The Dat Dads' Club was back in action this year for the first time since Hurricane Ida and COVID-19 for its annual cookoff fundraiser for United Way. The club also held its golf tournament fundraiser for three beneficiaries in need, earning \$20,000 to go toward their medical and other expenses.

Adams, through the St. Charles Parish District Attorney's Office where he works as an investigator, was part of a team that cooked for Hogs for the Cause, an annual event raising money to help children fighting pediatric brain cancer.

Dat Dads' Club held its first fundraising event in 2017. It was established by a group of friends who decided to form a group that would help families in need.

Jackson volunteers with Matthew 25:35 and just recently delivered 670 pounds of food donated by local schools to the food pantry to help feed the hungry for Thanksgiving.

She says the most rewarding thing is the chance to let people know "we're there for you" and that someone cares.

"I see people from all walks of life who need help and it just makes me think, how can I help them? Who else needs my help and what can I do for them? It motivates me to do more ... it doesn't take much to help somebody, to put a smile on their face. If you see somebody in need and you can do something, then why not? Boutte Community Outreach

Diggs is the founder of the Boutte Community Outreach Program, a neighborhood drop-in center that provides community-based services for at-risk youth. Programs include an after-school activity center, computer lab, summer enrichment program, and specialized programs for citizens of St. Charles Parish from toddlers to seniors.

Funded through United Way St. Charles and South Central Louisiana Human Services Authority, Diggs said the outreach program is looking for ways to expand into mental health help for local residents.

Diggs, a member of Mt. Zion Community Church, said the free tutoring that the outreach program is known for will return in January. The service has been suspended since Hurricane Ida because of damage to the building.

Retired from Valero

Other organizations and causes that Cheramie has been involved with include the Valero fishing tournament, St. John United Way and Help Dat Foundation. He has received numerous leadership awards.

Rogers has been an integral part of Matthew 25:35 - a local non-profit that services the St. Charles Parish community by providing food bag programs, congregate meals, and nutrition and educational services - since she moved to St. Charles Parish in 2020.

"I had just moved here and I had previously served at other food pantries and wanted to get connected to the community," she said. "It has been a wonderful and eye-opening experience, and I've gotten to meet a lot of people."

Rogers said she often serves at the organization with her husband and teenagers. Most recently the family helped to distribute Thanksgiving baskets to nearly 300 local families - a distribution which Rogers ran. Rogers runs her own consulting business, which gives her flexibility to volunteer. She is also involved with Gracepoint Church, Friends of the Library and River Region Ballet.

Hoeft and his volunteer group with International Orthodox Christian Charities traveled to Louisiana, and St. Charles Parish specifically, in the wake of Hurricane Ida to lend a helping hand. They've lived here ever since, for more than a calendar year, helping to rebuild the area and help local residents return to normal.

They worked on approximately 75 homes a month, gutting them and preparing them to rebuild. He said the rebuilding process is on for several homes, with many more to come. "The need is coming in." The group brings these homes back to livable conditions, including work on drywall, insulation, doors, cabinets, etc.

The group works with the Longterm Recovery Committee of St. Charles Parish to determine where assistance is most needed.

"We were on a conference call and we knew many groups were already headed out to different areas getting media attention ... we asked, 'What parish is not receiving what it needs right now?' and were immediately told St. Charles Parish. A lot of help was needed ... the rewarding part is being able to give someone a sense of direction and some hope, when they see insulation put in after looking at a gutted house for so long and start to think, 'Wow, this is really happening.'"

