Owner seeks answers regarding dog's mysterious death

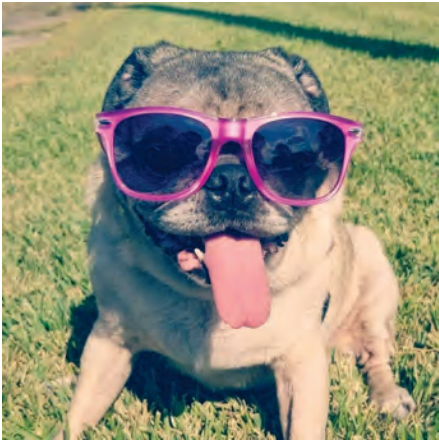

Former DHS, NFL star named head coach of college football team

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Pro Football Hall of Famer and Destrehan High alum Ed Reed will be manning the sideline in a new role next football season - as the head coach of a college program.

Bethune-Cookman University came to terms with Reed last week to make him the 16th head coach in its program's history. For Reed, it's a significant move up the ladder in the coaching fraternity. Reed has been part of the University of Miami's program for the past three seasons in a support staff role, most recently as a senior football advisor. In 2016, Reed was the school's defensive backs coach.

Last week, Miami athletic director Dan Radakovich praised Reed for serving as a strong mentor to the Hurricanes' athletes during his time with the school.

Now, Reed moves on to - once again - be a Wildcat.

The BCU Wildcats will be looking to Reed to turn recent struggles around after back-to-back 2-9 seasons under former coach Terry Sims.

A logical conclusion could be the school is hoping Reed can do for Bethune-Cookman what another former superstar NFL defensive back did for another HBCU school over the past few years - Deion Sanders, who led Jackson State to success before accepting the head coaching job at the University of Colorado last month.

Bethune-Cookman has won six MEAC championships since 2000 despite its recent struggles.

Reed has never strayed far from his hometown for too long, holding an annual football camp at Destrehan for

St. Charles businessman helps parents restore videos of son who passed away

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When Steve and Shana Acosta got into their car in Ponchatoula to drive and meet Mason Dauphin in St. Charles Parish, all they could hope and pray for was the best.

"I had a friend direct me to Mason on Facebook," Shana remembers. "I've needed to convert tapes for years - a mix of holidays, birthdays, and other special occasions. When we first met Mason we were excited to see what magic he could work. He was so kind and enthusiastic to help us preserve our memories. You could tell he genuinely wanted to help us."

Shana said that Dauphin initially had no idea what kind of footage he was converting.

"I was so eager to get these videos," she said.

Dauphin, born and raised in St. Charles Parish, started Dauphin Media, LLC a couple of years ago as a side business where he works digitizing analog media like VHS. He said he remembers originally thinking it was odd for the Acostas to want to drive the footage over instead of mailing it in, but then they told him they were too nervous to have the tapes lost or damaged in the mail.

"The first day he had our tapes he sent me a picture and it was of our son Logan at four months old," Shana said. "These memories are especially close to our hearts. Logan went home to be with our Heavenly Father in January of 2011. He was five and a half years old. To have Mason take such good care of these tapes and convert them to digital for us means the world to us. I guess it is no coincidence that Logan and Mason share the same birthday."

Shana said having the video memories converted by Dauphin has made their memories of Logan more vivid.

"It's like he's with us," she said of Logan. "We always talk about him, but to see these videos and see him through his stages ... we laugh and we cry and we have them to share now."

Dauphin said the experience of meeting the Acostas and getting to help them couldn't have come at a better time in his professional journey, as he had been feeling stretched too thin by running the small business and working his daytime job as well.

"It broke my heart and it inspired me to keep the business going," he said of the Acosta's story. "It made me feel like, ok ... I'm not just converting my time into money. I'm genuinely helping people in a way that I never dreamed I would."

Dauphin said he'll never forget the Acosta's initial reaction to seeing the first converted file.

"They just texted me so many times and told me that they had broke down crying when they saw that photo," he said. "It broke my heart. I finished them as quickly as I could. They were able to get hours of memories."

