“We have all kept in touch with each other over the years,” Ricks said. “We all went to SCB together, then went our separate ways in high school.”

While Ricks went to Brother Martin High School, Amedee and Daste attended Jesuit High School together and maintained a close friendship.

“Harrison and I grew up and did almost everything together,” Amedee said. “Both of us consider each other’s moms as our ‘second mom.’”

From time to time the trio would get

Judge retires after 15 years on bench, shifts focus to teaching next generation

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All around her, Judge M. Lauren Lemmon has daily reminders to why she does what she does.

As she sits at her desk, to her right is an artist’s portrait of her mother, father and herself – all three in their judicial robes - reminding of her first inspiration to pursue a career in public service. Directly in front of her, a picture of four children who are part of the Youth Empowerment Project, which Lemmon was instrumental in expanding into St. Charles Parish, and alongside that photo another artist’s portrait – this one

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Norco native raises more than \$10,000 for pediatric patients, among finalists to win contest of 60K entrants

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Months ago, Summer Zeringue McCune had to walk away from what she called her dream job, one that allowed her to do what she loved to do: positively impact the lives of children every day.

She found another way – and then another way after that.

The former Destrehan High School talented art teacher has raised over \$10,000, and counting, for children battling chronic illness and if things break right, could be closing in on earning a prize of \$20,000 that will go to the winner of the Women’s World Magazine’s Super Mom contest. McCune is one of 12 finalists among the more than 60,000 women considered in the competition, which is determined through voting and donations to hospitals in the Children’s Miracle Network.

“It’s been pretty amazing,” the Norco native said. “Everyone’s gotten me this far. It’s pretty amazing to have the community supporting me like this.”

McCune’s infant daughter Adler was diagnosed with a pediatric feeding disorder and as a result developed a bottle aversion and refused all feeds. The situation demanded McCune be by her daughter’s side, and she had to leave her classroom at DHS – where she succeeded her own former talented art teacher from McCune’s days as a Wildcat student – behind.

“I became depressed,” McCune said. “I had to leave a job that I loved so, so much ... I knew I couldn’t leave Adler in that condition. I was feeling so lonely. Going to medical professionals and asking for help, and they’re just as puzzled as I was. There’s nothing online that really guides you through this.”

In that darkness, McCune found a familiar light to guide her through it. While she could no longer teach her Destrehan students, she was able to put into practice a lesson she often imparted

upon them: use your art as an outlet.

McCune founded NolaBee, a home décor business that showcased her hand-painted art, prior to Adler’s diagnosis. But she decided to pivot the direction of NolaBee from décor to pajamas – with each design representing a different child and their diagnosis, in order to raise awareness. Each set has hand painted patterns that are uniquely inspired from the stories of the pediatric patients NolaBee represents in order to spark conversations and provide a voice for those fighting medical battles. Each also comes with a card telling the story of the child who inspired the set.

She donates a portion of the proceeds from each set of the bamboo pajamas sold and McCune also has a spot on her website where people are invited to submit their children’s stories so that they can be represented in a future design. Eighty children have had their stories submitted on her site.

United Way of St. Charles announces memorial award to honor longtime board member

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The United Way of St. Charles Parish (UWSC) recently announced the newly created Ray Tyree Memorial Citizenship Award, a new annual award the local nonprofit plans to offer each year to recognize an outstanding individual who has made a positive difference in the lives of St. Charles Parish citizens.

It is not a requirement for nominees to be a St. Charles Parish resident.

The UWSC is currently accepting nomination applications – any citizen who believes they know someone that meets the criteria of the award are encouraged to send in a nomination form. Both nomination criteria and nomination forms are available on the UWSC’s website.

The winner of this year’s Ray Tyree Memorial Citizenship Award will be announced publicly at the United Way of St. Charles Battle for the Paddle on Thursday, Oct. 5. The recipient will be notified in advance of the event.

The idea for the award came recently from another of the UWSC’s board members, who had previously served with Tyree.

“One of our Board Members, McKinley Day, had the idea,” Dias said. “McKinley said that the idea ‘came to his heart’ to recognize Ray because he was special to us all at United Way and to the community as well, and the Board agreed.”

Tyree passed away in the fall of 2021 at the age of 66, a 40-year banking industry veteran who carried a Tulane master’s degree and was a longtime member of the UWSC board.

“Ray was funny, and kind and he didn’t ever seem to care about who got credit for anything,” John Dias, Executive Director of United Way of St. Charles Parish, remembered of his former board member. “He was an active board member that would give his opinion but not need to get his way. He wanted success for others – he was just a wonderful man.”