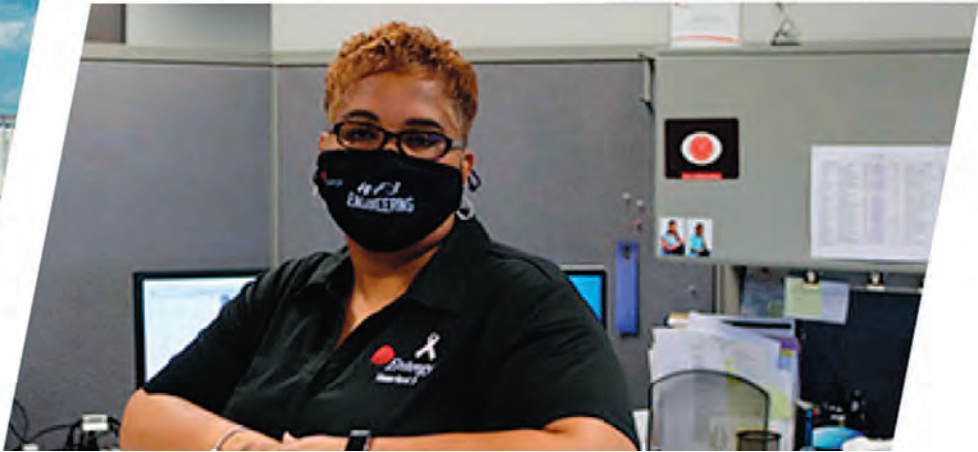

The community services team worked with Ameriprise Financial Services and a group of volunteers to make more than 300 Thanksgiving baskets for local families in need.

Destrehan travels back to Reserve for rematch with ESJ

Winner advances to the state semifinals

Less than a month following their District 7-5A determining showdown, Destrehan and East St. John are preparing to face one another one more time this Friday night.

The River Parish rivals will collide again in Reserve, this time in the Division I non-select quarterfinals as No. 3 seed Destrehan visits East

St. John with a trip to the state semifinals on the line. East St. John will host the game as the lower seed because it traveled to Haughton in round two, while Destrehan hosted its round two victory over Dutchtown.

Destrehan (11-0) won the last meeting between the teams in lopsided fashion. DHS coach Marcus Scott said his team knows East St. John (11-1) will be determined to make sure that doesn’t happen again, and that what was a wild, play-off-like atmosphere a few weeks ago will be all the more intense. Handling that scenario with a level head is the challenge Destrehan must take on,

he said. “Being able to settle down as fast as possible and just play,” said Scott, who is 2-0 at Destrehan

in the quarterfinal round. “We’ve talked to them about recognizing the big picture ... it’s about playing to a standard and continuing to improve each week, even this deep into the season. There’s still a lot of improvement to be had.

“It should be another big crowd, just like the last time. Our focus doesn’t change – we’re preparing for a good opponent and we need to go out there with our best effort ... this is a rematch and this one is certainly under different circumstances. We’re familiar with each other. We’re expecting a tough, very competitive game.”

Last week, No. 27 Haughton – which upset

No. 6 Airline in round one – rallied from a 14-0 deficit to tie East St. John at 14. From there, though, ESJ scored 21 unanswered

points to seize control and advance, 35-21. ESJ’s Yashua Mitchell passed for 268 yards with two touchdowns and two

interceptions in the win.

East St. John returned 15 starters from its squad a year ago. Eight of those 15 come from the defensive side, where head coach Brandon Brown has developed a reputation for his stoppers as a hard-hitting, stingy group from year to year. The team’s talented front includes end Elijah Frank, a strong pass-rushing force. Dwayne Brown plays all over the field as a safety, corner and linebacker depending on the play.

On offense, Mitchell is having a tremendous season at quarterback. Mitchell took over at quarterback for the Wildcats at midseason a year ago, but was injured in Week 9. Since his return, he has fulfilled the high expectations the program has had for him.

“That kid is going to make plays,” said Scott. “He’s a good player. You can try your best to limit him, but you also know they have good players, good coaches and they’re going to make adjustments.”

running back Cortez Fisher has been a cornerstone of this offense for awhile now, and this season he is complimented by the hard-running George Martin. Tight end Devin Davis is a big target and weapon down the seam. D'hki Joseph can really run at wide receiver, as can Koyal Gray, who can score from anywhere on the field – in Week 5 at Hahnville, Gray scored touchdowns of 41 and 95 yards off Mitchell passes. In the matchup between DHS and ESJ in Week 9, Gray got loose for another 32-yard score. ESJ also has a strong, experienced offensive line.

