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St. Charles Parish public schools would be completely desegregated by the end of the 1960s, but while plans and preparations by the school district were made throughout the decade to make that a reality, a group of students had to have the bravery to be among the first to cross the color barrier.

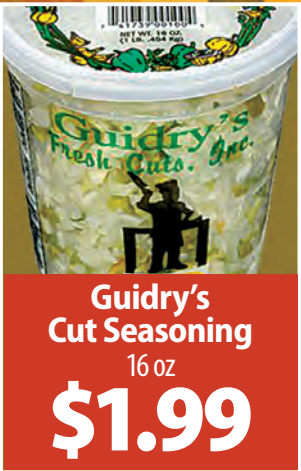

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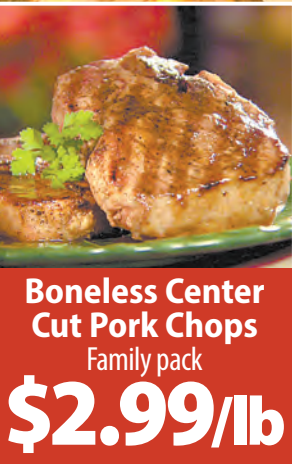

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Destrehan grad falls 50 feet in work accident, on road to recovery

In one misstep, Austin Faust plummeted 50 feet onto the concrete below – and the right side of his body virtually crumbled.

The Destrehan High alum and St. Rose native suffered a broken femur, elbow, pelvis, shoulder and hand and had to be airlifted for hospital care in New Orleans. Faust, who is attending electrical trade school, had begun working a job in the meantime performing work on industrial buildings. He stepped on a beam after beginning to work on a rooftop – that beam could not support the weight and sent him falling.

If not for another beam striking the 18-year-old on his way down – and slowing his fall – his fate could have been far worse.

“He got out the hospital about a week ago,” said Alexis Bailey, Faust’s sister. “He’s beginning outpatient rehab to get back to himself. I think

it’s been tougher on him mentally than physically ... he hated being in the hospital and he’s worried about how this could affect him later on in his life when he’s older, about having all this metal in his body. He has so many people supporting him, though – I think he will get through it, it’s just a process.”

Faust has endured five surgeries so far, has had a metal rod inserted in his leg and several screws into his elbow and hand.

Bailey said she learned of the accident when Faust’s girlfriend Savannah called about it and noted this was not an experience she’ll ever forget.

“Have you heard about what happened to Austin?” Bailey recounted. “They told me he fell from the roof at work – he’s being airlifted. I mean, I called my mother, she was terrified ... we had to be going 100 miles an hour. We were crying ... we’ve very close knit. It was one of the scariest

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Luling woman warns others of scam impersonating sheriff’s officers

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Connie Sperandeo took to social media this week to warn others of a scam she was unfortunately targeted by – one in which people are posing as officers of the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office.

Sperandeo, who lives in Luling, said it all started on Friday when she missed a phone call. A voicemail identified the caller as Sgt. Jake Long, who said Sperandeo needed to call him back as soon as possible.

When she called, the person on the other end of the phone told Sperandeo that she had missed jury duty the prior day and that she had two options – she could either turn herself in and sit in jail for 72 hours or do a Zoom call with the judge.

“First of all, I argued with the man because I hadn’t received a jury duty summons and he blamed the mail service,” she said. “He said I had two citations for missing jury duty ... one was \$500 and the other was \$1,500 plus court costs plus Zoom fees.”

In an interview with the Herald Guide, Sperandeo said there was no foreign accent detected by the men she spoke

to, and that the caller ID on her phone indicted it was a call from St. Charles Parish.

“I reluctantly opted for the Zoom call and that’s where it happened,” she said. “He transferred me to Captain Jeremy Daniels, who said he needed my banking information so he could set up the Zoom call with the clerk of court’s office. I went back and forth with him for a while because I couldn’t wrap my head around why I needed to provide my banking info for something I was never notified for. I even told him this wasn’t a legit call, so he hung up and called right back. That showed St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office.”

Sperandeo said she eventually hung up the call after refusing to give the caller her banking information.

“He called right back and I didn’t answer,” she said. “Neither have called me back.”

Sperandeo said she contacted the SCSO to report the call.

“An officer came out to my house and called her supervisor with all the information,” Sperandeo said. “My husband



called both numbers and both had voicemails saying they were with the sheriff’s office and to leave a message. One was from Luling and the other was from Thibodaux.”

