Tracy Bishop Naquin met Gore nine years ago when she began teaching at R.K. Smith.

"In August I know she had some concerns about some physical things, but then the hurricane came and she dealt with all of those stressors," Naquin said of Gore. "When we came back to work in October we had noticed ... and she had noticed ... some things she was unable to do mobility wise. She had started noticing a loss in the strength in her hands and her speech was impaired."

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Rare display of bees at work at Bayou Gauche home

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The statement seemed innocuous at first to Linda Rhodes of Bayou Gauche. “You know, you have bees,’ they told me,” Rhodes said. “They saw them flying around outside. We’d never really paid attention to it.” But the bees hovering around Rhodes’ garage window were seemingly growing in number – and there was a reason for that. The shutters for the window were obscuring what those insects had been up to: they had built a massive hive and honeycomb between the shutter and window. While a beekeeper is set to take and displace the bees elsewhere this month, Rhodes actually wasn’t and isn’t fearful of the swarm. In fact, inside her garage, one is able to watch the countless bees tirelessly working behind the glass, and she finds it fascinating. “They’re usually in boxes ... you never

really get to see that,” she said. “We were shocked and excited to see it. We really didn’t know what to do at the time ... they’re pretty amazing to watch. And oh my gosh, they work all the time. You go in any time of the day and they’re working in there, working on the hive, making the honey. I’m excited about them.” The bees would not have had to work in secret for long to establish their honeycomb. The honeycomb structure comprises of a series of hexagonal cells created from beeswax usually containing raw honey. It can take about seven days to two months for bees to make their honeycomb. In about seven days from the early build up and moving in, honeybees can add from one to three pounds of honeycomb inside the structure. Indeed, Rhodes’ window serves as a display of sorts to this effort – think an ant farm, but for bees in terms of the visual.

She’s learned a bit more about her new flying friends since first discovering them. When it gets cold, they all tighten up in formation. At one point, the hive got so big it began to push the shutter outward a bit. Another time, the bees seemed to be leaving the nest, though it wasn’t for good. “The queen took them off somewhere. Apparently, they needed something from the outside to keep building that hive. It’s been pretty amazing to watch,” Rhodes said. “They’re driven. They’re busy bees, without a doubt.” They also aren’t wasteful with what they make. “I thought they’d eat

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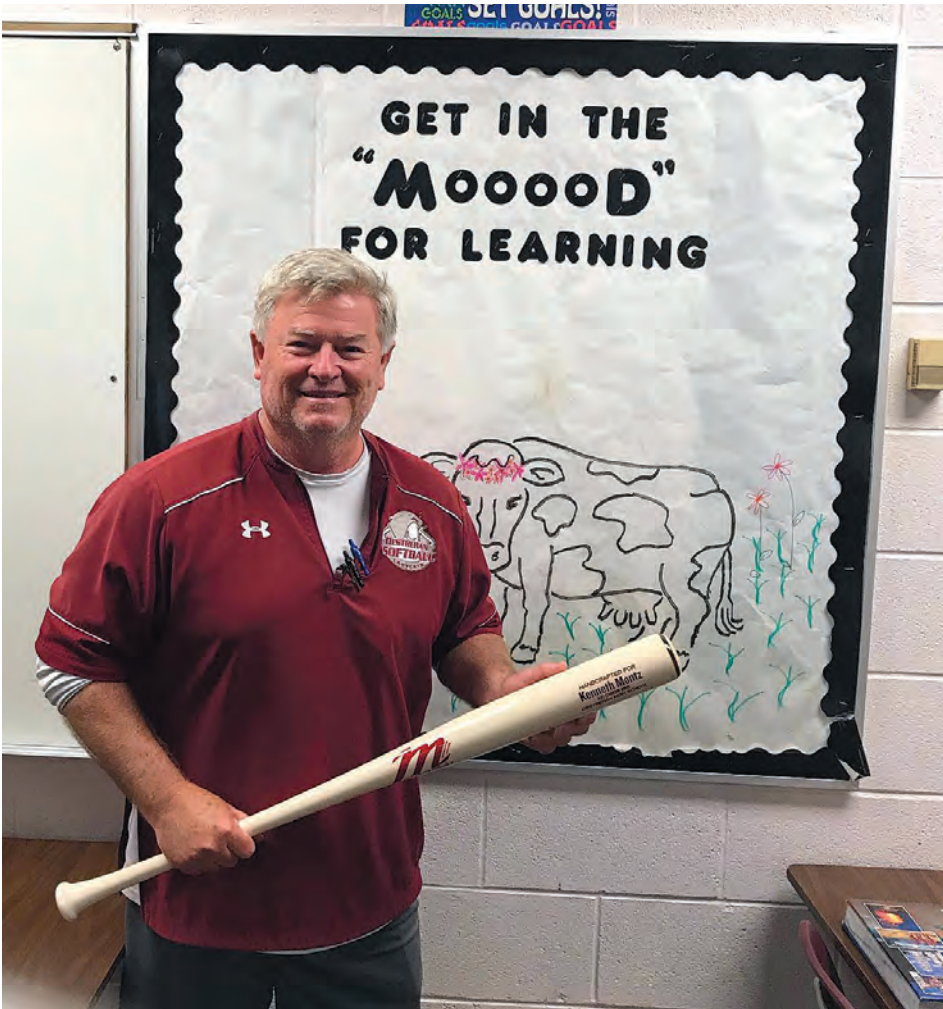

