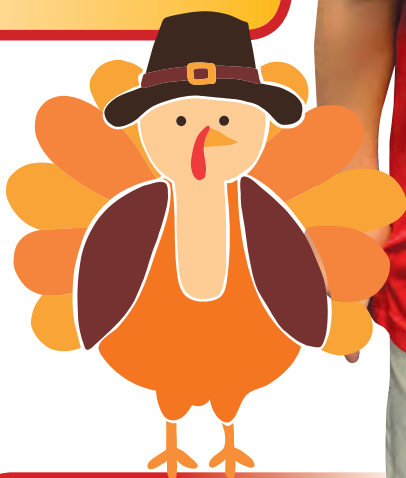

Opened his home to the family of friend and neighbor Eric DeSoto to live while the latter's home undergoes repairs.

Partnered with DeSoto to garner donations and supplies for people in need in the area, as well as buying generators and air conditioner units. Helped establish a partnership with Port Orleans Brewing to devote portion of beer sales during Craft Brew Week to United Way of St. Charles, raising \$2,000. An employee of Dow, he reached out to contractor contacts to find work for a man he met who was seeking supplies and had just lost his job.

“EROCK,” as many know him, utilized his presence on the social media platform TikTok to raise money for the local community following Ida. His viewers stepped up, and the effort brought in more than \$35,000 for the cause. That push began while he was still evacuated in Texas, and 100 percent of the funds went toward buying supplies and helping restore St. Charles Parish.

DeSoto did this despite the storm destroying his home, where he, his wife and daughter resided.

Along with group of friends, paid for groceries and handed out gift cards at Wal-Mart and Home Depot, respectively, to community residents. Purchased generators, refrigerators, gas cans and other items for locals in need. Loaded up a U-Haul of supplies to bring into neighborhood for restoration effort.

As soon as the conditions from Ida weakened enough to go out, Sheriff's Office team of employees immediately embarked on effort to clear roadways to make parish accessible to first responders.

Team utilized 4x4 vehicles, tow straps, a skid steer bobcat and chainsaws among its tools to cut down lines, drag trees away and open up obstructed areas that would otherwise have been too dangerous, or impossible, to venture through.



The effort was especially important as well as some areas were accessible solely by foot until things were cleared out.

"It was a matter of using anything we could to clear the roads for people to get from one point of the parish to another, and also to allow for our employees to be able to return to we could all start rebuilding and coming back together as a parish ... for first responders, we needed to know they could get where they needed to get to, for any kind of emergency or medical calls ... Overall, the community really came together after the storm and it showed what St. Charles Parish is all about." - Cpl. James Grimaldi.

This team was deployed when weather conditions had deteriorated to a point normal patrol vehicles were rendered unable to provide assistance.

Dispatchers trained in crisis intervention and de-escalation with Sheriff's Office spoke with those trapped or suffering from other emergencies, even staying on the line with the caller until response could arrive in some cases.

"A lot of problems we had during the storm came when people who stayed lived in mobile homes, in not sound structures, and people needed help in the middle of the storm. We had a crew assigned to emergency calls ... we had an Mwrap, the heaviest, largest equipment we have with the Sheriff's Office, and that isn't going to flood out in water. We used it to respond to calls and were able to use it for the majority of the storm." - Cpl. James Grimaldi.

Ruston visits DHS in quarterfinal

Rematch of classic 2020 quarterfinal showdown, defensive slugfest between premier programs

Fans of tough, defensive-minded football games fortunate enough to witness Destrehan and Ruston's quarterfinal battle a year ago no doubt remember it fondly – and are no doubt eagerly awaiting a second-serving of that, fittingly, on Thanksgiving week.

Both teams have become known over the years for ball-control, powerful offense and rugged, stingy defense and last year's contest

was a truly intense battle, with just one score in the game: Tyler Morton was the hero, his scoop and score of a fumble with less than eight minutes left supplied the winning points and propelled Destrehan into the state semifinals.

That one was at Ruston. This one will be at Destrehan, as on Friday night the No. 4 seeded Wildcats (8-0) host the No. 5 Bearcats.

Ruston enters with a

record of 10-2, with its losses coming in its regular season opener (at Neville, 27-24) and finale (at home to West Monroe, 42-14). An eight-game winning streak came in the interim, with wins over teams like Carencro, St. Thomas More, Alexandria and Ouachita Parish.

This is a team that has been tested – sternly. Neville, Ouachita Parish, West Monroe and St. Thomas More are quarterfinalists in their respective divisions.

“They’re very sound defensively,” Scott said. “They run to the ball very well and they’re physical. Very physical, a typical Ruston team in that way.”

Despite the steady competition level, one thing seems clear when it comes to the Bearcats: this is a team that can pile up yards and points in a hurry. Their loss to West Monroe was the only game in which it scored

less than 24 points all season long. Ruston averages 39.8 points per game and has topped the 50-point mark three times – including a 56-55 win over

Ouachita Parish in its seventh game.

