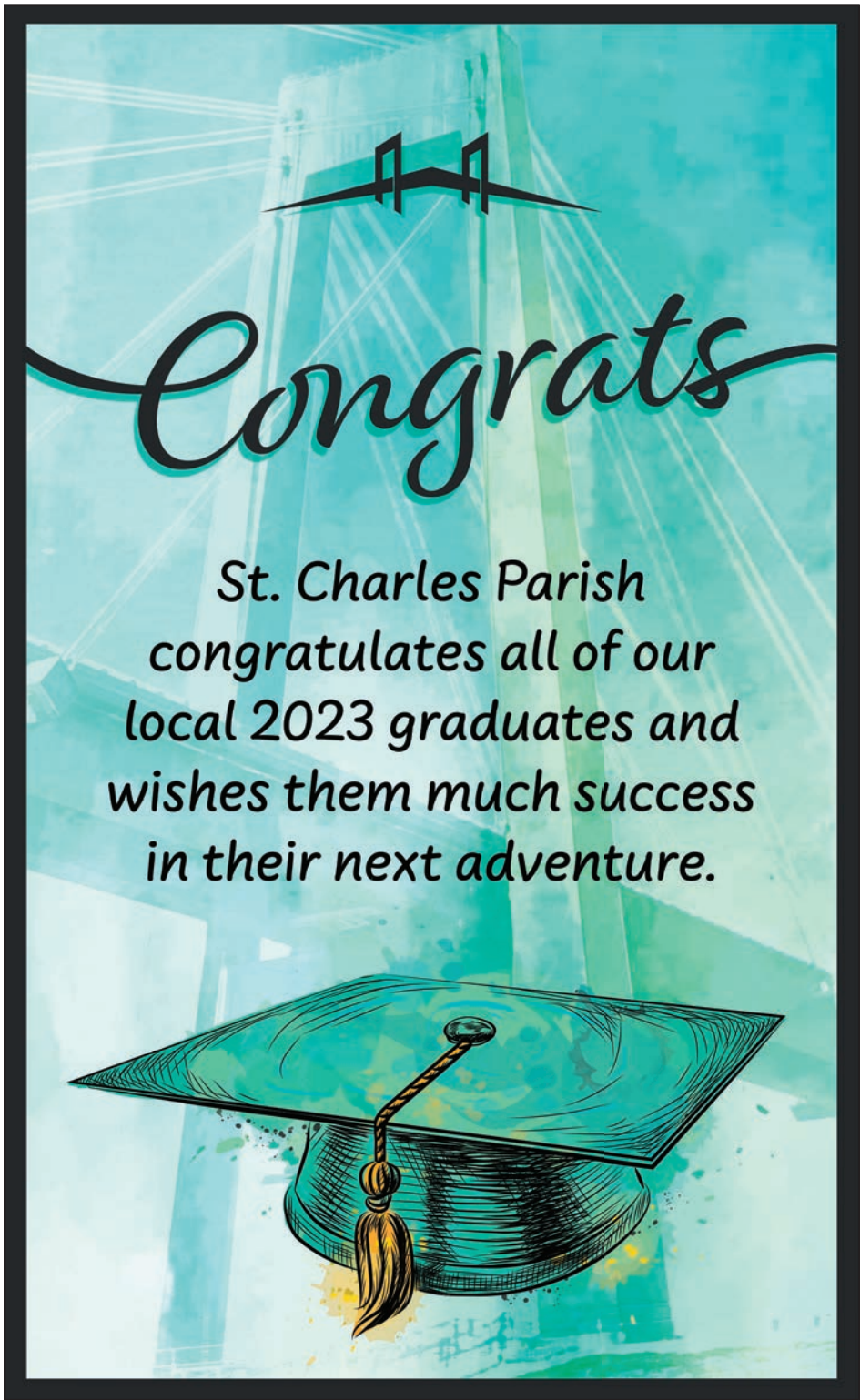

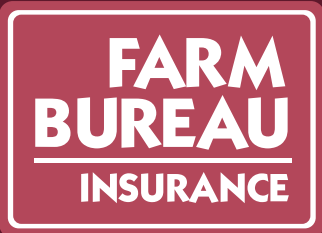

makes programs on his computer as a hobby.