Sperandeo said she feels relieved that the ordeal is over, but thankful that there were enough red flags that made her keep asking questions.

“I felt I should report it since these two guys gave me their names and one gave a badge number,” she said, adding that she

hopes her story reaches enough people so that no one falls victim and gives their banking information.

St. Charles Parish Sheriff Greg Champagne confirmed that Sperandeo is not the only local resident to be targeted in the scam.

“The supervisors’ names being used are not employees of the Sheriff’s Office,” he said. “Employees of the St. Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office would not contact individuals by telephone regarding outstanding fines and request any type of banking information or immediate payment over the telephone.”

The SCSO Bonds and Fines Division does accept payment for fees over the telephone and/or online, Champagne said, and added that citizens who wish to see if they owe any fines can call 985-783-6237 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Any citizens outside of St. Charles Parish who believe they are a victim of this phone scam should contact their local law enforcement agency to file a complaint, and citizens of St. Charles Parish should contact 985-783-6807.

discussions on what the new branch will include. The survey includes questions on how important certain library features – like a separate teen space, a separate children’s space, outdoor seating, and study rooms – are to patrons.

“We’re all excited about a new Hahnville branch and the impact it can have for the community,” she said. “The results of this survey and talking to our patrons will show us what people are already using the library for and what they’d like to see in a new library. The size and location of our current Hahnville branch has some limitations, so we know that a new building will give us many more possibilities to live our library’s mission, which is to empower our community to explore, learn, create, and connect.”

Pitz said the survey will be open until the end of the month. The current Hahnville branch of the library system, located at 14996 River Road, is open. Pitz said the location did not incur a lot of damage from Hurricane Ida, but that it is the last-est branch of the system’s properties to undergo a location change or major renovation – the last of which was when the new Norco branch on Apple Street was opened in 2019.

“The new location has been purchased,” Pitz said of the Hahnville branch. “It’s the old district attorney’s location ... near Family Dollar. It’s actually very close to the current location, but the property is much larger. We would like to keep a lot of outdoor space there. We’re close to the levee.”

The building that was on the property has been knocked down, Pitz added.

“It’s always exciting to be starting from scratch and thinking about what we could do,” she said.

There is no timeline yet for the start of construction or completion of the project.

highlighted those history-makers as it premiered Trailblazers, a documentary spotlighting the desegregation of St. Charles’ public schools in 1965 and specifically highlighting students who volunteered to be the first to integrate in the midst of the Civil Rights Movement. The premiere took place Wednesday at the Rodney R. Lafon Performing Arts Center. The short film includes interviews with a number of those students as well as school employees of the time.

“The documentary is an attempt on the part of the board to recognize those youngsters back in 1965 who were the first to integrate public schools here in St. Charles Parish. They have never been recognized and we felt it was only right to do so,” said St. Charles Parish School Board representative John Smith.

Smith said the decision made by those students brought on difficult consequences at the time that they bravely endured. Being the first students to exert Freedom of Choice and attend formerly all-white schools brought on threats, insults and other difficult treatment.

“Not only them, but also their parents,” Smith said. “They had to withstand that and for those students who volunteered to go, their choice would ultimately make everything so much better for everyone who came after – the school system is a lot better off, the parish is a lot better off. Prior to 1965, black youngsters did not have a high school or junior high school to attend here. If they wanted to pursue educational opportunities beyond the sixth grade, they had to leave for New Orleans, Kenner, find those opportunities elsewhere.”

The documentary can be viewed via a link posted on the St. Charles Parish School Board’s website, as well as via YouTube, Vimeo and cable access (Channel 8).

The Supreme Court’s landmark Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka ruling in 1954 declared that public school segregation based on race was unconstitutional. The desegregation movement was a multi-decade effort to reform public school systems nationwide. In a 1955 ruling known as Brown II, the Supreme Court ordered all federal judges to institute nationwide school desegregation “with all deliberate speed.”

In 1965, parents of black children received forms allowing them to transfer their children to any school in the parish, an integration plan known as Freedom of Choice. Approximately 43 black students transferred to previously all-white schools in 1965. In May of 1966, St. Charles Parish was one of just five parishes to voluntarily sign integration compliance agreements. By 1970, schools were fully integrated with the exception of Killona Elementary, which remained a Freedom of Choice school.

moments of our lives for sure.”

Once they arrived at the hospital, they learned he was breathing, but that significant damage was done.

