Tours offer insight into 19th century grieving practices, stories of hauntings, ghost

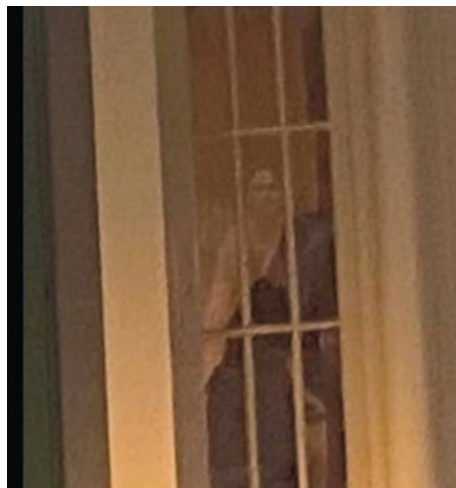

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When someone died in the 19th century, the family would place a black wreath on the front door to signify a house in mourning. The house would lose its color. Lavish meals were avoided. Portraits of the deceased were draped in black. A coffin would sit in the parlor for the wake.

If a child died, the family would dress even the child's dolls in black mourning attire. Families would also cover all mirrors and reflective surfaces to prevent the spirit of the deceased from becoming trapped.

Waterford 3 celebrates 40th anniversary

Entergy Waterford 3 recently held a gathering celebrating the nuclear energy plant's 40-year anniversary in the community.

The event was held at the Waterford 3 nuclear generating station and brought local leaders and community members together with current and former employees.

The plant first began operations in Killona on Sept. 24, 1985. But the planning for the site started well before that - in 1970, when Louisiana Power & Light requested permission from the NRC to construct Waterford 3.

The request was granted by the NRC

in 1974 for construction to begin and it was completed in 1984. In December of that year, fuel was loaded into the core after receiving necessary NRC licenses. Finally, after 15 years of planning, construction and preparation, Waterford 3 commenced commercial operation on Sept. 24, 1985 at 12:01 a.m.

Since then, the Entergy owned and operated plant has been a significant source of energy for Louisiana, using a pressurized water reactor to produce electricity.

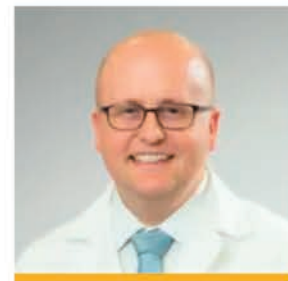

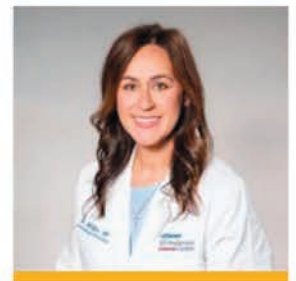

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Parish completes \$4.7 million East Bank Bridge Park Renovations

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The parish will host a ribbon-cutting ceremony for East Bank Bridge Park on Thursday, Oct. 30 at 5 p.m. to mark the completion of a \$4,760,000 renovation.

The upgrades to the park include two new pickleball courts, two new tennis courts, a new basketball court, a concrete parking lot, two turfed fields, new scoreboards, LED lighting throughout the park, a new batting cage, improved drainage, new backstops and updated fencing.

Grayson Touchard, a spokesperson for the parks and recreation department, said it has been nearly 16 years since the parish had significantly upgraded the park.

“We’re proud to provide these upgrades for our community to enjoy,” Touchard said.

Parish President Matthew Jewell, Director of the Department of Parks and Recreation Duane Foret and local council members will speak at the ribbon-cutting ceremony. Representatives from Valero, which donated \$500,000 to the renovations of the park, will also speak.

Touchard said that, after Hurricane Ida, Valero wanted to give back in a meaningful way.



A new scoreboard and new turfed field sit at East Bank Bridge Park. The parish will host a ribbon-cutting ceremony Thursday, Oct. 30 at 5 p.m. to mark the completion of a \$4,760,000 renovation at the park.

“Together we decided that investing in East Bank Bridge Park would have a lasting impact on local families and recreation,” she said.

Following the ceremony, a priest from St. Charles Borromeo will offer a blessing of the fields. Gabrielle Touchard will perform the national anthem. After celebratory first pitches are thrown on both fields, recreation teams will kick off the first games at the park.

The ceremony will begin at Fields 1 and 2 at 13244 River Road in Destrehan.

Touchard said the Louisiana Department of the Treasury allocated \$750,000 to the project. The parish contributed nearly \$2.5 million from parish funds.

The renovation comes as the parish moves toward a centralized park system, with more multiuse, regional facilities and fewer, smaller neighborhood play spaces. Parish officials made the decision to focus on park quality over park quantity after the parks and recreation department’s 2020 master plan highlighted the need for reducing the number of underutilized parks and parks with “low recreational value.”

The idea is that larger, regional parks will offer something for everyone and be of overall higher quality, even though many residents will need a vehicle to access the parks.

The parish recently renovated Fashion Playground with new equipment. A new playground is also being installed behind the fields at Landry Alternative Center in Hahnville.

He said the group is not only for veterans but for the entire community.