That ability to post big numbers comes via a run-heavy offensive attack, which can make for an especially dangerous matchup this time of year given the weather conditions and the relative lack of opportunities to intercept the ball for the defense. Another wrinkle is the team's style of offense – Ruston brings the triple-option, which is less common in prep football these days, and that relative lack of experience by a defense in facing it can be an advantage.

“It’ll be our first time facing it (this season),” said Scott. “We actually practice without a ball (for it) so everyone takes care of their responsibility

without looking for the ball.”

In last week's win, Ruston quickly pulled away from Benton, which had no answer for running back Dyson Fields. Fields – one of the state's leading rushers – rolled for 234 yards and three touchdowns in the win.

“The yards after contact is what you worry about with him,” Scott said. “He runs through arm tackles and things like that, and it’s what makes him effective. He’s a powerful guy, but he can certainly outrun you. He can score from anywhere

on the field.”

This is a matchup of schools that each have strong tradition. Destrehan's run of six trips to at least the semifinal round in the past eight years is one of the more impressive marks in the state. Ruston boasts one of the most consistent programs in the state as well, with 17 straight seasons qualifying for the playoffs.

Quarterback Jaden Osborne triggers the team's option attack – this is his second season as the team's starter. Devian Wilson also punishes teams up the middle at fullback.

“(Osborne) is a returning starter ... their backs both have experience and they have three guys up front who are returning starters. They're very well-coached and they run that system very well,” Scott said.

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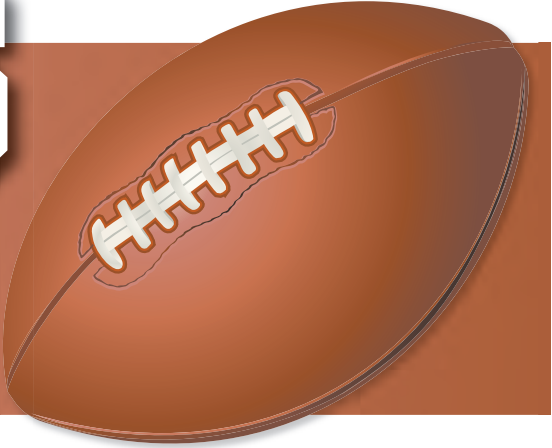

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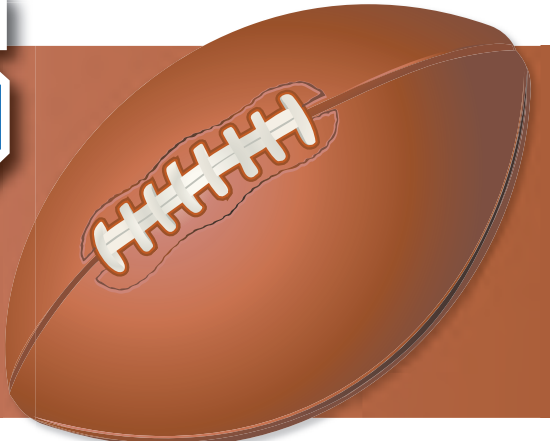

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Tigers win two of three to start season

Hahnville looks to build on 2020 quarterfinal run with experienced group

Behind the return of three now-senior starters and a key junior reserve from its 2020 Class 5A quarterfinals, the Hahnville Lady Tigers have high hopes to continue the program’s ascent this season.

Ah’Jaia Kenner, Reagan Harrold, Niara

Simmons and Kourtney Irons bring experience in their leading roles on this season’s Tigers team, which got off to a 2-1 start with victories over St. James and Loranger before suffering its first loss of the season to Walker.

“We have a lot of experience back,

and the freshmen we’re adding to the mix this year are go-getters,” Hahnville head coach Arrianna Smith said. “We’re still trying to nail down that rotation and find that chemistry. I think we’ve had that mental toughness in the past, that consistency from night to night, and we’re working toward getting back there.”

The Tigers got going early and rolled as they defeated Loranger at home, 68-43. Niara Simmons scored a game-high 22 to lead the way. Daisha Summers added 12 and Ah’Jaia Kenner 9.

Against St. James in the season opener, it was much the same as Hahnville took down the Wildcats, 61-28. Kenner scored a season-high 23 while Simmons added 14.

Walker took complete control, however, in Hahnville’s lone loss of the season thus far – a 71-33 Walker victory. Kenner scored 12 to lead Hahnville there. Walker’s Kennedy Ard led in the winning effort with 14 points, eight of those in the third quarter.

That large gap in performance between the Loranger win and Walker loss is something Smith said is indicative of the largest hurdle the team must clear to this point.

“That Loranger game, everything was really on point for us, from start to finish, from the starters to the reserves,” Smith said. “So, to go from that to where

we were against Walker ... it was disappointing, but at the same time it can be a valuable learning experience.”

Last season, Hahnville went 18-4 and marched to the state quarterfinals, falling at the hands of the classification’s top seed in Ponchatoula.

Intense defensive pressure has been the name of the game for Smith’s Tigers during her tenure. Being able to turn that dial back up to the same level is the goal, Smith said, but right now it’s a work in progress.

