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Happy Birthday, Judy celebrates legend’s life at Lafon Center

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Lorna Luft is a singer, an actress, a writer and a film producer – her love of entertaining others inspired in great part by her mother, the legendary Judy Garland.

On Saturday, Oct. 1 in Luling, Luft will channel her inspiration through a tribute show to Garland celebrating the latter’s 100th birthday: Happy Birthday, Judy, in which Luft takes the audience down memory lane through a medley of her mother’s most well-known and beloved songs and by sharing stories about Garland’s life.

The show will begin at 7:30 p.m. at the Rodney R. Lafon Performing Arts Center. It is the first show of the Lafon Center’s 2022-23 season.

Happy Birthday, Judy debuted in New York City on June 9, with Luft singing ‘Over the Rainbow’ on the staircase of the Empire State Building, a performance that included a lighting ceremony illuminating the top of the landmark in honor of Garland.

The show takes attendees through Garland’s five decades in entertainment through song and Luft’s personal stories, reminding why the legend was once dubbed the “world’s greatest entertainer.”

Garland is best known for her role as Dorothy Gale in the iconic film The Wizard of Oz. She earned a nomination for the Academy Awards’ Best Actress for her performance in A Star is Born and for Best Supporting Actress

in Judgment at Nuremberg. She appeared in more than two dozen films for MGM and was a frequent on-screen partner of Mickey Rooney and Gene Kelly. At 39, she became the first female and youngest ever recipient of the Cevil B. DeMille Award for lifetime achievement in the film industry. In 1999, the American Film Institute ranked her the eighth-greatest female screen legend of classic Hollywood cinema.

Despite season-ending injury, Hahnville QB remains a leader for his team

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When the Hahnville football team earned its first win of the 2022 season, a dramatic 42-41 overtime victory over Mandeville, there was nobody prouder than Donovan Friloux.

The senior quarterback entered the season as the centerpiece of a talented and experienced Tigers offense. That offense was as advertised against Mandeville, but with a change in one specific detail: Friloux didn’t take a snap that night, nor was he

dressed out to play.

Instead, the senior season he’s dreamed of since he was young and the chance to quarterback Hahnville at the peak of his ability in prep athletics was stripped away before the regular season ever began. Friloux suffered a season-ending knee injury against Jesuit in the preseason jamboree, tearing both his ACL and MCL and spelling the end of

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J.B. Martin’s 1st female kicker makes successful debut

After Gabby Touchard’s nerves settled last Thursday, she did what she’d long prepared to do – and made a little history in the process.

Touchard kicked off J.B. Martin Middle School’s first football game of the season in a literal sense, socking the opening kickoff downfield in her debut as the Cougars’ kicker. She’s the first female kicker in the program’s history, showcasing a strong leg developed over several years on the soccer field since she took up the game at 4 years old.

She’s a two-sport athlete now – and she’s enjoying the moment.

“I was kind of nervous at first, but when I got on the field all of that went away,” Touchard said. “It felt good. I heard the crowd screaming and all of my teammates cheering.”

Touchard’s interest in placekicking began in 2019, when she and her family went to Atlanta to watch LSU defeat Oklahoma in the 2019 national college football semifinals.

“They had something called a fan showcase event,” Touchard recalled. “There was a line to kick field goals. My sister had kicked one, and after I saw her do it, that made me want to do it.”

For Christmas, she asked her parents for a football goal post set to practice on in the front yard. Wish granted, and she was able to work on her accuracy as a personal hobby – but no plans to try out for football.

That changed after the J.B. Martin football staff got to see her in action last school year.

“One day, my friend and I had the football out for P.E. I put it on the ground and got off a pretty good kick. All three of the football coaches were right there and they went to go get a game ball, so I kicked that,” Touchard said.

J.B. Martin head football coach Nathan Fauchaux recalls it well.

“I said, ‘Let’s see what you got,’” Fauchaux said. “She thought it was a joke. I told her that she ought to try out next year, and she didn’t think I was serious. But I kept harping on her.”

