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Norco toddler now in remission after cancer battle

Blake and Abigail Estevez of Norco have waited over seven months for the magic word that they longed to hear from their daughter’s doctors – remission. Their prayers were answered this month when their 16-month-old daughter Blakely was declared cancer free.

The news comes after one surgery and 27 rounds of chemotherapy. The family’s cancer journey began on Jan. 27 when Abbie brought Blakely to the pediatrician for a wellness visit. What started as Blakely’s routine 9-month wellness visit led to the baby being diagnosed with cancer.

“Nothing has been wrong with her other than an ear infection ... she’s a perfect baby,” Blake said. “Abbie had noticed a lump in her belly - she had noticed it in the past and brought it up, but the doctor had pressed on it and it didn’t cause Blakely any pain and so it wasn’t really a concern. After the wellness check Abbie asked

Luling man searches for kidney donor

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Cole Medina celebrated his 22nd birthday on Sept. 7, distracted as he may have been.

The Luling resident and Hahnville High alumnus is suffering from kidney failure, the most recent effect of a near lifelong battle with kidney disease. He is in need of a new kidney, which would represent the second transplant surgery he’s undergone in his life, the first coming just before the age of 5.

That kidney has lasted for the past 17 years. But two years ago, he began having problems that hinted at the need for another transplant.

“Doctors found he started taking a decline (in his kidney function),” said Tammy

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Woman remembers kindness of community during her cancer battle

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In September of 2017 LaKeisha Lay of Boutte had one birthday request – birthday cards.

Lay had been diagnosed the year prior with Cutaneous T- Cell Lymphoma, a blood cancer that affects the skin. For her birthday in September five years ago, Lay posted on Facebook that she would love to receive birthday cards from family, friends, community members, and even strangers.

“With all that’s going on, I didn’t realize that my bday is right around the corner. It would be awesome if y’all sent me cards ... I’m not soliciting donations, it would be awesome to just have cards from all my friends,” she posted on social media at the time. “Due to my chemo schedule, I had to postpone my bday trip by a couple weeks, but I promise to take every card I receive with me and read them while I’m on my vacay. Sometimes, it’s just the simple things.”

Lay said the response to that request was anything but ordinary – she received nearly 150 cards. The kindness from the community, she said, is something that she has not forgotten five years later.

“During that time I was a little down,” she said. “It’s kind of like watching life pass you by. Even with the great support system that I had, it still felt like everyone was moving except me. I was just stuck in the hospital sick as usual. When I got the cards - so many cards - I realized that people had stopped just for

me. They took time out of their lives to shop for, or make, me a card. That was so awesome, and I’ll never forget that so many people in the community cared enough to stop for a moment and uplift a stranger.”

In addition to recognizing her birthday, the cards also offered well-wishes for another reason: September is Blood Cancer Awareness Month. Lay continues to undergo chemotherapy every 21 days in an effort to keep the

DHS alum has been dominant in minor leagues, working toward MLB call-up

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When Landon Marceaux stands on the pitcher’s mound, he carries a presence about him. And when he departs, more often than not he leaves a trail of baffled batters in his wake.

It was the case at Destrehan High School, where Marceaux was the ace and big game pitcher of a strong staff – and where he had LSU’s attention even as a prep freshman. And was the case at LSU, where the right-hander evolved into the Tigers’ staff ace and thrived in the spotlight.

His collegiate career ended when the MLB’s Los Angeles Angels drafted him in the third round and the 80th overall pick of the 2021 MLB Draft. And less than two years into his professional career, Marceaux has resumed his dominating ways in the minor leagues.

The 6’0, 199 pound 22-year-old was recently promoted to Double A, the second highest classification in the minors, where he pitches for the Rocket City Trash Pandas, an Angels affiliate. He previously pitched with the

Tri-City Dust Devils of Single A ball, where he’s posted 16 of his 18 starts this season.

Marceaux has a 2.98 ERA this season in 90.2 innings pitched. He’s struck out 73 batters while walking 16, and his WHIP – the number of walks and hits he allows per inning – is 0.95. An ERA under three and a WHIP under 1 is considered exceptional at every level.

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Brittany Bonnaffons of Hahnville High School was one of 22 educators from across Louisiana recently selected for the Louisiana Department of Education’s 2022-23 Teacher Advisory Council.

