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National Guardsman's final act one of life-saving heroism

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Harris Dufrene III spoke with a tear in his eye. "I just feel blessed," Dufrene said. "It's a new start on life."

The lifelong St. Charles Parish resident had only weeks before been the recipient of a new kidney, result of a transplant needed for his survival after a five-year struggle with declining health. That alone would be reason enough for the emotion of the moment, but it truly ran much deeper than that.

On April 5, Dakota Morton died at the age of 26. He died as a hero.

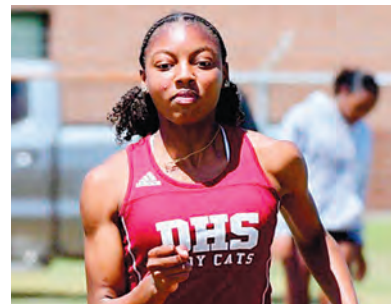
Morton had just wrapped up his time with the U.S. National Guard and had returned home to St. Charles Parish. Among the first things he wanted to

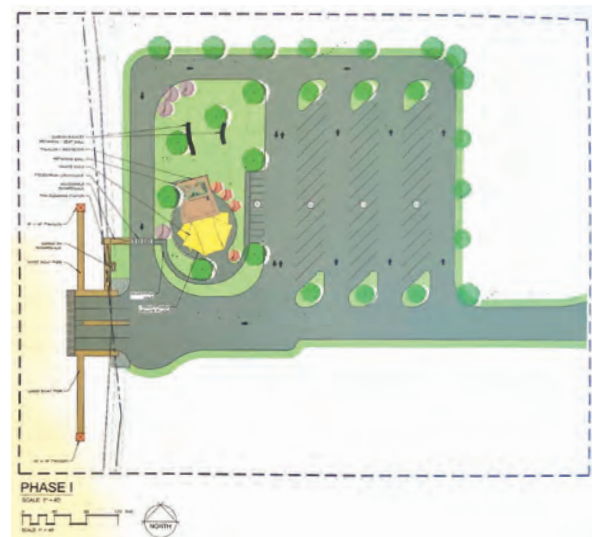
Boat launch details revealed at town hall meeting

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Ama woman hosts autism awareness event, starts support group for parents

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A year ago, Precious Singleton Alexander learned her then 3-year-old son, Rio, has autism.

“I started pulling my boots up, researching, finding out different things that would help me understand it,” Alexander said.

The more she learned, the more she wanted to help others in her situation do the same. Saturday saw her desire to do just that come to fruition, as several families gathered in Luling for an “Autism Acceptance Bubbles and Balloon Bash” where attendees were encouraged to wear any color of the rainbow on the final day of Autism Acceptance Month.

“With my baby and I, me being new to the diagnosis, I asked myself, ‘How can I advocate for my child and children like him?’” said Alexander. “So let me pray on it. Let me manifest, before I make any plans. I gave it to the universe, I gave it to God, and boom, it hit me.”

She determined she would create an event for children, teens and adults on the spectrum to come together in a fun, safe environment, while parents could likewise unite and network with one another.

“It’s something where we can meet each other, talk, vent, share ideas, whatever anyone needs,” Alexander said. “To come together as one. We’re all learning. I’m still learning. This is to raise more awareness, and here we are today.”

The event saw the children able to release balloons into the sky, blow bubbles – and chase them, of course – while playing together.

Singleton said when she learned of Rio’s diagnosis, it didn’t come as a shock.

“At age 2, 2 and a half, I started to see the signs and traits, the characteristics of being on the spectrum,” she said. “I noticed how he was playing with certain toys, not making eye contact ... I did the research, put it all in and what do you

know, they popped up as the symptoms. So, when the diagnosis came back, it wasn’t a surprise.”

But it has been an adjustment. “It’s been quite a ride. And just to know that it’s going to continue until he’s an adult, I’m trying to prepare myself mentally for that long haul,” Alexander said. “It’s been tough, but rewarding. He’s teaching me a lot, teaching me about patience, teaching me to be humble and to have compassion.”

It’s Alexander’s hope that Saturday’s event will blossom into something that can help families going forward on a regular basis.

“I want to start a support group, a whole River Parishes support group,” she said. “I would love for this event to be something we do annually. And for a support group, something where we can all get together certain days and talk ... maybe there’s a resource you know about, but I don’t know about. Things like that ... I don’t want this to end. I want it to keep going, because it’s every day for me, and it’s every day for parents who have children, teens, adults on the spectrum.

“I feel like we can motivate each other, encourage each other and support each other.”

The couple of nearly 10 years has made a habit of helping – through poker runs, benefits, raffles or anything else that’s needed. The two were instrumental in Hurricane Ida relief as well.

