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Luling resident's life altered by unusual vehicular accident

Luling resident James Kynerd and his family are still reeling from an unusual vehicular accident occurring in late August, the physical aftereffects having made a life-altering change in all of their lives.

On Aug. 26 at around 5:30 a.m., just before most St. Charles Parish residents rise in the morning, Kynerd, 60, left his home and began traveling down St. Anthony Street on his Suzuki motorcycle. He was out early to complete his weekly ritual of teaching at a local karate studio, where he holds a third-degree black belt.

Unfortunately for Kynerd, a dually truck towing a two-car carrier trailer was just ahead of him. Residential camera footage later showed the truck's load struck a low-hanging cable, clipped by what appears may have been a Ford F-150 the auto carrier was carrying on top. Because Kynerd was driving behind the truck, when the cable broke

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St. Charles Parish Public Schools show marked improvement in state’s annual release of school performance scores

The Louisiana Department of Education recently released its annual school and district performance scores, results that show overall continued improvement in St. Charles Parish Public Schools’ (SCPPPS) K-12 public schools.

The district performance of SCPPS showed improvement from a lower score of 85.6 in 2018-2019 to a higher score of 87.0 in 2022-2023, an increase of 1.4 points.

SCPPS’ individual schools also showed improvement, evidenced by a raise in overall letter ratings of the parish’s public schools. SCPPS ended the 2018-19 school year with 13 district “B” rated schools and two “C” rated schools. Following the release of 2022-23 scores, the SCPPS district now has two “A” schools, 11 “B” schools, and two “C” schools.

The 2018-2019 school year is used as the basis for comparison, given it was the last full school year before the twin

disasters of COVID-19 and Hurricane Ida later struck.

The parish’s two public high schools showed marked improvement in academic growth with the Department of Education’s scores release, given both schools now carry the coveted “A”

Connecticut native brings lobster rolls to St. Charles Parish

St. Charles Parish recently got a visit from local food truck Joel’s Lobster Rolls, an Orleans Parish-based outfit offering fare rarely seen in South Louisiana – Connecticut-style buttered lobster rolls.

Joel’s Lobster Rolls is operated by Madison, Conn. native Joel Griffin, who became a New Orleans transplant after moving to the area for college, deciding later to stay.

New Orleans is home to many great seafood restaurants, but one seafood item unique to the New England area Griffin said he was unable to find anywhere in South Louisiana was his childhood favorite – lobster rolls.

“Right when I turned 16, it was time for me to get a job, so I got a job at my local clam shack - they’re super popular [in Connecticut] - where they sell these seafood lobster rolls,” Griffin explained of his first job in the food industry, one he would hold throughout high school. “But when I moved down here for school, [lobster rolls were] something I couldn’t find anywhere.”

After finishing college in New Orleans, and still finding no signs of lobster rolls being served locally - Griffin sensed an opportunity to bring a taste of Connecticut to the New Orleans area. He decided to create a business focused primarily on lobster rolls, which he has now operated for the last two years.

Lobster rolls are sandwiches typically served with steamed or fried lobster in its center. Griffin commented there are two main variations to lobster rolls in New England, where the sandwich originates from.

The version many that visit New England are most familiar with is the “Maine style” lobster roll which usually features a mayonnaise, chives and lobster mixture, served cold.

Griffin’s version is different, known as the “Connecticut style” lobster roll, which is instead served warm with butter in the middle of a sandwich bun; no mayonnaise is used. Lobster included in Griffin’s rolls features only lobster claw and knuckle meat.

The food truck owner said he has his lobster meat flown in fresh from Maine, lobster that is “never frozen,” Griffin commented. “I think it’s much tastier [than the Maine version].”

Griffin serves his lobster rolls on a brioche type roll, which is cut New England

style.

“This one has a brioche buttery spin to it that makes it super crispy when you toast it – really flavorful – that just brings the flavor up a lot,” Griffin said of the bread he uses.

While not common in Connecticut, Griffin noticed how many Louisianians enjoyed their seafood served with sauces, so he began to offer a lobster bisque sauce as an add-on option. The sauced version now slightly outsells his original lobster roll version, he said. Griffin also sells clam chowder, made fresh everyday - another New England staple not commonly found in the New Orleans area.