Paradis woman says DHS group changed her life

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“This is absolutely life-changing.” Joyann Maddox of Paradis couldn’t contain her thankfulness and excitement as she talked about the ramp that was recently installed at her home. It was built by Destrehan High School carpentry students and funded by United Way St. Charles.

“They built a handicap ramp free of charge for myself and my family. I cannot thank them enough,” she said. “I have severe degenerative osteoarthritis of both knees, right hip, hand, and spine making walking difficult. Steps are nearly impossible.”

Living with Maddox is her daughter Heather Westbrook, who has hydrocephalus.

“Last year, at the time I applied for the ramp, she had had six brain surgeries in a six-week period where she stayed in ICU,” Maddox said. “She has had over 35 surgeries in her 37 years. After her surgeries last year she lost some mobility due to swelling on her brain. She will also benefit from the ramp.”

United Way St Charles approved the ramp build last year, but days before it was set to be constructed Hurricane Ida hit.

“Unfortunately, due to COVID and the hurricane the school wasn’t able to actually build and install the ramp until this month ... 13 months later,” Maddox said. “It was well worth the wait. I can now easily get to my car. Just three steps kept me from enjoying my yard, travel, and other things. Now I can walk directly to my car with no steps.”

Maddox said Craig Perrier Jr., who teaches the DHS carpentry class, and his crew of students are heroes in her book.

“His group of young, hard-working shop students measured, sawed, cut,

and nailed the ramp together,” she said. “I was so impressed at the communication between these young men and how they worked together, under Perrier’s direction, to get this built quickly and efficiently. These men worked together as a team and boy does it show.”

Without funding, Maddox added, the ramp build would not have been possible.

“Special thanks to Tamara Plattsmier of United Way for helping me by keeping the lines of communication open and my case at the forefront from the time I applied to the completion,” Maddox said. “I didn’t go out much. I used to take pictures and get out and explore. This ramp will give me the opportunity to go more places and do things, and that helps mentally with depression issues. I don’t want to have to depend on anybody, and this gives me the opportunity to take care of myself.”

Perrier said Maddox’s ramp is the first one constructed by his current group of students.

“It’s amazing,” he said of watching the teenagers learn new things in the carpentry class. “They are ready and excited to come to school, and a lot of times you don’t see that.”

DHS students Muhammad Murtaza, Nathan Hall, Terrance Anderson, LaCorey Cannon, Luke Hidalgo, and Antonio Williams - who have dubbed themselves the “handyman crew” - all worked on Maddox’s build. Perrier said without United Way St. Charles’ funding the class wouldn’t be able to have these experiences.

“To see their faces after Ms. Joy was so happy ... it means the world to me,” Perrier said. “They’re learning in a fun

about it again ... she didn't plan to ask about it, but she did, and the doctor said, 'Let's schedule an ultrasound.' That's where things kind of took a turn."

Blakely was sent to Children's Hospital to get blood work and a CT scan. After the tests were complete, it was determined that she had a Wilms tumor on her left kidney and a small lesion on her right kidney.

"Cancer free ... her body is cancer free for now," Blake said, adding that his toddler will get scans every three months for at least a year to make sure that cancer doesn't return. "Oh man I can cry even thinking about it. Everyone tells you, 'I'm praying for y'all ... y'all are so strong.' We didn't feel strong, but what else were we supposed to do?"

Hearing the news that Blakely's treatments were successful, Blake said, was a huge sigh of relief.

"It's still scary though," he added. "I already feel anxious for the next scans. Blakely is a trooper though. She made it ... she smiled the whole way through it."

Blake said that the bevy of community support, blood drives and fundraisers bolstered the family during the most trying of times.

"The support from the community was unreal," he said. "We couldn't possibly tell everyone thank you, and thank you isn't even enough. St. Charles Parish

... the whole River Region ... shows up for everything. I can't say thank you enough."

Blake said his daughter's news came at the perfect time – September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

"We'll forever be advocates for childhood cancer," he said.

cancer from advancing any further. She has been the recipient of a bone marrow and stem cell transplant, with her sister Ayesha as her living donor.