DHS on hiring trail for three major girls’ sports

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The past few years have several unique scenarios unfold in St. Charles Parish public school athletics, with one more emerging now at Destrehan High School – simultaneous vacancies in three of the major girls sports must be filled before next school year.

The school recently advertised openings for their girls basketball, softball and volleyball programs following the announced departures of head basketball coach Jenn Miller and head volleyball coach Edward Borgstede and the impending retirement of head softball coach Kenneth Montz.

Borgstede announced after last volleyball season he would be stepping down from his position, following a five-year run leading the program. Borgstede’s Wildcats went 16-11 in his final season with the program, one played in the shadow of Hurricane Ida. It followed up

on a strong 2020 campaign, one that saw the team go 21-7 and earn a first-round playoff victory at home over Terrebonne.

Miller led the Wildcats for the past two years as head basketball coach. Rogers said her departure comes as she and her family are moving out of the area. The Ladycats went 9-13 in 2021-22 under the former Florida State Seminoles player.

Montz has announced he will be retiring after 30-plus years as a coach and educator after this school year. He is in the midst of his final season with the Ladycats, after taking the helm of the softball program in 2010. He has led the program to more than 200 wins, a milestone he crossed this season.

Kade Rogers, St. Charles Parish Public Schools Athletic Director, said the task of replacing all three is a different kind of

Mimosa Park students enjoy ‘Final Four’ spoils

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The second graders at Mimosa Park Elementary screamed in excitement as their hard work was recognized and rewarded in a way that’s been scarce over the past two years.

The students got to eat pizza, listen to music and shoot baskets at an after-school celebration of a very special accomplishment: they qualified for the “Final Four” in the New Orleans area in the “Read to the Final Four” literary challenge competition.

In anticipation of the 2022 Men’s Final Four, second and third graders from elementary schools across Greater New Orleans have been logging their reading time, with weekly winners having been announced since January. The top schools were announced following the reveal of the March Madness bracket, with the Top 68 schools, the Top 64 schools, the Top 32 schools and so forth moving on to the next round until the Final Four schools were identified as the reading champions.

During each week of the competition, the top schools are awarded prizes and books. At the conclusion of the challenge, the Final Four schools are awarded a trophy and a monetary donation to their school for books, and each student receives a gift bag – rewards the eager readers at Mimosa Park locked down.

Local college basketball players from UNO and Tulane – including former Destrehan and Baylor star and current member of the Green Wave Moon Ursin – were on hand to

celebrate and play a little ball with the students.

“It’s just a little celebration to say thank you for all you’ve done,” said Mimosa Park Principal Angi Butler, gesturing toward the students. “Our teachers made a big impact, encouraging them to read and reminding them of when the due date is. Mrs. (Natalie) Campo was a huge factor in ensuring our kids had the opportunity to get their books in and their reading done ... it was a lot of fun, a lot of rah rah, and I’m so proud of all of these students.”

Of course, this was an event Butler could appreciate on several levels. The former Destrehan High School girls basketball coach – with Ursin leading the way on the floor -guided the Wildcats to the only state basketball championship in the program’s history, capping an undefeated season.

The event re-ignited that competitive side of her.

“Can’t take an L. I was their biggest cheerleader,” Butler said. “We paraded them through my office, showed them my basketball stuff. You want to show them the correlation between the two, putting the academics into the athletics, and what goes into reading and becoming academically solid so you can play sports.”

Seeing the students all together and celebrating freely was also a reward for Butler and the school faculty.

“These are our COVID babies ... they

An ALS diagnosis came after months of multiple rounds of testing, and Gore received a phone call with the diagnosis while she was at work.

“I had just walked my class out of my room and I was in the hallway and a co-worker said, ‘You need to go to Malissa’s room right away,’” Naquin remembers. “She was in there with some coworkers, and that’s when she broke the news to me about what her diagnosis was. We sat there and hugged and cried.”