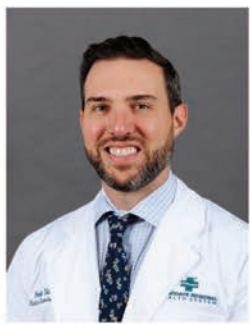
"Our doors are open to anyone who wants to help make a difference, whether that's volunteering, supporting local initiatives or simply attending one of our events," he said.

Clarence West Jr. searched for months. He wanted a new building for his tax and financial business, Infinity Tax & Financial Solutions, now located in Destrehan.

Tracy Smith, executive director of Destrehan Plantation, said he expects about 7,000 people to visit the plantation's grounds during the festival.

"I always look forward to our local community coming out and supporting Destrehan Plantation in its continued efforts to preserve our cultural heritage," Smith said.

The festival runs from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day. Visitors can purchase tickets online or with cash on-site. There is free parking on site.

All the money raised goes toward

preserving the Destrehan Plantation and its history. Smith said the fundraiser is more important than ever because business had not rebounded to pre-Covid levels.

"This has not affected just us but most major attractions in our region are still struggling to completely bounce back from Covid," he said.

He said the fundraiser contributes to about 15 percent of the annual budget of the plantation.

"But more than that, Destrehan Plantation is a big part of our local

history, and this is a way for residents to experience this," he said. "So many generations have memories of the fall festival."

Festivalgoers can experience a guided tour of the home for an additional \$15 ticket. Children 12 and under tour for free. Tours are offered every 30 minutes with the first tour of the day beginning at 9:30 a.m. and the last tour of the day beginning at 4 p.m.

The children's area includes pony rides, face painting, crafts, bungee jump, old timey games and mini golf.

There will be 12 food vendors this year, serving a wide variety, including Filipino food, burgers, homemade sausage and jerky, seafood balls, Mexican street

tacos, Cochon de lait, and much more. Beverage options include soda, water, beer, wine and the plantation's signature Plantation Punch.

The plantation's Indigo Café, with its outdoor covered patio, is also now open.

a few of those spirits got trapped anyway. Witnesses say they have seen a rocking horse move when no one is near it, a ghost caught on camera, and a boy, who died nearly 150 years ago, sitting on a window ledge.

Residents can see for themselves if the hauntings of Destrehan Plantation are real or make believe during its Hauntings of Destrehan Ghost Tour. The plantation now offers a 5:30 p.m. and a 6:30 p.m. tour Thursdays through Sundays. Tickets are \$35.

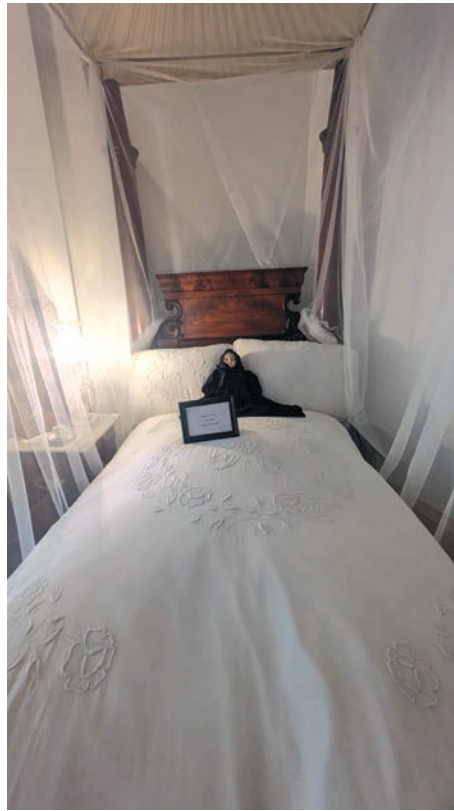
A two-hour tour hosted by NOLA Ghost Riders starts at 7:30 at the plantation. Tickets are \$69 for adults and \$49 for children. The tour includes ghost hunting outside the plantation home with equipment like dowsing rods, K2 meters and spirit boxes.

The plantation has a tragic and cruel history. Trials were held on the plantation after the 1811 Louisiana Slave Revolt, the largest in U.S. history. Although no executions happened on the property, slave owners did execute Destrehan Plantation slaves who participated in the uprising. Jean Noel Destrehan, who purchased the plantation with his wife, Celeste, in 1792, owned 56 slaves. The plantation produced indigo and cane sugar.

At least 30 people died in the plantation home and over 300 people died on the grounds.

As part of its normal house tour, the plantation is running its House in Mourning tour through Nov. 5.

Gabrielle Charron Benoit, a curator and historian for the plantation, said the inspiration for the tour came from a real

person: Lydia, who died of yellow fever in 1853 inside the home.

“Her death was recorded by Father Perret of the Red Church (now St. Charles Borromeo) in his diary,” Benoit said. “The year 1853 was also the deadliest yellow fever epidemic in Louisiana’s history, making this story both deeply personal and historically significant.”

Benoit said mourning was a deeply domestic and extended process in the 19th century. The body typically remained in the home for up to three days before burial. Services were intimate and brief, held within the home rather than in funeral parlors, but the mourning period itself could last months.

“Lydia’s mother, Louise, would have remained in mourning for at least six months following her daughter’s death,” Benoit said.

For slaves on the plantation, mourning was not a formalized process as it was for the free family.