"As far as my condition right now ... I am not in remission, but I'm doing pretty good this year. The people of St Charles Parish rock," Lay said. "My cancer affects the skin and in the beginning I made a general Facebook post about how expensive the Aquaphor was and goodness ... people sent me Aquaphor. I also get mouth sores from chemo and a dental hygienist sent me samples of gentle mouthwash. They have visited me in the hospital with flowers and treats. One lady, Rosalyn Markey, would make me homemade candy for my chemo treatments. One lady remembered that I like to cruise and she gave me a \$750 cruise gift card. Her name was Alaina Lumar. Cheerleaders at RK Smith sent me a card where all of the cheerleaders had signed. It was organized by a cheerleader named Shayla. I received

homemade card from a prison and over 50 people had signed."

Then, she said, there was her church family.

"The late Rev. Lagrange of True Vine Baptist Church in Hahnville and all its members kept me sane," she said. "Last but not least my family was awesome. My support system was a key factor in my survival - my mom, my late father, my sisters, my three daughters and a friend I met on the softball field, Mary Davis. These people have spent as many days at the hospital as I have. They have given their time, resources, and mostly love. It's harder on them sometimes than me. Paulette Castle Lay is my mother and I could not have made it without her."

Nichols, Medina's mother. "He caught COVID, and that shot things up a little bit ... it was enough for them to put him inactive for a time on the transplant list. He's back active on it now. But he's had to deal with this his whole life. He takes immune suppression medicine.

"So, a lot of it isn't new ... but we're reaching the end point where he needs a kidney."

For mother and son alike, the waiting is stressful and often scary. Compounding matters is that twice, it seemed like Medina's solution had arrived. But one willing donor traveled 12 hours for an intended transplant; while undergoing scans, some previously undetected complications were found, and it made the scenario too risky for the donor to undergo.

Recently, a second potential donor had to back out, citing personal reasons.

"You can't really get mad about it," Nichols said. "You just try and move on. (Medina) is having his labs done now ... they're getting ready to start dialysis on him.

"Every day is a struggle."

It's the latest chapter in a year Nichols had already called the worst of her life.

She lost her home during Hurricane Ida, a tree falling upon it to land the final blow. Like others who evacuated for the storm – she left to stay at her mother's home, out of harm's way – a night of anxiety was followed up by a gut-wrenching visual provided by a neighbor. In this case, it was a video of what remained of Nichols' home. She and Medina are still not back at their home, though she said "that's close" to happening.

"It's tough for Cole. He doesn't like change," Nichols said. "Between not being home at his house, his kidney failing on him ... it's been a little struggle for us. It's rough."

The two also suffered respective bouts with COVID-19, particularly worrisome for Medina due to his compromised immune system. He had to be hospitalized for a week and suffered from a bout of pneumonia. At one point he needed to be placed on oxygen.

"It was scary. I know he was scared. He didn't want to go on a vent," Nichols said.

The focus now is on finding a kidney match and willing donor for Medina, which thus far has been easier said than done. Nichols and Medina's brother and sister alike have each been ruled out by doctors as viable donor candidates, which means it will have to come from someone outside of the family.

Medina's brother suffers from a brain tumor, thus isn't a candidate, and Nichols said that was tough on him.

"His brother is upset. 'I should be able to give him a kidney,'" Nichols said. "He wants to help his brother. I understand it, but we have to make sure he's safe and OK, too."

With the loss of the most recent potential donor, Medina is back at square one. Nichols took to Facebook to let people know her son's plight and to call out to someone, anyone, who could be a kidney match.

"They say it's a 5 to 7 year wait to get to the top of the list," Nichols said. "He has a good way to go until he reaches that point."

“My goal is to inspire hope through the Hale Boggs Bridge while raising awareness of suicide in our community,” Julien said.

The idea for the signs came when Julien and her mother Adrienne Bourgeois were stuck in traffic one day on a bridge.

“We were joking that we should spread positive messages on the bridge as a joke, then we realized it could really benefit people,” Julien said.

Bourgeois and Julien presented the idea to John Dias, executive director for United Way St. Charles, who agreed to fund the project.

“She makes me proud every day,” Bourgeois said of Julien. “She grounds me daily and inspires me to grow. She constantly thinks about other people. As a mom being able to have a front seat to watch her navigate life it makes

me feel like I’m doing something right. I always tell her that we need to leave the world better than we found it.”