“I was always interested in engineering, but I never really felt a connection with physical, hands on engineering. I’ve always been more interested in technology and things connected to that,” Walther said. “LSU has a really good program there. I have friends going there, the campus is nice and I enjoyed visiting. It’s close to home too, which is nice.”

Walther’s got a strong competitive drive. He was captain of the Destrehan tennis team and helped lead that squad to the state championship tournament – Walther won eight matches between singles and doubles competition over the course of the season.

He also enjoys teaching what he’s learned on the tennis court. Walther frequently instructs younger players on weekends, paying his passion and knowledge forward to a new generation of players. He began playing when he was 7 years old and he hasn’t stopped since.

“I started playing in a rec league and that got me into it,” Walther said. “It’s a very solo sport where you really have to depend on yourself to win. It’s a lot of dedication, time and effort going into it.”

“I was lucky to go to a good school with good teachers. And my friends as well ... I’m friends with a lot of really smart people, and any one of them could have been salutatorian and I’d feel they absolutely deserved it. That I got it was kind of random ... we all help one another out.”

After Hurricane Ida, she was displaced from her home and was staying with her uncle in Arizona.

“I was fortunate to be in a good place, out of the range of the storm ... my dad and I were able to figure out a way to stay up to date with my classes,” she said. “It was definitely a lot of hard work, but I was also lucky to have the right people and to be in the right place at the right time.”

Schuler is headed to LSU to study computer science, and is excited where that process could take her in the near future. She doesn’t have a particular job pursuit in mind – but that’s by design.

“I don’t want to lock into any one solid thing ... I want to stay flexible,” she said. “I feel like with the tech industry, we’re in a moment of change with all of the A.I. coming out. 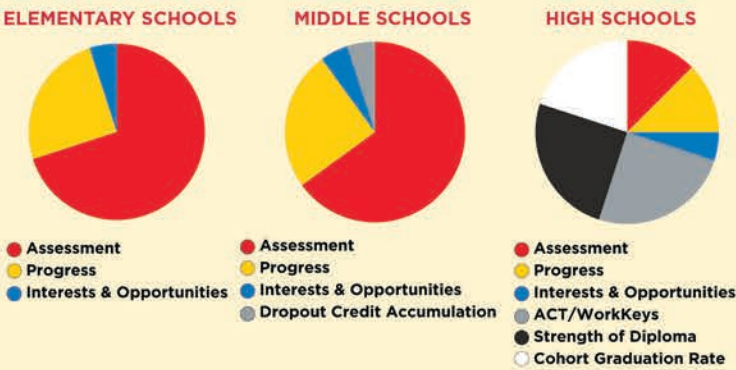

A student's academic progress is monitored through a variety of assessments and assignments; one of which is the end-of-year LEAP testing. These test results, in turn, contribute to performance scores and state-assigned letter grades for schools through Louisiana's school accountability system.

SCHOOL PERFORMANCE SCORES: Schools receive an annual school performance score between 0 and 150. This score is determined by indexes which measure assessments, student progress, interests and opportunities, dropout credit accumulation, ACT/WorkKeys scores, strength of diploma, and cohort graduation rate.



All performance scores incorporate how students perform on standardized tests like LEAP (Assessment), how much students grew on the LEAP from one year to the next (Progress), and to what extent students are offered activities such as enrichment classes or extracurricular activities (Interests & Opportunities). Middle school performance scores also consider how many credits students have earned after they transition to high school (Dropout Credit Accumulation). For high schools, there is an added focus on graduation indicators such as ACT scores, how many students graduate within four years (Cohort Graduation Rate), and how many students graduate with college credit or industry credentials (Strength of Diploma).

SCHOOL LETTER GRADES: The state assigns a letter grade to each school that correlates with the school's performance score, and the standard to attain specific letter grades continues to increase, resulting in a moving target for schools.

DEVELOPMENTS & DIRECTION

St. Charles Parish Public Schools hosted its annual District Job Fair on Friday, April 28. Although the nation and state are both currently experiencing a critical shortage of teachers, all interview slots were filled with 132 candidates participating. The positive response of candidates can be attributed to marketing efforts such as a recruiting video viewed by more than 20,000 people in the target audience and billboards strategically placed to entice teachers from other school systems to apply with SCPPS.

