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Family hopes for justice after woman killed in boat crash

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“We won’t take it anymore. How many more people have to pass away for things to change?”

Caitlin Higgins Comardelle speaks passionately about the recent uptick of local drunk driving accidents, and for good reason.

“On July 4, 2020, a drunk driver collided their boat into our family’s boat,” Comardelle said. “All six people in our boat were injured. My sister Audrey passed away a few days later due to the injuries sustained in the boat crash - as a victim of vehicular homicide and a victim of drinking and driving.”

Comardelle and her husband Blake were also involved in the accident, and she said their lives were changed in an instant because of someone else’s choice to drink and drive.

The November car crash that claimed the lives of Hahnville High School class of 2021 graduates Michaila Bowling, Hali Coss and Lily Dufrene – in which the

St. Rose native brings Texas STEM training back home

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Joshua Lewis had no idea that spending his senior year of high school in another state would propel him into starting a nonprofit, but he said he wouldn't change a thing about the journey he is now on.

Lewis, a 20-year-old St. Rose native who moved to Texas for his senior year, found a world of resources that weren't accessible to students in Louisiana ... and he knew he had to change that.

"I realized the difference between Louisiana and Texas," Lewis said. "In Texas they gave me the keys to do whatever I wanted. I really became self-taught. They had mentors from Boeing and these huge robotics companies and Google and all those places ... people who could point you in the right

direction. There were just a lot of the awesome resources and training I got in Texas that just wasn't available here."

When Lewis moved back to Louisiana for college – he is now a junior Xavier University student studying computer science – he returned to Destrehan High School to mentor the robotics team there. With the wheels in his head set in motion as to how he could replicate a Texas-like STEM experience here in Louisiana, he started STEMCYCLES in the summer of 2021.

"Starting STEMCYCLES was important to me because I believe everyone should have the opportunity to pursue their interests to the highest degree," he

"The week between Christmas and New Years there was a knock at the door and it was someone from NBC asking if we would be willing to allow them to film our decorations in the front of our house and they would pay us," Tina said. "Of course we didn't care about the money. The thought that our house would be in a show was exciting enough."

The Scanlon's home is known locally – and on Facebook – as the

Holiday House of Destrehan. The couple's elaborate Halloween and Christmas decorations began in 2007, the year they moved in. They started with a small arsenal of decorations, and later inherited some and even borrowed others from a family friend who had a lot of Halloween decorations but nowhere to store them.

Tina said the first evening of filming was very low key.

"They came that evening after sunset," she said. "It was just a couple of people and a drone, but then they knocked again and asked if they

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Safety Board releases preliminary report on helicopter crash

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The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) released its preliminary findings of an investigation of the Dec. 14 helicopter crash on the Bonnet Carre Spillway in St. Charles Parish, one that claimed the life of the aircraft’s pilot, Joshua Hawley of Denham Springs.

According to the preliminary report, the Bell 407 helicopter traveling from Gonzales to New Orleans was ultimately surrounded by a very dense fog, leading to a collision with transmission power lines suspended between two tall trusses. The wire was estimated to be approximately 130 feet above the bridge.

Location information tracked the helicopter’s path eastbound over I-10 toward New Orleans with a height varying between 75 and 175 feet over ground, according to the report. But less than a mile before the helicopter crashed into the transmission line, the aircraft descended down to 50 feet above ground. Prior to striking the line, it was about 75 feet above ground.

The heavy fog likely obstructed Hawley’s view, the NTSB estimated, rendering him unable to see the transmission lines prior to the collision. The report says several vehicles’ dashboard cameras captured the helicopter’s descent and impact with the bridge. The helicopter was traveling at a speed of approximately 120 miles per hour prior to the crash.

Video showed that the helicopter’s main rotor blades, mast and transmission separated from the fuselage and were later located in Lake Pontchartrain.

The main body of the helicopter was engulfed in fire upon impact with the ground.

A post-impact fire consumed most of the fuselage. No video showing the helicopter’s collision with the transmission line has been found.

Following the accident, a United States Coast Guard helicopter was launched to the scene to provide search and rescue support.

Low-level fog allowed the stanchions of the power lines to be barely visible from the east, according to the report. From a top-down view, there was a very dense fog from all areas identified, with a tall column of clouds to the west of the power line intersection where the accident occurred. With Hawley traveling westbound, the fog layer was above the power lines from that vantage point, blocking them from view.

The clouds were able to orbit overhead, allowing for good visibility, at 500 feet over the shoreline, but at landfall to the west, a wall of clouds built to 1,200 feet.