Tyree served numerous positions during his time with the local United Way chapter, serving as Secretary-Treasurer, Board Vice President, Board President and later served as a Campaign Co-Chair for what at the time was considered to be the most successful fundraising effort in the UWSC’s history.

“Ray was also part of the core group of board members that worked to get the Community College established,” Dias said of Tyree’s accomplishments.

Nominee criteria should be someone who frequently volunteers his or her time for the betterment of St. Charles Parish and its citizens, and has made a positive difference in the live of fellow citizens. Nominees should also display qualities of honesty and integrity, and have a willingness to continuously work towards the betterment of the community.

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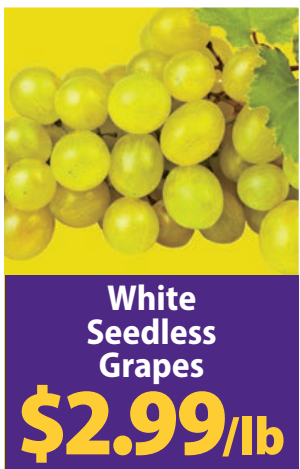
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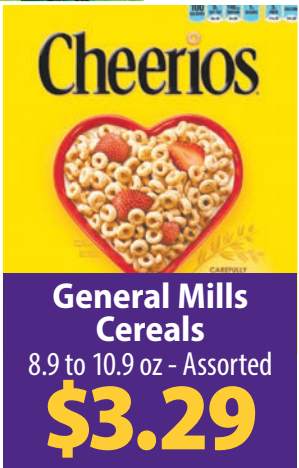
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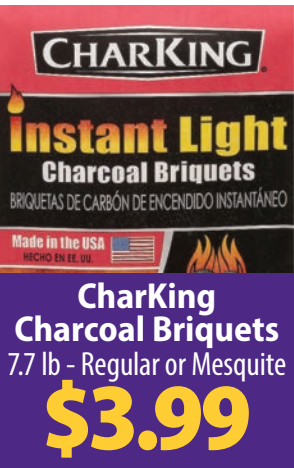
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CVS of Luling reopens

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National drugstore chain CVS recently reopened its Luling branch store on Paul Maillard, having closed after suffering severe Hurricane Ida damage in 2021.

Luling Store manager Jasmine Scott said the store officially reopened in March. Located at 1313 Paul Maillard, the Luling store was completely gutted, renovated and outfitted with an entirely new interior prior to reopening.

“CVS made it into a ‘health hub’ type of store,” Scott explained. “So - it’s not like most of the other traditional CVS stores.”

Scott said many St. Charles Parish residents who had been longtime CVS customers were happy to have the store and its pharmacy open once again following Hurricane Ida.

“They’re happy we’re back open,” Scott, a seven-year CVS employee, commented. “Customers don’t have to drive to Avondale, Destrehan or other places that they’ve been driving to get their prescriptions any longer.”

The store format is much as it was before, with a pharmacy section in the rear of the store, while retail, household goods and grocery items can be found elsewhere throughout its Luling location. The CVS in Luling also serves as a pick up and drop off location for UPS packages, while its pharmacy offers a limited selection of flu and certain vaccine shots for customers.

“We sell things that most people need – personal

items, over the counter meds, grocery items, frozen food, ice cream, cosmetic items- a variety of different retail items,” Scott said of the store’s retail selection.

The store typically has two pharmacy staff on hand most days at the Luling location, with one of the two pharmacy staff acting as the store’s pharmacy manager.

CVS of Luling’s store hours are 9 AM to 7 PM, Monday thru Sunday,

with pharmacy hours differing slightly. The store’s pharmacy hours are 9 AM – 1:30 PM and 2 PM to 7 PM Monday thru Friday, and 11 AM – 1:30 PM, 2 PM to 5 PM on weekends.

As to what sets her store apart from other retail pharmacies, Scott pointed to her store’s friendly customer service attitude and overall atmosphere.

“We make everything personable – everyone is like family,” Scott said. “Anytime someone walks in we’re very welcoming...we’re just here to help.”

together and hang out with each other along with other friends and catch up. After separately graduating college, the three met up once again and entered LSU Medical School together, each pursuing a career in medicine.

During their time in medical school, Amedee and Daste would meet up regularly and study together, taking the occasional video game break or playing a round of golf together after an intense round of test-taking. Both Amedee and Daste wound up becoming roommates in medical school.