“They were expected to continue working in the fields or the house, even while grieving,” Benoit said. “Small gatherings or remembrance ceremonies may have occurred, often rooted in African traditions, but they had to be brief and discreet.”



She said that during the 1853 epidemic, the enslaved community suffered great losses to yellow fever and cholera as well. Enslaved house workers, such as Marguerite, who is represented by a mannequin in the exhibit, would have been required to wear black and appear mournful for the family they served, all while silently mourning their own loved ones.

Most everyone who lived on the plantation was buried at the local Catholic cemetery, known today as St. Charles Borromeo.

“The House in Mourning tour is rooted entirely in history rather than ghost stories,” Benoit said.

She said guests are often most impacted by seeing how the home would have

appeared during a time of mourning — particularly the presence of a coffin in the parlor and the changes made to reflect grief within the household.

“Visitors come away with a deeper understanding of how prevalent death was in the 19th century and how society coped with loss,” Benoit said. “Mourning touched everyone — free and enslaved alike — regardless of race, class, or gender. It reminds us that death was an ever-present part of life in this era and shaped the customs, emotions, and daily routines of all who lived here.”

in a position he's mostly unaccustomed to: stationary, as he recovers from a broken leg he suffered recently. The injury was significant and, as Braud put it, a bit of a freak accident during P.E. class.

"I was being active with the kids and running ... I went to change directions and it just crumbled on me," Braud said. "It was really kind of a freak thing - it just snapped. The doctor who's doing my surgeries said he's only seen this injury from falls from high heights and motorcycle and car accidents. He said he'd never seen it from running before."

Braud's kept in good spirits despite the injury, but also said it's generally tough for him to slow down, let alone to stop completely - it's not the easiest thing to navigate through.

"The toughest part, probably - I'm a go, go, go person," said Braud. "Anybody that knows me knows I really don't have an off-switch. I just go. I coach rec volleyball, and one of the moms told me 'I'm going to call you ABC - Always Be Coaching.' And that's basically what I do. I'm always coaching, or exercising, or doing something with the kids. I do have trouble hitting the off-switch."

Keeping a positive attitude about things, he said, is made much easier by some amazing support from the people around him, including his wife Ashley.

"She's basically gone from being a parent of three kids with another parent to taking care of four kids, including me, by herself," Braud said.

Many others have stepped up to lend a helping hand or a show of support. Ashley's bible study group organized a meal train to lessen some of the family's burden. Parents of Braud's students have also been among those donating meals.

"People have been texting Ashley, 'what do you need? What can we help with?'" Braud said. "It just makes you feel the love of the community. The Saturday I came home, one of our neighbors was like, 'Hey, we're taking your kids to the zoo, and you're not saying no.' And my son ends up winning a bike at the zoo. The very next day, 'hey, let me take one kid over here to hang out. Let me take the kids to the birthday party.' We have one mom taking our daughter to dance two nights a week until I'm back at it. Neighbors cutting the grass.

"It's been anything and everything. 'Hey, let me help you with this.' And it's been amazing. It's been so helpful and it adds up fast, especially when you're immobile. I'm just so thankful. I can't begin to describe how thankful I am ... I never would have guessed this many people would have said, 'Hey, we got you, we got you.' And it's so reassuring and comforting."

Though he's used to being on the go, he does have some recent experience of being on the mend and off his feet.

Braud was diagnosed with a lower back condition four years ago - something he'd lived with since birth but had been unaware of until nerve pain spurred him to seek out a medical opinion. He ultimately needed spinal fusion surgery and had two rods and four screws placed into his lower back.

"That was a very hard recovery. The doctor said that I probably wouldn't be running marathons anymore," Braud said.

While marathon running wasn't in his future, other fitness and running avenues were still an option. Prior to his leg injury, Braud was well into training for HYROX, a competitive fitness event in Chicago this November in which Braud would be running and raising money for charity.

"I was in the best shape I've ever been in," Braud said. "It wasn't five minutes after (the injury) happened that I realized, wow, I'm not going to be able to do the race. I was working my tail off and put a lot of time and energy into that ... that was tough to swallow."

The experience of rehabbing his back injury, however, left him more mentally prepared to deal with this current setback.

"You learn and you grow from the challenges you face," Braud said. "I'm very thankful for all the challenges God has put in my path so far because they just make you a better version of yourself."



He's looking very forward to the day he can return to his students at Hurst.

"I know I'll be off of my leg definitely for two months," Braud said. "But as soon as I can get on a scooter, I'll be back out there on the field coaching them up. I find so much joy in it and I can't wait to get back out there."

school, which they recently completed and donated to the school. It'll be put to great use for the very first time before this Friday night's Hahnville/East St. John game at Tiger Stadium.

Hahnville welding teacher Chris Henning put HHS assistant principal Shawn Heiden in contact with Fleming, and things got rolling from there.

"We were spit-balling an idea, and they took it and ran with it," Heiden said. "They said, 'We can do this, we can do that.' I brought an old trailer that I had and they worked their magic with it."

Heiden said beyond football games, it's going to be a big plus for upcoming golf tournament benefits for the school's baseball and softball programs, as well as simply being there for general usage.

"We thought it would be pretty cool ... kind of our goal, we wanted to give back something that would be long-lasting that could be here for years and years. And maybe one day our children one day will come here and be able to see something we created," Fleming said.