“I always try to help people,” Dunn said. “We just did a benefit and a poker run for a guy that was born in Bayou Gauche and moved to Raceland. He’s 40 and he had a massive heart attack and they had to do a bypass ... two weeks later he found out he needs a pacemaker. We just got together and asked people for donations and did an auction ... it was a fun one because they had cake and they auctioned it and they smashed it on people’s faces.”

As unconventional as the fundraiser was, Dunn said it worked.

“One slice went for \$1,000,” she said laughing.

In the aftermath of Hurricane Ida Verdin and Dunn were able to locally distribute diapers, formula, wipes and other baby essentials through

6th annual First Responders Cook-Off set for June 4

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School bond issues passed, improvements should take 5 years to complete

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The St. Charles Parish School Board was authorized by 8.3 percent of registered parish voters in Saturday’s special election to issue new bonds not to exceed \$35 million for capital improvement projects.

The new bonds will be serviced by renewing 1.2 mills – which expired in December 2021 - of the total 5.01 debt service millage.

Of the 36,163 registered voters in the parish, only 3,010 participated in this election. Voting for the passage of the bond issue were 1,711 voters, while 1,299 voters did not support the measure.

Superintendent Dr. Ken Oertling said the passage of this bond issue allows for renovations of outdated facilities built in the late 1950s and 1970s.

“It will also allow for new additions to be added to sites currently at capacity and make much needed improvements and upgrades to technology infrastructure and equipment,” he said. “In addition, it allows for installation of additional security cameras while upgrading existing cameras, and enhancement and expansion of career and technical educational opportunities.”

Oertling said the bond issue funds will be issued in phases as needed for different aspects of the projects.

“Saturday’s result was a vote of support for public education, St. Charles

Parish Public Schools, our students and our employees,” he said.

Chief Plant Services and Security Officer John Rome, Jr. said the school system has been fortunate to have several bond issues passed since 2012.

“These past bond issues have provided a blueprint for the completion of all projects promised to our public in a timely manner,” Rome said. “As done during past bond issues, the 2022 bond issue projects will be completed in phases. Due to the large number of projects under the 2022 bond issue and the large amount of Hurricane Ida Restoration work that still needs to be completed, the bond issue projects will be split into three phases and take approximately five years to complete.”

The phased approach, Rome said, will allow for the school system to begin the design and bidding portion of phase one projects, award the projects, and commence construction within the next year to year and a half.

“Once construction has commenced, the school system will begin design of phase two projects,” Rome said. “This process will be repeated until all phase three projects are complete.”

During phase one, Rome said upgrades to technology infrastructure, upgrades to security/surveillance systems, and large screen device installation

will begin during the 2022-2023 school year. Phase one will also include the East Bank Head Start Renovation and Addition Project and the R.K. Smith Middle School Building A Addition and Flooring Project. Rome said these projects were strategically selected for phase one as their completion will allow the school system to address the need for additional classroom space at these two sites.

The East Bank Head Start project and the R.K. Smith Middle School project will enter design phase in the summer and fall of 2022 with the hopes of awarding contracts for the work and commencing construction by the summer of 2023.

Career and Technical Education

Renovations at Destrehan High School, Hahnville High School, and the Satellite Center are slated for phase two of the 2022 bond issue projects. The remaining identified 2022 Bond Issue projects will take place during phase three, the final phase.

“As the past few years of challenges with COVID and Hurricane Ida have taught us, we need to remain flexible and adaptable with our plans,” Rome said. “We look forward to completing these exciting projects in a timely manner and appreciate the community’s patience and support through the process.”

accomplish was to learn if he might be a donor match for Dufrene, a close friend to his family. His mother, Shirley “Shi” Reynolds, has known Dufrene for almost 20 years, and was also going to undergo testing to find if she could be a potential donor.

“I told Harris for years I was going to give him a kidney,” Reynolds said. “With the same blood type, I said I’m going to go ahead and talk to my son, too ... he said, ‘Well, Mama, I’m going to go after I get out (of the military) on the 20th. He couldn’t be a living organ donor at that time, but would be able to then.”

Before any of that could happen, the unthinkable happened. Reynolds returned home one day to find her son unresponsive. He was rushed to the hospital, but his family quickly learned there was nothing that could be done to save him. A blood clot had formed in his lungs, believed to be caused by a prior battle with COVID-19. He had dealt with the illness twice and was vaccinated – as part of the National Guard, he was one of those in charge of vaccinating and COVID testing others with the Guard.

Morton was gone, so suddenly, and was to be taken off life support. But before that could happen, and with an assist from her close friend Melissa, Reynolds let the hospital staff know her son could save a life.

“Don’t forget Harris,” said Melissa. “(Morton) wants to be a donor ... It just popped into my brain. She was going through so much grief.”