Fauchaux, also J.B. Martin’s athletic

director, knew Touchard had athletic gifts from seeing her on the soccer field and also during his P.E. classes.

“She was nervous (about her debut) ... she’s her own worst critic. She’s very hard on herself and she has a phenomenal work ethic. She went out and had three awesome kicks. She said, ‘I could have kicked better.’ It’s just how she is, but she’s doing a really great job. Not a great job for a girl – she’s a really solid kicker, no matter who. And she’s been awesome to have on the team.”

Touchard said the feeling she got from making the team is something she won’t soon forget.

“Everyone was so supportive when I was trying out,” Touchard said. “When I looked at the list and saw my name on the roster, I got really excited.”

Her mother Rochelle said she couldn’t be prouder of her daughter.

“I’m most proud of the way she’s stepped up and owned it,” Rochelle said. “It’s great seeing her have the support of her teammates and of her friends. Kicker is a pretty lonely position to begin with, beyond also being the one girl on the team, so it’s a pretty courageous step for her.”

By all accounts, her teammates have fully embraced having her on the squad.

“She didn’t really know how the guys would take it, but they’ve really accepted

her,” Fauchaux said. “To the point where, she’s not ‘the girl on the team,’ she’s the kicker. She’s a girl in a predominantly boys sport, and you don’t see many, but I think she has a future if she sticks with it. She’s only going to get better and stronger from here. I’m hoping to see her go on to high school and keep going with this. I know she really enjoys it.”

Touchard takes her new role seriously. Fauchaux said she’s inquisitive and a tireless worker. Rochelle noted Gabby works with her coaches and also with Alex Romero, former Hahnville High kicker who went on to kick at Nicholls State and with the NFL’s San Francisco 49ers.

She also gets a new way to bond with her brother, Gage – the two are now teammates with the Cougars.

“I never thought my husband and I would be able to say we have a boy and a girl on the football team, but here we are,” Rochelle said.

Touchard is proud to be the first girl to kick for the Cougars, but she hopes she isn’t the last female to be part of the team.

“I think it would be really cool if I’m able to inspire others to do what I’m doing,” she said.

will take place for the 41st time. The 2021 Alligator Festival was cancelled due to parish-wide devastation from Hurricane Ida, and the 2020 event was cancelled because of the pandemic.

“As president of the Rotary Charles of St. Parish, I’m thrilled that the festival is returning for the first time since 2019,” Brian Reulet said. “I can’t wait to see everyone sit back and enjoy the festival and feel a sense of normalcy again.”

Festival Chairman Eric Dishongh said that the Rotary Club has been working extremely hard to make this year’s Alligator Festival a success.

“With the pandemic and Hurricane Ida now in the past, we are ready more than ever for our community to come together for a good time and a good cause,” he said. “We are thankful for all of our community partnerships that make this event possible and can’t wait to see everyone at the festival.”

This year the festival will have the most food and craft vendors in its history - over 50 craft vendors and 25 food vendors. The weekend will also include live alligators, 10 bands, and amusement rides. All weekend ride bands will be \$65.

Thursday the 22nd is locals night. Patrons will receive free admission and \$1 off beer. The festival will be open from 6 to 9 p.m., and \$15 ride bands will be available. Will Dempsey will provide live music from 6 to 9 p.m.



On Friday the 23rd the festival will be open from 6 to 11 p.m. There will be a \$5 admission fee, with free admission for ages 10 and under. Ride Bands for the night will be \$25, and the Matherne Brothers will grace the stage from 6 to 7:30 p.m. The Chase Tyler Band will play from 8 to 11 p.m.

On Saturday, Sept. 24, the festival will open from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. There will be a \$5 admission fee, with free admission for ages 10 and under. \$25 ride bands will be sold twice for the day, with the first band valid from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. and the second band valid from 5 p.m. to 11 p.m.