“We’re trying to get back there,” Smith said. “With the hurricane putting us out, we’re a little off track in terms of conditioning to where we’d like to be. Otherwise, just a matter of keeping that mental focus for all 32 minutes, continuously. We see flashes of it, but it’s also been a struggle at times.”

Hahnville will have ample chances to test itself over the next several days. Matchups with strong East Iberville, John Curtis and Ellender squads loom. East Iberville and John Curtis represent two of Hahnville’s four losses a season ago – the other two coming to Ponchatoula.

“(East Iberville) is kind of a redemption game, to me,” Smith said. “Next week we’ll have Curtis and then Ellender. So, those should give us a good idea of where we are.”

Destrehan head volleyball coach Edward Borgstede announced last week he is stepping down from his position, following a five-year run leading the program.

Borgstede said it is not a retirement and called the announcement a bitter-sweet one. Borgstede served as the volleyball program’s head coach for the past five years and joined the program as an assistant six years ago.

“I have enjoyed the last six years more than anyone will know. I decided to resign because the volleyball program needs a new voice,” Borgstede wrote via Facebook. “I want to thank the administration at DHS for allowing me this opportunity to do what I love. I want to thank the former players that helped turn the program around. I want to wish the current players luck in continuing to work hard and improve. Thank you to the dedicated coaches that have been with me. Meagan Stock, Christie Taliancich, Joey Brady, Shannon Boyne, Miranda Kelley, and Courtney Cornwell. I am not retiring from coaching, just moving on.

“Destrehan High School will always be special to me. Thanks to Mr. (Stephen) Weber and Coach (Clarence) Dupepe for giving me a shot six years ago. I still have the fire and desire to keep coaching. It’s been a great ride.”

Borgstede’s Wildcats went 16-11 in his final season with the program, one played in the shadow of Hurricane Ida. It

followed up on a strong 2020 campaign, one that saw the team go 21-7 and earn a first-round playoff victory at home over Terrebonne.

The Wildcats qualified for the postseason in each of the prior two seasons as well, including a 2018 campaign that saw the then No. 20 seeded Wildcats upset No. 13 Acadiana in the opening round of the playoffs.

He joined the program as an assistant coach in 2016 before being promoted to the head coaching position in 2017. In 2016, Destrehan went 14-19 but began planting the seeds for a resurgence on the court, and in 2017 the team had a breakthrough campaign, going 17-14 and returning to the postseason for the first time since 2013.

This is to give notice that Louisiana Office of Community Development (LA OCD) under Part 58 has has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988 and/or 11990, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Wetlands Protection. The activity is funded under actions by which Statewide Federal Assistance for Homeowner Recovery Programs is proposed. The locations for proposed project activity encompass various residential properties in up to all 64 parishes of Louisiana. Grant recipients will be based on an application and eligibility process and thus the specific locations of these housing units are not known at this time. Criteria for selection will be further determined within the program policies and procedures based on availability of funds and number of applications. The LA OCD is proposing to implement programs to assist homeowners and rental unit owners and tenants that have been and continue to be affected by disasters. These programs are modelled after the Restore Louisiana Homeowner Assistance Program deployed in response to the Great Floods of 2016. These applicants and intended recipients of current or upcoming programs are homeowners and rental unit owners/tenants who are at various stages of rehabilitating residences in existing locations or relocating. Grants may provide for construction financing activities in addition to any previous federal loans or funds received in order to provide assistance to eligible homeowners to rebuild and re-occupy their homes and rental units or participate in buyout and relocation programs with the goals of rebuilding neighborhoods, reducing blight, mitigating against future storms and increasing overall resiliency. The types of construction-related activities will consist of either major or minor rehabilitation, reconstruction, elevation or demolition within the original footprint of each damaged structure or developed lot. Under the buyout option, properties with pre-existing structures may be retained as greenspace following demolition with homeowners relocated to more resilient areas. In some cases, new construction or elevation may be required with potential expansion beyond or outside of the footprint of the original structure and utilities.

LA OCD has determined that the proposed project activities could involve more than 100,000 properties and up to an estimated total of 21,250 acres with a substantial portion of these activities anticipated to be located within the 100-year floodplain. In accordance with Executive Order 11990, the total number of homes and combined acreage of these properties that are proximal to wetlands listed in the National Wetland Inventory will be reviewed on an individual basis after being identified. However, at this time, given the nature of the proposed activities and previous correspondence with state and federal agencies for similar projects, zero acres of wetlands impact are anticipated as a result of this project.

LA OCD has considered alternatives and mitigation measures to be taken to minimize adverse impacts and to restore and preserve natural and beneficial values. These included the following alternatives:

- Alternative 1. Locations outside of and not affecting the 100-year floodplain/wetlands;
- Alternative 2. Alternative methods to serve the identical project objective; or
- Alternative 3. Not approving action to occupancy or modify the floodplain.

