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Destrehan boy officially a kidney disease survivor

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Karen Bellow's voice was of pure joy.

"I believe miracles can happen, because of this," said the elated mother.

Bellow and her husband Paul just received the news they've prayed for years to hear – that their 5-year-old son, Jaxon, was a kidney disease survivor. Since infancy, the Destrehan boy has suffered from disease in both of his kidneys — hydronephrosis and vesicoureteral reflux — which

necessitated medical intervention, including surgery. He's not only faced serious discomfort since birth, but also the prospect of losing a kidney.

This month, Jaxon faced a key date in determining his health status – were an ultrasound to come back and show his doctor the necessary improvement, his kidney

“None of the grandchildren knew him,” Hahnville resident Janel Pizzolato, Lussan’s granddaughter, said. “He died before his grandchildren were born ... but we knew that he was parish treasurer

in the early 1900s and we know that he was a farmer. I remember the thing mostly that my mother told me was that he was a large man ... a tall man and he had a strong presence ... like when he spoke people listened.”

Pizzolato said when family members were cleaning out her mother’s house after her death they found Lussan’s death

Local artist designs life-size giraffe for the Baton Rouge Airport

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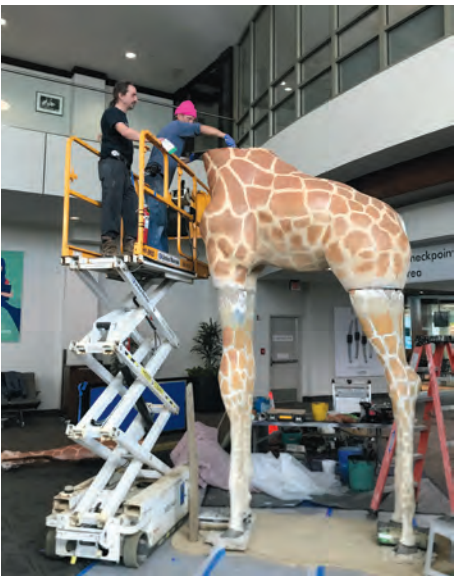
You just never know what your neighbors are really up to.

For instance, Steven Dorand’s Destrehan neighbors could have never guessed that the sanding going on in his Ashland Drive yard would be part of - a life-size giraffe statue.

“The 3D concept was developed in Destrehan ... and parts were created in shops throughout New Orleans,” he said. “The 3D head was assembled in Destrehan. One of the items was re-used fence boards that Ida took down. I sanded them down in the front yard and distressed them to look like an old sign board you would see on an overseas trip. I am sure my neighbors thought I was sanding the boards to fix my fence from the hurricane. You just never know when your neighbor is building exhibits for a themed experience.”

Dorand owns Dorand Design Studios. He and the project’s lead artist Robin Durand were two key players in the recent unveiling of the 18-foot giraffe statue that is now featured at the Baton Rouge Airport.

The sculpture is of Rowan, the zoo’s giraffe. Officials with the airport and the zoo gathered earlier this month to officially unveil the statue, which was sponsored by the Baton Rouge Zoo Foundation. The idea behind the artwork is to attract visitors to the zoo and

draw attention to efforts to protect the critically endangered species, zoo director Jim Fleshman said.

Dorand said the enormous sculpture is made of high-density foam coated with epoxy. It was brought in in five pieces and had to be assembled inside the airport’s atrium because of its size – a process that took 12 hours. The sculpture is anatomically accurate to an adult giraffe, something Dorand achieved by taking photos of Rowan. Signage around the sculpture states conservation facts about giraffes and a signpost made from Dorand’s fence.

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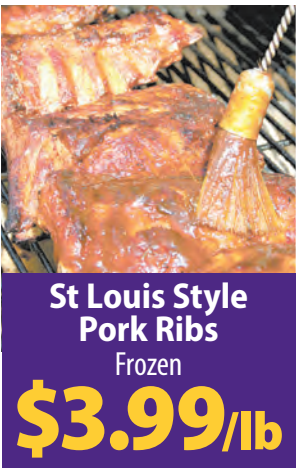

Street light repairs to be discussed at the April 4 Council meeting

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An Entergy representative will be on hand at the April 4 St. Charles Parish Council meeting to discuss ongoing street light repairs, parish communications director Samantha de Castro said.