The Human Resources Department recognizes the importance of developing a pipeline of future teachers. SCPPS collaborates annually with local universities to mentor and train future teachers through a residency, a yearlong program similar to the previous student teaching semester. During the 2022-2023 school year, 25 SCPPS teachers mentored and supported these university students/resident teachers. Working in partnership, the Human Resources and Special Education Departments offer SCPPS para-educators the opportunity to attain a teaching license through Reach University. Twenty-two employees are currently participating in the program and will receive their certification in elementary and special education through this four-year-program.

THE BULLETIN BOARD

SALARY STUDY: The St. Charles Parish School Board has hired Gallagher's Human Resources & Compensation Consulting to perform a study of our compensation structure and provide recommendations to ensure salaries remain competitive and equitable. While this salary study is not a strategy to reduce or increase pay or identify staffing needs, its purpose is to provide recommendations related to salary structure, movement in pay ranges, and related compensation approaches to improve overall payroll administration.

PROPERTY INSURANCE: The St. Charles Parish School Board carries \$100 million of property insurance coverage, \$75 million of wind coverage, a total insurable value of \$413 million in building and contents coverage, and a 5% named storm deductible. While most companies utilize only one carrier, SCPPS utilizes 24 different carriers through business partners AmWins and BRK/Riverlands Insurance.

The 2022 storm season heightened the trend of carrier capacity limitations and rate increases. Being leery of unexpected higher losses on existing coverages, underwriters are being more conservative in renewal pricing, and remaining carriers in the market are predicted to increase premiums due to a high demand with restricted supply.

SCHOOL SAFETY AUDIT: Safe Havens International, Inc. provided the findings of its school safety and security assessment to the school board in April. SCPPS contracted with Safe Havens to conduct an on-site assessment of all district sites, an on-site strategic-level interview, and an off-site review of the district's emergency management plans and safety and security policies. Findings were incorporated into a detailed, written strategic-level report which summarizes key findings and recommendations for consideration.

CONFERENCE WITH THE SUPERINTENDENT

The latest "reform" effort disguised as school choice is the creation of Educational Savings Accounts (ESA) - an initiative that may rob our state's public education systems of money needed to educate every child they serve. As written, these programs propose to send public funds to nonpublic schools and vendors without holding them accountable for results.



These programs could potentially limit access for economically disadvantaged families. Under most proposals, the cost allocated would be insufficient to completely fund education for a full academic year. This deficiency will likely result in limiting access to only those who can afford to supplement the remaining uncovered costs. Additionally, these options do not require transportation for students, further limiting access to only those families who can provide transportation to/from the nonpublic school or organization.

Furthermore, **these programs could limit access for students with special needs.** Under most proposals, the additional costs allocated for special education services are not provided, and nonpublic schools or organizations receiving these funds are not required to accept every student or provide services specific to meeting students' special needs. Therefore, families of students with disabilities, English-language deficiencies, or other special needs may be denied admittance to sites benefitting from these funds.

As a valued stakeholder and supporter of St. Charles Parish Public Schools, I encourage you to stay informed about proposed legislation that may directly or indirectly impact our school system. The current "failing" schools narrative sells a lot of people on privatized alternatives such as ESAs and vouchers. However, this narrative is not factual and only serves to market a product. Our product is tangible and is evident in every student who walks across the stage in May. Let's all do our part to keep it that way because together, **You and I...We Are St. Charles Parish Public Schools!**

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Ochsner to host sports, agility clinics for youth athletes

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For parents looking for a different kind of youth sports camp this summer, St. Charles Parish Parks and Recreation Department recently announced its Ochsner Sports Agility Camps will be held at the Edward Dufresne Community Center in June and July, with registration now open until May 31.

Unlike typical sports camps that focus on fundamental techniques geared toward a specific sport such as soccer, basketball or baseball, the Ochsner Sports Agility Clinic is taught by professional sports trainers and focuses on improving sports movements and techniques for youth athletes – techniques that can be applied to any sport. After spending time in their Sports Agility Camp, Destrehan Ochsner Performance Training Facility Supervisor and Head Coach Alex Romero says “athletes will run faster, jump higher and move more fluidly in space.”

The program will offer camps for two age groups: Group A, which is youth athletes ages 7 thru 10, and Group B, youth ages 11 thru 14. The program includes training sessions three days per week, and offers one, four and six-week training options.