“We spent a lot of time together those first two years of medical school,” Daste said. “It was helpful to have a close friend to ask questions, bounce ideas off of, share in frustrations, or just hang out with at the end of a long day at school.”

All three schoolmates – Ricks, Amedee

and Daste - now share an unusual milestone. The three men, who began elementary school together in Destrehan over 20 years ago, have now completed LSU Medical School and have become doctors together. They recently graduated in May in the same 2023 LSU graduating class.

“As a young boy, I always felt that medicine was for me,” Ricks explained of the draw he felt towards a medical career. “I wanted to help people, especially women. SCB did a great job teaching me to be selfless and to help those who needed it.”

Now that he’s completed medical school, Ricks will pursue a medical specialty in obstetrics and gynecology, a choice he said was easy to make.

“To me, there is no greater joy than bringing new life into this world, and helping, advocating for women and their

health,” he said.

Daste’s first encounter with medicine occurred when he fractured a bone in his elbow while playing baseball in middle school. He met a surgeon who helped calm his fears, diagnose, and explain what happened, then came up with a plan on how to fix it.

“I immediately knew that I wanted to have that ability,” Daste said.

Daste has decided to pursue Emergency Medicine and will go on to begin his residency training at the LSU Baton Rouge Emergency Medicine Program, which will last three years.

“For the next three years, I will be working...mostly at Our Lady of the Lake’s emergency department,” Daste explained of his current career plans. “My fiancée is currently in medical school in Shreveport. After completing both our residencies, I believe our plan is to come back to the New Orleans area to find jobs.”

For Amedee, who will now be taking an internal medicine track, his strong interest in science eventually led him to medicine.

“I’ve always had an interest in science growing up; it was my favorite subject,” he said. “When I went to college, I majored in kinesiology, which allowed me to study what I was most interested in and complete all my pre-med prerequisites. It was these classes in college such as anatomy, taking a cadaver dissection lab, and the various classes that involved the neuromuscular system that reinforced my desire for a career in medicine.”

Amedee will start his residency at the University of Alabama at Birmingham (UAB) in Montgomery, starting in July, and plans to return to south Louisiana once done.

“I grew up here and love the people here, so I would like to give back to them any way possible,” Amedee said.

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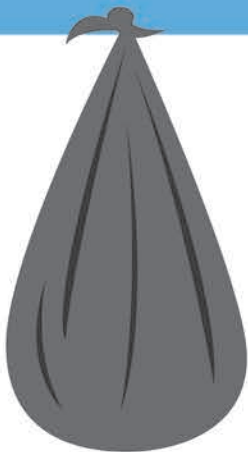


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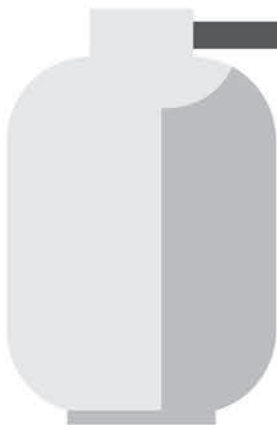
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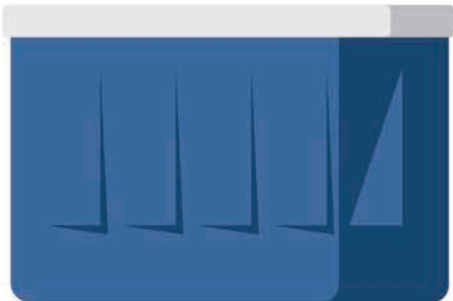

knocked on doors, talked to individual neighbors and explained the whole situation to them."

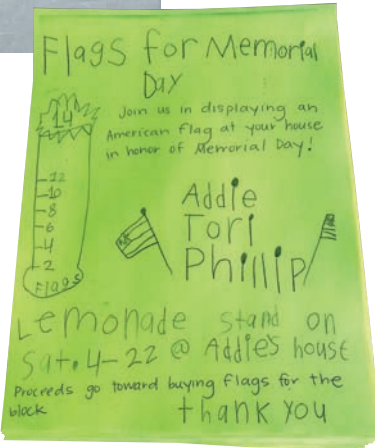

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Parish officials offer insights into improvements, adjustments made post-Ida