“It took a little bit before we could even see him,” Bailey said. “The nurse told us that, ‘I won’t lie, it’s pretty bad – but he’s alive. He’s alive.’ And that was a relief, but ... it was just horrible.”

Bailey set up a GoFundMe on Oct. 18 (titled “Austin Faust’s medical bills, housing expenses”) when her brother was healing in the hospital, to potentially raise money to help him manage his recovery. But initially there was some hesitation to share the page.

“We went back and forth as to if we should or not ... my mom is not the type of person to want to ask for help and was a bit apprehensive,” Bailey said. “But eventually we posted it ... we don’t know exactly what we’re going to have to deal

with yet as far as his medical bills, but on top of that he can’t work for the foreseeable future. We’re hoping to help him pay his bills and just with whatever he needs to heal.”

Bailey said the family is renting a house in Metairie for Faust currently so he can be close to his doctor for outpatient care.

“This is going to be a long, hard road for him,” Bailey said. “Austin is one of the most kind-hearted and loving kids on this planet and we are very blessed to still have him here with us.”

Bailey said prayers are welcome and appreciated.

“It’s my favorite time of year,” she said.

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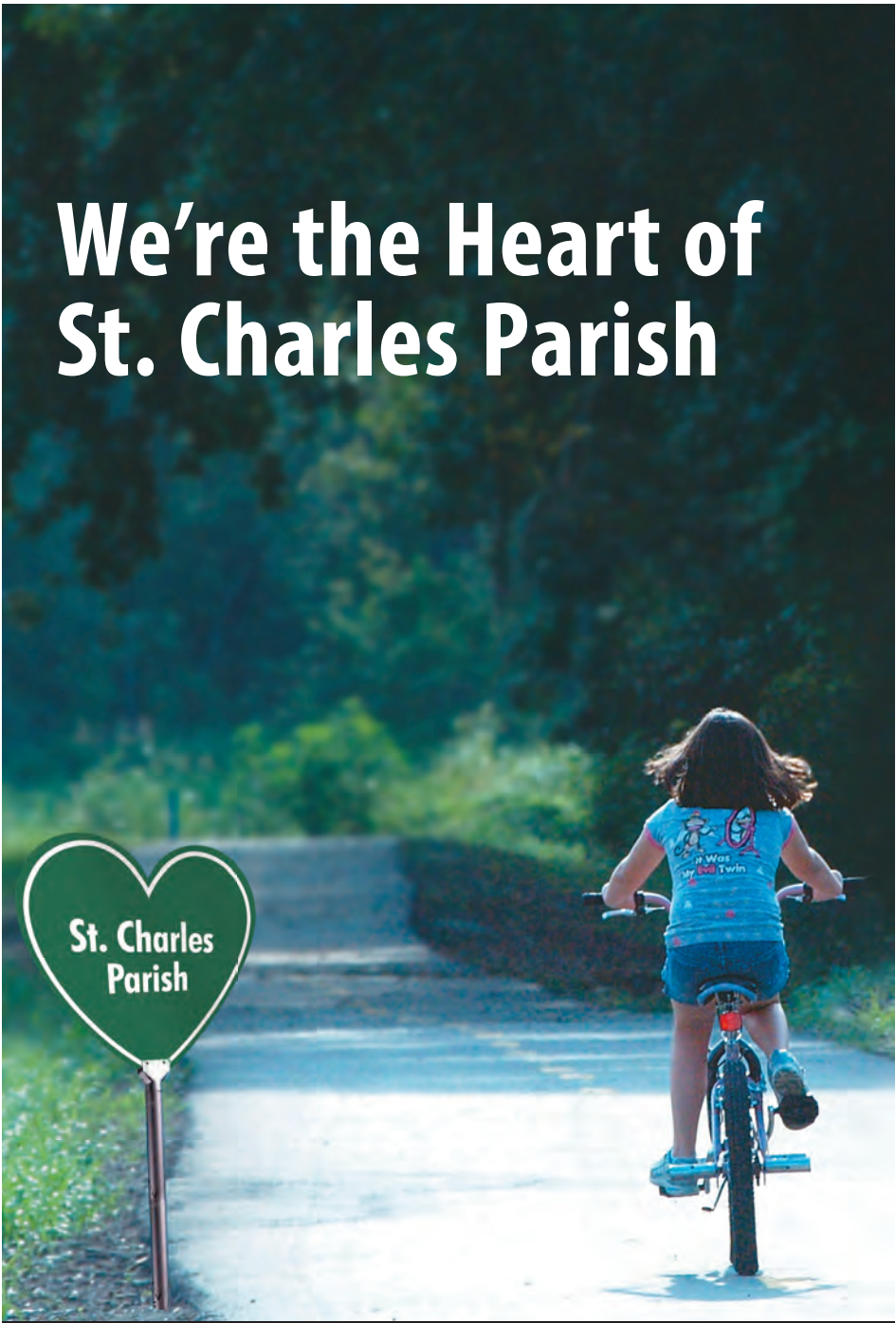