The program is a departure from the several other summer sports camps St. Charles Parish offers, which Parks and Recreation Director Dwayne Foret says was an intentional decision.

“We were looking for something a little different than normal sports camps and clinics that focuses on doing sports movements, and finding the fundamentals to perform skills without injury,” Foret said.

Organizers of the Ochsner Sports Agility Camps say their camp teaches youth athletes how to move properly, helping them to enjoy and excel in their respective sports. Sprinting, jumping, landing, bounding, start and stop and other sports movements are taught in the program.

“We work in three different planes:

running, jumping, landing and cutting in different directions,” Romero explained of their program. “During the clinics we start with very basic techniques and progress them throughout the six-week program.”

The program also teaches basic body weight exercises athletes can perform later on their own, including push-ups, sit-ups, squats, lunges and body control exercises.

“For many kids, they use this as a springboard before getting into

competition,” Foret said. “It’s almost like a training camp, but some do it to enhance their skills in competition, some do it to remain active.”

As head coach of the program, Romero has assembled a core team of capable sports trainers to run the program. Romero, who himself coached Hahnville High soccer for almost a decade, is a former Nicholls State football player and trained kickers for years before taking his current Ochsner position. His fellow sports trainers include LSU Exercise Science graduate Julius Medina, a former soccer athlete who specializes in working with elementary and middle school athletes. Another sports trainer many locals would recognize is St. Charles Parish native and Hahnville High standout athlete Brandon Singleton, who was a state track champion and later a collegiate wide receiver for Cal Berkley.

Romero had only positive comments

to make regarding the recent Ochsner and St. Charles Parish partnership that birthed this Sports and Agility clinic for St. Charles Parish youth athletes.

“The partnership with Saint Charles Parish Recreation Department has been amazing,” Romero said. “They have helped us grow our business while allowing us to work with kids in their community. We look forward to a continued program and hopefully expand what we can offer.”

Director Dwayne Foret says Parks and Recreation and Ochsner will look to offer additional shorter duration Sports Agility camps later in the year, commenting that their summer camps offered extended time for additional training versus other Sports Agility camps they will schedule later in 2023.

After losing 23 seniors, Destrehan holds own against Karr in spring battle

The stars were out during Destrehan’s spring game scrimmage with Karr – Justin Jefferson, Ed Reed and a host of collegiate scouts and coaches were on hand to see several of the state’s top recruits in action, and the players put on a worthy showcase in a matchup of power programs.

The two teams played to a 7-7 tie in the timed portion of the scrimmage, Destrehan pulling even with Karr on Jackson Fields’ long pass to Shane Lee on a well-placed wheel route to cap things off on the evening.

It was one of Fields’ three touchdown passes in the full scrimmage – including the teams trading drives of a pre-set number of plays – while Karr quarterback John Johnson tossed five touchdown passes. For Fields, it was a promising start for a player who will be the first quarterback besides Jai Eugene to start a game for Destrehan in three seasons. The Tulane-bound Eugene graduated last week and was a three-year starter

for the program. Of course, this was the first chance for Wildcat fans to see their team in action against another school since Destrehan’s Class 5A state championship victory over Ruston in December. The 2023 squad will attempt to extend a 15-game

winning streak this upcoming season after the Wildcats went unbeaten last season, and the cupboard isn’t exactly bare – even after one of the largest collegiate signing classes in the history of the program and 23 seniors moving on in total. Lee, Anthony Robinson, Jayce Mitchell

Fields connected with Makylon Smothers and Greg Wilfred for touchdowns on the day as well.

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New look Tigers take field against Easton

Titus White is the last man standing.

Hahnville boasted a very strong group of receivers in 2022 – so strong, in fact, that three of the team’s top four options signed to play at the college level this fall: Dakota Williams, Josh Smith and Romell Hardy. That leaves White as the last remaining starter from that unit as he prepares to enter his senior year.

He certainly looked ready and able to take on a lead role this coming season, showing a strong connection with returning quarterback Ryan Gregson throughout Hahnville’s spring game with Warren Easton last week. White’s leaping catch over a defender in the back of the endzone on a fade route from Gregson earned HHS a 15-yard touchdown, a highlight among several of them for White – who made a handful of big gains downfield on the day.