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Former DHS teacher arrested

Sheriff's Office not releasing additional details at this time

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The investigation against Kyle Aucoin-Melohn, a former teacher at Destrehan High School whose employment ended in early December, is ongoing following his Dec. 27 arrest.

Aucoin-Melohn was arrested by the St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office on one count of prohibited sexual conduct between an educator and student and one count of molestation of a juvenile. He bonded out on Dec. 29. His bond was set at \$200,000.

According to the SCP SO, Aucoin-Melohn, 32, allegedly had inappropriate sexual contact with a male DHS student. The alleged contact occurred from 2017-2020 at the school when the student was 16 and 17 years old.

The contact was first reported to the sheriff's office through an anonymous tip on Dec. 1, and the office said through investigation detectives obtained sufficient probable cause to obtain an arrest warrant for Aucoin-Melohn.

Reports have swirled on social media that other victims have since come forward and alleged similar behavior from Aucoin-Melohn.

"At this time we are not releasing any more details," Amanda Pertuis, the sheriff's office's public information officer, replied when

asked about those reports.

The sheriff's office did say that the investigation is being conducted with the full cooperation of St. Charles Parish Public Schools.

Christmas tree pickup to aid in wetland protection

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St. Charles Parish residents can now recycle their Christmas trees for coastal restoration.

From now until Jan. 26 residents can drop off their trees at the East and West Bank Bridge Parks. Curbside pickup will be available for residents from January 9-26.

Parish officials noted that all trees should be stripped of ornaments, lights, and stands. The recycling program is for non-flocked, non-painted trees. No artificial trees will be accepted, and the trees should not be bagged.

Planning Administrator Earl Matherne said the ready availability of Christmas trees and their bushy nature makes them ideal for coastal restoration efforts.

"Additionally, it keeps them from going into the landfill, so it has that environmental benefit too ... because the trees come from people's homes, it's a direct way for folks to participate in the project," he said.

St. Charles Parish has been reusing Christmas trees for coastal restoration since 1987. Unlike other trees, Christmas trees are large and lightweight and allow the movement of water and sediment without being a barrier. The organic limbs also provide an ideal fisheries habitat, and the brush fences that are created by the trees allow the creation of marsh habitat and provide an effective wave break and increased water clarity.

Man convicted in deadly boating accident urges others not to drink and drive

My name is Kevin Comardelle. This is not an easy letter to write as I am the type of person that keeps my emotions bottled up. However, my hope is that something positive for our community can be achieved by me speaking out in this way.

In March of 2020 I received my first DUI arrest. This should have served as a warning for me of the dangers and potential devastating ramifications of drinking and driving. Unfortunately, it did not. I promptly signed up for the Alcohol Diversion program, but before I had a chance to begin the program, July 4, 2020 rolled around, and I made the most catastrophic mistake a person could ever make. When you are young, you feel invincible, you feel like nothing can ever happen to you. The purpose of this letter is to tell you that it can – and will, if you make a decision to drink and drive.

My decision to drink and drive led to a serious boating accident that took the life of another human being and caused serious injuries to the occupants of the other boat, as well as to myself. I catapulted them, their families and friends, as well as mine, into the worse nightmare you could ever imagine. I will not attempt to speak of their pain, as that is their story to tell. I will tell you that my physical injuries were extensive and there are things that I can no longer do physically. But my physical injuries pale in comparison to trying to cope emotionally with the horror that I caused others.

I am writing this letter with the sincere hope that in your everyday lives and especially with the upcoming Holiday Season, it will motivate others to take a step back and REALLY, REALLY, think about the tragic and horrifying consequences drinking and driving can and will do to all involved. And when you think about it, you must be completely honest with yourself. Imagine for just 1 minute what you think it would feel like knowing that your decisions led to a horrific accident that caused the death of another human being. It is the most all-consuming, heart wrenching, gut gnawing, mournful feeling one human being can feel for another and their families and friends. When your 1 minute of imagining this scenario for yourself is up, you will be greatly relieved that it didn't really happen to you but know that this is what I live with every second of every day, and it will surely remain with me forever. Once again, I sincerely apologize to all that have been impacted by this horrific accident. I hope that you can find it in your heart to accept my apology. I never intended to hurt anyone, and never would intentionally cause anyone pain. That is why drinking and driving is so dangerous - it leads to unintended consequences.