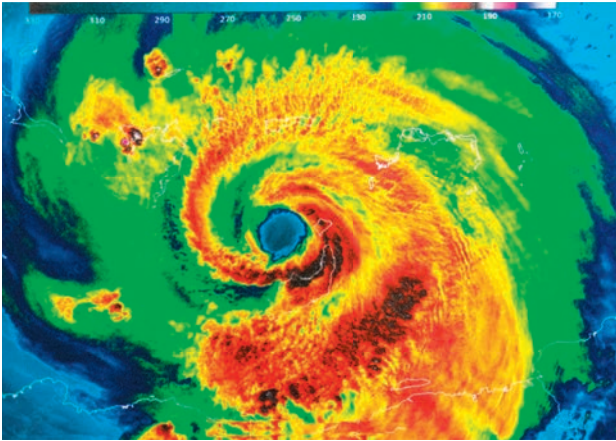

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As St. Charles Parish enters the active portion of the 2023 hurricane season, local officials offered insights this week regarding improvements made following 2021’s destructive Hurricane Ida.

Jason Tastet, St. Charles Parish Director of Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness, said parish officials and employees have continued fine-tuning its emergency plans and procedures following Hurricane Ida. Some of the latest revisions made, Tastet commented, will serve parish residents for years to come for all emergency events, even those that may not be storm related.

“Hurricane Ida tested our capabilities and helped us determine ways in which we could strengthen our ability to respond to all emergencies,” Tastet said. “Due to the damage and loss of so many public buildings, the parish government utilized and refined our Continuity of Government Plans. Across all departments and agencies, our public officials and employees adapted to new work locations and made use of what was available to get the parish operating as quickly as possible.”

After a post-Hurricane Ida parish governmental analysis, Tastet said parish officials took action to enhance its fuel storage and fuel capacity capabilities so that officials can be better prepared should another



major storm event threaten St. Charles Parish again.

“As with every storm, fuel availability became one of our biggest challenges,” Tasted explained regarding post-storm difficulties faced in 2021. “Fuel scarcity was resolved thanks to our local industries immediately assisting us. We conducted extensive after-action reviews post-Ida and determined the need for increased fuel storage capacity for our response crews.”

St. Charles Parish has now established larger fuel reserves on both sides of the Mississippi River in preparation for future natural disasters that may someday

strike the local area.

With respect to emergency shelter facilities, parish officials say they plan to once again utilize the state of Louisiana’s sheltering assistance programs should they become needed to assist St. Charles Parish residents in the aftermath of future storms.

“These State-provided trailers allowed residents to live in the Parish and their ability to recover from the storm was far easier thanks to the State’s assistance,” Tasted commented regarding the state’s storm-related residential housing assistance programs. “While we hope we do not have to utilize this program again any time soon, we were certainly able to learn and plan for this option in the future.”

Communication systems were especially critical to St. Charles Parish officials during Hurricane Ida as effective recovery efforts could not begin without a fully functional communication system post-Ida. Despite taking heavy damages to parish infrastructure, St. Charles Parish officials had to adapt quickly post-Ida to get its communications systems running again. Learning from that experience, the parish’s communication systems have since received a few upgrades to

Parish officials emphasize hurricane preparedness and evacuation planning

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St. Charles Parish officials mailed out its Hurricane Preparedness 2023 guide to parish residents this week, highlighting the parish’s evacuation route program along with numerous other hurricane preparation related topics.

“If the parish calls for a mandatory evacuation, both sides of the river will be asked to evacuate at the same time,” the parish’s brochure reads. “According to the state contraflow plan, once contraflow has started you will not be able to access I-10 from I-310.”

Current plans call for St. Charles Parish officials to evacuate the parish around 40 hours prior to the onset of tropical storm force winds.

The parish’s current main evacuation routes appear to involve Airline Highway to Baton Rouge and beyond, LA-3127 to Port Allen, and US-90 which can lead to either Lafayette or to Port Allen via LA-3127.

“We want to emphasize that if the parish is recommending evacuating, it is due to a risk of loss of life,” Samantha de Castro, St. Charles Parish Director of Communications, said. “The decision to evacuate is never made lightly and is generally made early to ensure all residents in the parish can get out of harm’s way early and safely.”

Residents are encouraged to have primary and secondary evacuation destinations, as storms can sometimes change direction unexpectedly. Have a secondary evacuation destination in

mind just in case your primary evacuation route suddenly becomes a storm target or becomes overcrowded.

Assisted evacuation for parish residents should be relied on only as a last option, parish officials warn. Residents are encouraged to work first neighbors, family, friends and social networks to secure transportation in the event of a mandatory evacuation. Assisted evacuations will be staged at the West Bank Bridge Park in Luling, with residents transported to the parish’s shelter site outside of the storm surge area.