There will be a slate of musicians taking the stage on Saturday. Faith Becnel will be on from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., while the Gordon Bradberry Band will play from 1 to 4 p.m. From 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. the Escalade Show and Dance Band will take the stage, and the Chee Weez will close out the day from 8 to 11 p.m.

On Sunday, Sept. 25, the festival will be open from 11 a.m. to 9 p.m. There will be a \$5 admission fee, with free admission for ages 10 and under. \$25 ride bands will be sold. Nonc Nu & Da Wild Motus will take the music stage from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., and from 2:30 to 5:30 p.m. Junior & Sumtin Sneaky will play. Category 6 will close out the festival from 6 to 9 p.m.

Parking shuttles will be available Friday from open to close, Saturday from 4 to 11 p.m., and Sunday from 4 to 9 p.m. The shuttle will pick up and drop off at the side gate on Dufresne Parkway, with three stops at the Dufresne Community Center, Lafon Performing Arts Center, and R.K. Smith Middle School.

welcome, and the Coats for Cake event will take place from 9 to 11 a.m. in her driveway. Her home is located in the 2300 block of Ormond Boulevard.

Bailey’s mother Ellen Huguenel Windmann said her family has partnered with the non-profit organization Love Your Neighbor NOLA, who will use the donations for a coat distribution event in October.

In fact, the coat collecting has already begun. Bailey shared the idea with her principal, who then allowed her to present her birthday wish to her fifth-grade classmates at Ethel Schoeffner Elementary. The result has been 25 coats collected so far and a school-wide drive that will end with the class that collects the most coats receiving a cupcake party.

Bailey’s idea to help others, Ellen said, is reassuring.

“She has a kind heart. We try our best raising her, and I know she has a lot of positive influences,” Ellen said. “It’s a good reflection of the folks that surround her. She leaves me speechless quite often at the things she wants to do. She makes me very proud.”

The victims’ families have started the nonprofit organization Drive One Way, which will advocate against drunk driving.

The preliminary investigation revealed that 39-year-old Joey Clement of Thibodaux was driving northbound in a 2019 Ford F-150 when he crossed the centerline and struck a SUV head-on, according to Louisiana State Police Troop C Public Affairs Spokesman Trooper Ross Brennan. According to State Police, Clement displayed signs of impairment and was arrested for DWI fourth offense with additional charges pending.

In March of this year the Nicholls State University Foundation established a new endowed scholarship to honor the memories of the three former students. Bowling and Dufrene were studying nursing at the university, while Coss was an allied health sciences freshman.

Traci Dufrene, Lily’s mother, said the golf tournament will raise funds for the scholarships. She added that she and the other victims’ families have started the nonprofit organization Drive One Way, which will advocate against drunk driving.

“Our mission is to educate and spread awareness on the impact of impaired driving and to advocate for the victims,” she said. “We’re in the very beginning stages of incorporating it. This is a new venture for all of us. The goal of the tournament is to fund the scholarships and to help make life a little bit easier for

students going into health care. Our girls ... they were all helpers ... we just want to continue that legacy for them.”

Dufrene said this is the first golf tournament planned for the organization, but that so far the response from the community has been overwhelming. She hopes to make it an annual event.

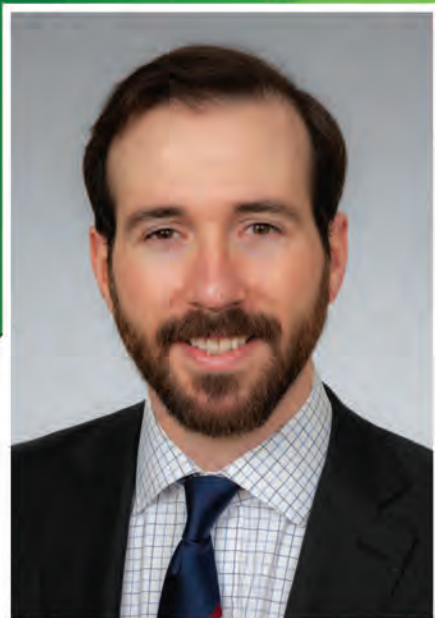
“Our girls were all very giving, and they’re not here to do that now ... so this is our way of honoring them,” Dufrene said. “The culture of Southeast Louisiana ...just what we have heard time and time again ... is that drinking and driving is just the culture here and that’s just not acceptable. Our greatest mission is to make people aware that that’s not acceptable, and we definitely want to advocate for victims and work with lawmakers to make people held more accountable.”