All of the major components of the helicopter were located at the accident site, and the helicopter was sent to a facility for further examination.

Hawley, 43, was the only person onboard the aircraft. There were no casualties on the highway. He was reportedly traveling to pick up three passengers from the New Orleans Lakefront Airport.

The former U.S. Marine leaves behind his wife and their three children, ages 7, 4 and 3.

He was a resident of Denham Springs, but he grew

up in Prairieville and graduated from St. Amant High School in 1997. He enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps and spent 13 years as an aircraft mechanic. He also volunteered as a paramedic during his time in service.

A GoFundMe has been set up to raise funds to help Hawley’s family (titled Josh Hawley Memorial Fund).

The NTSB will move on to conduct a more comprehensive investigation that could take up to two years to complete.

Over \$5 million in Hurricane Laura relief announced for St. Charles Parish

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U.S. Senator Bill Cassidy announced this month that the Federal Emergency Management Agency will grant the state of Louisiana a total of \$66,741,745.13 for COVID-19 relief and Hurricanes Ida and Laura relief.

St. Charles Parish will receive \$5,318,784.25 of that money in repayment for Hurricane Laura relief. The grant is reimbursement for the removal of 963,909.70 cubic yards of debris in the wake of the 2020 storm.

The remaining funds will go to the Louisiana Housing Finance Agency (\$27,725,684.13 for pandemic relief) and Jefferson Parish (\$33,697,276.75 in reimbursement for Hurricane Ida relief).

“Louisiana has been hit by disaster after disaster, but families in our state are strong,” Cassidy said. “This funding has been slow to come, but is welcome. There is still more work to fully recover.”

driver of the other car was arrested for impaired driving - has been an emotional volcano for those who loved and lost Audrey.

“It definitely brings it all back up,” Comardelle said. “It makes us all cry. Its definitely hard to go through, and unfortunately we know exactly what (those families) are going through. It feels like, ‘What is going on in St. Charles Parish? With the justice system? Why does this continue to happen?’”

Comardelle and her family have created the Facebook page titled “Justice for Audrey Maria Higgins” with the goal of spreading awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving. The page also serves as a place to update people on the status of the case against Kevin Comardelle - the 22-year-old man accused of causing Audrey’s death. He is charged with four felony counts and two misdemeanor counts related to the case. He had a previous DWI charge at the time of the accident.

“Our main goal is to raise awareness in the community and a big thing we want to make sure that justice is served,” Comardelle said. “Blake and I have been speaking at the St. Charles Parish Driving Academy about the accident. A piece of me felt like we were reaching these young individuals, but not the majority of our community. We wanted to make sure to use the Facebook platform to reach everyone in the community and keep everyone informed.”

Comardelle has been drumming up support recently on the Facebook page for the upcoming pre-trial



hearing in the case. Slated for Jan. 19, Comardelle said the purpose of the hearing is to get the case on track for a trial after previous attempts at a plea agreement were not successful.

“Nothing that will happen will bring Audrey back,” Comardelle said. “Nothing can be worth what her life was worth. But we’re trying to reach out and see the culture of drinking and driving change. The way a DUI is handled is more like a slap on the wrist. That’s unfortunate because someone can have multiple DUIs and not face treatment and not face true consequences.”

Comardelle has encouraged as many people as possible to attend the pre-trial hearing.

“I feel like there is strength in numbers along with that,” she said.

with the full accompaniment of drums and guitar. They are known for their eclectic renditions of anything from Guns N’ Roses “Sweet Child of Mine” to Shawn Mendes and Camila Cabello’s “Señorita.” They blend a variety of classical, pop, rock, and electronic elements in their string arrangements.

The presentation of a string quartet, which brings to mind classical music, producing the sound of popular contemporary music makes quite the impression, and it’s brought the group fame since its inception in 2007. DSQ has performed for Presidents Barack Obama and George W. Bush, the College Football Playoffs, NBA, NFL organizations, and most recently performed at the wedding of Gwen Stefani and Blake Shelton. They’ve sold out concert venues like the House of Blues and symphony halls, and have played alongside Josh Groban, Chicago, and the Trans-Siberian Orchestra. The group has garnered more than 600 million streams on Pandora, 6.2 million views on YouTube and 5.8 million listeners on Spotify.

All of this was born from what were once side gigs for a group of college students studying and playing music at Southern Methodist University. After some time of playing private events and building an audience, the team began experimenting and developed an electric set, including covers of rock and pop songs.

Did Zanca ever expect this kind of success?

