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"My family found out on Facebook and my sister Facetimed me ... she was crying ... she couldn't get it out. Then she finally said it – 'Brian Matherne is out.' I just fell to my knees. All I know is when I got up I knew I had to make this right. I knew I needed to get this monster back behind bars."

Chad Becnel said it felt like he was back to ground zero last month when he found out that Brian Matherne had been mistakenly released from prison over seven years early.

Matherne, 66, coached several boys' sports and taught various subjects at

Flood insurance hikes take center stage at townhall meeting

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There were more questions than answers this month when St. Charles Parish President Matthew Jewell, Congressman Garret Graves and members from the St. Charles Parish Council hosted a townhall meeting to discuss FEMA’s new National Flood Insurance Program called Risk Rating 2.0.

Nearly 100 people attended the meeting to hear how the new policy will affect flood insurance rates. The new program went into effect Oct. 1, 2021, meaning new policies beginning Oct. 1 were subject to the new rating methodology.

Many home buyers and builders in St. Charles Parish have been quoted over \$6,000 a year for new policies under Risk Rating 2.0.

All pre-existing policies renewing on or after April 1, 2022, will be subject to the new program. Flood insurance policies are set to increase 18% per year – the most permitted by federal law – under Risk Rating 2.0 until the policy reaches its peak – a peak of which is still unclear. Flood zones are a thing of the past now, with policy premiums calculated

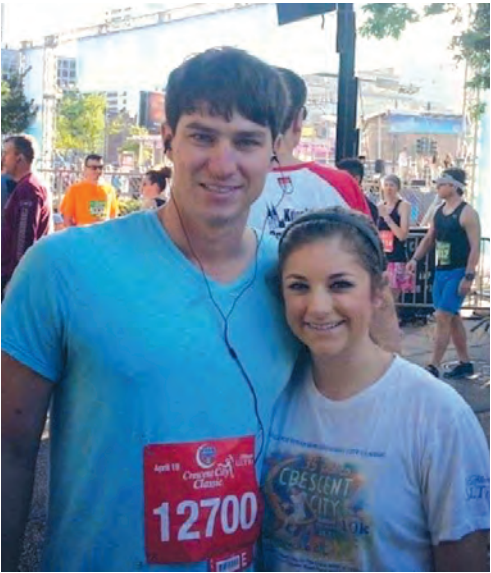
Widow hopes husband’s death leads people to do own vaccine research

“Brandon would be so proud of me. I do think that it was our destiny to be together, because I was the one who would have the courage and medical stance to share his story in an impactful way.”

Jessica Pollet became a widow on Jan. 28. Her husband Brandon Pollet died after being diagnosed with hemophagocytic lymphohistiocytosis, or HLH, following the administration of his second COVID vaccine. The couple has a 1-year-old daughter.

“My purpose in sharing Brandon’s story is not to tell everyone that you’re wrong if you get vaccinated or not to get vaccinated ... I want both sides of the story to be known,” Jessica said. “If we had a healthy, young, intelligent, kind, hard-working man with a beautiful family die after



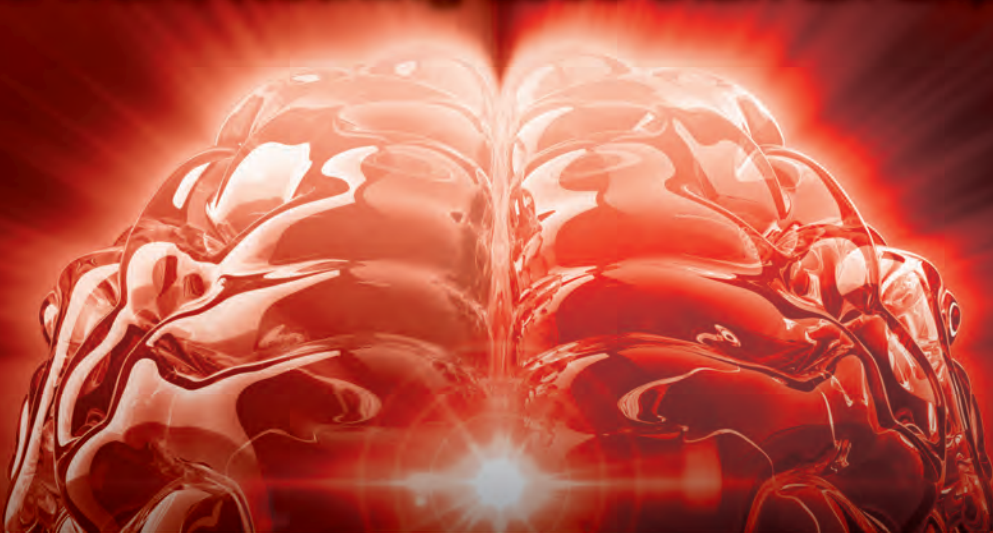

getting the vaccine in our community, and the story was spread near and far, we would have most likely not gotten the vaccine based on our own research and hesitations. I think it’s unfair for everyone to push the vaccine so hard but not warn of the adverse effects that are possible.”