“I know my team’s counting on me – I can’t have games off,” White said. “Last year I had Dakota Williams, Josh Smith and Romell Hardy with me, this year (White is the most experienced receiver). I need to stay on my A game.”

Easton got the better of HHS in the timed quarter portion of the

scrimmage, outscoring the Tigers 7-0 in the period. Hahnville drove down into the Easton redzone – Di ’Tre Joseph drew a penalty downfield for HHS to set the team up close to the endzone - but was stopped on fourth down on the day’s final possession.

Hahnville won’t have the experience it had a

year ago, but Hahnville head coach Daniel Luquet believes the Tigers have plenty to build on for the upcoming season – traits like strength and toughness in particular.

“We lost a lot of talented guys on both sides of the football and we’re young ... I thought our weight room really showed up tonight for the first time in a long time. I thought we were in shape, looked strong and we competed. At the end of the day, we accomplished what we were looking to do – show we could compete with one of the best programs in the state.”

Easton is just one

season removed from playing for the Class 4A championship in 2021, and brought a talented squad to Boutte for the spring scrimmage.

Easton passer Greg Donaldson had a solid day – including a deep bomb to Kyon Holliday in the timed quarter that set up quarter’s lone score, a run by Mathias Lee for a 5-yard score. Lee scored another touchdown earlier in the pre-set plays portion of the scrimmage, where each team gets a predetermined number of plays on a drive before yielding to the opposition.

6’4” wideout Stephen Stewart made one of the most impressive plays of the day on a deep sideline catch from Donaldson midway through the scrimmage, setting up a touchdown.

Hahnville is revamping its defense under coordinator Carey Melvin and will be looking for several players to step up as playmakers with several starters from last year’s group departed. Linebacker Beau Parker had a strong 2022 and shined early in the spring game, his sack of Donaldson helping to force an eventual stop in the redzone.

Luquet said the Tigers will be dialing up the heat on opposing offenses.

“We’re going to put speed on the field and

sending pressure from different areas. We’re not the biggest defense in the world but we should be one of the fastest ones. We have a lot of guys who can fly around and tackle,” Luquet said.

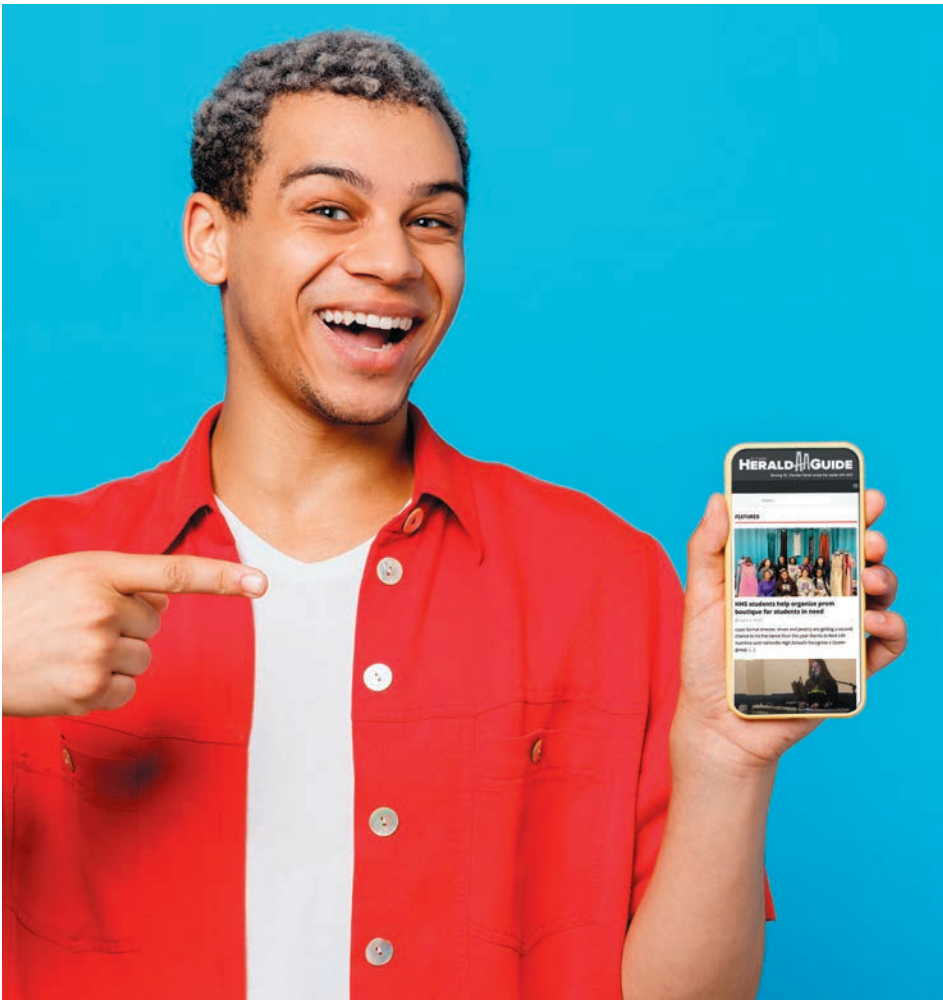
He added he was impressed with the way that unit held strong against a very good Easton offensive line and receiving corps.

