Local seniors provided with Thanksgiving meals

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Peoples Health recently joined forces with Second Harvest Food Bank and the St. Charles Council on Aging to make sure that local senior citizens had everything they needed to properly celebrate Thanksgiving this year.

St. Charles Council members were able to pick up meals with a safe and socially distanced drive-thru event on Nov. 16, and after the 10th annual event around 350 meals were delivered to homebound seniors in St. Charles Parish.

Each year the food program provides more than 6,000 traditional holiday meals to seniors in need across the state. The food is prepared at Second Harvest Community Kitchen and distributed to locations across south Louisiana. Because many food insecure seniors have a variety of special considerations - including nutrient requirements, ability to

prepare meals and accessibility to food stores - many require a variety of avenues for food assistance.

when a two-vehicle crash occurred on LA Hwy 20 in Chackbay. The preliminary investigation revealed that 39-year-old Joey Clement of Thibodaux was driving northbound in a 2019 Ford F-150 when he crossed the centerline and struck a SUV head-on, according to Louisiana State Police Troop C Public Affairs Spokesman Trooper Ross Brennan.

“After the crash, both vehicles became engulfed in flames,” a press release stated. “All three occupants in the SUV suffered fatal injuries and were pronounced dead at the scene. Clement experienced minor injuries. Clement was unrestrained while restraint use is unknown for the SUV occupants.”

According to State Police, Clement displayed signs of impairment and was arrested for DWI fourth offense with additional charges pending. Toxicology samples were collected from both drivers and submitted for analysis.

The crash remains under investigation.

“My memory of Lily was that she was the mom of the group ... she kind of made sure everyone was okay,” the girls’ friend Hailey Coffelt said. “Hali was the life of the party ... she could make anyone have fun in school and out of school. And Michaela ... she was the soul ... she was the most kind-hearted person I will ever know. They all were so beautiful and so young, and I think that what happened to them doesn’t even describe the pain it’s caused this community. They will always be forever missed and loved.”

P a i g e Stabile said she met Lily at Holy Family Preschool in Luling when they were each just 3 years old.

“We immediately became best friends the first day of school,” Stabile said. “I was crying and she made sure to cheer me up. She even walked with me to the bathroom and played with me all day. After preschool we remained friends throughout elementary school and we became close once again in middle school. Lily had a contagious laugh and the most caring heart ... we had so much fun together.”

Lily’s mother, Traci Dufrene, said her daughter was spirited, silly, moody and loved life, people and animals.

“She always saw the good in people and was one of the most forgiving people I knew,” Traci said of Lily. “She saw a world full of hope and possibility ... she believed in everyone even in the darkest of situations. Her heart was so genuine, and she always saw love. Her smile lit up the room and she hated it ... she said it was crooked...but it was perfect. I will forever miss that smiling face.”

Traci said she hopes people never forget Lily, her giving soul and her hopeful view of the world.

“She never stopped making plans, organizing her future and dreaming ahead,” Traci said. “My hope is that all of those that have been impacted by her life in some way carry this on in her honor. The days are hard now but continue on ... dream big and do great things for Lily.”

“For 18 years I got to love and cherish my sister and our bond,” Borey said. “She was i n c r e d i b l y beautiful with the biggest heart. She always went above and beyond for those she cared about. She was full of energy and we all knew her future was bright. She was the best big sister to Kennidey and the best little sister to me. I know she is looking out for us now. Michaila Paige, you are loved.”

Borey said that she will not only miss her sister, but Lily and Hali as well.

“Hali and Lily were my sister’s best friends. They were inseparable and it brings me some peace knowing that they are together,” she said. “They were all so beautiful and smart. Nicholl’s State had three hardworking, dedicated students with personalities brighter than the sun. Please remember that drinking and driving does not only put your life at risk, but the lives of everyone on the road. Michaila, Hali, and Lily would all still be here today if one person would have called an Uber.”

Jordan Lemoine said Michaila was a light in the dark.