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Gas pump explosion created scary scenario in Hahnville

Khalid Jamour was ringing up a customer when he heard a massive boom outside, spurring him into action.

“It was terrifying,” Jamour said. “But someone has to be brave for everyone else.”

Jamour, a manager at Birdie’s Food and Fuel in Hahnville, was on duty at about 6 a.m. Saturday morning when an SUV collided with a gas pump outside the store – a video of the incident showed the collision causing a large white flash, an explosion leading way to a massive fire and the collapse of the canopy above.

With a handful of customers inside the store, Jamour had to react quickly – not just to keep the situation from worsening, but also to calm the store patrons, and more importantly, to keep them safe.

“I shut all the tanks off and told everyone that we’ve got to go outside,” Jamour said. “You need to go across the street and get away from this.”

He called 911 and did what he could to contain the fire. He went outside with an extinguisher, but there wasn’t much that could do as the fire was too large and he could not get close to the source.

“It was like 40 feet,” Jamour said. “What made it so big, someone was pumping gas about a minute before, so there was still fuel in the line.”

A short time later, firefighters arrived and were able to contain and ultimately put out the fire.

According to Birdie’s owner Mike Nabut, police arrested the driver of the SUV, who was subsequently charged with DWI.

“Thank God that nobody was hurt,” Nabut said. “(Jamour) handled the situation great ... nobody could have done a better job securing the place and getting people out of the building.

We can get another gas pump, another canopy and even another store if it came to that, but you can’t get back a loss of life.”

It is an expensive situation – Nabut estimated the crash caused approximately \$75,000 worth of damage, and the store won’t be able to sell gas for at least another eight weeks, the estimated time it will take to replace the gas pumps. The driver was uninsured, Nabut noted, thus the costs fall upon the business.

“\$75,000 worth of damage, in a matter of seconds. But like I said, I’ll take damage all day beyond someone getting hurt,” Nabut said. “Even beyond the explosion, they could have run into someone coming out of the store, getting gas. Thankfully, at that time of day, there were not too many people there or even out on River Road.

“Accidents happen. But a drunk driver of all things ... it’s salt in the wound.”

When Nabut arrived at the scene, he said he could tell Jamour was “running on emotion.”

“I could almost feel his heart beating ... I mean, you see something like what happened, you see that in the movies. We’re not programmed to see that in real life.”

Jamour credited his ability to react in the heat of the moment to the emergency training Nabut provides and requires for store employees.

“You learn the protocols, so when this is what happens, this is what you do,” Jamour said. “It’s a good thing he has us take those classes ... I know I’m thankful I took the course. As scary as it was, you have to make sure a big problem doesn’t become a much bigger one, and that this (fire) doesn’t kill anyone.”

them to know that the great price the men paid for their country has not and will not ever be forgotten.

“It started as we were planning on holding an event for Black History Month,” said Ed Blouin, Commander of American Legion 509. “And with these men being our two remaining World War II veterans, and also our last two charter members, we decided to honor them. We always honor our veterans when they die, thank them for their service ... we wanted to honor (Becknel and Pierre) while they’re still here with us.”

The invocation was given by The American Legion, Dept. of Louisiana Chaplain Gerald Theriot, and the guest speaker was The American Legion, Dept. of Louisiana Commander Richard Bell. Becknel and Pierre were each presented with a proclamation from Commander Bell, honoring each for their service during World War II.

Becknel, 96, was inducted into the Air Force in October of 1942 and received numerous decorations, including the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign with one bronze star for his service during World War II. He was honorably discharged on July 12, 1951.

Pierre, 98, was inducted into the Air Force in July of 1943 and, like Becknel, had numerous decorations to his name, including the European-Africa-Middle Eastern Campaign with two bronze stars for his time in northern

France. He was discharged honorably in November of 1945.