“I wish I could say yes, but not really,” Zanca said with a laugh. “We didn’t know what to make of it. We were just these college kids and from that you go on to ... I mean, I’m a big NBA fan, and getting the chance to play at halftime, I thought, ‘Wow, nothing could be better than this.’ It’s been an amazing journey.”

A native of Romania, Zanca moved to Dallas in 2003 and it was there – as the group’s name would suggest – DSQ was born. The idea to bring the custom electric set into their shows was an idea born from the fact that early on, the group realized people at larger events could not hear them sufficiently.

“We weren’t amplified or anything,” Zanca said. “And trying to find a solution, we started talking ... asking, ‘How can we make this fun and interesting?’”

The transformation came in 2007. The quartet’s first cover song was The Verve’s “Bittersweet Symphony.”

“We did a live show and realized people really liked music they could recognize, but in a different style,” said Zanca. “All of a sudden, you hear “Sweet Child of Mine” coming from a string quarter and it’s like, ‘Wow, I recognize this, but at the same time I feel like I’m listening to classical music.’”

That, as it turned out, was an attraction.

“We played in front of more than 1,000 people ... we sold 300 CDs in an hour and a half,” he said. “And at that point, ‘Hey, maybe this is something we need to look at.’ Once we graduated, we realized we really enjoyed doing this, the crossover of classical and pop music. And it’s very rewarding to be able to bring people who wouldn’t normally listen to classical music to listen to this genre.”

The members are Zanca (viola), Melissa Priller (violin), Eleanor Dunbar (violin), Young Heo (bass), Anthony Plant (guitar) and Efren Guzman, Jr. (drums and percussion).

Zanca said his path to becoming a musician was set at a young age. His parents and grandparents alike were musicians.

“My whole life, I’ve been involved in music,” said Zanca. “It allows me to be true to who I am. I’ve had a lot of jobs ... I’ve worked construction, been a limo driver, and it works for awhile but that feeling of ‘I’m not meant to be here’ was there, that anxiety. But doing what I love, it’s completely different. I don’t have to fight it.”

He sees the upcoming concert as a great outing for all age groups, especially for a family night. After shows, the quartet takes time to meet with the attendees and answer questions, particularly from youths – and perhaps future musicians.

It’s also something of a homecoming for Zanca, who attended LSU as a student about 20 years ago after moving to America. This is the first time he’s been able to return to the area, and he’s looking forward to it.

“To be honest, I’m very excited about it. I have a lot of friends there,” Zanca said. “When I moved there, coming from Europe, I didn’t understand the LSU culture, the tailgating, the gumbo and it took me by surprise. And now I’m so excited about returning. I’ve been telling the group about all of the food, everything that’s so great about (Louisiana), and I’m pumped to bring the group to try everything around there.”

Hitting back roads from coast to coast, the Pickers earn a living by restoring forgotten relics to their former glory, transforming one person’s trash into another’s treasure.”

Carrera said the hosts of the show hope to give historically significant objects a new lease on life while learning a thing or two about America’s past along the way.

“The Pickers have seen a lot of rusty gold over the years and are always looking to discover something they’ve never seen before,” he said. “They are ready to find extraordinary items and hear fascinating tales about them.”

said. “STEM is one of the fastest-growing fields and one of the most impactful areas shaping our future. Students need access to high-quality resources, whether they are materials, training, or simply connections. The ability to provide these resources to students, specifically those underrepresented in the field, allows a new generation of students to see STEM as an achievable dream for their future.”

Lewis’ first STEMCYCLES program is an all-girls high school robotics team. This month kicked off the start of its first competition cycle, and for the next couple of months the 15-member team will meet at the Destrehan library weekly to build a robot that will be featured at a March competition.

“We’re starting well,” he said. “I wouldn’t say ‘small,’ but were starting with this and then we’ll branch out.”

Lewis has big plans for STEMCYCLES for 2022 and beyond.

“Outside of the robotics team, my goal is to expand the mission of the non-profit to every level of schooling,” Lewis said. “Launching our cultivation camps just in time for the summer, students ranging from K-12 would be able to participate in one-to-two-week camps focused on different STEM topics. The goal of these camps is to provide students with an experience that drives them to STEM and then directs parents and students in the right direction so that the cultivation can continue.”

Lewis said the goal for the STEMCYCLES students is to be able to build connections, cultivate relationships and find resources for whatever career path they are interested in.

Fundraising, and the associated marketing, are also something Lewis hopes to teach the students. Robot-making is an expensive endeavor, with one robot requiring up to \$10,000 in supplies and materials, he said.

Lewis said the community can support STEMCYCLES through volunteering or

monetary donations – all of which donors can be confident in the money being used to change the future.

