touchdown on a blocked punt (Kevin Adams) and two punt return touchdowns (Anthony Robinson, Daniel Blood). A fourth score on a kickoff was negated by penalty, but the point was made by a well-coached and well-played unit: there are no

“take off” plays against Destrehan.

The Wildcats return to action this Friday night at home to host District 7-5A opponent Terrebonne

Terrebonne (1-2, 1-1) is coming off a 19-10 loss to John F. Kennedy last week in non-district action. The week prior, it downed Central Lafourche for its first win of the season. H.L. Bourgeois beat the Tigers 19-0 in the season opener.

The Tigers went 3-4 last season with a loss on the road at Dutchtown in round one of the Class 5A playoffs. Destrehan handily defeated Terrebonne last season at Wildcat Stadium, 63-7.

Offensively, Terrebonne attacks in waves, without one star above others to key on – the ball gets out into the hands of a variety of playmakers. The team had to regroup by committee after former

“They spread the ball around,” said Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott. “They have a good quarterback, good receivers and a good running back. They like to get the ball to their playmakers in

space, so they can try to make you miss and make plays.”

The Tigers are well-coached, and defensively try to confuse the offense, mixing up fronts and throwing different looks at the quarterback.

“Coach (Gary) Hill and his staff always do a good job of preparing their

players ... they like to play some Cover 2, play two high safeties to force you to do some things in the run game and passing game. They’re sound up front. They always fly to the ball and make plays ... I think they play good team defense. They play well as a unit.”

While Destrehan (3-0, 3-0) has been unchallenged through three games, head coach Marcus Scott still sees room for improvement – fewer penalties, for one, will be a must once Destrehan encounters a closer game. The Wildcats were set back a few times Friday by penalties against Central Lafourche, but Jai Eugene and the Destrehan passing game were able to convert to pick up first downs.

“Cutting down on that is one area we can definitely improve on,” Scott said.

Still, the Wildcats’ strong level of play cannot be understated – the team improved its victory margin this season to

+130, outscoring its three opponents 143-13.

An evolving passing attack has helped make that a reality. Scott said that’s an area the team must continue to improve in order for the Wildcats to reach their peak.

“You have to keep getting better, in order to maximize the abilities of the players. You ask them to do things they can do well,” Scott said. “Our offensive staff has done a good job of putting guys in position to kind of make plays and simplify the game so they can play faster.”

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to add Article VII, Section 3.1 of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to sales and use tax collection; to create the State and Local Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Commission; to authorize the legislature to provide by law for the streamlined electronic collection of sales and use taxes; to provide for commission membership; to provide for commission duties and responsibilities; to provide for commission officers; to provide for the administration of sales and use taxes; to provide for the transfer of powers, duties, functions, and responsibilities of the Louisiana Sales and Use Tax Commission for Remote Sellers and the Louisiana Uniform Local Sales Tax Board; to provide for funding; to provide for submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; to provide for effectiveness; and to provide for related matters.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to add Article VII, Section 3.1 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§3.1. State and Local Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Commission

Section 3.1.(A) The State and Local Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Commission, hereinafter referred to in this Section as the "commission", is hereby created as a statewide political subdivision. The duties and obligations of the commission shall be determined by law.

(B)(1) The membership of the commission shall be comprised of eight members, each of whom shall be subject to Senate confirmation, as follows:

(a) One member appointed by the Louisiana School Boards Association or its

(b) One member appointed by the Louisiana Municipal Association or its successor.

(c) One member appointed by the Police Jury Association of Louisiana or its successor.

(d) One member appointed by the Louisiana Sheriffs' Association or its successor.

(e) The secretary of the Department of Revenue, or a designee of the secretary.

(f) One member appointed by the governor.

(g) One member appointed by the speaker of the House of Representatives.

(h) One member appointed by the president of the Senate.

(2) The initial members of the commission shall be appointed at the first meeting.

(3) The commission shall have a chairman and vice-chairman and such other officers as the commission deems necessary. The initial chairman of the commission shall be elected by commission members at the first meeting and shall be a member appointed pursuant to Subsubparagraphs (1)(a) through (d) of this Paragraph. The initial vice-chairman shall be elected by commission members at the first meeting and shall be a member appointed pursuant to Subsubparagraphs (1)(a) through (d) of this Paragraph. The election of chairman and vice-chairman positions shall continue to rotate in this manner each year.