“Guys made some mistakes but they didn’t hang their head, they moved right on to the next play. I think we’ve got a really good base to work from,” Luquet said.

For Gregson, 2023 is a much different scenario than was 2022, when the then-junior was thrust into the starting quarterback role following Donovan Friloux’s knee injury. Gregson grew into the role and his numbers were considerably up over the second half of the season, and with Friloux’s graduation, Gregson entered this spring as the Tigers’ starting passer.

Experience goes a long way, he said.

“It’s a huge difference,” Gregson said. “Now everyone’s counting on me to be that leader ... everything feels way more natural and having that experience from last season makes it 10 times easier. The game slows down.”

Hahnville recently announced the hiring of its two new head basketball coaches – of its boys and girls programs, respectively – and made history in the process.

Erica Randolph will take the helm of the boys program while Joshua Bellaire steps in to lead the girls program after the respective departures of boys coach Yussef Jasmine and girls coach Arrianna Smith. Both served as assistants with the teams prior to the promotions.

Randolph becomes the first female to ever serve as Hahnville’s boys basketball coach after six seasons as Jasmine’s assistant at Hahnville, part of a staff that guided the Tigers to back-to-back state semifinal appearances in 2020 and 2021 and district championships in each of those two seasons. Those were

milestones the program garnered for the first time in a decade.

“(Jasmine) told me in January that he was leaving, and said he wanted me to prepare to be head coach,” Randolph said. “He told me for years, Erica, this is your purpose,” Randolph said. “It was emotional at the time because my reaction was, ‘what do you mean you’re leaving? We’re the dynamic duo!’ But he said, ‘It’s your time.’”

Randolph has been in charge of the Tigers’ JV and freshman programs in addition to her duties as varsity assistant. It keeps a level of continuity in the program that it lacked prior to Jasmine’s arrival approximately six years ago, with several coaching changes in the seasons preceding.

“It’s the same voice they’ve been hearing once they get to the varsity level, except they’re older and more mature,” Randolph said.

She said some doubts crept in prior to her hiring, but only briefly.

“As a human, you always have reservations – of course, the obvious is being a female at a 5A school. I never thought about that when I was coaching but it was in the back of my mind for a hot second,” Randolph said.

But once her interview was completed, she got to tell her players the news – a true highlight experience, she said.

“That was one of the best feelings I’ve had in the world,” she said. “They were happy ... they’ve never treated or looked at me as a female coach. It’s ‘that’s Coach Randolph,’” she said.

This is Bellaire’s second head coaching experience after two years at West St. John following the retirement of long-time Lady Rams coach Lester Smith. Bellaire was an assistant under Lester Smith for five years prior to that. He arrived

at Hahnville as an assistant under Arrianna Smith prior to the 2021-22 season.

“I learned a lot from him, and I learned a lot from Coach (Arrianna) Smith,” Bellaire said. “She helped me grow the past few years. When I knew the job was open, I couldn’t walk away from this group – it’s a real special group and I wanted the opportunity to coach them.”

Bellaire said his time at Hahnville has been positive already and he’s looking forward to taking the next step.