According to de Castro, St. Charles Parish workers assessed metal light pole damages and Entergy assessed their wooden light pole damages immediately following Hurricane Ida in August.

“St. Charles Parish has worked with a contractor to repair 700 metal poles that were damaged throughout the parish and are working to finish a remaining 110 that require underground work,” she said. “Entergy established that 3,339 of their poles were damaged after the storm ... that accounts

for almost half of the poles they have in St. Charles Parish. Of that, 2,043 lights were damaged. As of March 18, 2022 30 percent of their light repairs have been complete.”

The remaining needed Entergy repairs – on over 1,400 poles – have drawn the ire of local residents who say they are ready for their streets to be illuminated.

The 6 p.m. meeting is open to the public and will be held in the Council Chambers, located on the second floor of the St. Charles Parish Courthouse, 15045 River Road in Hahnville. The meeting can be viewed live on SCP-TV, and council meetings are also live streamed on the parish’s Facebook and YouTube accounts.

Schools insist \$35 million bond will not raise taxes

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The St. Charles Parish Public Schools School Board is seeking authorization from local voters to issue new bonds not to exceed \$35 million for important capital improvement projects.

The special election will be held on April 30.

If approved, the new bonds will be serviced by existing 1.2 mills of the total 5.01 debt service millage, with no increase in taxes. Currently, 1.2 mills amounts to approximately \$1.39 a month for a home valued at \$200,000 and \$1.83 a month for a home valued at \$250,000.

Literature produced by the school district insists that taxes will not increase if the bond issue is passed, and that the school system intends to continue to levy the same debt service millage upon the issuance of the new bonds.

Per law, the funds would only be able to be used for capital improvement projects. Additionally, any funds that are in the Sinking Funds (funds received from bond issue millages) can only be used to repay bonded debt.

“It is possible that the millage rate could be reduced in coming years if the voters do not approve

the issuance of additional bonds,” school district literature states. “However, the school system has historically taken advantage of the redemption of outstanding bonds to continue to upgrade student facilities without a tax increase.”

Many local residents have expressed their disapproval for the ballot item.

“St. Charles Parish has become increasingly expensive for the retired and people on fixed incomes,” Darren Gaubert, who lives in the Des Allemands area, said. “I plan on moving by the time I turn 62. I’m against these off-year elections. This has been going on every time the parish tries to enact new spending. We are taxed enough already.”

Hahnville resident Rick Whitney agrees.

“I believe that it is unethical to exploit the system by internally lobbying their employee base while paying taxpayers funds - \$64,000 - for a special election that they know good and well will have a very low turnout,” he said. “Essentially they are manipulating the system to the taxpayers

checkups would be moved back to once every two years and he'd be considered, for all intents and purposes, officially a kidney disease survivor. The ultrasound was clean, and a massive weight off of he and his family.

"He had been having some aches and pains (before the visit) and I was afraid it was going to start all over again. They said it was a little swollen around the area but nothing to be concerned about," Bellow said. "Prayers work. All I'll say is prayers work ... the power of a prayer is more powerful than anything."

Bellow is just now starting to be able to reflect and enjoy her family's new reality – and health, as Jaxon was not the only child in the family who suffered a major health crisis. Last year, Bellow's daughter Madison had to be rushed to the hospital as well due to chest pains – she needed heart surgery.

"We were shocked ... like, he came out good, but now this is happening and you think, 'we can't catch a break,'" Bellow said.

Had Madison not been brought in for medical attention when she was, Bellow said she would have been lost. But the surgery was successful.

"Now, I have a perfectly healthy baby girl and baby boy," Bellow said.

In 2017, Jaxon went through surgery called pyeloplasty, which repairs the most common type of blockage that causes hydronephrosis. Bellow called that the scariest day of her life.

"I didn't know if I would be able to

hold my baby again alive," Bellow said.

That eliminated his hydroephrosis and would allow his other kidney disease to correct itself. In 2019, it was confirmed that his kidney was reducing to a normal size.

The situation still caused disruptions to his everyday life, however. Since birth, Jaxon has had pressure in his bladder — the comparison Bellow noted is he felt the equivalent of someone holding their

urine for too long and constantly feeling like it must be relieved, but being unable to do so.