St. Charles Parish will utilize an open re-entry approach. This means once officials announce to residents it is safe to return home, St. Charles Parish will not require residents and business owners to have special passes or permits. However, if a storm causes significant damage, parish officials may restrict access to essential personnel such as first responders or essential personnel.

Parish officials reminded residents in its recent preparedness circular that power restoration following a storm event for St. Charles Parish will be performed in an orderly manner, focusing on restoration of power plants, transmission lines, substations, and related systems along with essential services first. Once those key infrastructures and essential services are restored,

illustrated by one of the children in the photo.

“When I was a lawyer, (the child’s family) was struggling with some tough things. His grandmother was raising him ... I watched him grow up,” recalled Lemmon. “When he was in the seventh grade, he drew me that picture and brought it to my office. Those things remind me of why I’m here. It’s rewarding to look up at those pictures.”

After 15 years on the bench of the 29th Judicial Court for St. Charles Parish, Lemmon will hang up her robe. The Luling resident and fifth-generation native of St. Charles Parish will shift her focus to teaching the next generation of legal minds at the National Judicial College, among several organizations, something she has been doing and stirs up new great energy within her.

She’s ready to pass the torch – though she once thought she’d be holding onto it for a good while longer.

“That saying, we plan and God laughs,” said Lemmon. “I had my plan all mapped out and thought I would be doing this longer. I started doing some other things I’m really interested in ... I love what I’ve done in this community and across the state and country. But I’ve been thinking about it for two, three years and I guess I feel it’s time. Something better is coming ... it’s been a really good run. I am humbled by the opportunity to serve and am grateful for all of the support and love from this community.”

Lemmon knew at a very early age that she wanted to one day be a judge, like her father and her mother before her. Her father, Harry Lemmon, was a Justice of the Louisiana Supreme Court for more than 20 years. Her mother, Mary Ann Vial Lemmon, is a United States District

Court Judge. Her grandfather, James Vial, was a renowned lawyer for many years, his practice in Hahnville. And her great great grandfather, Leon C. Vial, was the Sheriff of St. Charles Parish.

Harry met Mary Ann in law school. By the time they graduated, they were married with three children, then went on to have three more.

“(Going into law) seemed very natural for me,” Lemmon said. “My parents’ integrity and my grandparents’ integrity, upholding that in my own life and career has always been my goal. And being able to share having a career in public service with them has been truly special.”

Lemmon was elected to the 29th Judicial Court in 2008, but her road to get there began in the 1980s. The 1985 graduate of Spring Hill College went on to earn her Juris Doctor degree from Loyola University School of Law in 1990. That was 55 years after grandfather James earned his law degree from Loyola.

She began her career working in New Orleans for 10 years before returning to

St. Charles Parish, moving to Luling to raise her family. She began practicing law in what was previously her grandfather’s office, including civil work and as a public defender. Later, she became a juvenile public defender.

Those roles saw Lemmon dive into an area that would become a passion for her over the course of her career. She has long been a voice for those less fortunate or who lack the resources to advocate for themselves. Lemmon’s promoted awareness of and access to mental health services for families and children regardless of socioeconomic status. She founded the local chapter of the Children and Youth Services Planning Board and the Juvenile Drug Court program. She co-founded the local court-appointed special advocates (CASA) program and the St. Charles CARE Center.

“My parents and my grandparents had such a giving spirit ... I don’t know any other way,” Lemmon said. “I was always interested more in the social worker and psychology side of this, in helping people who need it. I believe that everyone in a time of need deserves to have a voice and to be able to use that voice in a safe place. That’s something I feel is my job – to give a voice.”

The job of a judge isn’t an easy one. The responsibility is immense and that can intimidate even the strongest of people.

“Sometimes it’s still intimidating. It’s been the greatest blessing to be able to always call people who I trust absolutely,” Lemmon said, gesturing to the portrait of her parents. “It’s heavy and it’s challenging. It can be isolating ... once my first name became Judge, people treated me differently, in both good ways and not so good ways. It’s been a wonderful journey, though.”

Likewise, working as a judge in your native region can be a double-edged sword.

“You have to learn boundaries. People are going to get ticked off and it’s part of it,” Lemmon said. “Someone once said to me that 50 percent of the people in court must leave really upset. I said 100 percent – because it’s about compromise. It’s a balance and some days, I’m good at it. Some days, maybe not so good. You have to be tough, and you also have to be compassionate.