The second World War lasted from 1939 to 1945, beginning with Germany’s invasion of Poland on September 1 of 1939. By its end, it directly involved more than 100 million personnel from more than 30 countries, and it was by far the deadliest conflict in human history, with as many as 85 million fatalities coming as result. The war shifted the world in countless ways politically, economically and socially.

Members of the veterans’ family spoke, as well as their friends. Blouin also spoke in tribute to them, and gave some insight as to why the day carried extra special meaning for him.

“I’m a Vietnam veteran, and I know how it is to be away from home for a year at a time, praying every day that you’ll get back home,” Blouin said. “I told a story about how I came back ... I got to stay home a little while. I put on my uniform and went to church. And nobody welcomed me back, and nobody thanked me for my service.”

Blouin said he almost teared up as he was recalling the emotional memory.

“I can’t ever forget that,” he said. “And I told them, as bad as that was, it’s nothing compared to what Mr. Becknel and Mr. Pierre went through. They fought for freedom overseas, and they came home into desegregation. That was even worse.”

Despite returning victorious in World War II, there was no universal thank you for the black veterans returning home to an ongoing struggle to achieve social justice during the civil rights movement.

“They were very influential to putting the Post together after the war,” said Percy Wilson of Post 509. “They bought a building back in the early 90s and put this all together. They had to build on it, paint, put concrete in, and they were a huge part of all of that. They deserve to be recognized.”

the parish's library locations are now operational.

"It feels really good to be back open," said Lauren Campo Pitz, St. Charles Parish Library Assistant Director. "I know our staff, they've been working at other branches since around Thanksgiving, and I know everyone's very excited to be back around their branch. The response (from the community) has been great ... a lot of people have been expressing their thanks and excitement that we're back open on social media."

The site was the final to reopen as it absorbed the most direct damage from Ida.

"It was definitely our hardest hit branch," said Pitz. "We lost half of the roof on the second floor and one exterior wall on the second floor came down. We were unable to secure the roof and walls immediately after the storm, so we had more water inside of the building from rainfall after the hurricane."

That created several issues beyond building repair – materials were damaged and air quality became a concern due to worries about potential mold due to the water inside. Employees at the branch relocated to other branches as repairs were ongoing, the library keeping its doors closed until it could be safely inhabited again.

Everything on the second floor, including the library's meeting room and its Louisiana collection, took water. In the immediate aftermath of the storm, staff that stayed local through Ida were able to retrieve as many books and materials



damaged first floor of the library," Pitz said. "

We brought dehumidifiers and ran them throughout the building to avoid losing more of the collection and more of the building."

Hurricane repairs included a new roof for the second floor of the library, the gutting of all damaged areas, and a temporary wall built to close off the back half of the building until it can be repaired.

Some materials and spaces are unavailable for the time being due to the hurricane damage and ongoing renovations. The Louisiana Room and meeting room are unavailable. Books and other materials can be requested and delivered to the library through its courier service. All computers, study areas, Wi-Fi, and two study rooms are available.

Many of the library's regular events and activities have already resumed. Weekly story times for children up to age 5 take place every Wednesday at 10:30 a.m. Planetarium shows are set for every Tuesday and Thursday evening at 6:30 p.m., every Saturday morning for children's shows at 10 and 11:30 a.m. and every Saturday afternoon at 2 and 3:30 p.m.

"We also have a Nerd Night for teens every Thursday evening that's started," Pitz said. "I think by the summer, we'll be able to offer a lot of the same types of programs and events that we always do."

months."

All of the books that took direct water damage have been disposed of. Pitz said a large part of the library's first floor book and material collection was preserved thanks to how quickly it was removed.

There were 3706 items pulled from the Louisiana Room collection and they are currently being remediated out of state, according to Pitz.

The library has a total collection of 60,225 items, with only 3,200 of them lost.

"We saved 13,853 items from the

using a set of vague criteria including distance to water – seemingly regardless of a levee system.

"The new flood insurance rates we are seeing with FEMA's new Risk Rating 2.0 are unreasonable and are going to hurt our community," Jewell said. "On one hand we have the Corps of Engineers that said a billion-and-a-half dollar levee project is a good thing for this area, and that the cost benefit makes sense. On the other hand, the paradox is that FEMA is basically making it unaffordable to live here."

Jewell said during the meeting that the new rates were "a slap in the face" to St. Charles Parish residents, as over a decade ago local voters decided to tax themselves to generate increased levee and flood protection. Since then he said over \$50 million has been spent on levees, pump stations and flood gates.