He added that Henning has made a very positive impact on his life.

"I started right here in high school in his welding class," Fleming said. "When I went to welding school, he was there for me as well, he helped me with some jobs and just a lot of things like that. So it's just great to be able to repay some of these guys who helped me grow."

Heiden said that when he walked into their shop for the first time, it had an impact on him.

"It just overcame me that these two young guys are following their dreams and chasing something they wanted to do," Heiden said. "They took something that they loved, something they learned about here in St. Charles Parish, and have been able to turn it into a business."

"Their time is valuable, and they love this parish, they love this school, and it's so cool that they took some of that time and energy and their expertise and used it to give back. It's something where we were able to give to them as students here and now they're giving back to us years later."

Dufrene and Fleming each received the Lee Vial Memorial Scholarship as Hahnville students, doing so eight years apart.

Said Dufrene, "It's kind of full circle for us."

While the two are fellow HHS alumni, they did not attend at the same time – they met working together at another shop.

"After a couple years of working together, we just took it from there,"

Dufrene said. "I knew another shop that was selling some equipment, so I went just looking to buy a little bit. I ended up getting a lot more."

It turned out to be the catalyst for taking a big step.

"We started talking about it – do we go into business together? A few months later, we bought a shop. And then we had to figure out how to own a shop," Dufrene said.

Added Fleming, "We learned that we thought similarly in a lot of ways ... we ended up going in together. We had this big empty space that soon got cluttered with a lot of equipment. Jobs came in slow between his resources and my resources. As it kind of grew, we figured out our roles, and we work together to create something. It's growing. It's getting to where we kind of always dreamed. We just had to put it together."

Dufrene said the process of building a business from the ground up has been enjoyable – and quite an education.

"A lot of times, we put our heads together and say, 'OK, let's figure this out.' How do we keep growing, how do we tackle this or that," Dufrene said.

Said Fleming, "And that's the part I like the most. My dream was always to grow something from the bottom, build it up, and seeing our ideas come to fruition is really exciting to me."

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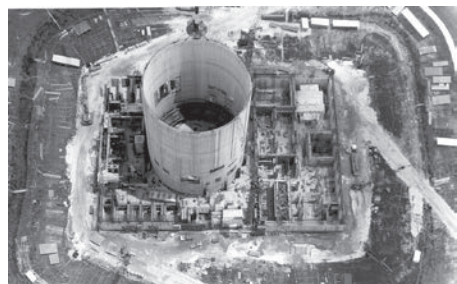

It is one of just two nuclear plants located in Louisiana, the other being Entergy's River Bend Nuclear Station in St. Francisville.

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One message shared that was at the core of the anniversary celebration was that at the heart of the plant's success

has always been the hardworking people serving as its driving force.

As the senior manager of operations at Waterford 3, Kenny Cambre has seen the plant evolve over the course of his 23-year career at the site. Cambre began at the facility in 2002 as a nuclear auxiliary operator, performing hands-on field work.

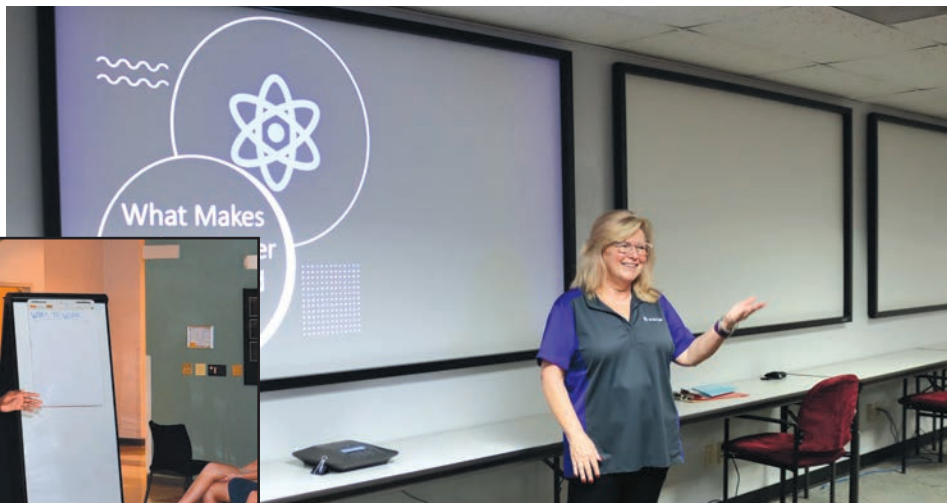
Over the years, he steadily advanced, earning both reactor operator and senior reactor operator licenses that allowed him to oversee day-to-day plant operations, including critical procedures like reactor startups and shutdowns.

Cambre takes great pride in Waterford 3's role in powering the local community.

"Electricity is something that is so easy to take for granted, until you don't have it," Cambre said. "It's then when we realize how vital it is for us to do our very best every day to help keep the lights on."

Kyle Sanford's career at Waterford 3 has been marked by a diverse range of roles and responsibilities. Since starting as an electrical design engineer in 2013, he has held various roles leading to his current as the central programs engineering supervisor.

