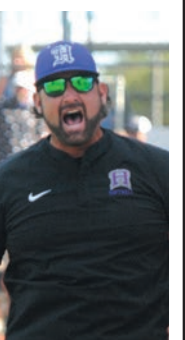

1,632 have voted early in parish so far, election day is May 16

As of Wednesday morning, 1,632 people in St. Charles Parish have voted early in an election to decide whether to renew two school tax millages as officials continue investigating the district's finances.

Election Day is May 16.

The district's former Chief Financial Officer Ronald White resigned in February shortly after the district hired EisnerAmper, an independent accounting firm, to investigate potential misrepresentations of the district's financial standing.

District officials have said the investigation is ongoing and that some details cannot yet be released publicly, meaning voters may not have a complete picture of the investigation's findings before voting. Early voting continues through Saturday.

Two propositions on the ballot would renew existing school millages for 10 years.

Proposition 1 will set a millage rate of 39 through



2037. This rate funds teacher salaries as well as essential services and personnel for the universal pre-K program. It also sustains school-based mental health professionals, school resource officers, workforce development opportunities, bus transportation, utilities and other items. It would generate around \$100 million per year.

In 2017, parish voters approved a 43.18-mill property tax for the operation and maintenance of public schools for a 10-year period.

Proposition 2 on the ballot asks residents to renew

the district's construction and facility improvements at 4.92 mills through 2037. This millage funds safety and security upgrades, maintenance of school grounds, salaries for maintenance personnel and other items. It would generate a little more than \$12 million each year.

Superintendent Dr. Ken Oertling said the millages also support paraeducators, interventionists, nurses, mental health professionals and school resource officers.

Student needs have also increased in recent years, Oertling said. He cited a 30 percent rise in students identified with special needs and a similar increase in English learners. Those students often require smaller instructional groups, specialized staff and targeted intervention programs.

"The reality is that without the renewal of these

Parks and Recreation Department works to deter vandalism

The Parks and Recreation Department is working to find ways to deter vandalism at parish parks, after several incidents at Rathborne Park and Ormond Park in recent months.

Grayson Touchard, a spokesperson for the department, said the department is focused on identifying and implementing ways to better monitor parks.

"This includes evaluating our existing practices and exploring additional strategies to strengthen oversight and visibility across our facilities," Touchard said.

On Tuesday, the department posted a photo online of vandalism in the Rathborne Park restroom. Photos showed a toilet paper dispenser ripped from the wall and dirt in the sink. The vandalism occurred a week after the restroom was professionally cleaned. The park's restroom was also vandalized in December, with Silly String on walls and through the restroom stalls.

"This kind of damage impacts our entire community and takes away from the safe, clean spaces we work hard to provide for our residents,"



the post read. "We ask everyone to take pride in our parks and help us keep them clean, safe, and enjoyable for all. If you see something, say something."

At Ormond Park, a trash can was intentionally burned in January and that same month, a visitor drove an electric bike through the baseball fields. While the spray park was closed, visitors hung on park fixtures, risking damage to the equipment.

Last December, slats of a wooden park bench were cut off, requiring the parish to repair the bench.

Parish plans sale of Goodhope Park to Shell subsidiary

St. Charles Parish plans to sell Goodhope Park in Norco to Equilon Enterprises, a subsidiary of Shell USA, for \$20,000.

Parish President Matthew Jewell described the small park as underutilized in an ordinance seeking the Parish Council's approval of the sale. The council has not yet voted on the ordinance.

When the administration first introduced the ordinance April 20, the proposed sale price was listed at \$100,000. On Monday, however, the administration asked the council to postpone action indefinitely before introducing a new ordinance reducing the proposed sale price to \$20,000.

Goodhope Park was donated to the parish in 2006 by Motiva Enterprises, Shell Chemical, Shell Oil Company and SCOGI Louisiana Holdings. It sits at 500 Goodhope St. within walking distance of several homes.

The parish has sold other neighborhood parks as it moves toward a centralized park system, with more multiuse regional facilities. The council approved the auction of the neighborhood park in Fairfield Plantation Oaks subdivision in a 7-2 vote last May, with many residents voicing their disapproval.

Jewell said last year that parish officials are focusing on



park quality over park quantity. A parish rule that requires developers of subdivisions to set aside space for playgrounds or pay a fee to the parish, which has existed since the parish code was adopted, helped expand the parish system to 56 sites, resulting in higher maintenance costs.

Larger regional parks like West Bank Bridge Park and East Bank Bridge Park offer something for everyone and are of overall higher quality than the smaller neighborhood parks, Jewell had said.

Last year, the parish spent nearly \$2.5 million on a revitalization project for East Bank Bridge Park. The renovations included two new tennis courts, two pickleball courts, a batting cage, a basketball court, turf infields, fresh grass and an irrigation system. Two new light

poles and LED fixtures at the tennis courts were also installed. The parish completed similar renovations at West Bank Bridge Park in 2024.

The parish also plans to build a new gymnasium at East Bank Bridge Park. Last May, the council approved a \$356,901 agreement with Murray Architects to design the gym.