"We have been mitigating our risk in St. Charles Parish," Jewell said, adding that according to the national levee database on the Corps of Engineers website several local levee alignments are listed but detailed as having a 0 foot elevation.

"Is that what FEMA is using to model

as possible from the library.

"It's a process that's taking some time, because once Ida hit us, it went northeast and a whole bunch of libraries up there are in the same situation we are," Pitz said. "So, we're hoping we'll learn more about that over the next few

our flood risk?" Jewell asked.

FEMA Regional Flood Insurance Liaison Gilbert Giron spoke at the meeting and reminded the crowd several times that he didn't write Risk Rating 2.0. He provided very few answers to Jewell's questions, but did note that the general affordability of policies is in no way a factor in FEMA's decision-making process.

According to FEMA, over the past 50 years the agency has collected \$60 billion in NFIP premiums but has paid \$96 billion in costs.

"Taxpayers and policyholders are adversely impacted when the program does not generate the revenue needed to pay claims," the FEMA website states. "Risk Rating 2.0 will help put the NFIP on solid financial footing by creating a more stable program that is accountable to taxpayers."

Graves addressed the crowd and said he and other congressional leaders are doing everything they can to make sure FEMA realizes the gravity of the new policy premiums. He said several amendments he and others drafted to either stop or amend the new rating system were blocked before even being voted on.

Norco's Sacred Heart of Jesus School for over 20 years. Becnel was the first victim who spoke out and levied allegations against Becnel, paving the way for more victims to eventually come forward.

"I was the first one and I was the first one for about four months," Becnel said. "We were definitely ostracized ... my family was shunned. We were drug through the mud for those months."

Becnel said when the allegations were first made public, community members and Sacred Heart teachers wore ribbons in their show of solidarity – not for Becnel, but for Matherne. Becnel also said that Archdiocese officials knew of his claims two years prior and ignored them – which allowed Matherne to continue to stay employed by the school.

Becnel's sister Doreen Becnel Landry said her family "went through hell" during the time.

"Matherne was a pillar of the community," she said. "People said that my brother's accusations of being molested were all lies. Matherne is a complete monster who molested all these young boys during his 22 years of teaching. His early release shocked and maddened me to my core."

Matherne was charged in 1999 with several hundred counts of child sex abuse. In 2000 he pleaded guilty in St. Charles Parish to molesting 17 boys during a 15-year period that ended in 1999.

Judge Robert Chaisson of the 29th Judicial District Court sentenced Matherne to 29 years, 11 months and 29 days. The sentence structure was crucial – a sentence

of 30 years or more would have meant Matherne would eventually be eligible for parole or to be released early for exemplary behavior.

When they found Matherne was released early, Becnel said he and his family immediately reached out to the Louisiana Department of Corrections to try and learn why.

"I personally asked the lady on the phone if this possible ... that this could have been a mistake," Becnel said. "She told me that this was looked at by three people and she said, 'We don't make mistakes.' It would have

actually gone unnoticed if we didn't call."

Matherne was re-arrested last week following an investigation and WWL news segment. Becnel said the DOC has not issued any apology.

"No sympathy or explanation ... no apology," Becnel said. "It's been just the opposite ... she told us now there's more paperwork she had to do because we found the mistake."

The "nightmare on top of a nightmare," Becnel said, was that none of Matherne's victims were notified about his release.

"If we had been notified we could have prevented this," Becnel said, adding that during Matherne's nearly 30 days of freedom he was living just a little over a mile from a school and within less than 50 yards from several children. "Do you know how the number of times the DOC mistakenly releases someone prior to their release date? 125 per year on average ... and that's just in Louisiana. The silver lining here is that were made aware that things like this happen."

Becnel said although the last couple of weeks have been emotionally draining, he knows he did the right thing in fighting for justice.

"The farther I get away again from this day again the better I'll become," he said. "I know I made the right decision. I'm glad I did it. A lot of victims have sent messages thanking me ... one said, 'I live 20 miles from where he was living ... I can't imagine if I would have run into him.'"

Brandon were very vocal to doctors that his symptoms started immediately after he was vaccinated.

“There was one doctor, his primary care physician, who said that he thought the vaccine definitely led to what he was suffering with,” Jessica said. “When we would ask the doctors at the hospital their opinion on if the vaccine could have led to his condition, some said it was pure coincidence and others said it was a possible trigger. An overall consensus was that HLH or Stills disease usually has a trigger.”

The couple hesitated to get the COVID vaccines at all, Jessica said.