Dutchtown visits Destrehan for second round clash

Dominant Wildcats eye four more wins as playoff run begins

For the first time all season, Destrehan didn't win on Friday night.

Of course, in this one-and-only case that's a positive: the Wildcats earned a bye week in round one of the state playoffs for placing as one of Division I non-select's top four seeds, and enjoyed a week off. Destrehan is still very much unbeaten, and after 10 dominant regular season efforts are about to embark on what the team has been working toward all season, a 2022 postseason run – one that, specifically, ends with a state championship win.

It starts this Friday night as the No. 3 seeded Wildcats (10-0) host former district rival Dutchtown, the No. 14 seed, at 7 p.m. at Wildcat Stadium.

Dutchtown is 7-3 this season following its round one victory over No. 19 seed Parkway, a decisive 42-8 victory. The Griffins broke a scoreless tie in that game with a dominating second quarter, outscoring PHS 28-0 in the quarter to take a lead by that same margin into halftime.

AK Burrell rushed for 141 yards and two touchdowns on just seven carries, while Gary Dukes gained 110 yards and scored twice.

"They played a Parkway team that we feel is pretty talented, and Dutchtown handled them pretty well. It was impressive," said Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott. "But Dutchtown is a good program and they've always done a good job

over there, so we didn't expect anything less than a strong effort."

Dutchtown shared the District 5-5A championship with East Ascension and Denham Springs this season.

The Griffins' record is strong enough on paper, but might not tell the tale entirely. Dutchtown has won seven of its last 8 games after starting the season 0-2, and only one of those wins came in a tight game – a 30-27 win over East Ascension at home in the Griffins' final regular season game.

A change in quarterback helped prompt the streak, as Pierson Parent took the helm after changing positions in the offseason. Parent described himself as having a game somewhat patterned after Taysom Hill in an interview with WBRZ.com – "I try to do exactly what Taysom Hill does pretty much, you know? I try to run the ball as best as I can, make some good reads and try to distribute the ball out whichever whichever way I can."

Scott said Parent, who took over after the team fell to 0-2, makes this team go.

"He's very good," Scott said. "He's a

tremendous athlete with running back skills and who can throw the ball effectively. He's the leader of that group, and he has a group of receivers who make timely plays for them.

Making Parent's job a bit easier is some tremendous firepower alongside him in the backfield in the form of Burrell and Dukes. Burrell plays on defense as well, a playmaker at defensive back. Both play-

than stopping it completely.

"That's tough – nobody's really stopped them all year," Scott said. "We have our hands full."

On defense, Dutchtown has a strong core of linebackers and a good front seven overall. Defensive backs Burrell and Kaden Mackey are two of the team's standouts and can make life tough for an offense.

ers are very capable of taking a carry to the house at any time.

"They're impressive players, impressive athletes. They play multiple tight ends and they look to wear you down – they run the ball well," said Scott. "You have to obviously stay aware of the big play-action pass, which they mix in for big gains."

Scott said it might be more of a matter of slowing the Griffins' rushing attack

"They're interchangeable, and a big part of what they do on defense," Scott said. "Those guys are two of the better athletes we've seen."

At one point, Dutchtown's defense shutout three consecutive opponents in a string of October games. The offense, likewise, has been clicking during this streak, with 27 points or more in each of the seven wins.

Simmons was a warrior in his final game as a Tiger. He made 10 tackles, a whopping six of those for loss, and forced a fumble in Friday’s play-off game at home. The senior has been a cornerstone of the Hahnville defense since his arrival at the school and put together a career to remember.