Joel’s Lobster Rolls is a roving food truck operation that normally operates Thursday thru Sunday on a weekly schedule throughout the metro Orleans area, setting up in a new spot each weekday.

While most of his locations tend to be

in Orleans Parish where he is based out of, Griffin said he plans on visiting St. Charles Parish every one to two months and hopes to begin making more frequent trips to the area as his business gets better known locally.

Short term fostering can brighten holidays for shelter pets, families

Whether it's a feeling out phase toward owning a pet, a desire to offer a dog a break from shelter life or simply looking for a bit of companionship while home for the holidays, the St. Charles Parish Animal Shelter might have just the fit for you.

The shelter offers the option to foster any of its animals short term for the holidays as part of its Foster Express program. The shelter provides medical care, food and crate for the pet during its foster tenure, and as a bonus will wrap a present for it to open on Christmas day.

The idea behind providing the option is that short term fostering helps animals emotionally and is a way to prepare/promote them for an eventual permanent adoption.

Animal shelter supervisor and veterinarian Dr. Jena Troxler noted that the St. Charles shelter has offered the option since 2016. Those offering their homes to the animals for a stay are providing a great help, she said, because shelter life can be quite stressful.

"A home environment provides a good routine and acclimation to basic sights, sounds and expectations of

free and whipped backward, it struck him in his exposed throat area with extreme force.

“He was clotheslined off the bike,” Vanessa Kyrnerd, James’ wife, said. “It totally obliterated his trachea; he had extreme difficulty breathing and was in full-blown respiratory failure.”

Vanessa, 61, said video shows the truck driver stopping and getting out of his vehicle, checking behind him, then driving off. Police thus far have not been able to identify the vehicle using the limited residential camera footage capturing the incident.

Dennis Street, a local critical care nurse who happened to be passing by, saw Kyrnerd bleeding and in dire need of help, and immediately jumped into action. Recognizing Kyrnerd may have had just minutes left to live in his injured state, Street placed Kyrnerd into his own vehicle and drove him directly to the local hospital, saving his life.

Kyrnerd was given emergency care and airlifted to University Hospital. His trachea injury has since stabilized but has led to a few severe complications; the first hurdle to arrive following the accident was a blood clot, which shortly afterwards was followed by a massive stroke.

where he went to rehab,” Vanessa explained, speaking with the experience of having been a registered nurse for 25 years.

Kyrnerd slowly recovered and was still on a feeding tube when he was initially sent home – only to later encounter more medical complications. He went into cardiac arrest while at home, was hospitalized again in early November, and now remains in a coma.

“He is currently receiving hyperbaric treatment – it’s considered ‘off-label’ – for a study of 10 days, and we have seen some progress,” Vanessa said.

Transportation costs alone to and from the hospital where he receives the special treatment have been around \$1,000 per day, and the expensive “off-label” treatment is not covered by the Kyrnerds’ medical insurance provider.

“He’s made

some progress – he actually bent his left knee today while he was in the hyperbaric chamber,” Vanessa said, progress the family had not seen until first beginning the treatment.

With the truck driver appearing to be involved in the incident nowhere to be found, Kyrnerd’s own motorcycle insurance policy only had collision related coverage, and thus had no coverage for the devastating injury, which has left him in a coma and suffering from numerous complications.

Kyrnerd moved with his wife to Luling from Jefferson Parish shortly before Hurricane Ida struck in 2021. The couple had moved to St. Charles Parish to live closer to their daughter and grandchildren, who now live in Luling.

The recent accident has left Vanessa caring for her husband with significant financial strain following her husband’s medical complications and various uncovered medical procedures.

A family friend recently started a GoFundMe account to benefit the Kyrnerd family, in an effort to offset the heavy burden of medical expenses the Kyrnerds now face. The event’s two-mile fun run will begin around 4 p.m., with the course being run on the paved top of the nearby Mississippi River levee. Runner registration will take place on the date of the event prior to the run.