She said the case against Clement is still in the fact-finding stages and that no trial date has been set.

The November golf tournament, Dufrene added, will be a family affair with lots of food and entertainment for children.

Archrivals battle Friday night as Hahnville visits Destrehan

Teams to kick off District 7-5A play with annually anticipated showdown at Wildcat Stadium

It's that time once again.

It may feel like all of St. Charles Parish is in attendance on Friday night as Destrehan hosts archrival Hahnville for the 2022 chapter of their heated series. It's one of the most storied rivalries in not just

the state of Louisiana, but one recognized nationally among the best of the best prep football rivalries.

This year's showdown will kick off District 7-5A play for both teams and sees Destrehan (3-0) enter as the No. 2 ranked team in the Class 5A poll, on a three-game win streak that has seen the

Wildcats outscore their three opponents by a combined 133-8 margin. The most impressive of those three wins arguably came on Friday night, when Destrehan went on the road and dismantled a strong East Ascension squad, leading 35-0 after just a quarter of play. Hahnville (2-1),

meanwhile, has picked itself up after a rocky beginning of the season that saw the Tigers lose their starting quarterback, Donovan Friloux, to a season-ending knee injury in the preseason jamboree, then fall 35-14 at home to Newman in Week 1. Since then, Hahnville has straightened things out with new quarterback Ryan Gregson in Friloux's stead, winning a pair of tight games against Mandeville and Northshore.

Destrehan has gotten the better of Hahnville over the recent history

of the series, winning the past four turns since the Tigers' victory in 2017. Destrehan is 9-1 over the past 10 games in the series.

Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet said he knows his team is aiming to shock the world, as the Wildcats will enter as the favorite.

"We're up against a team that nobody is giving us a chance of beating," Luquet said. "I like where we are mentally with it. We've been in some tough battles already this year and we've seen some growth from

our young team.

"No matter what the scenario is, these games take on a life of their own."

Part of the reason for that, Luquet believes, is simply familiarity. Even for the youngest players on each roster, this will be far from the first time they've seen their opponents play in person.

"I think a lot of it has to do with the fact that our kids, be it basketball, baseball, football ... they've known each other and played with and against each other for

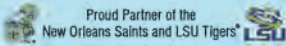
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Ladycats growing under 1st year coach

As Destrehan earned a victory over Baton Rouge at last weekend’s Brusly tournament, the Ladycats showed a glimpse of their potential and their growth through the early portion of a re-tooling season.

The Wildcats (4-10) are working with several new starters this season, while new head coach Adison Giambrone takes the helm of the program after the departure of former head coach Edward Borgstede, who made a jump to St. Charles Catholic after last season. Destrehan is also adjusting to life without former star hitter Ryley Boyne, who now plays for Southeastern.

Giambrone said she’s pleased with how her young team is coming together through 14 matches, noting that the Wildcats have come into the season ready to work and to learn.

“It’s definitely an adjustment, but we’ve been adjusting well,” Giambrone said. “Obviously with me being new, and a lot of new players. We’ve been focused on coming together as a family and as a team, worrying about what goes on at our side of the net more than what’s going on over on the other side. We’re making sure we’re progressing every single day in the gym, and in life, and making sure we’re doing right by us.”

Thus far this season, Khara Morton has been among the standouts. The 5’11 junior outside hitter and the sister of former DHS football star Tyler Morton has taken steps forward after starting as a sophomore.

Paris Richard, Rinoa Swancey and Lily Hayes have played very well to start the

season as well, with Swancey and Hayes the lineup’s two lone seniors.