"Whenever I see the Waterford 3 plant on the horizon, I'm reminded of the profound responsibility we have to our neighbors," Sanford said. "It's that sense

of purpose that drives me to continuously improve, innovate and uphold the highest standards in my role."

Sanford said he is proud to be part of the Waterford 3 family and part of the positive impact the plant has on the local community.

With 34 years of service at Waterford 3, Michelle Groome witnessed the plant's evolution firsthand. Joining the team fresh out of the University of New Orleans with a mechanical engineering degree, Groome started in the design engineering department working on electrical and instrumentation and control systems.

Over the years, she took on increasingly responsible roles, including serving as a system engineer for critical plant systems.

The sense of being valued has been a key factor in keeping Groome at Waterford 3 for over three decades.

"After working nights, weekends, etc. with your peers, they are more family than just a co-worker," Groome said. "When I retire shortly, that will be the hardest part - leaving my work family."

In her current role as an instructor, Groome finds the greatest reward in sharing her wealth of knowledge and experience with the next generation of nuclear professionals.

"What I enjoy the most about my work - today, it's teaching," Groome said. "Giving to this new generation the insights and knowledge that I have, and the perspective that I have been where you are today."

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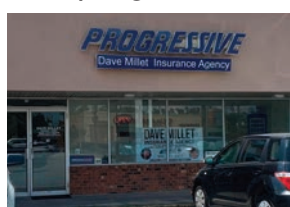
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Wildcats head to Central Lafourche

Destrehan looks to follow up on its most explosive effort of the season as it travels to Central Lafourche this week, the Wildcats seeking their fifth consecutive win and looking to remain unbeaten in District 8-5A.

Last week, it was Malachi Dabney's six touchdowns and 303 total yards paving the way as the Wildcats scorched the field against host Captain Shreve (4-4) in non-district action, rolling to a 68-28 victory to move to 5-2 on the season.

Destrehan head coach Marcus Scott said the Wildcats hit on some big plays early to get out to a lead on the Gators, which was imperative against an offense that entered the game averaging 45 points per game.

"You want to make sure you stay ahead ... you don't want to get to where they're up on you by a couple of scores. They're so good on offense, you can't afford to get behind," Scott said.

Destrehan (5-2, 3-0) has made several trips to north Louisiana the past two seasons – including three times in the playoffs alone last season. And on three of these occasions, including Friday's game, the Wildcats topped the 60-point mark.

"Overall, I thought the kids handled the trip really well. We obviously have a lot of experience in traveling far distances and being able to perform," said Scott. "Credit to the kids and the assistant coaches for doing a great job preparing for and handling the trip."

Destrehan will be on the road again this week, though it's a much shorter trip this time.

Central Lafourche (2-5, 0-3) fell last week to

Hahnville, 49-14.

The Trojans have had some tough luck in past seasons – in 2023 and 2024, the team lost its starting quarterback, Jeremy Cleveland, before Week 2 of each. Cleveland is back now, however, and has had some strong performances this season. The Trojans have put up big point totals in their two wins, including a 56-24 win over Central Catholic in Week 4.

Running back Robert Day shoulders a lot of the load for the CLHS offense. He rushed for two touchdowns in what was a close loss in a shootout against rival South Lafourche in Week 2.

Last year, the Trojans went 3-6 overall, including a 41-0 loss to Destrehan.

Scott said the goal remains to go out and continue to raise the level of play, week by week, as the Wildcats move toward the playoffs – and all of their goals that come with it.

"Get a little bit better every week, week after week, and keep raising the standard," Scott said.

Scott noted Central has some playmakers including Cleveland, but also some talented receivers along with Day out the backfield that can connect with the passer.

RAISING HIS GAME – Dabney's monster performance against Captain Shreve was just the latest big night for the junior. He rushed for touchdowns of 3, 4, 56 and 70 yards – the first four DHS touchdowns of the night – and scored twice more on passes of 51 and 4 yards. He rushed for 212 yards on 12 carries and caught five passes for 81 yards in all.

"He's just picked up from how he finished last season," Scott said.

Destrehan powered to 322 yards as a team and averaged nearly 11 yards a carry, with Jabari Mack and Damien Richard II also combining for 100 yards on the ground, with Richard scoring on a pair of runs.

Dabney's complete game continues to evolve – as well as he's played, it's easy to forget he's not yet a senior.

"He caught the ball well last season, but he's taken a step forward in the receiving game this year," Scott said. "It just makes him tougher to match up with."

There were a lot of big performances against Shreve – the 68 points Destrehan scored represents a season high and the most scored since a 69-point effort in its 2024 quarterfinal victory over Airline. Destrehan has now topped the 60-point mark four times in its past 12 games.

Jackson Fields threw four touchdown passes on the night, including passes of 36 and 37 yards to Jaylan Ash and Mack. Mack caught four passes for 93 yards and a score, while Jaylan Ash hauled in two receptions for 77 yards and a touchdown. Fields finished with 13 completions in 17 attempts for 266 yards and was not intercepted.

Eleven different Wildcats recorded 10 tackles or more, led by Kyce White's 12 stops. Cameron Florent made 10 tackles, two for loss, and recorded a sack. Aiden Schwab and Christian Ordonye each recorded a sack.