Local business owner and Paul Maillard Business and Arts Initiative board member Jenny Lendle mentioned several local school running clubs and teams are already set to participate in the fun run component of the Christmas in the Park event.

“They’ll run to the bridge and back, and we figure by the time everyone’s

back in the park, the sun will be setting, and we can light the oaks,” Lendle mentioned.

The lighting of Monsanto Park’s sizeable live oak trees, which the Paul Maillard Business and Arts Initiative has acquired funding for via local sponsors, will be the capstone of the event at dusk.

“We will graft the oak trees in permanent LED lighting, so that they will be lit up all year long,” Lendle said.

The lighting project was put together in partnership with St. Charles Parish government, Lendle said, which helped the group to get the proper electrical

components in place.

The Paul Maillard Business and Arts Initiative is a local nonprofit organization that first began around two years ago when several community leaders came together to organize a Paul Maillard area art mural. The group later began collaborating, organizing other projects and special events to promote economic growth and community involvement surrounding the Paul Maillard Road area of St. Charles Parish.

Lendle says the group hopes to continue its work by bringing in additional art installations throughout Paul Maillard

Road and the Old Luling area.

“The whole initiative is geared towards bringing back [the Paul Maillard Road and Old Luling area] ... community events are one way we’ve been doing that, as well as our art show and now with Christmas in the Park,” Lendle said.

Captain Debra Dufresne Vial said at present time the krewe is remaining optimistic about plans to maintain its traditional parade route, which gathers and starts at Winnwood Shopping Plaza on Paul Maillard Road.

“We’ve spoken to the [road construction] contractor doing the work, and they said they didn’t see it would be a problem to still line up at Winnwood and be able to pull out onto Paul Maillard,” Vial said. “We’re hoping we can still have it, and we’ll see what the final outcome is; we’ll be able to let everyone know as soon as we can.”

Paul Maillard Road, Vial noted, would only be restricted to one lane around Winnwood Shopping Center, opening

up to two lanes for the remainder of the route.

Like most parades of its type, the Krewe of Lul must submit a formal parade day application with public officials each year, who must first approve the route, and then coordinate with local government for various public services such as traffic control and local police department security to assist.

Given the complexity of the current Paul Maillard Road construction, the Krewe of Lul is submitting its application a little early this year given there may be additional complications that need to be worked out with public officials. Krewe members also need time to prepare, ordering their costumes and throws, renting trailer floats and decorating them, arranging bands and dance teams to attend and other scheduling necessities that go into planning a parade.

The 2024 Krewe of Lul parade, thus far, promises to be the same size as 2023’s parade, which Vial said included “75 units – 25 of which were floats.”

The Krewe of Lul captain mentioned her organization does anticipate possibly making one change to the end of the parade route, although the details have not yet been worked out with parish officials.

The Krewe of Lul’s traditional parade route makes a “P” shaped loop starting at Winnwood Shopping Plaza. The parade heads north on Paul Maillard,



right on River Road, right on Sugarhouse Road, left on Angus Drive, turns left back onto Paul Maillard Road and finally ends where it began at Winnwood Shopping Plaza.

Vial said the final turn at the end of the parade route, when the parade turns left onto Paul Maillard Road from Angus Drive, currently does not appear possible with road construction. This complication may cause the parade to have to end at a different termination point.

“That is going to be the biggest decision that is going to have to be made

- how we’re going to handle the parade ending,” Vial said, one that will require public official input before any changes are made.

No concrete alternatives for the Krewe of Lul parade ending have been proposed yet. Vial hopes to have more details on the parade status soon, once public officials have had sufficient time to formally review the krewe’s parade day application and provide feedback. Krewe of Lul organizers are hopeful they will have answers for parade goers sometime in early January 2024.

rating. Together, Destrehan High School and Hahnville High School now boast a higher number of St. Charles Parish students graduating high school within four years. SCPPS' strength of diploma index increased this year as well, meaning more students are graduating with college credits through advanced placement and dual enrollment courses, or graduating with industry-based certifications through career and technical courses.