Hydronephrosis causes fluid buildup in the kidney due to backed up urine, while vesicoureteral reflux means there is a backward flow of urine from the bladder

to the kidney.

"He had pressure on his kidney since the day he was born, the pressure we feel when we hold our urine for too long. It caused him to not know," Bellow said.

But Jaxon's doctors informed the family that pressure was no longer there, and they were able to potty train him.

And with this most recent news, he's been able to stop taking all kidney-related medication.

She calls him "a trooper" for what he's endured.

"He's earned that nickname," she said.

"He has been through so much in such his little time here on earth, all with a smile on his face and courage and strength in his heart. I'm so proud of him."

She also said she has much gratitude for her community and support system.

"I mainly asked for prayers, because God can change anything in a second," she said. "I asked everyone to pray and heal my son. And that's what we got. We got calls, prayers, thoughts and kind words."

Michael, 18, was diagnosed with autism as a young child. He was non-verbal until he was approximately five, but has come so far since then – he now does public speaking and advocates for people with intellectual disabilities. He is set to graduate from Destrehan High School this year and is set to become a freshman in college this fall, with an early eye on Nicholls State University.

He began swimming with the local chapter of the Special Olympics program at the age of six, and by eight he was competing.

“It’s a natural sport to him – he loves the feel of water,” Connie said. “He says he feels free in the water, and he just goes. He swims, and swims and swims. It’s the best exercise for him, and he loves it.

“So many people think, ‘Well, he’s autistic, he can’t do this or that.’ And he goes out there and just performs. He does all kinds of stuff. He amazes us on how far he’s come and continues to in how far he’s going and going to go.”

Michael was a four-year member of the Destrehan High swimming team as well.

When it came to being selected for the USA team, he was overjoyed.

“He was so excited,” said Connie. “When he saw he was picked, he was cheering ... he was pumped up.”

Legendre, 27, won’t be in the pool, but on the basketball court, and he’s pretty elated as well.

“They went through and announced all the athletes ... we were waiting, knew it was alphabetical so I was kind of on

watch for it when it came up ... and his picture popped up and he was beaming from ear to ear. It was an emotional time. I’m so proud of him,” said his mother, Renee.

Legendre is diagnosed with a mild intellectual disability, but hasn’t let that or anything else stop him. A Destrehan High alumnus, he loves his alma mater and has returned to volunteer with the football and softball teams at the school. He was accepted into the LIFE Program at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette and worked as an equipment manager with the school’s football team.

He’s a well-rounded athlete, having competed in track and field, bocce and swimming as well as basketball.

“He’s really athletic and he likes to get out there. He’s really very perfectionist,” Renee said. “He’s just got that competitive gene within him. When we moved back to Luling, he wanted to join the bocce team. He’d never done that before and he watched some YouTubes on how to do it. He picked it up and became a bullseye. He competed at the state event and won a gold medal. Anything sports related, Oneil loves.”

He was originally chosen for the team in 2020, but COVID-19 prevented that from ever being realized.

“The coaches back in Lafayette remembered him and that he was going to be on the team,” Renee said. “And they chose him this time, again.”

Both athletes will also have the chance to qualify for the World Games in Berlin, Germany, in their respective sport.

qualified as a contestant for the ABC show’s 20th season.

Those who earn the nod receive the show’s coveted Golden Ticket – which Gullage pulled out and displayed to the wildly cheering Mariano’s crowd during a watch-along party to celebrate his national television debut. Gullage also performed prior to the show’s start.

He said the outpouring of support brought him incredible joy.

“There’s a lot of love ... the love was just exploding around me,” said Gullage. “I almost cried – I stopped myself, and had to even say it out loud. ‘Kevin, you’re not gonna cry.’ The love and emotion I felt from all these people, it’s something that’s kept me going, and getting that all at once is a little overwhelming.

“I’m seeing people here from every part of my life, from the very beginning to right now. I know it feels really good, feels really big in my heart.”

He said seeing himself on television, meanwhile, was surreal. Being so in the moment during his performance, he didn’t get to take in how the judges were reacting to him – it was clear from the show footage that the three took very well to Gullage’s talent and charisma.

“For a lot of my audition, my eyes were closed. I didn’t see how they reacted ... a smile goes a long way. Trusting what to do, trusting what people see about you ... you just decide to be yourself,” he said.