“She was the sweetest person you’d ever meet. She was always happy to meet new people and so friendly to whoever she met,” Lemoine said. “Michaila was always willing to lend a helping hand ... she was so selfless. One thing that I am definitely going to miss most about her are her stories. Michaila and I could just sit for hours and hours and talk and tell stories. She had so many stories to share and I loved listening to every single one of them.”

M a d i s o n Manieri said she will never forget Hali and her larger- t h a n - l i f e personality.

“Hali was always the life of the party and had such a free spirit,” she said. “Any time she would walk in the room it would instantly light up ... I know she is lighting up heaven. I will cherish every moment from car rides in her Jeep blaring music with the windows down to dancing obnoxiously in my room. I love you forever and ever my angel.”

Alyssa Moreau agreed that Hali was a loving, talented and goofy person.

“She always brought smiles to everyone’s face,” Moreau said. “Even if you were in a sad mood ... she always tried to make you feel better. She was always the light of the room. Hali loved dancing and I know she’s dancing up in heaven right now.

“She enjoyed every ounce of life.”

something was on fire. The boy smelled smoke and Steinkamp sprang into action to clear all three children out of the house. By the time she did the entire den was engulfed in flames – they almost didn’t make it out in time.

The cause was electrical – a spark hit the den sofa and caused it to ignite. But because the family did not have renter’s insurance, they lost everything and replacing the losses would be a struggle.

Trosclair, a Hahnville native, began reaching out to her community in an effort to help. She started a clothing drive for Steinkamp, partner Martin Boudreaux and their three children, Liam, Hunter and Marcella.

The response was more than she ever expected. The family indeed received clothing donations – and so much more. “The generosity was amazing,” Trosclair said. “We had a couple in Luling donate a whole living room set. We have a couple who wants to donate an X-Box and TV to them for Christmas. One lady wants to buy them Christmas gifts. We also had a lady ask if she can make each of the kids a quilt. And so many more people here in St. Charles

Parish that donated clothes and home decor. They filled up one storage unit and we’ll need to get another one. That’s how much our community really came together to help this family.”

The drive was the third effort Trosclair has put together in recent months to help others in need, the two prior going

towards families who lost everything in Hurricane Ida.

“The community really came together for them as well,” Trosclair said. “I never have lived in such a great parish where there is so much love and so many people wanting to come together to help people in need. I honestly couldn’t ask

to live in a better community. St Charles Parish is my home.”

She said it was tough to see this happen to Steinkamp and Boudreaux, who she called “such sweet and down to earth people.” It was a scary situation for the children, and coping is a “day by day” process for the family.

“The youngest was actually dreaming about the fire and woke up screaming water, water, water,” Trosclair said. “It truly breaks my heart to see them go through this. I know they’re so grateful for all the donations. The kids were so amazed at all the toys they received and they were running around the parking lot with their dinosaur stuffed animals today when we went to pack all the donations we have so far in the storage unit.”

A GoFundMe (titled House Fire) established by Steinkamp’s sister Jodie has raised \$600 as well for the family. Anyone with interest in donating to help may do so through that page, or by contacting Trosclair through Facebook. Money through the GoFundMe will be put toward new housing.

offered a trailer to live in, a gesture that came completely unexpected.

“I heard him say something about giving us a trailer, and I thought, ‘Wow, that doesn’t sound right,’” Nazio said. “I told my wife and she asked about when they would want it back ... no, I think they want to give it to us, to keep. She said the same thing I did.

“But I called them back and he said he could have it to us in an hour and a half. I could have never imagined.”

The beginning of Nazio’s story is an all too familiar one over the past few months – his Paradis home was wrecked by Hurricane Ida, leaving Nazio, his wife and their three children to look for a Plan B.

That’s where their tale turns into some unique territory, however: upon returning from evacuation in Texas and learning that their home would be unlivable for the foreseeable future, the family made the decision they would live in tents outside of their home before figuring out a permanent solution. That’s exactly what the Nazios have done since Ida.

An outdoorsman at heart, Nazio downplayed the rough conditions and even noted his children looked at their situation as “a big camping trip.” But the weather was getting colder, and attempts to shore up a more stable living arrangement were seemingly running

into a dead end.