My hope is that no one else ever experiences such a tragedy. Unfortunately, no matter how often it's wished, there is absolutely nothing that I can do to change what happened that tragic night. The most I can do at this point is to pay my debt to society and pray that all involved can find a little bit of peace. I am hoping that by having this letter printed, it will help prevent others in our community from making the same mistakes I made. If you have been drinking any amount of alcohol, do not fool yourself into thinking that you are "okay" to drive. Drinking, driving and operating any type of motorized vehicle, whether it is on the highway or the waterway, can lead to deadly and catastrophic consequences that will forever change the lives of all involved.

who they were or where they were, but it would have meant a lot to find them ... I feel like this is something we were able to do together.”

Loupe found these pictures on the side of the road in the immediate wake of Katrina. It was clear these pictures would have plenty of sentimental value to the people who had lost them - there were older pictures and photos of loved ones sharing good times together, including extra special occasions - several were from a wedding, including posed shots of the bride and groom.

One read “Yours forever, Lillian.” There are baby photos and those of winter fun with snowmen.

“He’d asked me to do it a long time ago, but I never had the time,” Usea said.

After rediscovering the photos, however, she made the time and had the inspiration to make her father’s wishes into reality.

That she did.

“I had a lot of help,” Usea said. “Once I posted it online, it didn’t take long. People really wanted to help.”

Usea posted a collection of the photos with the message: “Ok this is a long shot. My daddy had found some pictures on

the highway after Katrina ... I would love to return them to the rightful owners. I will make this public and wish that everyone help me make his dream come true.”

Once she was connected with the family, she felt plenty of emotion - both her own and from a recipient of such a tremendous Christmas gift. Kevin Dumas’ father, aunt and grandparents - Frank and Lillian Dumas - are in the photos Loupe found.

Last week, Dumas met Usea in person and retrieved the photos.

“He was choking up,” Usea said, noting that she is hoping to be able to meet in person with the family sometime soon. “There were things they learned about their family they didn’t know before that they learned from those photos. That they had a restaurant - they had no idea.”

She was also able to speak on the phone with other members of the family and said she could feel their excitement.

It made Usea feel good to be able to help. Most of all, though, this was for her father, her tribute to a man who exuded generosity and kindness on a daily basis.

“This is his doing ... I just feel so blessed to be able to finish what he started,” Usea said. “I could feel him with me, and that was the best feeling in the world.”

She was able to leave a triumphant message on her Facebook page following her discovery.

“Dad, I finished your project. I found them.”

She is preceded in death by her parents, Riece and Garnet Simoneaux.

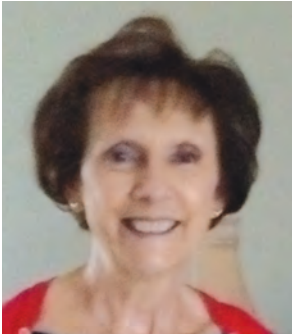

we had electricity. The electricity we had was one light bulb hanging from the ceiling in each room. We also had running water, but no inside bathroom until I was grown – like 18.”

The introduction of a 10-inch box fan to his family’s home is something he remembers fondly.

“We thought we had died and gone to heaven,” Coleman said chuckling, adding that it is strange to look around his home and realize that the majority of things in it – such as the microwave, air conditioning, refrigerator and television – were all invented after he was born.

“In 1937 we got a radio and I got to listen to LSU football games on WWL,” he said. “I became a fan ... I still am a fan.”

Coleman entered the Air Corps – now known as the Air Force – in 1943 at the age of 20.

“Most my of time served was in the South Pacific,” he said. “I was discharged in 1945.”

After his time in the service Coleman met and married Georgia, his wife of 74 years. Like him she grew up in Central.

“We had a good life together,” he said, adding that the couple raised a son and daughter. “People tell me I’m lucky and I say, ‘No, I’m blessed.’ I have been a true believing Christian for a long time and God has really,

really blessed me in a lot of ways. I think I’m blessed beyond belief.”

Career changes brought the Colemans around the United States until his job with Union Carbide transferred him to St. Charles Parish in the 1960s.