“When the vaccine first became available, we didn’t really have interest in getting it,” she said. “We knew we were both healthy and would likely fare well if we caught COVID. We would read different things about peoples’ reports of vaccine injuries ... but the media was quick to write that off so we didn’t look much more into it. As time passed and the Delta wave emerged, things got confusing for us. A fear was instilled in us. There was this sort of ‘promise’ that if you got vaccinated, you wouldn’t die from COVID. I mean that sounded like a good thing ... what we were not informed about was the possibility of dying from getting the vaccine.”

Jessica said she and Brandon both wavered for weeks on whether to get vaccinated.

“One day we would say we weren’t getting it because we read something negative about it, and the next day we decided to get it because maybe the benefit outweighed the risk,” she said. “We went back and forth like this for weeks. So many people were urging others to get the vaccine and people were angry at those who didn’t get it. We couldn’t predict the future. Maybe Brandon would be one of the ones who got extremely

sick from COVID ... it was all really unknown.”

Jessica said the couple finally decided to get vaccinated.

“We weren’t happy to get it,” she said. “But then again all these people are telling us it’s the right decision, that this is needed. He took the first dose and had a headache that lasted a couple of days.”

When it was time for their second dose, Jessica said she and Brandon were both uneasy.

“I cried on the way to get it,” she said. “I almost didn’t get the second dose, but my thoughts were that it would make life easy to have this vaccine card filled out since mandates were emerging everywhere.”

After his second shot on Aug. 25, 2021, Brandon developed a headache almost immediately.

“We thought nothing of because he had the same symptom last time,” Jessica said. “As the days went on, the headache did not subside and about three days later he developed fever. The fever would get as high as 103F. He felt very fatigued overall.”

A visit to urgent care resulted in Brandon learning he had an enlarged spleen.

“A lot of his lab work was out of normal range, including his white blood cell count and liver enzymes,” Jessica said. “He seen a hematologist a couple times during this period for concerns of cancer, but nothing was ever diagnosed.”

Brandon became more ill over the next couple of months and was eventually hospitalized.

“At a loss, the doctors decided he may have a rare disease called hemophagocytic lymphohistiocytosis,” Jessica said.

Staff at another hospital later ruled out that diagnosis, and instead diagnosed Brandon with a rare autoimmune disease called Adult Onset Stills Disease.

“Brandon was seen by almost every type of doctor in the hospital and had almost every test run,” Jessica said. “He was stuck for blood hundreds of times. They did a lumbar puncture, bone marrow biopsy, liver biopsy, and so much blood work. Everything was negative. Infectious disease saw him and tested him for all possible infections, but nothing was to be found.”

Brandon was discharged

from the hospital and waited for over a month for an immunosuppressant drug to be delivered to his home. For whatever reason, Jessica said, that drug never arrived.

By December Brandon started developing severe fevers again and was again admitted to the hospital.

“His labs were extremely abnormal,” Jessica said. “His white blood cell count was dangerously low, blood clotting numbers dangerously low, liver enzymes elevated, and all inflammation markers, including ferritin, were extremely elevated. After a few days, they decided to diagnose him with HLH. From here, he was started on the 2004 HLH protocol, which included chemotherapy, along with a few other meds.”

As time progressed, Brandon was not getting better.

“There came a point where they decided there was not much more they could offer him in terms of treatment,” Jessica said. “His body started going into liver and kidney failure ... his body started shutting down. On January 27 he was discharged to hospice and died the next day.”

Although Brandon asked multiple times, Jessica said, his doctors never reported his case to VAERS.

“I reported the case to VAERS then a few days later I got a response for a ‘STAT: Medical Records request for COVID-19 vaccine recipient,’” she said. “I then got a condolence letter from VAERS and they said they were reviewing the case with his medical team.”

Jessica, who works as a Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist, said she has been on leave but will return to work soon.

“There was definitely a lot of times after Brandon’s death that I didn’t know if I could go back to the medical profession,” she said. “The medical system failed him and our family. Not only did they strongly urge us to get this vaccine, but they didn’t heal him. Looking back at his entire journey in the medical system, there were a lot of missed steps and opportunities that make me sick.”

Jessica said she or a member of Brandon’s family was at his side every day.

“Even being so involved, we had to strongly advocate for Brandon every

single day,” she said. “We had to push for treatments, medications, pain relief and just human comfort. Comparing the hospital system from when I worked as an ICU nurse years back, it’s pathetic now. So returning to a hospital has me feeling a little uneasy. How can I participate in such a broken system? But now I know there needs to be people who will stand up in the broken system and advocate for others, especially those who can’t advocate for themselves or have no one to advocate for them.”