As for Sunday night’s watch party,

the waiting was the most stressful part for him.

“I don’t know when it’s going to happen,” he said prior to his appearance. “It’s really nerve wracking.”

A singer and pianist, Gullage is following in the musical footsteps of his father, Tony, a renowned bassist who has performed all over the world and spent six years as musical director for television and movie star Tyler Perry.

But on Sunday night, he was simply an exceptionally proud father.

“He’s an old soul,” said Tony. “A lot of young people, kids around his age, you see them get coverage and see a lot of negative things. Kevin’s talented, but he’s a good person. And I’m not just saying that because I’m his dad. I’m so proud of him.”

He was with his son out on the West Coast for the audition, but wasn’t able to go into the studio room to watch it live. This was his first chance to see it.

“I take it all in stride, and I’m just watching him taking it all in himself ... he loves what he does. He loves to touch people. You can see it now,” Tony said.

The watch party venue was a fitting one. Kevin said Mariano’s was the first to give him a consistent platform.

“Mariano’s is the first place to just let me play and work hard to become a better musician,” he said. “I played here from the age of 12 to 19, learning new songs and how to interact with people ... there’s no better place to do it.”

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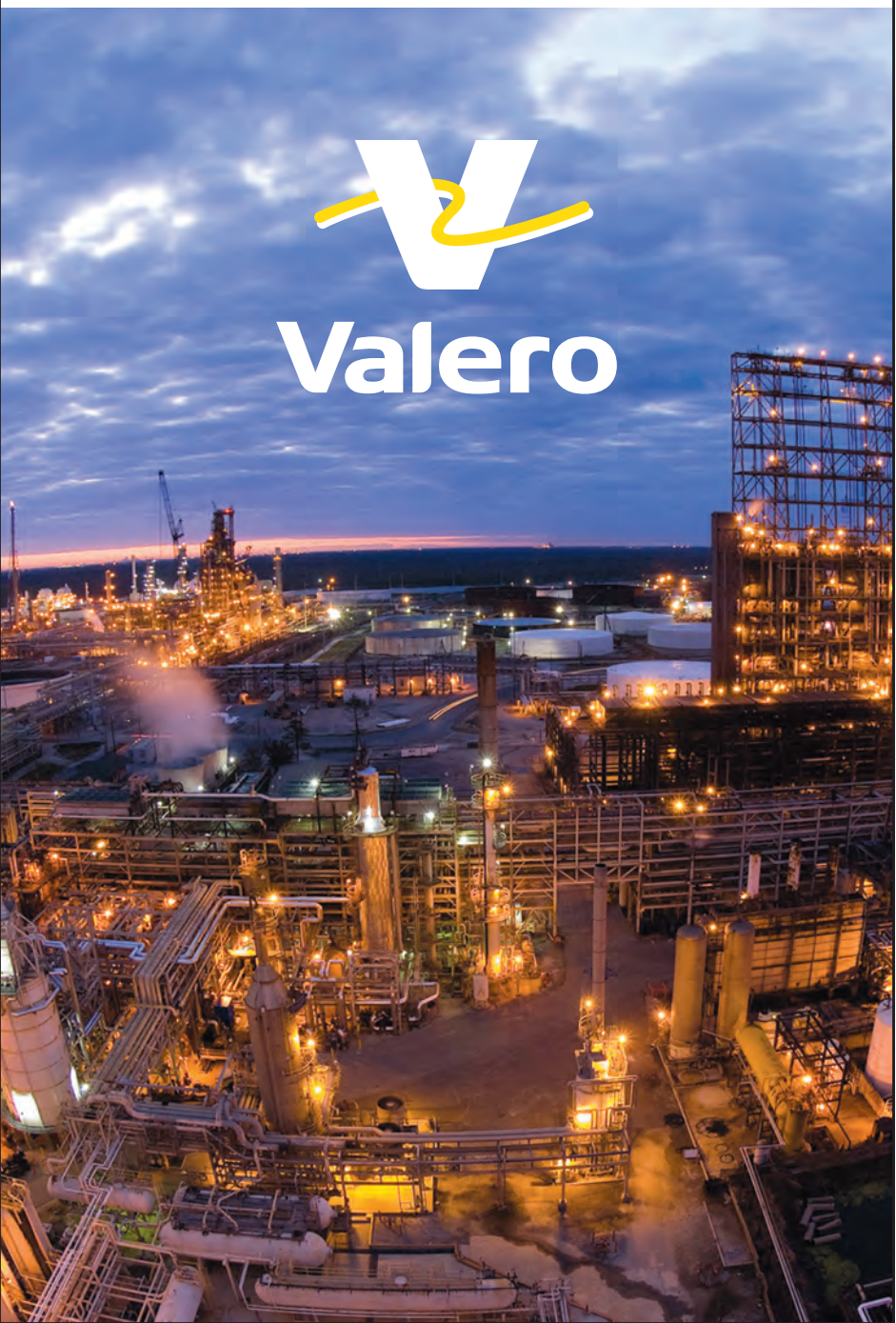