“I kind of felt like I was getting the runaround,” Nazio said of his application for a trailer. “We applied ... after a month, FEMA said the state was in control of that and it wasn’t in their hands anymore. Then I called the state and was told if I didn’t hear anything by the following Tuesday to try back. We couldn’t get any kind of time frame on how long it might take to get a trailer.”

One day, Nazio was speaking to the pastor of his church – venting, as he described it – and spoke of the family’s uncertain situation. The latter decided to make a few calls, including to several news outlets, to attempt to shine some attention on the Nazios’ situation, and secure some help along with that.

A Twitter post about the situation by FOX 8’s Josh Roberson caught the attention of Matt Rookard of the Terrebonne Economic Development Authority. The post included photos of the Nazios’ home and their temporary “tent village” living quarters. Rookard’s group used its connections to secure a trailer for the family, which the Nazios moved into in early November.

“I sure wasn’t expecting it,” said Nazio. “I felt like I was running into dead end after dead end ... it kind of brought me back. I was starting to lose my faith in humanity a little bit. You’re looking for help and just getting the runaround. But they restored it.

“It’s definitely warmer in the trailer. And a hot shower, that’s even better.”

Prior to the trailer, the tents were no short-term arrangement. The back end of the roof on Nazio’s home was completely blown off by Ida. A power pole had been ripped from the ground and was on the back of the house. And the storm shifted the home entirely off of its base.

“It wasn’t livable anymore,” Nazio said.

When another storm came through after Ida, it caused further damage, both to the family’s home and its temporary setup.

“That night kind of broke me, I’m not



going to lie,” Nazio said. “I dropped down and prayed, I asked God, ‘please, if we have to live in these tents for years then OK, but please don’t let us lose everything again. I just want my family to be safe.”

Knowing a cold front was coming in, Nazio tapped into some creativity, gathering pallets to create a platform to lift the tents off of the ground.

“It was to make it a little bit warmer,”



he said. “We were sleeping on air mattresses inside the tent. But the air from the ground makes the air in the mattress colder.

“We made it work. It was rough sometimes, when the weather would change. We didn’t get to the point of, ‘Well, we can’t live like this.’ We hadn’t gotten to that dire point yet where it was too cold, we have to do something else ... but that was likely coming.”

Chuck Jacob had barely walked a foot away from his freshly painted sign before cars began to stop along the side of the road.

No wonder – turns out free food is a popular commodity.

Jacob, the owner of Jake’s Towing in Boutte, recently gave away 800 50-pound cases of Idaho potatoes, after some fortunate happenstance brought the potato windfall into his possession.

“It kind of caused a traffic jam,” Jacob said with a chuckle. “I took a sign from my shop and put “free potatoes” on it, and before I even walked away from it, people were stopping. People were coming with pickup trucks and said they were going to get them to people in need. It was a whole lot of potatoes.”

Jake’s Towing was to unload a truck as part of a job for a company shipping the potatoes. That company called Jacob with a specific problem: an issue

arose with the truck after its initial departure and the frozen potatoes thawed out.

“They had a problem with the truck and after the potatoes defrost, you can’t refreeze them,” Jacob said. “There was nothing wrong with them, but they couldn’t process them. So, they called me. We do a lot of recovery. We took them out of the fridge truck, took ‘em all out. They had to get them dispersed, so they gave them to us.”

Jacob said in addition to the people who collected their new potato bounty, he reached out to several churches and food centers that could use a boost to help the needy.

“It was pretty awesome,” Jacob said. “It was fun to be able to do that for people and we felt really good about it.”