“I love it here. Everyone’s embraced me here,” Bellaire said. “We have a good group of student athletes and great parental support. I’m ready to get on board and keep on building – Coach Smith has this program in a great space.”

“Everything here – the atmosphere, the coaches,



administration and support – I didn’t even have to think about it. I love this group and think we can do some big things.”

Fans can expect the same style of relentless pressure on defense they grew accustomed to under Smith at Hahnville, while Bellaire said the aim is to perhaps up the pace even more when it comes to the offensive end.

“I think that style – up tempo, pressure defense, fits our girls,” he said. “I want to get out and run a little more offensively, get up some more shots. But we’ll remain an up-and-down the court basketball team pushing pace and tempo.”



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Destrehan Anytime Fitness receives No. 1 ranking in North America

Local franchisee owners of the Anytime Fitness Gym in Destrehan recently announced their Ormond Boulevard location had achieved a No. 1 ranking year-to-date out of over 5,000 Anytime Fitness locations throughout North America.

Co-owners Brandon Hebert and Daniell Nielsen Jenkins were able to achieve this feat after owning the gym less than two years, having just purchased the business in January 2022 from former owner Michelle Oubre.

around one another, gutting and repairing homes, rebuilding churches, businesses, and friendships.

“Putting an emphasis on Key Performance Indicators and business metrics all of a sudden wasn’t nearly as important as having a real conversation with someone and truly being present for them,” Hebert said. “We dialed back the business mindset and just loved on our members.”

Following Hurricane Ida, membership and their business began to grow and improve after reopening under new ownership, resulting in the Destrehan location achieving number one status in 2023.

Club owners Hebert and Nielsen-Jenkins said their live fitness class offerings are something that has helped them to differentiate their business amongst other local gyms in the region.

“We offer over forty live group fitness classes each week, which complements our eight trainers and Anytime Fitness training service,” Hebert said. “From the day we opened our doors, our Group Fitness classes were a big expense to the business, but the benefits to our community matter much more than our bottom line.”

The local Destrehan location is currently focusing on offering virtual coaching and corporate wellness, looking to partner with local businesses to improve the health of their employees.

“We have a great partnership currently with Valero Refining Company and have previously worked with the St.

Charles Parish Sheriff’s Office in bringing health and wellness to their employees,” Hebert said of their corporate wellness programs.

Before purchasing the gym, Hebert had worked at the same Destrehan location as a trainer and was one of the gym location’s original employees. His business partner Nielsen-Jenkins was one of his former training clients, who became a trainer herself after being recognized nationally for her training success as an Anytime Fitness member.

Both Nielsen-Jenkins and Hebert believe being on-site owners has been an important component that has allowed them to reach their current No. 1 ranking.

“Being locally owned and operated makes a huge difference,” Hebert said. “We hear stories all the time about people that own five, six or a hundred Anytime locations. What ends up making the difference with us is the presence of the owners and the staff.”

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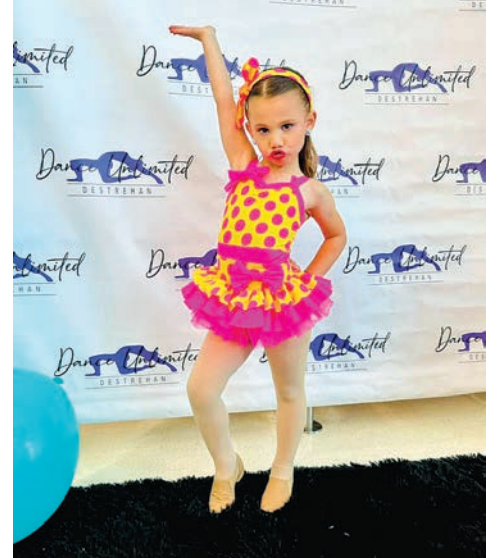