Bourgeois said she hopes the signs would help to reclaim the Hale Boggs as the symbol of unity that it used to be for the parish. The past few years, she said, the bridge has been the scene of several fatal accidents and suicides.

“As a mom, one of the things I get so excited about her navigating this project is that when we first had the conversation in the car it sort of tugged on my heart. Like, I thought, ‘You can teach her that sometimes ideas that God gives us were meant to acted on and cultivated ... to show her ideas can turn into tangible ways to help others,’” Bourgeois said. “I can’t even find the words. It was one of those things I thought was maybe too big of a reach, but now it’s happening. No idea is too small to act on if it’s for the good others.”

Julien said if she is able to get the signs installed, she would be proud of herself for giving back to the community. “

“Knowing I have the possibility of saving lives is very humbling,” she said. “As a mom I often worry if I am teaching her the right lessons. If she is hearing me when I say to be humble and kind- to think about others and be the change you want to see in the world. She is at the age where it isn’t always popular to be seen or heard for raising awareness especially for difficult societal concerns. Watching her push herself out of her comfort zone because she believes in this project reassures me that even though she doesn’t listen when I say to clean her room she is holding on to the important lessons.”

way, and even though it’s hard work they’re learning and it’s teaching them a great work ethic. They’re enjoying it so much they don’t realize all the lessons they’re learning.”

Plattsmier, UWSC’s volunteer and event manager, said the collaboration between UWSC and the DHS’ carpentry classes goes back to 2017. She added that Maddox’s ramp is the first one built since the pandemic and hurricane.

“The program absolutely could not take place or happen without the handyman crew at DHS,” she said. “They’re really the ones doing the work and making it happen.”

to grow. It was actually a bumpy start for him this season, as he allowed 11 runs over his first 13 innings pitched. That quickly subsided. Over his next five starts, he allowed just three earned runs total, and he’s sustained the momentum.

One thing Marceaux has been very strong at has been keeping his strikeout to walk ratio high, over one two-month stretch posting a 46 strikeout to 5 walk mark. That happened at the Single A level; a similar breakout at Double A could precede a promotion to the major league club.

When Marceaux was at Destrehan, DHS head baseball coach Chris Mire often noted how poised and mature Marceaux was when he arrived at the school as a freshman. While some pitchers have raw stuff and others strong command, Marceaux came armed with both, and he understood how to use those weapons once taking the mound. It was a rare gift for such a young pitcher.

“He’s been a college pitcher since he got to high school,” Mire said. “He’s one of those special kids you don’t see very often. He has this great understanding of how to use his pitches and how to command them, and when you have the stuff he has and the command to go with it ...”

Mire paused.

“He just has ‘it,’” he concluded. “He has it. He’s built for this.”

The coach got his first glimpse of Marceaux on a social media video of the latter throwing a bullpen in middle school.

“It was immediately obvious the talent this kid had,” Mire said. “And I go on to



find out after the fact that he’s coming to Destrehan, right about the time I got the head coaching job here. So, you know you’re about to get a special player.”

Mire said where most pitchers are developing their arsenal during their prep years, Marceaux was able to build on the rich skills he arrived with.

“He was able to refine his skillset as opposed to developing it,” Mire said. “He was able to work on the smaller details and finer things you’re usually working on in college.”

The Angels chose pitchers with all 20 of their picks in the 2021 draft, Marceaux

near the top of that list after shining as one of the nation’s best hurlers in the 2020-21 collegiate season.

for opposing lineups. His ERA was just a shade over 1.00 for his career at the school. The was named District 7-5A Pitcher of the Year after a dominating senior campaign. As a junior, he posted a microscopic WHIP (walks and hits per inning pitched) of 0.76, and an ERA of 1.56. He was a two-time All-State selection. As a sophomore, he set the school’s all-time record for ERA in a season with a mark of 0.64 in 2016.

His final numbers at Destrehan saw him go 18-3 with three saves, 239 strikeouts, 31 walks and a 1.17 ERA in 168.1 innings of play.

Marceaux also earned a gold medal as a member of the Team USA 18U National Team, selected as one of the nation’s 20 best players.

Beyond his natural talent, Marceaux’s focus and work ethic has long set him apart as a rarity.