For each of these alternatives, various factors were considered including natural value, feasibility, technology, hazard reduction, related economic value and other environmental impacts. The evaluation of each alternative is summarized below.

Alternative 1 – In most cases, aside from the proposed buyout program actions, re-location of these activities to areas outside of the floodplain or wetlands would result in abandonment of existing homes that are in an unfinished state of repair as well as the purchase and development of land for the relocation of citizens. In order to be considered for relocation, any such land would need to be: a) outside the 100-year floodplain and wetlands, b) not currently developed for other land uses, and c) not designated for other uses (e.g., prime farmlands, parks, recreational areas).

This alternative was rejected due to a number of factors including the following: a) this would not provide any significant benefit to the floodplain since the existing areas will remain developed regardless of any action taken, b) this would require displacement of homeowners that may be still living in the homes, c) the lack of existing infrastructure and services in areas outside the floodplain and the unfeasible costs to provide such amenities, and d) the resulting blight that would occur as current homes fall further into disrepair and abandonment. This alternative further does not meet the overall objectives of the proposed action in that it does not result in allowing residents to rebuild their lives, homes and communities.

Alternative 2 - Alternative methods to serve the project objective are limited but could include multi-family housing at specified locations in the general vicinity of the affected communities. The multi-family housing could be located either at a few sites within the floodplain or at sites outside of the floodplain or a combination of both. Such an alternative would conceptually allow for similar populations but with a smaller footprint. However, this alternative was rejected due to many of the same disadvantages as Alternative 1 regarding no real benefit to the floodplain, resulting blight in the neighborhoods as the existing home sites fall further into disrepair, the displacement of the homeowners, and failure to meet the goals of the proposed action in helping to rebuild impacted communities to their prior state.

Alternative 3 - The alternative to not approve any action, essentially a "No Action" alternative, would result in the properties remaining in disrepair. This alternative would not result in a reversion of floodplain back to its natural state. Additionally, no beneficial value would be anticipated since homes would be surrounded by other residences in most cases. If the homes are not rehabilitated, then the homes will deteriorate lowering property values and preventing homeowners from either returning to their homes or possibly causing those still living in the homes to eventually leave. The "No Action" would thus lead to eventual blight and hinder the ability of the impacted communities to rebuild and regain their identity that existed prior to the storms.

Based on this detailed review, it has been determined that there is no practical alternative to the proposed action being located potentially in a floodplain. This includes careful consideration and rejection of the alternatives above. The proposed actions of repairing/rehabilitating existing homes will meet objectives while not hindering the natural values of the floodplains.

Mitigating measures will be incorporated into the housing programs as part of the rebuilding process. This includes elevation of homes within the floodplain that have substantial damage and adoption of various building codes for rehabilitation of residential structures in the floodplain. These construction measures and contractor standards, outlined in the LA OCD Master Action Plan for the Utilization of Community Development Block Grant Funds, will result in more resilient and sustainable communities.

LA OCD has re-evaluated the alternatives to building in the floodplain and has determined there is no practicable alternative. Environmental files that document compliance with steps 3 through 6 of Executive Order 11988, are available for public inspection, review and copying upon request at the times and location delineated in the last paragraph of this notice for receipt of comments.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public educational tool. The dissemination of information and request for public comment about floodplains can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks and impacts associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplains, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.

- F. Services made necessary by the default of the contractor in the performance of the construction contract
- G. Services as an expert witness in connection with court proceedings
- H. Traffic consulting if necessary
- I. Topographic Survey
- J. Preparation of Environmental Assessment documents and/or Environmental Permits
- K. If all or part of the work is to be financed by a Federal or State Grant, the Consultant shall assist the Owner in the preparation of the Grant application and with the Grant Administration, unless otherwise specifically agreed upon previously herein.

6.0 DEFECTIVE WORK

During such visits and on the basis of such observations, Consultant may disapprove of or reject Contractor's work while it is in progress if Consultant believes that such work will not produce a completed Project that conforms generally to the Contract Documents or that it will prejudice the integrity of the design concept of the Project as reflected in the Contract Documents.

7.0 NOTICE TO PROCEED

The Owner shall notify the Consultant in writing to undertake the services stated in this Agreement, and the Consultant shall commence the services within ten (10) days after receipt of such notification.

If the Owner desires to divide the Project into various parts, a Notice to Proceed shall be issued for each part, and the Owner and the Consultant shall mutually agree upon the period of time within which services for each part of the Project shall be performed.

The Consultant will be given time extensions for delays beyond their control or for those caused by tardy approvals of work in progress by various official agencies, but no additional compensation shall be allowed for such delays.