“I’m a judge, but I’m a person first.”

Lemmon has seen people at their most vulnerable, as when she worked overseeing drug recovery court.

“We had 34 heroin deaths. We called them tombstones. And I would say, ‘please don’t be the next tombstone. Don’t be number 35.’ It’s heavy,” Lemmon said. “In some ways, you probably get to know these people more than anyone else, even family.”

But when someone comes up to her and thanks her for helping to turn a life around, Lemmon said there’s no better feeling.

One of the biggest differences from when she first began as a judge to today is she thinks we are disconnected and more focused on what divides us rather than what unites us as a society, and she feels that has worsened during the pandemic.

“Drug use, DWIs, drug dealing, domestic violence, it all shot upward (during the pandemic),” she said.

“A lot of the new work I’m doing is about reconnecting. And I’m really excited about that. Teaching new judges, college students and high school students, gives me great hope and energizes me. Our purpose is to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with our brothers and sisters in the community.”

“That’s one reason I’m raising funds ... I don’t know how to say, ‘thank you for submitting your story, but it’s going to be years before I can afford to make this for you.’ I want to get their stories out there as soon as I can,” she said. “The prize money would be put toward the next children in the lineup.”

The idea for pajamas came to McCune as Adler would only feed in her sleep.

Her story has inspired many, as evidenced by the tidal wave of support she’s received.

She hopes that potentially winning the contest would allow Adler’s story to touch even more people, this time on the national level. All of this began during a time McCune wasn’t sure where to turn to find answers, and even if those answers aren’t all that much clearer today, she’s found comfort in sharing stories with the other parents.

“It’s like you’re teammates,” McCune said. “When you have a child with special needs, it’s a whole other level. People don’t know what’s involved until it’s you

ensure parish governmental services communication remains solid regardless of the emergency.

“We have layers of technology, ranging from low-technology sources like HAM radios and CB radios, and have since added high-technology sources like the Starlink low-orbit satellite system,” Tastet said. “We have now installed the Starlink system permanently as an additional form of redundancy, increasing our resilience to all-natural disasters.”

In recent months, officials like Parish President Matthew Jewell have mentioned they believe the 2023 version of St. Charles Parish gives better protection to residents than ever before. New

or enhanced pump stations, progress with Corps of Engineers levee protection projects and other infrastructure programs continue to be added to St. Charles Parish’s arsenal of tools used in defending itself from powerful storms.

“As far as new infrastructure, a new pump station in Ama will be coming online soon,” St. Charles Parish Director of Communications Samantha de Castro commented. “Additionally, our drainage maintenance program is stronger than ever, and public works has been working diligently to ensure all of our pump stations remain in top shape, all season long.”

Entergy will then focus on restoring power to neighborhoods and finally to individual homes as needed.

Residents can expect to be without power on a sliding scale of time based on the severity of storm winds sustained. Weaker storms, for example, with only 95 miles per hour winds are likely to allow Entergy to restore power to customers in just 7 days or so. On the opposite end of the

storm spectrum, storms having severe winds up to 157 miles per hour or more will result in Entergy power restoration taking 21 days or longer.

Former HHS teammates on opposing sides in National Championship

Co-Lin defeated Smith College in final game to earn NJCAA D-II crown

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Laney Waguespack and Kathryn Smith embraced on the field after their teams concluded a battle for the highest stakes.

Waguespack's Copiah-Lincoln Wolves had defeated Smith's Jones College Bobcats 7-0 in the National Junior College Athletic Association Division II championship game, a victory that delivered Co-Lin its first national championship in any sport over the school's history. Co-Lin needed to win three consecutive elimination games – all within 24 hours – to earn

the crown after beginning the 16-team tournament as the fifth seed.

Smith, it was a unique situation for another reason: the two were

teammates and cornerstones of the Hahnville Tigers, Waguespack a force in the pitcher's circle and Smith a prolific slugger.

This time, they were competitors. Their bond was nonetheless strong as ever post-game.

“When I passed Kat in line after the game, I saw her start to cry and I broke down, too,” Waguespack said. “We found each other after and gave each other a really big hug.”

It was the final game of an extremely productive two-year career for Smith at Jones.

“I played with her for her last high school game and then against her in her last college game. It's hard when it's all over,” Waguespack said. “Kathryn Smith's a really great athlete and softball player, and she left a legacy at Hahnville.”

Said Smith, “It was a great experience ... of course, I'd rather have ended up on the winning side of it. But (Co-Lin) was a great team and it was awesome playing against Laney.”