“He always had a plan,” Mire said. “He never did things randomly or went through the motions. In high school, he did so much work on his own, and it was all to get to where he is now. To see that at an early age is what impressed me the most. This isn’t a normal high school baseball player ... he’s not only got the skillset, but the makeup and passion to reach his goals.”

American honors and was a second team All-SEC selection. He notched the second most innings pitched in the SEC (102.5), ranked sixth in ERA at 2.54 and sixth in strikeouts with 116. He went 7-7 and helped LSU capture a regional championship.

This was the second time Marceaux has been drafted by the major leagues. In 2018, the New York Yankees chose him in the 37th round out of high school, but Marceaux elected to attend LSU and aim for a higher selection – which he indeed would find.

Los Angeles is a potentially exciting landing spot for Marceaux, who could one day join a roster that includes some of the brightest stars in baseball today, like Mike Trout and Shohei Ohtani.

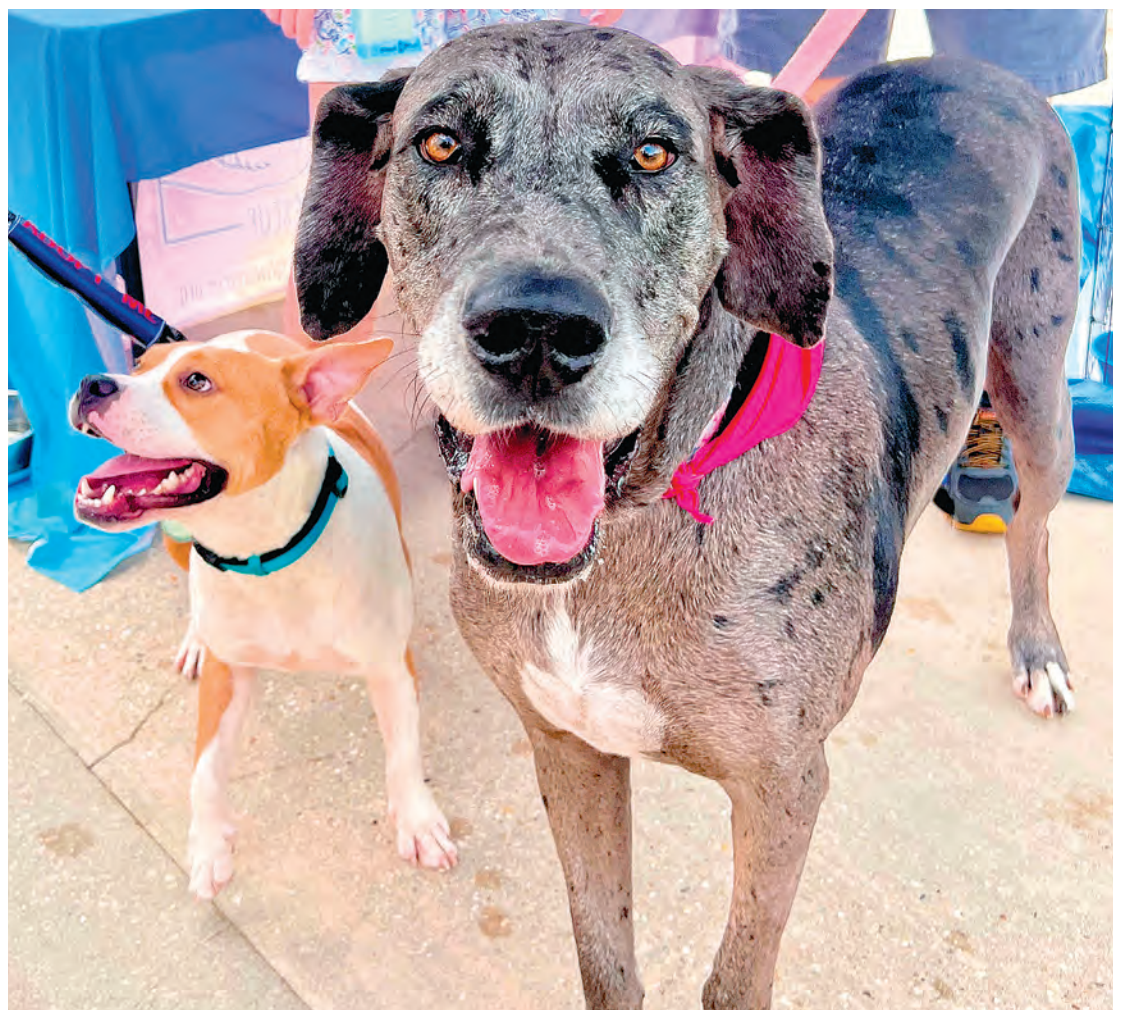

The theme for this month's market is Back 2 Football, and available auction items will included an autographed Saints football. Vicki Johnson-Cain, a Destrehan resident and event organizer, said she hopes the day results in lots of family fun and pet adoptions.