"This accomplishment is evidence of the school system's commitment to providing enriching education opportunities for our students," SCPPS Superintendent Dr. Ken Oertling said. "By earning college credits and industry-based certifications while still in high school, students are graduating future-ready with a solid foundation and a financial advantage."

Oertling pointed out high school seniors in SCPPS' graduating class of 2023 collectively saved more than \$2 million in tuition from credits earned through the school system's advanced placement and dual enrollment courses, along with the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) offered within St. Charles Parish Public



Schools.

The Louisiana Department of Education releases school and district performance scores annually, a practice required by federal law and the Louisiana State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE).

Louisiana schools are expected to transition to a more rigorous grading scale beginning in 2024, as directed by BESE. The standard to attain specific letter grades will continue to increase in the future, resulting in a moving target - making it more challenging for SCPPS schools to continue to earn higher letter grades each year.

"For example, whereas a performance score of a 90 would earn an "A" according to the scale used previously and this year, the exact same score will be deemed a "B" next year according to the 'new' scale," SCCPS explained in its November press release.

a household environment," Troxler said. "The shelter staff is wonderful, yet due to the intake of 1,300 homeless pets per year in St. Charles Parish, it still lends itself to a stressful setting to live. There are lots of sound and scents that can be stressful and scary to these pets used to living in homes, but who have lost theirs."

When someone decides to foster on a short-term basis, they bring the dog or cat into the family home and continue to work on the pet's manners – teaching response to commands like sit, down or stay – and reinforce other housetraining basics.

The holidays, Troxler said, provide a nice opportunity for parents and their children to take on a foster pet as something of a family project, with the children home from school for the holidays. One fostering window is approximately a week long, with the second just a touch longer.

"For the holidays we promote a short foster period that many are comfortable with," said Troxler. "Many times we can

find permanent homes within a two-week period and get them from that home and directly into their next forever family."

But sometimes a temporary situation can blossom into something lasting.

"Some fall in love and adopt, while others choose to foster a bit longer & both are great deviations," Troxler said. "We help match the pet to your home, lifestyle, current pet personalities and desired activity levels. Fostering is free and we provide all needed supplies and medical care."

Anyone over 21 can apply. If one rents, landlord approval is necessary for a pet. The foster family's current pets must receive basic yearly veterinary care of an exam, vaccines and recommended heartworm/flea prevention.

The first foster window begins with a Nov. 21 pickup with a return Nov. 27. The second begins with a Dec. 22 pickup and Jan. 2 return.

Destrehan and Zachary collide in matchup of state powers

Wildcats look to advance to ninth semifinal round in 11 years, but 4-time champion in way

Destrehan defensive coordinator Tim Taffi perhaps summed up this Friday night's quarterfinal matchup best.

"Destrehan and Zachary, two big programs going against one another – if you're not excited about this, you don't have a pulse," Taffi said.

No. 3 Destrehan (11-0) and No. 6 Zachary (10-1) represent about as marquee of a matchup as you'll find in a prep quarterfinal round matchup. Destrehan, the defending Division I non-select state champion and a team that has reached at least the semifinal round for five straight seasons – and in 8 of the past 10 seasons – and a Zachary program that has captured four state crowns since 2015.

Zachary's one loss this season came at the hands of Catholic-Baton Rouge in Week 10 of the regular season. 35-28. It's a loss squarely in the rearview mirror, given how the Broncos have played through two weeks of the postseason – defeating Barbe 51-14 and Salmen 49-28 in the last two rounds, respectively.

Wildcat Stadium might just be the place to be this Friday, given the spotlight of the matchup. It will cap what's been an extremely eventful week for Destrehan, which defeated Belle Chasse 31-10 last Friday night to advance.

That day began at Destrehan with the news that head coach Marcus Scott would not be with the team for the game – the news was quite positive, though. Last week, Scott got the call he'd been

waiting a very long time for. The coach has been in need of a kidney transplant, and he was told a match was found. He went into the operating room Friday, and it was an emotional day at Destrehan.

The team went out and no doubt made their coach proud. After the win,

Taffi said Scott spoke to the team early in the season about the situation.