8.0 PAYMENTS

- 8.1 Owner shall pay Consultant for the performance of work and services as outlined in Attachment "C" to this Agreement.
- 8.2 Payment for Consultant work and services on projects that do not require construction services, such as feasibility studies or drainage studies, shall be made based upon Consultant's estimate of the proportion of the services actually completed at the time of billing and shall be made in partial payments at monthly intervals.
- 8.3 If the Project, or any portion thereof, is not completed for any reason, the final fee for consulting work and services shall be negotiated between Owner and Contractor. If the final fee for work and services is not mutually agreed upon, either party may elect in writing to submit the dispute to mediation. If mediation is not mutually agreed upon, written notice will be submitted to the other party of the intent to submit the dispute to the 29th Judicial District Court of St. Charles Parish, State of Louisiana.
- 8.4 If authorized in writing by Owner, for the performance of, or for obtaining from others Additional Services which are not considered normal or customary consulting, the Owner shall pay Consultant based on monthly invoices submitted by the Consultant, within sixty (60) days of receipt of Consultant's invoice. Consultant shall provide written notice to Owner when no services or work have been performed during a given month.
- 8.5 For Additional Authorized Services provided by the Consultant such as, but not limited to, wetlands permitting, land and right-of-way acquisition, surveying, NPDES and LADEQ permit renewal or acquisition work, etc. Owner shall pay Consultant based on an agreed upon hourly rate(s) between the Owner and Consultant. Payment shall be not-to-exceed based on hourly rates and actual hours worked.
- 8.6 The following documentation shall be required for payment to Consultant and shall be attached to the monthly invoice.
- a. A copy of the Owner's written authorization to perform the service.
- b. Timesheets for all hours invoiced.
- c. Invoice copies, logs or other substantiation of non-salary expenses.
- 8.7 For Additional Authorized Services that Consultant acquires from subcontractors and/or subconsultants, Owner shall pay Consultant a fixed sum previously agreed upon by Owner and Consultant, such sum to be established in each case when the scope of the work involved has been determined and before any of the Additional Services are provided. The use of subcontractors and/or subconsultants shall be subject to the provisions set forth in this Agreement. The following documentation shall be required for payment to Consultant and shall be attached to the monthly invoice:
- a. A copy of the Owner's written consent for the subcontractor and/or subconsultant to perform the service stating the Owner's and Consultant's agreed upon fixed sum established for the service performed.
- b. Evidence that the subcontractor and/or subconsultant is insured as required by this Agreement.
- 8.8 For Supplementary Services described in Section 5, Owner shall pay Consultant for the fee negotiated at the time the work is assigned by the method stipulated in the contract amendment.

9.0 BUDGET LIMITATIONS

The construction budget for this Project shall be determined by the Owner, and the Consultant shall be advised of the budget limitation in writing by the Owner and the Consultant shall indicate his acceptance of same in writing to the Owner. Any subsequent budget revisions shall be confirmed in writing.

If, at the completion of the Preliminary or Design Phase, the Consultant does not concur with the construction budget, he shall so notify the Owner, and the Consultant and Owner shall mutually agree on a revised construction budget prior to any work on the Design Phase.

If no bid is received within the budget limitation and a redesign of the project if required by the Owner, such redesign shall be accomplished by the Consultant at no additional cost to the Owner, provided, however, if the receipt of bids is, for any reason, delayed beyond a period of six (6) months from the date of the completion of the Design Phase the amount stated as the construction budget shall be adjusted, immediately prior to the time bids are received, by use of a construction cost index acceptable to both parties of this agreement.

10.0 FUNDS

No work shall be authorized until funds are established for each individual task.

11.0 TERMINATION OR SUSPENSION

- 11.1 This Agreement may be terminated for any reason by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice.
- 11.2 The Consultant, upon receipt of such notice, shall immediately discontinue all services in connection with the performance of this Agreement and shall proceed to cancel promptly all existing orders and contracts insofar as such orders or contracts are chargeable to this Agreement.
- 11.3 The Consultant shall, as soon as practicable after receipt of notice of termination, submit a statement showing in detail the services performed and payments received under this Agreement to the date of termination.
- 11.4 The Owner shall then pay the Consultant promptly that portion of the prescribed fee to which both parties agree.
- 11.5 Consultant fully acknowledges that no payment will be made for any work performed or expenses incurred after receipt of the termination by either party unless mutually agreed upon in writing.
- 11.6 Failure to meet agreed delivery dates or authorized extensions are considered substantial failures and breach of this contractual agreement by Consultant.
- 11.7 This agreement shall automatically terminate upon satisfactory completion of all services and obligations described herein or three (3) years from the date of its execution, whichever event occurs first.

12.0 INSURANCE

- 12.1 The Consultant shall secure and maintain at his expense such insurance that will protect him and the Owner, from claims under Workmen's Compensation Acts and from claims for bodily injury, death or property damage which may arise from performance of services under this Agreement. Insurance for bodily injury or death shall be in the unencumbered amount of \$1,000,000.00 for one person and not less than \$1,000,000.00 for all injuries and/or deaths resulting from any one occurrence. The insurance for property damage shall be in the unencumbered amount of \$1,000,000.00 for each accident and not less than \$1,000,000.00 aggregate.
- 12.2 The Consultant shall also secure and maintain at his expense professional liability insurance in the unencumbered sum of \$1,000,000.00.
- 12.3 All certificates of insurance SHALL BE FURNISHED TO THE OWNER and shall provide that insurance shall not be cancelled without ten (10) days prior written notice to the Owner. The Owner may examine the policies.