“Students who otherwise may not have the chance to develop their skills in STEM for various reasons, whether it is because of a lack of funds or prejudgment because of their gender or race, will be provided with the resources and placed into an environment where they are advanced,” he said. “This means more developed students, but it also means diverse workers, who will bring a different perspective to the industry and work to improve our lives. When you donate to the organization, you invest in the future and developing students in your community who are prepared for whatever challenges they may face in the future. To build a quality project isn’t easy, but I think we’re in a really good position.”

Lewis said he has had a lot of people and industry leaders help him thus far, and that he is excited about the future of the nonprofit.

“I can see it being really beneficial for the students who are a part of it,” Lewis said.

Abihail Navarro is one of those students.

“I am really excited for this season to start because this is my first time being a part of a robotics team, and I’m so happy that I was able to be part of this amazing team,” she said. “We have an awesome goal with our robot and I know our team is going to work hard to accomplish it. I hope this season goes smoothly and that we especially have a lot of fun.”

Indira Escobar agreed.

Having a team that is all girls is exciting,” she said. “It defies all the standards society defines for women in STEM. I’m grateful for the mentorship and thrilled to see how this journey inspires underrepresented groups as it did me.”

Lady Tigers rally for district win

Kylie Dufrene and Kayla Martin admitted the first half of Tuesday night’s district soccer matchup between Hahnville and visiting Central Lafourche was a bit frustrating at times – the Lady Tigers outshot the Trojans 12 to 1 in the first half, yet trailed 1-0 against a team that’s had Hahnville’s number in

recent years. But the two juniors helped key a second half turnaround, scoring the tying and eventual winning goals, respectively, in a 2-1 victory that moved the Tigers to 2-0 in district play. Dufrene’s score in the box with 16:30 remaining in regulation knotted the game at 1 – Hahnville

trailed 1-0 since the 30-minute mark of the first half. Martin put the Tigers over the top a short time later, after she drew a foul just over 20 yards from the goal. She lofted the free kick into the upper left corner of the net to give Hahnville a one goal lead, and the Tigers controlled the action from there. “It was tough,” said Martin. “I didn’t think we were playing our best, but we kept the confidence to come back. We know we can win district, and this was a big win.” Dufrene said the Tigers fell short in past seasons against Central (7-11-1), but were determined to make sure it didn’t happen again Tuesday. “I just feel like every year they’ve beat us, and every year we’ve felt we were good enough to beat them and we just couldn’t step up to do it. I think this year we were tired of

it,” Dufrene said. Hahnville is 9-7 overall following a pre-district schedule that HHS head coach Edgar Fuentes said was put together to test and prepare his team for district and postseason play. It’s little wonder why – the Lady Tigers snapped what was a near decade-long drought without a playoff win last season, making a run to the Division I state quarterfinals. A second-round upset win over then No. 3 seed Captain Shreve highlighted the season, just one year after the Lady Tigers lost a heartbreaking matchup to Barbe in the final moments of their 2020 1st round game in Boutte. This Tigers group has introduced several new, young starters, but this team’s talent is not in question – and they’re excited to see how far they can go. “These are the games that build character, and

what can I tell you, we’re super proud of the way we came out in that second half,” Fuentes said. “We overcame adversity ... between some of these upperclassmen and some of those freshmen coming together, our sophomore keeper ... they kept fighting. They never gave up.” Hahnville just missed on several first half scoring chances – two shots bounced back after striking dead on the crossbar. Dufrene finally broke through for her team, though. A key defender for the Tigers, she said this was something new. “I usually don’t play attacking. I’ve never really scored a goal in an important game. When I was in front of it, I just knew we need this. I need to do this to wake everyone up. So, when I made it, I was in shock. I think it kind of lit a fire in everyone else.” Fuentes said the chance was a product of the Tigers’ style, and

the conversion result of a player cool under pressure. “We were playing with three in the back and two wing backs. We ask our wingbacks to join the offense a bit more. She was in the right place at the right time, and had the composure in front of goal to put it on the far post, and that started it all,” he said. Martin said seeing the ball finally find the back of the net brought some relief. She launched 10 shots on the night – and when she had a chance at the PK, she was in no mood to miss. “I had too many shots in the first half – I had to put this one away,” Martin said. “We couldn’t leave with a 1-1. We needed a win.” The Tigers have a win to celebrate, but another important game looms large this week: rival Destrehan visits Hahnville on Friday night.

"The level of success that we achieved was due to the incredible hard work of the people in the district and all of the outside support that we received from organizations like Junior Achievement."