“The thing about here - the climate is horrible but the people are great,” he said of Louisiana.

Coleman lives alone in the Luling home that he and Georgia built. He said he misses his wife greatly since her death three years ago, but that that his five grandchildren, seven great grandchildren and two great-great grandchildren keep his spirits high – as do the LSU Tigers.

“This week I bought a new 75-inch TV ... I was going to buy the 100-inch to match my age but decided against it,” he said laughing. “I watch LSU on it and a lot of football.”

Council on Aging delivers meals five days a week and offers house cleaning once a week for Coleman, who said he has no intention of going anywhere.

“I plan on being right here,” he said laughing from his kitchen table. “My sister is 102 ... that’s why I splurged and bought the big TV.”

On Dec. 26 Guasp went to work and received a call that still haunts her.

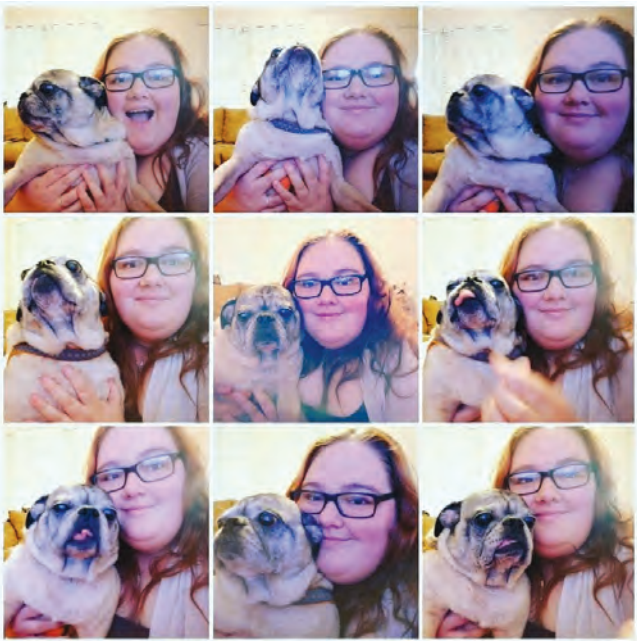
“It was so hard for me to go to work, but my husband and family took to foot that day to look for him,” she said. “I got a call around 9 a.m. from the Luling animal shelter. She asked me if I was missing Dexter and told me he was struck by a vehicle and didn’t make it.”

Guasp said while she is thankful that someone found Dexter and brought him in to the shelter so that she could be notified, she and her family are baffled on how Dexter – a 13-year-old deaf dog with arthritis, bad eye sight and only one eye – was found 17 miles from his home.

“I’m thinking someone possibly picked him up and took him home and maybe he got out their yard,” she said. “I am just trying to figure out what happened to my boy. I’m just trying to get closure. I’m devastated that my baby died alone and in the cold.”

Guasp said she and her family are distraught.

“As soon as I saw his face I just absolutely fell in love with him,” she remembers of first seeing the post about Dexter’s need



for adoption. “I knew he was meant to be in our family. He was just such a sweet, little old man ... a ball of energy. I just knew he should be mine. He was my buddy. He followed me around ... he was just my little shadow. I just feel broken without him.”

Guasp said she is blaming herself for Dexter’s disappearance.

“I’m beating myself up. He wasn’t wearing his collar because he had a bad cough from his collapsed trachea,” she said. “I regret that immensely. My assumption is somebody picked him up and either dumped him or somebody picked him up and maybe he escaped their backyard. I’ve ran through so many scenarios. I don’t understand how anyone could hit an animal and just leave. My fear is that someone did it on purpose, but my hope is that they didn’t.”

Guasp said she has been contacted by people who say they saw Dexter roaming in St. Rose.

“He wasn’t just a dog ... he was our family,” she said. “I would like some type of justice.”

young players. In the summer of 2021, he was on hand to officially open Parquet Park, a St. Rose playground for local children that he named for his longtime mentor, Benjamin Parquet. Reed drove the project for some time due to his belief that a park would provide a positive outlet for the community’s youth and a diversion from dangerous activities.