The parish has made investments in Norco parks. Last August, the parish completed renovations at Bethune Park. The renovations, which took about a year to complete, included a covered basketball court, a pavilion, a playground, batting cages, upgraded baseball and multiuse fields and improved dugouts. Commemorative signage honoring Mary M. Bethune High School was also installed.

That renovation was funded by a collaboration between the parish and Shell Norco, which provided a \$500,000 donation. The project marked the first major upgrade to the park in 25 years.

In April, the parish held a ribbon cutting ceremony for the new outdoor classroom at the Norco park named the Dow Discovery Deck.

millages, we will be required to do more with less while still working to meet the needs of our schools and community," Oertling said.

The district also pointed to career and technical education, dual enrollment and industry certification programs funded through Proposition 1. According to the district, 62 percent of graduates last year earned either college credit or an industry credential while in high school at no cost to families.

If the renewals fail, Oertling said the district would have to make difficult decisions affecting long-term investments, academic programming, operational needs and student support services. Bringing the renewals back to voters is part of the long-term planning process, Oertling said.

"The millage renewal is about maintaining stable funding that supports the academic excellence that our students and schools rely on every day," Oertling said.

Oertling said one of the largest misconceptions about the election is that voters are being asked to approve new taxes.

"These are renewals of existing millages that have long supported our schools and community," he said. "If they are not renewed, that funding goes away."

Oertling noted that reductions in millage rates approved by the school board between 2020 and 2025 saved taxpayers an estimated \$58.8 million.

In a May 1 update on the investigation, the district said the interim fiscal 2026 budget presented to the superintendent and school board relied heavily on projected revenue that either did not materialize within the expected timeframe or, in some cases, did not materialize at all.

The district said school board members approved capital projects and salary adjustments based on the financial information presented at the time.

A revised budget showed approximately \$20.75 million more in expenditures and about \$5.6 million less in total revenue than previously projected. It stressed that the investigation has not found any personal financial benefit or gain by any employee, vendor, or member of the public.

In a statement, the district said it is committed to transparency with the community and will continue to provide updates throughout the process.

"St. Charles Parish Public Schools has kept our community abreast of everything we can release since the potential misrepresentation of funds was announced in January – through videos to the school community, news releases, journalistic articles and outreach to media, social media posts and at a number of public meetings and community group sessions," the statement said.

Villasenor's 2 home runs, Chaix's game-winning hit lift Tigers to state title

There have been plenty of heroes for Hahnville throughout this softball season.

And there were plenty of them on Sunday – and they're now all state champions.

Jordyn Chaix's two out, walk-off single and Rylee Villasenor's two home run, five RBI day lifted No. 8 Hahnville to a 6-5 victory over No. 10 Live Oak in the Division I non-select state championship game.

Chaix came up to bat with Villasenor at first base after the latter drew a walk earlier in the inning. Chaix drove the ball to the outfield and Villasenor raced home, scoring on a play at the plate to send Hahnville's dugout pouring onto the field in celebration.

Villasenor was named the tournament's Outstanding Player after her big day.

"I was not stopping (on the game-winning run)," Villasenor said. "This is once in a lifetime. Not everyone can say they made it to Sulphur and even fewer can say they won it all there. That's something Coach (Jeremy) Duplantis preached ... I think that was part of my fire coming around third, it was right there and I wasn't going to stop. To have my name as a part of this, being a champion here at Sulphur, it's absolutely amazing."

Villasenor collided with Live Oak catcher Jeanne Janise on the play at the plate - both were on the ground for several moments, momentarily interrupting the Tiger celebration until both players were confirmed to be OK.

Then came more elation.

"I knew if that ball was hit in the gap, I was going home," said Villasenor. "I had the mindset that no matter what I was going home and scoring that run ... I did what I had to do. Yes, my head hurts, but I'm proud of it.

I'll take a headache for the victory."

Chaix said she focused on the task at hand when she came up in the big spot.

"I don't know that it's sunk in fully yet, but I know as a team we worked so hard all season to get here. When I saw Rylee rounding third, I had so much faith in her," said Chaix. "It's just such an exciting feeling ... as I approached the plate, I knew I had a big job to do, and I believed in myself. And I knew that with Rylee's speed at first and my ability to work long counts and stay strong through the count, that got me through the at-bat. I'm so excited for everyone on our team. And I believe that we deserve to be here."

The Tigers (24-12) captured the program's first state

championship since 2011. Sunday's win represents the second state softball championship win in Hahnville's history.

"We believed in ourselves," Chaix said. "And coming into the playoffs as the 8th seed, nobody really expected us to get that far. I think it just shows in the playoffs, it's any team's chance to win. Today we had an 8 seed and a 10 seed playing a championship game. And when you put the pieces together, it can work out beautifully like it did today."

This year the second year as Hahnville head coach for Jeremy Duplantis – and he worked quickly to guide

Hahnville head softball coach Jeremy Duplantis has a word he speaks to his team about – one he says his sophomore third baseman Rylee Villasenor exemplifies every time she takes the field.