“With a young group, we’re focused a lot on keeping one foot in front of the other ... staying in the moment, focusing on what you’re doing in the present. It’s something I think we’ve gotten a lot better at,” Giambrone said.

In the win over Baton Rouge, she said the team’s defensive discipline translated to the offensive side.

“We got a lot of quality touches and that enabled us to get some big swings on the front row,” Giambrone said. “Putting the ball where the defense wasn’t and finding the hole.”

a long time,” Luquet said. “There are no surprises as far as what each player can bring to a game. We know how good their guys are, they know how good our guys are. Our coaching staffs know one another well.

“As big as this community is, in a lot of ways it’s really a small community. They know what we’re about and we know what they’re about, and that makes it fun.”

Both Luquet and Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott said for as hot as this rivalry is, it’s really all about community, and that both sides

want to see the other do well ...

“Outside of this week,” both Luquet and Scott said.

“I think everyone is excited,” Scott said. “For one, it’s nice to get back to a normal game, with no restrictions and what time we were scheduled to play. Plus, this is the first one we’ve had at home in a little while, so that’s exciting. A lot of people get very into it ... from grocery stores to barber shops to restaurants, a lot of people are related on both sides of the river. This is basically a family affair, cousins

against cousins, things of that nature.”

When it comes to the on-field breakdown, Scott sees a Hahnville team that’s quickly adjusted well as Gregson has stepped in for Friloux.

“He’s done a really good job stepping in at quarterback,” Scott said. “He’s mobile and can make the throws they ask him to make. They have a lot of talent at wide receiver and running back, a lot of weapons around him. When they run it, there are a lot of good players they send at you. Five different guys touch the ball and they keep fresh legs back there. You can’t key on just one player.”

Dakota Williams, Scott said, is a dangerous playmaker.

“He’s got a lot of game experience and he’s the leader of that group,” Scott said. “He has the size to defeat press coverage and the speed to make plays down the field. We think he’s a complete player.”

When Destrehan has the ball, finding a way to neutralize Cincere Simmons as much as possible is a priority.

“His athleticism jumps off the screen,” Scott said. “His motor is always going. Then, their linebackers are very active, as are both defensive ends. The guys in the middle, they

free up the linebackers to run and make plays.”

Luquet, conversely, sees a much-improved passing attack from Destrehan this season and credits quarterback Jai Eugene for the strides he’s made.

“It’s all about experience,” said Luquet of the senior who has started since his sophomore year. “He’s been running that offense a long time. We know he’s talented when he tucks it and runs. But one thing that you knew they’d need to do to get to the place they want to be is they needed to do a better job throwing the football. And Jai worked at it. He has trust in his guys

and his ability to throw it, and it’s made him a better quarterback.”

To that end, Luquet said he knows offensive coordinator Greg Boyne looks to test the secondary.

“He’s gonna take shots,” Luquet said. “They have some really experienced, talented wide receivers. He’s gonna throw the ball and trust those guys, like Daniel Blood and Leslie Jefferson, to go get it and make plays. As good as Shane Lee and those backs are, as that offensive line is, we already know they’re going to run the rock. But you have to defend the whole field,

all over the place, and if you do load the box to stop the run, they’ll go downfield.”

Defensively, Luquet said two juniors set the tone for a very talented, sound group.

“For me, everything starts with Kolaj Cobbins and Anthony Robinson,” Luquet said. “Those are fantastic football players and very strong tacklers. Really, that extends to the whole defense ... they make you go 10 to 12 plays to score, and that’s hard to do. The speed and physicality that they play with makes it tough. We have to match their physicality.”