Jessica said she has had people from close to home and all the way from Ireland reached out to her since learning about Brandon’s story.

“Among them was a vaccine-injured veteran, a healthy young man who developed neurological symptoms that looked like but wasn’t Guillain Barre, someone who did develop Guillain Barre, a man who had a heart attack and died two weeks after the vaccine, a lady who developed liver failure after the vaccine who was put in a transplant list, and the list could go on and on,” Jessica said. “One lady’s husband was diagnosed with HLH then died one month after receiving the vaccine. She always had a huge suspicion for the vaccine being related to the development of his condition, but the doctors refused to acknowledge it and refuse to give her the medical records.”

Jessica said she hopes Brandon’s story will cause people to do their own research about adverse effects of the vaccine.

“I want everyone to make their own choice ... like we did,” she said. “We did make our own choice, but the difference is that we were not informed of the possible adverse effects. I’ve had hundreds of people that I don’t know see my Facebook posts and hear his story ... we are reaching people.”

Jessica said she would like to think that all of this happened for a reason.

“This was Brandon’s purpose in life ... to help open other’s eyes, to motivate others to do research, to question before complying, to understand what can happen,” she said. “He really wanted his story spread. He wanted to warn every and anyone of what could be possible. We never thought this would be us.”

Hahnville struck early to take control of the game, with a Jacob RBI double and Edgar RBI single plating the day's first

two runs in the second inning.

Waguespack's sacrifice fly and a Jacob RBI single pushed the lead to 4-0 in the fourth inning, and Hahnville never looked back.

The victory over Hannan was the latest of a series of victories over several perennial state tournament qualifiers – HHS has bested Doyle, Belle Chasse, Vandebilt Catholic and Dutchtown over the past two weeks, with its lone loss in that stretch coming to John Curtis.

Hahnville began the year missing five starters due to quarantine, then further injuries and

illnesses cost various players time from there.

"It's been a roller-coaster year," said Schulz. "I joke with them that it's like trying to put together a puzzle, and then my little boy comes in and kicks the table and it falls and you have to start all over."

With five starters back from last year's team, this is an experienced group that's already won plenty of games.

"We're inexperienced at a few spots, but we've had young players step up," said Schulz. Adeline Bertrand and Brazzi Jacob, those are a sophomore and freshman starting third base and first

base for us, and they've done a really good job for us."

Edgar has swung a hot bat, including a recent three-game stretch where she piled up three home runs and three doubles.

Waguespack and MacKenzie Kliebert have also continued their strong pitching from a year ago.

"There's not many teams fortunate to have a staff like we do, where we always have someone warmed up and ready to go if needed," Schulz said. "Laney's pitching extremely well and we've gotten very good innings, strong starts out of Mac."



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Hahnville alum Byrd places 5th at national meet, sets school records

Dillard freshman has run multiple record-setting times in first year with program

Appropriate per her name – Kevell Byrd flies when she takes to the track.

The Hahnville High alum and Dillard freshman has already made her mark in the collegiate ranks, surging to the front of the university’s track and field record books. In just her first year, Byrd has set school records in the indoor 200 and 400 meter dash events, as well as the indoor 60 meters.

Technically speaking, Byrd has garnered four record-breaking performances – her 400 meter time of 55.02 broke her own record, which she set only a day earlier at the 2022 NAIA Indoor Track and Field National Championships in Brookings, South Dakota.

That 400-meter mark earned her fifth place overall nationally in the event, earning her All-American status. Her 200m mark (24.74) was also set at the national championship competition. She is the first Dillard woman to earn All-American honors since Akia Armstrong in 2019.

All in all? Not a bad start to a college career.

“When I came to Dillard, my goal was to make history,” Byrd said.

“And to feel like I’m moving toward that goal as a freshman, it makes me think I’m on the right track in life and know what I’m doing. I’m putting the highest expectations on myself. I’m very excited and grateful to get to this point.”

She’s quickly earned fans, among the chief of which, her coach.

“Kevell is a flat-out superstar, she came into the championship with a race plan that was executed,” said Dillard coach Nile Legania following the national meet.

While she dreamed big, Byrd admits she wasn’t so sure what to expect from herself upon first arriving at Dillard. The college game was somewhat intimidating at first, she said.