"The numbers of owner surrenders is staggering," she said. "It's at epidemic proportions. It's unreal the amount of dogs getting surrendered by people ... getting dumped by people ... it's unreal. You can't even put it into words. So many people in today's world have such little regard for the life of these precious animals and the impacts of Hurricane Ida are still being felt ... and now the high price of fuel, utilities, and groceries is making it hard for families to survive."

Johnson-Cain said she has transported 140 dogs so far this year from rural shelters that have little resources to house and provide medical care needed for the increase in animals entering their facilities.

“That does not even put a dent in the need, but for those animals it’s a second chance at life,” she said, adding that the monthly markets serve as a perfect opportunity for patrons to receive information on information on pet care, adoptions, and fostering.

The heat has prevented market organizers from having many animals at the market adoption events, Johnson-Cain said, but they are hoping as the days get cooler they can get more participation from the local shelters and rescues to bring out their adoptable pets and try to find homes.

This month’s market is unique in the fact that it will be collecting donations for the Proverbs 14:31 Homeless Ministry, which is based in St Charles Parish.

“It does not take a lot to be kind and make the day for someone less fortunate,” Johnson-Cain said. “The snack packs that we will be collecting at the market is one way. You can fill a quart size baggie with items from your own pantry for less than \$5. We ask that everything is individually wrapped, single serve items that can withstand the heat. Proverbs 14:31 and its new board are hoping to make seasonal distribution drives. Our winter drive in December will be our biggest drive, so stay tuned for details about that and follow us on our Facebook page.”

Each patron who brings a snack bag for the homeless will be entered into a drawing for the market’s vendor raffle basket.

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Wildcats head to East Ascension with eyes on 3-0 start

Destrehan, East Ascension head coaches were college teammates at McNeese State

When Marcus Scott and Darnell Lee manned the cornerback spots together at McNeese State, they learned several lessons that set the foundation for what they teach their players today as respective head coaches of Destrehan and East Ascension.

Fundamentals. Technique. Effort.

"That's what was preached to us in college, and that's how we played," said Scott. "As coaches, we do the same ... we preach what we learned as players there."

The friends and former teammates will face off Friday night as Scott's Wildcats (2-0) hit the road to face Lee's Spartans (1-1) in a matchup of teams featuring a wealth of offensive playmakers,

hard-hitting defenses and similar philosophies.

This isn't their first meeting as head coaches, and if Friday's game is anything close to as dramatic, fans are in for a show. Scott's John Ehret Patriots took on the Spartans in the 2018 Class 5A state quarterfinals, a game won on a 44-yard touchdown pass with less than a minute left by Jacoby Windmon to Ja'Ron Glenn – Windmon was on in place of starting quarterback Travis Mumphrey, who had left the game injured moments earlier.

"We were fortunate to win that day," Scott mused. "We expect another tight one."

Lee was not bashful when scheduling pre-district games this season – his Spartans (1-1) are in the midst of

a run of games against a who's who of state powers: Zachary in Week 1, West Monroe Week 2 and now Destrehan in Week 3. Zachary is currently ranked No. 1 in Class 5A, while Destrehan is ranked third in the LHSAA's weekly poll. EA lost to

Zachary, 35-13, then bounced back to score a 16-10 victory over West Monroe.

Offensively, running back Walter Samuel is a weapon who can strike in the rushing and receiving game alike.

"He's a Division I player,"

Scott said. "He's outstanding running the ball and catching it out the backfield. He's a guy that can really hurt you."

Receiver Brennan Thompson is another dangerous weapon. He and Samuel are two amongst many for an offense that also boasts an experienced passer and a mammoth offensive line.