Amazingly, Morton was all but a perfect match for Dufrene’s transplant.

“A million in one chance,” Reynolds said. “It’s just really surreal ... it gives me so much hope, and joy and pride that my son’s last act on this Earth was as a hero. This is what he wanted. I made sure Harris got first pick if he turned out to be a match ... and miraculously, it was.”

Morton’s second kidney was a match for another woman as well who was on the transplant list. Thus far, he has helped to save two lives.

“He was getting out of the military ... God needed him for another mission. His 4-year-old son, my grandson, he says, ‘My dad is a hero. He’s watching over me.’ That’s the biggest joy in my life right now,” Reynolds said.

Dufrene said he feels overwhelming gratitude and sorrow alike for Morton, Reynolds and her family.

“You’re receiving this life-saving gift from someone,

someone that you know ... and with the circumstances ... it’s so hard to explain how much that means,” an emotional Dufrene said. “It’s an incredible thing. That family is incredible ... it just makes it mean so much more.

“Dakota went to school with my son. They graduated the same year. I’ve been knowing Shi and their family for quite some time ... Shi’s supported me since day one. And it’s hard for her. My heart goes out to their family, because it’s rough, what they’re going through. It’s rough.”

Dufrene began having kidney issues a few years ago, believed to be the result of hypertension. Ultimately, his kidneys began to shut down.

“I worked in the oilfield ... I still had decent levels,” Dufrene said. “I kept working through it all, made a few offshore hitches, and I started feeling kind of bad. Towards the end, I came home and went back to the doctor. They checked everything and my levels dropped tremendously. The next thing I knew, I was in complete renal failure.”

That was a milestone in what was a long battle. Dufrene began dialysis. He would have to be rushed to the hospital two years ago to have stents put in his heart and ports on his neck to drain fluid. He began dialysis again for about a year, until he began having heart problems.

Through it all, Dufrene had friends like Reynolds who had offered to be a donor.

“I said, ‘let’s just wait and see if something becomes available (via the transplant list) before we take that step,’” Dufrene said. “My goal was to get a transplant before I turn 50. Aug. 27 is my birthday, I’ll be 50 then.”

Ultimately, it was Morton’s kidney that would save Dufrene.

“It was as close as you could get to a perfect match. Blood, tissue, everything,” he said. “They told me it would be about one to three months before full function ... it took three weeks. My functions are all leveled out. No rejection, no antibodies needed ... I haven’t really had any issues. It’s a scary situation ... very emotional, very mental.”

There were some dark times during his journey.

“Some days you wake up in the morning and you just don’t want to go,” he said. “Mentally, I broke down. ‘How much longer am I gonna make it like this? Am I gonna

make it?’ And that’s where it really takes its toll. If you tell yourself I’m going to be fine, if you have a positive attitude, that changes a lot. But without support, that’s difficult.”

Dufrene says he never lacked for that support.

“I had people call me every day. Let’s go do this. Let’s try to do this, to get out the house ... my dad, my kids, ‘what can you do today? What do you want to do? Let’s go get dinner, let’s take a ride.’ My dad and I would sit out, talk about we did in the past, and talk about what we’re gonna do in the future.

“That’s what gets you through it. It’s the support ... it’s the support.”

Dufrene was released from the hospital Wednesday of last week, as his body was responding so well to the surgery.

“He said he saw no reason to hold me back,” Dufrene said. “He put stipulations on me ... I asked for stipulations, because I’m hardheaded. I push the limits. And I don’t want to fail this. I’m listening to them. Get out, go around, but I’m being careful.”

Reynolds said Morton, who was with the National Guard as a combat engineer, was “always a hero.”

“He served his country for eight years,” she said. “He always wanted to help people.”

She said Morton’s organs will be used to help others, and that she will receive updates on that when that occurs.

On Friday, Morton will be buried, with a military funeral at Slidell’s Veterans’ Memorial Cemetery.

To hear Reynolds speak of him, her pride in her son’s lasting impact is clear. Of course, there is great pain along with it, as well as the thoughts of what could have or might have been done, in hindsight, to prevent his death.

“There’s not a lot known about long COVID,” she said. “The symptoms of blood clots ... you don’t hear a lot about it. If you had COVID and you didn’t go to the doctor after and they put you on blood thinners or aspirin every day, then you’re not aware of these things. He was 26 years old, in perfect health. To have a blood clot in his lungs ... nobody knew.

“If we had known, an aspirin a day, it could have prevented this. And I just want people to know that this can happen, and maybe that can help someone else.”

in a Facebook post announcing her departure from the school system. “As part of the diagnosis I also have PBA, which means I laugh and cry way easier than I did before. It also means I should be warned if I’m eating if you’re going to say something funny. I like to think that it’s allowing me to feel all of the love and memories with the most incredible faculty - even more than should be possible. I can’t thank these incredible people enough for all that they have done for me and taught me over the last 16 years.”