certificate. The item taught them that he was a farmer, as it was listed on the certificate as his occupation.

“I also found some small personal notebooks with ledger entries,” she said.

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detriment, at the taxpayer’s expense. Also, this is not a renewal of an old tax. The prior debt has been paid. This is new tax. I’m tired of their word craft.”

Funds created by the passage of the bond issue would be funneled into three areas: career and technical education renovations and additions, renovations and additions at numerous district centers and schools and technology.

“Preparing our students for the future, expanding opportunities, modernizing facilities and upgrading technology allows for our students to receive a well-rounded education in the latest and greatest learning environment,” Superintendent Dr. Ken Oertling said. “We must continue to look for ways to ensure our students are prepared for an ever-changing work force and world. Together, we can make a lasting impact on students for years to come.”

Proposed work that falls under career and technical education additions and renovations – which carries a \$16,616,000 price tag – encompasses work at Destrehan High, Hahnville High and the Satellite Center.

For DHS, it would include renovation of the existing career and technical education area to modernize and improve functionality and an addition of a covered outdoor workspace adjacent to the career and technical education area. At HHS, it would include renovation of the existing career and technical education area to modernize and improve functionality and construction of a new classroom building addition for the career and technical education area.

Renovation of the applied science wing to modernize and improve functionality and construction of a new classroom building addition would be on tap for the Satellite Center.

Ringed in at \$13,134,000 are proposed renovations and additions at all middle schools, high schools, East Bank Head Start and Luling Elementary. Albert Cammon Middle, Harry Hurst Middle, J.B. Martin Middle and R.K. Smith Middle Schools would see renovation and conversion of existing computer labs to STEAM labs, and Destrehan and Hahnville High Schools would see renovation and conversion of libraries to flexible, digital media spaces.

Included in the price tag would also be the renovation of science labs at Destrehan High School, and construction of a new building addition to include classrooms and office space at the East Bank Head Start Center.

Reconfiguration to allow for parking, a bus circle and a drop-off canopy and renovation of building J including new paint, light fixtures, flooring, ceiling work, technology and furnishings would also happen at East Bank Head Start.

At Harry Hurst and J.B. Martin Middle Schools there would be an addition of an elevator to building A at J.B. Martin Middle School and a replacement of existing building B elevator at Harry Hurst Middle School.

Luling Elementary School would see renovations of buildings B, C and D including new paint, light fixtures, flooring, ceiling work, technology, furnishings and restrooms. R.K. Smith Middle School

would see expansion of the main building to construct additional classrooms including new paint, light fixtures, flooring, ceiling work, technology and furnishings.

Carrying a \$5,250,000 price tag is the technology component of the bond proposal. It includes an upgrade to the technology network infrastructure and a plan to equip classrooms with up-to-date, interactive large screen devices. Installation of additional security cameras and an upgrade to existing cameras is also in the proposal.

The last school district bond issue passage was in 2015. It rang in at \$42,000,000 and included safety and security upgrades, building renovations and construction of the Lafon Performing Arts Center.

March 30 is the deadline to register in person or by mail for the vote, and April 9 is the deadline to register online.

The deadline to request an absentee ballot from the Registrar of Voters is April 26, and April 29 is the deadline for the Registrar to receive absentee ballots.

Early voting will be held April 16-23 from 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Registrar of Voters Office, located at the Westbank Courthouse and at the Arterbury Building, located at 14564 River Road in New Sarpy.



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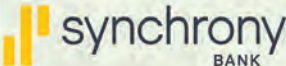


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Wildcats best Jesuit in clutch

Destrehan head baseball coach Chris Mire says that Saturdays might just be the Wildcats' day – his team has found a lot of success on the last day of the week.

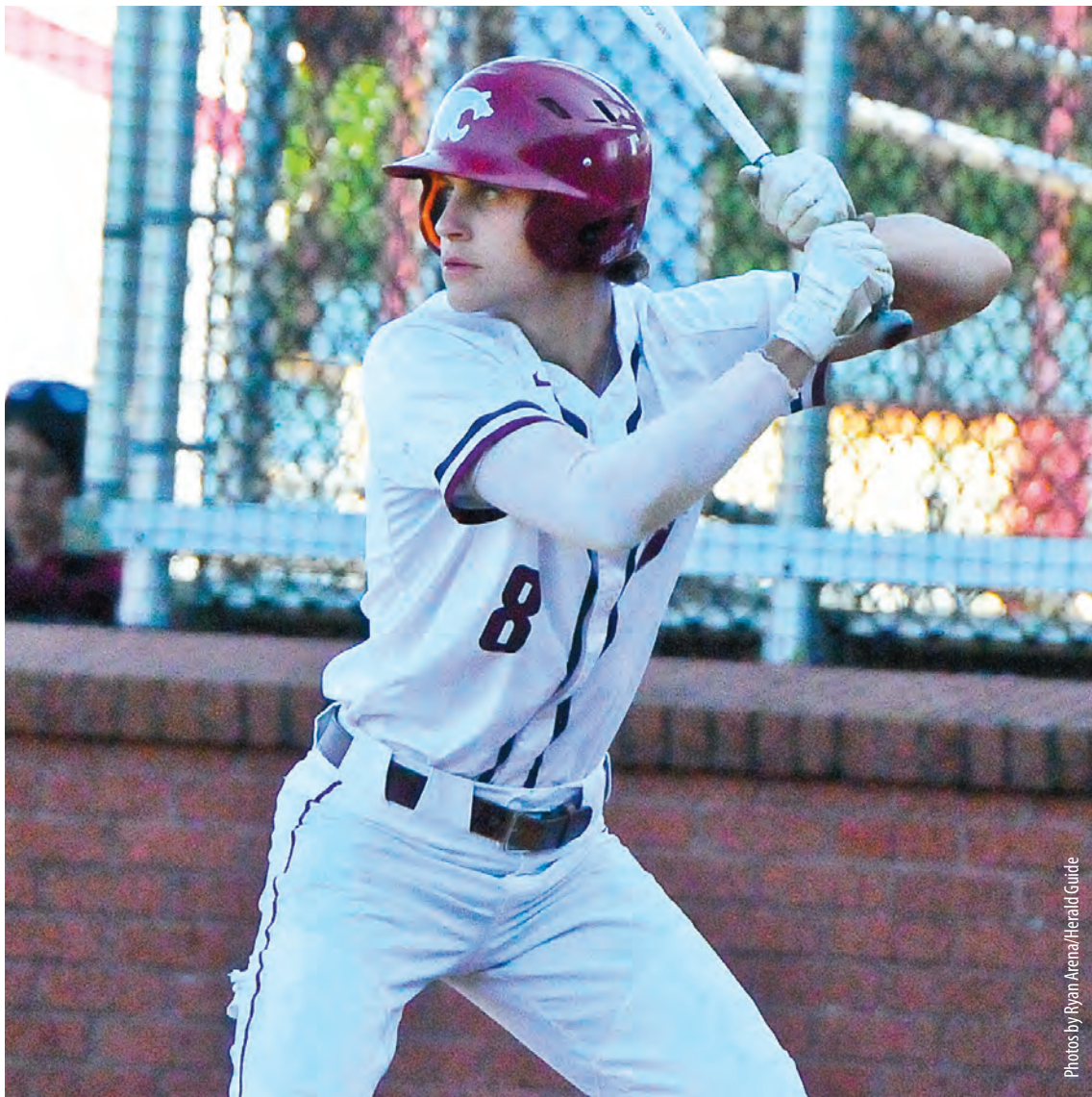
Last Saturday, this was the case again – and certainly the case for the day's hero, John Carmichael.

Carmichael delivered the eventual game-winning hit and nailed down the save in a 9-8 victory over Jesuit, then later in the same day delivered a complete-game, one-run performance in a 3-1 Destrehan win over Holy Cross.

The wins spurred Destrehan to 8-7 this season and washed away the bad taste of a mini-slump for the Wildcats, who had lost four of their previous five games. With Destrehan beginning District 7-5A play this week, it was a welcome shift in momentum.

"It was a big confidence builder for us," said Mire. "We've had a tough stretch of games and weren't playing our best ball. This was a reminder that we can be pretty good when we play the right way."

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Jefferson returns home, dedicates fitness equipment donation

Parquet Park receives several upgrades in the form of brand new exercise equipment

Pro Football Hall of Famer Ed Reed established Parquet Park in his hometown of St. Rose not that long ago – and a fellow pro football star and St. Rose native just delivered an upgrade to the site.

On Monday morning, Destrehan High alum and Minnesota Vikings wide receiver Justin Jefferson returned home and dedicated brand-new fitness equipment for the park and the St. Rose community enjoying its amenities. The equipment gift was secured through KOMPAN Sport and Fitness, as well as through Jefferson’s partnership with Optimum Nutrition.

Through that partnership, Jefferson and Optimum seek to improve access to fitness in underserved communities. The donation is

intended to help establish a permanent public fitness resource for his home community. The equipment includes a variety of cardio and strength training equipment, such as

suspension trainers, magnetic balls, sport bikes, cross trainers, pull-up stations and more. Parquet Park officially opened last July. It was the vision of Reed to establish a playground for

the community’s youth aimed at providing children access to safe facilities, positive programs and mentors, while serving as a symbol of hope and healthy choices. The playground is near the streets of Turtle Creek and Preston Hollow where Reed spent his childhood, at 190 Short Street. It was named for Benjamin Parquet, who mentored Reed as well as many other young people in the community over the years. Jefferson has made a habit of promoting healthy habits locally. Last summer, Jefferson returned to St. Rose and hosted a workout event for area children with Optimum Nutrition. “We’re talking about nutrition and how it works toward better lives. I’m trying to give

back to our community and supporting getting fit,” Jefferson said prior to that workout.

It wasn’t that long ago that Jefferson was a relatively unheralded collegiate football prospect following a strong career at Destrehan – but he now stands as one of the most recognizable athletes in the NFL.

After arriving at LSU without much fanfare relative to other prospects, Jefferson quickly established himself as one of the Tigers’ top wide receivers. As a junior in 2019, he posted arguably the best statistical receiving season in school history, posting 18 touchdowns and 1,540 yards on 111 receptions – including a 14 catch, 227-yard, four touchdown day in the National Semifinals against Oklahoma. That

all helped lead LSU to immortality via an unbeaten season and National Championship. By the end of his first season with the Vikings, Jefferson set the NFL record for the most receiving yards by a rookie in NFL history, his 1,400 yards eclipsing the mark set nearly 20 years ago by Arizona’s Anquan Boldin in 2003. He caught 88 passes and scored seven times. Though that rookie record was broken one season later by his former college teammate, Ja’Marr Chase of the Cincinnati Bengals, Jefferson would have no sophomore slump, improving across the board. He caught 108 passes for 1,616 yards and 10 touchdowns in 2021.

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Tigers score win over Holy Cross

Hahnville has endured growing pains thus far in the 2022 season as a young team of largely first-time starters learns how to finish games. But on Saturday, the Tigers did just that – and in fact did so behind a pitcher making his first career varsity start.

Junior Kohl Ducote hurled a complete game shutout to key Hahnville’s 5-0 victory over Holy Cross on Saturday. Ducote allowed four hits and one walk while striking out four.

“He really threw the ball well,” said Hahnville head coach David Baudry. “He’s worked very hard and he’s pitched well all year. We’ve used him in relief a couple of times, and I decided to give him the start Saturday ... he threw it extremely well, threw a bunch of strikes and really limited their opportunities.”

The game was scoreless until the fourth inning, when Hahnville scored the first of its five runs. HHS added two in each of the fifth and sixth innings.

Talan Theriot went 1-for-3 with two RBIs. Jake Risinger and Kason Alexander each had two hits on the day, while Risinger, Collin Galland and Chase Morales each drove in a run.

It was Galland that got Hahnville going with a two-out RBI single in the bottom of the fourth inning.

Theriot’s line drive single to right field pushed that lead from one run to three, plating two more. A Risinger RBI single

and Morales sacrifice fly rounded out the HHS scoring.

The win snapped a six-game losing streak for Hahnville, which now stands at 6-13 entering District 7-5A play this week. The bulk of those 13 losses have come in close games, and several have seen Hahnville jump ahead before falling.

Baudry said that will improve as his players gain experience – Hahnville brought back just four regular starters this season, including last season’s District 7-5A Pitcher of the Year in Landon Cortez. At times, the team has leaned on up to five sophomore starters.

“We’ve had leads, but we haven’t been winning, haven’t been closing games,” said Baudry. “We have a lot of young guys, a lot of underclassmen ... I think with the exception of a few tournament games where we’ve been short on pitching, we’ve been playing well. We haven’t had consistency.”

That said, were Hahnville to make a late season run after a slow start, it would not be a new endeavor for the program. For all the learning on the job the Tigers have had to do in terms of finishing off wins this season, Hahnville has had a knack for closing speed in the late stages of its season the past few years.

Could this Hahnville team make a similar late season run?

“Absolutely,” Baudry said. “Absolutely.

If you look at the way the season has gone so far, we’ve played 20 games in four weeks. Now we have 14 more over the next four weeks. So, you have time in between games to practice, to help guys iron things out, and it allows your pitching staff to take a breath.”

Baudry said the top of the order has been steady all season, with returning starters Morales, Aidan Machado and Theriot delivering in the top three spots.

On the mound, Brady Babin is among those who have stepped up along with Cortez.

“He’s a crafty left-hander, and he’s given us an absolute chance to win every time out,” said Baudry. “He’s throwing strikes and keeping the ball down in the zone. He’s been very tough on hitters all year.”

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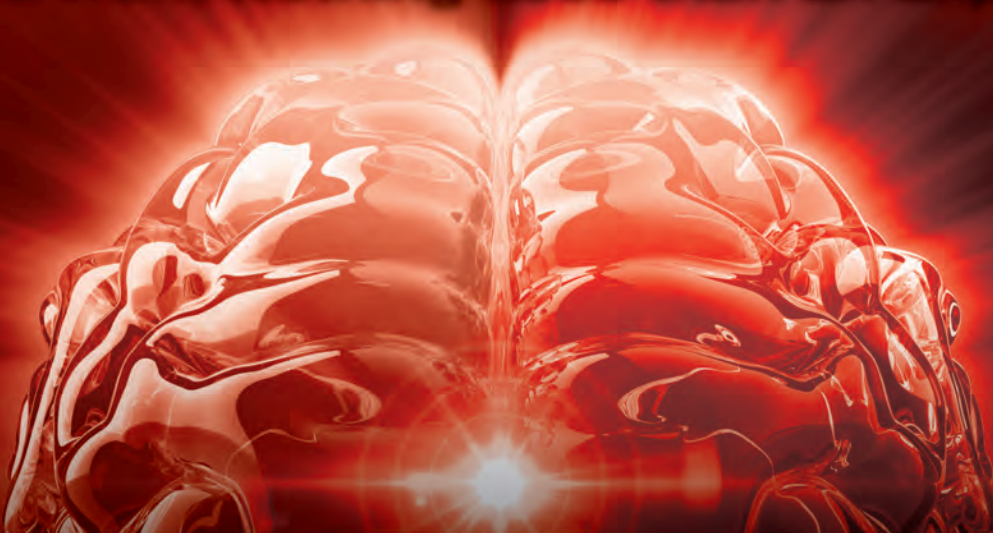

Johnson-Cain said she hopes the event also drives home the importance of keeping animals healthy through vaccinations.

“There’s a huge need in the community for people to spay and neuter their animals. There are more animals than there are homes ... thousands of healthy puppies are getting euthanized,” she said. “These animals end up in this situation not due to any fault of their own.

They have been failed by humans. We have to do better and be more responsible pet owners by spay and neutering and vaccinating our pets.”

“During the COVID shut down people were adopting puppies and kittens in mass quantities to keep them company while they were stuck home and now that things are starting to open up