At his Hall of Fame enshrinement, Reed recalled meeting Parquet at the age of 16, and said that ever since he’s been an important influence on his life.

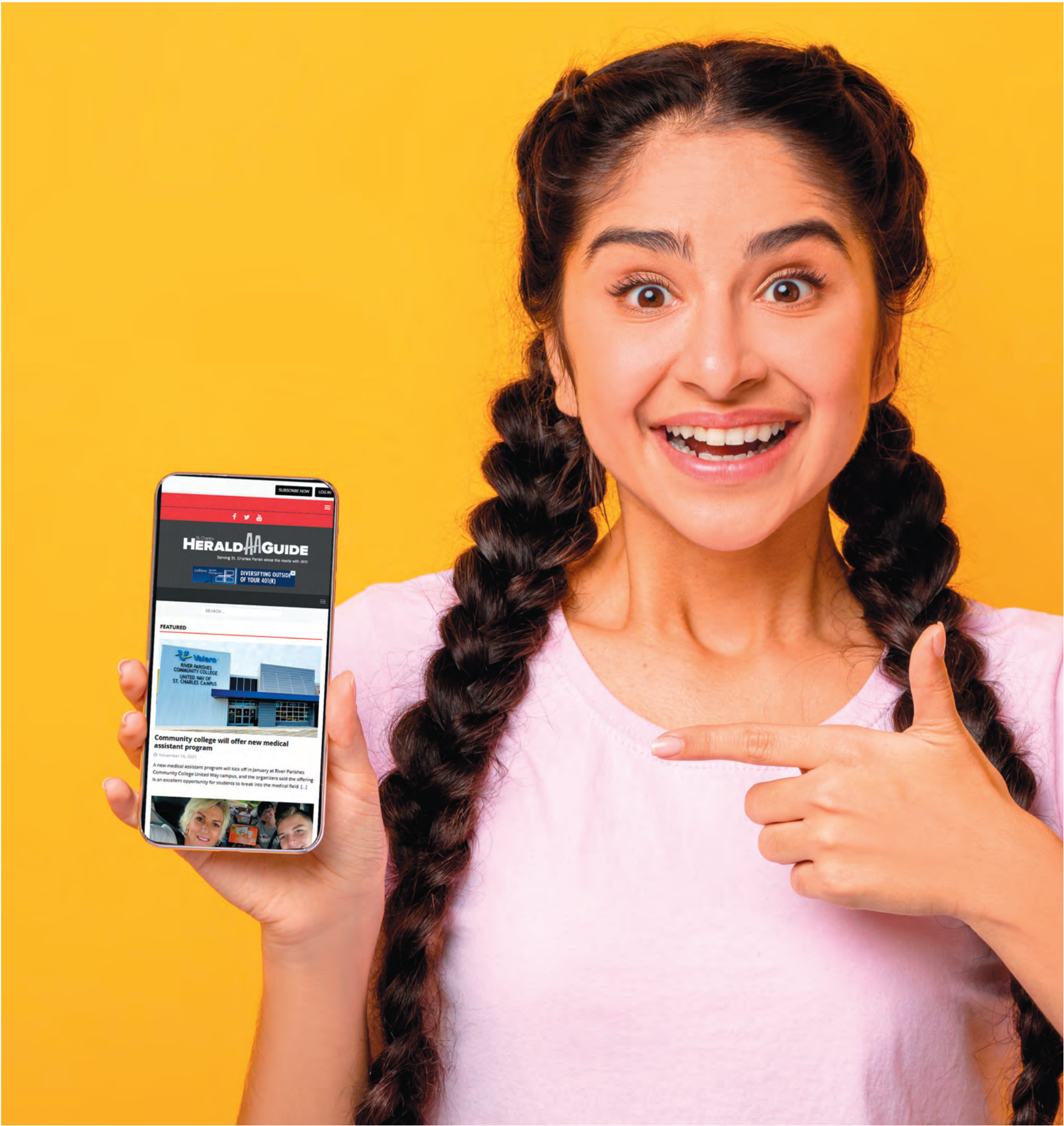
“He still slaps me on my chest to this day ... my mentor,” Reed said. “He’s 80 years old and still does the same thing ... Mr. Parquet and Mrs. Parquet, I love y’all. I wouldn’t be here if not for you. A Hall of Fame mentor, there’s no doubt.”

