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Des Allemands woman remembered for caring nature, selflessness

Countless in the St. Charles Parish community have mourned the death of Guadalupe “Lupe” Sweeney, who recently passed away at the age of 88.

Sweeney was known for her selflessness, displayed regularly through her volunteerism in the name of numerous causes and agencies. After retiring from Entergy Waterford 1 and 2, she was a member of TRIAD, Council on Aging, Queen Yaya Sisterhood, Red Hat Society, Hornets’ Used to Bees dance team and Dancing Grannies, volunteering for community events including the Special Olympics, Food for Seniors and Toys for Tots. A St. Gertrude Catholic Church parishioner for 44 years, Sweeney was also well known for her strong faith.

She was also an active member of the Hahnville High School

Touchdown Club and avid Tigers supporter.

“I would say that one word that really described her was service,” said Realtor Regina Allemand, who became close with Sweeney at the Touchdown Club when Sweeney’s grandson and Allemand’s son were Tigers’ teammates. “She served her community, she served her family and she would do anything for anybody – she would drop everything to help someone whether that entailed running the roads or giving the coat off her back.”

Connie Love, who volunteered along with Sweeney with the Special Olympics, said Sweeney had a big heart. Sweeney was a coach and

School-based mental health centers making a difference

When a St. Charles Parish student started having weekly panic attacks and daily anxiety due to social interactions and past trauma, she didn’t have to venture far to get the help she needed.

That student met with therapist Sharell Warren-Veal, who works for Access Health Louisiana’s Albert Common Wellness Center, which serves both St. Rose Elementary and Albert Common Middle School.

“That student has now completed therapy and is excelling in high school,” Warren-Veal said.

Warren-Veal, who has worked as a therapist at both schools for a little over a year, said most of the students the wellness center serves have limited access to healthcare, let alone behavioral healthcare.

“A lot of families need help locating providers during a feasible time. This means the student would miss school, and the parent would typically have to miss work,” she said. “The services are provided during the student enrichment time and don’t pose a scheduling concern for the family.”

Warren-Veal provides both individual and group counseling to students.

“It is fantastic when you can make a difference in a student’s life,” she said.

“The most minor things, like a weekly check-in, change the dynamics. The students know you genuinely care for them.”

Jerry Smith, who serves as Executive Director of Child Welfare and Attendance and Student Services for St. Charles Parish Public Schools, said it’s highly critical for the district to

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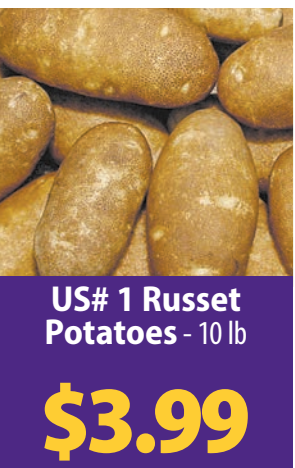
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Parish forms partnership as registration open for summer camp

The group holds summer camps in more than 30 locations.

Cavaretta said the partnership looks to be a plus for everyone involved.

was really what spread the word that we were opening. One of the most common responses is that people are excited not to have to drive to Metairie or New Orleans for fresh craft beer or to hang out.”

Zeringue is a chemist and brewer and said that he and his wife brewed more than 200 batches of beer before settling on what they plan to regularly offer their customers. German Coast Beer Company will feature a few beers on tap on a permanent basis, including an IPA, American lager and English stout, alongside a continuously rotating group of seasonal beers using different hop styles and malt characteristics.

Since the brewery was announced last year, Zeringue said they’ve fielded plenty of questions but the response has been an easy one - “yes.”

“Will there be food? Yes, we will have some food, pop ups, food trucks and our neighbors’ lovely menu. Is it kid friendly? Yes, we



will have root beer and games for kids. Will there be sports? Yes! Will there be private events? Yes, Thursday nights will be for rehearsal dinners, graduation parties or company parties,” he said.

Zeringue added that he and his wife’s excitement has only grown after seeing the success Crawfish and Chill has had next door.

“Our neighbors at Crawfish and Chill have done a wonderful job, and their food is amazing,” he said. “It shows how supportive this community is to new and local businesses. This particular area has a state-of-the-art recreation center, performing arts center and community center. A lot of the community works at the courthouse, sheriff’s office and school board. We can’t wait to become the local brewery and add to the excitement.”

Though the Zeringues had originally planned to open early in 2024, the date was pushed back as they deal with a crucial point in renovations and permitting.