DHS heads to Zachary for semifinal

Top-seeded Broncos led by Texas A&M committed passer; teams met in 2018 semifinal

22 wins. 0 losses.
But someone loses for the first time Friday night when unbeaten Destrehan travels to unbeaten Zachary for a Class 5A semifinal matchup – and the other is headed to the Superdome.
For a little while on Friday night, it seemed Destrehan might host this week's semifinal. No. 9 West Monroe was leading top-seeded Zachary in their quarterfinal game in the moments following Destrehan's 24-10 victory over Ruston, and had that held, the latter would have traveled to Destrehan.
But Zachary rallied to force overtime

and ultimately win, 37-34 in the battle of perennial state powers, Eli Holstein's pass to Charles Robertson spelling the difference. Destrehan must now travel to Zachary where it hopes to land the first win against the unbeaten Broncos this season. These teams are acombined 21-0, Zachary at 13-0 and Destrehan at 9-0.
Holstein presents perhaps the stiffest test for Destrehan in terms of stopping a dominant individual talent this season. The quarterback is a Texas A&M committed junior, a pocket passer and

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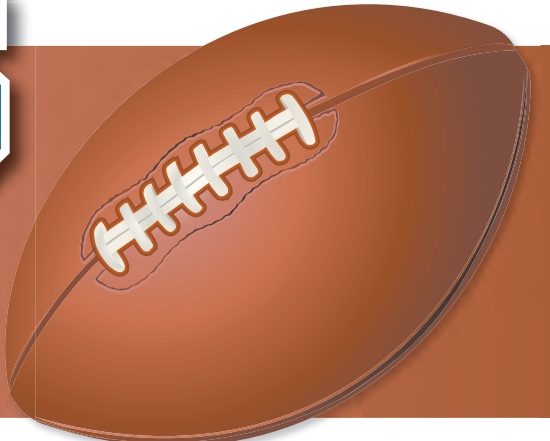

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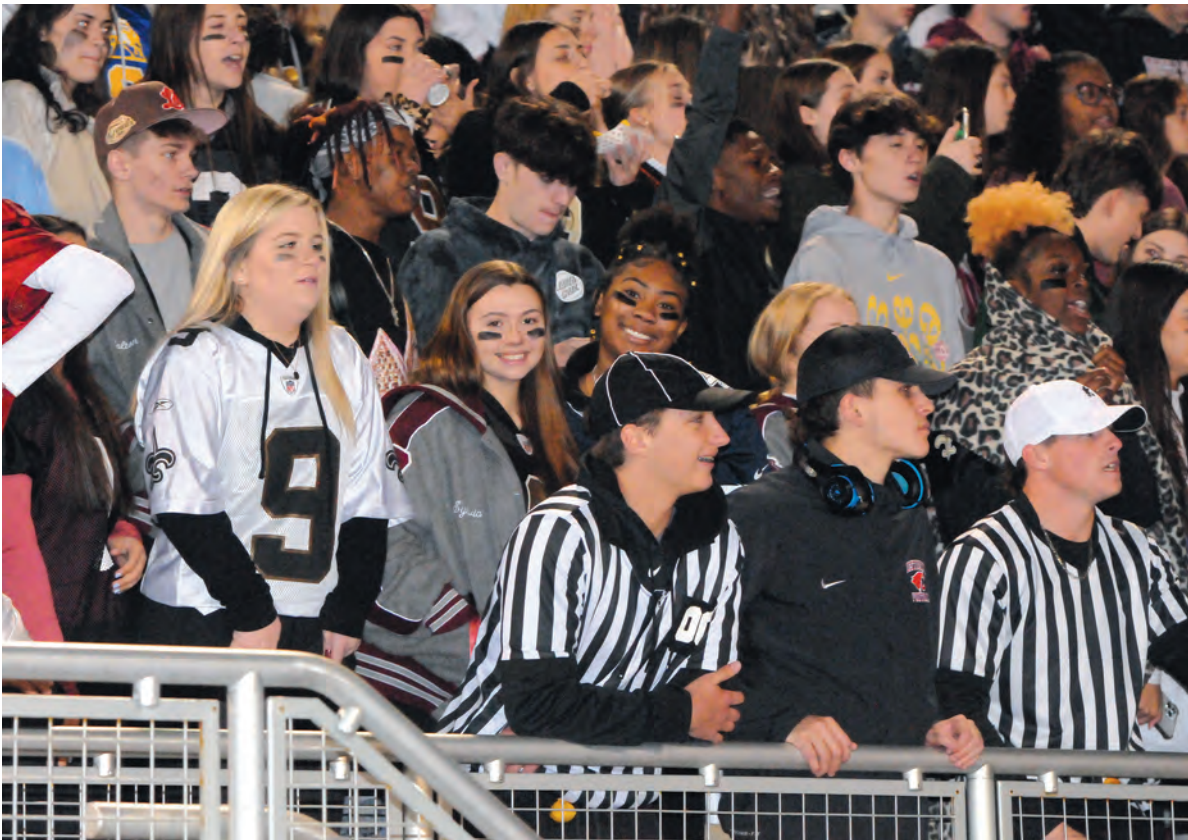