- 12.4 Consultant shall include all subcontractors and/or subconsultants as insured under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates for each. All coverages for subcontractors and/or subconsultants shall be subject to all the requirements stated herein.
- 12.5 Contractor shall secure and maintain at his expense Comprehensive Automobile Liability - Bodily Injury Liability \$1,000,000 each person; \$1,000,000 each occurrence. Property Damage Liability \$1,000,000 each occurrence. The Comprehensive Automobile Liability policy must have coverage for loading and unloading and must include owned, hired and leased autos.
- 12.6 St. Charles Parish shall be named as an additional insured on general liability insurance policies.
- 12.7 For all purposes under Louisiana law, the principals of this Contract shall be recognized as the statutory employer of all contract employees as provided in LSA-R.S. 23:1061.
- 12.8 Insurance policies shall be endorsed to provide for a waiver of subrogation in favor of St. Charles Parish for worker's compensation policies. The certificate of insurance shall reference the waiver of subrogation endorsement.
- 12.9 The Worker's Compensation Policy Territory Coverage must include Louisiana.

13.0 INDEMNIFICATION

Consultant shall indemnify and hold harmless the Owner, its employees, agents and representatives, against any and all claims, demands, suits or judgments for sums of money to any party for loss of life or injury or damages to person or property growing out of, resulting from or by any reason of any negligent act by the Consultant, its employees, agents, servants or representatives, while engaged upon or in connection with the services required or performed hereunder.

14.0 WARRANTY

- 14.1 Consultant warrants that it will perform its design services with the degree of skill and to the standard of care required of the consulting profession to meet all Federal, State and Local requirements.
- 14.2 If Consulting Services for project designed by Consultant does not meet those requirements noted herein above, then to the extent that this occurs as a direct result of Consultant's failure to meet the standard of care in its design services, Consultant will indemnify the Parish for Consultant's share of the costs incurred to bring Consulting Services for project to the limitations mandated.
- 14.3 The obligations expressed in Section 14 above in no way limit the Consultant's obligations expressed elsewhere in this Contract.

15.0 EXCLUSIVE JURISDICTION AND VENUE

For all claims arising out of or related to this agreement, CONSULTANT hereby consents and yields to the exclusive jurisdiction and venue of the Twenty-Ninth Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Charles, State of Louisiana, and expressly waives any (a) pleas of jurisdiction based upon Consultant's residence and (b) right of removal to Federal Court based upon diversity of citizenship.

16.0 OTHER

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. There are no understandings, agreements, or representations, oral or written, not specified within this Agreement. This Agreement may not be modified, supplemented or amended in any manner, except by written agreement signed by both parties.

AGREEMENT TO PURCHASE AND SELL PROPERTY

hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Vendor" and
Donna Zanca wife of and Glenn L. Ebeyer, Jr., persons of the full age of majority, and whose present mailing address is 108 Ducayet Dr., Destrehan, Louisiana 70047, whose social security numbers are xxx-xx-2840 and xxx-xx-2280;
hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Purchasers,"
who declared that in consideration of the mutual obligations undertaken herein, and the mutual benefits to be received by the parties hereto, Vendor agrees to sell and Purchasers agree to purchase, on the terms and conditions and for the consideration hereinafter set forth, any and all of Vendor's interest (a 100% interest) in the property more commonly known as a portion of Lot 26, Ormond Plantation Estates in Square 6 measuring approximately 31.17' x 175'.
The terms, conditions and consideration of said Act of Sale shall be as follows, to-wit:

d. The sale is conditioned upon approval of all terms and conditions, including the sale price, by the St. Charles Parish Council in accordance with the governing rules of the Parish of St. Charles.
e. Vendor shall deliver occupancy and possession of the subject property to Purchasers at execution of the Act of Sale.
f. Vendors shall convey the subject property with warranty as to title only, but with full substitution to all rights and actions of warranty Vendors has against prior owners and warrantors, and shall contain the following clause concerning warranty as to condition and fitness, to-wit:
Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, Purchaser acknowledges that the property hereby conveyed, including the real estate and any and all buildings and/or improvements erected thereon, are conveyed by Vendors to Purchaser "as is, where is and in its current condition" and without warranty as to physical condition, and with the exclusion of and release by Purchasers of any and all legal implied warranties, and Purchaser expressly waives any and all claims against Vendors for vices or defects, including any environmental hazards in said property. This "as is - where is" condition applies to all improvements and inspections of the property

being conveyed. Purchaser further acknowledges that Purchaser has fully inspected said property and is not relying on any representation as to its condition which has or may have been made by Vendors. Purchaser further waives and releases Vendors and Vendors' agents, employees and insurers from any and all claims or causes of action which have arisen or might hereafter arise, whether presently known or unknown, in redhibition or for loss or damage resulting in whole or part from the condition of or defects or vices, including any environmental hazards, whether latent or patent in the property conveyed or any part thereof, whether such conditions, vices or defects give rise to such claims or cause of action should have been known to either Purchaser or Vendors. Any liability in connection with any environmental protection rule, regulation order, requirement or law, whether state, local or federal, is hereby assumed by Purchaser. Purchaser takes cognizance of all defects, apparent or not apparent, and does hereby acknowledge that the purchase price of said property reflects a diminution in price in order to compensate Purchaser for the condition of the property and any and all improvements thereon. WHEREAS, St. Charles Parish desires to continue to support local veterans and improve their access to benefits by providing for both, the cost to maintain and operate a Veterans Service Office; and,