(As amended). The fee for performing these services shall be at a rate of 0.037 per square foot of the lot cleaned. The contractor’s fee for performing these services shall be at the rate of 0.029 per square foot of the lot cleaned. In the event a mini-clean up is required prior to performing the above services, a fee of \$58.61 per mini clean up plus actual disposal fees will be assessed, not to exceed then (10) mini-cleanups per property in violation. 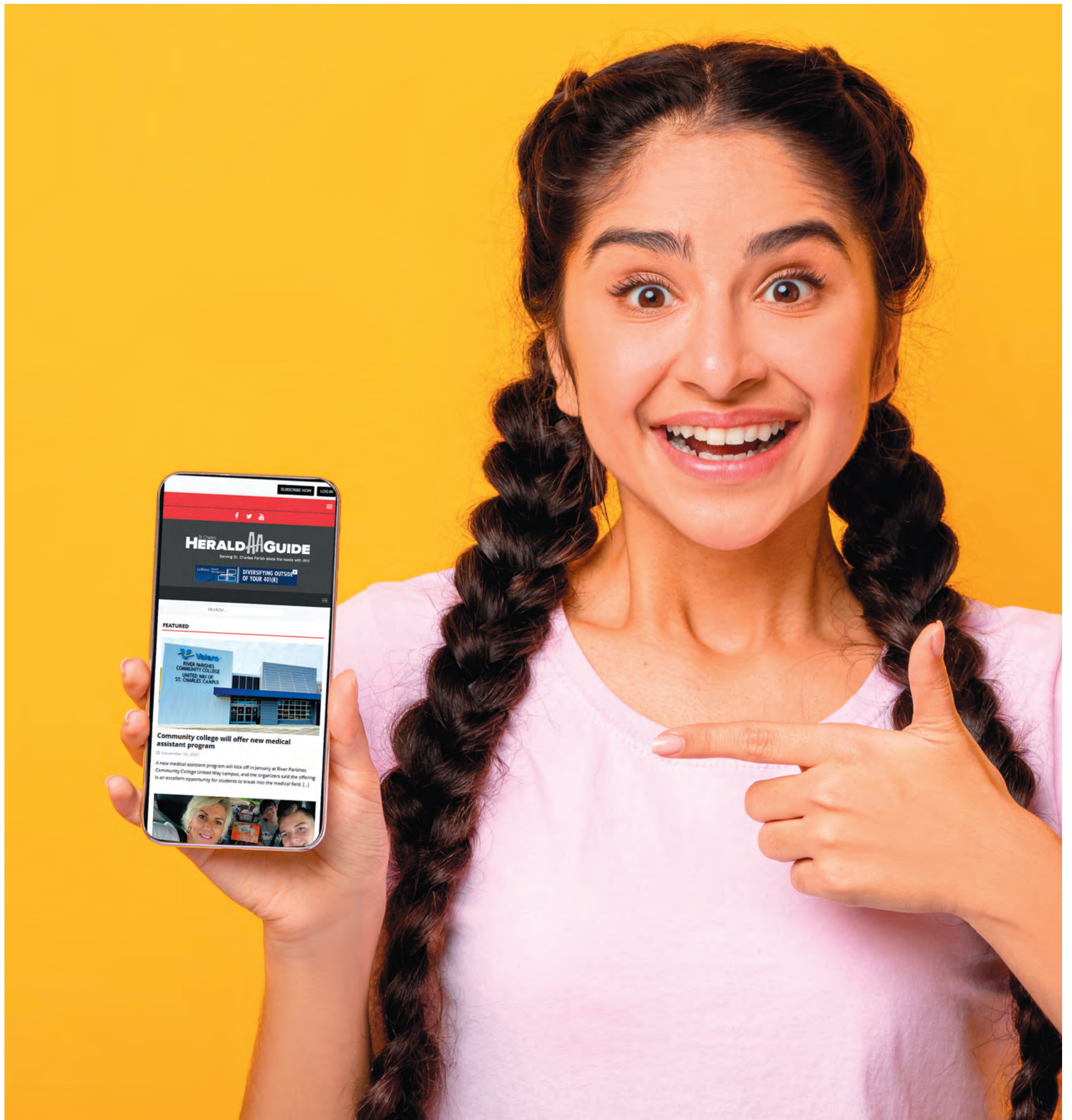