Gore thanked her school family for wonderful memories.

“This disease may take away my ability

to eat, move and breathe, but it can’t take away what I’ve gained from my time with all of you,” she wrote.

Tracy Bishop Naquin met Gore nine years ago when she began teaching at R.K. Smith, and the two became fast friends. She said unexpectedly fast-tracked because of disability paperwork, and on Gore’s last day there was a gathering of the school’s employees.

“It was a very difficult but heartwarming and touching moment,” she said. “We have faculty and staff who have taught with her for many years, and we have faculty now who were at one point her students. It was just really a touching moment for all of us to be able to show her our love and appreciation for her time and service and just for the person who she is ... there is so much life left inside of her.”

Naquin has been instrumental in fundraising for Gore since the diagnosis, as have many other community and family members.

Gore was one of the beneficiaries of the recent Dat Dads’ Club of Luling’s recent gold tournament, and on June 4 a “Gores Got Grit” day of shopping with local vendors and crafters is planned to

help raise money for Gore. The shopping event will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Holy Family Catholic Church of Luling.

Ava Rockefeller, a Destrehan High School sophomore, has organized a gift basket raffle to benefit Gore. Rockefeller’s mother Chrissy works as a nurse in the school district. The basket contains over \$600 in gift cards to restaurants, salons, coffee shops, gas, groceries, boutiques and other local places. “We had the idea when we heard about it and we felt like we should do something,” Comardelle said, adding that so far the raffle has raised \$700.

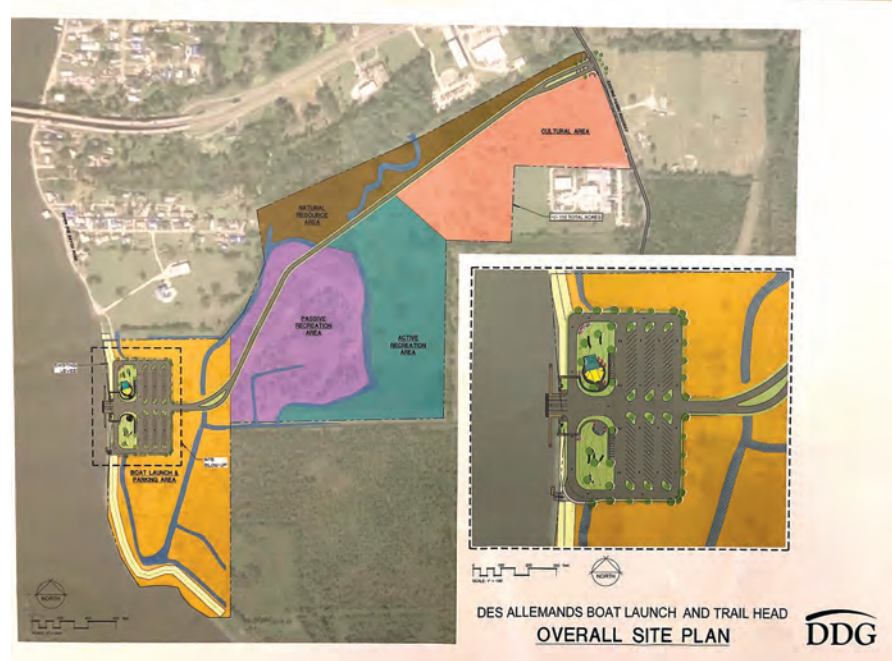

Center as parish officials hosted a town hall meeting related to the Des Allemands Boat Launch and displayed design drafts of the project.

“There aren’t any high-quality boat launches ... just not a lot of options on the West Bank, and we intend to build that for our residents,” St. Charles Parish President Matthew Jewell said at the start of the meeting.

Thomas Buckel of Duplantis Design Group, along with several of his colleagues who are also working on the design and logistics of the build, spoke to the audience and fielded technical questions related to the boat launch.

“The goal is to be pushing dirt by the third or fourth quarter of this year,” Buckel said, explaining that the area

used for the boat launch and related parking areas will need to be built up before construction can begin.

In spring of 2021 the St. Charles Parish Council unanimously voted to approve a donation of 109.8 acres of land by Chevron’s Gulf of Mexico Business Unit to the parish for the purpose of a boat launch and recreational area along Bayou Des Allemands. Talks between the parish and Chevron over the gift have been ongoing since the middle of 2018.

The sprawling 110-acre area is located in Des Allemands, south of US Highway 90, between Bayou Des Allemands and WPA Road. The boat launch and recreational space will be created using a \$1.88 million grant from the Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority. The partnership was heralded as the optimal model for CPRA’s recreational “Quality of Life” projects.