“Mudita,” Duplantis said. “It means to have great joy in others’ success, and she is a perfect example of that. When somebody hits a home run, she’s the first one out the dugout jumping and celebrating for them. She’s definitely a team player and she wants success for everybody.”

Through a bit of her own success, Villasenor helped spur her teammates and coaches to the ultimate team success on Sunday. Her power was on display – two home runs, both of which put her team ahead at different points of the game, and five RBIs.

But so was her speed, the last of her three runs on the day seeing her race home from first base to score on Jordyn Chaix’s single in the bottom of the seventh inning to seal the Division I non-select state championship for the Lady Tigers.

Through it all, her expression remained relatively constant, a big smile, enjoying the moment throughout her team’s victory in Sulphur. It did change for a brief time, however, once the game



was over – tears of joy streamed down her face as she embraced her coaches and teammates, overcome by emotion.

“I was not stopping (on the game-winning run),” Villasenor said. “This is once in a lifetime. Not everyone can say they made it to Sulphur and even fewer can say they won it all there. That’s something Coach (Jeremy) Duplantis preached ... I think that was part of my fire coming around third, it was right there and I wasn’t going to stop. To have my name as a part of this, being a champion here at Sulphur, it’s absolutely amazing.”

Villasenor was named Outstanding Player of the state tournament. Though she’s just played two seasons of prep ball so far, she already has begun to stack up accolades: the tourney MVP and her state championship ring go with Offensive MVP honors that she earned in District 8-5A in 2025 after a stellar debut season.

But Villasenor ran into adversity early in the 2026 season. Her statistical pace was down from her previous year, and she admitted self-doubt crept into her outlook.

“My confidence was down at the

Lambert makes lasting impact in debut season

Very few freshman softball pitchers ever get the chance to start a state championship game in Sulphur.

Of those who have, fewer still can say they've won. London Lambert can.

A sensational debut season for Lambert culminated in her helping lift Hahnville to state championship glory. HHS head coach Jeremy Duplantis said Lambert "has ice in her veins" and that the unflappable freshman handles pressure spots far beyond her years.

Still, when she and her teammates arrived in Sulphur, she admitted atmosphere made an impression.

"It was a little different," Lambert said. "I think we kind of underestimated what Coach Duplantis was telling us about it ... a lot of people, a bigger crowd and a lot of noise. But once we were there for a second, I feel like we kind of settled in, and it was more like, OK, this is a business trip."

With Lambert in the circle, the Tigers took care of business all



And by the sixth grade, she began to realize her own potential as a player.

"I kind of saw what hard work can really do, and learned how to work hard," Lambert said.

She arrived at Hahnville and started from day one. There were no training wheels – the Tigers' first win of the season came in their second game, a 12-7 win over Live Oak, in what was an eventual preview of the state championship game matchup. That was a theme for Hahnville throughout the season – the Tigers' success came against a schedule full of contending teams, including several eventual state quarterfinalists, finalists and champions.

"I knew it was going to be a big difference (from middle school to high school varsity)," Lambert said. "I had to work on the mental side a little more. I knew I was probably going to fail a little more than I did playing middle school ... the hitters are a lot better and a lot smarter. And the pitchers are a lot better, when I'm hitting."

Duplantis said it became clear very early that Lambert had the chance to be an impact player.

"At workouts, I could see she was trying to push herself to do more – and more than I wanted her doing at first," Duplantis said. "So, I saw that work ethic. Then when we started pitching during the summer, I could see that perfectionist in her. You could see it in her face where she's just, 'I need to get this.' That's how I knew she's going to be special for us for a long time."

That work ethic applies in the classroom just as much as it does on the softball field – Lambert's maintained a 4.3 GPA through her freshman year.

"We're heading back from the state championship game on the bus, and I looked over at London and she's on her Chromebook doing schoolwork," Duplantis said. "Everything she does, she tries to perfect. You always know she's going to give it her all."

season long. She went 22-8, striking out 169 batters in 187 innings with a 2.5 ERA and a 1.2 WHIP.

As a batter, she likewise made a fast impact: 12 home runs, 59 RBIs, a .468 batting average and a .552 on-base percentage.

Five of those 22 wins came in the play-offs, and two of those in Sulphur.

"It took me a second to really let it sink in," Lambert said of the realization the Tigers were state champions. "I couldn't really believe it, because this is what you work for all season. You think about this all year long – to play on that last day of the season ... I just kept saying, 'oh my gosh, we just won the state championship' to my teammates. What we've wanted to do all season, and we literally just did it."

Lambert began playing Tee ball when she was 6 years old. By the age of eight, she ramped up to play travel softball.

HHS coach has guided two programs to softball's top prize

When it comes to the state softball tournament in Sulphur, Jeremy Duplantis doesn't mince words.

"Sulphur's an addicting thing," Duplantis said. "I'm not addicted to many things, but I am with Sulphur."

Duplantis has coached teams to Sulphur in three of the past four seasons, this year at Hahnville and two at Vandebilt Catholic. In each of those three seasons, Duplantis' team made the state final – two of those cementing themselves as state champions.

Sunday's 6-5 Hahnville victory over Live Oak cemented him on an elite list of head coaches to guide two different schools to a state softball championship.