"We knew this was coming... he let the kids know what could happen way early in the year. We had a system in place set up for this, so it wasn't a shock. I think the kids understood," Taffi said.

"(Scott is) the biggest part of this program ... he's trained our team for the seniors to lead," said sophomore quarterback Fields, who helped lead DHS to the win in his first playoff start. "Everybody plays their part. I feel like he taught us so well that we were OK today."

Thomas concurred.

"We were playing for Coach Scott today," said Thomas just after the victory. "We got the job done. I know he's gonna be happy when he hears the news."

Zachary, as one would expect, presents stout challenges on both sides of the ball.

Destrehan offensive coordinator Greg Boyne said Zachary brings the same brand of defense prep football observers have come to expect over the years – very fast, very disciplined and very well coached.

"They're not overly huge, but they're very technically sound," Boyne said. "Their line reminds me of ours. They get off the ball, they get good push into the backfield and they're very gap sound – their linemen fill the gaps and the linebackers make plays.

"Beyond that, they can fly. They've got one of the better track programs in the state traditionally, and a lot of those kids if not most of them are on the football team. They're definitely fast, sound and well-coached. I think we are too, and that's what makes this a good matchup."

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Tigers alum Haydel inducted into Nicholls Hall of Fame

Pitcher helped lead HHS to state crown, was conference Pitcher of the Year for Colonels

When Hahnville captured the Class 5A state softball championship in 2011, it was Hannah Haydel in the pitcher’s circle, striking out Denham Springs’ final batter to seal the victory.

Only one year earlier, Haydel allowed the tying and winning runs in the 2010 state championship game. In hindsight, that she bounced back would come as little surprise to anyone who has followed her pitching career – the Nicholls State alum proved to be as mentally tough a competitor as there is, and its that mental side of the game that she loved the most about her sport.

“I never had the height of the typical pitcher, but I had the mentality for it,” Haydel recalled of her early days in the circle. “I loved those one on one challenges, the mental battle between you and each batter, tuning out everything besides your coach, your team and what you needed to do out there.”

Her approach led her to find great success at the college level – she became the Southland Conference Pitcher of the Year in 2016, was the Colonels’ first 20-game winner since 1998 and earned numerous other honors and accolades.

Make that one more this month: Haydel was inducted into the Nicholls State Athletics Hall of Fame on Nov. 11, prior to Nicholls’ football game against Lamar.

“It’s exciting – so many of my teammates from college, high school and even travel ball were texting me congratulations. It made me feel pretty special,” Haydel said. “Some of my old teammates from college were going to the game to cheer me on. You know with adult life, people lose touch, but then something like this happens and they’re right there for you again. It just tells you how much those days meant to all of us.”

Haydel was the ace of the Colonel softball pitching staff in her four seasons and helped turn around the program. She graduated ranking in the Top 10 of the program career lists with 51 wins, 392 strikeouts, five saves, and a 2.73 ERA.

After earning All-Southland honorable mention twice, Haydel emerged as the Southland’s top pitcher in

her senior season, earning SLC Pitcher of the Year, All-Southland First Team, and NFCA All-Region. She was a four-time LSWA Pitcher of the Week, three-time SLC Pitcher of the Week, and was the first Colonel to win 20 games since 1998. She was also a standout in the classroom, garnering Southland All-Academic twice.

“Everything really started clicking in my junior and senior year,” said Haydel. “I felt very confident in what I was doing and was seasoned as a pitcher. I had so much support from my team that really helped out. Looking back, it really was a special time.”

Haydel said those relationships with her teammates are what she cherishes most, calling them lifelong bonds.

“From living with some of my teammates to having them in my wedding ... it’s friendships I’ll keep forever,” Haydel said.

Of course, she also loved the competition.

“You’re reading the batter’s body language,” Haydel said. “You understand what your catcher is thinking,

even if you’re not talking, and she can read me too. Those parts of the game are the biggest challenges, and it’s what really started to click for me in my last two years of playing.”

At Hahnville, Haydel was part of a run that saw the Tigers go to three consecutive state championship games.

It was a special time for the program fueled by an exceptional group of players under then-head coach Kenneth Vial.