THE ST. CHARLES PARISH COUNCIL HEREBY ORDAINS:

COOPERATIVE ENDEAVOR AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

ST. CHARLES PARISH

AND

LOUISIANA DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS

THIS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT is made and entered into on _____ by and between St. Charles Parish, hereafter referred to as Parish/Municipality, a political subdivision of the State of Louisiana represented by Matthew Jewell, President, and the Louisiana Department of Veterans Affairs (hereafter referred to as LDVA), a state agency within the Executive Branch of the State of Louisiana represented by its Secretary, Joey Strickland.

ARTICLE I

WHEREAS, Louisiana Revised Statutes, including but not limited to La R.S. 29:260-262, as amended and reenacted, specifically provide enabling legislation for LDVA to estimate and recover part of the operations cost of parish Veterans' Service Offices. Specifically, La. R.S. 29:260-262 provides that LDVA shall not contribute more than seventy-five percent (75%) for

the operation and maintenance of such parish Veterans' Service Offices; that police juries and municipal governing authorities may make appropriations out of funds for the purpose of providing or assisting in providing for the maintenance and operation of Veterans' Service Offices established by LDVA; that police juries and municipal governing authorities shall provide office space for the operation of Veterans' Service Offices established by LDVA pursuant to law; and the cost of providing such office space shall not be considered as any payment or contribution required toward the expense of operation and maintenance of such Veterans' Service Office space.

ARTICLE II

WHEREAS, Parish/Municipality desires to support local veterans and improve their access to benefits and services by providing for both the cost to maintain and operate Veterans' Service Offices and space to house such service offices as provided by law.

ARTICLE III

WHEREAS, LDVA, whose physical office is located at 602 N. Fifth Street, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, 70802, and whose official mailing address is P.O. Box 94095 Capitol Station, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, 70804-9095, received funds in Fiscal Year 2021-2022 to provide such services to veterans in Parish/Municipality.

ARTICLE IV

WHEREAS, both LDVA and Parish/Municipality desire to memorialize their respective fiscal, operational, and maintenance obligations relative to the establishment of a Veterans' Service Office in Parish/Municipality,

NOW THEREFORE, LDVA and Parish/Municipality, each having authority to do so, agree as follows:

I. OBLIGATIONS OF THE PARTIES.

A. Obligations of LDVA

- LDVA shall provide information to veterans residing in or near Parish/Municipality and their dependents through various outlets including but not limited to the news media, internet, reading materials, and personal consultation about benefits to which they are entitled, including medical services, compensation and pension programs, education, home loan guarantees, employment, benefits for patients in a nursing home, insurance benefits, referrals to housing and mental health providers, and last interment benefits.
- LDVA shall provide a highly trained Veterans Assistance Counselor at said service office.
- LDVA shall make every reasonable effort to ensure that the designated Veterans' Service Office is staffed two (2) days per week on the following days, to wit: Tuesday and Friday, excluding applicable holidays, training periods, inclement weather closures, etc. LDVA will endeavor to update the parish or municipality of any office closure that may occur, should the need arise.
- LDVA shall designate a contract monitor to ensure that the parties meet their obligations described herein and identify said person, along with their mailing address, email address, and phone number to Parish/Municipality.

B. Obligations of Parish/Municipality

- Parish/Municipality shall provide office space for the Veterans' Service Office that offers a safe location for LDVA employees and clients, space for private client interviews, secure storage of client files, and accessibility for disabled visitors. Said space shall be located at 15045 River Road, Hahnville, LA 70057.
- Parish/Municipality shall provide for all utilities and Internet expenses, as well as 31.01% of phone service costs, as part of its obligation to provide space for the Veterans' Service Office.
- Parish/Municipality shall provide funding to LDVA in the amount described herein to support the cost to operate and maintain the Veterans' Service Office.

II. FUNDING AND REPORTING

A. Compensation and Disbursement

- Parish/Municipality shall contribute to the support of the Veterans' Service Office by paying LDVA a total of \$2,992.00 in minimum monthly payments of \$249.00.
- Parish/Municipality shall make payments by check or electronic means only, payable to LDVA. Prior to making the first payment, Parish/Municipality shall select its preferred method and communicate the choice to LDVA.

B. Reporting

- Upon request, LDVA shall provide an operations report on the number of veteran contacts and claims processed that period.
- LDVA shall also include within that report any additional information that might assist in communicating and demonstrating the positive impact to the community of the services provided by LDVA.