in the midst of an excellent season. Incidentally, this will be the second time in a matter of three games Destrehan has faced a junior quarterback already committed to play at a Division I school, as the Wildcats faced Woodlawn’s Rickie Collins in a round two matchup.

“Well, he’s a big, strong kid. He can throw it and he can run it. We certainly have our hands full,” Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott said. “He’s what you’re looking for in terms of a prototypical pocket passer, and he has some very good players around him.”

That Woodlawn team is the lone common opponent between Destrehan and Zachary. DHS bested Woodlawn 29-20 in round two; Zachary defeated the Panthers 35-28 in a midseason matchup.

Robertson is Holstein’s favorite receiver, and committed to Louisiana-Lafayette. In the win over West Monroe, he caught seven passes for over 100 yards and scored a pair of touchdowns.

“He’s a big reciever and he can make

acrobatic plays in tight coverage,” Scott said.

Running back Cameron Stewart paces the ground game, and he rushed for 92 yards last week.

Defensively, safety Kylin Jackson is another of the state’s top stars and is one of the top ranked recruits for the class of 2023. He’s a big hitter and playmaker.

“He’s good with the ball in the air, but he’s also very strong in the run game,” Scott said.

These programs are not at all unfamiliar with one another, though the last meeting of the teams pre-dated many of its players. In 2018, the teams squared off in the 5A semifinals on a night of hard rain and tough conditions. The score didn’t match the scene, however – this was a shootout, one won 67-57 by Zachary.

Both programs are used to playing deep into the postseason. Zachary won three 5A championships in four seasons, earning the crown in 2015, 2017 and 2018. Destrehan, meanwhile, continues to build upon its run of incredible consistency: the Wildcats’ game Friday night will mark the seventh semifinal game in nine years for Destrehan.

“It says a lot about the job Coach (Stephen) Robicheaux did with the program and established here,” Scott said. “To be able to continue that tradition is something we’ve been very focused o ... these are two programs with great traditions, and I think it’ll be a really good matchup.”

Young Tigers team showing progress

Hahnville is off to a 2-2 start on the basketball court to begin a season in which the Tigers will be looking to re-tool and mesh several new contributors together, following the team’s Class 5A semifinal run in 2020-21.

While the team is turning over its entire starting lineup following the graduation of the team’s senior core, Tigers head coach Yussef Jasmine is excited to work with a group he sees sky high potential in.

“We have a group of really good young guys,” Jasmine said. “I think, potentially, they can make us even better than we were last year. They have to be coached and developed, but I really feel great about this group.”

Cameron Lumar, Da’Quon Price, Dylan Roberts, Jai Johnson and Ty’Ray Bartholomew are among the stand-outs of a talented group that is already growing by leaps and bounds. That was reflected after the team bounced back from an 18-point preseason loss to Booker T. Washington by bouncing the latter from Hahnville’s tournament last week, in a game the Tigers led start to finish.

“I think that highlights the progress we’ve already made through just four games,” Jasmine said.

Lumar is the team’s top scorer, and someone Jasmine said has asserted himself on and off the court.

“He’s a natural scorer and a natural leader,” Jasmine said. “This is a group that understands roles. Some of them have been playing AAU together for years. Cam happens to be the scorer, but this is a very strong group as a collective.”

It’s not a team boasting the size it had a year ago – or much at all. The tallest player on this year’s team is 6’3. But that hasn’t prevented the Tigers from already meshing together as a strong defensive unit, something Jasmine said is in part due to the players’ toughness.

“I think the defense is ahead of the offense. (Offense) will come with repetitions,” Jasmine said. “This is a really tough team and they respond very well to coaching.”