Access to the boat launch will be provided by a road leading from WPA Road (LA Highway 632) near Allemands Elementary and Des Allemands Playground, the land for which was also donated by Chevron in 2006.

At the time of the donation, Jewell called the donation “generous” and said the land offers incredible potential. He echoed those same sentiments Tuesday as he said options are wide

open for what the land could eventually be used for. Examples included developing camping sites, ball fields, RV camps and nature trails.

Several audience members expressed concern over the talk of ball fields, and vocalized how they thought the area should be used exclusively as an area to enjoy fishing and related activities.

Future surveys and parish meetings will guide those developments, Jewell said.

What is certain for now is Phase 1 - building the launch site itself and a road to accompany it - and Phase 2 – finishing the parking lot and scope of the project. Jewell said Phase 1 should ring in at around \$4 million.



Jewell noted \$1.8 million in RESTORE Act funding from the BP oil spill settlement will be utilized toward the project. He also noted other sources of funding should be available via grants through the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries and the Department of Homeland Security for birdwatching areas, elevated trails, RV sites and campsites. The general fund, he said, would also be in play as a source toward the project, which he said would offer a substantial improvement to the parish.

The parish will be responsible for maintaining the property, as it will maintain ownership of the property.

Gail Babineaux of Luling attended the meeting and was all smiles walking out of it.

“It was great,” he said. “The design had everything I would want as an avid fisherman and it also had amenities that my family would use.”

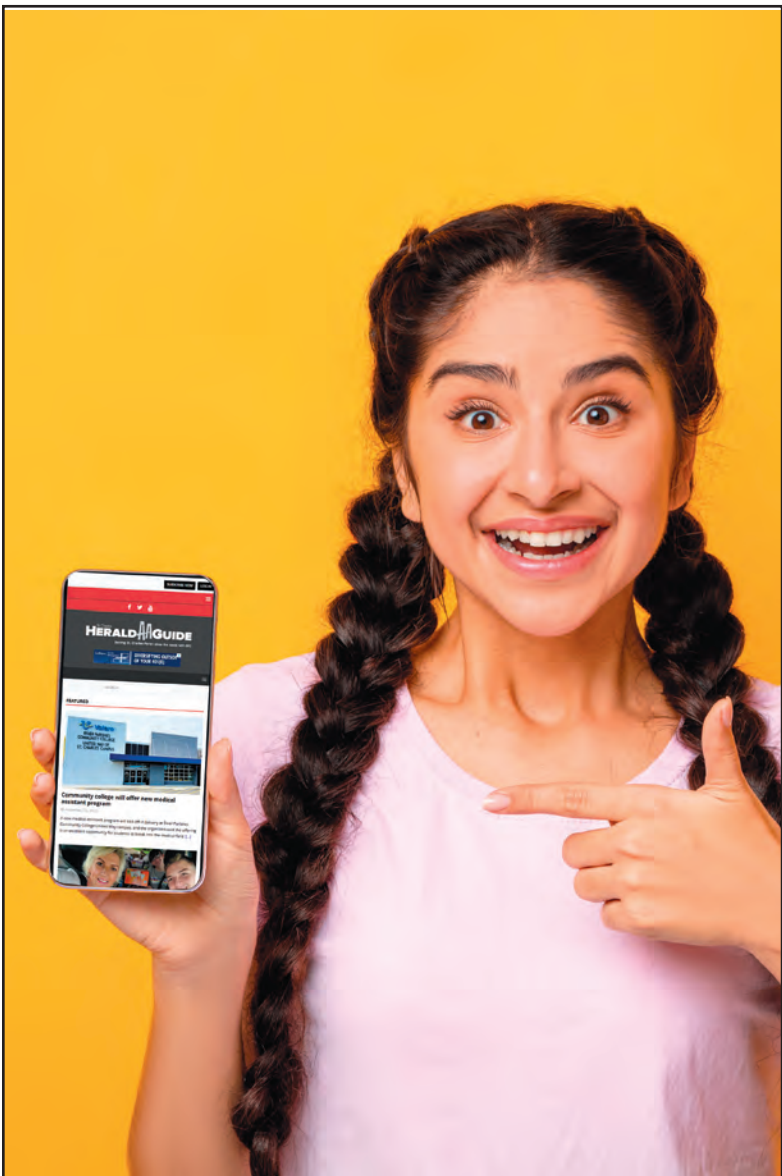

Dwayne LaGrange, a friend of Alexander’s family – her father, Glenn, is someone LaGrange credits as a longtime mentor – said Alexander has already made a positive impact through the event.

“Precious is a young lady who’s really been vibrant in this community and really wants to do things to help the community.

“I know society struggles with the acceptance and inclusion (of those with autism) and

event annually. “Last year was one of the most successful events we’ve had, and we’re excited to get up and running again this year.”