That experienced passer is senior quarterback Jaylen Lee, son of Darnell and someone Scott said is exceptionally knowledgeable of the game.

"He's a coach's kid," Scott said. "So you know he's been around the game his whole life. You can tell he has leadership ... pressure doesn't get to him."

"They spread you out and they're huge on the line. Thompson is good,

but they have a full complement of players who can beat you. I don't know if you can stop them completely, given all the weapons they have. We'll have to limit the damage and lean on our fundamentals. When all else fails, that's what brings you through."

Defensively, Scott had high praise for the Spartans.

"They're actually really fun to watch when they're not playing us," Scott said with a laugh. "They're big up front. They're athletic in the secondary. But their linebackers, those guys can run and they're big kids, 215-pound kids who fly to the ball. You can really appreciate what they do when you watch them in action."

Chief among those linebackers is Antwone Foster, a 5'11, 220-pound senior who runs at a 4.7 clip.

DESTREHAN 42, EHRET 6 - Destrehan has now outscored its opponents 91-6 through two weeks of the season after its decisive victory over John Ehret.

Safety Anthony Robinson scored his second touchdown in two weeks, while Daniel Blood, Jai Eugene, Shane Lee, Brandon Freeman and Trey Nixon each added touchdowns.

Fresh off overtime thriller, Hahnville travels to unbeaten Northshore in 1st road game

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Faced with the prospect of falling to 0-2, Hahnville had a choice on Friday night: fold or fight. Hahnville fought. The Tigers’ 42-41 overtime win at Tiger Stadium had few dull moments – a 7-6 game with approximately three minutes left in the first half exploded from there, with a whopping four touchdowns between the teams in

the final three minutes of the half; a sensational six-touchdown game by Mandeville rusher Nate Sheppard; and a 356-yard, six touchdown rushing performance by the Tigers over six different rushers, led by Calvin Smith and Joshua Joseph. After a 35-14 loss to Newman in Week 1, and working in a new quarterback on the fly, the Hahnville offense put on a performance that may give a young group that much more confidence to know it can win a shootout when or if one breaks out. The running game is strong, and quarterback Ryan Gregson is growing into his new role as he prepares for the third start of his career. “You know, offensively, in the first half week one, we were doing what we needed to do for the

most part, but the turnovers hurt us,” HHS head coach Daniel Luquet said. “Ryan is acclimating to the speed of the game. We’re going to get the ball out his hands quickly, run the football, run play action off of that ... and one thing I’d like to see him continue that he was doing last game was to use his legs. He’s an athletic kid, when things aren’t there, take off, get what you can and use those baseball skills he has and slide.” This week presents a new challenge on two different fronts for Hahnville. This is the first road game of the season, as HHS (1-1) prepares for its final pre-district game where it will travel to Northshore (2-0) Friday night. “When you go on the road for the first time

with a young team, you want to get them used to some things with that. But I think in a way, it can also be a plus, to not have to worry about anything but showing up, getting on the bus and playing,” Luquet said. “It’s a business trip. You show up to win a football game, get back on the bus and go back home.” Northshore has posted a 13-0 win over Dutchtown and a 52-21 win over Salmen through two weeks. Head coach Bobby Sanders arrived from Rummel, where he served as an assistant on the Raiders’ 2019 state championship team, last season and took the helm of a program that went 3-4 in 2020. He got the Panthers back on track, and back to the program’s winning ways as it posted a 9-2 record and reached

the Class 5A playoffs. “Coach Sanders did a very good job there last season. He won a championship at Rummel, so he knows what championship pedigree looks like,” Luquet said. Defensively, Northshore mixes things up on its front line, showing two, three and four man fronts depending on formation and personnel. One of its top playmakers is safety Kohen Rowbatham, a safety/outside linebacker hybrid who also plays on offense for Northshore. Cornerback Kyle Williams brings size at the cornerback position, while two-way star T.J. Coleman has speed to burn. “Kohen Rowbatham stands out. He plays both ways, he’s their Wildcat quarterback on offense. He’s one heck of

a football player,” Luquet said. “Kyle Williams is a really good player ... defensively, (Northshore) is sound. You don’t beat Dutchtown and Salmen and start 2-0 for nothing.” Offensively, James Bridges combines with Coleman to give quarterback Donovan Weilbaecher a pair of dangerous downfield targets. In one major way, Hahnville and Northshore are quite similar teams – both have endured an injury to their starting quarterback and have needed their backup to step forward into the starting role. “He can make some good throws,” Luquet said. “We’ll try and out some pressure on him and establish the line of scrimmage.”