“I was super nervous

when I got to college. It’s a bigger field ... expectations are very different in college. I thought going to a smaller school, it might be similar, but I was wrong. The way our coach trains, we do it like they do at SEC schools. How I treat my body, how I treat myself ... a lot has changed,” she said.

She credited her support system of teammates and coaches with helping to acclimate her and build her confidence.

Her early performances

didn’t hurt that, either. When she ran the indoor 60-meter for the first time at Dillard, she set a personal record for indoor or outdoor events That was an eye-opener for her.

“Indoor times are relatively slower than outdoor times, and I opened up running times I never ran in my life,” Byrd said. “I realized that I can do this.

“In indoor track, the competition is where they say the big dogs are. And I was scared, like ‘little ol’ me, I just got here, what am I supposed to do?’ I realized I’m faster than I think I am and I put all those self-doubts aside.”

That success has only lit a fire underneath her. As she sees herself racking up strong performances

and living up to her potential, it’s only made her want to work even harder to see how far she can spur herself to go.

“I’m working as hard as humanly possible,” Byrd said. “Track is a mental game. I always ran with as much effort as I could,

but I feel like now, I’ve found another level I can go.”

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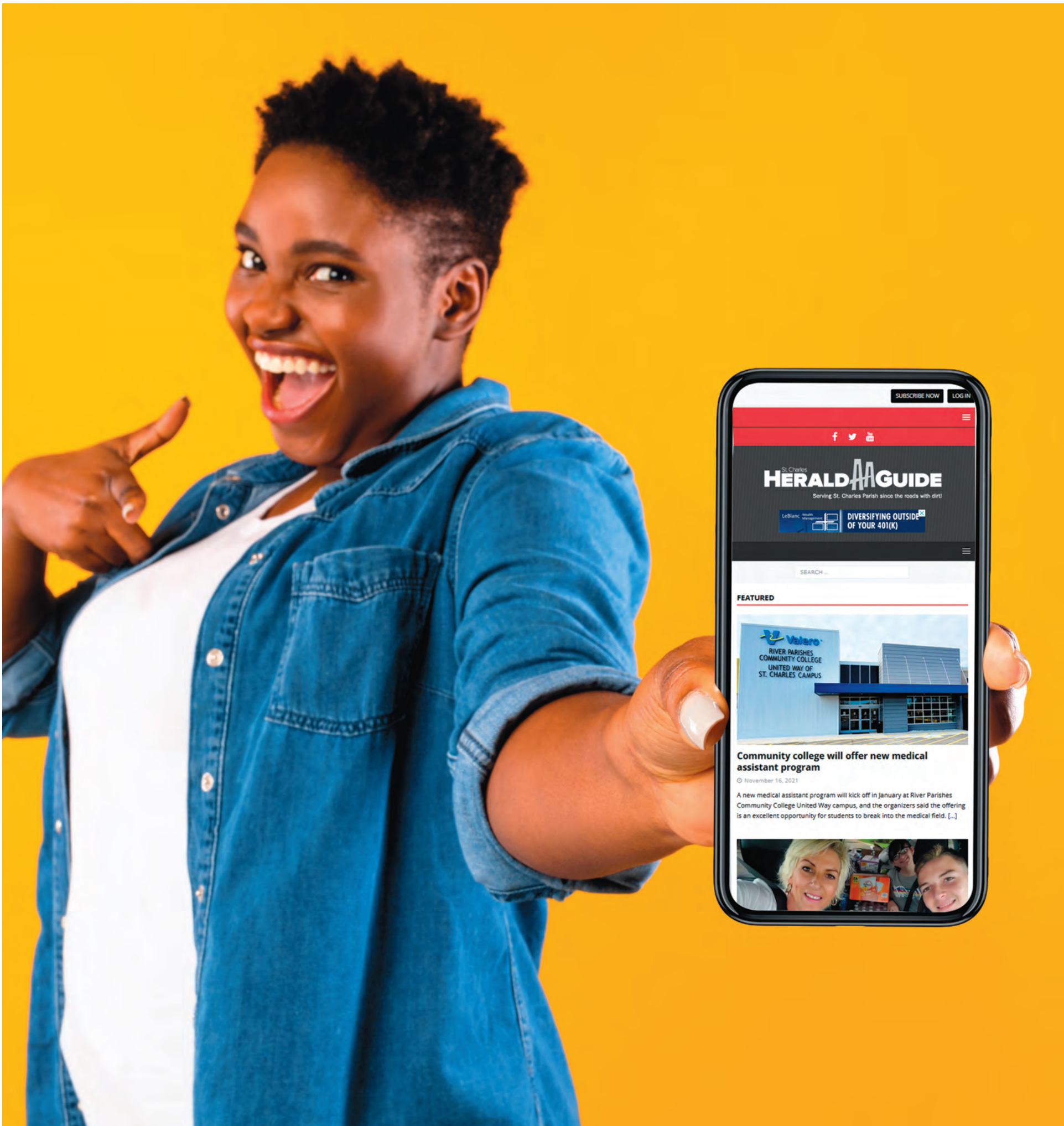