“A lot of times we just see these community members at work ... picking them up when they’re sick, after car accidents and traumas,”



said Wright, who is an ER nurse. “People with the fire department and Sheriff’s Office see the patient until they bring them where they need to be, but not after unless that person reaches out. So, to see a lot of those same people out there in support of you ... that tells you, thank you for doing everything for me or my loved one.

“It gives you that reminder that you’re not doing it for the money. You’re doing everything you possibly can to take care of them and get them to be able to spend another Christmas or holiday with the family they love ... we enjoy doing it. We like being here for the parish and supporting our community. And these events help us to keep it going.”

Wright said team entries are being accepted and should be throughout the weeks leading up to the event. Each team can have four members.

“We’re always looking for teams ... we’ve never really had to cut it off anywhere, we just kind of make it work,” Wright said.

This year’s event will enjoy a new addition in the form of a petting zoo. There will be face painting and a fire safety trailer on the grounds as well.

Destrehan finishes season, falls at top-ranked Barbe

Two-time defending champion turns back Wildcats in Round Two

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No. 17 Destrehan's season came to an end Saturday at Class 5A's top-seeded team and the defending two-time 5A champion, as Barbe finished a two-game sweep of the Wildcats on the back of an 11-strikeout no-hitter by Buccaneers starter Landon Victorian in a second-round playoff series.

The Buccaneers (33-2) defeated DHS 6-0 on Saturday, a day after capturing an 8-3 victory a day earlier in the best-of-three second round series. Both games were played at Barbe.

Barbe advanced to the 5A quarterfinals to face No. 8 St. Amant as it continues its bid to attempt to win a third consecutive state crown.

"Barbe's the standard," said Destrehan head coach Chris Mire. "I don't like to preach moral victories, but I thought it was a great experience for our guys to be able to see (Barbe) first hand and learn from it. And now we get back and we know what we're working toward."

Victorian, a Vanderbilt commitment, allowed just one baserunner Saturday, coming on a walk of Bryant Cato, the only separator between the sophomore and a perfect game.

"He throws a low 90s fastball and probably a mid-80s slider ... he kind of showed early that he was on," Mire said. "When he was getting the slider over for strikes, I knew it was going to be a tough day, because at this level and throwing at that kind of velocity, if you're able to establish both pitches like that for strikes, it becomes very hard on the offense."

Offensively, Owen Galt drove in three runs for Barbe, while Blake Moss drove in two.

Destrehan's Noah Simon took the loss, allowing one earned run on five hits and two walks. But Barbe pushed five unearned runs across on a day Destrehan committed five errors. Simon struck out six on the day.

On Friday, the middle of the Barbe order again hurt Destrehan, as Moss and Galt each drove in two runs. Gavin Guidry set the table for his team all day long, scoring three runs, doubling and hitting the day's lone home run. Each player collected three hits on the day.

For Destrehan (21-15), Jonah Haslauer went 2-for-3 and walked. Cato and John Carmichael each drove in a run.

Again, Destrehan's defense struggled, with five errors helping to lead to the eight runs.

Barbe's JC Vanek earned the win, going 6.1 innings and allowing three earned runs on three hits and a

walk. He struck out 10.

John Carmichael allowed five earned runs, and eight total, on 11 hits and two walks in the loss. He struck out two.

Mire said the 10 errors over the two games weren't something that could truly be overcome against a team at Barbe's level.

"That was really the story of the whole series, errors," Mire said. "They put a tremendous amount of pressure on you through the speed in which they play. They play fast. The ball comes off their bat fast, and just not being used to that speed of play, I think that can be overwhelming."

"We made some mistakes that didn't show up as errors that added up ... balls in the dirt, not hitting the cutoff, that gave them extra bases."

Mire said the Wildcats continued to fight, as they have all year. Particularly in game two, the mistakes added up, but for much of the day Destrehan went toe-to-toe with the state's top ranked team.

"I thought both of our pitchers did what they normally do over the two games," said Mire. "I thought, for Noah, it was one of his best games. He threw his butt off. He had his fastball, changeup and curve all going. But that second inning, we're down 1-0, we have two outs and nobody on ... we make some mistakes, they end up loading the bases and they hit a ball off the wall in an inning we should have been out of and three runs score."

That loss aside, there was much to be proud of over the course of the season for DHS, which captured the District 7-5A championship.

After a midseason stretch of four losses in five games, Destrehan came through in the clutch to earn a 9-8 victory over Jesuit, the first of four straight wins. The Wildcats ended the regular season on a run of 14 wins in 20 games, then went on the road in round one of the 5A playoffs to best host Airline.