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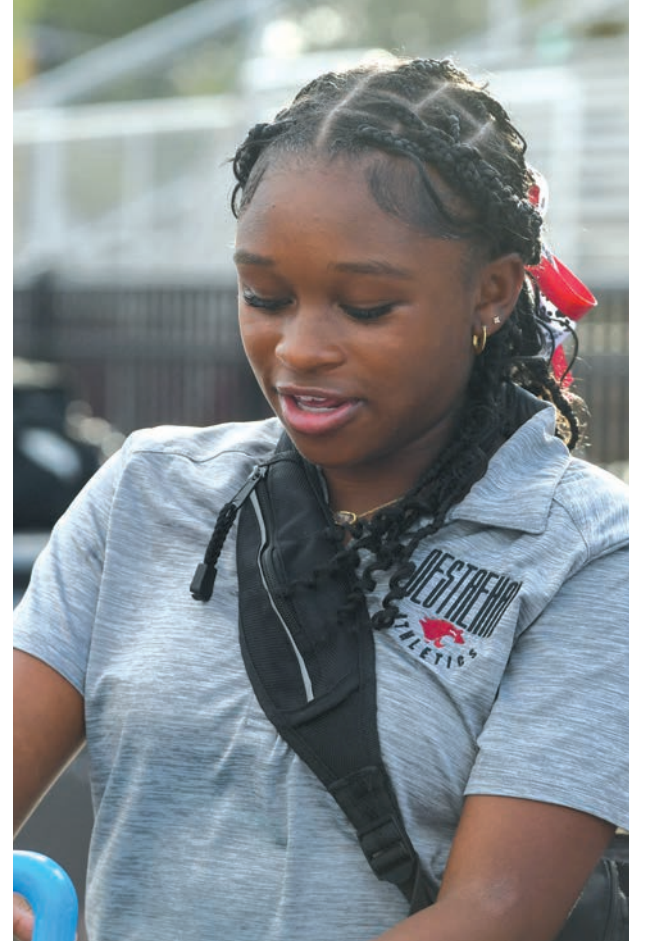

Tigers return home with chance to move to 7-1; Teague earns Manning award recognition after near perfect 300-yard outing

Hahnville returns home this Friday night for the first of back-to-back home games and back-to-back River Parish rivals, as East St. John visits one week before a Halloween night clash with Destrehan.

ESJ went 2-7 last season, including a 47-18 loss to HHS, in a down year for a historically strong Wildcats program.

The Wildcats earned their first victory of the season two weeks ago in its homecoming game, 32-14 over Central Lafourche, before falling decisively to Terrebonne 52-14 last week. ESJ enters with a record of 1-6 overall.

Da'Mon Scott leads ESJ at quarterback. Scott took over the position as a sophomore last year. His favorite target is Deonte Fleming, a sophomore wide receiver. Fleming's brother Donte plays in the NFL with the Minnesota Vikings. East St. John is breaking in several new starters on the offensive line.

Defensively, East St. John is far more experienced, led by defensive ends Jayden Johnson and Stanford Jenkins and linebacker Warren Leboeuf.

Hahnville head coach Greg Boyne said that the message to his Tigers (6-1, 2-1) is that it's important to understand this Wildcats roster is more talented than its record suggests.

"And anytime you play somebody that's a nearby rival, you've got to prepare as if they're undefeated," Boyne said. "They've had injuries, and they seem to be playing a lot of younger guys than they were earlier than the year. I think they're better than their record and they certainly have better players than their record - there's a bunch of really good athletes over there."

Scott is one Boyne noted as an impact player for the Wildcats, while the coach said Hahnville knows Fleming will see the ball early and often.

"He's a sophomore and he plays beyond his years," Boyne said. "He's fast and he runs really good routes. They try to get it to him in different ways. They're not very shy about letting you know they're going to get him the ball. A really good football player."

Hahnville, meanwhile, has another really good football player leading the way at quarterback. Landen Teague was named one of four Allstate Sugar Bowl Manning Futures honorees for his performance in last week's 49-14 win over Central Lafourche. Each week prep quarterbacks are selected as potential future candidates for the Manning Award which recognizes the top collegiate quarterback in the nation on an annual basis. It was created by the Allstate Sugar Bowl in 2004 to honor the college football accomplishments of Archie, Peyton and Eli Manning.

It was a near perfect night for Teague, who completed 19-of-20 passes for 302 yards and three touchdowns.

"He was locked in from the beginning ... he's been playing and competing at a high level all year," Boyne said. "He threw the ball well, we started underneath early and he took a lot of deep shots from there. Everything was clicking. When you have that kind of yards per attempt ... hats off to Landen. He had a good week of watching film and we saw his work put into action."

Boyne said Teague deserves the recognition and that he was proud of the junior.

"It's a tremendous award that the Sugar Bowl does,

and for a kid, just to have that (Manning) name attached in recognition of a performance you had, I think that says a lot," Boyne said. "It was a phenomenal night."

He spread the ball out to six different receivers, led by Aaron Williams' seven receptions for 95 yards and a touchdown. Bennett Naquin caught four passes for 75 yards and a touchdown. Kevias Singleton caught four passes for 73 yards and a touchdown.

It was a breakout game for Williams. Boyne said the Tigers have wanted to get him more involved, and on Friday Williams showed exactly why.