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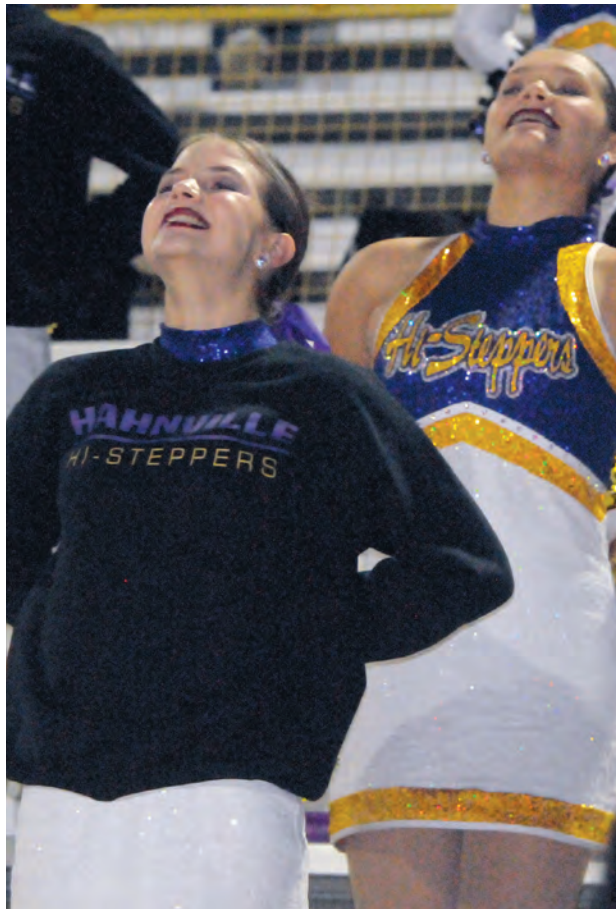
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Hahnville’s season ends in 1st round battle with Ouachita

Young Tigers grew as season progressed, Luquet sees bright future

It was a tale of two halves at Tiger Stadium Friday night. 16th seeded Hahnville stormed out to a 14-0 lead in its opening round playoff battle with visiting No. 17 seed Ouachita Parish, but the Lions fought back – and ultimately a second half in which OPHS outscored Hahnville 22-0 spelled the difference in a 35-21 road victory, bringing Hahnville’s season to an end. Ouachita Parish advances to face No. 1 seed Ruston in round two.

Ouachita entered the game with both quarterback Zach Jackson and running back Carldell Sirmons coming off a Week 10 absence with injury. Both made their presence known throughout the night, however, as did Week 10 breakout star Chaunkiveon Lewis, who rushed for more than 340 yards last week filling in for Sirmons.

“It was a case where we made every throw and made every read we needed to in the first half, and we missed a lot of throws and a lot of reads in the second,” said Hahnville head coach Daniel

season, opening the game with a long passing play as Ryan Gregson connected with Titus White for a 60-yard gain down the middle of the field. Gregson finished the drive off with a touchdown run of 13 yards to make it 7-0.

That deep shot to White was the first of many for a Hahnville offense that sought to attack an Ouachita secondary tasked with covering the Tiger receivers one-on-one as the Lions loaded the box against the run.

The Tigers swarmed to the ball on a second down play for Ouachita and made a key tackle for loss that short-circuited OPHS’ next drive and forced a punt.

Hahnville scored again on the first of several big plays on the night by Dakota Williams. The Louisiana Tech commit made a tremendous adjustment on a deep bomb by Ryan Gregson that resulted in a 45-yard touchdown, putting Hahnville ahead 14-0.

“He’s our best player on the offensive side,” Luquet said of Williams, who erupted statistically in the second half of the season. “Ryan, over the last four or five games, started to get it going down the field and we took some shots – kudos to Dakota, who’s going to have a phenomenal career at Louisiana Tech, he gave ‘em trouble all night.”

After Sirmons’ catch to score and answer, Calvin Smith punched through the line for a big gain out of the Beast formation and got 30 yards to put HHS in scoring position. A near touchdown pass to Romell Hardy was caught but ruled out of bounds on third down, and a 33-yard field goal by Dylan Patterson was tipped at the line and came up short.

Jackson dialed up another big play to pull his team within one, hitting full-back Jamarion Treadway down the seam for a 45-yard touchdown to make it 14-13. Hahnville blocked the point after to maintain a one-point lead.

Just as Hahnville turned to the air more to combat the loaded box Ouachita’s defense presented, the option-based Lions offense was attacking downfield early.