C. Invoicing

- LDVA shall submit to Parish/Municipality an invoice for the payment described herein on a quarterly basis.
- Parish/Municipality may pay monthly, and shall pay LDVA the full sum of the invoiced amount no later than 30 days after receipt of this invoice.

III. TERM

- This Cooperative Endeavor Agreement shall be in effect from January 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022.

IV. TERMINATION

- Parish/Municipality may terminate this Agreement at any time during the term of the Agreement by giving the Contractor written notice of its intention to terminate at least thirty (30) days before the intended date of termination. The Parish/Municipality must provide the reason for termination and reason why it cannot comply with the Louisiana Revised Statutes referenced above. Upon termination by the Parish/Municipality or the failure of Parish/Municipality to meet its obligations defined herein, LDVA may close the Veterans Service Office operated in Parish/Municipality.

V. CONTROLLING LAW

- The validity, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be controlled by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana.

VI. LEGAL COMPLIANCE

- LDVA and Parish/Municipality shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws and regulations, including, specifically, but without limitation, the Louisiana Code of Governmental Ethics (R.S. 42:1101, *et seq.*), in carrying out the provisions of this Agreement.

VII. PUBLIC LIABILITY/INDEMNIFICATION

- LDVA will indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Parish, including Parish's employees and agents, from and against any and all claims or liabilities arising from the fault of LDVA, its employees, or agents in carrying out LDVA'S duties and obligations under the terms of this agreement. The Parish will indemnify, defend, and hold harmless LDVA, including LDVA'S employees, delegates, agents, and representatives from and against any and all claims or liabilities arising from the fault of Parish, its employees, or agents in carrying out the Parish's duties and obligations under the terms of this agreement. This section will survive the termination of this agreement. In the event that either party takes any action to enforce this mutual indemnity provision, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorney's fees and costs arising as a result thereof.
- Nothing herein is intended, nor shall be deemed to create a third-party beneficiary to or for any obligation by any party hereto or to authorize any third person to have any action against any party hereto arising out of this Agreement.
- LDVA is responsible for any and all insurance or other liability requirements related to the operations or activities associated with this agreement. LDVA will ensure that it has insurance coverage for any general liability claims occurring at the premise provided by the Parish as well as insurance coverage for any LDVA contents located at the premise provided by the Parish. In addition, LDVA agrees that all insurance policies required by the agreement will be primary, will include a waiver of subrogation in favor of the Parish as to workers' compensation claims, and will identify the Parish as an additional insured.

VIII. SEVERABILITY

A. If any term, covenant, condition, or provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall, at any time or to any extent, be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such term, covenant, condition, or provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and each term, covenant, condition, and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and be enforced to the fullest extent of the law.

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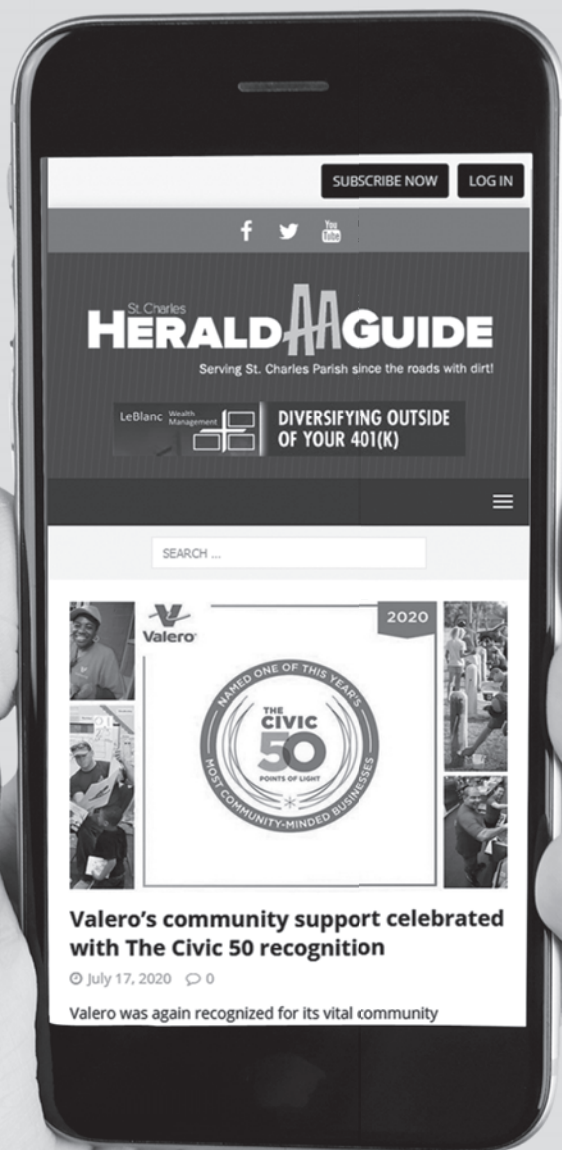
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