"It was awesome to see, because he's a very talented kid and he's one of the hardest workers we have in the weight room," said Boyne. "At practice, he's quiet. He comes in and does his job every day. So you love to see him have that game. He and Landen are starting to have a really good connection."

Those several receivers produced along with a big night by Fabian Celestine, who needed just eight carries to gain 105 yards on the ground and score three touchdowns. Defensively, end Raymond Williams added a touchdown on a scoop and score.

The Tiger offense is showing that it can hurt defenses from numerous positions on the field, and that's how Boyne likes it.

"I've always said, the more guys that you get involved, the more stress you put on the defense," Boyne said. "And Landon understands what we want to do. He's gotten so much better at reading the defense ... his maturity has allowed us to open up the playbook, and these receivers all played a good bit last year."

Destrehan battling back on the court under new head coach

After a seven-match losing streak Destrehan's volleyball season was spiraling, but the Ladycats decided among themselves that they would not be fading without a fight.

Since then, Destrehan has gone 5-3 in its past eight matches, including a 2-0 mark in District 7-I competition with wins over Thibodaux and Terrebonne.

The Wildcats' non-district wins in that span came over Willow, Zachary and West Jefferson. The turnaround happened in the midst of a major transition for the team – a coaching change, as assistant coach Tabitha Tabb steps in for Miranda Kelley as the team's new head coach.

Tabb, also an assistant coach for the Wildcats softball team, played both sports for Destrehan as a member of the Class of 2017. She officially took over on Sept. 2 and said she's proud to guide the program in her first head coaching role – and is just as proud of the push her players have made over the last several games.

"In that first practice, we talked about how change is hard and you've got to learn how to adapt to change and adversity in life," said Tabb. "So, I let them know their two options ... they could either not get over this change or adjust and continue on with the season, or they can make the most of it, band together and come out on the other side stronger and better than ever."

The results indicate the players took those words to heart.

"I'm proud to say they've chosen the second option," Tabb said.

The first of those wins came in a tight matchup with Willow that Destrehan (9-16) won in five sets, 22-25, 25-14, 25-15, 24-26, 16-14.

Zachary was the second, 17-25, 25-18, 25-14, 25-16.

Remy Foster had 32 assists while Harmony Howard had 11 kills and 10 digs. Vivian Brouillette made 13 kills and 12 digs.

Then came Terrebonne, 23-25, 25-15, 25-21, 25-23.

Foster had 40 assists. Brouillette made 13 kills and 13 digs while Howard had 13 kills and 15 digs. Morrow led defensively with 15 digs.

A dominant win over West Jefferson came after that, 25-14, 25-7, 25-6, and their most recent win, a Monday night win at Thibodaux, 25-12, 25-19, 25-25, 25-15.

In the win over the Tigers, Brouillette had 18 kills and 10 digs. Howard had 12 and 12. Hannah Chaisson had three blocks. Foster made 32 assists and had five blocks.

Tabb said her senior players have taken the lead.

"My five seniors are bringing the leadership that this program needed," said Tabb. "They had to step up in ways on and off the court that seniors traditionally don't have to."

Harmony Howard and Vivien Brouillette have taken on roles as all-rotation players, which Tabb said has allowed Destrehan to attack from the front row and back row alike when needed.

Setter Remy Foster has found a strong chemistry with those hitters, as well as middle blocker Honesty Miller. Ka'mi Johnson's energy has been vital, Tabb said, while libero Victoria Morrow has been all over the court defensively and provides a motivating voice. Jacee Pate, Gracie Bourgeois and Hannah Chaisson have all made an impact as well.

"It's like I tell them, every single game, we need everybody to win it," said Tabb. "Whether you're playing, whether you're on the bench – anybody can go in at any time. Give us that energy and keep that focus on the game and how you can contribute no matter what you are doing in that moment. It takes all of our players, and people have been stepping up when needed for sure."

Tabb is getting her first chance to be a head coach earlier than she imagined, but she said she's played for and coached with some excellent coaches over the past several years, and that she takes after all of them.

"I try to apply all those things I've learned," Tabb said. "At the end of the day, my heart's in this. It's personal for me. This is my alma mater and I played on that court. I wore that jersey. When you're a player you need that coach who sees the potential in you and pushes

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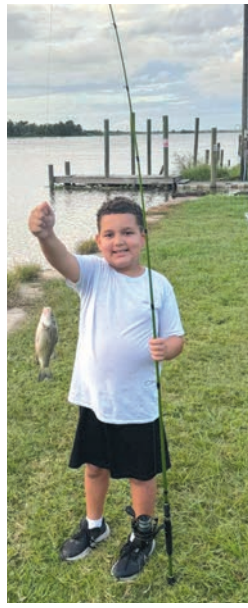