“The renovations to the building were massive: new roof, walls, floors and ceilings, bathrooms, exterior patio, electrical and HVAC,” Zeringue said. “In the next four weeks we will be building the brewhouse and cellar. Once we get it permitted

and inspected we will start brewing. Our beers can take anywhere from two to six weeks of fermenting before it’s ready to serve.

“We are very hopeful that we are 60-90 days out from opening the doors. We are giving ourselves margin time to make sure we are serving the most incredible beer possible. The beer will be worth the wait!”

He added that being so close to the opening date almost doesn’t seem real.

“We have been planning this brewery for years now, and there have been so many roadblocks that we have had to get past (COVID, Hurricane IDA),” he said. “Now that the opening date is so close, it feels like perfect timing.”

put it all into the broth ... I didn’t make the broth correctly. I made it backwards,” Champagne said. “I was supposed to let it sit and do what I was supposed to do. The whole time I was basically trying to tweak the sauce so it could taste edible ... it just wouldn’t come out right.”

Ultimately, Champagne did find the right mix – to the event judges’ enjoyment, as they declared Champagne victorious.

“I did not expect that at all. When they said the third-place winner, I thought that was for first place,” Champagne said. “When they got to me and I realized, wow, I’m in first not third – unexpected, but thank you for sure.”

The cook-off takes place annually. According to Pat Phelan, a longtime chef and culinary teacher with St. Charles Parish Public Schools, the child nutrition department of the school district provides a different food item that will be the base for each student to work off of when preparing their dish. The dish must be feasible to offer on a school menu, so price and other factors come into play. This year, the item was roasted turkey.

Champagne, Phelan said, cooks with a bit of flair.

“He likes to do his own thing,” Phelan said. “Most team members tend to rely on sticking to the recipe, and that is how you learn, but he’s focused on making

his own thing up – he’s a creative thinker and a worker. It’s how someone can become really good.”

Champagne said he began cooking when he was 12. Before that, he said his mother had often asked him to try, but that it seemed like too much of a hassle.

“But I started trying stuff out ... we always used to have this (item) for this meal, but not the rest, or that for that meal but not the rest. I always ended up throwing things together and it ended up pretty good a couple of times,” Champagne said. “So, it was like, ‘Hey, I think I can cook.’”

His first-ever dish was homemade lasagna.

“Everything was from scratch,” he said. “To me, it wasn’t especially that good, but I was just 12 at the time and it was decent, so I wanted to keep going.”

He notes his specialty, meanwhile, is fried chicken.

The trial and error of it all appealed to him then and still does today. Making the dish is one thing, but making small tweaks each time to perfect the taste is perhaps the element he enjoys most.

“You try and change the smallest things to see how much it makes a difference,” Champagne said.

Often, it can make a pretty big difference – and as Champagne often finds, a delicious result.

“We actually held a craft fair without food trucks and wasn’t as successful until we added the food truck element into the mix,” Schmill said. “Our last event brought in 12 different food trucks and over 25 craft booths.”

nearly 10 food trucks and 10 craft booths already signed up.

Schmill said that American Legion Post 131’s Food Truck & Craft Fair offers a little something for everyone.