In the teams’ Week 9 showdown, Destrehan stunned the sold-out crowd in Reserve by immediately seizing control of what became a 48-7 district championship sealing win, scoring all 48 of its points prior to halftime. In a game that many predicted would be the first of the season to see a team take No. 1 ranked Destrehan into the fourth quarter of a tight game, instead Destrehan all but ended the matter in less than a quarter. Shane Lee’s second of three touchdowns on the night with eight seconds left in the opening quarter gave Destrehan a 28-7 lead.

At approximately two minutes into the game, Destrehan led 14-0. DHS scored touchdowns on three of its first four offensive plays, including three straight plays resulting in a touchdown. 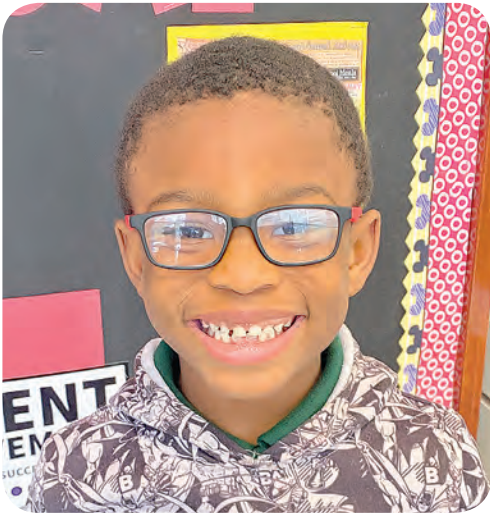

Are you Experiencing Symptoms of a Sinus Infection?

Ever have a stuffy or runny nose that won't go away, or a postnasal drip combined with a feeling of pain or pressure in your face? Those symptoms might indicate that you have a sinus infection. Additional symptoms of a sinus infection include headache, sore throat, cough and bad breath.

Sinuses are air-filled cavities, and we have four pairs on the right and left sides of our face. Frontal sinuses are located right behind the forehead, maxillary sinuses are behind your cheeks, and sphenoid and ethmoid sinuses are located deeper in your skull behind your eyes.

Sinuses are hollow, but they are lined with cells that secrete mucous. The mucous helps nasal passageways to work properly. But problems can happen when the small air passageways into the sinuses, called ostia, get blocked. When the ostia are blocked, air can't get in, and mucous can't get out. Germs can then build up in that blocked fluid. That's called sinusitis.

Sinusitis, or sinus infections, can be acute, occurring suddenly for a few days, or chronic, continuing for at least a few weeks. Sinus infections are common and are caused by viruses, bacteria, fungi, mold, allergies and autoimmune reactions.

If you have facial pain, pressure or headache; symptoms that get worse after initially improving; symptoms lasting longer than 10 days with no improvement; or fever for three or four days, see your doctor. If you have other symptoms that are concerning you, do not hesitate to see a doctor.

Many sinus infections can clear up without

antibiotics. It's important to discuss this with your doctor. Using antibiotics when they are not necessary can have negative consequences, such as skin rashes and antibiotic-resistant infections. Often, sinus infections go away on their own. Therefore, a doctor might use a "watchful waiting" strategy, which may involve monitoring symptoms for two or three days to see they can improve with bed rest, increased fluids and over-the-counter pain relievers.

If symptoms haven't improved after a period of time, your doctor might then prescribe antibiotics.

Other home remedies that can help include warm compresses placed on the face to help relieve sinus pressure, over-the-counter nasal decongestants or saline nasal spray and taking a hot, steamy shower, or breathing in steam from a bowl of hot water.

Sinus infections are no fun. To reduce your risk of getting sick, don't smoke and avoid second-hand smoke whenever possible, wash your hands thoroughly, avoid close contact with people who have colds and other respiratory symptoms and get your recommended vaccines.

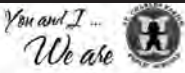

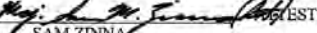