"Couldn't be more proud of the way our guys played down the stretch," Mire said. "Seniors stepping up and having big moments for us. Sophomores who got going late in the season and, by the end, weren't playing like sophomores at all anymore. I thought early on we had spells where one guy would get hot but another would be cold, but everyone stuck together and we started to heat up."

The Pelicans are now 1-12. We don’t know if Zion wants to be here, yet it’s likely he is the only avenue for this franchise to turn around.

Did you enjoy rummaging through that time capsule? Because that feels like several years ago, not several months. It was difficult to imagine this team would take us on the ride we just had, enjoying the show put on by perhaps the most enjoyable New Orleans basketball team I can remember.

It wasn’t just about winning with this crew – and hey, let’s face it, there haven’t been plenty of winning clubs in franchise history. But there’s rarely been such a time where the arrow has pointed up in all facets to

such a degree. This team is young. This team is fearless. This is a team that refuses to lay down and will fight you till the bitter end.

And – the cherry on the sundae – this is also a team with a wealth of draft capital being shipped in from out west. The Los Angeles Lakers effectively tanked for the Pelicans this season, and New Orleans could have a chance to add another high lottery pick, ping pong balls willing, in two weeks if fortune smiles upon them. If the Lakers’ play this season is any indication of the future, there could be more where that came from.

I guess the lesson is, things can change in a hurry, just as they did from that November night. Just ask the Pelicans.

Or the Nets, for that matter.

and Whitaker are qualified for two events each.

Only a freshman, Richard has already proven she possesses rare talent.

“She’s the only freshman in the state to qualify for four events,” said Destrehan girls track and field head coach Lynette Matthews. “That’s an impressive feat ... every week she’s improving. She’s like a little machine. We’ve been waiting for her for two years – we kind of knew what we were about to get, but we didn’t know we were going to get quite this much. She’s just one of those rare, rare athletes.”

Matthews said track and field is in Richard’s DNA.

“Her parents are track people, mom and dad ran track. She’s been training since she was very young. When you get started early like that, then when you get older you tend to be great at it, just like having a basketball in your hands or kicking a soccer ball when you’re young,” Matthews said.

The road to the high finish in regional competition was an exciting one as well.

“We’re adding up points all night, asking OK, what if this happens or what’s next now that we’ve done this?” Matthews said. “We’re trying to put the pieces of the puzzle together ... we really wanted this. And I couldn’t be prouder, they’ve done everything we’ve asked them to do. They’ve made us all proud through all their hard work all year.”

The following are the top three finishers from each regional event. All top three finishers qualify for the state track and field meet.

In the boys’ events, Destrehan saw a number of high finishes. Phillip Wright took the regional championship in the 400-meter dash with a time of 49.87 and third place in the 200-meter dash with a time of 22.18; Skyler Gayten finished third in the 110 hurdles with a mark of 15:32; the boys 4x200 team took third place with a time of 1:27.67. Daniel Blood finished third in the triple jump (43-06).

Among the girls, Destrehan’s Marley Richard won the 100-meter dash, her mark of 12.05 cementing the regional crown. Ditto for the 4x200 relay squad, their mark of 1:44.73 topping the field. Richard added runner up honors with a second-place finish in the 200 (25.43), and then third place finishes in the long jump (18-06.75) and triple jump (37-08). Ivie Mashia took third in the 400 (1:00.94). Kaylee Keller was third in the 100 (16.79). The 4x100 relay team finished second (50.48).

For the Hahnville girls, Mallory Whitaker captured the high jump title with a field best mark of 5-00. She added a third-place mark in the pole vault (9-06), tied with teammate Kayla Lavin (9-06). Madison Bailey took second place (1:00.42); the 4x200 relay team captured third (1:48.74) and the 4x400 team finished third as well (4:15.68).

The Hahnville boys saw Cincere Simmons earn second place in the discus (139-09); Jarian Shelby earn second in the shot put (50-07); Micah Lamers take third in the 400-meter dash (51.46); Ryan Abadie placed third in the pole vault (12-06).

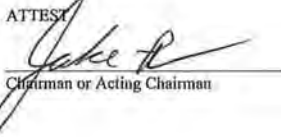

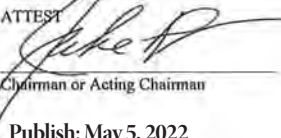

It shall set forth: (1) the caption of the forfeiture proceedings; (2) the physical address where the claimant resides and the post office address where the claimant will accept mail; (3) the nature and extent of claimant's interest in the property; (4) the date and identity of the transferor/seller; and the circumstances of the claimant's acquisition of the said property; (5) the specific provisions of this law asserting that the property is not subject to forfeiture; (6) all essential facts supporting the assertion; and (7) the specific relief sought.