“I think we all had the same goal in mind,” Haydel said. “We all played travel ball together and we had that same competitive mentality. A



lot of us ended up going to play at the college level and I got to play against a lot of those former teammates.”

These were the times the former Tigers needed no scouting report.

“We grew up together and we knew each others’ quirks already,” she said. “It’s fun and challenging. You want to get ‘em and beat ‘em. There’s that competitive side of it, but it’s also great having them on the other side.”

Since her playing days, Haydel earned her master’s degree in speech pathology and currently works as a speech pathologist and rehab director.

She may no longer take the field, but her legacy as a Colonel is cemented.

“There were so many awesome experiences, things I’ll keep with me forever,” Haydel said.

Many of the Wildcats’ players experienced their first playoff action a week ago, including sophomore quarterback Jackson Fields. Fields completed 14 of 20 passes for 233 yards, two touchdowns and an interception.

For Fields and his teammates who made their initial playoff starts, getting that experience prior to this matchup with Zachary was vital, said Boyne.

So was getting running back Shane Lee back. Lee rushed for 136 yards and a score in his return to the lineup after a two weeks sidelined by injury. Shane Ward also rushed for 102 yards and a touchdown – the two combined for 30 carries and 238 yards on the night.

“Run the ball, protect the ball and eliminate penalties ... if we can do that as an offense, we have a chance to win the game,” Boyne said. “Our defense has done the job no matter who we’ve played. Run the ball, stop the run and protect the ball – those are things we hang our hat on.”

Taffi said that defensively, the biggest challenge is dealing with the size and physicality of the Zachary line. He said when Zachary gets into its biggest matchups, the Broncos make no secret as to what they like to do.

“They’re big and they’re physical,” Taffi said. “They run the ball a lot – they want to run it in the games against the better teams they’ve played. It’s been their trademark.”

The player carrying the workload primarily will be Kameron Thomas, a running back who had 149 yards on the ground in last week’s victory over Salmen.

“He’s very good. He’s fast, he makes good cuts and he does a good job reading his blocks,” Taffi said.

But the challenge is multifaceted, Taffi said, as there’s nothing one-dimensional about the Broncos.

“You certainly want to stop the run, but you can’t sleep on their passing

game with their talented group of receivers,” Taffi said.

One might not need a roster at all to identify the most dynamic of those receivers. Tight end Trey’dez Green stands at 6’8, weighs 230 pounds and represents a problem for any defense.

“They like to get it to him, obviously,” Taffi said. “It’s a big wide receivers corps overall. And when you’re 6’8, you can go up and get it.

“We’ve got to stop them from making big plays. You can’t stop everything – they’re going to make plays, but you have to limit what they do. Get some stops, get off the field, give the ball to our offense for as many opportunities as possible.”

Two quarterbacks have seen time for Zachary and will distribute the ball among their targets, Hudson Spangler and Caleb Gonzales.

The two programs matched up in the semifinal round of 2018. That game was at Wildcat Stadium – and that game was one of the wildest you could ever hope to see on a football field at any level.

Zachary emerged from that game a 67-57 winner on a rainy night full of big – and often unconventional – plays.

“It was nuts. Absolutely nuts,” said Boyne with a laugh. “And you look at the score, 67 was not on the defense – you had a kickoff return for a touchdown, a fake punt for a touchdown, a defensive back stole the ball from our receiver for a touchdown. That season, 30 was a lot of pass attempts for us, and J.R. Blood went

36-for-49 that night. That was an amazing performance on his part.

“I spoke to (Zachary head coach David Brewerton) to set up the logistics and he goes, ‘I’ve gotta ask ... we cannot do 67-57 again.’ Nope, I don’t think any of us can.”

This week, of course, marked the continuation of what’s become almost an annual tradition at Destrehan – Thanksgiving morning practice, where the team enjoys donuts together as a quarterfinal week treat.

“It’s a great tradition and it’s awesome to be able to have that. We certainly don’t take it for granted,” Taffi said. “It’s something our kids have earned the past several years, and we get to enjoy it again this year.”