(C) The first meeting of the commission shall be called by the speaker of the House of Representatives no later than one year following the enactment of the statutory provisions as provided for in Paragraph (1) of this Section.

(D) The commission shall:

(1) Provide for the streamlined electronic filing, electronic remittance, and the collection of sales and use taxes levied within the state ensuring prompt remittance of the respective tax returns and monies

received electronically by the commission to the single collector for each taxing authority and to the Department of Revenue for distribution. The tax monies received shall, at all times, be and remain the property of the respective taxing authorities or the state.

(2) Issue policy advice relative to sales and use taxes levied by all taxing authorities within the state.

(3) Develop rules, regulations, and guidance to simplify and streamline the audit process for sales and use taxpayers.

(E) The commission shall be funded with state and local sales and use tax revenues collected and deemed by the commission, to be reasonable and necessary costs of the administration and collection of sales and use taxes levied by all taxing authorities within the state.

(F) One year following the first meeting of the commission, the Louisiana Sales and Use Tax Commission for Remote Sellers and the Louisiana Uniform Local Sales Tax Board shall be abolished. The powers, duties, functions, and responsibilities of the Louisiana Sales and Use Tax Commission for Remote Sellers and the Louisiana Uniform Local Sales Tax Board shall be transferred to, exercised by, and under the administration and control of the commission. When the Louisiana Sales and Use Tax Commission for Remote Sellers and the Louisiana Uniform Local Sales Tax Board are abolished:

(1) Any reference in law to the Louisiana Sales and Use Tax Commission for Remote Sellers and the Louisiana Uniform Local Sales Tax Board shall be deemed to apply to the commission.

(2) All books, papers, records, actions, and other property, heretofore possessed, controlled, or used by the Louisiana Sales and Use Tax Commission for Remote Sellers and the Louisiana Uniform Local Sales Tax Board are hereby transferred to the commission.

(3) All employees of the Louisiana Sales and Use Tax Commission for Remote Sellers and the Louisiana Uniform Local Sales Tax Board shall be transferred to the commission.

(G) The adoption or amendment of any rule by the commission shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the commission and shall be in accordance with the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act.

(H) All statutory provisions enacted relative to the duties, funding, or obligations of the commission shall require the enactment of law by a two-thirds vote of the elected members of each house of the legislature.

(I)(1) Absent the enactment of statutory provisions pursuant to Subparagraphs (D)(1) through (3) of this Section, local sales and use tax collection shall be as provided in Article VII, Section 3(B) of this Constitution and state sales and use tax collection and administration shall be by the Department of Revenue as provided by law.

(2) Any law enacting provisions pursuant to Subparagraphs (D)(1) through (3) of this Section shall require a two-thirds vote of the elected members of each house of the legislature. Beginning on the effective date of such law, the provisions of Article VII, Section 3(B) of this Constitution shall cease to be effective and shall be inapplicable, inoperable, and of no effect for the limited purposes of the commission's duties as set forth in Subparagraphs (D)(1) through (3) of this Section.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on October 9, 2021. If the Act which originated as Senate Bill No. 149 of this 2021 Regular Session of the Legislature does not become effective and no statewide election is held on October 9, 2021, this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on November 8, 2022.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to authorize the legislature to provide for the streamlined electronic filing, electronic remittance, and the collection of sales and use taxes levied within the state by the State and Local Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Commission and to provide for the funding, duties, and responsibilities of the commission?

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to amend Article VI, Section 39 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§39. Levee District Taxes

Section 39.(A) District Tax; Millage Limit. For the purpose of constructing and maintaining levees, levee drainage, flood protection, hurricane flood protection, and for all other purposes incidental thereto, the governing authority of a levee district ~~created prior to January 1, 2006, except as provided in Paragraph (C) of this Section,~~ may levy annually a tax not to exceed five mills, except the Board of Levee Commissioners of the Orleans Levee District which may levy annually a tax not to exceed two and one-half mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of all taxable property situated within the alluvial portions of the district subject to overflow.