He arrived at Hahnville with the confidence of someone who had done it before. That confidence soon became reflected in his players, who he told when he arrived that the championship win was coming.

They believed him – and ultimately made him a prophet.

"I just knew that with this group, it was going to happen in the future," Duplantis said.

On paper, Hahnville didn't enter the season or postseason among the favorites for that distinction. The starting lineup was built of majority underclassmen.



By regular season's end, the Tigers earned a No. 8 seed and defeated several of the state's top teams along the way – the very talented but also very young roster seemed primed to be a popular choice to strongly contend for the 2027 championship.

Duplantis' Tigers, however, weren't interested in waiting for their crown.

"I knew we'd be competitive," Duplantis said. "Even though they're young, we have a lot of talent. You always aim to play on that last day of the year, no matter what. In my mind, we did it a year or so early ... I wasn't so sure it would be happen this quick, but hey, it did. And we're going to start working to get there again next year."

Duplantis led Vandebilt Catholic to the Division II select softball championship in 2024, following a 2023 season where he and the Terriers finished as state runner-up. He served as head coach of the Vandebilt program after being hired in May of 2021. Prior to that, he was the head softball coach at H.L. Bourgeois.

Initially a baseball coach at H.L. Bourgeois, he was approached with the idea of jumping over to the softball side.

The road to Sulphur

his team to a state championship. It was Duplantis' second state championship in three seasons, after guiding Vanderbilt Catholic to the Division II select state crown in 2024.

"Every time (Live Oak) scored runs, when we got that third out, our girls would come off the field cheering, ready to go and get the bat in our hands, to get up there and have a chance to score another run," said Duplantis. "Our strength of schedule it prepared us mentally for this moment, playing the top teams in the state. There were a lot of games we didn't come out on the winning end. To overcome that, and overcome that, and keep the wheels on ... knowing what the prize is and our ultimate goal."

It was a wild start to the game. Live Oak (23-14) got on the board in the top of the first to take a 2-0 lead, the first run coming after Halle Maxwell scored on an error and the second on Ava Kate Phillips' RBI single.

Phillips got the first two Tiger batters out to start the bottom of the first, but after London Lambert walked, it was a Live Oak mistake that gave the Tigers an opening when Shelby Theriot reached on an error.

With two on, that brought Villasenor up – and she hit the ball out, clearing the bases with a home run that gave the Tigers the 3-2 lead.

That high-scoring first gave way to a calmer next few innings. The score held until Jeanne Janise's RBI single in the top of the fifth, which scored Maxwell after the latter singled with two outs. That tied it 3-3.

Again, the Tigers answered – and it was a familiar answer. Lambert singled to lead off the bottom of the fifth inning and two batters later, Villasenor blasted a towering shot to left field and over the wall to give her team a 5-3 advantage.

"That was an incredible feeling," Villasenor said. "I knew I had my teammates behind me ... I got on top of that ball and that ball went flying."

But in the sixth, walks drawn by Bailey Spencer and Kenslee Carter of Live Oak opened up a chance to tie or go ahead. Taylor Mattingly and Molly Latham each singled to drive in runs, tying the game 5-5.

Phillips and Lambert each pitched a scoreless frame to bring it into the bottom of the seventh. Then Villasenor and Chaix delivered.

Lambert earned the win on the mound – in only her freshman season. She went the complete game and struck out five, allowing three earned runs on eight hits and two walks.

Phillips took the loss for Live Oak, also going the complete game, allowing three earned runs on eight hits and four walks.

Lambert and Sophia Patin each had two hits in the championship game.

Villasenor said that there were times early in the season that her confidence waned. The sophomore was the District 8-5A Offensive MVP in 2025, but started this season a bit slower.

But she began to heat up in a big way from midseason onward. And in the championship game, she was every bit the feared slugger she's been at her very best at Hahnville.

"(Being named Outstanding Player), also feels amazing ... my confidence was down at the beginning of the year and I brought that up," Villasenor said. "And my teammates were a very big part of that every step of the way."

Said Duplantis, "As we got into the middle of the season, you started seeing Rylee's confidence come back. She started to hit some home runs. In (the semifinal), she hit a single to score a run. And you could see the confidence there. And today, I knew with a pitcher (for Live Oak) who throws in and out, and not really an up pitch, that goes in (Villasenor's) favor for sure. And today she took advantage of it."

It was Hahnville's second win over Live Oak this season. The Tigers defeated Live Oak 12-7 in Hahnville's second game of the regular season on Feb. 19. That win over the Eagles was Hahnville's first win of the 2026 season – and Sunday's was its last.

After the game, Duplantis huddled with his team for one final time on the field this season and reminded his players – when he arrived at Hahnville two years ago, he told them this moment was coming.

"It's work ethic. It all starts in the weight room. All summer, all fall. We pitch twice a week, all year long. London is a freshman, and we watched her grow throughout the year. All these girls refused to stay down when we were losing some games at the beginning of the year. They all wanted to come back up, to get better and to give ourselves a chance to make a run at state," Duplantis said.