The failure to timely mail a claim to the seizing agency and the District Attorney's Office of the Twenty-Ninth Judicial District Court for the Parish of St. Charles, State of Louisiana will result in forfeiture of the property to the State of Louisiana without further notice or hearing.

This is to give notice that **St. Charles Parish, LA (SCP)** has determined that the following proposed action under **HUD-RAD** is located in the **100-year floodplain**, and **SCP** will be identifying and evaluating practicable alternatives to locating the action in the **floodplain** and the potential impacts on the **floodplain** from the proposed action, as required by **Executive Order 11988**, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands.

Chadbourne Estates is proposed conversion to RDA and rehabilitation of 66 units of affordable housing. The purpose is to preserve and improve much needed affordable housing in the area. The project site is located within Zone AE (area of special flood hazard with water surface elevations determined) as indicated on Preliminary Flood Insurance Rate Map 2201600125C effective June 16, 1992. 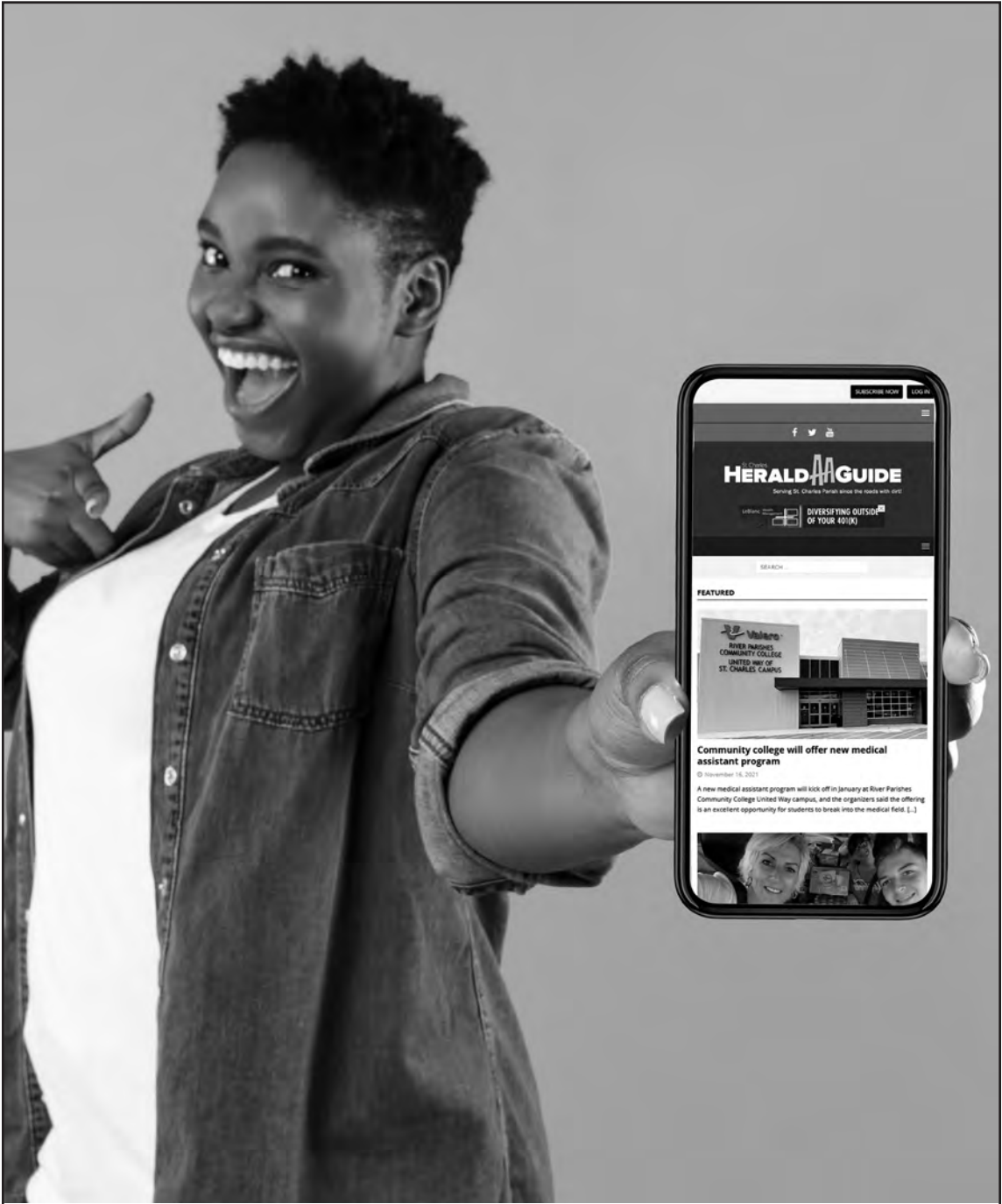