(B) Millage Increase. If the necessity to raise additional funds arises in any levee district ~~created prior to January 1, 2006,~~ for any purpose set forth in Paragraph (A) of this Section, or for any other purpose related to its authorized powers and functions as specified by law, the tax may be increased. However, the necessity and the rate of the increase shall be submitted to the electors of the district, and the tax increase shall take effect only if approved by a majority of the electors voting thereon in an election held for that purpose.

(C) **Certain Districts Created After January 1, 2006. For any purpose set forth in Paragraph (A) of this Section, the governing authority of a levee district created after January 1, 2006, and where a majority of the electors in the district failed to approve the provisions of this Section in an election held on October 9, 2021, or a levee district created after October 9, 2021,** may annually levy a tax on all property not exempt from taxation situated within the alluvial portions of the district subject to overflow. However, such a district shall not levy such a tax nor increase the rate of such a tax unless the levy or the increase is approved by a majority of the electors of the district who vote in an election held for that purpose. If the district is comprised of territory in more than one parish, approval by a majority of the electors who vote in each parish comprising the district is also required for any such levy or increase.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on October 9, 2021.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at said election there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to allow levee districts created after January 1, 2006, and before October 9, 2021, whose electors approve the amendment to levy an annual tax not to exceed five mills for the purpose of constructing and maintaining levees, levee drainage, flood protection, and hurricane flood protection? (Amends Article VI, Section 39)

10(F)(2)(a) and (b) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

ARTICLE VII

§10. Expenditure of State Funds
Section 10.

(F) Projected Deficit.

(2)(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this constitution to the contrary, adjustments to any constitutionally protected or mandated allocations or appropriations, and transfer of monies associated with such adjustments, are authorized when state general fund allocations or appropriations have been reduced in an aggregate amount equal to at least seven-tenths of one percent of the total of such allocations and appropriations for a fiscal year. Such adjustments ~~may~~ shall not exceed ~~five ten~~ percent of the total appropriation or allocation from a fund for the fiscal year. For purposes of this Subsubparagraph, reductions to expenditures required by Article VIII, Section 13(B) of this constitution shall not exceed one percent and such reductions shall not be applicable to instructional activities included within the meaning of instruction pursuant to the Minimum Foundation Program formula. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this constitution to the contrary, monies transferred as a result of such budget adjustments are deemed available for appropriation and expenditure in the year of the transfer from one fund to another, but in no event shall the aggregate amount of any transfers exceed the amount of the deficit.

(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this constitution to the contrary, for the purposes of the budget estimate and enactment of the budget for the next fiscal year, when the official forecast of recurring revenues for the next fiscal year is at least one percent less than the official forecast for the current fiscal year, the following

procedure may be employed to avoid a budget deficit in the next fiscal year. An amount not to exceed ~~five ten~~ percent of the total appropriations or allocations for the current fiscal year from any fund established by law or this constitution shall be available for expenditure in the next fiscal year for a purpose other than as specifically provided by law or this constitution. For the purposes of this Subsubparagraph, an amount not to exceed one percent of the current fiscal year appropriation for expenditures required by Article VIII, Section 13(B) of this constitution shall be available for expenditures for other purposes in the next fiscal year. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this constitution to the contrary, monies made available as authorized under this Subsubparagraph may be transferred to a fund for which revenues have been forecast to be less than the revenues in the current fiscal year for such fund. Monies transferred as a result of the budget actions authorized by this Subsubparagraph are deemed available for appropriation and expenditure, but in no event shall the aggregate amount of any such transfers exceed the amount of the difference between the official forecast for the current fiscal year and the next fiscal year.

A resolution giving preliminary approval to the issuance of not to exceed Fifty Million Dollars (\$50,000,000) of Hurricane Recovery Revenue Notes of the Parish of St. Charles, State of Louisiana; and providing for other matters in connection therewith.