The Tigers showed mental toughness throughout their playoff run that's especially rare for the team's youth – Hahnville's lineup is largely comprised of underclassmen.

"My biggest thing as a coach is to make these kids believe in each other, and believe in me, because in 2026 every team has good ballplayers. They do. So, if you can get them to buy in to what you're saying, and buy into the program, you give yourself a good shot," Duplantis said.

SEMIFINALS – HHS 6, ST. AMANT 4 – The 5th seeded Gators rallied to tie the game 4-4 after falling behind Hahnville 4-0. The Tigers shook it off quickly, with the top of the order coming through to retake the lead. Adriana Walton led off with a single, then stole second and reached third on an error. Emma Jackson bunted for a single and brought Walton home for the go-ahead run – Jackson got to second on the play.

London Lambert was intentionally walked and Shelby Theriot was hit by a pitch to load the bases with no outs. St. Amant pitcher Brently Bourque got the next two batters out, but Jordyn Chaix drew a walk to force home another run, making it 6-4.

The two-run lead was plenty enough for Lambert to slam the door when she

took the mound in the bottom of the seventh. Lambert struck out two batters before getting the game-ending fly out, which Emersen Tregre put away to seal the win – and a spot in the championship game.

Jackson singled home Hahnville's first run of the day in the third inning. Jackson would score on an error later in the inning after a Theriot bunt. Rylee Villasenor's sacrifice fly to plate Jordan Lirette made it 3-0 and Sophie Baudouin hit a line drive to center field for an RBI single to set HHS up with a 4-0 lead.

St. Amant (25-8) pushed two runs across in the fourth inning, Devin Tanner scoring on a passed ball before Kaydi Landry's sacrifice fly scored Kyndall Landry to make it 4-2. Kenley Triche's sacrifice fly in the bottom of the

sixth scored Kyndall Landry and made it 4-3, then Maddie Stevens' RBI single tied the game at 4.

Jackson went 2-for-4 at the plate with two runs and two RBIs. Walton went 2-for-4 with two runs scored and two stolen bases.

Lambert went the complete game to earn the win on the mound, allowing three earned runs on nine hits and one walk. She struck out four.

Hahnville got to St. Amant starting pitcher Kyndall Landry early – she allowed just one earned run on five hits and a walk, but allowed four runs total in 2.2 innings. She struck out four.

Destrehan reaches first semifinal since 2005, sweeps Benton

Destrehan's caught fire – and there's no better time for it.

The No. 14 seeded Wildcats traveled to No. 6 Benton and swept the Tigers in the Division I non-select quarterfinals, earning back-to-back wins by the same 4-2 score to win the best-of-three series and advance to the state semifinals.

Destrehan (29-12) will face No. 2 Sam Houston (30-8) in the semifinal round. Sam Houston advanced by sweeping No. 7 Walker in the quarterfinals, 2-0 and 9-4. Sam Houston will host the best of three series, which begins Friday at 6 p.m. Game 2 is scheduled for Saturday at noon, with Game 3, if necessary, played following Game 2 as part of a doubleheader.

It's the first time Destrehan has reached the state semifinals since 2005 – which doubles as the last time the Wildcats reached the state championship game. Destrehan will try to match that feat when it takes on Sam Houston – the division's defending state champion.

Destrehan head coach Chris Mire said the team has been

feeling the love from its community since returning home – and truly before that return trip even began.