“We knew (Sirmons and Jackson) were banged up. Did we expect them to go to that as early as they did? No ... they got

us for two big plays. (Sirmons) in the slot, he had a groin injury but vertically, he was fine,” Luquet said.

HHS was in business again, this time on a 30-yard completion down the sideline – no adjustment needed this time as Williams hauled in a perfect pass from Gregson to set the Tigers up near the redzone. A few plays later it was Gregson connecting with Williams again for a 30-yard touchdown pass, making it 21-13, a score that held until halftime.

Hahnville drove down into the Ouachita redzone again to begin the third quarter, but stalled out on fourth and two after Ouachita’s Damontae Thomas broke up an attempt to Williams.

Then Lewis got rolling. He made two strong runs to push OPHS into Hahnville territory. Jackson picked up a fourth-and-2 with his legs, then Lewis scored on the next play to make it 21-19. Treadway scored on the two-point conversion try on a blast up the middle.

The Tigers couldn’t get their footing on the next drive, and Lewis made them pay on the next drive with a 54-yard touchdown run that pushed his team ahead 28-21 with eight seconds left in the third quarter.

Hahnville needed a response, but ran into a tough defensive stand by Ouachita – and some unfortunate circumstance. Gregson was tackled and shaken up on a second down, necessitating he miss a third-and-long play. White came on in relief and was hit by several defenders at the line on a rush attempt – it resulted in a leg injury and White was forced to miss the rest of the game.

Hahnville punted and Sirmons returned it to the Hahnville 27, threatening to all but put the game away. The Tigers defense got a much-needed stop and forced a turnover on downs. But Ouachita’s pass rush got to Gregson and likewise forced a Hahnville punt – and this time, Lewis put his team up two touchdowns after a big run into the HHS redzone and an 11-yard touchdown run.

HHS drove down to the Ouachita redzone, with time ticking away on their season. But with just under four minutes left, Gregson’s 4th down pass for Hardy

in the endzone fell incomplete, and the Tigers’ season was all but over.

Though a painful loss for Hahnville, the young Tigers battled through the loss of its starting quarterback and several tough setbacks throughout the season to enter the playoffs playing its best football.

“We have resilient young men who play football here,” said Luquet. “We’ve lost people over the last couple years and we’ve had guys stepping up. No matter who we lose, I know I have guys who practice hard every day, who do what they need to do in the classroom – it’s a phenomenal group. I know they’re hurting, but they’ve done what they needed to do this year to get us going in the right direction.”

Gregson, a junior who found himself thrust into the lineup as starter after

Donovan Friloux’s season-ending injury in the preseason jamboree, started to find himself in the second half of the season. Through his first six games, Gregson had thrown one touchdown pass. Over the past five, he’s thrown 12 and rushed for another.

“He has done a fantastic job this year – the offseason is going to be huge for him and for our other young guys,” Luquet said. “This is a team that grew really well over the course of the season, and the future is bright ... it didn’t go the way we hoped tonight in the second half, but our guys fought all night.”

Luquet. “There wasn’t a lot they were doing defensively that could stop us in the first half. They made some adjustments, as a good football team does, and I felt we made some too, but the biggest thing is in the first half, we played well offensively and kept them off the field. In the second half, we missed on too many chances.”

It was Jackson and Sirmons who got Ouachita on the board first, their long touchdown connection cutting Hahnville’s lead to 14-7 late in the first quarter.

But it was Lewis who took over the game in the second half, scoring three times, including a 54-yard touchdown that put Ouachita (6-5) ahead for the first time, and for good.

Slow starts have plagued Hahnville (6-5) in a handful of games this season, but Friday night did not represent another example – the Tigers got off to as hot a start as they’ve had in a game this

WHEREAS, a waiver from the landscaping requirements in Section VIII does not affect the buffer requirements for commercial sites in the C-3 zoning district.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE ST CHARLES PARISH COUNCIL hereby endorses a waiver from all landscape requirements listed in Zoning Ordinance, Section VIII. Site design requirements, D. Landscaping requirements, as requested by Dirt Worx Rentals, LLC for Triple MBM Properties, to approve the special permit for an equipment rental and repair business with fleet management and outdoor storage in a C-3 zoning district, subject to stipulations required by the Planning and Zoning Commission at their regular meeting on October 13, 2022.

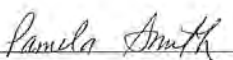

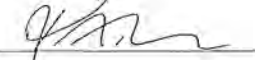