On the football field, Reed was known as a terror and perhaps the

greatest ballhawk in league history.

Reed played for the Baltimore Ravens, Houston Texans and New York Jets during his career, best known for his years in Baltimore. He played 12 years in the NFL — 11 of those with the Ravens after he was selected by the team in the first round of the 2002 NFL Draft.

He won championships at the pro and college level. Reed was named 2004 Defensive Player of the Year and was a 9-time Pro Bowler in the NFL. He was the first player in NFL history to return interception, punt, blocked punt and fumble for touchdowns and he recorded 1,590 career yards on interception returns.

"Anytime we play Destrehan, especially now, there are so many different emotions that come with this game," Jasmine said. "We wanted to play fast early – I thought that would settle our guys down and let them get into the game. We know one of their main sources of offense is on second chance points, but that meant once we rebounded it, we had a chance to push the ball.

"We knew it would take a strong effort to come in and beat Destrehan. It's always a good, tough battle."

And this was the kind of night Lumar relishes.

"I love it. (The crowd) brings the energy to me," Lumar said. "I love playing against rivals, in front of big crowds. It's great."

His shot began to fall in the second half - "Coach told me to keep shooting. Shooters always shoot, I did, and I knocked them down" - but his ability

But Lumar answered with a 3 of his own with 15 seconds left, pushing the lead back to nine entering the fourth.

That served as something of a turning point in Hahnville's favor, as some mistakes began to pile up for the Wildcats. Lumar scored a bucket and drew a foul – on top of the basket, Destrehan was called for a technical foul, which added up to two more free throws and possession for Hahnville. Lumar sank two of three to make it 53-40. Thomas scored in

transition off a turnover, but Destrehan did not have another run in them on this night. With HHS up by 10, Lumar and Tyray Bartholomew scored back-to-back baskets to push the lead to 14, and the game was all but decided.

Jasmine said the Tigers built their schedule to prepare them for the stretch and potential playoff run. Lumar echoed that.

Tigers outlast Wildcats to move to 3-0 in 7-5A

A rising Destrehan squad battled hard against rival Hahnville on Tuesday night, but the Lady Tigers' defense proved the difference in a 41-33 victory that pushed HHS to 3-0 in District 7-5A play.

Saige Stewart scored 16 and Dihlynn Mitchell scored 10 to lead the Tigers. Paige Friloux added 8. For the Wildcats, Koi Ursin scored 16 to lead her team while Amaya Armstrong added 11.

Playing without a pair of starters in Ryli Martin and Alaejah Jupiter, the Tigers needed others to step up to fill the void. That they did.

"I think we came out with a lot of nerves in the beginning ... down two people in your lineup, you're stressing whether you can pull it off," said HHS head coach Arrianna Smith. "The girls did an excellent job tonight. Saige I thought did well and really impacted us on defense. Dihlynn Mitchell played really well. Really, team wide,

everyone played together and we came out with the win."

The Tigers (11-7) dug in defensively in the third quarter after a strong first half led Destrehan to carry a 19-17 lead into halftime. Hahnville held the Wildcats scoreless in the third quarter, outscoring DHS 16-0 to seize control of the game.

"I think we've been communicating better on defense and getting a lot of stops – and that opens things up for us to score," said Stewart.

Stewart said her team kept its composure in front of a rowdy rivalry game crowd.

"We didn't let that get to us," she said.

Once HHS made its run, Smith said she felt good entering the fourth but also understood Destrehan wasn't going to go away easily.

"The third was that turning point and we held after that, but we know Destrehan will keep fighting, so we had to do the same," Smith said.

HHS will face East St.

John Friday night in a key district matchup.

Destrehan, meanwhile, has made a big leap this season under first-year Wildcats head coach Twalla Powell. The Wildcats are 11-7 thus far with a 1-2 mark in 7-5A play, after winning nine games over the entirety of last season.

Powell said on Tuesday, her team executed early but once Hahnville started gaining steam, it was difficult to reclaim that level of play.

"They came out in the second half and hit a couple of threes ... we lost momentum and momentum is everything in this game," Powell said.