Jones and Co-Lin faced off several times as conference rivals during the season and postseason, so the two had time to get acclimated to being on opposing sides. Smith said it took some getting used to.

“You want to support her, encourage her if she's down because that's what we've always done, but we're on opposing teams,” Smith said. “I've always been on her side. So, it was a different experience, but every part of it was awesome.”

complete game shut-out from starting pitcher Belle West and a grand slam from Abby Grace Richardson to fell Jones on the final day of the season. That was the Wolves

third game against Jones in two days, as a day earlier the two teams traded wins, with Jones winning early, 5-3, then Co-Lin answering back at night, 10-5.

A 10-3 victory over Des Moines CC kept the Wolves' season alive as well – one in which Waguespack pitched two scoreless innings, called upon in an important spot as a freshman.

The Co-Lin coaching staff's trust was earned during a debut season that saw Waguespack

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notch six wins and no losses to go along with three saves, a 2.94 ERA and 33 strikeouts in 47.2 innings pitched.

“I love Co-Lin ... the people, the atmosphere, everything about it,” said Waguespack. “We were all going for it. We wanted to go for our coach, who had never been to nationals before, and we wanted to prove to everyone who we are.”

They did that, as did Waguespack on an individual level, making a fast adjustment to the college game. Her first appearance in a collegiate game came Feb. 5 against Baton Rouge CC, a two strikeout, scoreless in-



ning. The first four appearances and nine total innings of her season saw her hold the competition without a run.

Ditto for the first appearance of her career against rival Jones. Waguespack entered that March 21 game

with runners on second and third and got her team out of the jam. She went five scoreless innings the rest of the way and helped her team to a 3-2 victory.

“Playing at Hahnville helped me a lot,” Waguespack said. “We played in 5A and faced a lot of top-notch, really good teams with Division I commits. I think I was very prepared.

“(The March 21 game) gave me a lot of confidence. It let me know they trusted me in those pressure moments.”

Winning the championship, she said, was a function of a group of players and coaches completely pulling in the same direction.

“This entire team, I love it so much,” she said. “We play as one. We all support one another whether we’re playing or on the bench cheering for one another. I love being part of this.”

This season represented the start of Waguespack’s collegiate career. It brought Smith’s softball career at Jones to an end.

One of the most feared hitters in Hahnville history, Smith broke the Lady Tigers’ single season home run record in 2019 and then broke her own record in 2021.

Her skills translated immediately against college competition. She started all but four games at second base for Jones as a freshman and hit .264 with 11 home runs and 33 RBIs. As a sophomore she was even better, smashing 20 home runs to go with 56 RBIs, a .322 batting average and a .435 on-base percentage.

Like Waguespack, Smith gave a nod to her Lady Tiger roots for her seamless adjustment to the next level.

“We were set up very well for college ball. Lots of conditioning, lots of workouts, lots of hitting drills,” Smith said. “They said up front: this is how it’s gonna be in college. You have to be prepared for it.”

The Bobcats (50-10) won the MACCC conference this season, setting up their run to the championship game.

Smith said with this being the final season for head coach Chris Robinson, the second-winningest coach in MACCC history, the team was especially driven to make a run.

“We all made an agreement – an unspoken agreement – that we were going to finish our season in Spartanburg,” Smith said. “We’re gonna give our time to this, lock in and see how far we can make it.”

Very far, as it turned out. Smith earned several individual accolades as well, including being named to the National Fastpitch Coaches Association All-Americans First Team and also earning Gold Glove honors from Rawlings for her defense at second base.



DHS alum Ursin joins Wave coaching staff

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Tulane University women’s basketball has named Moon Ursin as its new Assistant Coach and Director of Video ahead of the 2023-24 campaign, Head Coach Lisa Stockton announced Friday. Ursin will take over the role vacated by the promotion of Janet Butler to Assistant Coach.

“Moon has made such a positive impact on our program over the past two seasons, one as a player and the other as a graduate assistant,” Coach Stockton said. “She has a contagious passion for the game and will be an outstanding coach. We are thrilled to have her on our full-time staff.”

Ursin will move into the role after serving as a student assistant during the 2022-23 season. As a student assistant in 2022-23 she worked with the team daily assisting with practice and video while also completing her master’s degree in health and wellness management.

“I’m grateful for this opportunity that Coach Stockton and the staff have given me,” Ursin said. “Coaching gives me a chance to be a part of basketball, something I still love and am passionate

about. I’m excited and look forward to this journey, and what lies ahead.”