Naquin said technology has made it possible for Gore to still teach even as her mobility and speech ability continue to decline.

"She's still teaching ... she's still in the classroom," Naquin said. "She is still moving around and she's doing her absolute best to function the best that sh

Gore has told her 8th grade students about the disease and the declines that could happen over time.

“She really wanted them to understand why she’s dealing with the limitations that she’s dealing with, because there are some things the students have been able to see progressively over the course of the school year,” Naquin said. “They’re old enough to understand and comprehend it. She didn’t want to hide from them what’s going on.”

Naquin said students at school have eagerly expressed an interest in ways that they can help Gore, and that plans are currently underway for a special student initiative. She added that immediately upon learning about the diagnosis several of teachers and friends got together to plan fundraisers and support for Gore.

"We were ready to hit the ground running," Naquin said.

Withing the first week the friends

organized a Super Bowl football pool. The pool ended up selling out the first day and two others were created. Naquin said bracelets and shirts have also been created, all with the intention of showing Gore she is loved and supported.

"We also know there's going to be a point in time she'll need help with get-

ting food and meals, so we're organizing gift card donations" Naquin said. "We have several businesses in the community who are ready to support that."

As more community members and former students have learned of Gore's diagnosis, they have organized raffles and fundraisers in her honor. At the end of the month Gore will be one of the recipients of proceeds collected from the Dat Dads' Club golf tournament.

“She is over appreciative,” Naquin said of Gore. “We’ve always been friends ... since the day I started working here. Over time we’ve really grown just to be really close. I told her the day that she was diagnosed, ‘This is tough and this is hard, but you will never be a burden. You are being burdened, and there is a huge difference.’ There’s no task too small and no task too big for us to do for her ... she’s overwhelmed I think at this time with the amount of support that she’s gotten.”

"She just wanted to live," Dufrene said of Growl. "She truly made everyone feel so special ... she was so amazing."

Growl passed away in February after an eight-year cancer battle, and since then Dufrene has been busy raising money for Growl's two children, Grace and Gavin.

First there was a March 26 memorial blood drive in Growl's name.

"She saved 159 patients ... it was amazing," Dufrene said of the drive, adding that each blood donor counted as a \$15 credit to the bill of Growl's final hospital stay.

The next event Dufrene is organizing with Growl in mind is the final race of the school year for Luling Elementary School's Running Club. The club is something that Dufrene and Growl worked on together during their years of teaching at LES.

“We started the running club to help students experience something new ... something healthy,” Dufrene said. “When we started the club at LES, the name Loving Every Second was dropped in my heart. It now takes on a bigger meaning to me. Kellie truly loved every second of being a teacher and a running club mentor to our students. She wanted to be at Luling every day. She wanted to teach ... she wanted to lead ... she loved every second. This last year was torture for her ... all she wanted to do was work. Our last event will be in her honor.”

Dufrene sold 178 shirts ahead of the April 11 race, with nearly \$1,000 of proceeds benefitting Growl's family.

"I'm open to however God wants to use me in the future," Dufrene said. "I know he's going to use me somehow."

all the honey, but there’s still honey left,” Rhodes said.

Though she’s grown fond of her visitors, ultimately she had to make the call to have them removed. That day is coming, though they’ll be able to continue their daily routine elsewhere once that happens, safely for both themselves and others.

“I wanted to get someone local to do it,” Rhodes said. “This (beekeeper) lives near us ... I thought it would be nice to keep them local. I wouldn’t be surprised

if they find their way back one day. For a hurricane or something like that, they’re protected behind that shutter.”

They also largely keep to themselves, Rhodes said, one reason there’s been no real urgency on her part to have them removed until now.

“They’ve never really bothered anyone,” Rhodes said. “They’re starting to come out more now that it’s a little warmer, and fly around outside. They’re busy doing their own little thing though, not worried about anything else.”

challenge.

“It’s truly unique,” Rogers said. “It’s been a very, very strange couple of years in the athletic arena for sure. In each case, you have to make sure you’re hiring the right person for the job and making sure it’s someone who will be impactful both on the field and off the field.”

While the two positions were not open at the same time, Rogers and the school system were tasked with finding new football coaches at Hahnville and Destrehan within a matter of weeks, following the departure of former HHS coach Nick Saltaformaggio to Holy Cross and the retirement of longtime Destrehan coach Stephen Robicheaux. The programs have each maintained success under the subsequent hires, DHS coach Marcus Scott and HHS coach Daniel Luquet.