On the season, though, the Wildcats have plenty of momentum.

"We've gone all out at practice and stress to the girls to play hard, smart and together," Powell said. "We did a lot of strength training in the offseason and I think that helped. We've been more focused and in the moment."

from our mistakes and make it 1-1 in district this Friday when we play H.L. Bourgeois."

Carroll noted this was one of the best nights rebounding the basketball his team has had all season.

"They get up for Hahnville," said Carroll. "We preached all week about rebounding ... there's the good and bad with that, because you see them get up for Hahnville, but my thing as their coach is I want them to bring that every single game."

Moore, Carroll added, has done a tremendous job taking on a major leadership role on the court this season.

"He's a senior who has stepped into a position we needed help with, after losing our point guard early this season," said Carroll. "Chris has stepped up big for us."

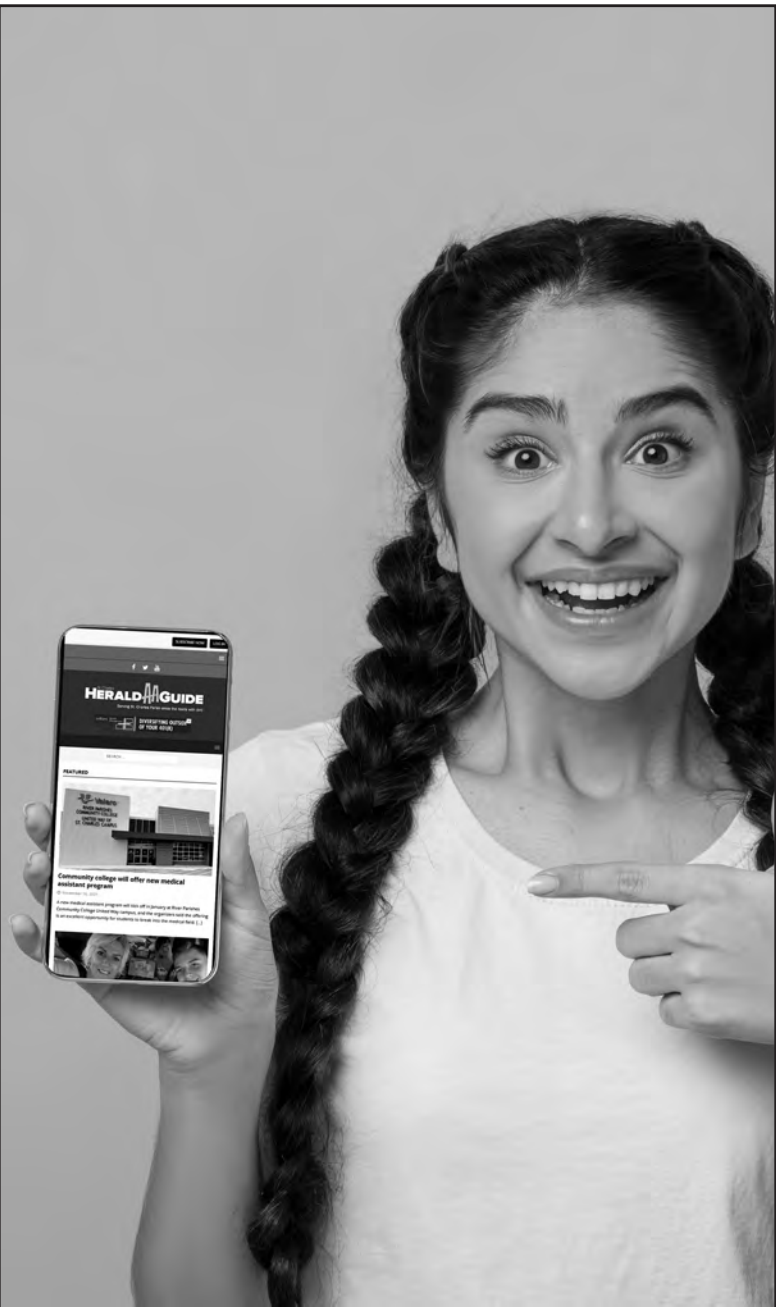