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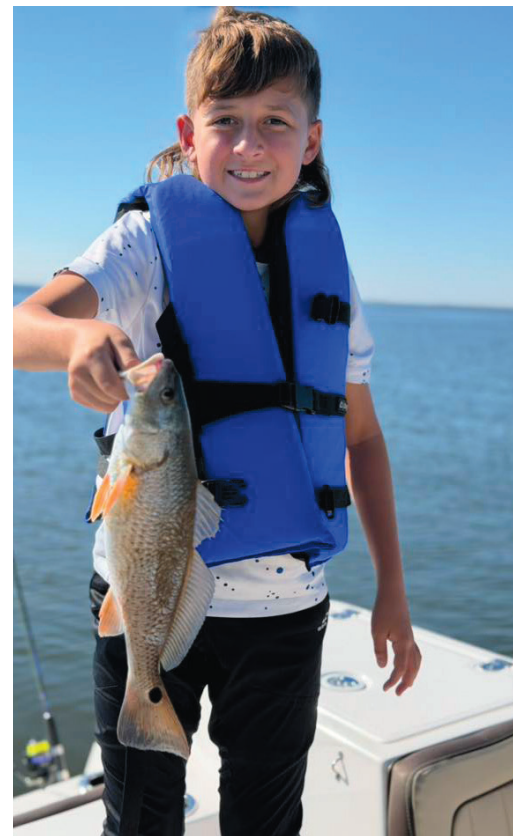

B. Weber motioned to go into Executive Session per L.R.S. 42:16-17; second by A. Aucoin.

Motion by A. Aucoin; second by B. Weber to return to regular session.

The first group of Educator Rising Class from the Satellite Center visited our Board Retreat and introduced themselves.

GOAL D: RESOURCE ALLOCATION

Health Insurance Claims Update:

Insurance Technician Samantha Buras presented the Item to the Board along with Representatives from USI and UMR. Discussions were held on organization memberships, employer coalition, high-cost claims, cost trends, and a detailed medical claims audit.

Board member B. Weber requested a copy of the high-cost claims data, and the selection of the data was also discussed. ER vs. Urgent care facilities, usage, and costs will be reported on, and the Superintendent asked for previous ER visits vs. current.

Comparisons with other school districts' data will also be reported back to the Board. The Ochsner digital medical program usage will be analyzed.

Other discussions included unique care members definition, specialty medications and uses clarified, rebates (\$3.1 million) and costs for most commonly used drugs and catastrophic cases.

LCMC Health negotiations were addressed and will be relayed to all members using LCMC.

Retiree Health Insurance:

The Superintendent gave an overview and Chief Financial Officer Ronald White presented to the Board. Medicare Advantage rates, eligibility, SCPPS policy 4.6.13, and retiree spousal cost were discussed. A proposal will be on the October 2025 Board meeting agenda and an updated policy reflecting this will be on the November 2025 Board meeting agenda. The 0-9 year retirement rate will be further clarified, as well as the years of service variables.

Board Meeting Management System:

The Superintendent, Executive Director of IT Kelsey Hegel and Executive Secretary Shelly Babineaux presented to the Board. The Superintendent stated that our Board Docs contract will be ending in January and we are proposing going with a new company. Kelsey Hegel presented the choices of staying with Diligent (who owns Board Docs) or going with a new platform developed by Georgia School Board (Simbili). The Superintendent discussed the benefits of moving to Simbili. LSBA is also directly connected to Simbili and will modify it to fit our needs as far as our policies and procedures. Mr. Ellis suggested passing this by the Board of ethics before voting on this matter due to a possible conflict with being members of LSBA.

ITS Update:

Executive Director of IT, Kelsey Hegel, presented to the Board. Discussions were held on the newly implemented AI Task Force, LDCS Guidelines and Implementation, and SCPPS Goals and Objectives of the Task Force.

GOAL A: STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

LPAC Update:

Director of The Lafon Performing Arts Center Ned Moore discussed the fall highlights, new program initiatives, the needs assessment, and the operational update. Discussion was had on the 25-26 revenue goals. The LPAC has partnered with Deep Fried media for marketing.

Motion by B. Weber; second by A. Aucoin to pause for lunch.

Motion by A. Aucoin; second by B. Weber to resume meeting.

The Superintendent recognized the second group of Satellite Center Educator Rising students in attendance, who then introduced themselves.

GOAL B: STUDENT WELLBEING AND BELONGING

Enhanced Enrollment Process Update:

Executive Director of Child Welfare & Attendance and Student Services Ms. Jerry Smith introduced Director of Student Services Erin Crisham who highlighted the temporary residency process. This is now renewed annually instead of every 3 years. Ms. Crisham discussed the enrollment enhancements, renewal process data, the 25-26 action plan, expansion costs and enhanced enrollment challenges. Discussions were held on the great job with streamlining this process.

GOAL E: FACILITY MANAGEMENT

Long Range Plan for Physical Education and Athletics Update:

Assistant Superintendent of Operations John Rome, Executive Director of Safety, Athletics & Ancillary Services Kade Rogers, and Director of Athletics & Physical Education Duane Foret presented an update to the Board. Mr. Rogers discussed the completed and in-progress projects. Discussions were held on the new school scoreboards and opportunities for students to participate and run the boards. All elementary schools will have indoor gyms. Duane Foret presented the detailed long-range plan for physical education and athletic facilities, including actual and projected costs and the status of each project. A proposal will be made to the Board at the November meeting. A discussion was held on padding for turf fields, and the Board agreed the turf replacement is needed.

Facility Needs Assessment and Attendance Zones:

Assistant Superintendent of Operations John Rome introduced Joshua Manning with South Central Planning and Development, who presented on attendance zones and explained a tool that helps staff determine zones by typing in an address.