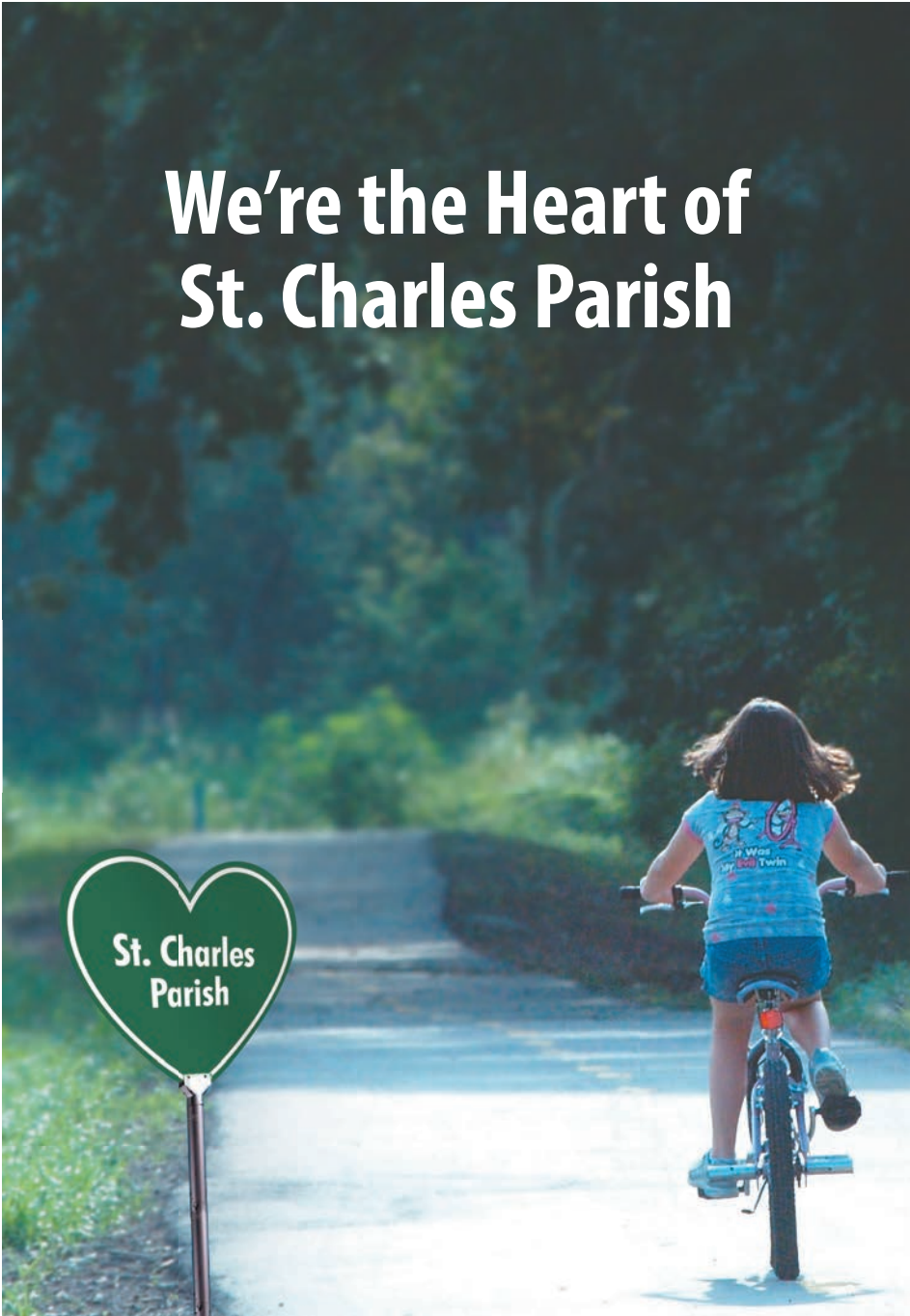
“We have tents and tables set up so people can sit and hang out with their families. Our vendors also bring family

have the behavioral health counseling services that are provided by Access Health.

“This partnership supports our unwavering commitment to supporting our students’ mental health and social-emotional wellness needs and is directly aligned with our St. Charles Parish Public Schools mission of developing empathetic, involved, productive, and responsible citizens,” she said.

She said the district has “definitely” seen positive outcomes for the students who are receiving such services.

“It can be very challenging for parents to secure behavioral health appointments after school and/or after work hours, which oftentimes results in missed appointments and/or school absences,” she said. “Our partnership with Access Health Louisiana affords our students timely access to critical behavioral health support on their school campuses and enables them to receive therapy for a variety of behavioral health needs, including trauma, anxiety, depression and other stressors in an expedited manner.”

After abrupt closures of schools due to the pandemic, Smith said the district realized that students not only suffered academic learning loss, but also suffered social-emotional loss (SEL) as

well. To help identify students who may be experiencing trauma and other adverse childhood experiences, the district launched universal screening for behavioral health needs in the fall of the 2020-21 school year.

“The screener results are heat-mapped in a format that allows us to identify students who endorsed ‘high SEL needs’ in their responses to the screener,” Smith said. “Our partnership with Access Health has been an integral support part of the post-screening triage process and enables students to receive therapy for a variety of behavioral needs, including trauma, anxiety, depression and other stressors in an expedited manner.”



Wildcats' pitching shines in early season battles

While Destrehan head baseball coach Chris Mire said he's pleased to be 5-3 through his team's first eight games on the diamond, there was a tinge of disappointment in his voice nonetheless – Destrehan could just as easily be 7-1, but for two games that slipped away.

"I think everyone on our team would agree that we let a couple get away," said Mire. "We felt like we were in control."

Part of the frustration, Mire said, is that Destrehan has seen a lot come together thus far from its players – the pitching staff has put together an ERA under 2 and offensively, several Wildcats are off to strong starts.

"We've struggled defensively and in baserunning – if we can stop shooting ourselves in the foot, I think we can really make some noise," Mire said.

All of that said, the Wildcats are nonetheless in a good position after eight games against quality competition, and some of the defensive struggles Destrehan has endured seems likely to improve with experience – DHS is breaking in new starters in about half of the lineup on a day-to-day basis.

Strong pitching has been a tradition for the Destrehan program, and the 2024 staff thus far has been stellar. Alex Schiff has been among those at the forefront, a senior who has excelled as both a starter and reliever this season. Schiff has appeared in five of the team's first eight games and has secured saves in two of those.

"He's the tone setter," said Mire. "We've asked him to do it all and he's ready every single day. 'Give me the ball.' Our staff feeds off him. He's very confident in what he does. He attacks and

"(Stubbs) has given us good innings," said Mire. "He's emerged as a talented arm. Jayse pitched a lot last year and now he's asked to be a starter, and he's done a good job."

Offensively, Brady Mire, Bennett McNamara, Jack

Conravey and Chase Mire have all been off to a good start over the early season.

Even better news for the offense: Shane Lee is starting to get rolling.

"Before the West Monroe game, he wasn't up to his usual standard and he'd agree, but he was locked in this weekend," Chris Mire said. "He doesn't have the full fall to get ready (due to football). He's getting on base a lot.

People are aware of him and pitching around him. He's starting to get going and once he locks in, he's a big difference-maker and piece of our offense for sure."

Lee smashed a home run in Destrehan's 5-4 loss to West Monroe on Saturday, one of the

The Tigers are 6-3 and have scored multiple runs in every game since, including a three-game winning streak that saw Hahnville pile up a combined 42 runs in wins over Natchitoches Central, Belle Chasse and DeRidder.

“I’d hate to have to pitch to this lineup,” Schulz said. “When we hit, we really hit. We can hit for power, we can move runners around, bunt ... this is a very solid team, it’s really just a matter of getting them to fully believe that and for us to put it all together.”

Brazzi Jacob is among those comprising the heart of the order and comes off a very strong 2023. Since her return from a broken leg that she suffered prior to her freshman year, Jacob has been a consistent force in the Tigers’ lineup and this year has made a significant move defensively as she mans shortstop.

“I don’t think Brazzi’s sat for a single game since (her return),” said Schulz. “You always know she’s gonna give all she has. I think she’s more relaxed at shortstop – she’s played there before and she seems to really like it. I think she’s in for a very good season. She’s been bouncing between third and fifth in the order, hitting wherever

we’ve needed her, and she’s one who’s going to give you that clutch, timely hit.”

Addy Bertrand, meanwhile, is another returning standout – and she makes nothing easy for opposing pitchers. Bertrand has struck out just four times this season.

“She’s got a real good knowledge of the strike zone,” said Schulz. “She’s going to play at the next level and you have to

have that.”

Amberly Dempster and Morgan DeJean are also off to strong starts, as is Jenna Cancienne, who has launched three home runs thus far this season.

“She has a real powerful bat and we’re excited about her too,” said Schulz. “She’s stepped up big.”

Among newcomers to the squad, freshman Jordyn Chaix

has hit four home runs already and has asserted herself as a factor.

“A very good athlete and she’s an even better kid,” Schulz said. “We kind of saw (her talent) when she came in, but we didn’t realize she’d take off like she has already. She’s very athletic and she can play anywhere on the field.”

On the mound, Hahnville has an experienced combination

leading the charge as Cancienne and Kloe White are both back from leading last season’s rotation.

The Tigers fell in their last game to Dutchtown, 10-4, as the Griffins rode a 5-run sixth inning to take control. Dempster and Cancienne each had two hits for Hahnville. White took the loss on the mound.

That game took place at Hahnville’s annual tournament, as did its game earlier on Saturday – a 16-2 victory over DeRidder.

DeJean, Cancienne, Chaix, Dempster and Brianna Keller each doubled, while Jacob doubled twice. Cancienne went 3-for-4 with four RBIs. Jacob, Dempster and Addison Walton each earned two hits and two RBIs, while DeJean also had two hits to go with three RBIs.

Cancienne earned the victory, going the complete five-inning game and allowing two runs on six hits and a walk. She struck out three.

Last week the Tigers also faced off with Belle Chasse, taking a 12-3 win in which Cancienne and Jacob each launched home runs. Chaix and Bertrand each has two hits and two RBIs. Cancienne pitched another complete game, going seven innings and allowing no earned runs on nine hits and two walks. She struck out three.

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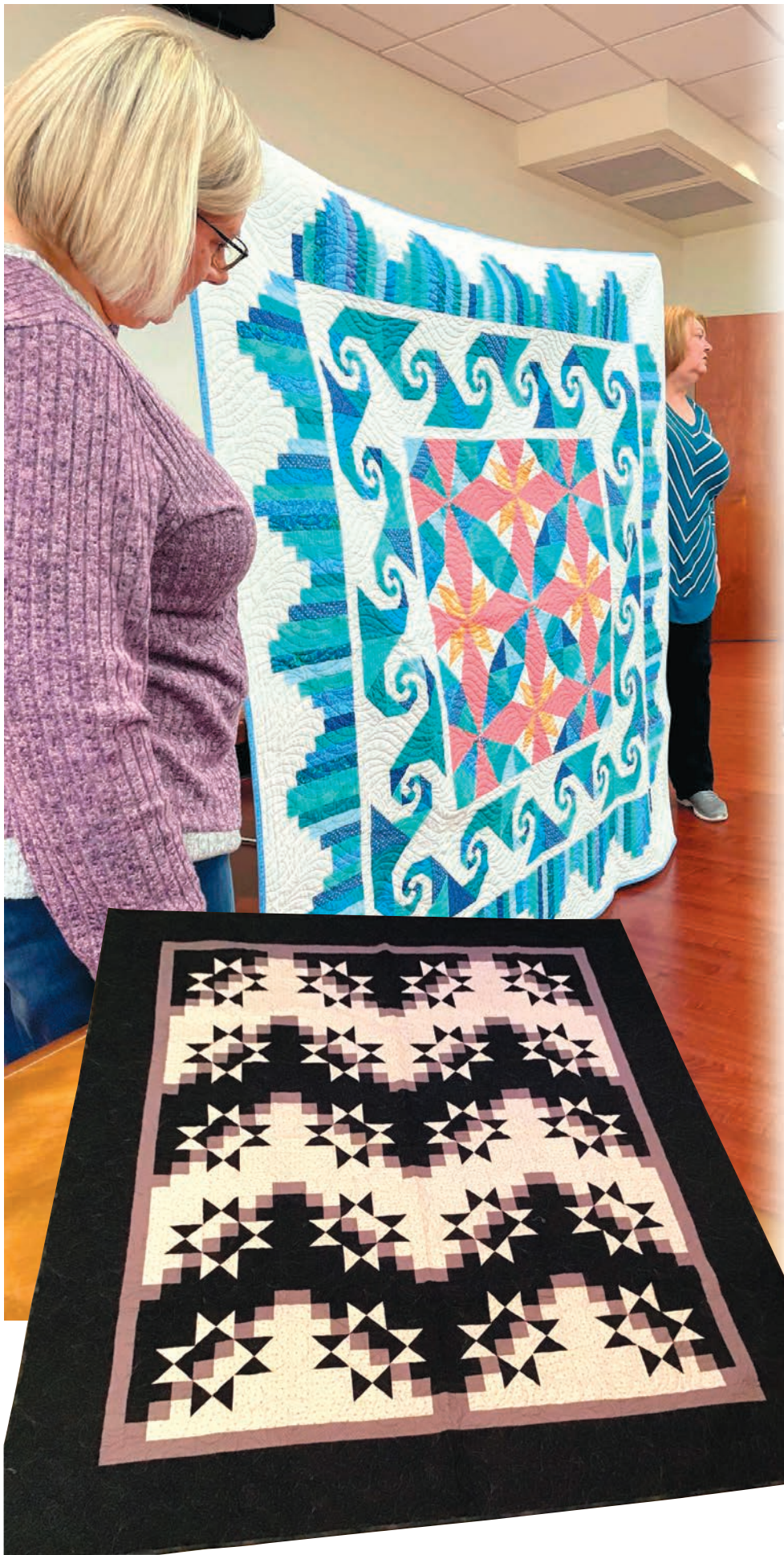

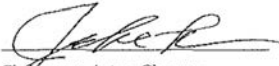

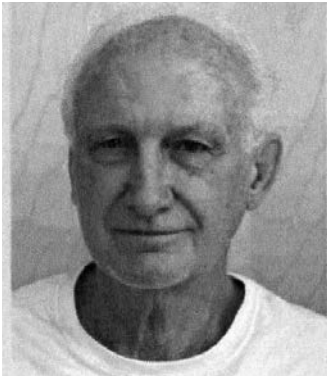