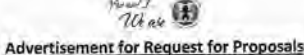

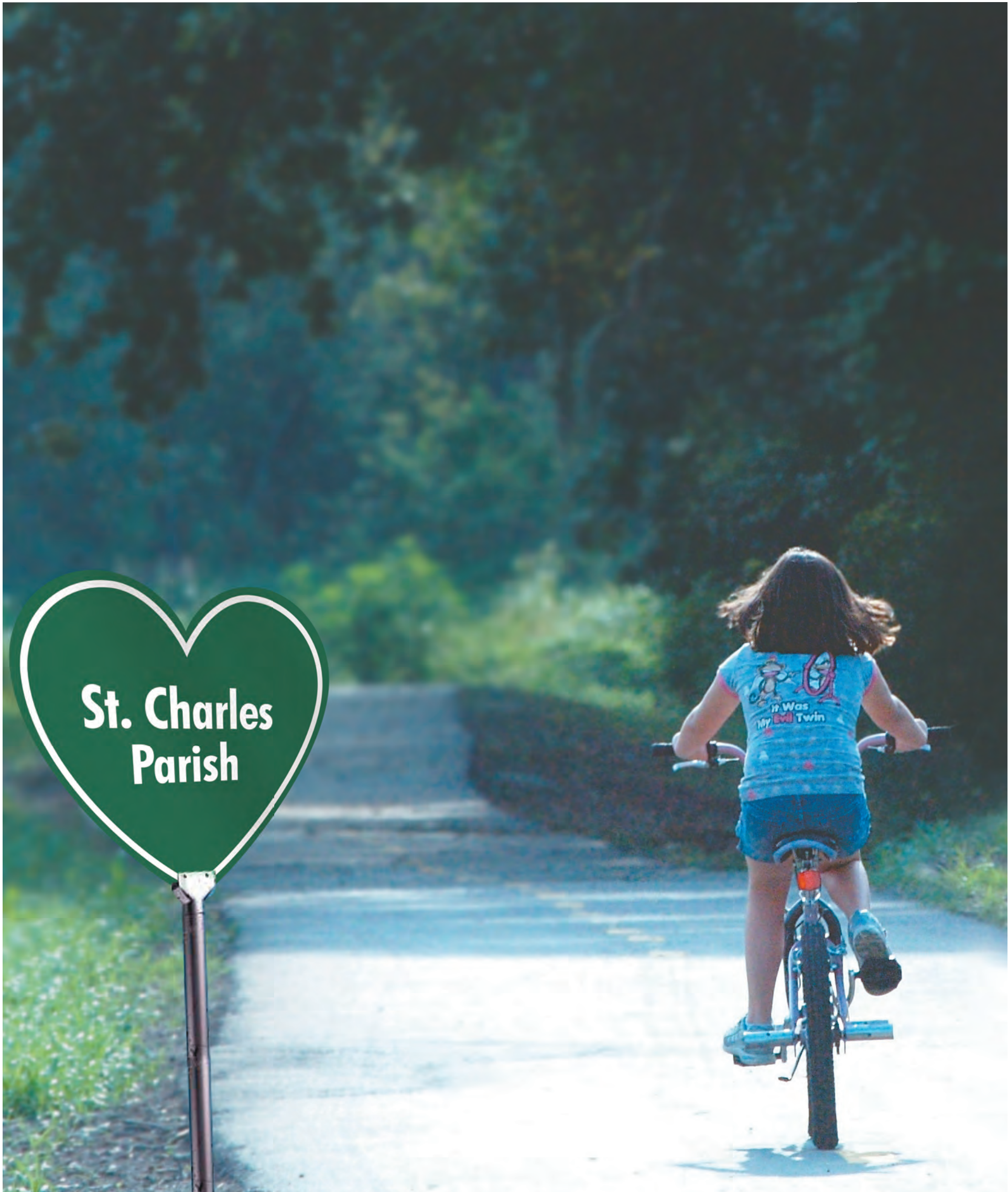