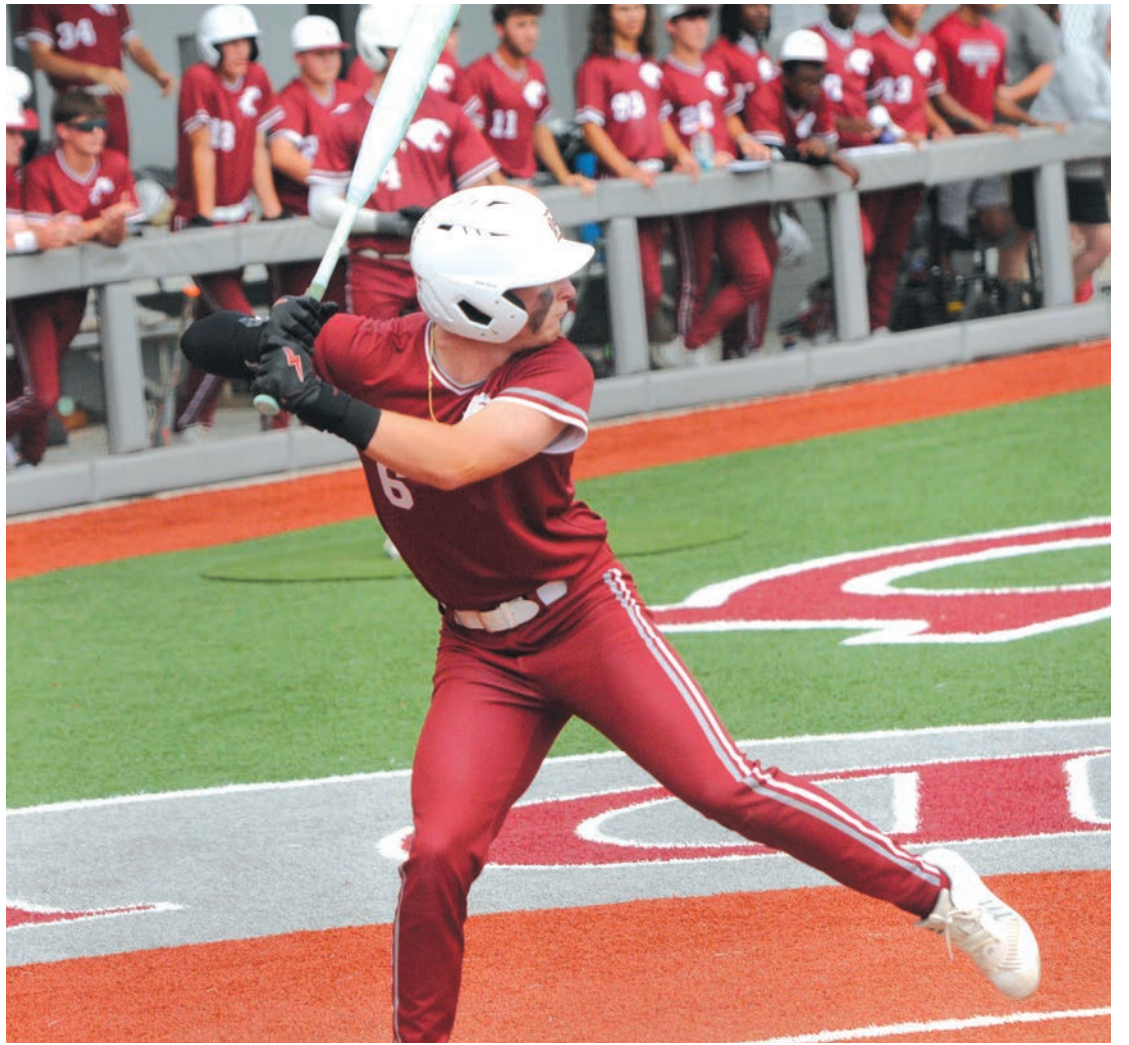
"We actually have had a good bit of fans travel," said Mire – Benton is a nearly seven-hour drive from Destrehan. "And everybody's been watching on the live stream. It's been amazing hearing from the former players, especially that group that (reached the semifinals) 20 years ago. We've been hearing from everybody."

It will be Mire's first trip to the state tournament as a head coach, but he's no stranger to these rounds. As an assistant coach, he was part of the staff at 2002 state champion Christian Life and state runners-up at Destrehan in 2003 and 2005.

"I'm very happy for our players, because I've experienced it as an assistant coach and I know how special it is. For them to experience it and see it first-hand makes everything worth it," said Mire.

Tigers fall in decisive game of quarterfinal series

After a Game 2 win to force a deciding final game in its quarterfinal baseball series at Zachary, Hahnville fell one win short of advancing to the Division I non-select state semifinals.

Zachary won the deciding game 6-1 Sunday, the No. 4 seeded Broncos advancing to the semifinal round where it will play No. 8 Dutchtown.

It brought to an end a Hahnville season that saw the Tigers finish 31-8, those 31 wins setting a new program record for wins in a season. That included a stretch that saw Hahnville win 24 out of 25 games. HHS carried a 20-game winning streak into the Zachary series.

"Zachary has a really good team ... the ball didn't bounce our way," said Hahnville head baseball coach Jared Vial. "This one hurt and it leaves a sour taste in your mouth. But at the same time, I'm proud of our guys. They competed to the end. This is a team that's really together – they handled their business day-to-day and really clicked all year. We just fell short in the end."

The Tigers led 1-0 early in Game 3 on Koa Romero's solo first inning home run. But

Zachary plated three in the bottom half of the inning to take a lead it wouldn't relinquish.

Tyler Wilson went 2-for-3 for Zachary (28-9), with one RBI and a run scored. Cullen Howard drove in two runs.

Javonte Gray took the loss on the mound for Hahnville, allowing two earned runs on two hits. Landen Teague came on in relief to pitch five innings, allowing two earned runs and striking out six.

Zachary's Madden McClure went the complete game for the win, striking out three and allowing one earned run on four hits and four walks.

"(McClure) just went out and executed," Vial said. "He was throwing breaking balls and changeups off the plate ... he stayed away from us all game and made us jump at it. We tried making an adjustment there during the game, but he was just efficient. He's a senior and I think he had a little bit of that back against the wall kind of competitor to him."

Vial said a few defensive

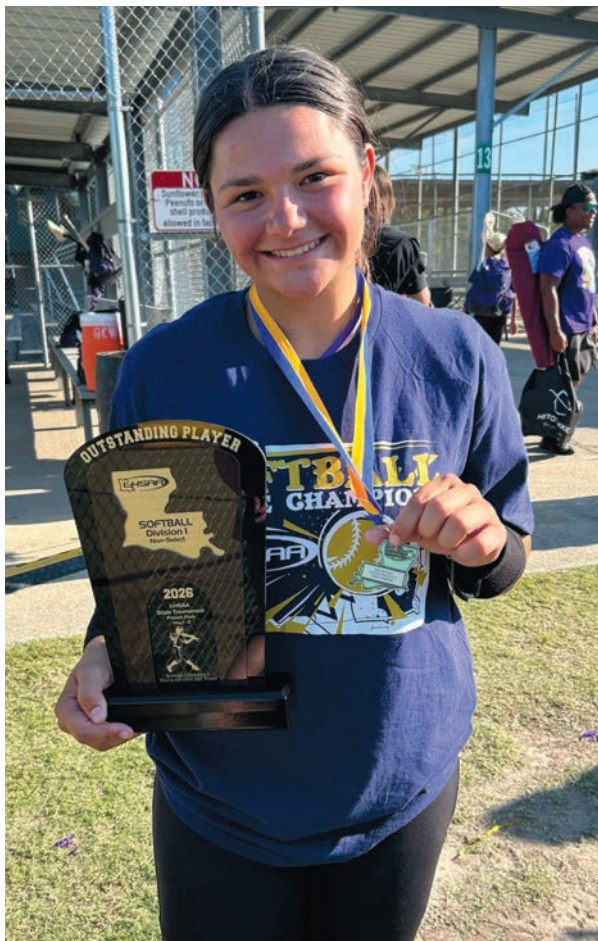
beginning of the year and I brought that up,” Villasenor said. “And my teammates were a very big part of that every step of the way.”

Through 12 games, the slugger wasn't able to fully lock in and the breakout game she was working for eluded her.

That began to change in the middle of March. Villasenor hit her first home run of the season on March 13 against Walker, then doubled against Sam Houston. Neither game seemed otherwise notable for the Tigers – it was a 9-4 loss at Walker and a 15-5 loss at Sam Houston, part of a 3-game losing streak for Hahnville.

But those games represented a huge turning point for the Tigers – Rylee Villasenor's slump was over.

She drove in two runs in a 13-3 win over Oak Grove to snap the losing streak. Then she went 3-for-3 with a home run in a 19-2 victory over East St. John. She doubled, homered and drove in three runs in a 12-3 win over South Terrebonne.



She hit a home run and four RBIs against Central Lafourche, then another home run against Berwick and another against Sterlington – all wins.

“You started seeing Rylee's confidence come back,” Duplantis said.

Villasenor officially had her swagger back, and so did the Lady Tigers.

Hahnville went 7-7 through its first 14 games of the season. From the Oak Grove game onward, and with Villasenor on a tear in the middle of the Tigers' order, HHS went 17-5, including their five postseason victories.

And, of course, including the last of those victories – capped by Villasenor scoring the final, most critical run of the season.

“She had her ups and downs this year and she fought through them,” Duplantis said. “I was so happy for our team and for myself, but so very happy for her to have that moment.”

The Outstanding Player award was representative of just how much her determination to turn her season around paid off.

“I'm so proud (of the honor) and to be that player that I know I was when I arrived at Hahnville,” said Villasenor.

She said she has long drawn inspiration from her older brothers, who played football at Hahnville. She also gave a specific nod to her brother Cole, a talented rusher and pass receiver as a running back for the Tigers' football team. His prep career ended prematurely due to a torn ACL suffered early in his senior season. When Villasenor was very young, she was determined to play football like her big brothers before giving softball a try and falling in love with the sport.

“My brother's senior year, he tore his ACL and didn't get to go where he wanted to go. And I honestly took that in and that's part of my fire,” Villasenor said.

At first, he was hesitant, but he gave it a shot – and he says it was one of the best decisions he could have made.

“I fell in love with it,” Duplantis said. “I like the fast pace of it, I like the way you can engineer a little bit more at third base with the quick game and small ball. And coaching girls, when you get them to buy in, they'll go through a wall for you. I've been lucky to have teams where I feel like the girls will do anything to help our team win.”

His first season with H.L. Bourgeois, and the subsequent offseason, was about building a foundation.

“That first year at Bourgeois wasn't very good,” said Duplantis, who served as Braves softball coach for four years. “We didn't make the playoffs. We won maybe 11 games that season. I got in a little late – I didn't start with them until December.”

Once he had a full offseason to work with his team and install his program, things began to turn.

“We got into the weight room all summer and worked ... we made it to the playoffs, which was a big deal at the time for us,” Duplantis said. “I was learning as I went. Going from baseball to softball,

there were a lot of things I didn't understand – so going to coaches clinics, talking to people who have been around the game a long time and trying to pick up on things every single year was something I made a point of doing.”

The move to Vandebilt Catholic was a big jump – the Terriers program has a strong tradition, with 16 state championships in its history.

Even so, Vandebilt had not been to the state tournament in Sulphur since 2014. Duplantis was determined to end that drought. He did that in year two.

“Going to Vandebilt Catholic was one of the best things for my career ... they had some talent, and they had some girls who wanted to work,” said Duplantis. “We had a lot of young kids who were good ballplayers.”

Duplantis noted the 2024 championship team had a few seniors, but a large component of the team was comprised of 8th, 9th and 10th graders – not dissimilar to his current Hahnville roster.

But he knew one day he would return to the public school system, after accruing 13 years as an educator already in Louisiana. When the Hahnville job opened, he said he recognized that it

would be the right fit.

The Lady Tigers, he said, bought in – and the rest is history.

“When I got here, I told the girls that we will win – you've got to trust the

process, you've got to work hard and you've got to believe that you can do it,” said Duplantis.

HAHNVILLE 3, PATRICK TAYLOR 1 – HHS beat an eventual state semifinalist in a pitcher’s duel between London Lambert and Ashtyn Rogers. Lambert struck out eight in her complete game 1-hitter, and Rogers struck out 14. Jordyn Chaix’s 1st inning two-run homer gave the Tigers the lead for good. Chaix also stole a base in the win.

HAHNVILLE 8, STERLINGTON 3 – The Tigers scored six runs over the first three innings to defeat the eventual Division III non-select champion Panthers. Emma Jackson and Rylee Villasenor each homered. Jordan Lirette and Sophie Baudouin each stole two bases. Jackson scored four runs and London Lambert drove in three.

HAHNVILLE 6, HAUGHTON 3 – A preview of what would be an eventual 1st round rematch. Rylee Villasenor and Addison Walton each earned two hits for HHS.

HAHNVILLE 4, CHAPELLE 1 – The Tigers earn a win over an eventual state semifinalist shortly before the end of the regular season. London Lambert allowed one run in a complete game effort and struck out nine. She and Sophie Baudouin each drove in runs for the Tigers.

HAHNVILLE 10, MANDEVILLE 7 – For a team that would show its ability

to bounce back from adversity and answer the bell in the postseason, this was one example of that mental toughness in the final game of the regular season. Hahnville trailed 3-0 before taking a 5-3 lead in the 5th, then fell behind 6-5 before putting together a second straight 5-run inning to take control for good. Rylee Villasenor homered and drove in three runs and Sophie Baudouin drove in two in the win.

ROUND 1: HAHNVILLE 5, HAUGHTON 0 – Through bunts and baserunning, Hahnville pressed the Haughton defense into mistakes – and ultimately, the Tigers propelled themselves into the second round. after losing the opener of its first round series with Fontainebleau, including back-to-back sweeps. The first of those sweeps came at West Monroe – another long-distance trip, and another the Wildcats made worth their while through their performance.

“These guys are just so locked in right now,” Mire said. “I asked them (after the West Monroe win), ‘Are y’all done? Are y’all satisfied?’ We challenge them, and they were quick to say no. We had a great week of preparation and they were very focused.”

Destrehan earned the clinching win over Benton Saturday by doing its offensive work early, scoring four runs within the first three innings, including a three-run second inning.

The score held until the top of the sixth inning when Case Jordan doubled home Kannon Greer, who singled with two outs in the previous at-bat.

But that was the last push for Benton (29-8-2). Marcotte took the mound in the seventh and shut the door, sealing the win for Destrehan.

Josh Muller started and went 5.2 innings to earn the win on the mound for Destrehan. He allowed two earned runs on six hits and four walks and struck out one. Marcotte went 1.1 innings and allowed no runs on two hits while striking out one for the save.

McClure went 3-for-3 with a double, three runs scored and three RBIs. Noah Sullivan went 2-for-4 with a double and four

RBIs. Kam Bailey homered, going 2-for-3 with four runs scored and three RBIs.

Sullivan went the complete five inning game, striking out seven and allowing one earned run on two hits and a walk.

Guarisco homered for Hahnville. Teague doubled and scored a run for Hahnville. Bennett Naquin drove in a run as well.

Matt Plaisance took the loss for Hahnville, allowing three earned runs on two hits and five walks.

Vial said he and the Tigers knew the series would be a challenge, and the expectation was that the series would go the distance.

He said that Sullivan, a Louisiana Tech commit, was as advertised.

“He was really sharp ... one of the top pitchers we’ve faced this year,” Vial said.

Hahnville’s 31 wins came against one of the toughest schedules in the state. The Tigers earned the District 8-5A championship, going unbeaten in league play, and earned the No. 5 seed in Division I non-select and an opening round bye. The 5 seed was the highest Hahnville has reached since the power point system was implemented.

Vial said that while of course the team wanted to march on and into the semifinals, this season should make the Tigers even more formidable next year. The team will return the vast majority of its lineup and pitching rotation next year, with Naquin representing the lone everyday senior starter this season.

“These guys definitely raised the bar this year,” said Vial. “So, we’ve got to really lock in and have a good offseason and bring the mindset into next year that we’ve got unfinished business ... this group has put Hahnville baseball in everybody’s ear around the state ... we’re excited for the team we’ve got coming back.”

Pitz said she is looking forward to watching people look through everything for sale and walk out with a stack of books.

“It is especially heartwarming to see kids get so excited about being able to pick out books for themselves,” she said.

NEW ORLEANS (April 21, 2026) — Today, Pontchartrain Conservancy received \$1 million from Valero to fund a multi-year coastal forest restoration initiative. The foundation of this project is thorough baseline monitoring of environmental conditions, which will enable