WHEREAS, the St. Charles Parish Council (the "Governing Authority"), acting as the governing authority for the Parish of St. Charles, State of Louisiana (the "Issuer"), desires to incur debt and issue not to exceed Fifty Million Dollars (\$50,000,000) of Hurricane Recovery Revenue Notes (the "Notes"), in the manner authorized and provided by Section 1430 of Title 39 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended, and other constitutional and statutory authority (the "Act"), for the purpose of (i) paying any costs associated with debris removal or the demolition, rehabilitation, repair, reconstruction, renovation, restoration and improvement of the properties and facilities within the Issuer resulting from or related to Hurricane Ida, including purchasing any furnishings, fixtures and equipment incidental or necessary in connection therewith; (ii) funding a reserve, if required; and (iii) paying the costs of issuance of the Notes; and,

WHEREAS, the Notes shall be secured by and payable from a pledge of all funds or revenues received or to be received by the Issuer to the extent legally available for the payment of debt service on the Notes, provided that no such funds or revenues shall be so included which have been or are in the future legally dedicated and required for purposes inconsistent therewith by the electorate, by the terms of specific grants, by the terms of particular obligations issued or to be issued or by operation of law (such amount being the "Available Funds of the Issuer"); and,

WHEREAS, it is expressly provided that the full faith and credit of the Issuer shall not be pledged, and there shall be no obligation on the Issuer to levy or increase taxes or other sources of revenue in order to pay debt service on the Notes or to transfer any funds for the payment of debt service that may result in a violation of any law, ruling, regulation, contract or agreement applicable to the Issuer; and,

SECTION 1. **Preliminary Approval of Revenue Notes.** Preliminary approval is given to the issuance of not exceeding Fifty Million Dollars (\$50,000,000) of Hurricane Recovery Revenue Notes of the Issuer, pursuant to the Act, for the purpose of (i) paying any costs associated with debris removal or the demolition, rehabilitation, repair, reconstruction, renovation, restoration and improvement of the properties and facilities within the Issuer resulting from or related to Hurricane Ida, including purchasing any furnishings, fixtures and equipment incidental or necessary in connection therewith; (ii) funding a reserve, if required; and (iii) paying the costs of issuance of the Notes, said Notes to be secured by and payable from the Available Funds of the Issuer. The Notes shall have such additional terms and provisions as may be determined in a subsequent resolution of the Issuer.

SECTION 2. **State Bond Commission.** Application is hereby made to the State Bond Commission, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, for approval of the issuance and sale of the Notes and for consent and authority to proceed with the issuance and sale of the Notes as provided above, and Bond Counsel is directed to make application to the State Bond Commission in accordance with the foregoing on behalf of the Issuer. By virtue of applicant/issuer's application for, acceptance and utilization of the benefits of the Louisiana State Bond Commission's approval(s) resolved and set forth herein, it resolves that it understands and agrees that such approval(s) are expressly conditioned upon, and it further resolves that it understands, agrees and binds itself, its successors and assigns to, full and continuing compliance with the "State Bond Commission Policy on Approval of Proposed Use of Swaps, or other forms of Derivative Products Hedges, Etc.," adopted by the Commission on July 20, 2006, as to the borrowing(s) and other matter(s) subject to the approval(s), including subsequent application and approval under said Policy of the implementation or use of any swap(s) or other product(s) or enhancement(s) covered thereby.

SECTION 3. **Employment of Bond Counsel.** The Issuer finds and determines that a real necessity exists for the employment of special counsel in connection with the issuance of the Notes, and accordingly, Foley & Judell, L.L.P., of New Orleans, Louisiana, as Bond Counsel, is hereby employed to do and perform work of a traditional legal nature as bond counsel with respect to the issuance and sale of said Notes. Said Bond Counsel shall prepare and submit to the Issuer for adoption all of the proceedings incidental to the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of such Notes, shall counsel and advise the Issuer as to the issuance and sale thereof and shall furnish its opinions covering the legality of the issuance of the Notes. The fee of Bond Counsel for each series of notes

shall be fixed at a sum not exceeding the fee allowed by the Attorney General's fee guidelines for such bond counsel work in connection with the issuance of such series of revenue notes and based on the amount of said Notes actually issued, sold, delivered and paid for, plus "out-of-pocket" expenses, said fees to be contingent upon the issuance, sale and delivery of said notes. A certified copy of this resolution shall be submitted to the Attorney General of the State of Louisiana for his written approval of said employment and of the fees herein designated, and the Council Secretary is hereby empowered and directed to provide for payment of the work herein specified upon completion thereof and under the conditions herein enumerated.