This week, Hahnville began play at the Sophie B. Wright tournament. It faced Slidell Wednesday. That kicks off a month of tournaments, including another next week at Newman.

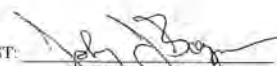

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to provide funds to eligible applicants for eligible costs for Non-Disaster Grants (NDG) projects. This notice applies to the Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA) grant program implemented under the authority of Section 1366 of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, as amended, and Section 203 of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act respectively.

FMA provides funding to states, territories, federally recognized tribes, and local communities for projects and planning that reduces or eliminates long-term risk of flood damage to structures insured under the NFIP. FMA funding is also available for management costs. Funding is appropriated by Congress annually. The Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is posted on www.Grants.gov. The FY 2020 FMA Fact Sheet provides an overview of the agency's priorities for this year. FEMA announced the FY 2020 application cycle on August 4, 2020. The application period was September 30, 2020, through January 31, 2021.

This public notice concerns grants that were submitted during the FY2020 year. The purpose of the proposed action is to reduce risk of flood hazards to properties in the Parishes of East Baton Rouge, New Orleans, Calcasieu, Jefferson, Terrebonne, St. Charles, Rapides, St. Mary's, Tangipahoa, St. Tammany, and Livingston. The proposed action consists of elevating 381 buildings to at least 1 foot above the base flood elevation, acquiring and demolishing 47 buildings within the flood hazard area, and reconstructing 1 building. Acquired properties would be dedicated as open green space for the protection of floodplain functions in perpetuity. Some elevations would install green infrastructure elements that may include rain barrels, rain gardens, or pervious pavement. The proposed action would mitigate impacts from repetitive flood damage to these buildings. Pursuant to Executive Order 11988 (Floodplain Management), Executive Order 11990 (Protection of Wetlands), and FEMA's implementing regulations at Title 44 of the Code of Federal Regulations Part 9, FEMA hereby provides interested parties with a notice of its intent to carry out an action affecting a floodplain and wetlands. It covers activities that may affect historic properties, activities that are located in or affect wetland areas or the 100-year floodplain, and critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. Such activities may adversely affect historic properties, floodplains, or wetlands, or may result in continuing vulnerability to flood damage.

The Presidential Executive Orders 11988 (Floodplain Management) and 11990 (Wetland Protection) require that all federal actions in or affecting floodplains or wetlands be reviewed for opportunities to relocate out of the floodplain or wetland, and be evaluated for social, economic, historical, environmental, legal, and safety considerations. Where there is no opportunity to relocate, FEMA is required to undertake a detailed review to determine what measures can be taken to minimize future damage. The public is invited to participate in the process of identifying alternatives and analyzing potential impacts through this notification.

FEMA has determined that for certain types of facilities there are normally no alternatives to relocation from the floodplain or wetland. These are facilities that meet all of the following criteria: 1) FEMA's estimate of the cost of repairs is less than 50 percent of the cost to replace the entire facility, and is less than \$100,000; 2) the facility is not located in a floodway; 3) the facility has not sustained major structural damage in a previous presidentially declared flooding disaster or emergency; and 4) the facility is not critical (e.g., the facility is not a hospital, generating plant, emergency operations center, or a facility that contains dangerous materials). FEMA intends to provide assistance for mitigation measures as defined by the program's objectives.

For routine activities, this will be the only public notice provided. Other activities and those involving facilities that do not meet the four criteria are required to undergo a more detailed review, including a study of alternate locations. Subsequent public notices regarding such projects will be published, if necessary, as more specific information becomes available.

The National Historic Preservation Act requires federal agencies to consider the effects of their undertakings on historic properties. Those actions or activities affecting buildings, structures, districts, or objects 50 years old or older or that affect archeological sites or undisturbed ground will require further review to determine if the property is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (Register). If the property is determined to be eligible for the Register, and FEMA's undertaking will adversely affect it, FEMA will provide additional public notice. For historic properties not adversely affected by FEMA's undertaking, this will be the only public notice.

As noted, this may be the only public notice regarding the above-described actions under the NDG program.