“We lucked out with two good football coaches, and hopefully we can continue to have success hiring new coaches,” said Rogers.

Rogers said there has been interest conveyed in the openings from both outside the system and in-house. Likewise, the district has been gauging interest through different avenues.

“Whether it’s putting something out on the LHSAA website or different coaching platforms, talking to other coaches as to whether they’d recommend any of their assistants ... we’re

doing our due diligence,” Rogers said.

There is not yet a specific timeline for when each hire will be made, but Rogers noted in each case, the sooner the better.

“You of course want to move as quick as you can, because you have summer leagues, conditioning, things to get ready for the next season all upcoming. With volleyball, obviously that season is next up,” Rogers said. “You want to get someone in place and get them with the girls as soon as possible in each case.”

While he admits three openings at once isn’t ideal, in some ways the timing isn’t so bad to be on the lookout: Destrehan’s gymnasium was just renovated and expanded, making the basketball and volleyball positions attractive prospects. Meanwhile,

prize, and once they saw the finish line, they only worked that much harder.

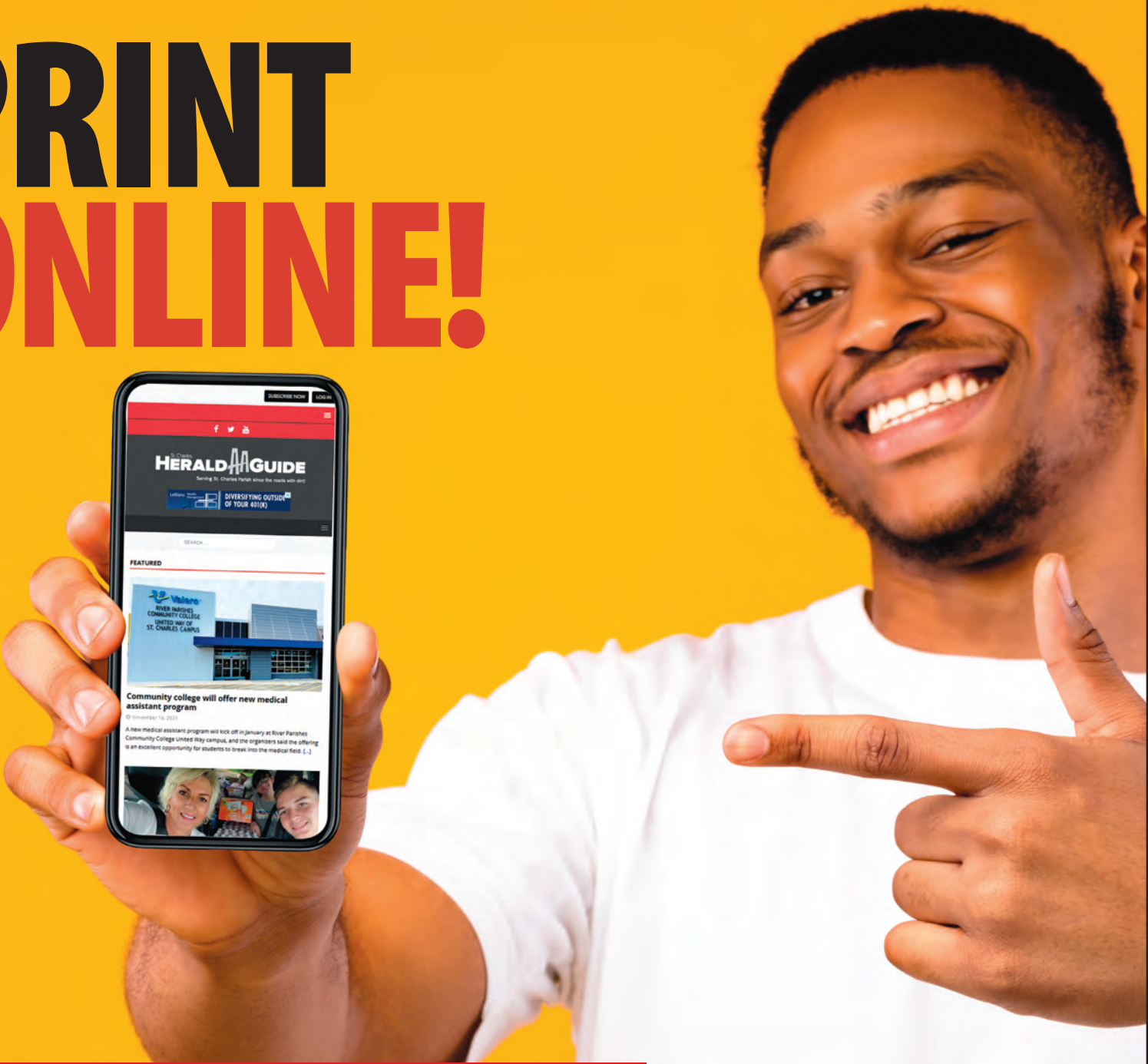
"They were getting more into it, turning in those reading logs ... it's been amazing to see," Campo said.

The win was Hahnville's fourth in a row, and the Tigers are now 11-2 in their last 13 games.

"It's always a fun game to play Mount Carmel," said Hahnville head coach Todd Schulz, who was Nugent's assistant prior to taking the helm of the program prior to this season. "These teams have a rich tradition of playing each other, with Nuge when he was here ... we've got a good relationship going. I told the girls

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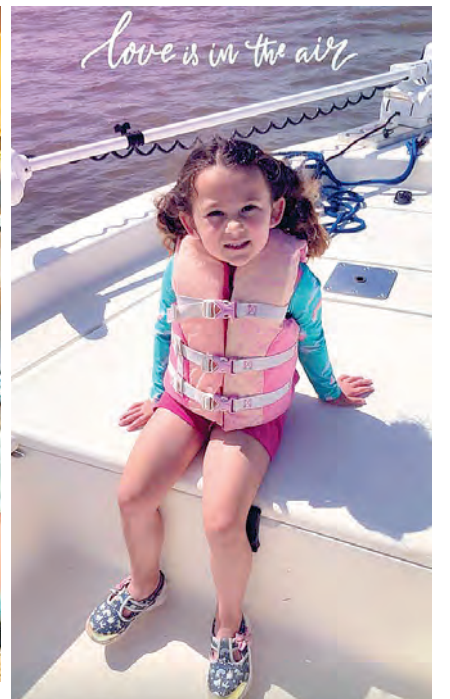

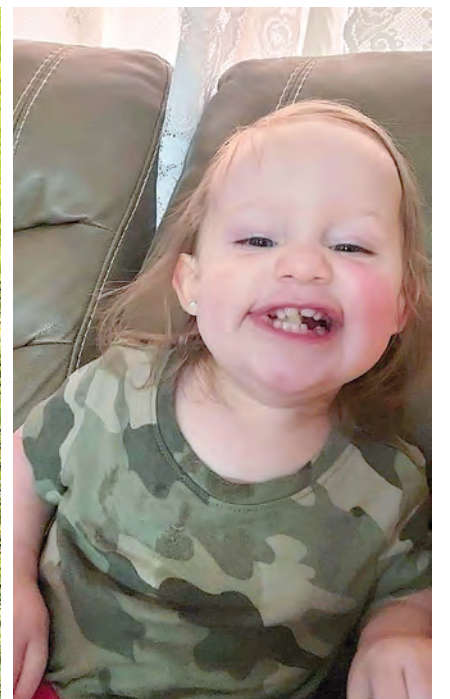

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How Market Cycles Can Impact Retirements

Sequence of returns can play a role in your overall portfolio

A thoughtful retirement strategy may help you pursue your many retirement goals. That strategy must consider many factors, and here are just a few: your income needs, the order of your withdrawals from taxable and tax-advantaged retirement accounts, the income tax implications of those withdrawals, and sequence of return risk.

Just what is the sequence of return risk? In brief, it is the risk that market declines in the early years of retirement, combined with steady withdrawals, could reduce your portfolio's outlook.

A recent CNBC article mentioned how sequence of return risk can affect retirement accounts. It used a 20-year example – someone retiring in 2000 with \$1 million in an account tracking the returns of the S&P 500, making withdrawals of \$40,000 a year that increased 2% annually in view of inflation.

In 2000, a bear market began. The 37% pullback for the S&P 500 that occurred in 2000-02 would have reduced the \$1 million account to about \$470,000 by January 1, 2020, the end of the 20-year period. The balance reflects the annual withdrawals of \$40,000 and the 2009-20 bull market.¹

Now, if the order of yearly returns were flipped, the portfolio would show much different performance. At the end of the

20-year period, the retiree would have had more than \$2.3 million in that account after the exact same schedule of income distributions.¹

The sponsoring agency assumes financial and administrative responsibility and is also responsible for operating the program within federal and state guidelines. The St. Charles Parish Council, through its Department of Community Services, has accepted the responsibility in St. Charles Parish. Plans are being made to use the kitchen facilities at Carver Early Learning Center and Albert Cammon Middle School. The program will operate for the period of June 6, 2022, through July 14, 2022.

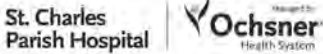