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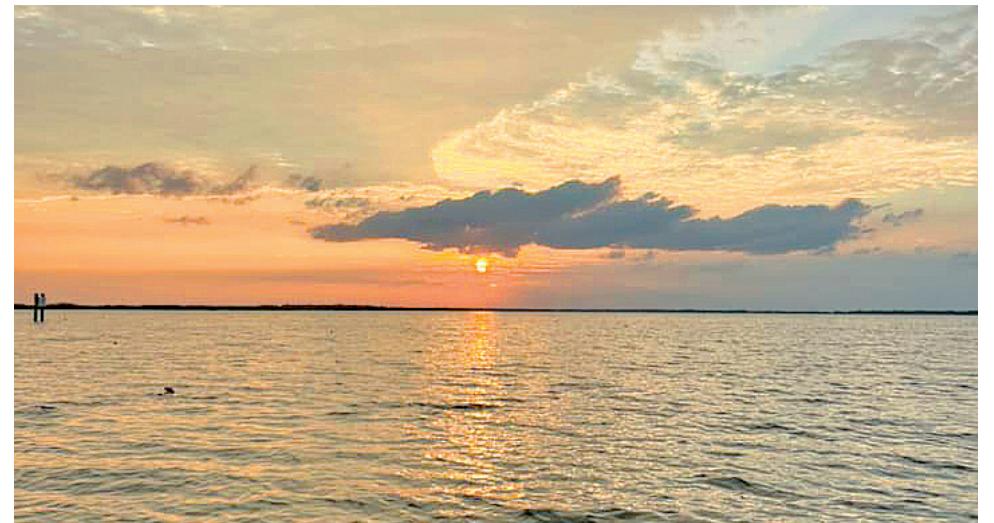

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Women’s Health in Your 40s

As we age and enter new decades, our bodies change and we may develop symptoms we have not experienced before. Women in their 40s can experience a slower metabolism, decreasing estrogen levels, and even begin to notice signs/symptoms of perimenopause or menopause.

Among our daily tasks and busy day-to-day lives, it is important to remember to prioritize your health and keep up

with annual appointments and screenings. Disease prevention is just as important in your 40s as any other decade. Women in their 40s should complete recommended screenings for diseases such as hypertension (heart disease affects over 60 million women in the U.S.) and diabetes to address any issues early. Scheduling a yearly mammogram



should also be a top priority, and it is recommended to begin annual mammograms at age 40. A mammogram is an x-ray of the breast to detect early signs of breast cancer, and early detection is important for treatment and prognosis.

Women in their 40s should also continue with annual gynecological appointments. Pelvic exams are recommended annually to examine any skin changes of the vulva/perineum and screen for abnormal growth or masses in the pelvis. Your doctor will recommend pap smears for cervical cancer screening every 1 to 5 years based on your medical history and previous pap smear results.

Having an open dialogue with your physician is always beneficial regardless of age. Women in their 40s shouldn’t hesitate to speak to their doctor about any new concerns or issues. Women may start to experience symptoms of menopause or begin the transition to menopause, a time called perimenopause, in their 40s. Hot flashes, night sweats, sleep disturbances or mood changes are common symptoms of menopause. Periods may be heavier or lighter and may become irregular in length. Some women experience lower libido. Women should see their doctor for evaluation and treatment options if they experience any of these symptoms. Additionally, women who still have their period in their 40s can still get pregnant. Those who do not want to get pregnant should speak to their doctor about pregnancy prevention options.

Perhaps the most important things women can do for their health in their 40s is eat a well-rounded whole food diet, exercise, and practice self-care.

Physical activity is vital for bone health, heart health and preventing excessive weight gain that many women experience as they age due to genetics, diet, hormonal changes, metabolism, sleep and other risk factors. Additionally, it is recommended to limit alcohol intake to one standard drink per day or seven standard drinks per week, incorporate Vitamin D 800 IU daily and calcium 1000mg daily through diet or a supplement, and avoid tobacco products or vaping to reduce the risk of cancer-- including lung, nasal, oral, esophagus, kidney, bladder, cervical and colorectal cancers. All of these cancers are associated with smoking, which may be surprising. Women should also discuss recommended vaccinations with their doctor based on their medical history and personal risk factors. A yearly flu shot is an important prevention step as the risk of complications, even with common illness, can increase as we age.

Women in their 40s are still young! Establishing healthy habits can help maintain overall health and wellbeing for years to come.

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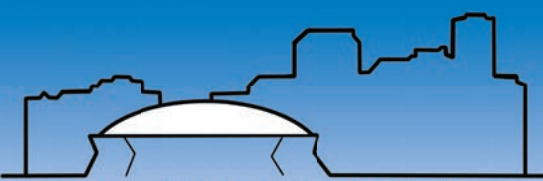