Prior to serving as a student assistant, the Destrehan native played her final collegiate season for the Green Wave in 2021-22. She earned First Team All-American Athletic Conference and AAC

Newcomer of the Year honors as she helped Tulane reach the WNIT.

Before playing her lone season in Uptown, Ursin spent four seasons at Baylor University. While playing for the Bears, she helped Baylor win the NCAA National Championship in 2019 and

make a trip to the Elite Eight in 2021. Ursin also aided Baylor to four regular season Big 12 Championships and three Big 12 Tournament Championships.

Ursin played the role of a key reserve and defensive stopper as a sophomore and junior, but she truly blossomed as a senior. She averaged 12 points, 6.7 rebounds and 3.9 assists per game. She’s shooting 48 percent from the field and 38 percent from 3-point range.

The 2020-21 season was Ursin’s senior season, but Division I, II and III athletes were granted an extra year of eligibility by the NCAA due to COVID-19, and she brought her game to Tulane.

Ursin became the first player to ever secure three Gatorade Player of the Year Awards in Louisiana during her prep career playing at Destrehan High School. She was also a three-time first team All-State selection and named All-USA Louisiana Player of the Year in 2017.

She averaged 27.6 points, 14.2 rebounds, 7.4 assists, 5.6 steals and 4.1 blocks per game as a senior, in what was a dream season for the Ladycats, leading DHS to a perfect 35-0 record and the Class 5A state championship. Destrehan went 121-8 during her four years with the program.



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IMTT Park reopens with upgrades after Hurricane Ida damage

The park features two fields: a baseball field and a multipurpose field, both available for public use. Located at 10668 River Road in St. Rose, it is one of 56 parks and facilities the Department of Parks and Recreation maintains across St. Charles Parish. St. Rose is home to at least five of the parish’s many parks maintained by Parks and Recreation, including IMTT Park, Parquet Park, Fairfield Playground, East Bank Multi-Use Path near Charlestowne, and the fields at Albert Cammon Middle School.

Parks and Recreation officials said most parks have now been sufficiently repaired and reopened, but given

the unprecedented damage caused by Hurricane Ida, there are a handful of parish parks left that await additional storm damage work.

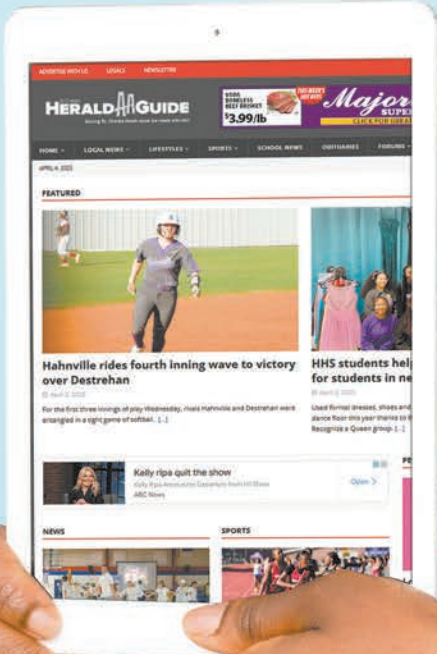

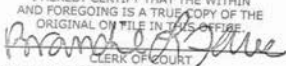

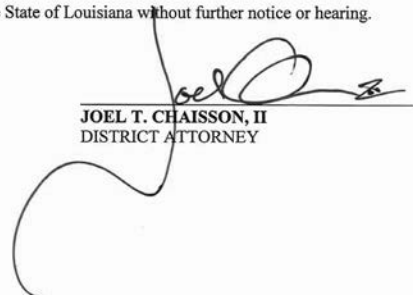

The filing reflects an earned return on common equity ("EROE") for the 2022 Evaluation Period/Test Year of 8.33%, which is below the approved FRP midpoint and, without consideration of the cap, would result in an increase to Base Rider FRP Revenue of approximately \$70.7 million. However, after application of the cap approved by LPSC Order No. U-35565, Base Rider FRP Revenues are only being increased by \$4.9 million. After accounting for all components of FRP Revenue, including amounts inside the bandwidth and subject to the cap as well as amounts which are adjusted outside of the bandwidth, the net increase is \$85.2 million. The resulting FRP factors to be applied to the respective ELL rate classes (including Legacy ELL and Legacy EGSL rate classes) effective for customer bills rendered on and after the first billing cycle of September 2023, are as follows:
