## Battle for the Paddle delivers food, fun and music for a good cause

United Way of St. Charles expects to host its largest number of teams ever competing at this year's Battle for the Paddle - and that means even more great food for all who attend the upcoming fundraiser.

This year's event will be held Oct. 2 at the Edward Dufresne Community Center in Luling from 3 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Approximately 250 teams are slated to compete at the cookoff, the winners earning titles including Best Jambalaya, Best Pastalaya and Best Gumbo.

The Battle for the Paddle is a major part of UWSC's fundraising efforts, with proceeds going toward positive work in the community done by the organization and its partner agencies. Causes include providing meals for children in need,

providing support for victims of domestic violence, and building wheelchair ramps for the elderly. More than 30 local United Way-funded, nonprofit agencies benefit from the annual fundraiser.

Admission is \$10, but free for children ages 10 and under. Event admission allows visitors to eat as many servings as they care to sample of jambalaya, gumbo or pastalaya dishes, from as many of the various competing teams as they would like to try.

As United Way of St. Charles Executive Director John Dias notes, that's not a bad deal.

Child Advocacy Services provides support to River Parishes community members through two programs: The Children Advocacy Center (CAC) and Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA).



The CAC's counselor, Marcy Willett, LPC, NCC provides counseling services, including trauma-focused therapy, to children and families.

River Parishes CASA Volunteer Supervisors, Jodi Luna and Alyssa Bordelon, oversee and support dedicated volunteers who advocate on behalf of children in foster care within the judicial system.

Codie Witmer is the CASA recruiter of the River Parishes. Witmer recruits community members to become Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA). 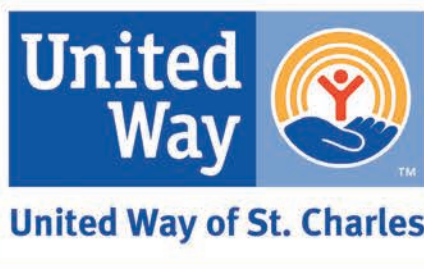

# St. Charles Parish Community Services

Community Services serves as the safety net for individuals and struggling families within St. Charles Parish. In collaboration with community partners, programs are provided to respond to the needs of residents in crisis and youth at risk.

Programs are developed and implemented to provide supportive services to improve quality of life, build self-sufficiency, and break the cycle of poverty.

Through the support of United Way and the Repair on Wheels Program, Community Services builds ramps for elderly and disabled homeowners.

Through the support of United Way and the Summer Food Service Program, Community Services provides lunch for children 18 and under and disabled adults who attend an accredited school in St. Charles Parish at designated sites throughout the parish for six weeks during the summer.

The department of community services provides safety net services for struggling families through the following programs: low income home energy program for assistance with electricity; share

the warmth program in partnership with Atmos for assistance with gas services; emergency rent through a partnership with the HUD HOME program; emergency assistance for residents that need assistance with water, rent or electricity through the department emergency program; and an on site emergency food bank.

The department provides minor home repairs and handicap ramps through health and safety programs. And the department provides assistance to qualified applicants for home repairs through the HUD HOME program.

In addition, the department offers before care and after school drop neighborhood based programs for youth in targeted communities. Special programs for adults include life skills and lunch and learn events. The department offers special summer food programs offered for all school age children.

EAL offers seizure first aid and safety training to school personnel, childcare workers, police officers, and the general public. This training equips participants to recognize different types of seizures and respond safely and appropriately. With 1 in 10 people expected to experience a seizure in their lifetime, having a community trained in seizure first aid is essential for ensuring everyone's safety.

EAL also offers several options for training, including both in-person sessions and monthly online sessions on the second Thursday of each month. Participants learn to recognize seizures and provide the necessary first aid, helping create a safer community for individuals affected by epilepsy.

EAL's client services team assists individuals and families who are new to an epilepsy diagnosis or in need of extra support. The team helps guide them through available resources and services.

# Future Fathers Outreach

Future Fathers Outreach (FFO) is a St. Charles Parish based nonprofit mentoring program partnered with the United Way of St. Charles.

The FFO organization focuses on its four pillars: adventure, exploration, passion and individuality. The group's mission is to empower youth from any economic, racial, cultural or religious background to create a life that is meaningful to both themselves and the community they are a part of.

Accepting that no two people are identical, all youth are encouraged to define their own value system based on their own unique, innate inclinations. Using an introspective approach to life experiences, participants learn to cultivate self-trust.

Group discussions are a participant-guided open forum, where the youth practice critical thinking, sharing their own ideas, and being effective listeners. In addition to open discussions, weekly meetings also include team building exercises that foster community and creativity.

Entrepreneurship is encouraged within the FFO. Youth explore ways to transform an idea



into a business plan, organize marketing strategies and learn about accounting.

The FFO hosts regular retreats called the "First Time for Everything Retreats," designed to encourage youth to do something they have never done before. The retreats encourage exploration and imagination.

This summer, Future Father's Outreach's 15u Guardians Basketball team earned five championship wins and finished the season with 30 wins and five losses. The team made the championship game in 7 out of 9 tournaments and had two second place finishes.

At the Ballin on Beach tournament, the team finished 13th out of 60 teams in the 15u division GOLD bracket.

## GNO Therapeutic Riding Center

To see children and adults with disabilities ride horses is an unforgettable experience. Not only do they sit taller and smile more, they extend their dreams beyond the confines of their disability into new, unexplored worlds. Riding exercises the spirit as well as the body.



or emotional disability is present, the unique relationship formed with a horse can help to improve personal relationships. All riders benefit from increased self esteem and confidence.

Greater New Orleans Therapeutic Riding Center is a member center of PATH Int'l, an international governing body for the therapeutic riding industry and establishes safety standards and teaching techniques for operating centers. That means that each rider is assured the greatest reward with the least possible risk.

GNOTRC is a nonprofit organization that serves children and adults with just about any disability. The therapeutic riding center has 7 equine therapists that provide movement most similar to the human walking gait, which builds upper body strength and coordination. For individuals with impaired mobility, horseback riding gently and rhythmically moves their bodies in a manner similar to the human walking gait. These riders experience increased balance, muscle control and strength. Individuals with learning disorders or cognitive disabilities are motivated by riding to increase concentration, patience and discipline. If a psychological

The center has classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 5:30 and 6:30 p.m., and Saturdays from 9-11 a.m. The center has a covered arena, so that classes can be held during the summer months. Volunteers are needed to assist our riders with preparation of the horses for classes, and as side walkers and horse leaders during the classes. # St. Charles Parish TRIAD

The core of St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office's TRIAD is an advisory S.A.L.T. Council (Seniors and Lawmen Working Together). This governing body of TRIAD is composed of law enforcement along with senior service providers. The S.A.L.T. Council examines and recommends programs, increases communication and recruits volunteers to help with objectives.

TRIAD's focus is to reduce the fear of crime by identifying misconceptions, educating seniors on criminal activities and creating programs to reduce crime against seniors.

Some objectives include: surveying seniors to determine their crime related concern; preparing a list of available programs and services for seniors; operating an ongoing channel to exchange information between seniors and law enforcement;

## Attorney steps up to fully fund Imagination Library for local children

The Dolly Parton Imagination Library was launched locally in 2010 by United Way of St. Charles, and since then nearly 239,584 books have been mailed to local children completely free of charge.

The library will continue on doing just that in great part due to St. Charles Parish's Loyd J. Bourgeois, who has stepped forward to fully fund the program.

Bourgeois, a personal injury attorney, said that he saw the strength of the program firsthand through his family's experience – his children were among the many receiving those books in the mail.

“As a dad, I've seen firsthand how much my own children benefited from receiving Imagination Library books,” Bourgeois said. “Those books sparked their curiosity and gave us countless moments of reading together as a family. It means a lot to me to know that this program will continue for every child in St. Charles Parish, giving them the same opportunities to learn, dream, and grow.”

More than 1,200 children are currently enrolled in the program, which is aimed at making a lasting impact on early literacy and school readiness. The Imagination Library is available

for every child from birth to age 5.

Each child receives one free, age-appropriate book in the mail every month until their fifth birthday. Children can build a personal library of up to 60 books by the time they graduate from the program.

Those backing the Imagination Library see it as an investment in building a stronger future for St. Charles Parish children, with the idea in mind that early access to books boosts kindergarten readiness and can foster a lifelong love of reading.

“We can't thank the Loyd J Bourgeois Injury and Accident Lawyer Firm enough for their support of the Imagination Library program,”

said Kacy Kernan, United Way of St. Charles' Director of Community Impact. “Because of their generosity, children in our community will continue to receive the gift of books each month, opening the doors to imagination, learning, and a lifelong love of reading. can eat, cooked by the 220 or so teams we're going to have with us,” said Dias. “There's four people on each team ... if we get a few more teams, we'll have 1,000 people cooking before the public even arrives.

“I think adding pastalaya a few years ago has been a big hit for us. That's become popular and we see more and more of that. So, the food, the music ... we still see it as the biggest neighborhood party in St. Charles Parish. And it's all for a good cause.”

“They were very well-received,” Dias said.

There will also be a 50-50 raffle. And, of course, prizes and custom awards for the winning teams.

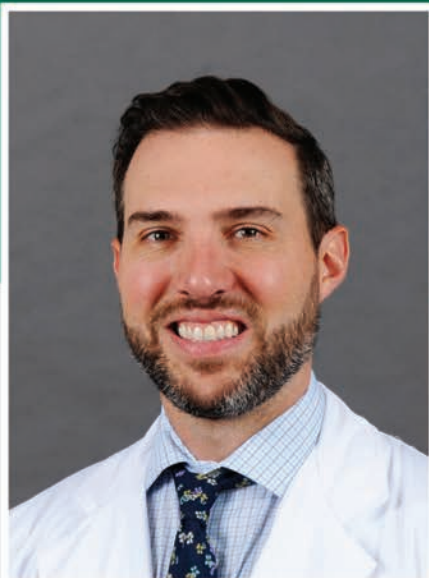
Bragging rights, as well.

Several distribution programs are available: USDA Distribution, Donated Food Distribution and Houseless Bags.

The ministry has partnered with governmental agencies like the St. Charles Parish Sheriff's Office to help transition people released from incarceration to become self-supported, and it has partnered with the court system to support the assignment of community service hours. Matthew 25:35 Ministries has further aligned itself with River Parish Community College in order to help students become food secure, so that they can concentrate on their education. This year, the organization partnered with junior high schools in the parish to provide food-insecure students with a bag of food to take home on Fridays.

The ministry also holds workshops and other educational and social events to help their clients and their families grow in their health, nutrition, movement, personal lives and their spirit.

The Crime Victim Assistance Division's objective is to provide available services to victims of violent crimes and their immediate family members.

Crime Victim Assistance receives funding from the United Way of St. Charles to fund the Crisis Assistance Program (C.A.P.). C.A.P. provides crisis counseling to persons affected by violent crimes or traumatic events.

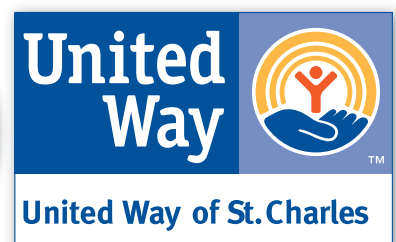
Officers and Detectives can request the presence of a C.A.P. counselor to the scene of the event, once it is safe, allowing the law enforcement officer to remain focused on their duties during the crisis or investigation. This can have a tremendous impact on victims' willingness to cooperate with investigations and the prosecution of cases, as well as possibly increase their overall satisfaction with the criminal justice system.

Crime Victim Assistance Division personnel can also request a C.A.P. counselor when victims of serious crimes are seeking assistance.

C.A.P. provides the victim and family members with onsite crisis management, debriefing counseling, screening, referrals, support and guidance during and after a traumatic event in a safe environment. Included are family survivors of unexpected tragic deaths, excluded are victims who commit a felony during an event. Our goal is to respond swiftly, effectively, facilitate stabilization and provide support to the responding officers and victims.

# Hahnville travels to Terrebonne

After dominant win over E.D. White, HHS opens 9-5A play in battle of district title contenders

Hahnville entered the week off of a dominant win over a perennial contender in E.D. White, but the Tigers had little time to celebrate.

This week brings the District 9-5A opener for the Tigers as it visits Terrebonne Friday night in a matchup of undefeated teams, both of which have district championship aspirations.

Last season saw a back-and-forth offensive shootout in the battle of Tigers, with Calvin Smith's five touchdown night spelled the difference for Hahnville in a 49-31 victory.

Most of Terrebonne's team is back this season after it went 8-3 a season ago and the team figures to be among top contenders for the District 9-5A championship once again. Terrebonne is looking to build on a successful season, but one that ended in round one after THS was upset by Chalmette in round one.

It's been an ascendant program under head coach Tyler Lewis, and one built on the hallmarks of the West St. John Ram teams he starred for as a player: strong play across both lines and big play ability all over the field.

Terrebonne is taking aim at a 4-0 start. A win over Hahnville would be its third over a River Parishes team, with a 24-13 win over Riverside and a 28-8 win over St. James in weeks 1 and 3 respectively. It also posted a 42-3 win over Ellender in Week 2.

Alvin Celestin is back as a do-it-all playmaker. Celestin lines up as a running back and as a wide receiver and is dangerous with the ball.

But Terrebonne's breakout star this season has been running back Quincy Adams, who Hahnville head coach Greg Boyne said has emerged as a driving force for this offense.

"The offense kind of runs through him now," Boyne said. "He played some Wildcat quarterback against St. James, got 30 touches and scored four or five times. He reminds me a little bit of Calvin Smith. He's got good size and they give him the ball in different ways. He'll play some Wildcat quarterback, they'll throw him the ball, and then you've also got Celestin who they're creative with. They get him the ball with the bubble screens

and quick passes."

Boyne also had praise for Terrebonne quarterback Owen Oliver, a three-year starter.

"He doesn't get enough credit as a quarterback. He just seems to make plays every time you put on the film," said Boyne. "He's not a 2,500 yard passer but he extends plays with his legs and he's a big, strong kid."

He added that he feels like it's (Oliver's "fourth or fifth year back there")

"I could have sworn he was a senior last year and I'm thinking, 'they're going to have a hard time replacing him.' Then we went to the scrimmage and I'm like, wait a minute, this kid is back," Boyne quipped.

Terrebonne's calling card is along its offensive and defensive lines. This is one of the biggest teams Hahnville will see and Boyne estimated it is the biggest offensive line on the HHS schedule. That line returns three starters, all of which are 285 pounds or above. The group is led by offensive tackle Ryan Mosley.

"And then defensively they've got two 300 pound kids on the inside. This is definitely a test for us," said Boyne.

Defensively, 6'0, 317-pound tackle Julian Coleman anchors the middle for the defense. Coleman has started for Terrebonne since his freshman year – he's now a senior.

"He's lost some weight and he's moving better. He's much more active and athletic this year," Boyne said of Coleman.

Linebacker Mason Coleman also leaps off of film, Boyne said. Coleman was first-team All-District 9-5A as a sophomore.

"He flies around, sideline to sideline making tackles, he's good in the pass game and he can tackle in the run game," said Boyne. "We certainly need to account for those two guys."

Safety Terrance Diggs is another stout playmaker for THS who doubles as a wide receiver on offense.

Both of these teams have eyes on the District 9-5A championship and both represent the district opener for one another.

**BREAKOUT PERFORMANCE** - "The secret's out," said Hahnville head coach Greg Boyne of his senior wide receiver Bennett Naquin, who posted the best statistical night of his career on Friday in Hahnville's 28-7 win over E.D. White.

Naquin hauled in 4 catches for 64 yards and two touchdowns and rushed three times for 60 yards and a touchdown – and this somehow undersells the performance, as a long touchdown reception and a touchdown pass on a trick play were wiped out by penalty.

He converted to wide receiver in the offseason and Boyne noted during the summer that the coaching staff was very excited about the skills he was showing – as were coaches at Southeastern,

where Naquin attended a camp and performed extremely well.

"He kind of let the cat out of the bag over at Southeastern this summer," said Boyne. "He's a natural. He's got really good hands and he runs good routes. He asks several questions a day. He's still learning the position, but he's such a good athlete and the guys around him have helped. Certainly, people can't concentrate on him – Kevias Singleton's had a fast start over on the other side, and Aaron Williams, Lance Marshall and Kaden Bran have all contributed."

Naquin primarily played a bit of the Taysom Hill role for Hahnville last season, spelling quarterback Landen Teague while also lining up as a pass catcher and returning kicks.

"He's versatile," Boyne said. "He still gets his reps at quarterback. We just keep adding to the package of what he can bring to the table as we go."

The Tigers measured up.

Behind Bennett Naquin's three touchdowns, HHS captured a decisive 28-7 victory over the Cardinals at Tiger Stadium.

Landen Teague threw three touchdown passes, completing 15 of 22 attempts for 187 yards.

Defensively, Hahnville (3-0) held E.D. White (0-3) to its lowest scoring output since the Cardinals' 38-7 loss to St. Thomas More in the 2022 Division II select state semifinal round.

"In a game like this, when they were against the ropes – for our program, just a huge win. Offense, defense and special teams. We made a few mistakes, but it's all correctable," said Boyne. "Good programs prepare and do the things necessary to win games like this in the off-season, during the week, in the weight room, in conditioning. I thought tonight was a huge stride for the Hahnville program."

It was a dominant performance against a hungry E.D. White team that was state runner-up in Division II select last season, but had absorbed back-to-back tight losses against Holy Cross and Jesuit to start the season.

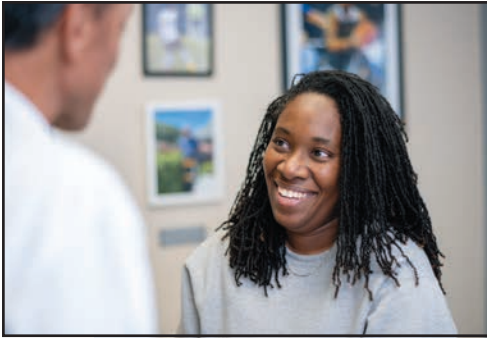

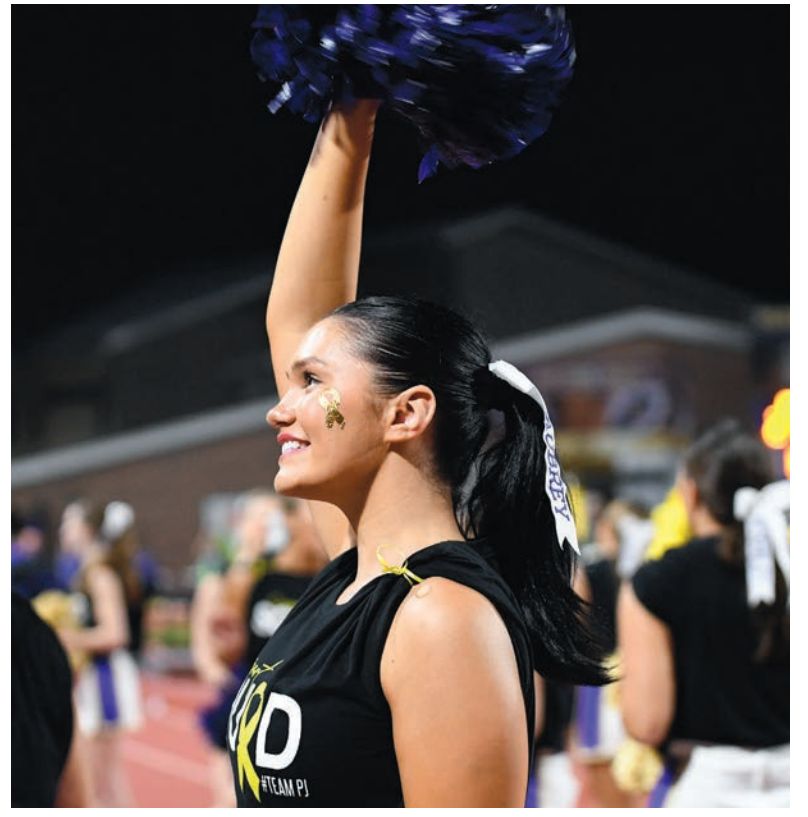

# Destrehan heads to Reserve to open district play, face East St. John

Wildcats look to even record after close loss to Alexandria

Destrehan battled back in the fourth quarter of its home game with Alexandria last week, but the Wildcats fell a touchdown short of the comeback in a 27-21 loss.

DHS will have to quickly shake that off as they go on the road this week for a matchup with River Parishes rival and District 9-5A competitor East St. John in the district opener for both teams.

ESJ went 2-7 last season, including a 39-16 loss to DHS, in a down year for a historically strong program. These two Wildcat teams have a long history of games that come down to the wire between teams boasting talented players up and down its respective rosters.

This season, thus far, has not gone much better for East St. John. The Wildcats are 0-3, though it must be noted that mark has come against very difficult competition. ESJ has lost 49-6 to St. James, 56-6 against St. Augustine and 37-7 against Hammond.

But East St. John always brings a talented group to the field, and historically ESJ and Destrehan have played some classics.

Da'Mon Scott leads ESJ at quarterback. Scott took over the position as a sophomore last year. His favorite target is Deonte Fleming, a sophomore wide receiver. Fleming's brother Donte plays in the NFL with the Minnesota Vikings. East St. John is breaking in several new starters on the offensive line.

Defensively, East St. John is far more experienced, led by defensive ends Jayden Johnson and Stanford Jenkins and linebacker Warren Leboeuf.

ALEXANDRIA 27, DESTREHAN 21 - The Trojans were the Division I select runner-up last season and earned a victory over Destrehan during what was a 13-game win streak in 2024. Alexandria again got the better of Destrehan on Friday night to remain unbeaten.

Destrehan struck first after an interception by Frank Harding set the Wildcats up at midfield. A Jackson Fields pass to Jaylan Ash and then a run by Malachi Dabney inside the 5 led to DHS scoring on a 2-yard Dabney run from the Wildcat formation. Destrehan led 7-0.

AHS' Kason Williams' 1-yard

touchdown run tied the game early in the second quarter, and that 7-7 score held into halftime.

Early in the third quarter, Alexandria made a play on special teams that would prove massive – the Trojans blocked an Ian Arceneaux field goal attempt and Kerrick Gaines returned the ball all the way inside the Destrehan 5. Williams rushed for his second touchdown of the night to make it 14-7.

It was touchdown No. 3 for Kason Williams to make it a 21-7 game.

Destrehan (1-2) converted a 3rd and 15 on a pass interference penalty to extend their ensuing drive. That led to Dabney slashing up the middle for a 9-yard touchdown run to make it 21-14.

But Kason Williams struck again – this time for his most explosive play of the night. A play action pass by Sellers to Williams sparked a 50-yard touchdown connection that made it 27-14 with 3:25 left in the fourth quarter.

Destrehan answered with the quick score it needed to extend the game. Completions from Fields to Ash and then Cai Williams, the latter scoring on a 45-yard play, made it 27-21 with 1:47 left

– Alexandria nearly intercepted the pass to Williams but couldn't come away with it, and Williams displayed his strong run-after-catch skills to score.

But with timeouts limited, Destrehan was forced to attempt an onside kick. Alexandria recovered and was able to run the clock down to 20 seconds left.

The Wildcats had one last shot. Fields completed a pass to Ash for a first down which momentarily stopped the clock with one second left – this would be the source of a bit of controversy to end the game. DHS snapped the ball to spike it, but time expired. The ball was completed to Ash and Ash downed with five seconds displayed, but the clock ran down to 1 prior to the first down stoppage. That denied Destrehan the chance for a final heave from midfield.

Dabney finished the game with 188 yards rushing, Mack caught eight passes for 72 yards, Williams 2 for 59 and a touchdown and Ash 5 for 56. Fields completed 18 of 28 pass attempts for 186 yards, a touchdown and an interception.

# Lady Tigers earn win over Lakeshore

Hahnville moved to 8-6 this season with a sweep of Lakeshore Tuesday, as a young Lady Tigers team continues to grow together on the court.

The Tigers have won three of their last five matches – included in that span is a split with Lutcher, after Hahnville lost in Dutchtown tournament action to the Bulldogs, 23-25, 25-15, 15-12. The two teams met up for a rematch days later, and Hahnville answered the bell with a win in five sets, 12-25, 25-13, 25-22, 19-25, 17-15.

Hahnville head coach Mendi LeBoeuf sees a growing chemistry and comfort level with her team each time it takes the court, as it breaks in a largely new starting lineup this year.

“I think every time we go out there we’re making some improvements,” said LeBoeuf. “You can see that team cohesion improving as we go along.”

Hahnville controlled much of the action Tuesday night from start to finish in its 25-15, 25-22, 25-18 win over Lakeshore, save for the late stages of the second set.

“We got a little bit lax toward the end of the second set and we had to come back and finish it off,” LeBoeuf said. “I was pleased in that we had to deal with a little adversity there and we were able to do that, then come back with a really good start to the third that led us to close it out.”

Maci Hollingsworth led the Tigers with 16 kills, while Jada Moore and Abigail Hotard each tallied nine. Hollingsworth also led her

team in digs with 14, with Madyn Romero adding nine, Hotard seven and Sophia Hotard five.

Hollingsworth and Moore have been putting together strong games at the net all season for Hahnville, while Abigail Hotard, a freshman, has been rapidly climbing in her play. Moore and Hollingsworth are the team’s most experienced returning players and LeBoeuf said both have understood that means their roles in communicating on the court are even more important now, with so many new players in the lineup.

Integrating new players often means the defense comes with a learning curve, and LeBoeuf said that’s no different here.

“That’s a daily battle for us,” said LeBoeuf. “We pay attention to and talk about it every day, communicating and talking out there. I think we’ve done a better job in between points, especially Maci and Jada, of communicating.”

In the win over Lutcher, Moore and Hollingsworth each had 21 kills. Hollingsworth, Romero and Sophia Hotard each served two aces, with Hotard also adding 26 assists. Addison Orgeron made 22 assists.

Hahnville returns to action today at Chapelle. On Tuesday, the Tigers return home to play South Lafourche. Matches with Northshore and Northlake Christian will follow a week later, the final pre-district matches before District 7-1 play begins for Hahnville.

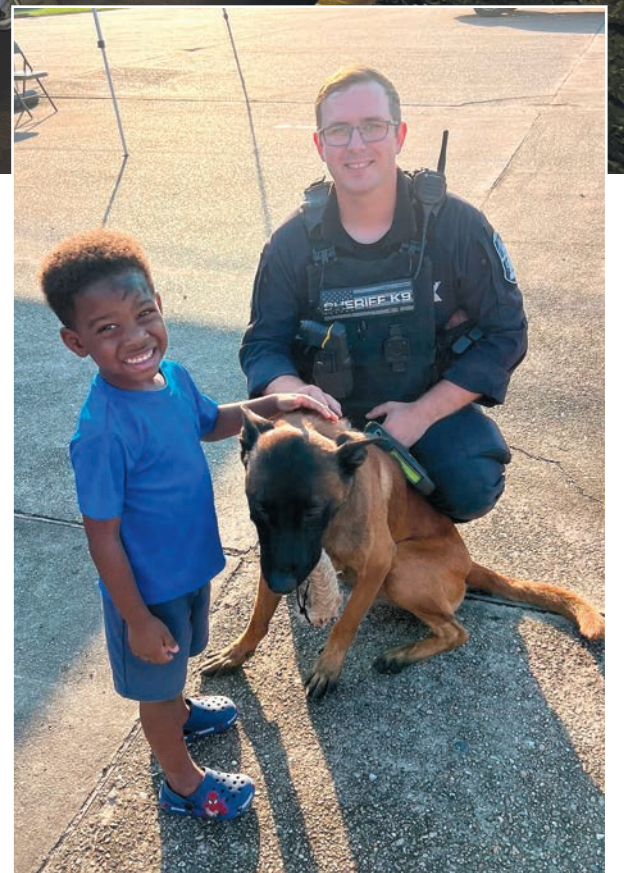

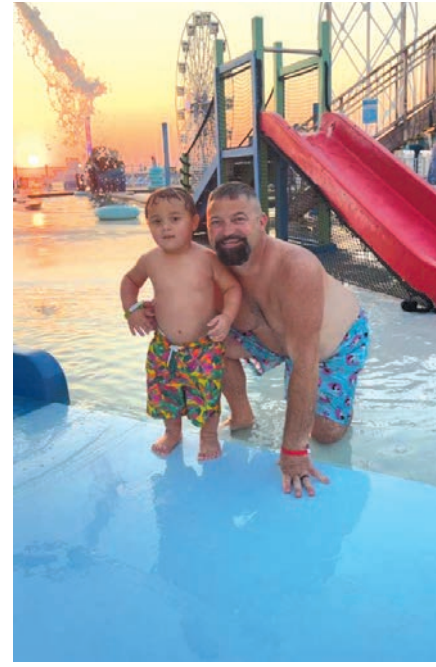

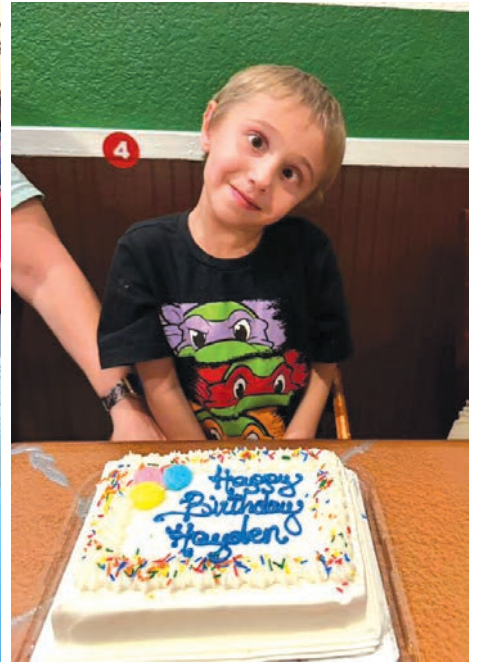

The current tax rates of the 10 percent, 12 percent, 22 percent, 24 percent, 32 percent, 35 percent, and 37 percent brackets have been extended. Had the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 expired, the rates would have reverted to 10, 15, 25, 28, 33, 35, and 39.6 percent.

The standard deduction is \$15,750 for single filers and \$31,500 for those married filing jointly in 2025. The best part is that it will adjust for inflation starting next year!

The new "bonus" deduction for older Americans raises the most questions. Here's what you need to know: starting in 2025, the bill provides a \$6,000 bonus deduction for filers 65 and up. The deduction begins to phase out for individuals with incomes starting at \$75,000, or joint filers with an income of \$150,000.

W.R. Grace & Co. filed an ITEP application with the Louisiana Board of Commerce and Industry for an estimated new investment of \$15,190,000 under the 2018 rules, and the state approved the application. Under the 2018 rules, the School Board must approve the application for the exemption to take effect.

A brief discussion was held on the type of product and the amount of product produced. The attachment of ad valorem and sales tax was referenced.