Lady Tigers surge out to 9-3 start

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After losing eight seniors from her 2021 squad, Hahnville Lady Tigers head volleyball coach Mendi LeBoeuf said she realistically expected a bit of a learning period early on this season as the team integrated several new starters into the fold. But these Tigers learn quick. Hahnville is off to a strong 9-3 start this season after its most recent victory, a four-set victory against John Curtis Tuesday night as the Tigers keep building momentum. There’s a lot of energy around the program, and rightfully so. “Losing eight seniors, a really big class, we knew it would be a transition,” LeBoeuf said. “To be honest, we’re a little further

along than I anticipated, knowing the turnover we had. Our players are working hard and definitely progressing, and it’s very exciting.” Senior Ella Wilkie is among the leaders of the team. After moving from the outside to her 2022 position of middle blocker, she’s off to a strong start and LeBoeuf says she’s setting a fantastic example for her teammates. “Ella leads our offense ... she comes in every day with a lot of energy,” LeBoeuf said. “She’s made a lot of improvement to her offensive game. She’s a powerful weapon. Her teammates are stepping up their game in the same respect to really working hard.” As Wilkie is to the offense, fellow senior Sandy Bourgeois is

to the defense as its libero. “In addition to being a very good player, she’s a very good leader,” LeBoeuf said. “She leads by action and by her ability to communicate. And she’s really helped us be able to develop a more consistent serve receive. We have three sophomores and Sandy in serve receive, and I think she gives them a lot of confidence.” One area of stability has been at setter, where senior Kourtney Irons and sophomore Ebby Zeringue return. That consistency from a year ago has helped the team’s offense come together as quickly as it has, LeBoeuf said. “They’re mature, and they’ve been in that position before. They’ve done a great job taking feedback from hitters as to

how they can put them in the best position to be successful,” LeBoeuf said. Sophomore outside hitters Mariah Mott and Makynzi Williams, middle blockers Shannon Kenney and Katelyn Dufrene and defensive specialist Kylie Spurgeon are other rotation mainstays who have factored large in the hot start. Against Curtis on Tuesday, Hahnville earned a 25-20, 20-25, 25-23, 25-23 victory as four Tigers secured double-digit kills. Wilkie led the way with 16. Mott made 13 while Kenney and Williams each made 11. Dufrene served three aces. “We got off to a pretty decent start and won the first one, but didn’t have the best second set,” LeBoeuf said. “We hung in there and fought back after falling

behind quite a bit, but dropped that one. After that, we got into a groove again and did a better job. When we needed to take care of business and needed to hold on, we did that. That’s very important to establish for yourself when you have a lot of young players on the court.” Hahnville returns to action today at the Morgan City tournament, where HHS will play five matches. Today (Sept. 15), it will face off with Newman and Central Lafourche, followed by a trio of matches on Saturday. “When you’re integrating new lineups, it’s important to play as much as possible. So to be able to get five matches at least here, that’s exciting for us,” LeBoeuf said.

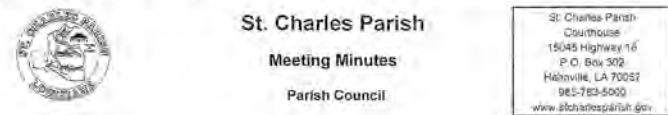

In the event a mini-clean up is required prior to performing the above services, a fee of \$58.61 per mini clean up plus actual disposal fees will be assessed, not to exceed then (10) mini-cleanups per property in violation. On property where trash and/or debris accumulation is such that it requires heavy equipment, bulldozer, front-end loaders, etc. a fee of forty-three dollars and ninety six cents (\$43.96) per cubic yard will be assessed. An administration fee of \$36.63 may be assessed on each invoice. The fees in this section shall be increased or decreased on February first of each year by a change in CIP applicable to the US cities average group, all urban consumers, all items published by the US Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, for the preceding twelve-month period ending each November. The change shall become effective beginning with the period ending November 30, 2000. The department of finance shall notify the department of planning and zoning in writing annually of the revised fees.
